PREMIER MEIGHEN SUSTAINED HIS FIRST DEFEAT GENERAL REVISION OF RAILWAY RATES PROMISED BY RAILWAY COMMISSION

Railway Rate Revision Will Take Place Soon After Board Hears All Parties Interested

OTTAWA, November 23.—The Railway Commissioners yesterday reserved judgment on the application of the Manitoba Government for a suspension of the railway rates increase. The findings of the board are expected to be given before the end of the week.

The chairman of the board announced that a conference would be held between the board and all parties interested in the railway rates. This will take place at Ottawa on December 14, when the board will make an exhaustive investigation into the question of railway rates generally, with a view to making a permanent settlement of the difficulties.

CITY LIGHTING SYSTEM REPAIR

While Cracked Governor is Being
Fixed Shawatlans Plant
Not Working.

On account of a crack in the governor at the Shawatlans Lake electric plant, power is being generated today at the Cow Bay dam plant while the full crew of the city electric light department is working night and day at Shawatlans, repairing that plant. This break has been the cause of the flickering lights that have been so noticeable for the past few weeks. The Shawatlans plant was stopped last night at midnight and the Cow Bay plant was put on. The light and power on Third Avenue was off this morning until 10:30.

It is not certain how long it will take to get the Shawatlans plant in operation, but the broken part has to be electrically welded. In the meantime there is no electricity for large power purposes and the street lights are out. The council has suspended operations until the power supply is again normal.

SEPTIC TANK AT NEW SCHOOL SITE

City Council Favors That Instead
of Installing Expensive
Sewer.

A letter from the school board inquiring as to what provision the city council was making in regard to sewer connection at the Hays Cove school was referred to the board of works last night.

It is understood that the city proposes to use the septic tank system in providing for sewerage at the school. The cost of putting in a sewer would be exorbitant, while a septic tank system could be easily established in Hays Cove.

CONSOLIDATION BYLAW WAS SENT BACK HERE

Inspector of Municipalities Said
It was not Clear—Just
For Soldiers.

The tax consolidation bylaw dealing with the delinquent taxes of soldiers' property has been turned back to the city clerk by the inspector of municipalities. Certain parts of it were not very clear. City Clerk Woods pointed out that the only property coming under the bylaw was that of soldiers, and ordinary persons had to abide by the regular tax sale provisions. During the war the property of soldiers on which there was delinquent taxes was not sold by the city and this bylaw gives them a chance to pay up. There is a revenue of \$33,000 due the city under this bylaw, pointed out the mayor. With the \$70,000 due the city from the provincial government it will be seen that the city is carrying \$100,000 of unpaid taxes.

ASK POWERS PROVIDE TROOPS TO END WAR AGAINST ARMENIA

GENEVA, Nov. 23.—The French delegates to the League of Nations yesterday urged the League to provide 60,000 troops to end the hostilities in Armenia. Dr. Nansen says he thinks the United States will co-operate.

Bankruptcy Proceedings Against Shipbuilding Co. Are Started at Vancouver

L. W. Patmore this morning received a telegram from Vancouver as follows:

"McInnes and Arnold undertook to wire the sheriff tonight to postpone the sale until Friday. No replies from Erb or Guthrie at Ottawa. Committee consequently instructed A. H. McNeill this morning to institute bankruptcy proceedings immediately, appointing us interim receiver. Our representative leaves for Prince Rupert tonight."

"Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association."
Mr. Patmore was naturally very indignant at the action of the Vancouver creditors as they have been asking him to hold back in view of a possible settlement. This he has done. Now they have double crossed him and the meeting of creditors will be held in Vancouver instead of here.

Telegrams received from the same people within the past few days contain such statements as "Committee still of opinion bankruptcy fatal," and previous to that "Kindly withhold bankruptcy proceedings." Mr. Patmore was anxious not to do anything which might injure the prospect of the plant starting up again immediately and for that reason held his hand, although he had doubt even then of the wisdom of doing so.

POLICE SEARCH FOR DUBLIN MURDERERS

DUBLIN, Nov. 23.—Dublin is surrounded by a cordon of soldiers and constables and the city is being combed by the military and police with a view to finding the assassins who perpetrated the horrible murders of Red Sunday.

JOE FOLK CHARGED FORGING RECEIPT

Obtained Money at Royal Bank
by Signing Name of J. A.
Walton.

Evidence was taken this morning in the police court in the case against Joe Folk, who is alleged to have obtained \$150 at the Royal Bank of Canada yesterday morning by forging the name of J. A. Walton to a savings account withdrawal receipt. The accused has been remanded until tomorrow morning.

Warden Bailey was the first witness to take the stand. He told of having been notified by the bank of a forgery. Folk had been arrested on suspicion and then let out. He was watched and his movements subsequent had led to his being arrested again. After cashing the receipt at the bank he had gone to a second-hand store, changed his clothes, had a shave and appeared very different. He had left his old clothes in the second-hand store.

John S. Forsythe, teller in the bank, also gave evidence. He told of giving the accused 15 ten dollar bills. The receipt had been handed over to the ledgerkeeper to enter and the forgery had then been detected. The accountant had been notified and the police apprised of the forgery. The witness was satisfied that the accused was the man.

W. Gratien, second hand man, told of the accused coming to his store, buying some new clothes, and then changing them there, giving the old clothes in trade. George Roberts, clerk in the bank, also testified. He had detected the forgery. This concluded the evidence and remand was then granted. W. H. Johnson appears as counsel for the defence, City Solicitor T. B. Hooper prosecuting.

WILL CONFER OVER DRYDOCK

Representatives of the Vancouver
Creditors is on His Way
Here.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 23.—To confer with the Prince Rupert creditors of the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Co. A. H. Bida of the Canadian Creditmen's Association representing the Vancouver creditors, left last night for Prince Rupert on the steamer Prince George.

A conference of a committee named to act for local creditors was held here yesterday morning and the decision arrived at to send a representative to Rupert. It is understood an effort will be made to effect co-operation among the creditors of both cities.

CAFE ASSISTANT WAS BURNED YESTERDAY

Merritt Restaurant Destroyed, but
Firemen Save Adjoining
Buildings

MERRITT, Nov. 22.—William Edwards, cafe assistant, was fatally burned when Stay's new restaurant was gutted early this morning. Edwards was attending the fire in the stove when his clothing ignited.

Awakened by the man's groans a girl, who is the telephone operator, saw the reflection of the fire and notified the department which turned out and saved the adjoining buildings.

The restaurant was uninsured.

PATTULLO GIVEN GOOD RECEPTION AT SURF INLET

SURF INLET, Nov. 22.—Hon. T. D. Pattullo was given a good reception here on Friday evening. He addressed a good crowd of electors on the topics of the day, outlining the Government policy. It looks as if the Minister of Lands would have a good majority here.

Ottawa Government Gets First Set Back

Beaten in Elgin, Ontario, by Farmer
Candidate; McKelvie is Elected in
Yale by Very Small Majority

AYLMER, Ont., November 23.—S. McDermid, former warden of Elgin County, was elected in East Elgin by-election as a United Farmer candidate, polling 3,043 votes against the Government candidate, J. L. Stansell's 2,855 and the Liberal, W. G. Charleton's 1,940. The campaign was the hottest ever waged in the district, Meighen speaking in the constituency twice, Cregar once and King once. This is the Meighen Government's first defeat.

VERNON, November 23.—The constituency of Yale returned a Government candidate, but by so narrow a majority as to upset the calculations of the prophets on both sides, who saw an easy walkover for McKelvie. His opponent was Col. Edgett, representing the returned soldiers and farmers. There was no Liberal candidate in the field. Editor McKelvie has a majority of 106 so far and the Liberals concede the victory. Mr. McKelvie is editor of the Vernon News.

OTTAWA, Nov. 23.—That a signal victory has been secured by the farmers is admitted and also that the Government has received a severe setback.

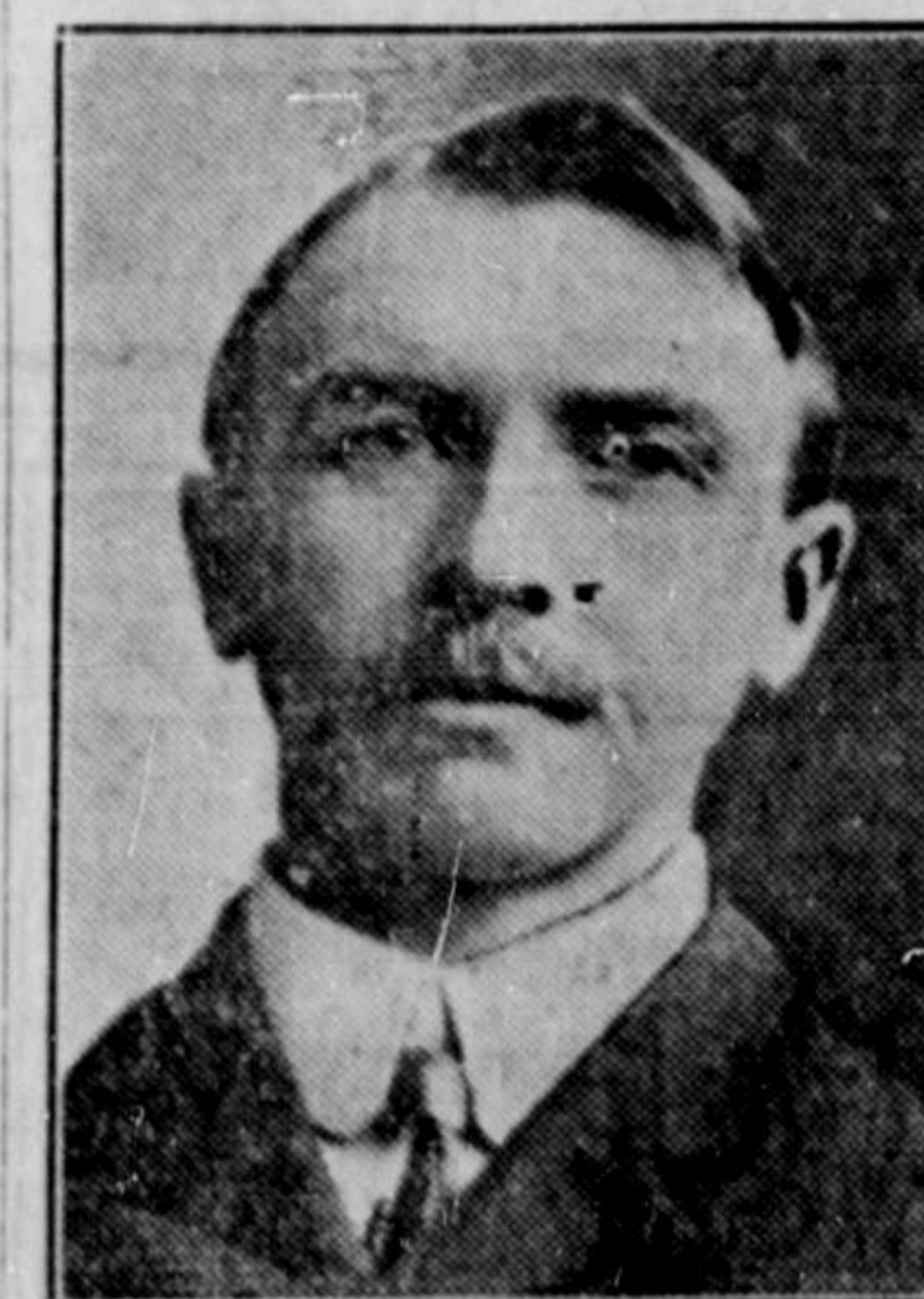
SCHOOL CONTRACT AT POWELL RIVER

VANCOUVER, Nov. 22.—Thomas Carson here has been awarded the Provincial Government contract for the building of a two room addition to the Powell River School at a cost of \$20,000.

James King was sentenced to thirty days in jail by Magistrate McMordie this morning, having been found guilty of knowingly having stolen goods in his possession. When sentence was passed the prisoner broke down as he was leaving the dock. Evidence was given by Warden Bailey and Will Edmunds, whose cello strings had been stolen. Accused tried to sell the strings back to Mr. Edmunds in his store and the police were notified, Warden Bailey effecting the arrest.

Judge F. McE. Young is expected to return from Vancouver on the Prince George tomorrow.

PRINCE GEORGE, Nov. 23.—H. G. Perry seems likely to be a winner in this constituency. All reports received from Peace River indicate that he is solid there, even though his opponents are masquerading as farmers.

The Liberal candidate speaks in Fort Fraser Friday, Vanderhoof Saturday and Prince George Monday. He says he is confident of a sweeping victory.

SUGAR DROPS TODAY DOLLAR A HUNDRED

VANCOUVER, Nov. 23.—Sugar is down another dollar a hundred pounds today. The wholesale price here is now \$13.50 a cwt., and the retail rate is about \$15 a hundred pound sack.

MEN LEAVING BRITANNIA

Two Hundred Dropped from the
Payroll Owing to Low Price
of Copper.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 23.—Workers continue to arrive from the Britannia mines where 200 men were dropped from the payroll because the company refuses to ship any more concentrates to the Tacoma smelter while the price obtained is less than the cost of production.

Copper is now selling for less than 15c a pound.

Stewart Comes Into Limelight.

Stewart comes into the limelight as a result of the published statement that a corporation has secured an option on Sir Donald Mann's short line of railway from Stewart up the Bear River and the charter allowing the building of the same through to the Peace River, connecting with the E. D. & B. C. Railway recently leased by the C. P. R. running from Edmonton to the Peace River.

The railway has to tunnel the mountain between the Bear River and the Naas River, but otherwise has a good grade and is not difficult to build, according to the reports of engineers received from time to time.

Should this line be built, even only to the Groundhog coal fields, it would mean an immense thing for the town of Stewart. That place would become an important shipping port and there would soon be an important city there. The place would not depend only on the railway but would also have the backing of the silver mines which have proved so rich and which at present keep it going. One thing seems certain, that the anthracite coal areas are very extensive and valuable and that the British Government and everybody else needs coal since the failure of the oil supply. The railway is under option and some definite action is likely to follow.

What About

New Postmaster?

Now that the position of postmaster is vacant the wires will be pulled to secure the job for some politician who has served the Conservative party faithfully. The stumbling block, however, is the Civil Service Act which provides for promotions in the civil service.

The assistant to Mr. McIntosh was J. R. Morrison, who is at present in charge and who also had charge of the postoffice while Mr. McIntosh was away on a long holiday recently. He has been connected with the post office for ten years and is said to be in every respect a capable man. The position should naturally go to him. He is the next in line for it.

The position of postmaster is worth something slightly over \$2,700 a year, including bonuses. It is not a very lucrative position, considering the responsibility involved, but there is a prevalent idea abroad that there is nothing to do in connection with it but to sit in an office and now and then see that the others are working. This is anything but the truth. A postmaster, to be efficient, has to work harder than any of the clerks. He should be a man who knows all about the work and who is able to put his fingers on any of the weak spots in a moment. It is to be hoped that the postmaster-general will see that the regular course of promotion is carried out in order to secure the efficiency of the institution.

CHURCH CONGRESS ON THEATRE AND ORIGIN OF HUMAN SPECIES

At the Church Congress, which met this year at Southend, Miss Sybil Thorndike, an actress, said that the theatre seemed to disturb the conscience of the Church, and continued:

The material which the drama uses to arouse our emotion is human life itself in action. Here we reach the essential point of contact and conflict between the Church and the drama. So far as the Church stands for sympathy and understanding of the joys and sorrows of life we are on common ground, but beyond this comes the split and the necessary and vital antagonism. The Church claims the right to say, "This is right, this is wrong; this is truth, this is error." The dramatist and the actor look at life and throw down the challenge, "This is life as I see it. What do you make of it?" They claim that by their art they throw upon each small concentrated section of life the bright light of humor, imagination, pity, terror and laughter. Should not the Church welcome such a means of presenting life? If the theatre is really and faithfully reflecting life it should be a valuable means of communication between us. Those who fear the theatre fear life itself. All we ask is sincerity.

Canon Barnes, in the course of his address, which was delivered at a morning devotional meeting of the Congress, said:

Systematic observation had made it practically certain that man was not specially created by God, as until two generations ago all Christians believed on the authority of primitive Jewish speculation. Man was the end of a vast evolutionary process of divine design by which during at least a hundred million years life had become even more complex. The record of man's history was not that of physical evolution, for man's structure in his long period of some million years had altered but little. His history was the record of mental growth and of the concurrent emergence of moral loyalties and spiritual perception. Gradually the new complex of human personality had appeared. All the factors in human nature on which religion is built belonged to this complex. Because it seemed to have emerged out of nothing we could not deny its reality. In creating human personality God had made, or rather was making, something new which was apparently the final product of His purpose, the supreme object of His care.

DOUBLE CHINS, FLAT CHESTS, SLOUCHY WALK

No Need of These says Health Expert; Use Exercise instead of Cosmetics

WINNIPEG, Nov. 18.—Boney shoulders, double chins, flat chests, slouchy walking and ungainful sitting are all unnecessary, according to Mrs. J. C. Cameron, formerly of London, England, who has recently opened a physical culture studio in Winnipeg. "All these things can be cured or prevented by scientific exercise," she says. "But when I see the scrawny necks of girls in ball-rooms, the awkward poses of half the passengers on the street cars, and the peculiar walk of many people, I realize that people in Canada have not yet learned the truth about exercise. In Germany the government has inaugurated state physical culture, to improve the future race, but we are content to let our people develop haphazard," Mrs. Cameron declared.

"You know, the human body is after all only a machine," Mrs. Cameron pointed out. "When one part of the machine becomes rusty or worn out, all the rest of the mechanism is affected. Our bodies are a mass of muscles, but only some of these are exercised by our daily work. The others become flabby and weak and a lowering of efficiency results. Few people realize, either, how many of their ills are caused by incorrect sitting and standing postures. The positions in which most of us do our work are such that our organs cannot function properly. We suffer from indigestion or headaches or other ailments and never think of blaming the unnatural way in which we hold ourselves."

"The beautifying effects of scientific exercise have the widest appeal to most. I do wish girls would realize that instead of spending large sums of money on cosmetics to improve their appearance, they might better spend a little time on exercises calculated to improve their general health. When the body is in perfect condition the face shows the effect, the eyes are bright, every sense alert. Complexion ills are never cured by covering them up. Then, too, many otherwise attractive girls spoil their appearance by an ungainly carriage, and this could be overcome if they knew how. Busy housewives also think that they get enough exercise doing their daily work, but their faces grow wrinkled, and superfluous flesh accumulates just the same. They should remember that too much exercise of some muscles does not make up for no exercise of others."

"The good effects of proper breathing have been known for years. What is not so generally known is that proper breathing can do much to relieve asthma and lessen the tendency to consumption. Remedial exercises can also be taken to cure or prevent indigestion, nervousness, weak ankles, adenoids, enlarged tonsils and many other ailments not generally considered amenable to this treatment. However, I may change their minds when I demonstrate my gospel of exercise," Mrs. Cameron concluded.

OLD EDIFICE IS IN DANGER

Work of Restoration Must be Done Before Long—Dean is Raising Fund.

Many people will be astonished to learn that the great national institution, Westminster Abbey, is in a state of positive danger today; but yet it is not so very remarkable after all, when once the actual facts are examined.

Here, to begin with, is a building of immense age. The present choir, for instance, was opened for divine worship so far back as October 1 of the year 1269. The nave is later in date, though it is erected in practically the same style as the choir. Still, even the nave was completed before the fifteenth century had run its course. The most modern portions of the building are the two towers at the west end, which did not arise until the reign of our second George. Thus a building of such venerable antecedents is bound, even under favorable circumstances, to demand the most careful handling year by year.

Not First Time

This is not the first time that the fabric of Westminster Abbey has been pronounced to be in a state of positive danger. The same thing happened rather more than two hundred years ago, and an enormous work of restoration was set on foot, under the superintendence of Sir Christopher Wren. Much of that work has had to be done over again. Apparently there are some properties contained in the climate of London which have an extraordinary evil effect on all buildings, but more especially upon one like the Abbey, the exterior of which possesses such a number of small details.

Big Upkeep Expense

No one can accuse the Abbey authorities of not having done their very utmost to preserve this glorious church for the benefit of their own and future generations. For many years past the fabric fund, amounting to £3,500 per annum, has been a first charge upon the Abbey revenues. Not only has this fund been expended up to the last penny year by year, but a good deal more besides. Unfortunately the building is of such a character that £3,500 per annum is nowhere near enough and requires most extensive supplementing if the glorious old church is to be rendered really stable and secure. The Abbey revenues are not large, for it must be remembered that the great bulk of them were surrendered many years ago into the hands of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, who apply them to all kinds of other purposes.

Situation is Anxious

The situation was anxious—to use no stronger words—six years ago, but the enormous changes of one kind and another due to the war have brought about a situation which is well-nigh desperate and which must be rectified without any delay. A building which makes so tremendous an appeal to the hearts of English-speaking people all over the world like Westminster Abbey will most assuredly not fail to secure the financial support which will enable it to weather this extremely serious crisis in its history.

The Dean has this week issued an appeal for a fund of £250,000,

which is to be placed in trust, so as to make certain for all time (so far as such a thing is possible) that all anxiety as to the future of the grand old building shall be for ever at an end.
