## LIBERAL MANIFESTO ISSUED FROM THE CAPITAL GREAT POLITICAL MIXUP IN CONSTITUENCY OF ATLIN; SEVEN CANDIDATES

### Premier John Oliver Issues Public Manifesto to Electors

Favors administration of Liquor Law through Commission  
and would regulate near beer sales; railway proposals

VANCOUVER, November 4.—Premier Oliver has issued a manifesto on behalf of the Government in which he states that favors administration of the Moderation Act under a commission or Board of Control, which would prohibit the sale of malt spirituous liquors to persons under 21 years of age. For the effective control of the sale of near beer, he favors securing legislation from the Federal Government to govern the supply as well as sale of liquor in the province.

The Premier says legislation will be prepared by the legislature newly elected and acting under direct instructions from the electorate. This will be more effective and workable than legislation proposed in advance of an election.

Coming to the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, the Premier says that \$33,000,000 in all has been absorbed in the undertaking and that when it is completed from Squamish to Prince George approximately \$37,000,000 will have been invested in the undertaking. To complete the line from Squamish to Vancouver another \$5,000,000 is needed. The administration proposes to complete the line between Squamish and Prince George by September next and to temporarily secure the extension of the Edson, Dunvegan Railway to British Columbia for the purpose of settlers.

Mr. Oliver proposes to immediately enter into negotiations with the Dominion Government and the Canadian Pacific Railway for a subsidy for the construction of the railway.

The manifesto, among other things, declares the Government's intention to spare no efforts to secure the establishment of pulp and paper mills and also a plant for the production of iron.

At the expiration of the lease McRae Bros. propose erecting a substantial fire proof building with a large basement, the rock from the basement to be used in construction of the building. The basement will house the print shop. The other parts of the building will be used to accommodate their rapidly growing stationery and general business.

### DELEGATES TO CONVENTION OF LIBERALS

Among those present at the meeting was D. G. McKay of Ocean Falls who will be delegate from that town to the convention. He said he expected to support the candidature of Mr. Pattullo. The Government had made some enemies by trying to keep the expenditures within the income, but he felt that the people as a whole would appreciate their work. The Liberal Government had been a good one. Considering the legacy of debt that had been left them by the former administration, they had done wonderful work. Now that the worst of the difficulties had been surmounted they would do even better. They certainly deserved another term. They were trying to develop the natural resources of the country and it would be a good thing for Prince Rupert to have as its representative a minister of the crown and one holding so important position as head of the lands department.

### Free for All Seems Likely in Atlin Constituency with Seven Candidates in Field

ANYOX, November 4.—Reorganization of the Liberal Club was effected last night at a meeting held here. A convention of Liberals will follow tomorrow and proxies will in some cases be secured by telegraph. The names submitted will probably be those of Bert Kergin of Alice Arm and O. B. Bush of Stewart. There is some doubt expressed as to whether Bush will attend as he has already commenced an independent canvass.

The new Liberal Club starts out with much confidence and Harry Chapman, who was elected president, is a man of great energy. Bert Hillbert is vice-president and Fred Brown secretary. The executive committee is made up of James Dick, Peter Gibson, John Ritchie, and George Jessup.

The officers and committee were selected as delegates to the convention.

There will be delegates from Alice Arm and Anyox but not likely from other points owing to the lateness of the call.

#### Pat Daly Meeting.

Pat Daly, the independent labor candidate addressed a well attended meeting in recreation hall last night and took particular delight in brief salutes at the Conservative choice, W. G. Ross.

He declared that Mr. Ross was finding the going hard and that the party leaders had to send all the way to Washington to bring Charlie Culkin, an old Bowser worker in the north, off his ranch to organize the north and line up the Tories.

Ross, he said, was sent to Stewart for the express purpose of catching the Atlin seat. Daly also had some fun at the expense of Bert Kergin, who, he said, had called a rival meeting, which was not mustering many supporters. Daly advocated a legislature composed of employers and employees and less of lawyers and other professional men.

W. G. Ross, the Conservative choice, is expected back from Alice Arm today and it is a foregone conclusion that the Conservative convention will nominate him on Saturday.

#### Other Candidates.

### Pattullo Addresses Liberal Gathering

Tells of work he has done for the constituency and justifies his action in regard to preferential treatment for north

"Some of the people in this district have said that the north is being robbed in the interests of the south, and the people of the south have been saying that the minister of lands takes everything to the north. There is no foundation for either of these criticisms," said the minister of lands, Hon. T. D. Pattullo, in an address at a well attended Liberal meeting last night, at which a number of ladies were present. Mr. Pattullo made a rattling good speech in which he showed that his actions had been in the public interest since the beginning of Prince Rupert although his acts had often for political reasons been misrepresented.

Mr. Pattullo said he knew this district got more than its share of appropriations, considered on the basis of population, but he could justify that by the fact that the difficulties of development in the newer parts of the province were greater than in the older parts.

There had been a lot of money spent on roads and trails for the benefit of farmers and miners, in addition to the appropriations for this city, which were unusually large. He had been severely criticized for securing these, but he had no excuses to offer. In fighting for the four hundred thousand dollar appropriation for government buildings here he had shown clearly that the Government was pledged to provide these buildings at the time of the land sale.

Mr. Pattullo said that as representative of this district he could not expect support if he did not get a proper share of appropriations for it and as minister of lands he had to work for the whole of the province equally. They must not ask for impossible things.

#### Much Was Spent.

The minister said that during their term of office they had borrowed \$27,000,000. Of this \$4,360,000 had gone to pay off current liabilities of the former government, which had dissipated the assets of the province for years to such an extent that when this government came into power there was only \$6,000,000 of revenue and \$10,000,000 outgoing which must be paid.

Of the big sum borrowed \$4,288,000 had to be paid to the Union Bank on account of Foley, Welch & Stewart obligations, and \$9,500,000 to the P. G. E. to carry on construction. This property had now been offered to the Dominion Government and should be taken over by them as a national undertaking.

#### Land Settlement.

The sum of \$2,650,000 had been spent on land settlement work, much of it being in the north and of great benefit to Prince Rupert. Much of the progress of this city was due to the development of the lands of the interior. \$1,351,000 had been spent on the better housing scheme, of which this city got many times her share.

**PREMIER MINE  
LOOKING GOOD**

**H. A. Guess, Vice-President and General Manager, Got Back This Morning from Stewart**

H. A. Guess, vice-president of the American Smelting and Refining Co., which company last year purchased a controlling interest in the Premier Gold Mining Co., returned this morning from Stewart on the Queen and leaves again tonight for Seattle. Mr. Guess is in charge of the mining operations of the American Smelting and Refining Co. and in his official capacity has been making an inspection of the Premier mine. He may return again during the course of the winter. His headquarters are in New York City.

Speaking to the News this morning, Mr. Guess expressed his pleasure at the appearance of the property. Development operations are bringing forth showings that come up to the most optimistic expectations. Shipping, it is expected, will commence in a fortnight, when the snow has fallen sufficiently to allow hauling over it. Already there has been 50 tons come out this season over the roads but it became so muddy that no more has been brought out that way. Two caterpillar tractors are now on the way to Stewart and they will be used on the snow this winter in bringing out the ore for shipment. Besides these, sleds will also be used.

**Water Power.**

In about a month's time the water power plant at the Premier will be in operation and larger compressors will be used, thus allowing for more extensive development in the mine. The cyanide mill, Mr. Guess says, will be completed and running next spring and then only the highest grade values will be shipped out and no dross will have to be taken away from the mine.

Bert F. Smith has been removed from Hazelton to Stewart where he will be assistant to Dale S. Pitt, the manager at the Premier.

## BRINGING UP FATHER



## BIG WORK ON PRINCE RUPERT

**Captain Logan says Biggest Ship  
Ever Turned Over by Sailors  
on Pacific Coast**

That the bringing of the steamer Prince Rupert to an even keel as she lay upon the bottom at Swanson Bay was the largest job of its kind ever accomplished on the Pacific Coast is the declaration of Captain W. H. Logan, representative of the Salvage Association, London, says the Victoria Colonist.

The prominent feature of the salvage work being done by the Pacific Salvage Company, said Captain Logan, "is the fact that the Rupert, which lay on her beam ends, was brought to an even keel in two weeks, without the breaking of a line or the injury of a man and with little damage to the ship. I consider that job the equal of any done in any part of the world. The Rupert is the biggest ship ever turned over by salvors on the Pacific Coast. The method was not unusual. It was merely the pontoon method rightly applied."

### Tide Helped in Work

To bring the wreck to an upright position two big scows were used. Sixteen two-inch lines connected them with the ship. The lift of the tide did the rest. The Pacific Salvage Company's steamer Algerine started work on October 2. The gear was in position on October 14. On October 18 the ship was upright and in a good position.

The cofferdam, stated Captain Logan, would be the largest ever used by the local salvage company and perhaps the largest in the history of salvage work on this coast. It will be 56 feet high at the highest point, and 40 feet at the forward end.

### Mail and Baggage

While such a move would in no wise aid in the salvage work, the Pacific Salvage Company, for sentimental reasons, had its divers remove the baggage and mail from the Prince Rupert when that ship reached an even keel. The company realized how anxiously

the mail and baggage was awaited. Capt. Logan expects that the Prince Rupert will be raised in five or six weeks.

The salvage work on the Prince Rupert is being done by the salvage company under the direction of Capt. Logan, who praises the work of the salvage men on the present big job.

## WOMAN BEATS OFF ROBBER

The man accosted Mrs. Tuley at Charles and Sloane Street as she was on her way to her home, 2724 Gravely Street and ordered her to throw up her hands, at the same time grabbing for her handbag, which the lady carried.

With great presence of mind Mrs. Tuley carried the fight into the enemy's country and labored her assailant with the bag in question, keeping him at bay until a passing autoist, seeing the trouble, came to her assistance, when the stranger fled.

SHIPYARD MEN  
HAVE MEETING

Situation Thoroughly Gone Into  
But Little New is  
Brought Out.

ASKING OTTAWA WHAT  
IS REASONABLE PERIOD

A second meeting of the local shipyard workers was held yesterday afternoon in the McIntyre hall and the situation thoroughly gone into again. There was nothing new uncovered with the exception of the telegram received by President Parker of the Board of Trade which was furnished to the meeting by the Daily News and was read. This telegram appeared in full in yesterday's papers.

Considerable dissatisfaction was expressed at the use of the term "reasonable period" in the telegram and after a thorough discussion a committee consisting of Messrs. Ellis, Fanthorpe, Blundell, Smith, Dickens, Kenyon, Hammond and Burnough, was named to draft a telegram to the minister asking him to define what was meant by the phrase in question. The urgent need and, in some cases, distress brought about by the sudden suspension of work and pay was given as a strong reason for the insistence of the demands.

## Pattullo Speaks.

Mr. Pattullo appeared in response to a request by one of the committee appointed on Monday. He answered a number of questions satisfactorily but could throw little further light on the situation. From a legal standpoint he considered that the failure of the company to pay wages for a number of weeks was defaulting on the contract and had wired the minister that there must be something wrong with the contract if that was not so. He suggested that the meeting draft a resolution to be wired to Ottawa urging the need of immediate attention and relief for the employees, and that if a copy of the same were given to him he would be glad to supplement it by a wire of his own. Col. Peck should also receive a copy of the same telegram and he would doubtless take similar action.

In regard to the reference to "sufficient funds" in the published telegram received from the minister by the Board of Trade, it apparently referred to the funds voted by the government for carrying on the building of ships, of which, from the telegram, there was apparently a surplus still in hand. If there was not enough the government had the power to draw a special warrant for the deficit.

After Mr. Pattullo had left his suggestion of giving copies of the telegram to himself and Col. Peck was approved and the committee so instructed.

A motion was carried that no legal steps be taken until the government had been tried out.

The meeting then adjourned to the call of the committee.

SCOTLAND VOTES  
ON PROHIBITION

LONDON, Nov. 3.—In the Scotch vote on the liquor question out of 48 areas 14 have voted no change, while three have gone in favor of prohibition.



SHIPYARD MEN  
AWAITING NEWS

No Developments in Regard to  
Reopening of Drydock.

Although there has been nothing heard since yesterday as to the turn of affairs that might have transpired in connection with the drydock question, there seems to be a cheerful spirit among those concerned and nobody seems to think that the present shut-down is going to last very long. Indeed some, with an appearance of authority, state that it will open up again very soon under the direct control of the Department of Marine. However, there seems to be nothing to show for their beliefs.

Neither J. H. Pillsbury, manager, nor Col. C. W. Peck, M.P., had any information to give out in connection with the matter at noon today and N. Booth, general secretary of the O. B. U., stated that there had been no reply received by the special committee of shipyard workers that yesterday sent a message to Hon. C. G. Ballantyne, minister of marine, asking what he meant by "reasonable period."

An assurance given by the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon that some provision shall be made for any immediate distress was received with general relief.

BODY FLOATING  
IN THE HARBOR

Finlander at Vancouver Dis-  
appeared Several Months Ago,  
Comes in Tide

VANCOUVER, Nov. 3.—On Tuesday afternoon a body was found floating in the inlet and taken to the city morgue. It was identified as that of D. Elias Seppala, a Finlander aged 50, who had resided in Canada for the past thirty years. He had not been seen for about three months, his movements throughout his lifetime being very uncertain. He was in the habit of going from one place to another, for which reason his disappearance several months ago elicited no comment among his acquaintances.

HINDU CLAIMS THAT  
HE WAS ROBBED OF  
CASH AND A WATCH

Mike Zersky came up before Magistrate McMordie this morning in the police court for preliminary hearing on a theft charge preferred by Arjohn Singh, a Hindu, who claims he was relieved by the accused of \$105 in cash and a silver watch. The case was adjourned until tomorrow morning when Magistrate McMordie will give his decision as to whether accused is to be released or committed for trial.
