REPORTS FROM ALL QUARTERS INDICATE LIBERALS SWEEPING PROVINCE

SOCIAL CONTROL

By F. H. Du VERNET, Archbishop of Caledonia.

Two elements are indispensable in any attempt to solve the temperance problem, self control and social control.

Self control involves the proper education of the individual as to the evil effects of alcoholic drink, especially as to its insidious character. Educational work along scientific lines is a slow process, needing to be repeated from generation to generation, but it is vital to success in the temperance cause.

Social control must always accompany self control to reinforce it, otherwise the odds against the individual will be too great. The free and unrestricted manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating drink would mean the suicide of the nation within a comparatively short period. For this reason every civilized nation in the world throws round the intoxicating liquor trade more or less stringent restrictions. The degree of stringency depends upon the measure of public opinion. Public opinion is the chief factor in social control. It is useless to legislate much in advance of public opinion. This points to the need of educating the social conscience. Individual appetite and corporate greed are the two mighty forces operating against the social control of the liquor trade.

Restrictive Legislation.

Behind all restrictive legislation there is the well established principle that the more difficult it is to secure intoxicating liquor the less drinking of it there will be.

Until public opinion is sufficiently educated to heartily support total prohibition some safety-valve is necessary.

This province has decided that government control and sale of intoxicating liquor is to be this safety-valve, but this implies the most stringent restrictions otherwise there is no social control. Wherever past legislation has proved successful in controlling and so lessening the amount of drinking and drunkenness this should be noted and embodied in the new law. For example:

The Government agents must be forbidden to sell to those under age or to those of any age showing the slightest degree of intoxication. Under private control of the trade it was impossible to enforce this; under Government control automatic dismissal should take effect.

The hours of sale should be shorter not longer under Government control. In the past the big liquor interests, desperately fought the cutting off of every hour of sale.

Every locality should have the option of voting out the Government liquor store if it proves a nuisance and a menace to the community. The good feature about local option is that it accurately reflects the public opinion of the locality.

Coupon System

The inherent property of intoxicating liquor to create an insatiable thirst for more and to secretly undermine the individual's power of will to resist this craving, renders it imperative that there should be some social control over the amount sold to the individual for consumption within a limited period. The Swedish coupon system seems to be the most successful method yet adopted to enforce moderation

Retail Merchants Urge on Government Change of Method of Collecting

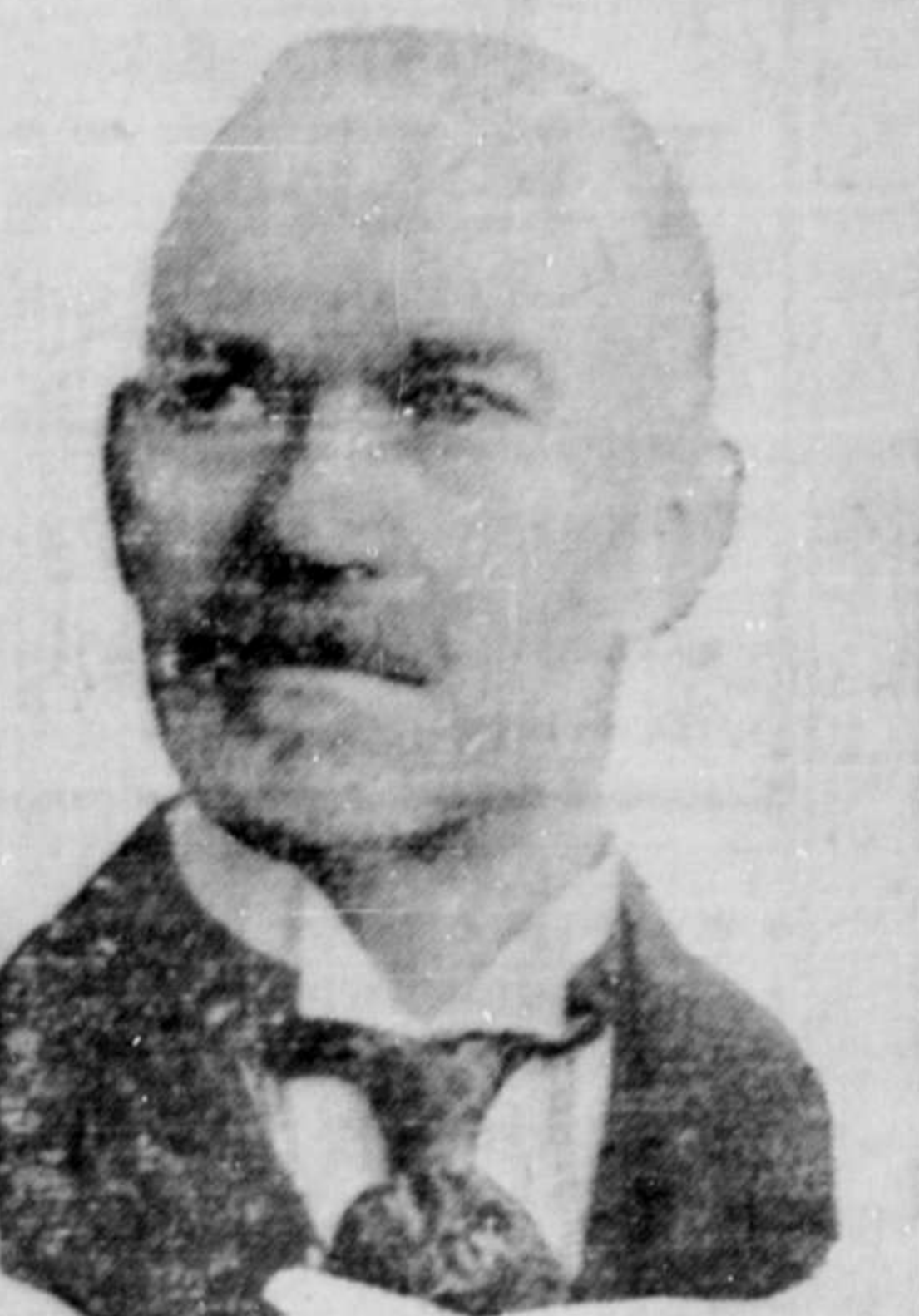

Coughlan Returns Home with Contract

Says he will commence Work at once on Vancouver Drydock with Payroll of \$50,000 Monthly

VANCOUVER, November 24.—J. J. Coughlan of the Coughlan shipyards, arrived here from Ottawa yesterday with the contract for the \$3,500,000 drydock in his pocket. He says that over a million dollars will be spent on labor, the payroll averaging \$50,000 monthly.

Preliminary work on the dock starts at once with 100 men and the number of employees will gradually increase to several hundreds as the work proceeds.

The result is that only one carload can be shipped east and the rest of the fish will have to sell for cold storage if the boats decide to remain here. Four more "freezers" are reported to be on the way and will arrive here tomorrow night. The following were the sales:

RAKED BOWSER WITHOUT MERCY

Vancouver Hotel Ballroom Crowded to Corridors—Minister Cheered Continuously.

VANCOUVER, November 24.—A meeting in the ballroom of the Vancouver Hotel was crowded far out into the corridors last night and amid almost uninterrupted cheering Attorney-General Farris raked W. J. Bowser without mercy in defending the record of the Oliver administration and especially the administration of his own department.

He said that Farris was not attorney-general for a year and a half after the Scott plugging episode. The absconding of Cook was no different from what might happen in any private firm. The Government was shocked by the Findlay affair as much as the prohibition party which recommended his appointment.

Bowser had never taken up the challenge to prove the insinuations regarding prohibition enforcement. He read a letter from Sir Charles Tupper commending his enforcement of the act.

Custard Pie

1 cup pastry flour
1/2 teaspoon Dr. Price's
Baking Powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup shortening
2 cups scalded milk

Sift together flour, baking
powder and salt; add one-half
shortening and rub in lightly
with fingers; add water slowly
until of right consistency
to roll out. Roll out very thin;
put on in small pieces re-
maining shortening; fold up-
per and lower edges in to
center; fold sides in to cen-
ter; fold sides in to center
again; roll out thin and put
on pie plate.

Custard

3 eggs
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups scalded milk
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Beat eggs, add sugar, salt,
flavoring and milk very slow-
ly. Line pie plate with paste
made as above, and bake in
very hot oven about 10 min-
utes. Pour custard into the
baked crust and bake in mod-
erate oven about 25 minutes.
The pie is done when a knife
put in center of custard
comes out dry.

Cocoanut Pie is made the
same way, adding 1 cup of
shredded cocoanut, and us-
ing only 2 eggs.

Pumpkin Pie

2 cups stewed and strained
pumpkin
2 cups rich milk or cream
1/2 cup brown or granulated
sugar
2 eggs
1/4 teaspoon ginger
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon

Mix pumpkin with milk,
sugar, well-beaten eggs, gin-
ger, salt, cinnamon, and beat
2 minutes. Pour into pie tin
which has been lined with
pastry. Place in hot oven for
15 minutes, then reduce heat
and bake 45 minutes in mod-
erate oven. To bring out fla-
vor of pumpkin it must be
very well baked.

TURNED TRICK ON SEATTLE CREDITORS

Rochepoint Now Lies Safely Moored at Grand Trunk Pacific Dock in Victoria

The big motor fishing boat Rochepoint which was spirited away from Seattle last Tuesday is now tied up at the Grand Trunk Pacific dock at Victoria and the King and Winge Co. which has a libel claim against her for repair work is unable to touch her. The vessel reached Victoria the morning after she had disappeared from Seattle and although two revenue cutters were out after her they were too late, for the vessel was by that time safely moored at Victoria.

The Rochepoint is owned by Stone Brothers of Alberni, one of them having lived on her since she was seized in Seattle. He was aboard when she was spirited out of Seattle. Part of the past season the Rochepoint packed fish for the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. here.

FREIGHT RATES KILL BUSINESS

Consular Report made by E. A. Wakefield Shows Fatal Effect of Drastic Action

The consular report made by E. A. Wakefield in regard to the local lumber and fish situation, as published in the commerce reports of the United States Government, shows the fatal effect of the recent freight rates increase on the business of this port. It says:

"Canadian railway freight rates were recently increased from 35 to 40 per cent. The immediate effect has been to practically stop lumber shipments from the Prince Rupert consular district to the United States."

"During the past year a thriving lumber business with the eastern United States had been established by British Columbia lumbermen. Fully 20,000,000 feet of spruce and 60,000,000 shingles were exported by rail from this district to the States during the last twelve months. The trade in lumber cannot possibly continue, according to local lumbermen, as the new freight tariff adds from \$7 to \$8 per thousand feet to transportation charges. Whether the trade in shingles will be similarly affected is difficult to say at present, but the general opinion is that freight rates must be reduced decidedly if the lumber export trade by rail is to continue. The only lumber now being shipped is the lumber bought or contracted for before rates were raised. Spruce mills on the Queen Charlotte Islands are closed or closing. Local mills adjacent to the port and along the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway are closing down or curtailing operations."

"Strong protests have been forwarded to the Canadian Railway Commission in connection with the increase as applied to fresh and frozen fish shipments to the United States. The big fish buyers frankly state that the increase will seriously interfere with the fish business and probably stop shipments of low-grade fish."

PENSIONS PAID EARLY IN JULY

Supt. Brankin Refutes Conservative Statement at Welfare Convention.

Mr. David Brankin, Superintendent of Neglected Children, in a short address at the evening session of the Child Welfare convention said that the present Mothers' Pensions legislation in British Columbia was the finest in existence. It was not true that no pensions had been paid out until October 1 on the eve of the election. Mr. Brankin stated:

"I have a letter in my pocket dated Sept. 11, thanking me for a cheque, and I have acknowledgements of pensions dating back to July," said the superintendent, "and tonight I have signed a voucher for 637 pensions for November. If people knew of the relief the pensions have given to mothers they would regret that the act had not been passed long ago."—Vancouver Sun, November 18, 1920.

MOTHERS' PENSION ACT:

Starting with July 1920 to date, 637 mothers and over 1000 children have already received assistance under the Act.

MINIMUM WAGE:

Thousands of young girls and women, who under the aegis of previous administrations, were not paid enough to keep body and soul together, are now receiving a decent weekly wage.

WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT:

Under the present Liberal Administration 750 widows and other dependents of working men are now being cared for. A sum of over \$22,000 is being expended monthly in this connection.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$1.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportional improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 400 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased, conditions include payment of stampage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving in His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 24, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years. Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions. Interest on moneys paid to purchase town, city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from settlement to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to 100 head.
