

## STEEL WORKS FOR PROVINCE

### COURT OF APPEAL CASTIGATES CHIEF JUSTICE HUNTER OVER JUDGMENT

#### EDITORIAL

##### STEEL ROLLING MILLS.

The announcement of the formation of a company to erect steel rolling mills on this coast is of supreme interest to Prince Rupert. It is one of the big things that we have been looking forward to in connection with the development of the province's natural wealth. It was something, however, that only big capital could handle and according to the reports it is likely that this will be available.

Prince Rupert is particularly interested because up the Copper River, a tributary of the Skeena, there is the largest deposit of lamontite ore yet discovered in the province and Prince Rupert people are interested in its development. Any smelting scheme for the province is almost sure to take this deposit into consideration.

Whether or not we shall be able to get the mills located in this neighborhood, it is impossible just now to state. We shall undoubtedly make a bid for it. Whether we get the mills or not we shall hope to have the lamontite deposits worked, for an ore of this class is needed in the smelting operations.

Another advantage to this city will be having the steel for shipbuilding available close by. There is a finer shipyard here than at any other point in the province. If the steel can be obtained we should be able to compete in the business of building steel ships. The development of the steel industry offers great possibilities for us.

#### MEN ARRESTED FOR ROBBERY

Large Amount of \$3,500,000 taken has been Recovered

**COUNCIL BLUFF, Iowa, Nov. 20.**—Seven more arrests have been made, and one confession and a large amount of money has been recovered, all in ten dollar bills in connection with the robbery of a mail car on Saturday with \$3,500,000. ### Steel Company to Build Mills; Spend Huge Sum of Money

Proposal to manufacture steel for shipbuilding in this province and for other purposes; British capital interested

**VANCOUVER, November 20.**—The Coast Range Steel Co., the incorporation of which was mentioned in the B. C. Gazette yesterday as being incorporated for \$15,000,000 with head office here, is controlled by British capital. Its ambitious plans include blast furnaces and steel mills, and it is stated that 10,000 men will be employed with an annual payroll of \$2,500,000.

The directors of the new concern are John D. Kearns of Vancouver; L. J. Landhal, formerly of the Klondyke; Major Moore; A. T. Congdon, formerly a Yukon lawyer but now of this city, and G. Steta, of New York.

The plans of the company are to produce steel from British Columbia ore for plates for shipyards, etc., displacing the steel now brought from Pittsburg at heavy cost.

The provincial government's offer of a bonus of \$3 a ton on pig iron and the Dominion's offer to provide a market for the output to encourage promotion are the great incentives which have made the undertaking possible.

Mr. Landhal claims that London capital is assured for the project, subject to confirmation of the data submitted after an investigation by two London engineers who are now here. The investigations will take 90 days. Hon. W. J. Farris and Hon. William Sloan are both lending their assistance and Vancouver and Victoria are nibbling for the plant proposed.

### CITY GRANTS MORE MONEY

Trades and Labor Committee Gets \$5,000 More for Relief of Dock Workers.

The Trades and Labor Council Committee this morning had placed at its disposal by the city a further \$2,000 for immediate relief to workers in distress over the recent dry dock shutdown. By noon arrangements had been made for the distribution of \$1,918.86 of the sum.

A further sum of \$3,000 will be forthcoming from the city next week.

### MUCH LIQUOR WAS DESTROYED TODAY

Whole 586 Bottles Figuring in Duff Theft Was Emptied Today.

This morning behind the court house 586 bottles of Scotch whiskey were destroyed by the provincial police on order of the department. This is the liquor ex-Constable Simon V. Duff was found guilty of stealing, for which offence he is now serving a year's sentence at Okalla prison.

The liquor had been offered to the hospital, but on account of its inferior quality was not accepted. The bottles were each broken and the contents emptied out. Chief Minty conducted operations and was assisted by Chief Clerk Gale and the janitor. Major McMullin and other spectators were on hand.

### USK COUPLE WERE MARRIED AT THE MANSE LAST NIGHT

Miss Margaret McDonald was married last night to Anderson Eckert at the manse. Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant officiating. Mr. and Mrs. E. Eckert were the witnesses. Mr. and Mrs. Eckert returned this morning to Usk where they will take up their residence.

Canadian Situation is One of the Best of Nations

He reports that the financial statement submitted on behalf of Canada showed that the financial situation in Canada was one of the best of the nations represented.

### PROVINCE OWNS SEIZED LIQUOR

Mr. Justice Morrison Decides Case Against Westminster City.

**VANCOUVER, Nov. 20.**—In a test case, Mr. Justice Morrison decided yesterday that the province was the rightful owner of whiskey seized by the New Westminster police from local men.

The city refused to obey a request that the liquor be shipped to the government warehouse, claiming that the liquor, or the proceeds from its sale, should remain the city's property.

### COALING PLANTS.

**VANCOUVER, Nov. 20.**—As a result of the fuel oil shortage, the C. P. R. has placed contracts for eight coaling plants at various points on the B. C. lines.

### BRIGHT REPORTEE PREMIER OLIVER AT WESTMINSTER

**NEW WESTMINSTER, Nov. 20.**—Premier Oliver addressed a rousing public meeting in New Westminster and got a splendid reception last night.

Replying to the question of a heckler "How much did you get out of the Dolly Varden affair?" the Premier shot back quick as a flash, "I got the satisfaction of protecting working men's wages amounting to \$140,000 and \$300,000 due to merchants in this province."

### RATE WAR PREDICTED FOLLOWING CUTTING TRANS-PACIFIC ROUTES

**PORTLAND, Nov. 20.**—A. F. Haines, vice-president of the Pacific Steamships, predicts a trans-Pacific rate war following the withdrawal of the Blue Funnel line and the Mitsui Company of Japan from the rate conference.

American boats are being emptied of freight by the British-Japanese rate cutting on lumber and flour consigned to the Orient.

### URGE ADMISSION OF GERMANY TO LEAGUE

N. Barnes, Labor Leader, Places Views before Assembly at Geneva

**GENEVA, Nov. 20.**—The immediate admission of Germany and other former enemy states to the League of Nations was urged before the assembly by George Nicol Barnes, labor leader, or the British delegation.

### 4,000 SOLDIERS DEMONSTRATE AT MEIGHEN MEETING

**TORONTO, Nov. 20.**—While Premier Meighen was speaking last night in Massey Hall, outside the hall 4,000 soldiers demonstrated behind a cordon of 200 police and were addressed by Flynn on the question of the gratuity.

### CHARGES CAPT. BLACK DRAWING TWO SALARIES

**POINT GREY, Nov. 20.**—Fred Congdon, formerly of the Yukon, at a meeting here last night charged Capt. Black, Conservative candidate for Vancouver, with drawing a salary of \$3,000 a year as commissioner for the Yukon while at the same time drawing captain's pay at Victoria during the war.

### ENGLAND WILL BE WITH FRANCE

Must Stand Shoulder to Shoulder With That Country Says Lloyd George.

PREMIERS TO MEET IN LONDON SOON

**PARIS, Nov. 20.**—Premier Lloyd George declared regarding reparations: "England must stand elbow to elbow with France." He insisted, however, that the amount Germany is to pay must be fixed. "It is a very simple matter," he said, "Make Germany pay all she can."

Premiers Lloyd George and Georges Leygues probably will meet in London soon to determine joint action relative to the defeat of Premier Venizelos in Greece. They will also discuss the advent of the Russian Bolsheviks in the Caucasus region and the consequences of the defeat of General Wrangell in Russia.

### FINDS JAWBONE ON THE STREET

George Horton Picks up What is Identified by Physician as Human Jawbone.

George Horton, of Little's newsstand, picked up on the street last night what is declared by physicians to be a human lower jaw bone. It is of abnormal size, measuring about four inches across but is the regular shape. Some of the teeth still remain attached to the jaw while some are missing.

Dr. J. P. Cade, who was shown the bone, identified it as human but of extraordinary size.

It likely belongs to the skull of an Indian and possibly has been dug up by a dog from a cemetery and brought into the streets.

### OTTAWA GOVERNMENT IS STILL WAITING

Erb May Assign His Interest to Canadian Government.

**OTTAWA, Nov. 20.**—The Government is still waiting the reply of the guarantee company to telegrams asking the company to agree to the Government advancing money for wages, etc.

It is understood that Newman Erb is considering the advisability of assigning his interest in the concern to the Canadian Government or their representatives for the protection of creditors.

### PRESENTATION TO R. L. M'INTOSH BY CHURCH OF ENGLAND

The officials of the Church of England waited on R. L. McIntosh last evening on the eve of his departure for Toronto and presented him with a gold watch safe, suitably inscribed and inset with a diamond. The presentation which was on behalf of the congregation, was accompanied by an address beautifully executed by A. C. Gudge.

The Church of England in Prince Rupert suffers a loss in the departure of Mr. and Mrs. McIntosh who have steadily contributed to its progress from the early days. They will be much missed by the congregation.

### Appal Court Upsets the Judgment of Chief Justice Hunter in a Recent Case

Judge McPhillips says it was "an enormity beyond parallel and a miscarriage of justice"; Judges unanimous

**VANCOUVER, November 20.**—The Court of Appeal yesterday allowed William H. Chiffey's appeal from the order of Chief Justice Hunter, committing him for a year's hard labor in default of making certain payments on a judgment secured by Mrs. Martha Gutter under a mortgage.

That Chief Justice Hunter's sentence was "an enormity beyond parallel and a miscarriage of justice, an attempt to railroad a man for no crime whatever," were among the stinging comments of Mr. Justice McPhillips of the appeal court on the Hunter sentence.

The appeal court judges were unanimous in setting aside the judgment.

### CONSIDERABLE CHANGE IN NORTHERN SERVICE

Canadian Pacific Put Beatrice on Alaska Route and Discontinue Weekly Steamer to Vancouver.

On account of the shortage of fuel oil the C. P. R. is making considerable change in the northern service. The Princess Royal and Princess Mary are withdrawn and the Princess Beatrice will replace the Princess Mary on the Alaska route on November 27. The week-end local service between here and Vancouver will be discontinued and instead the Tees will maintain a weekly service between Vancouver and Swanson Bay. All the C. P. R. vessels are going into dock immediately to be converted into coal burners.

The Princess Beatrice is today on her last run in the local service.

### USK FOR PATTULLO

Newton Got Good Hearing There But no Enthusiasm, Says One Who Was There.

Word received this morning from Usk is that the place is solid for Pattullo in the coming election. At Newton's meeting Chas. Durham presided and he said he would vote for Burrough. There was no applause at Newton's meeting, although the candidate got a good hearing.

The mining policy of the Provincial Government has been so beneficial to Usk that the place is solid for the Government.

### BARNES SPEAKS FOR INDUSTRIAL PEACE

**GENEVA, Nov. 20.**—George Barnes, the British labor leader, told the League of Nations assembly yesterday that a general peace was impossible until industrial peace comes and labor gets a full share of the product of its own efforts.

### OFFICER GIVEN TERM IN JAIL FOR SEDITION

Col. Malone Sentenced to Serve Six Months for Advocating Reign of Terror.

**LONDON, Nov. 20.**—Colonel Malone, M. P., was sentenced here to serve six months' imprisonment for sedition. He advocated a reign of terror of a Bolshevistic type in order to reverse the social order of Great Britain.

### DISCUSS FISH PRESERVATION

British Columbia Convention Going to Vancouver to Attend Convention

**VANCOUVER, Nov. 20.**—The annual meeting of the Association of Pacific Fisheries is to be held at Seattle on Friday and Saturday next. A Vancouver delegation has been specially invited to discuss Pacific fish conservation. This delegation comprises W. W. Whitehead, president of the B.C. Packers; H. Doyle, president and general manager of the Kincaid Packing Co. and the Northern B.C. Fisheries; F. C. Miller, of the Gosso-Miller Packing Co.; H. Bell Irving Jr., of the A.B.C. Packing Co., and J. L. Brisay.

### CONSTANTINE NOT RETURN TO GREECE

Allied Nations will Intervene if Necessary, says Jonnart

**PARIS, Nov. 20.**—The Allied nations probably will intervene to prevent the return of ex-King Constantine to the Greek throne, says Charles C. A. Jonnart, former French High Commissioner in Greece.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

SYLVIA WRITES PREMIER LENIN

Miss Pankhurst who was Recently Convicted of Sedition Writes Russian Premier

After Sylvia Pankhurst had been arrested she wrote Premier Lenin of Russia the following letter, which was later produced in court:

"Dear Comrade—The situation here is moving in a revolutionary direction more swiftly, but of course we are far away yet. The prices of necessities are rising, though the cost of living is not totally supposed to have risen this month. Unemployment is now acute and the unemployed are restive. One of Lansbury's meetings was broken up by members of my party, because he advised peaceful methods, and the crowd supported the young dockers, seamen and others of my party who opposed him. Unemployed in various towns march to factories, enter them, make speeches and speak of seizing them. Ex-soldiers arm and drill. Do not exaggerate these things—they are not formidable yet."

Not Big or Bold

"Unemployed smashed windows and stole jewels last Monday when the London Mayors led them to Westminster. The Communist parties, alas! are neither big enough nor bold enough to rise to the occasion. In the Communist Tom Bell (ex-S.L.P.) was advocating the other week a strike for the reduction of hours to absorb the unemployed into industries. In Coventry a member of our party, Emery, leads a campaign for setting aside a factory to work for Soviet Russia—factory to be controlled by the workers."

"In the Dreadnought I tried to set a bolder policy and should be discussing it with my executive this afternoon, but I was arrested last Thursday and am under £2,000 bail not to meet or communicate with any of our people responsible for publishing paper till my trial Thursday, so I can only communicate indirectly. I expect six months' imprisonment. I considered a hunger strike, but I am afraid that weapon is destroyed now, since the Government is letting the Irish hunger strikers die."

No Unity

"I find all the Communist parties, except perhaps Gallacher's Scottish Communist Labor Party, disinclined to unity. I was the first to let the movement know, through the Dreadnought, that the I.I.L. International had called us to a new conference, and I gather that the Communist Party (B.S.P.), which had heard it from W. McLaine, was opposed to it, and, therefore, had not published it. Nothing will come of it unless the I.I.L. International supplies the promised chairman. Our party has written to the others expressing our willingness to enter into negotiations. Parliamentarism and the tameness of the B.S.P. crowd are sore points with our party. I should have had a hard struggle to bring them round. Now I shall not be there, it seems."

Borrowed from Herald

"I have done less than I should in seeing people, because I have had a most terrible struggle since I returned home. Our press where our paper is printed was suffering (1) because the Dreadnought owed money; (2) because we had accounts to pay for type, metal and instalments to pay on machinery; (3) ordinary trade fought a little shy of us on account of the Dreadnought being printed there. Whilst I was away an account ran too long and a creditor got a writ for payment against us in the Court. Then all the creditors took fright. On my return the brokers were in twice in one week and I have been fighting the situation ever since, visiting, writing to this and that person, borrowing and loaded with debts of honor, some of which are at the point of disgracing me. The I.I.L. International in Moscow heard my plea when I was there and promised relief; it does not come. This week the South Wales Mining Comrades sent for 6,000 extra copies of the Dreadnought. I borrowed paper from the Herald. At present I have no paper for next week. It is not pleasant to go to prison so. Still things advance. With Communist greetings, "SYLVIA PANKHURST."

### MORSE CREEK SKATING POND

City Men have done Great Deal of Work and Elks say will be Ready Soon

Under the supervision of the Elks the work of getting the Morse Creek pond ready for the skating season is going on satisfactorily and those interested give assurance that by the time the big frosts come it will be in good shape. Already dirt has been put in by the city road crew at the bottom of the dam in front to a depth of about 10 feet, but still there is a slight leak because some of the logs of the old dam are rotten and the dirt has not packed well. It is proposed to put in a stick of stumping powder here and clear out the rotten part of the logs to allow the dirt to settle.

The pond has not yet filled with water to the top of the dam because the weather has been so dry and there has been no rain. At present the stream in Morse Creek is very small and until a freshet comes the pond will not fill up. In spite of this there was a depth of ice of two inches during the recent frost and several boys were skating on it then. The Elks committee in charge of the work feel sure that there will be a good skating place at Morse Creek yet and have not given up hope by any means.

### PREPARE FOR DOG DERBY

Great Event at The Pas Early in March; Proposed Changes

Northern dog mushers already are getting their huskies into shape for the 1921 Dog Derby, which will be held at The Pas early in March.

Walter Goynes, "The Going Kid," of Ruby, Alaska, and winner of the 1920 Dog Derby at The Pas, wires from St. Paul, Minn., that he has lost 13 dogs since June, but has nine good ones left and would like a race in February.

Goynes says he will race Canadian teams for purses and will run one mile or twenty for \$1,500, half to be put up by each driver or his backer.

Many Entries Expected. Indications point to a large number of entries for the 1921 Derby. Albert Campbell, winner of the first Pas Dog Derby and the Winnipeg-to-St. Paul race, in 1918, intends to compete and is sanguine of success. Albert's brother, Baptiste, who won the second Pas Derby, is another intended starter, as are S. Pranteau, of The Pas, L. McKay, of Grand Rapids, and J. Hayes, of Sturgeon Landing, all veteran racers.

It is suggested that the purse for the next race should be \$2,500, as against \$1,000 last Derby and the increased stake should attract white and Indian mushers from all parts of northern Canada.

The proposed course is from The Pas to Flin Flon and back, a distance of nearly 200 miles, and it is intended to stage an Indian parent in connection with the race.



## TOLD CORNER CLUB ABOUT NEWSPAPER AND ITS MAKING

At the Corner Club last night, a talk was given by H. F. Pullen on "The Making of a Newspaper." The speaker explained that making a newspaper was very much like making a cake. You put in fifty per cent news along with a similar quantity of advertising, favoring with a little editorial opinion, passed it all through the mechanical oven and served hot. It was simple enough, so simple in fact that almost anyone you met on the street could tell you how to run a newspaper much better than you could yourself.

**Separate Departments.**  
The making of the newspaper was divided into three separate departments, the editorial, business and mechanical sections. While these were all closely related they were kept distinct. To successfully conduct a newspaper a man must not be too keen on making a good paper or he would spend too much money in that department and not give enough attention to the business end. There had to be a good balance or the institution could not live. One department could not be starved at the expense of the other.

**Whose Fault.**  
It was shown how the circulation department, which was a branch of the business department, was the barometer of the institution. When the circulation advanced both editorial and circulation departments were apt to claim the credit, but if there was a falling off it was the fault of the other department.

The speaker dealt with the ideals and difficulties of newspaperdom and closed by saying
