## LORD GREY ADVISES BRITISH TO LEAVE IRELAND

## W. J. BOWSER THROWN FROM AUTOMOBILE INTO MUD BUT NOT INJURED

### Would Let Ireland Settle Own Affairs

### Viscount Grey makes Notable Speech in British Parliament Advocating Withdrawal of All Forces from Emerald Isle

LONDON, November 25.—Viscount Grey, until recently ambassador to the United States and one of the most prominent of British statesmen, debating the Home Rule Bill in the House of Lords yesterday, made a notable appeal to the Government to withdraw all forces from Ireland and leave the country to find her own salvation.

The speech has created a sensation throughout Great Britain and is commented on in all the newspapers. It finds many backers and the hope is expressed in many quarters that the appeal will meet with a ready response.

Lord Grey has held many important positions in the British Government, most important of all being that of Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, which he held at the time of the outbreak of war with Germany. He used every effort to secure peace, but when he found it impossible, he entered the war with vigor. He still wields great influence in Great Britain.

### BOWSER EVADES CHALLENGE OF DR. E. A. HALL

Says He Has Not Time to Meet Well Known Speaker at Victoria.

HANEY, Nov. 25.—W. J. Bowser refuses to meet Dr. Ernest Hall in Victoria. Speaking here regarding Dr. Hall's challenge on behalf of Premier Oliver to debate the political issues, said: "The challenge is merely cheap advertisement. The premier had an opportunity of meeting me at the board of Trade luncheon in Vancouver on Friday, an event which has been cancelled. I have only an hour and a half left in the schedule for Victoria and need that to address the electors."

### REPUBLIC TRUCK WILL HANDLE THE EXPRESS BUSINESS

Machine Being Painted and Lettered in Winnipeg—Service Starts Wednesday

The Canadian Express Co. and the Dominion Express Co. are inaugurating free express delivery on December 1 will use a Republic truck jointly. This truck is now in Winnipeg where it is being painted and lettered. It is expected that it will be here by next Wednesday and if not a temporary arrangement will be made to start the service.

### MANSON HAS HELD NINETEEN MEETINGS

Strong Anti-Bowser Feeling Continues—Prudhomme and Kelly Weakening.

HOUSTON, Nov. 25.—The weakness of the opposition to Manson, particularly of Prudhomme and Kelly, is nightly becoming more apparent. In some polling places they will get no votes at all.

The Bowser candidate, Murray, is finding the anti-Bowser feeling very strong throughout the riding. Manson has held nineteen meetings to date since the campaign commenced.

### DIRECT CABLE WITH GREAT BRITAIN FOR ALL CANADIAN NEWS

MONTREAL, Nov. 25.—The Canadian Press Ltd. shareholders yesterday decided to establish a direct cable service between Great Britain and Canada to obviate the passage of British news through American channels.

### LOCAL CREDITORS HAVE INSTITUTED BANKRUPTCY CASE

Prince Rupert Creditors Want Statutory Meeting Here—Vancouver Representative Arrives.

A. H. Bain, representing the Vancouver Credit Men's Association and the Vancouver creditors of the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Co., arrived yesterday on the Prince George from the south.

As yet there has been no appointment made of a receiver for the company although the Prince Rupert creditors have now taken bankruptcy proceedings through L. W. Palmore, counsel for the local people. Bankruptcy proceedings have also been instituted in Vancouver but it is understood that they have been opened improperly.

The Prince Rupert creditors are willing to co-operate with the Vancouver creditors providing the first statutory meeting of all the creditors, both Vancouver and Prince Rupert, is held here. If this first meeting is not held here then it is the intention of the Prince Rupert creditors to oppose action instituted in Vancouver.

Decision has not yet been made as to an agreement between the creditors on this point.

### KETCHIKAN HOTEL HAS BEEN SOLD

Large Deal Consummated When J. B. Simpson Purchased Mission St. Property.

KETCHIKAN, Nov. 25.—The St. Francis Hotel property here has been sold to J. B. Simpson with it were purchased two pieces of adjoining property, making the largest deal ever put through in Ketchikan.

Mr. Simpson is an old timer of the north, having once resided at Dawson. He will convert the lower part of the building into a billiard parlor and the upstairs part will be used for hotel purposes.

### Newton Emissaries Tock Cold Feet at Port Simpson

Letter to the Editor of Daily News Shows Few Facts are Falsified by Supporters of Independent Candidate

To the Editor.—According to your paper of yesterday, W. R. Love spoke at the Newton rally on Tuesday night in his committee rooms and told of the favorable reception he got at Port Simpson on Saturday night and that he thought the people were with Newton. This, Mr. Editor, is flagrant camouflage. Mr. Love knows a lot better than that. He told this yarn to the dozen people at the so-called rally, but it is not true. This is what happened:

W. R. Love and Herb Young went to Port Simpson on Saturday afternoon and arrangements were made for a meeting in the hall, the same place where Mr. Pattullo recently held a meeting. The two Prince Rupert heroes did not go far, however. They took cold feet after landing and refused to go to the meeting and John Flewin was sent to call the meeting off, which he did. The people who had gathered going home very sore at not getting a chance to hear the representatives of the fireworks candidate.

I do not think, Mr. Editor, that Love and Young spoke to half a dozen voters at Port Simpson or that he urged the cause of Newton there. Flewin is a Conservative and he seems to have heard them off. At any rate the Port Simpson people have decided that as Newton and his valiant henchmen are not interested enough in the cause of the people's independent candidate to attend the meeting called in his behalf and would not even look them up, they reneged and went home and thus falsified the position at the Newton "rally." They will vote for Pattullo, the man they know and who had the courtesy to address them and explain the issues of the day.

### W. J. Bowers Meets with Serious Accident But Happily Escapes Unhurt

Was on His Way to Meeting at Haney; Car Turned Somersault over 20 ft. Embankment and Covered Occupants with Mud

HANEY, B. C., November 25.—W. J. Bowser, after narrowly escaping death in an automobile mishap near here last night, capitalized the incident by putting all the blame on, what he called, "Oliver's beautiful roads." On his way from Mission to Haney in a car in which he and J. A. Calderwood, the local Conservative candidate, and four others were riding, ran over an embankment and fell a distance of twenty feet, turning a complete somersault and landing upside down. It was at first feared that the occupants of the car were either killed or seriously injured, but after a few minutes they managed to cut away the sides of the car and crawl out on the wreckage.

It was found that, although both Mr. Bowser and Mr. Calderwood were covered from head to heel with mud, they were unhurt and suffered only from shock. Considering a passing Ford, the entire party of six piled into it and reached Haney about half an hour late, but in good spirits.

The first thing to be done was to explain to the large audience waiting why they were late and why they appeared on the platform covered with mud. The explanation brought cheers from the crowd and congratulations on getting safely out.

### SCLATER GETS BETTER JOB

Prohibition Commissioner Resigns To Become Steamship Manager.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 25.—Colonel James Sclater, provincial prohibition commissioner, has resigned his position in order to accept a position as Australian manager of the Canadian-Australian Steamships line.

Col. Sclater was appointed commissioner January, 1919, after discovering the W. C. Findlay irregularities. Besides a good record in the government service and military he has had lengthy experience in shipping affairs. His resignation was practically coincident with pending change in the liquor control as voiced in the recent referendum.

### LABOR ORATOR TELLS VERSION

Admits He Said "Like Hell" He Would Sing National Anthem—No Mental Prostitute

Jack Kavanagh was the speaker at a well attended meeting in the McIntyre Hall last evening. There were about 300 persons assembled and it was thought that things might get heated, but perfect order was maintained and there were no scenes or hot words.

Mr. Kavanagh took opportunity to give his version of the "Terrace incident." At the close of the Terrace meeting it was suggested that the National Anthem be sung and Mr. Kavanagh said that he would not; it was a Socialist meeting and Socialists were opposed to royalty. Anybody else could who wanted to, though. Some one made a remark that he would have to sing it and he had said, "Like hell I will." Mr. Kavanagh said that only E. T. Kenny and his brother-in-law and sister-in-law sang the anthem and that everybody else got up and moved out.

"I have earned money at my trade," said Mr. Kavanagh, speaking of the press, "and for a brief period was paid for my services in the labor movement, but I never was a mental prostitute."

N. Booth was the chairman of the meeting last night and J. H. Burrough, labor nominee for the election, spoke briefly at the commencement of the meeting.

### FARMER JOHN OLIVER WAS CONSISTENT OVER GIVING WOMEN BALLOT

MILLARDVILLE, Nov. 25.—Premier Oliver, in a speech here, charged W. J. Bowser with voting against the Woman's Franchise Bill, which was defeated in 1909 by the Conservatives. Oliver voted for the bill.

Many Sinking  
Political Views.

Many people are sinking their political views just now and are rallying to the support of Hon. T. D. Pattullo in order that the city of Prince Rupert may continue to have representation in the Oliver cabinet, and that the policies laid down by the minister of lands may be carried to fruition. "Let Pattullo finish his work" is the motto that is being followed. The people are anxious to see no hitch in the carrying out of the construction of the new court house, in the extension and thorough overhauling of the provincial government dock here, in the payments to the new school and in the provincial aid to the Section 2 bridge. They are also looking for other things from the same Government, such as the building of the road to Port Edward. Just now we have the ear of the Government. We have a man there with influence and it might be as well to let him see that we are behind him almost to a man. It is a great opportunity to let the Government see that we appreciate the privileges of representation in the cabinet and that the people of the north know a good thing when they have it.

It should not be sufficient to elect Pattullo to the Legislature. He should be sent by a full majority of the votes of the people. Do not let it be said that he would have been beaten if it had not been for a certain combination of circumstances. We believe that over fifty per cent of the actual voters will cast their ballots for the minister of lands, but every vote counts and we urge that others follow the good example of those who have taken the lead and, for this occasion, drop their political affiliations and make the election of Pattullo almost unanimous. We never could see why it was necessary to have a ballot on the election here. A return by acclamation would have been the right thing.

A University  
With One Wing.

At his Kitwangaar meeting S. M. Newton is reported to have said that if elected he would advocate spending only half a million dollars on the university buildings at Point Grey and the balance of the allotment of three millions in the Omineca and Prince Rupert districts. Did anyone ever hear such an idiotic suggestion?

The new university buildings are to be paid for from the sale of lands in the neighborhood of the new buildings, the value of which will be enhanced through the advent of the new institution. The total cost, it is estimated, will be three and a half millions and the lands are worth all that, if not more. In the meantime, however, the province has to advance the cash to do the work.

We believe in getting all we can in the north. At the same time it is not wise to make silly suggestions. It is not wise to expect that electors are going to take those suggestions seriously. Let us fight for the north all we can, but let us be reasonable. We shall never get anywhere by making statements such as that reported from Kitwangaar recently.

Streets Are Getting  
In Bad Shape.

Complaints are once more being made of the bad condition of the city streets. Naturally if some of the streets are to be paved in the spring, it would not be wise to spend much money on surfacing them now, but they must be fit to drive on. If the cost of delivering goods increases to any degree, it is the people who have to pay for it. It is trying to the pocket and the temper to drive over very bad roads.

The cure for the bad condition is asphalt or some similar paving. This the city council is planning to use. It is understood that a bylaw is to be laid before the people at the time of the civic election, giving the city the right to go ahead with the work on Second and Third avenues. This seems like good policy. It would change the appearance of the business section of the city wonderfully to have one or two streets paved. The other streets, however, must be kept in good shape as well as those more centrally located.

BAND MASTER  
PASSED AWAY

Ben McKay, Conductor of Greenville Band, Was Well Known in Prince Rupert.

Ben McKay, conductor of the Greenville Concert Band, passed away at his native village, Lakalzap, Naas River, on November 16, after a long illness. Mr. McKay was quite well known here, having visited the city several times on the occasion of the fall fair, for which the organization has held special playing engagements for some years. He was only a young man of 27 years and news of his death will be received with regret by his many friends in Prince Rupert and the Naas valley. His wife predeceased him, having died of influenza in the fall of 1918. Mr. McKay's successor in the leadership of the Greenville Band has not yet been chosen.

Letter From Father.

Writing to Will Edmunds, of this city, who has given the band special instructions for two years, Alfred McKay, father of the deceased, says:

"Your friend, Ben McKay, conductor of the Greenville Concert Band, passed into eternity at 2 o'clock on the morning of November 16, dying the death of a good Christian. The last piece he played on his violin was 'I am coming to the Cross.' Then again, one hour before his death, he sang 'Safe in the Arms of Jesus' and he lifted up his hands to heaven and died.

Heavenly Vision.

"Someone standing around the house outside saw a heavenly vision in the form of a bright, shining light about the size of the moon. It caught the eyes of those who were standing by and spread over the house like a rainbow and disappeared.

"He devoted all his life to the studying of his violin and clarinet and also played all kinds of brass instruments. He was very respected among the Indians of the Naas."

The native band took part in the funeral playing "The Dead March in Saul" and Chopin's "Funeral March."

MRS. KAUFFMANN  
DIED IN CHICAGO

News of Death of Wife of Pioneer Music Teacher Received in City.

The death occurred recently in Chicago of Mrs. Maria Kauffmann, wife of the late Professor Paul Kauffmann, of this city, who died here some years ago. It was over a year ago that Mrs. Kauffmann left Prince Rupert to visit in the United States and South America, after having disposed of the Prince Rupert Music Store business to Will Edmunds who has since conducted it. Recently she sent word to her agents here that she would be back in Prince Rupert in January to attend to certain business matters.

Mrs. Kauffmann was well known here and was highly respected, having resided in the city with Professor Kauffmann since 1909, when the Prince Rupert Music Store and studio was established by them. Before that they were in a similar business in Chicago, Roseland and Greenwood. Deceased was a native of Germany and her brothers were prominent business men, one of them being high up in the affairs of state in Prussia. Another brother is in the wine business in Chile, South America.

### PRINCE RUPERT MAY COME HERE

**Captain Donald is Now at Swanson Bay to Take Charge—Preliminary Survey Here**

Captain Donald was a passenger on the Prince George this trip from Vancouver to Swanson Bay, where he will take charge of the wrecked steamer Prince Rupert as master. Great progress is being made on the floating of the big three-stacker and she should be ready to move in quick order now.

The report was brought by the steamer Prince George yesterday that the Prince Rupert, though she may go south for repairs, will first come to the company's dry dock here for preliminary survey. If dry dock troubles are by that time adjusted, the local yard will also have a chance to tender on the repair work, which is going to be very extensive.

### VANCOUVER BOWLERS VISIT OCEAN FALLS POSSIBLY VERY SOON

OCEAN FALLS, Nov. 25.—Arrangements are under way to bring a Vancouver bowling team here within the next month or six weeks to roll against the local boys. None of the Vancouver teams make better averages than the local pipfitters, according to the Vancouver papers.

In one of the best games of the season the pipfitters won out again, making ten straight games. The Townsite and Loggers have put up the best contest games to date. ### TAGGED SALMON IS CAPTURED IN SKEENA

**Chinook from Washington, U.S.A., Reached These Waters Recently**

The U.S. Bureau of Fisheries has been advised by W. A. Found, of the Canadian Department of Marine and Fisheries, of the capture in the Skeena River of a Chinook salmon bearing an aluminum button, which, according to the bureau's records, was attached to a fish at Point Partridge, Whidbey Island, Wash., Aug. 13, 1918. This was done in connection with the investigation of the migrations of Fraser River sockeyes, a Chinook evidently having been tagged by mistake.

It is thought that the fish must have been in its second or third year when tagged, maturing two years later. The fact that a Chinook should be caught in a trap so far from sea at this period of its life is interesting. The distance between the points at which it came under observation is about 600 miles by the most direct water route.

His meeting at Ocean Falls was held on Tuesday evening. On that occasion he had a large audience, something like three hundred being present. Among those present was Jack Kavanagh who is stumping for J. H. Burroughs, but he left before the end. Mr. Pattullo had a good hearing and his audience was very enthusiastic and sympathetic.

Dealt with McKay  
At Swanson Bay the minister took occasion to wipe the floor with T. Ross McKay, who was given the privilege of speaking, and who talked for an hour dealing to some extent with purely personal matters. The minister then let loose for ten minutes and the audience went almost wild with excitement. The minister says he will get a good majority of the votes at Swanson Bay.

At Bella Bella the minister inspected the hospital and was much pleased with it. He says it is a well conducted institution.

Capt. Formby and Mr. Pattullo held a joint meeting at Namu where about twenty attended. The Captain read the Buyer platform and spoke about the various planks. Mr. Pattullo is not fearing the result of the Namu vote.

Impromptu Meeting  
Surf Inlet was the first place visited. There an impromptu meeting was held and much interest was taken in the topics discussed.

The minister says that Burroughs will get a good many votes at some of the points and doubtless Formby will also get the straight Conservative vote at some points where they do not realize the desirability of supporting a member of the Government. Mr. Newton does not seem to have many followers.

### CAPTAIN BERGMAN BACK TO HIS SHIP

Captain Bergman, of the Booth Fisheries organization, has resumed command of the steamer Commonwealth after being laid up with a broken leg since last January. Mr. David Brankin, Superintendent of Neglected Children, in a short address at the evening session of the Child Welfare Convention said that the present Mothers' Pensions legislation in British Columbia was the finest in existence. It was not true that no pensions had been paid out until October 1 on the eve of the election, Mr. Brankin stated.

"I have a letter in my pocket dated Sept. 14, thanking me for a cheque, and I have acknowledgements of pensions dating back to July," said the superintendent, "and tonight I have signed a voucher for 637 pensions for November. If people knew of the relief the pensions have given to mothers they would regret that the act had not been passed long ago." Vancouver Sun, November 18, 1920.

### MOTHERS' PENSION ACT:

Starting with July 1920 to date, 637 mothers and over 1000 children have already received assistance under the Act.

### MINIMUM WAGE:

Thousands of young girls and women, who under the aegis of previous administrations, were not paid enough to keep body and soul together, are now receiving a decent weekly wage.

### WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT:

Under the present Liberal Administration 750 widows and other dependents of working men are now being cared for. A sum of over \$22,000 is being expended monthly in this connection.

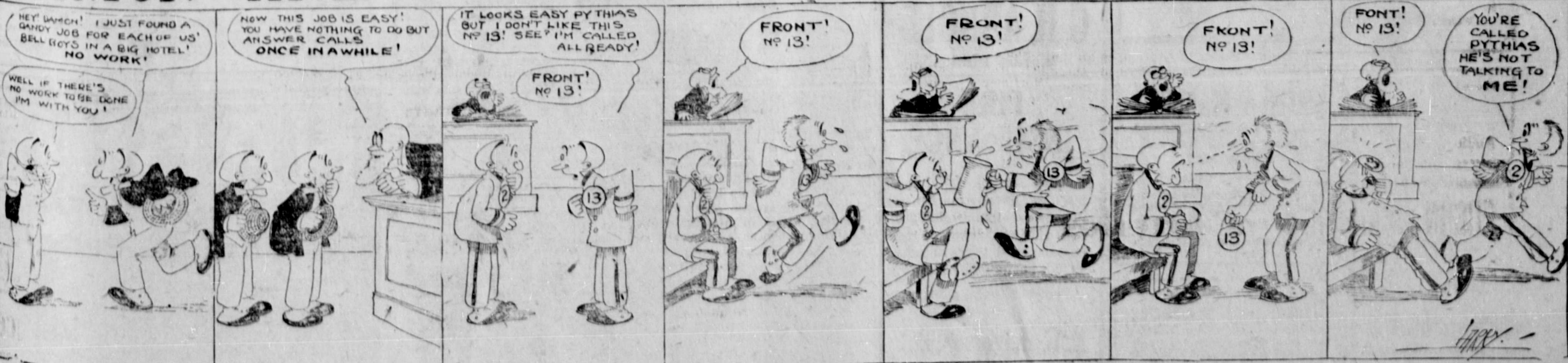

The mayor went away on October 2, but on Friday October 1 I stopped him on Third Avenue and he said, "I've seen Chief Vickers about that matter."

I heard nothing further about his case until Mr. McNulty came to me on Monday, October 18, and said that Sergeant Adams had been up to the Bazaar Committee on October 15 or 16 to say the raffle was illegal and would have to be stopped.

After being assured by Mr. McNulty that this was the first notification that they had received I said: "Well, you were informed just two and a half weeks at least after the time I understood Chief Vickers had been instructed to stop your raffle. Under these circumstances I, as one commissioner, will not agree to prosecute you."

In my own mind I'm sure there was a misunderstanding somewhere, but we all make mistakes and I'm not out to accuse anybody over such a paltry affair as this.

Mr. Hill's resignation and his letter remind me of that well known play—"MUCH ADO ABOUT NOTHING."
