EDITORIAL

THE SOLID FOUR.

The sending of a solid four members from the north to support the Oliver Government during the next four years in order to fight for the rights of the north as against the south, is a great idea. There is always plenty of pressure exerted in the south. Let the north stick together and its members go to Victoria as one man and demand that this part of the province get all that is coming to it. As Mr. Pattullo said, the two members that were supporting the Oliver government did well last term. Let four be sent and they will do much better. A solid four is a good gospel to preach. It is good business.

The next five years mean much to the north country. It is our growing time. The Oliver government will have it in its power to make this a great country or to frustrate its growth. We do not believe it will do the latter. We know it will do what it can, but what is needed is four Liberal members who will go into the Liberal caucus and tell the other Liberal members that this part of the province has needs such as they cannot even imagine, and that these needs must be filled.

On the basis of population we have done well during the last four years. We shall do much better in future if we are wise and do not divide our forces. Pattullo, Kergin, Manson and Perry would be a great team to represent the north and we believe they will be returned—every one of them.

Pattullo Urges Electors to Choose 4 Liberals in North

Would present united front at Victoria in interests of Prince Rupert Constituency, Atlin, Omineca and Prince George

Urges Development of Ecstall River Power

Suggests establishment of Pulp Plant there with surplus power for Rupert City; Soldiers with Government

"I have been all over the province and I am convinced that the Oliver Government is going to be returned with at least as big a majority as it secured on the last occasion," said Hon. T. D. Pattullo to the Liberals who crowded into the committee rooms on Second Avenue last night and who listened to him enthusiastically. He continued:

"In view of the certain return of the Government, what we want is a solid four from the north country to stand shoulder to shoulder in order to secure for the north its rights. There should be at least seven representatives in the north in place of four. Prince Rupert district should have three members and Prince George two. In order to secure this it is desirable that four members be sent from the north to support this Government and to see that we get the treatment which is our due.

"For some time past there have been but two of us, for Ross is a dead one. He did not even visit our constituency. It has been a two-handed fight, but we have not done badly. We have been few in number but we have insisted on our rights and have got them. This time we should send a solid four for the constituencies of Prince Rupert, Omineca, Atlin and Prince George, and I believe this will be done. I believe the people of the north appreciate the work of the Oliver Government in opening up the interior country and making it so that settlers could come in."

By the Throats.

Mr. Pattullo went over the pamphlet put out by W. J. Bowser and circulated broadcast. He reminded the gathering of the old days when the Bowser machine and them by the throats, especially in Prince Rupert. Four years ago there had been bitter enmity in this town where today there was amity and friendship. An attempt had been made at that time to drive Liberals out of town but it had not succeeded.

Dealing with the proposals to establish pulp mills, Mr. Pattullo said that throughout their administration had been to accomplish this end. They had succeeded at Prince George where the sum of \$200,000 had already been paid to the Government in connection with timber limits for pulp purposes. This will mean a great thing for Prince George and will add greatly to the population of the place.

Power Proposition.

Since he had been in office Mr. Pattullo said he had been trying to get someone to take hold of the power proposition and develop the Ecstall. This city must have power to offer people who wanted to come, if it was to succeed. He was leaving no stone unturned to secure for this city the development of that project. He thought probably they would have to get a pulp mill on the Ecstall which could sell its surplus power to the city.

Captain McKenzie's ticket is suspended for four months and Chief Officer McKenzie's, two months. The inquiry closed yesterday afternoon after the technical evidence of the engineers had been heard. was to be rid of the railway. The Dominion Government was anxious to have government ownership. Let them have this one. It would have to be extended to the Peace River, of course, but the Canadian National people were the ones who should do this, for it would be a natural branch for their railway. The cost of continuing the railway to the Peace River would throw the province into debt to the extent of another twenty-five million dollars and he thought it was the duty of the Dominion to undertake the work and not saddle the province with it.

Mr. Pattullo went on to say that they would make an appropriation this year for drilling for oil in the Peace River. If they struck oil it would mean a great thing to the province. In connection with this and with the coal, a definite policy would be outlined as soon as the situation in regard to the old licenses was cleared up.

Returned Soldiers.

Taking up the point made by Mr. Bowser in regard to the returned men, Mr. Pattullo said he could tell them this. The soldiers were not against the present Government. They knew better than anyone else what the Government had done. He had always maintained that it was the duty of the Government to re-establish the soldiers and to continue the work until the last man was back

in civil life and able to take care of himself. This was no reason, however, why the province should not do its part. If it had refused to act it should have been fired from office.

The candidate went on to speak of the taxation and irrigation problems. He showed that if taxes were transferred to the municipalities the amount had to be made up from other sources, and this could only be done by levying additional taxes. It was putting the money from one pocket into another. However the whole matter of municipal taxation would have to be overhauled.

Returning to the matter of hydro-electric power, Mr. Pattullo told of the survey work which had been done in this connection and of the powers which had been granted by the legislature in regard to development of water powers.

The matter of timber export was explained. The candidate said the power to allow export in certain cases acted as a safety valve in the business. It prevented the buyers holding up the loggers. It also was in the interests of economy for the Government insisted on clean logging, the taking of hemlock as well as spruce, for instance. Often there was no market at home for hemlock and, in such cases they allowed the export of hemlock logs. The terms of the bill had been agreed to by the loggers and millmen. Each case was considered on its merits. The statements of Mr. Bowser and the other members of the opposition that they encouraged export of unmanufactured timber was false and they knew it.

At the close of the address Mr. Pattullo was heartily applauded.

SAYS REPORTS ARE FAVORABLE

Vancouver Credit Association Wants Bankruptcy Proceedings Against Dock Stayed Further.

L. W. Patmore, acting for the creditors of the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Co., received another wire last night from the Merchants' Credit Association of Vancouver asking that bankruptcy proceedings against the company be still further delayed. While there is nothing definite, the Vancouver people state that favorable reports are coming through from Ottawa. Mr. Patmore has decided to stay action until he hears from Col. Peck who is at Ottawa now.

The general situation appears to remain unchanged and J. H. Pillsbury, general manager at the yards, had nothing to give out this morning.

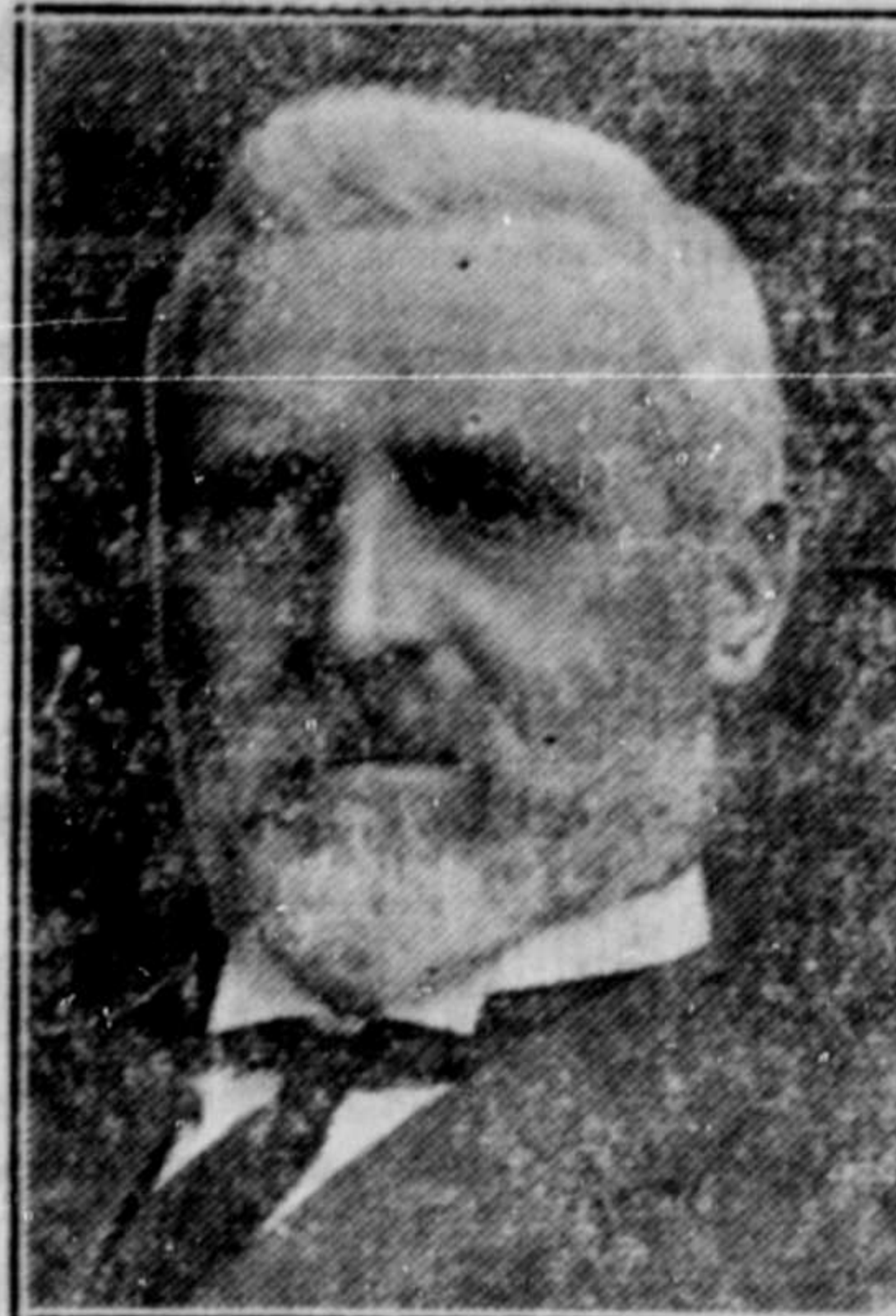

ASSURANCE FROM PECK

Says Opinion is Dry Dock Situation Will be Cleared up Satisfactorily.

The following reassuring telegram was received by President Stanley E. Parker of the Board of Trade from Col. C. W. Peck, M. P., at Ottawa this morning:

"I am doing all possible to facilitate the settlement of the dry dock situation. The Department of Marine is pressing the bonding company and I expect an early decision. I will camp here until the whole situation is cleared up and I fully expect all will come out all right in the end."

"I think that the level crossing at Cow Bay will be approved by the Railway Commission. General Manager A. E. Warren is agreeable to it."

ORIENTALS IN LUMBER CAMPS

Hon. T. D. Pattullo Says Government Not Satisfied with Ruling of Court of Appeal.

WILL PROBABLY TAKE TO PRIVY COUNCIL

That the province would not accept the judgment of the court of appeal in regard to the employment of Orientals in logging camps, was the opinion expressed last night by Hon. T. D. Pattullo in connection with the report of a decision that an act of the recent legislature was ultra vires of the province and contrary to the provisions of the Canadian-Japanese treaty.

Mr. Pattullo said they would take further legal advice and in all probability the matter would be taken to the Privy Council. He did not think the lumber industry should be allowed to get into the hands of the Orientals as the fishing industry had.

There was a clause in all the licenses issued by the provincial government saying that no Orientals should be employed on the limits.

Prince Rupert was Off Her Course at Time of Accident

Sentence Modified a Good Deal by Commissioner McPherson who says Chief Fault lay in Travelling Too Fast

VANCOUVER, November 19.—In delivering judgment yesterday following the investigation into the wreck of the Prince Rupert at Swanson Bay, Capt. MacPherson said that the suspension of Capt. Mackenzie for four months would start from the day of the wreck and thus would expire January 29. That of the chief officer, Rod Mackenzie, for two months expires on January 18. Further, the suspension of the captain is not to be endorsed on his ticket.

No action would have been taken in connection with the captain's certificate if the boat had not been travelling at thirteen or fourteen knots, which the court considered excessive. The suspension was necessary as a warning to other navigators.

Commissioner MacPherson finds that the primary cause of the accident was that the ship was off her course considerably, with the helm to port instead of to starboard, making it difficult to get the ship back when it was realized that she was running ashore. The master and mate were at fault in not discovering sooner that the ship was not in her proper channel.

BIG LISTS OF FISH ARRIVE

More Than Twice as Much Halibut As Would Fill Available Refrigerator Cars.

There was 350,000 pounds of halibut offered for sale at the fish exchange this morning. The seven cars in the yards were enough to take 175,000 pounds of fish east, so half of the fish at the exchange sold for cold storage at the cold storage price of 10c and 6c. However, the demand this week is not very large so the car shortage does not affect the market much today.

Trio, 14,000 pounds, and Mabel A., 12,000 pounds, sold to the Royal Fish at 13c and 7c.

Sherman, 17,000 pounds, Gora, 3,000 pounds and Margalice, 4,100 pounds, sold to the Cold Storage at 13.2c and 6c.

BIG COMPANIES INCORPORATED

Alice Arm Holdings Will Operate in Illiance Valley—\$15,000,000 Steel Company.

VICTORIA, Nov. 19.—The Alice Arm Holdings Co., Limited, capital \$1,000,000, non-personal liability, public, has been incorporated according to the current issue of the B. C. Gazette. This company is to carry on operations on the Bellevue Group in the Illiance Valley at Alice Arm and has already taken in its winter supplies. Two tunnels are to be driven. The head office is in Vancouver and the company is made up of a syndicate of Vancouver men.

Another incorporation gazetted this week is the Coast Range Steel Company with headquarters also in Vancouver. Its capitalization is \$15,000,000 and it is backed by English capital. The object is the development of the steel industry on this coast.

SIR GEORGE FOSTER VICE

Canadian is Among Six Vice-Presidents of League of Nations.

GENEVA, Nov. 19.—Sir George Foster is one of six vice-presidents elected in the League of Nations. He is one of the Canadian representatives.

The League has decided that four nations are to furnish troops for the League. Organization of the assembly is now completed.

Stand by Guns and Fight for the Right.

Some of our friends have asked why the Daily News takes sides to such an extent in this election. Why do we not give the other side a chance? The Board of Trade is recommending to the Department of Marine and Fisheries at Ottawa that a board of pilotage commissioners be established at Prince Rupert. A motion to this effect was passed at the meeting last night, H. H. Clarke being the proposer and J. H. Rogers the seconder.

The big rock cut between the Grand Trunk wharf and Morse Creek was finished today. It is the biggest cut on the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific and took two years to take out. Ross and McGill had the contract.

Ald. V. W. Smith made strenuous objections at last night's council to such a high sum as \$350 being paid the city solicitors. He wanted this cut by \$100, but the matter is standing over for a week.

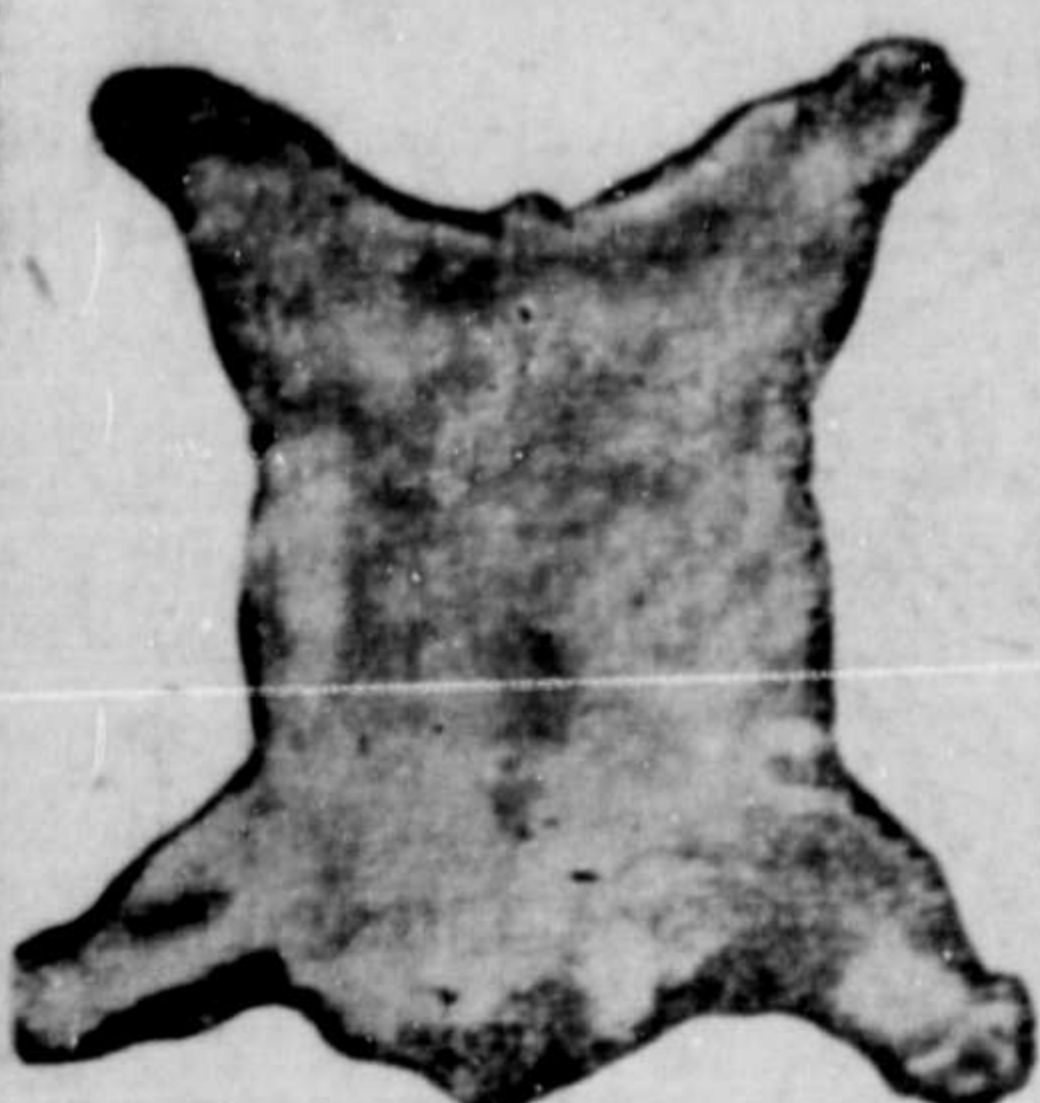

OLIVER A MAN
OF THE PEOPLESpeakers Optimistic Over Out-
come of Election and Urge All
to Support Pattullo.HEALTHY CONDITION
DUE TO GOVERNMENT

At the Liberal Rally last night, in addition to the address by the candidate, short speeches were made by M. P. McCaffery, who presided, by L. W. Patmore and H. F. Pullen. The committee room was crowded and a large number were standing. A goodly number of workmen were there and added their quota to the applause.

Mr. McCaffery said under the circumstances the Provincial Government had done very well. John Oliver was a man of the people. He had worked his way up from the bottom without any push from capitalists or others and without even the advantage of an early education. He was an outstanding example of the best coming to the top. To draw a comparison between him and the Vancouver lawyer who led the opposition was hardly possible. Oliver was so clearly the best man.

Among other subjects touched on by the chairman was the working of the Land Settlement Act and the benefits derived from it in the north. The settlement along the line of the G. T. P. was the result of the operation of this measure.

Tackled Big Job.

Speaking of the local member, Mr. McCaffery said he had tackled one of the biggest jobs on record. He dealt with over 500 employees, who reported directly to him and handled the largest revenue of any department. He had handled the job to the satisfaction, not only of themselves, but of the province generally. His was the one portfolio that had never been criticized. His constituency was very large, larger than that represented by any other other minister, with 5,300 voters. He had been instrumental in putting into effect many beneficial policies and the people here should support him.

In regard to the new court house bids had been called and the building would be erected immediately. Mr. Pattullo did not say much about it, but it was his work.

Mr. Patmore.

L. W. Patmore spoke of the big business of the province in which every elector was a shareholder and which was managed by the board of directors which they would elect. Bringing the finances of the country from the basis in which they found them four years ago to the present healthy condition was in itself sufficient reason for returning the Government. There were, however, many other reasons. The Government had done much for mining, more than any other government had ever attempted. He drew particular attention, however, to the social legislation.

Mrs. Ralph Smith.

Mrs. Ralph Smith went into detail in regard to the beneficial results to women of the Franchise Act which enabled Mrs. Ralph Smith to have

a seat in the Legislature and resulted in much beneficial legislation. As a result of the advanced program of legislation which had been passed, the Social Service League of Canada had said that British Columbia leads the world in social legislation.

"Mr. Pattullo is the most capable legislator in the province," concluded Mr. Patmore. He had worked out all these policies. The Oliver Government was going to win and he urged all to join in the good work of electing him.

H. F. Pullen spoke very briefly on the need for enlisting everyone with the desirability of electing Mr. Pattullo as a supporter of the Oliver Government, which was going to be returned.

WILL BE BEST
BUILDING HERECourt Room in New Provincial
Buildings Beautifully Designed
and Well Appointed.

The new government buildings for which the provincial government is calling tenders, to be erected at the Market Place in this city will be the city's finest building. A cursory glance over the complete plans, which Government Agent J. H. McMullin now has at his office, will make this plain.

Besides local firms contractors in the south are planning to tender on the building and there will likely be a good deal of rivalry for the big job. At least one local firm of contractors is preparing tenders for the work, bids for which will close on November 25 and will be considered at Victoria.

Provision is made for the new building to house all the government offices such as forestry, land registry, provincial police with lock-up, public works and most important of all the provincial law courts with an adequate court room. Possibly the most important, however, is the land registry department which will take the place of the little wooden structure now used for that purpose. Proper provision will be made for the safe keeping of deeds, which at present are none too secure.

The whole building will be a credit to the city and one that will minister to the needs of the people.

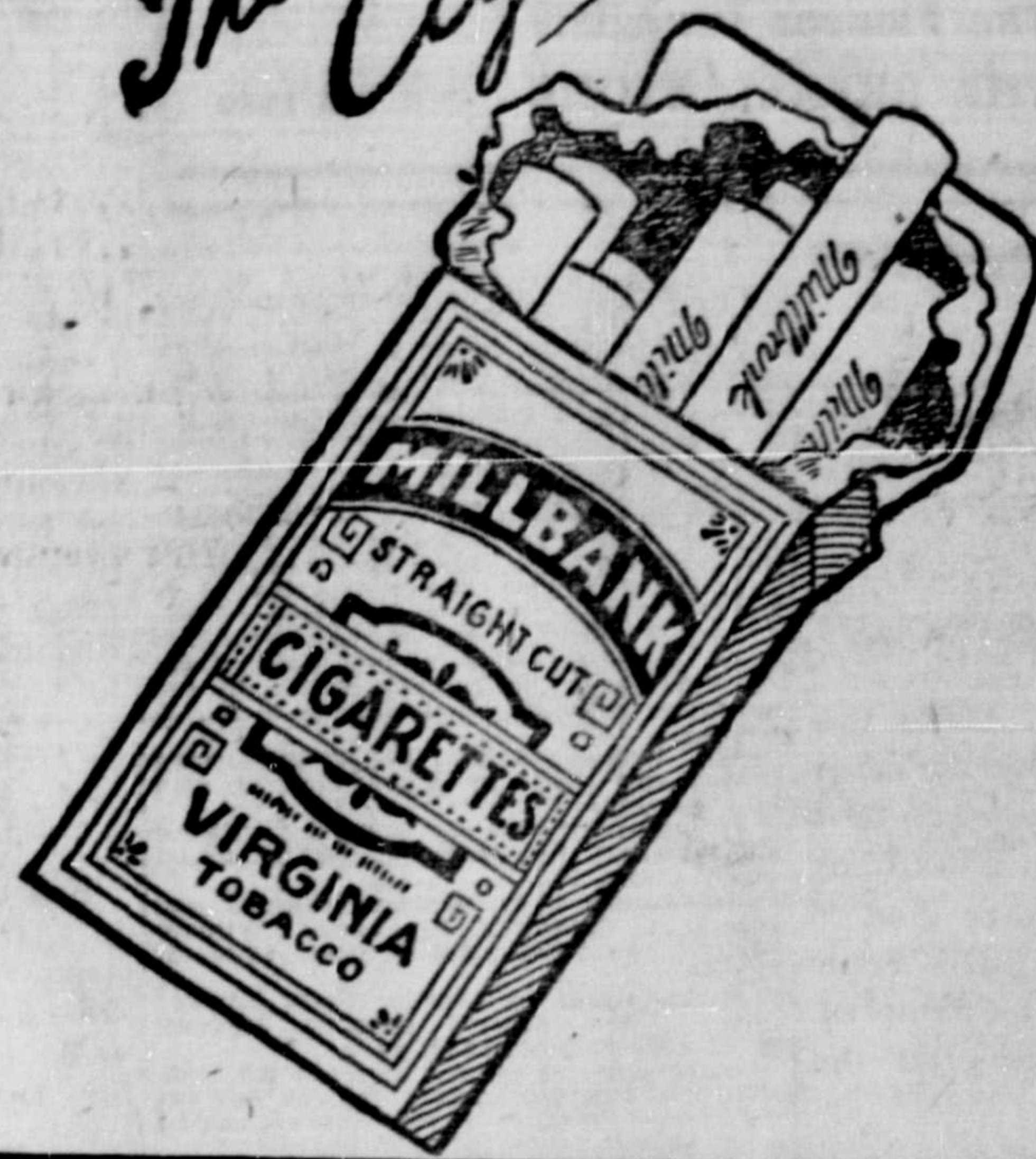

OLD FAMILIAR BOAT WILL BE SOON TIED UP

Sailing Days of Indian Department Launch Leila Will Soon Be Over.

CONDEMNED BY INSPECTOR IN UNSEAWORTHY STATE

The old familiar Indian Department gasoline boat Leila has been condemned by the Department of Marine on the recommendation of Inspector Bert Manthrop and after November 30 will be used no more. Indian Agent C. C. Perry has been notified to this effect and the reason given is that the stem post is rotten as well as some of the planks, and the vessel is generally unseaworthy. It was just recently that the boat was equipped with life saving devices but her general condition could not pass muster on the last inspection.

Built in Vancouver.

The Leila is one of the pioneer boats in northern waters. She was built in Vancouver in 1906 and was at first a steam tug owned by Frank G. Stratford and Thomas W. Allen of Victoria, in which city she was registered. In 1908 she was in Prince Rupert and was used by A. R. Barrow in the first survey work on the townsite. Later she was used by the city and was then acquired by the Department of Public Works and converted into a gasoline boat by Major George B. Hull. When the work of this department became so heavy that a larger boat was necessary she was replaced by the Valronde and herself taken over by Indian Agent Perry, who has used her for five years in the work of the Indian Department.

One of Sea Marks.

The little vessel has weathered many a billow and has had a useful career in her work out of this port and is, as Mr. Perry describes her, one of the "sea-marks" of the north. She is 36 feet long, 9 feet beam and 3 feet six inches deep, and is of ten tons gross and five tons registered.

What action the Department of Indian Affairs will take in replacing the Leila has not yet been announced.
