# UNITED STATES DOES NOT LIKE ISOLATION POLICY

## FOUNDER OF THE SINK FEIN MOVEMENT IS NOW UNDER ARREST IN IRELAND

### United States Demands Same Recognition as if Party to Treaty and Nations League

WASHINGTON, November 26.—Secretary Colby of the American State Department informed the British Embassy through Earl Curzon, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, that the United States does not propose to be excluded from participation in the rights and privileges secured under mandates provided in the treaty of peace. Also the U.S. expects to be heard regarding the terms of mandates before they are put into force. The secretary also demands that the mandates for Mesopotamia be sent to Washington for endorsement before going before the League of Nations.

The note demands for America equal treatment with the League of Nations regarding markets and the development of oil resources in Mesopotamia.

MONTREAL, Nov. 26.—Three were killed, an unidentified man and woman, and Porter E. Brown, in the wreck of the Toronto-Montreal express ten miles from Toronto last night, according to an official statement made by the Grand Trunk Railway.

In addition to the killed four injured have been taken to the hospital and seven were slightly hurt.

LOS ANGELES, November 26.—Gaston Chevrolet, the famous racing auto driver, Lyall Jolis, mechanician for Eddie O'Donnell, were killed yesterday when Chevrolet's and O'Donnell's machines crashed together on the Los Angeles speedway at the end of a 250 mile race.

The accident occurred while Chevrolet, O'Donnell and Joe Thomas were struggling to make up half a dozen laps they were behind.

### UNITED STATES THANKSGIVING

### JACK JOHNSON KNOCKED OUT HIS OPPONENT

Fought Last Night in Leavenworth Jail and Then Boxed Topeka Jack.

WASHINGTON, November 26.—American Thanksgiving Day yesterday was celebrated even more generally from coast to coast and from border to border. Marking it does the tercentenary of the landing of the Pilgrim Fathers at Plymouth Rock in 1620, the day has been specially noted. Turkey and pumpkin were served on million tables and a true sense of thanksgiving pervaded the spirit of the nation.

On September 6 the sailing of the Pilgrims from Plymouth was celebrated in the English City of that name. Yesterday celebrations of the landing were general throughout the states. The reflection of the old British characteristics were made a dominant note in speeches delivered for the occasion and eloquent pleas were made for the erection of a common purpose of the great English speaking nations, Britain and France, to maintain the peace of the world.

Real Policy or  
Purity Program.

Every politician has a program which he dangles before the electors. It is usually a work of art. It is designed to catch the unwary voter and lure him into the polling booth ready primed to vote for that particular candidate. It is a bait with which to catch human fish, and sometimes the suckers bite.

What is true of all elections is true here in Prince Rupert. Each candidate lays out a program. Some of these are published persistently and insistently with the idea that if the fish refuse to rise to the bait it shall be shoved down their throats. The curious thing is that in spite of past experiences of this kind, there are still suckers.

Now the sucker is not a very desirable fish. It is full of bones and there is little meat to it. The human sucker, however, counts just as much as an intelligent man, when it comes to voting. Every vote counts the same.

The curious thing about voters is that everyone thinks he is wondrous wise and the other is the sucker. He cannot distinguish between the false and the true. It is to draw attention to this condition and to urge that every voter make a thorough investigation into the personality of the candidates, into their past records and into the promise for the future, before casting the ballot that this is written.

Electors Forsaking  
Former Affiliations.

The electors of the north are a discriminating kind. They are more intelligent, probably, as a whole than any other body of electors in the province. They are already investigating and many have already made up their minds that there is but one candidate at this time to vote for. We know this is true because many, who were not former supporters of Mr. Pattullo, have dropped in to make it clear where they stand at this election. We appreciate their confidence. We realize that often it is considerable wrench for a man to vote against his party or contrary to his past convictions, but these are extraordinary days and this period is a critical one for Prince Rupert city and the whole district. They are days when it is desirable that people should be willing to give up their natural preferences and act as a unit for the good of the north.

Don't Forget to  
Unite on Big Four.

The thing to do now is to unite on the big four for the north. The Liberal four will go to Victoria with a mandate from the people asking for fair treatment for the north, including an increase in the number of representatives before the next election.

The election of Hon. T. D. Pattullo is now assured. It is a commonly accepted fact. What is desirable now is to make the majority as large as possible so that it will impress the people of the south.

Good reports come in from the other constituencies. Manson seems likely to make the grade in Omineca where he has done excellent work. Kergin is making a good impression in Atlin constituency and should have a good majority. In Prince George Perry is very sure of victory. This is in line with reports from the south, where every indication is that the Oliver Government will be returned by a very handsome majority.



### USE AIRSHIPS IN SEARCH FOR SEALS

Four Leave on Steamer Alconda for Newfoundland for Spring Service

Many strange expeditions have set sail from the Thames, but none stranger than that which cleared from the river last week en route for Newfoundland on the steamer Alconda, says the London Times. On board her are four non-rigid airships, which are to be used early next spring in a first attempt, by means of aerial observation and wireless telegraphy, to direct the course of the steamers which set out each year from St. John's in search of the seal herds which come drifting down on the ice from the far north.

The expedition, which has been organized and is being taken out by Frank J. Tippen, consulting airship engineer and constructor to the Newfoundland Government, and a well-known expert in this country on the design of large commercial airships, is a very complete one.

#### Three Blimps

Three of the four airships are of the "S.S." or sea-scouting type which, known familiarly as "Blimps," and driven by a single "Hawk" Rolls-Royce motor, did such valuable reconnaissance work in the war over the North and Irish Seas. The fourth is a larger ship of the same type, driven by a couple of Rolls Royce motors. These four ships, with all necessary equipment and ample spares, have been presented to the Newfoundland Government by our Air Ministry as the nucleus of a regular government air patrol service in Newfoundland, and after the experiment in seal-hunting they will be used as a matter of routine in survey work and forest patrol. The experience thus gained by the Newfoundland authorities will be of the utmost value and will, it is hoped, lead to the establishment of other airship patrol services in different parts of the world.

### INDIAN WOMAN CREMATES HERSELF

Burns Cabin Over Her Head at Gambier Bay.

Preferring death to senility, the ancient mother of "Gambier Bay Jim," tyee of Gambier Bay, last week set fire to her cabin and cremated herself in the smouldering ruins of what had been her home for nearly a century, according to word received at Juneau. For several years she is said to have brooded over increasing infirmity.

Gambier Bay Jim himself is more than sixty years of age and he too has lived all his life at Gambier Bay, traditional hunting grounds of his family. For many years he keenly resented the white man's intrusion and was even considered a dangerous man by the interlopers. Of recent years, however, he has quieted down and apparently is reconciled to the cannery operations of the Hoonah Packing Company and other activities of the whites.

He is quite well fixed in worldly goods, owning a fine gasboat, a young wife—several of his older ones having died—much fishing tackle and other wealth.




