Local Lumber Mill Bids on Foreign Shipment Order

Difficulty in shipping by water is lack of assembly dock here; rail shipments are still cut off by high rates

An inquiry has been received by the Prince Rupert Lumber Co. in connection with a shipment of a cargo of lumber, approximately two million feet. This is for the foreign market and if secured would keep the local mill going for some time. If no orders are received the mill will have to close before very long. Rail shipments have been wholly closed off by the high freight rates, with the exception of the special order being shipped to U. K. on which the mill is now working, and which will be completed this month.

The difficulty in making foreign shipments is the lack of an assembly dock, mention of which has been made on several occasions. At the present lumber dock about 80,000 feet can be assembled within reach of ship's tackle, but that is nothing like enough to provide for a cargo of say, two million feet, such as would be almost a minimum for foreign shipment. The lack of accommodation for assembling lumber, combined with the shut off in rail business has put all the local lumber mills out of business, with the exception of the Prince Rupert mill. Some of these will not start again under the same management and the dislocation of business arising therefrom is therefore more or less permanent. The establishment of an assembly dock immediately would be an aid to the industry, which is a basic one here.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM A SERIOUS ACCIDENT

Princess Charlotte and Empress of Russia Almost Collide at Victoria.

VICTORIA, November 9.—The steamer Princess Charlotte bound for Seattle with hundreds of people aboard nearly collided with the Empress of Russia inbound on Monday in a fog.

The Charlotte outbound was forcing her way through the thick fog when the Russia suddenly loomed up scarcely a boat's length away. Capt. Griffin put on full speed ahead and drew off before an accident could occur.

Captain Formby Receives Conservative Nomination

Young Imperial Officer is selection of convention held last evening on decision to keep inside the rank and file of the party

At their nominating convention held in the new Frizzell block last evening, the Conservatives selected Captain Charles Bernhard Formby as their candidate in the forthcoming election. Their decision was made unanimously after some discussion in which it was urged to select a man to represent the Conservatives from within the party and not accept the offer of any outside independent candidates who might desire their support. The nomination was moved by J. C. McLennan and seconded by John Sinclair. The chairman of the meeting was John Flewin of Port Simpson and the secretary, R. W. Cameron.

On the decision being made, Captain Formby expressed his thanks for the honor the party had conferred upon him and agreed with the convention on the wisdom of selecting a man to contest the election from the ranks of the Conservative Association. The party would thereby be held together.

Captain Formby is a native of Liverpool, Lancashire, England, and is only 28 years of age. He came to Canada ten or eleven years ago but immediately the Great War broke out in 1914 he enlisted with a Canadian unit. He was mobilized at Camp Valcartier. He, however, met with an accident riding on a motorcycle and was unable to go over with the unit and when he recovered paid his own expenses to England in order to rejoin them. Arriving overseas he was taken by the Royal Garrison Artillery, of the Imperial forces, and with this unit served throughout the war, five and a half years in all, more than three of which he was in active service in Gallipoli, Egypt and Belgium. He held the rank of acting major for a good part of the time he was in the service and retired with the permanent rank of captain.

Captain Formby who is an electrician by trade has been in Prince Rupert for somewhat over a year and is a member of the firm of Pattinson & Ling, Ltd., electrical contractors. He took an active part in the recent temperance prohibitive and was vice-president of the local branch of the Moderation League.

HOMICIDE VERDICT OF CORONER'S JURY

Witness Says Victim Flourished Revolver in Face of Inspectors.

WINDSOR, Nov. 9.—Justifiable homicide was the verdict of the coroner's jury on the death of Beverly Trumble who was shot by Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin, pastor and license inspector, on Saturday.

The most alarming feature of the evidence was that of the two doctors. A man named Smith told them on the morning of the death of Trumble that the dead man had a gun and had flourished it in the face of the inspectors.

CHANGE JAIL SAVE PRISONER

Prohibition Officer Moved to Chatham Following Killing of In Keeper

WINDSOR, Nov. 8.—Rev. J. O. Spracklin, Methodist minister and prohibition enforcement officer, who had been held in jail here in connection with the shooting of Beverly Trumble, inmate, has been moved to Chatham jail.

His removal was effected following a telephone message to the jail here that attempted violence was contemplated by friends of the slain man.

FRANCE WILL NOT SEND HELP

PARIS, Nov. 9.—France has decided not to send military help to General Wrangel, anti-Bolshevik leader, who is reported to be hard pressed by the enemy.

THE LATE SENATOR

L. W. Shatford had Large Property Interests, Partner of H. Stevens

VANCOUVER, Nov. 9.—Senator L. W. Shatford, whose death took place yesterday morning, was 47 years of age. He was elected to the legislature for Similkameen in 1903 and re-elected in 1907, serving as Conservative member for that district until 1916. The following year he was called to the Senate.

The late Senator leaves three brothers, L. W. T. Shatford of Port Moody, B. A. Shatford and S. A. Shatford of Vancouver. He also leaves four children.

A business associate of H. H. Stevens, M.P., Senator Shatford was looked upon as one of the ablest business men of the interior. He was interested in mining and land. He was not a very strong party man, but was always ready to look after the interests of any of his constituents.

Better Housing Not Understood.

The Better Housing scheme of the Provincial Government is not generally understood. When the inter-provincial conference was held to discuss matters of common interest to all the provinces, the conference urged on the Dominion Government that they should assist in the work of housing, which was a crying need. British Columbia took a prominent part in this conference and especially in urging that the Dominion should do its share. As a result the Dominion agreed to lend the provinces a considerable sum of money, of which British Columbia borrowed \$1,500,000. For this money the credit of the province was pledged, just as in other loans, only in this case the money was secured at a rather lower rate of interest than was being paid for private loans.

The British Columbia Government decided to give the returned soldiers the benefit of this loan, and the whole was taken up by them to provide homes for married men. The terms of repayment were made easy and a sum of \$300 is given each borrower to be reduced from the final payments on the property. The cost of handling the money, which is always considerable, and the loss on the unused part during the time it was lying idle and the interest accruing, as well as the donation of \$300, is all borne by the province, the borrower being given the benefit of getting the money at five per cent instead of at eight or ten per cent which are the current mortgage rates.

Of the money set aside for better housing, Prince Rupert got many times her share. Mr. Pattullo, the local member, and the minister under whose charge the loans were made, justifies the granting of so large a sum here, on the ground that the need here was great. He was right. The need here was great. The loans were taken up with eagerness by the soldiers and if there had been a million dollars more there would have been applicants for it all from civilians who were wanting houses. However, the money was used to great advantage, and the new houses across Morse Creek are largely the result of the policy of the Government.

Political Line Up Seems Now Complete.

With the nomination last night of Capt. Formby in the Conservative interest the list of candidates now seems to be complete, although it is still open for a fifth man to step into the lists and take a tilt for the prize, if he should so desire. Capt. Formby is a soldier, and in civil life an electrician. He is a young man full of energy. He was rather prominent recently in opposing prohibition and should put up a clean fight for the party whom he represents. He is an Englishman who has lived in Canada for some years and he still looks at many Canadian questions through English eyes. We welcome him into the field although we cannot support him in his political aspirations.

The other candidates are all well known in the city. Mr. Pattullo is receiving very wide support, not only from members of his own party but from Conservatives and labor men who recognize the work he has done and the desirability of having a minister of the crown representing this city. Mr. Newton, the self-nominated man, is also running on his record in civic affairs. Mr. Burrough was chosen at a convention of labor men but it is alleged that the convention was captured by the Q. B. U. and as a result most of the other labor men have left him or are lying low.

CITY TO PURCHASE TRACTOR OUTRIGHT

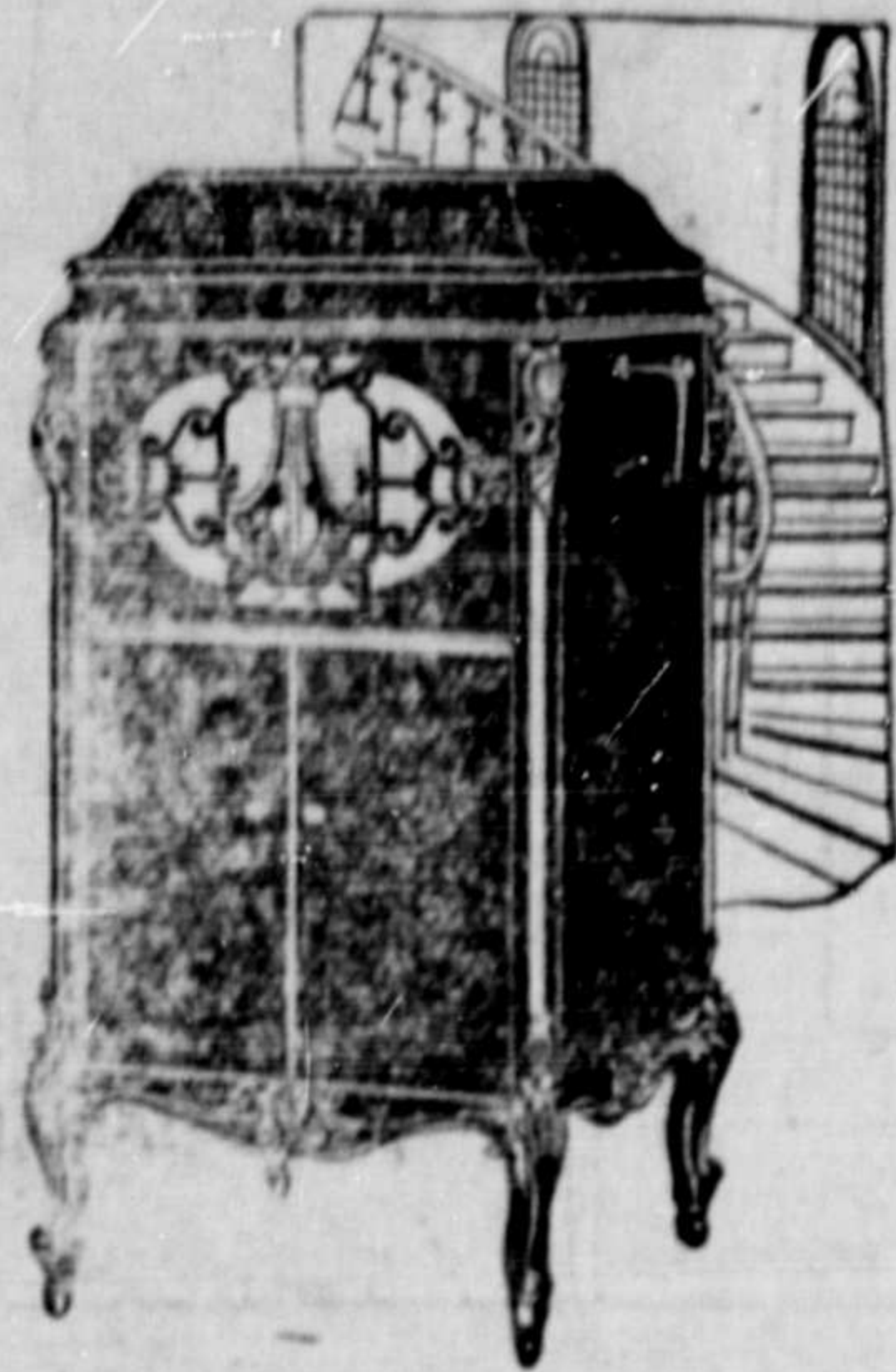

G. W. V. A. special emergency meeting tonight at 8:30 p.m. All members requested to attend. Business: To consider drydock situation and further aid to returned men.

The city is to purchase 213 feet of 1-inch drill steel and a number of tools from Tony Christian for \$4.15 on the recommendation of the board of works and the city engineer.

Dalby B. Morkill, of Stewart, is applying for certificates of improvements for crown grant on the Dixie, Lesley, Mahood, Lesley No. 4, Lesley No. 6 and the Bell claims at Stewart.

A. E. Phillips' application to purchase lots 32 and 33, Block 7, Section 1, at the upset price with interest at 8 per cent from the recent tax sale was granted at the council meeting last evening.

A letter from H. A. Hansard, the G. T. P. solicitor, informing the council that the company was making application to the railway commission for permission to fill Cameron Cove was laid over for a week by the city council last night.

The city council has recommended that the Prince Rupert Lumber Co. install another hydrant on its property at the mill for its own protection. This was embodied in a report from the board of works to the city council last evening.

According to Medical Health Officer Cade's report submitted last evening to the city council there were 8 births and 5 deaths in the city in October. There were 25 cases of chicken pox, 7 mumps and one case of typhoid, the latter originating outside of the city.

Mr. and Mrs. D. Zarelli are here on their way to Alice Arm where they will take charge of the Alice Arm Hotel which Mr. Zarelli re-

cently purchased from Ole Evindsen. They intend to conduct a first class business there and will have a restaurant in connection, with every accommodation for visitors. They are staying at the Prince Rupert Hotel until Wednesday night.

The Prince Rupert Packers, Limited, with head office at Prince Rupert, has been incorporated with a capitalization of \$50,000, according to the current B.C. Gazette. This company is to carry on the fishing and packing business started by Jack Bradbury and Don Yelf of this city.

At last night's council meeting the amendments to the building bylaw were considered in committee up to section 9, this including the portions dealing with electric wiring. Considerable discussion arose for and against the amendments and finally it was decided to leave it over for a week.

Appearing in the last B.C. Gazette is the announcement of the incorporation of the Lakelse Hot Springs, Limited, with a capital of \$200,000. The head office of the company is at Prince Rupert. This company plans extensive improvements and buildings at the popular summer resort near Terrace.

On the recommendation of the finance committee, the City Council is to hear the expense of sending Col. C. W. Peck and J. H. Pillsbury to Ottawa and Winnipeg in dry dock affairs. These matters, it is contended, are of such vital importance to the city that the council is warranted in footing the bill for personal representation at headquarters.

The city council last evening filed a communication from Mayor R. J. Porter of Victoria asking support for a resolution passed by the Victoria council asking both Government and Opposition leaders to get early action on the transfer of taxes rightly coming to the city but now collected by the province. Mayor McElymont stated that the request would only match election promises.

The costs in the case of the Bishop of Vancouver Island vs. the City of Victoria over city assessment of church property from which the plaintiff claims exemption has already reached \$5,000 without the costs of the privy council hearing which is now going on. The city of Prince Rupert which has agreed to pay a pro rata proportion of the costs will be presented with the account in full when the present appeal has been completed.

The by-law for the consolidation of payment of soldier's taxes in arrears was read for a second time at last night's council meeting and progress was reported by the committee. The by-law now goes to the Inspector of Municipalities for approval and will then be read again by the council. It provides for the consolidation of tax arrears of soldiers, allowing them to be paid in equal yearly installments as long as the arrears do not run into more than ten years.

BOND MEN KEEN FOR B. C. ISSUES

Man Who Paid Above Par for Last Issue, Says Credit Here Is of Best.

Bond houses all along the coast are keen for more British Columbia Government bonds, as a result of the way investors have rushed for the last couple of issues. G. A. Haskell, of the Carston, Earle Syndicate, Seattle and San Francisco, who came over here two weeks ago and took away the last issue of \$1,000,000 six per cent. British Columbia Government P. O. E. bonds by bidding 100.73 for them, returned to Victoria today on the hunt for more.

"We sold the whole \$1,000,000 worth of the last lot in an hour," Mr. Haskell said to The Times today.

"British Columbia securities are now regarded favorably by investors from Seattle to San Francisco. They realize that the Hon. John Hart, your Minister of Finance, has put the province back into a sound financial position. This province, as far as outsiders who have money to invest can see it, is now in quite a different financial position from what it was in the past. Careful management has brought back its credit."

Mr. Haskell said that British Columbia bonds now have greater popularity with investors south of the line than even Ontario bonds.

Other bond men are here today trying to get more British Columbia bonds, although they now have to pay the government more than par for them, because they are in such demand from the public.

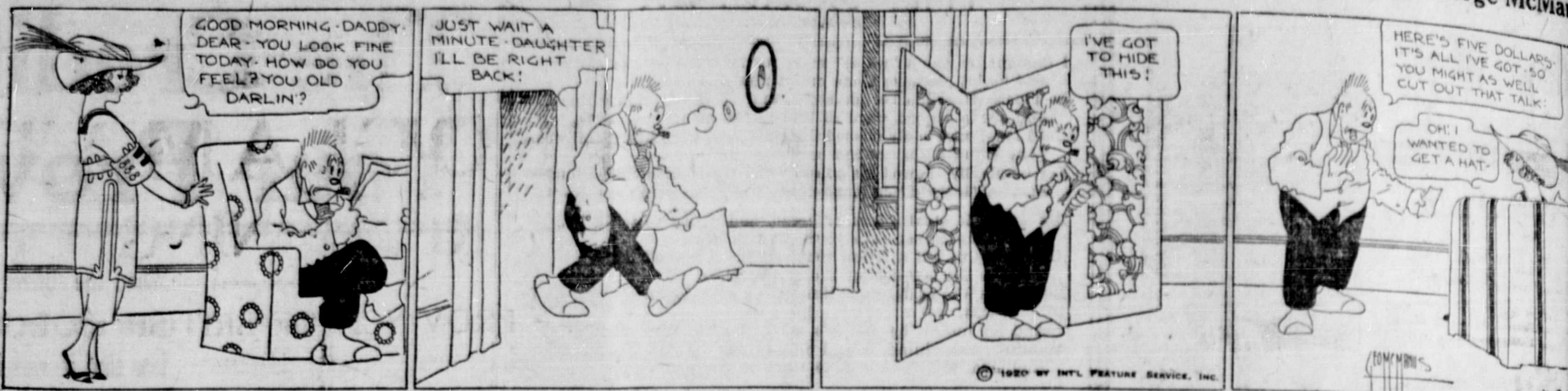

BRINGING UP FATHER



By George McMan

Colonel Peck on Docking of Rupert

Makes some caustic remarks regarding treatment of this place by Grand Trunk Pacific Coast Steamship Officials

Before leaving for the East yesterday morning, Col. Peck left the following letter for publication under the caption "Give the Old Town a Square Deal":

"On Friday evening the Daily News published the following, received, I suppose, in the ordinary course of newspaper dispatches.

"Vancouver, Nov. 6.—The G.T.P. officials today deny the story that the Prince Rupert will be docked in the north. It was explained that the yard will be decided on by Capt. W. H. Logan, representative of the London Salvage Association, who is in charge of the salvage work, when the ship is floated."

"As I had stated that the Prince Rupert was to be docked here for repairs the editor of the Daily News called upon me with the above dispatch, and I showed him the telegrams I had received on the matter. As I did not think fit to publish them I think it worth while to quote them here, so that the public may know exactly what is happening and how our town is getting the harpoon at every turn.

Rush into Print
"Isn't it rather enlightening that the Grand Trunk Pacific offices in Vancouver should rush into print on this question? Does it not show where the heart of its high officials is?"

"From the telegrams, somebody is lying. Either the head officials of the Grand Trunk Pacific at Vancouver, or Mr. Hanna, president of the National Railways. I don't think anyone will believe it is Mr. Hanna."

"Now when Mr. Hanna was here a short time ago I interviewed him in his private car upon this very subject. Speaking of the wreck of the Prince Rupert I said it would be a big thing for this port if she could be repaired at our own drydock. He immediately said that he was anxious that this should be done, and that he had instructed Captain Nicholson to dock the Prince Rupert here."

Greatly Surprised
"I took this as final, but was greatly surprised a few days later to hear on good authority that Captain Logan had said she was to be docked in Victoria. I at once communicated with the Prince Rupert Board of Trade on the matter and then wired in their name to the secretary of Lloyds (who I personally know) and received this reply:

"Waiting Logan's report respecting docking Prince Rupert. Suggest you apply owners."

"This telegram certainly infers that the owners have some authority of influence in the matter. Upon its receipt I wired Mr. Hanna as follows:

The Telegram
"Since I saw you Captain Logan,

London Salvage Association, has stated that Prince Rupert will be docked in Victoria. This will entail towing her over four hundred miles and across Milbank and Queen Charlotte Sounds, instead of over a hundred miles here. Should the shipbuilding company succeed in getting the contract after ship is docked in Victoria it will mean bringing her back here. Lloyds suggests that you owners will be able to influence plan of docking and I sincerely trust you will see that she is docked here."

"To this Mr. Hanna replied as follows:

"Your message Second. When I was in Vancouver I arranged with Nicholson to send steamer Prince Rupert to Prince Rupert and have message from him dated October thirtieth that he expected ship would be floated about end of November and will then be taken to Prince Rupert. Cannot understand any reason for change this arrangement. Have wired Nicholson again."

Very Definite
"The News said I had received a 'reassuring' reply. Well, I'll say it was reassuring. Could anything be more definite? Just read Mr. Hanna's telegram and compare it with the News despatch from the G.T.P. offices. With both Mr. Hanna and the G. T. P. the wish is father to the thought."

"Now all this may seem a great ado about something that has happened very often before, but I think the time has come when we should come out in the open. It has always been an astounding thing to me that this town has received so little support from the G.T.P. This is the terminus of that railway—its seaport. This company has sold millions of dollars' worth of property to us and to the public of Canada. Our interests have been bound up together in every way; but I cannot remember a case that the company has spent any money in Prince Rupert if it could divert it anywhere else."

Greatest Offender
"The steamship company has been the greatest offender. It is not too much to say that their policy has been antagonistic to the town and some of their high officials have openly scoffed at us. And all this notwithstanding the fact that there would be no such institution as the G.T.P.C.S.S. Company if it was not for our poor old town of Prince Rupert. Where have they kept their head offices? Where have they bought their supplies? How many times have they had their boats' annual overhaul in our dock? How many times have they had their wrecks repaired here? Where do they propose to dock their ships this winter for the annual overhaul?"

Stand Together
"I would like to ask a great many more questions along this line. What I want to do is to stir up the people of this town to action—to enlighten them on the situation. I could and may tell some interesting stories, and, believe me, they would be interesting. What we want here more than anything else is a stand-together attitude; a spirit of loyalty and devotion. We need

FUEL SUPPLY HERE AMPLE

G. A. Woodland, Local Manager of Imperial Oil Co., Says Stoppage Will Not Affect Rupert.

The forthcoming suspension of the supply of fuel oil to British Columbia from California by the Standard Oil Co. will not affect the port of Prince Rupert to any extent, according to G. A. Woodland, the local manager of the Imperial Oil Co. In speaking to the News yesterday afternoon Mr. Woodland stated that there is already a good supply of fuel oil here and further supplies are coming so that the present source will suffice until next June when the Imperial Oil Co. will be refining its own fuel oil at loco brought direct from the Mexican coast by the company's own boats. The recently announced stoppage of supply will not affect boats or trains operating out of Pacific coast ports.

As gasoline distillate and kerosene and other kinds of fuel will continue to be supplied as usual, the fishing industry here cannot be affected whatever. The Grand Trunk trains are the main consumers of fuel oil although there are a few steamers using oil up here at times.

New Tankers.

Two of the company's new boats are now nearing completion at Tacoma and will be in the service by June. Very soon the familiar Standard Oil Company's tank ships will be seen here no more for the Imperial Oil Co. will no longer depend on the Standard Oil Company's fields and refineries in California for supply.

Dock Repairs.

The local oil dock is now being repiled, an improvement that has been felt necessary for some time. After this work is done the wharf will be strengthened and in good shape to carry on business.

When the first ship is launched at the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Co.'s yards it is going to come down perilously close to the east end of the oil dock and when that time comes the dock will be cleared for an emergency. Unless the ship swerves from its intended course the dock can only be affected by the wash but it is thought best to be safe and all will be cleared for the occasion.

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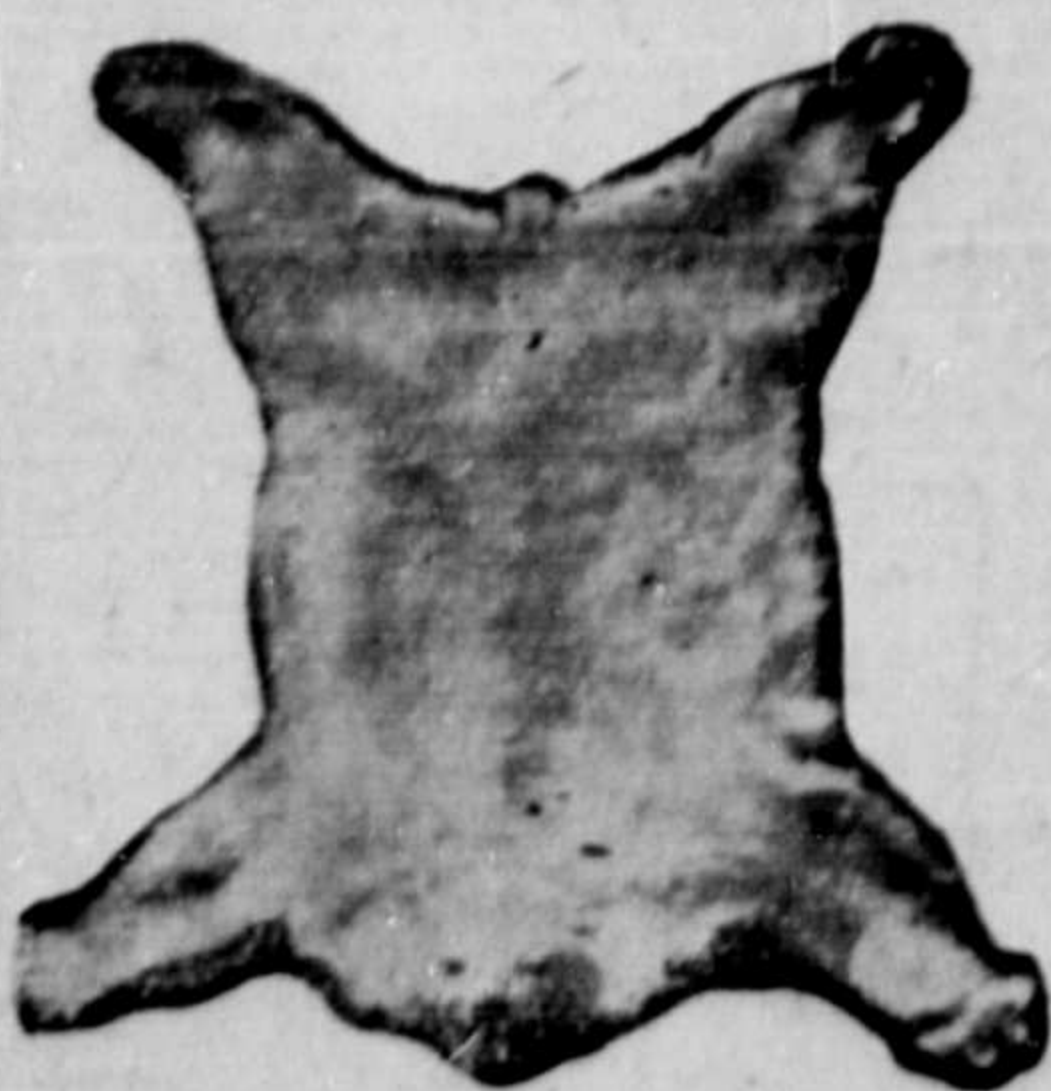
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
