OVERFLOW MEETING AT VANCOUVER LAST NIGHT

PATTULLO, FORMBY, NEWTON AND BURROUGH IN LINEUP FOR LEGISLATURE

Great Enthusiasm at Liberal Rally in Vancouver Last Night

In spite of Dense Fog Two Halls Scarcely Sufficed to Hold Crowds who Flocked to Hear Premier and Candidates

VANCOUVER, November 10.—Premier Oliver, M. A. Macdonald, Hon. W. J. deB. Farris, Mrs. Ralph Smith, Ian Mackenzie, and James Ramsay and J. P. Dougherty addressed a big meeting and overflow here last night. Thousands crowded into the Dominion Theatre and O'Brien Hall in spite of the dense fog that made transportation difficult. The enthusiasm displayed has seldom been excelled in this city and never during the present campaign.

Premier Oliver spoke of the record of the Government. He admitted that there were deficiencies, for the Government was human, but he urged that they had unquestionably made such progress as to warrant their re-election, and apparently the big audience thought the same, for they cheered him again and again. Former John has seldom received such an ovation.

The Premier went into some detail in regard to the legislation passed by the administration and emphasized particularly the Mothers' Pensions provision, which had been put through in a few months after a promise to do so was made, whereas the Conservatives had made promises which for fourteen years had been unkept.

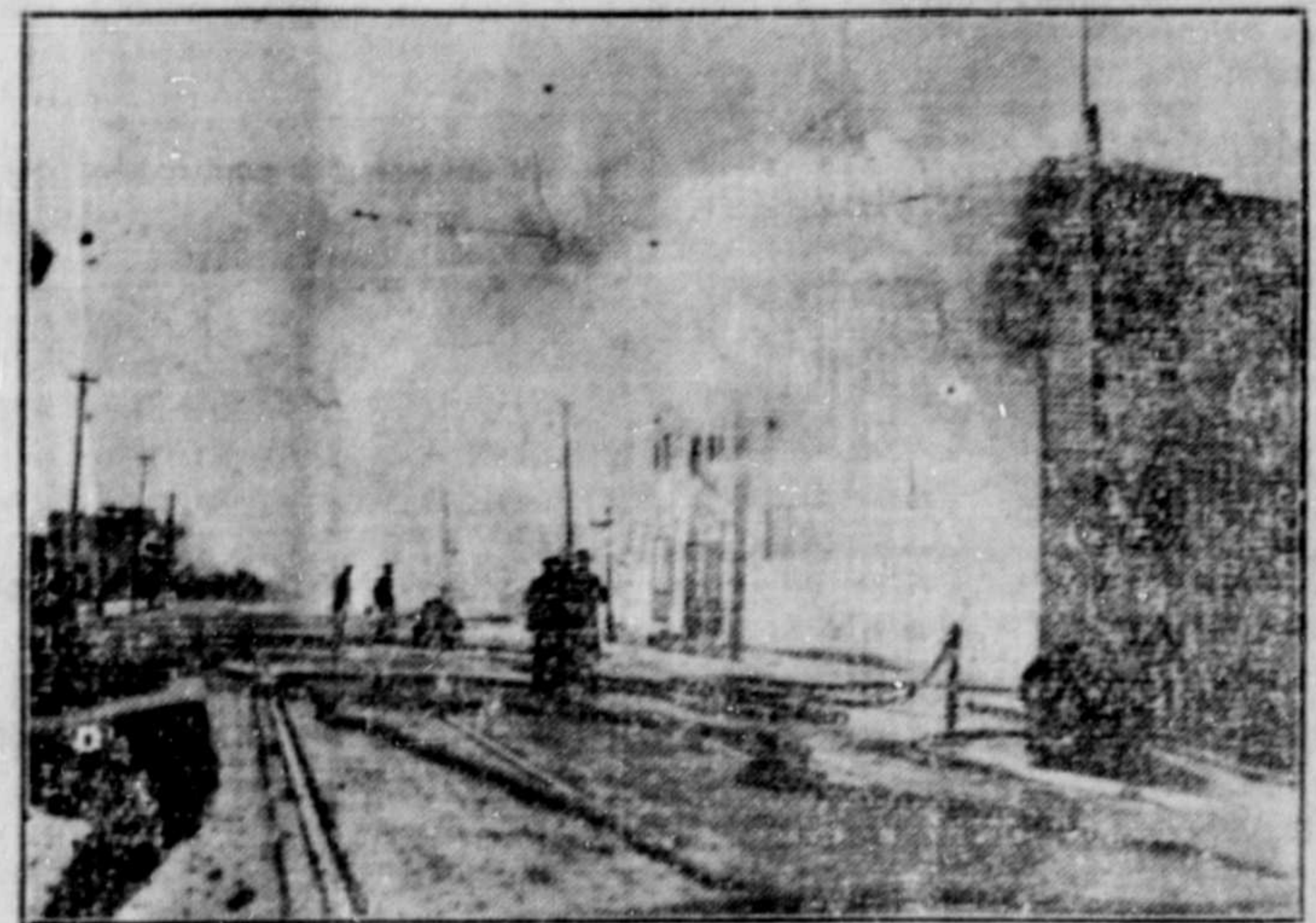
WELL KNOWN LOCAL MAN BRINGS WIFE

Pastor of Kitsilano Church Kisses Call and then Refuses It

VANCOUVER, Nov. 10.—Reverently kissing a petition signed by 514 members of the congregation, Rev. A. D. McKinnon of the Kitsilano Church, at the presbytery meeting, received a call and immediately declined it and said that he had accepted the mission superintendency at Williams Lake. This was a dramatic climax to a factional split in the church at Kitsilano which has lasted two years.

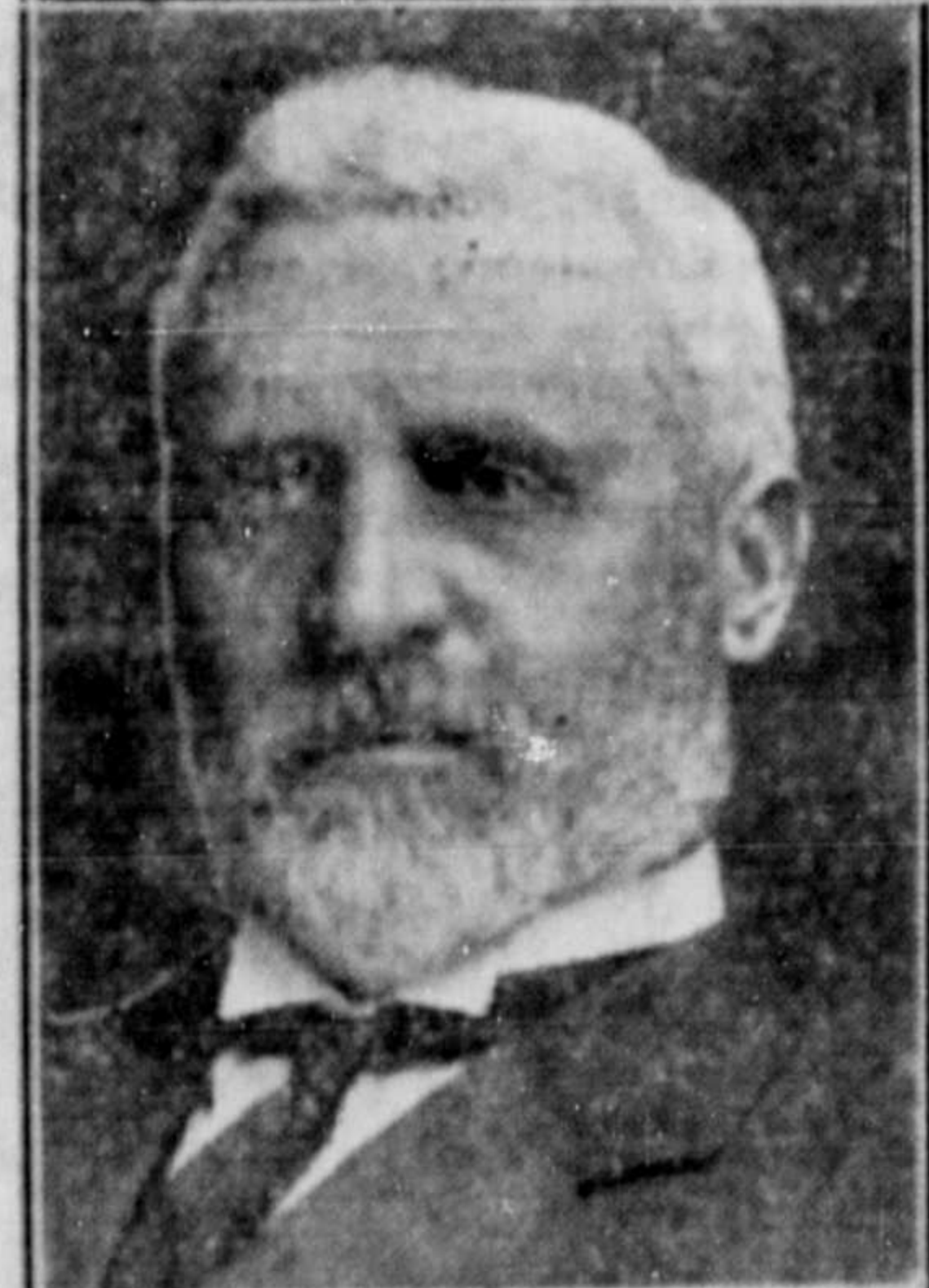
BEAVER SKINS CONFISCATED

POLICE HAD BUSY MONTH

Police Commissioner Myhill-Jones Says Force is Now Working Satisfactorily.

According to the report of the chief of police received by the police commission at the regular monthly meeting last evening there was \$3,372 collected in fines by the police department in the month of October. This establishes a high record mark for the amount of fines collected in one single month.

There were 84 cases brought up in the police court and 77 convictions were obtained. There were 46 drunks and 9 charges under the Prohibition Act. In several drug cases the maximum penalties were inflicted and in two cases the offenders had received both jail sentences and fines. There was one case under the Inland Revenue Act for having a liquor wash in possession. Bread and coal weights were reported fair. There were a number of small robberies and suspects were now in view. The conduct of the near beer bars was orderly.

"If the size of the docket is any criterion," said the mayor, "the public should be convinced that the police department is doing its duty."

During the course of the commission meeting, Commissioner Myhill-Jones stated that the police force, in his opinion, was working better now than ever it had since he had been a police commissioner. He would like to see two morality men on the force.

What Has Government Done for Labor?

One of the questions that arise naturally at election time is what has the Government of the province done for labor? Has it made good? Is it worthy of continued support from the wage earners of the province? These questions must be satisfactorily answered or the administration cannot expect to be returned to power.

The Oliver Government has taken steps to improve the sanitary conditions in camps, canneries and mines, by the appointment of a qualified sanitary inspector. Complaints regarding working conditions are immediately investigated and as a result the lot of the workmen in the camps has been immensely improved. The men know this.

The Oliver Government established a system of free employment bureaus, ridding the cities of the private agencies which often preyed upon the men. There are now seventeen of these bureaus in different parts of the province and through these workmen are able to secure employment and also can secure information in regard to working conditions in the various districts.

The Oliver Government passed a measure providing that wages should be paid semi-monthly and no holdback of more than eight days is allowed by law. This applies to all the principal industries of the province.

The Compensation Board has been supported and its work supplemented with the result that very few accidents now occur and all troublesome litigation has been done away with in connection with accident claims.

The Oliver Government extended the eight-hour day to include men working around mines as well as those working underground. Also there is a daily limit for those employed around a coke oven, smelter, concentrator or mineral separation plant. From 5,000 to 6,000 workers have been affected by the eight-hour day legislation.

The Oliver Government has amended the Factory Act to make the regulations more stringent in regard to adequate ventilation and the competition of Chinese in laundries.

The weekly half-holiday has been extended to include trades and occupations not formerly coming under the law.

The Oliver Government passed the Better Housing Act which helped to provide homes for returned soldier workmen.

A provincial technical school has been established as a commencement in the direction of a more general adoption of technical education for the province. A correspondence school for miners is in operation.

The minimum wage board for women and girls has done such good work that it is being commented on in all parts of the civilized world and this is one of the measures passed by the present government. It prevents the employment of girls at less than a living wage.

Night schools have been established at a great many centres under regulations made by the present government and boards of school trustees are encouraged in the establishment of such schools. Grants for such a purpose are made to local boards.

Pensions to mothers whose husbands are dead or incapacitated are being paid under a law passed recently by the Oliver Government and as a result much needless suffering has been obviated and the dread of starvation or reliance on cold charity is done away with. This legislation was more or less experimental but it is working out well and is looked upon as one of the real forward steps in social legislation looking to the improvement of conditions among those who are not in a position to make provision for themselves.

The Oliver Government has been in power less than four years, yet in that time they have done a great deal, in spite of the fact that during part of that time the war was on and all the energies of the nation were set on the one big job. Now there will be opportunity to take up new problems and wrestle with them. With such notable women as Mrs. Ralph Smith in close touch with the administration, the electors may be sure that social legislation will receive adequate attention.

KING SCORES RAILWAY BOARD

Does Not Think Hanna should Prevent Employees Taking Part in Politics

DAUPHIN, Nov. 9.—Dauphin being an important railway centre, the bulk of the meeting held here by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, was composed of workers in the round house and shops of the Canadian National railways. Mr. King dealt exhaustively with the railway problems with which the country is faced. He aroused the enthusiasm of his audience when he condemned in no unmeasured tones, the recent order issued prohibiting employees of the government lines from taking active part in politics. The member of the local house from Dauphin, George Palmer, is a train despatcher on the railway and anticipated an order to resign his seat or his job under Mr. Hanna's ruling.

From the Highest Motives Mr. King also spoke at some length upon the position of the Unionist Liberals at the last election. He said he could not make it too clear that so far as the great body of electors were concerned, it was his conviction that those who had supported the Unionist administration whether Liberals or Conservatives had done so from the highest and most patriotic motives. It was natural that in a campaign as unfair in many respects as the one conducted in 1917, where by the device of the war time elections act and other measures, the rights of a large portion of the electorate had been sacrificed, there had been strong feeling on the part of men and women towards those who differed with them in opinion, especially where it seemed to involve the severance of old traditions.

Re-Uniting in Opposition "I am glad to find, however," he said, "wherever I have gone in western Canada as well as throughout eastern Canada, that the genuineness of the motives of those who had differed from their fellow Liberals in the last contest was being proven beyond question by the manner in which one and all were re-uniting in opposition to the present reactionary administration, now that the single question which had formerly divided them was no longer an issue in our politics.

True Liberalism "I believe that the more respect there was for independent judgment and differences of opinion, the greater would be the security of the Nation's freedom and the truer Liberalism would be to what is fundamental in its teachings."

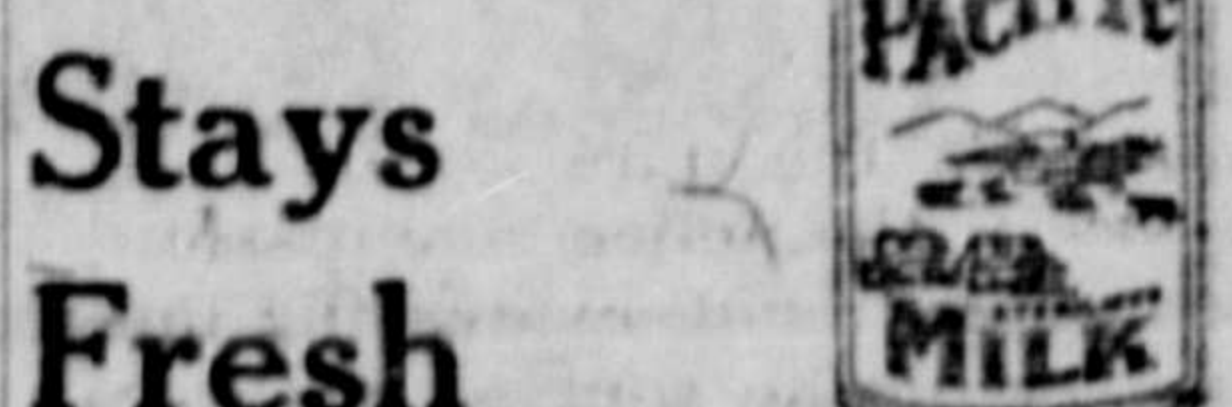

He says he took a drive through the district in an automobile and he was surprised at the large amount of development which had been done there in the past year. The place is looking prosperous and in the near future will be an important centre, especially in view of outside developments which are taking place and which radiate from Terrace, and will add to its prosperity.

SANK AT DOCK

Steamer Clansman Loaded with Herring Takes Big List and Goes Under

VANCOUVER, Nov. 9.—The coasting steamer Clansman, loaded with Chemainus herring, took a list when moored at the pier here and kept listing as the tide fell. The water poured into her and she sank at the dock.

NEW STATUS OF CANADA

Toronto Correspondent of Manchester Guardian Discusses Government of and Washington Representative

That Canada as a result of the war was about to attain a new national status has been a confident assumption, says the Manchester Guardian's Toronto correspondent. She was about to achieve a new "social order" of her own. She would, among other things, name her own Governor General, from among Canadians, and she would send a Canadian ambassador to Washington. According to recent reports she is in these two particulars doomed to disappointment.

Regarding the Governor Generalship, the cables every week or two repeat a rumor that the Earl of Athlone is to succeed the Duke of Devonshire, the appointment being due next year. Socially the Earl of Athlone would be a "catch" for Canada almost rivalling the Duke of Connaught. The latest cable expresses the opinion that his appointment will be popular in the Dominion and that Canadian circles in London lend color to this view. "Canadian circles in London," quoted in circumstances like these are, it may be said in passing, like a red rag to many Canadian circles in Canada.

Explanations.

What has happened Canada's ambassador at Washington no one seems to know. One explanation of the "indefinite postponement" curiously first announced from Washington instead of from Ottawa or London, is that Sir Auckland Geddes, who was formerly a professor at McGill University, Montreal, so impressed Canadians by his qualifications during his recent visit to Ottawa and Toronto that it was considered unnecessary to appoint "another" Canadian, at least during his term.

Another excuse for not making the Washington appointment is that no Canadian of the calibre required is at present available. Among potential plenipotentiaries there are none out of work.

Pretty Thin.

All this is pretty thin. The real explanation seems to be that in the days when advanced proposals such as those dealing with the Governor-Generalship and the Washington post were under discussion the Union Government then in office contained a radical forward-looking element. That element has now retired, and the Government that remains is more reactionary, as is appearing also in more domestic issues.

GERMAN PLANES TO BEAT WORLD

Tractor Monoplane with Four Engines and Carries 20 Passengers

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The Zeppelin Company is about to begin trials in Germany with an aeroplane for which it is claimed that in design and performance it will far out-distance any machine in the world.

This is a tractor monoplane which has been built in secret and only the most meagre details have been allowed to leak out. It is built throughout of duralumin, has a span of 90 to 100 ft. and a chord of 10 or 12. It is fitted with four engines and has capacity for 20 passengers. The wings of the monoplane are hollow. In them the four engines, each of 260 h.p.—Mercedes or Maybach—are fitted, and the wings are constructed so that, while the monoplane is in flight, a mechanic may crawl through them and attend to the engines. There are only two struts in the monoplane, and these extend laterally from the under-carriage to the under-side of the wings.

To Cross Atlantic

The first question that arises is to what extent the efficiency of the propellers will be reduced since they are placed so close to the leading edge of the wings. It is understood that, following the trials, an early attempt will be made to fly the machine across the Atlantic. The revelation of German activity is of the utmost interest in view of the references made at the Air Conference to machines of British design with their engines mounted in the wings.

WHITEHORSE EDITOR DIES

A. Rosseau of the Star was in the North for Twenty Years

DAWSON, Y.T., Nov. 9.—A. Rosseau, editor of the Whitehorse Star and American consular agent there, died yesterday following a month's illness with paralysis. He leaves a widow, two sons and a daughter.

Mr. Rosseau had been a resident of the north country for twenty years. E. J. Whitehead, of the Alaska publicity bureau, is his brother-in-law.

WORK RESUMED

All difficulties at the Grant & McDonald dredging outfit at McNichol Creek have been satisfactorily settled and active operations resumed this morning. During the last few days the machinery has been given a needed overhaul.

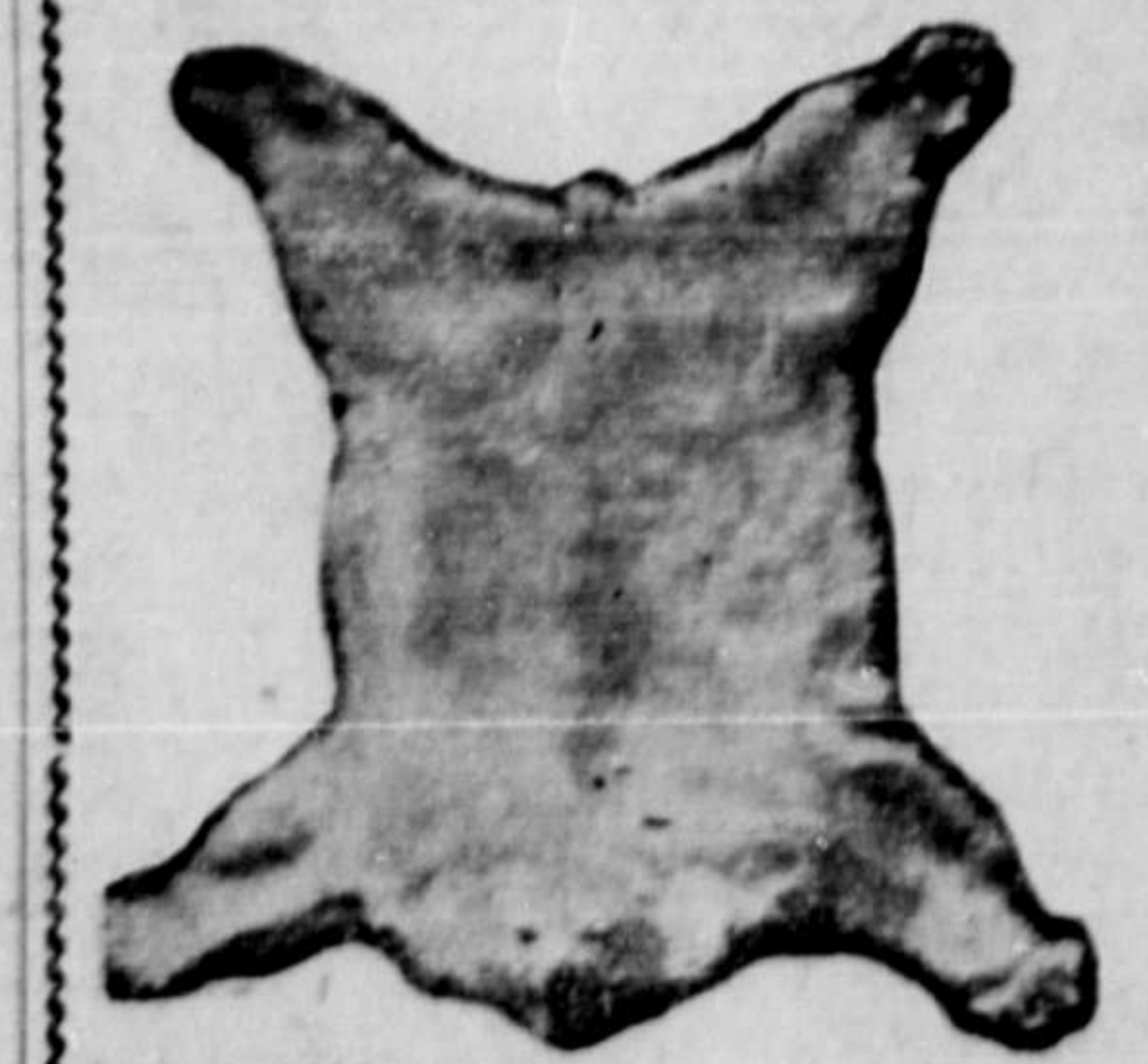

FISH TRAPS FOR ALASKA DISCUSSED

Meeting to be held in Seattle November 20 to Consider Question

JUNEAU, Nov. 10.—The whole question of regulations for fish traps in Alaska will be taken up in a hearing to be held in Seattle which is scheduled to begin on Saturday, November 20. This is a continuation or extension of a hearing held here last September by Col. Edward H. Schulz, Corps of Engineers, at which time the matter of whether or not floating traps were a menace to navigation was considered.

Col. Schulz has mailed out notices to all interested parties as follows:

"A public hearing will be held in the Assembly Room of the Chamber of Commerce, Arctic Building, Seattle, Washington, November 20, 1920, at 2 p.m., relative to proposed change in regulations governing fish traps in Alaska. All interested parties are invited to be present.

"At this hearing the whole question of regulations for fish traps in Alaska, both floating and pile driven, will be taken up.

"While for accuracy of record all important facts should be submitted in writing, oral evidence will be heard."

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not situated in a reserve.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may apply for adjunction of pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor has made improvements in less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and residence on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be purchased on conditions including payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessibly by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1914. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS. Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING. Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provided for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

J. D. McAULEY TO MONTREAL

Commercial Agent for G.T.P. Goes to Mercantile Marine Staff

TELLS OF DROP IN GOODS AND WAGES

J. D. McAuley, commercial agent for the G.T.P., arrived here last night from Montreal whither he had been called by the Canadian National officials in connection with the reorganization of the shore staff for the Canadian Merchant Marine. Mr. McAuley is leaving at the end of the month and will be associated with the new service.

Mr. McAuley says that the mercantile marine organization will be a bigger affair than most people imagine. Services are to be established to almost all parts of the world and new routes will be opened up, providing new markets for Canadian goods. For this service the railway officials are picking out mostly single men from different parts of the service, who are particularly suited for the work and who have had experience.

Speaking of conditions in the east, Mr. McAuley says that business is very good in Montreal. The prices are tumbling rapidly and in the factories wages are being reduced to conform with the new conditions. In most cases the men are accepting the change without protests as they know it means shutting down the factories if the wages are not cut. In the west the retailers and others do not seem to have accepted the condition so readily and prices are not being adjusted as rapidly as in the east.

KING & WINGE IS SOLD TO GOVERNMENT

Will be Operated After Present Trip in Service of United States.

The fishing boat King & Winge has been sold to the United States Government by the National Independent Fisheries. She is expected in port with a cargo of fish and will then be taken south where she will be formally transferred to the Government service. The Canadian Fish and Gold Storage Co. has purchased the frozen halibut of the Independent co.

The fishing boat Sitka came in today after a stormy trip with about 20,000 lbs. of fish.

PADEREWSKI NOT NOW PLAYING PIANO

The New York Herald (Paris edition) publishes an interview with M. Paderewski, in which he is reported as saying: "I shall never touch a piano again. Not only the situation of my country makes me unwilling to continue my career as a public entertainer, even as presenting the highest form of art, but the shock of the repeated misfortunes of my country has so affected my nervous system that I am unable to touch the piano even for private satisfaction.

M. Paderewski expressed the hope that the treatment he was undergoing in Paris would improve his hands enough to permit him to play occasionally for Mme. Paderewski. The piano which had travelled with him for 25 years, he said, was now for sale, being of no further use to him.
