DOUGHTY GIVES VICTORY BONDS UP TO POLICE

Nothing Yet Discovered to Indicate what Happened to Ambrose Small

TORONTO, Nov. 30.—John Doughty, who was chased across the continent and arrested at Regina City in connection with the mysterious disappearance of Ambrose Small, the theatrical manager, today visited the home of his sister, Mrs. Lovatt here, and revealed there to the police the hiding place of the \$100,000 worth of Canadian victory bonds, which have been now recovered intact. Later it was discovered that Doughty had returned \$5,000 more victory bonds than he was charged with stealing. There are a flood of theories in regard to the disappearance of Small and the opinion of Mrs. Small is that he is still alive.

EVERYBODY WELCOME

Pattullo Drove Home Many Political Truths and Had Meeting with him last night

Followers of Burrough interrupted constantly but were silenced by quick retorts of Liberal Candidate; No Other Candidate Spoke

Hon. T. D. Pattullo came out with flying colors from the big meeting last night in the Westholme Theatre, in which he explained the issues of the day and effectually dealt with all criticism. No other candidate addressed the gathering. S. M. Newton was represented by B. O. Oughton who spoke very briefly, and J. H. Burrough who took a place on the platform gave his time to Jack Kavanagh. There was a goodly smattering of Reds present, some of whom constantly interrupted, but were silenced by the speaker who showed wonderfully quick wit and bright repartee.

In summing up at the close of the meeting, Mr. Pattullo combatted the idea that a wave of independent thought was sweeping the country. He asked what happened in New Brunswick, in Nova Scotia in Manitoba recently. Liberal Governments were elected in each of those provinces and even in Ontario, Drury, the leader of the Farmer Government, was a Liberal.

If Mr. Burrough was elected to the Legislature, Kavanagh could not sit for him. He would have to take the seat himself.

Not Ideal Conditions. No one claimed that conditions were ideal now. No one knew this better than the speaker. The difficulty with Burrough and Kavanagh was that they showed no remedy. What about the millions starving in Russia today he asked, and there was no answer.

Liberals represented no one class alone but all classes and all conditions. They believed in applying the experience gained during 6,000 years for the benefit of the human race. He ridiculed the socialistic idea of conducting affairs and asked who would be the bosses, who the scavengers and who the cooks? This work as necessary and had to be done, he recognized that even now no one really owned anything. They simply controlled it.

In Russia everything was owned by the state and they had a rule of blood and iron. Probably Jack Kavanagh was getting money from the workingmen but he was not finding fault with that. "No Jack," he said, "I am not finding fault with that. You call yourself Jack instead of John in order to be one of the boys."

Chairman. Dr. W. T. Kergin, who presided, said he had known Premier Oliver for 14 years and he thoroughly admired and esteemed him. They were quite right in calling him "Honest John." As to the appeal in favour of "Farmer John," if they meant that he had plenty of good horse sense, that was correct too. The present government had taken hold of affairs when they were in bad shape and had re-established British Columbia and had enacted a lot of commonsense

MUCH MONEY UP AT PRINCE, GEORGE ON THE LIBERAL

PRINCE GEORGE, Nov. 30.—Betting on the election results in this constituency is very general. Until today the money in sight was fairly even, but today there is a decided change. There is lots of money offering on the Liberal candidate but the Conservatives want two to one and then there are scarcely any ready to take the Liberal money. There is another \$10,000 to bet that Perry, the Liberal candidate, will be elected by the largest majority ever given a candidate in this district.

DEATH TODAY ON NEWINGTON

A. Dunwoodie of Victoria Was Wireless Operator and Purser.

Mr. Dunwoodie was only 25 years of age. He was a single man with his home at Fort Street, Victoria. Heart failure is thought to be the cause.

Polls open at 8 o'clock and will close sharp at 7 o'clock in the evening. All absentee voters who belong to the riding will vote as usual at the deputy returning officers' desk, while there will be a special booth for absentee voters from other parts of the province.

The partition in the Sons of Canada hall on Second Avenue, where the election is to be held, will be removed to make the quarters more commodious and convenient.

Liberals Sure of Winning Says Vancouver Despatch

Oliver Confounds His Traucur amid Much Applause; Says Political Corpses should Not Return to Corrupt the Earth

VANCOUVER, November 30.—On the eve of election the people are realizing that the Oliver Government is going to be returned with a substantial majority.

Last night Oliver evoked a whirlwind of applause at a meeting here when he threw out the challenge that he would give \$4,500 to the Vancouver General Hospital if Dr. Machan, the Conservative candidate, could prove that he had been paid \$4,500 for the Western Cordage Company site at New Westminster before the company was given a government loan. He said the Western Cordage Co. never paid a dollar for the site.

Oliver refused to attack, the premier spoke of the remark of Louser who said "Let the dead bury its dead." "I say let the dead not return to walk the earth in their grave clothes and offend the living with their corruption, corruption caused by unsavory allyway deals."

Mr. Oliver said the statement had been made that he had been opposed to the military service act. This was false.

Both Liberals and Conservatives had crowded meetings.

PRUDHOMME MET QUIETUS

Said He Will Not Receive More Than Ten Votes in His Home Town.

HAZELTON, Nov. 30.—The final meeting in this riding in connection with the present political campaign is called by Alex. Manson for tonight at Smithers.

At the biggest meeting in the history of the place at Telkwa on Saturday night, Prudhomme met his quietus, the meeting being plainly with Manson. It is said now that Prudhomme will not get more than ten votes in his home town of Telkwa and that the total vote for both independents will not be more than 25.

Murray will receive a percentage of the old line Tory votes but there is every indication that Manson will have the big bulk of the farmer and Liberal vote. The returned soldiers are voting as civilians and are well pleased with the treatment they have received from the Provincial Government.

The house and contents are a total loss.

STEEL SMELTER NEAR VANCOUVER

**Vote Tomorrow
For Good Government.**

Tomorrow the people of British Columbia are given an opportunity of saying whether they will revert to Bowserism and all that it stands for, or a continuation of sane and safe government under Premier John Oliver. There is no other issue. The petty independence cry and the Socialist flurry mean nothing. There is but one issue. If the Liberals are re-elected it will mean a continuation of the Oliver administration. If they are defeated, it will mean that Bowser will lead a new Government, which in every material respect will resemble the one that went out of power four years ago.

**Camouflage of
Independents.**

There is no such thing as independence in Government. There must be co-operation. Liberalism means co-operation for a definite purpose. The Liberal party is a loose organization to which anyone may belong who subscribes to the ideas and ideals of liberalism. The independent is one who is out for himself. He cannot work in conjunction with his fellow. He is an Ishmaelite. He may prepare an elaborate platform but he has absolutely no power to have its provisions carried out. There is no co-operative spirit behind it.

A vote for an independent means a vote against the present Government. The only reason there is an independent candidate in this city is because one man, with an overwhelming desire for public office, a hardy perennial in office seeking, places himself in the field without any backers except C. O. Rowe and F. S. Wright and by means of his newspaper is able to delude a section of the public and make them believe he is their champion. This is a clever trick, but unfortunately there are a few who fall for it. This overweening ambition of one man has made it impossible for the Conservatives to unite in any real opposition to the minister of lands and has prevented a proper discussion of the issues of the day.

He cannot hope to win, but he has attained his desire, that of obtaining cheap notoriety and at the same time of revenging himself on the Conservatives who cast him out. The election campaign has been an interesting display of human nature. We should be sorry for the independent if we were not aware that he richly deserves the fate that awaits him.

Mining News

TULAMEEN PLATINUM
If the expectations of Robert Stevenson, one of the oldest prospectors of the Cariboo district, are realized, British Columbia will have a platinum mine beside which the deposits of the Ural mountains will fade into insignificance. According to Mr. Stevenson's story in the Princeton Star recently he discovered a vein of platinum four inches wide and thirty feet long in a canyon at the headwaters of the Tulameen River forty three years ago. When he made the discovery there was a thousand pounds of platinum in sight, but then it was worth only 50c an ounce. Now it is worth \$100 an ounce and since the increase a high water year came and buried the deposit with trees and a landslide. For years the prospector has worked on the uncovering of it and is now but seven feet from the body. He expects to uncover it soon and come out a wealthy man. According to Mr. Stevenson he is the only man alive who knows about the vein.


Model Town
Another model mining town is being established by the Coalmont Coal & Coke Co. at Coalmont on the Kettle Valley Railway, a few miles west of Princeton. The Coalmont company is opening up coal mines in this vicinity and the installation of an aerial tramway and power plant will soon be completed. Most of the equipment is already on the ground. In addition to running the mine operations the power from the plant will supply the power and light of the town and a water system will be put in for domestic purposes. Housing and living conditions for the employees both at the mine and the town are pronounced very good. Six large motor trucks are kept busy hauling lumber to the mines from a nearby sawmill.

Great Districts
The Similkameen and Altn mining districts have probably been the most active in British Columbia during the season just closed. Great promise is shown in both districts and while some of the older mining belts have been declining both these seem to be rapidly advancing forward. In the Similkameen the Great Copper Mountain properties have just been connected with the Kettle Valley railroad and at Coalmont coal mines are being developed. There are also other bright prospects. The Similkameen country has come to life as a result of the opening of that country by the Kettle Valley Railroad a few years ago. Since that time the big properties have been developed and opened up. Next year the Copper Mountain will become one of the world's largest copper producing plants, rivalling Anyox and Britannia.

Soldiers' Strike
A find of silver ore in the Kitsault district, not far from the Dolly Varden claims has been reported by Wm. Walker and F. C. Roberts according to papers from the south. This is one of the parties grubstaked during the season as a result of the special Provincial legislation enacted at last session. The ore is said to be gray and ruby silver in the andesite similar to the Dolly Varden. The claims are known as the W. and B. group and are only half a mile distant from the Moose property. During the winter the soldier partners are going to work in Vancouver and expect to invest capital to enable them to go ahead with aggressive development work next season.

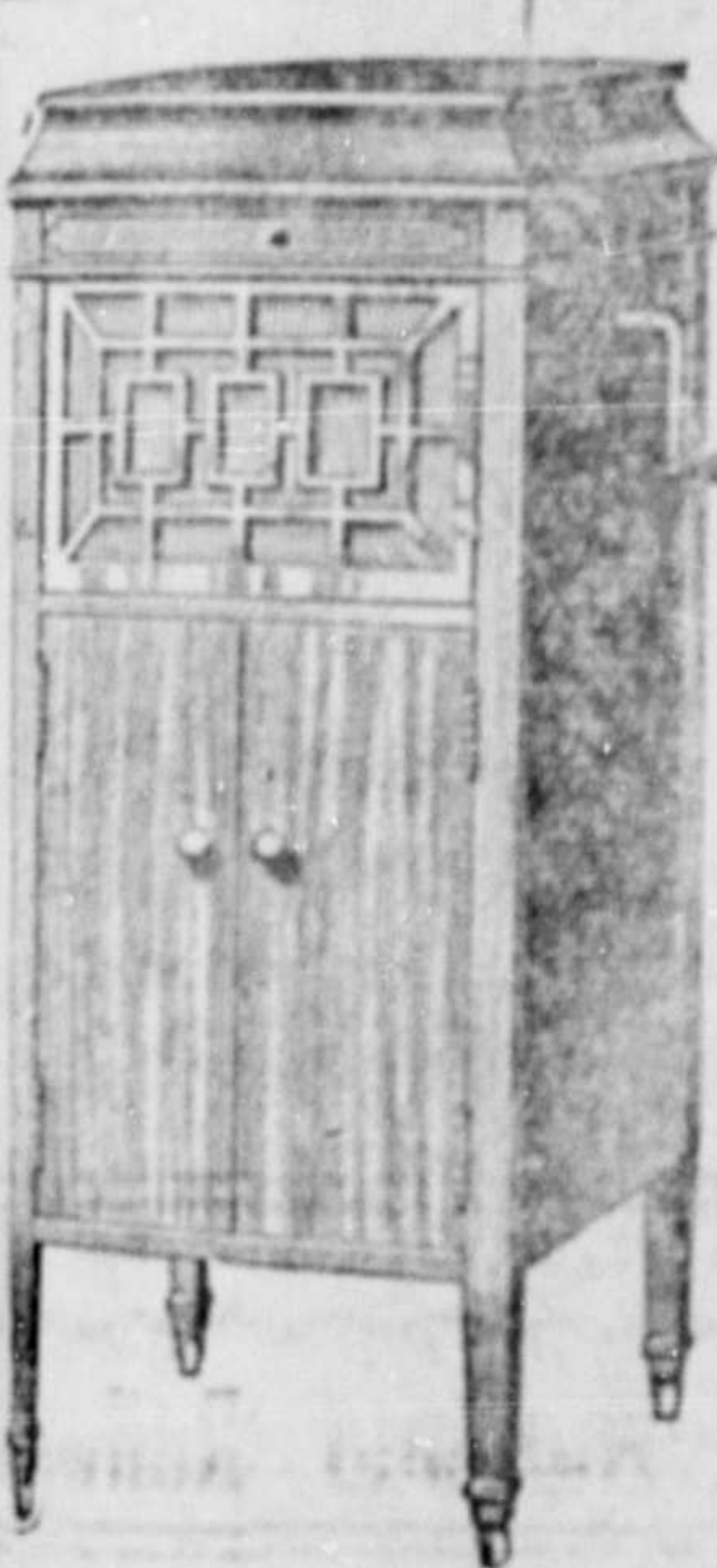

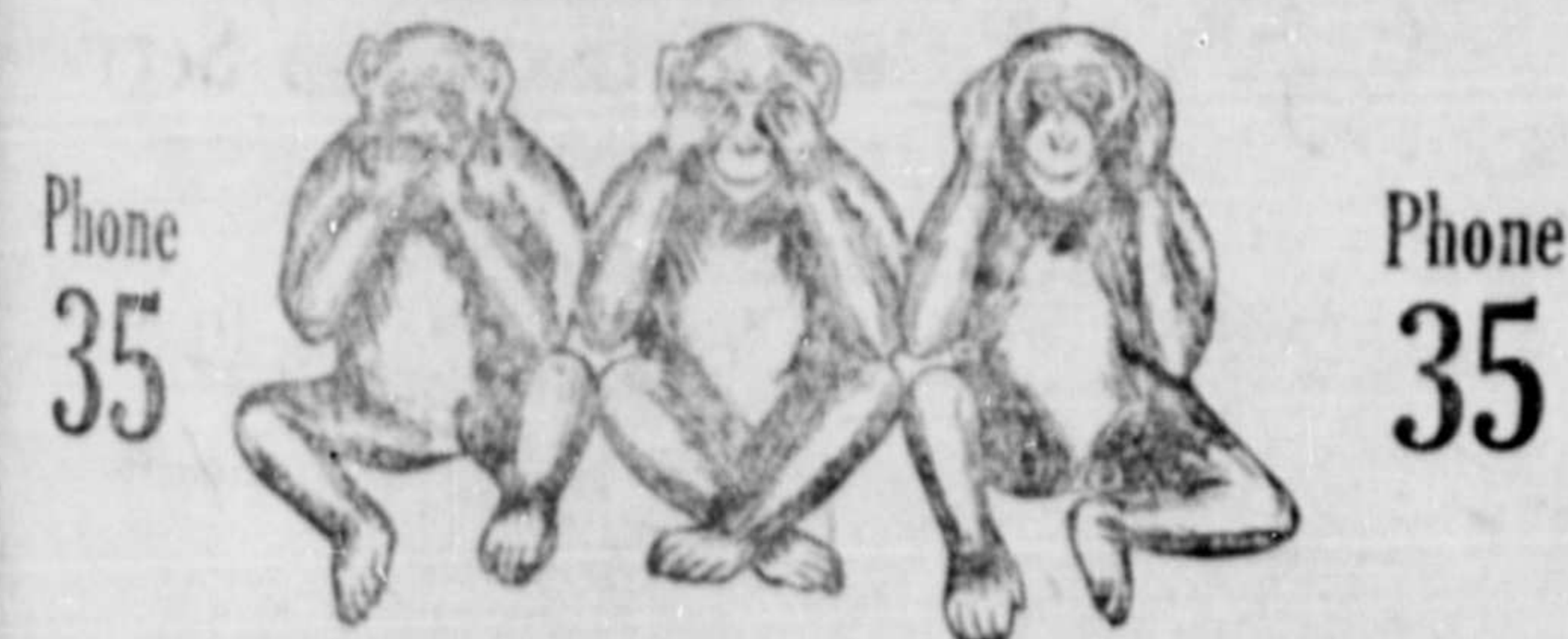

BETTING MAY BE ILLEGAL

Law in Regard to Matter Does Not Seem Clear—Affidavit May be Taken.

There seems to be a difference of opinion as to whether betting on the election results disqualifies from voting. If there is any doubt in regard to the eligibility of a voter, the returning officer or poll clerk may require the voter to take the following affidavit:

"You swear or solemnly affirm that you are the person whose name is entered on the copy of the list of voters now shown to you; that you have not before voted at this election, either at this or any other polling place, and that you have not received anything nor has anything been promised to you, either directly or indirectly, in order to induce you to vote or to refrain from voting at this election, and that you are a British subject of the full age of 21 years. So help me God."

Any person who takes this affidavit is allowed to vote, and if he has perjured himself he will be liable to prosecution for the crime. Betting is not mentioned, but whether the affidavit would be considered to cover betting is an open question.

PATTULLO DROVE HOME POLITICAL TRUTHS; HAD THE MEETING WITH HIM

(Continued From Page One.)

largely due to the efforts of the people themselves. He spoke of the new pulp mill that had been established farther south and of others which were in prospect. At Prince George, Kitimat, and the Queen Charlotte Islands there would be mills. The minister said they were also using every endeavor to secure the establishment of a pulp mill which could utilize the power from Falls River. Already a large concern was investigating this. He said he had gone down to defeat on the question of a power supply for the city. There had been people who were willing to sacrifice the city for political purposes. Nothing had done the city such terrible harm as the defeat of the hydro-electric bylaw. It made him sick when he saw what an opportunity had been missed. He believed the population of the place would have been doubled if it had gone through. Now they had no power to offer anyone. The same men who helped to defeat this measure were now standing behind Capt. Formby and S. M. Newton. The most important thing just now was to get power at a reasonable rate so that they could get industries into the city.

Mr. Pattullo then dealt with the claim of Mr. Newton that he had grabbed the power and showed that only the reserve put on that watershed by the present Government had saved it for the city. Yet Newton says he did it. The speaker said he would move heaven and earth to get power for this city.

Fred Shaw: "That will not suit the old timers."

Pattullo: "I'm talking to the intelligent people of Prince Rupert."

Social Legislation.

Mr. Pattullo then went on to speak of the social legislation the labor legislation, including the establishment of the labor bureau and the eight-hour day in certain industries. He explained why the general eight-hour day had not yet been passed although his Government was pledged to do it if the Dominion refused. However, he was not catering to anyone to get a vote but appealed to the cold, calm reason of the people. He wanted to be elected by the intelligent vote of the people.

To the mothers pensions measure there had not been a dissenting voice. This was already given relief to many mothers and children. Of the minimum wage measure 2,600 were taking advantage. There were men who would not work eight hours a day yet their wives had to work sixteen hours.

Japanese Question.

The prevention of Japanese invading the lumber camps was spoken of by the minister, who said this measure would be fought to the end.

In regard to the department of industries which had been started for the benefit of the returned soldiers there was no criticism here. "You do not dare to say so even if you are opposed to it," he threw at the Reds.

Voice from the audience: "Why?"

Pattullo: "Because you are

scared."

It was the soldiers, he continued, who, urged on by patriotic duty, had saved the public institutions under which they were able so fully to discuss the public affairs of the province today. The Government had been instrumental in securing the building of houses for these soldiers. No less than forty houses had been erected here for the men.

Election Act.

Mr. Pattullo said he believed in conducting the affairs of the country in a sane, sensible manner. The parties had got together in the framing of the election act and they would do the same in preparing the moderation act. Everyone today who was in the province had a chance to vote and he saw no reason why a ballot box should not be carried on a ship so that the people aboard might vote.

Larger representation for the north was one of the things they were going to ask. He honestly believed the Liberals were going back into power as strong as ever and there should be seven members for the north instead of four. He asked that they send a solid four on this occasion.

The speaker dealt briefly with the other candidates and then urged that they vote for a principle and not for the man. The Oliver Government would be returned for it still held the public confidence and he felt sure they would also elect himself.

B. O. Oughton.

B. O. Oughton spoke of the desire of the people to get away from old party lines and said this movement was gathering force. He thanked Mr. Pattullo for the courtesy in inviting Mr. Newton to speak on that platform.

Jack Kavanagh.

Jack Kavanagh made a bright speech and was not interrupted. He accentuated the difference between the business people and the working class. The speaker had mentioned "our resources," "our land settlements." He asked how many people owned one of these things. The former speaker had urged the need of population. In Vancouver they would hang a man who talked like that. The Government represented the interests, the financial and industrial control of this country. The press, with the exception of one paper, was controlled by the interests. The people had no industries. They were simply employed by them and when it was found there was no profit in hiring them they could go on the scrap heap.

Kavanagh claimed the minimum wage measure was not enforced except where there was an organization of workers. The same was true of the health act. After all the things they heard, they were 15,000 men in Vancouver looking for a job and could not find one.

Skinned from Profits.

The pensions of which Pattullo spoke were part of the surplus profits of the working class. They were skinned from the surplus profits. Their candidate had nothing to do with Pattullo or Newton but with principles. There were millions of orphans, cripples and widows in the world broken by a capitalistic war. This was the system today. The ownership of the means of wealth production was in the hands of one class and the others had to sell themselves for wages. The only solution of the problem was to take over the means of production. They had their choice on December 1 either to vote for the system that made widows and orphans and prostitutes, or for Burrough who stood for a change of the system.

LYNCH SPEAKS AT MASSET ON ISSUES OF DAY

Large Majority Expected from Masset Inlet Points for Pattullo

PORT CLEMENTS, Nov. 29.—W. P. Lynch addressed a large and representative meeting here on Saturday night at which he defined very clearly the financial policy as well as their land and timber policy as compared with that of the former Government. He showed how the former Government had tied everything up and forced merchants into bankruptcy and the people had to leave the Islands. The present Government, on the other hand, led in this respect by the Minister of Lands, had passed legislation, the result of which was shown very plainly in the number of people, industries and business establishments now at this place.

Mr. Lynch also pointed out that the road development policy was being carried out along lines that had for its object the best interests of the residents of the Islands.

Dealing with Socialism, the speaker made it very clear that the only way they could obtain power in this country was by the ballot. They could not by any chance obtain power by any revolutionary methods.

Chairman McTae invited anyone and everyone to speak or to ask questions. As a result everyone had a chance to air his views and the cause of Mr. Pattullo was much benefitted thereby. The more questions and speeches there were, the more clearly it was shown that the interests of the Islands were safe in the hands of a man of integrity and ability like Mr. Pattullo, whom everyone knew, than with a revolutionist, a self-nominated office seeker or the untried and inexperienced young man of the Conservative party.

The general feeling here shows that Mr. Pattullo will receive from this place a large majority.

PILE DRIVING THREE WEEKS

Dredge Moved to This Side Today to Start Work of Over-casting.

The largest pile driver ever used here is now under construction at the waterfront for the work. It is a trip hammer, over-reach driver and is equipped with suitable engines for the work. It will be operated partly from the land. With the starting of the pile driving there will be about 30 or 40 men employed on the work.

The moving of sand from Mc-Nicholl Creek to the dock site is still going on but is yet only about half completed. Good progress is now being made and quite a sand beach is being formed where there was formerly a sheer rock incline into fathoms of water.

One of the dredges was moved to the dock site this morning to start the work of over-casting sand. This over-casting work consists of placing sand to a higher point than is possible in dumping

from the scows. The dredge simply digs it up and drops it higher up.
