Shipyards are to be Working Soon

ALDERMAN ROCHESTER SAYS HE WILL LIKELY BE CANDIDATE FOR MAYORALTY

Wages to be Paid at Shipyard; Work Resumed at Early Date

Peck Remains at Ottawa until Whole Situation is Cleared Up; Tenders being Called for Completion of Ships

Last night telegrams were received from Colonel C. W. Peck in connection with the shipyard that are most reassuring. C. H. Orme president of the Conservative Association, and S. E. Parker, president of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade, received duplicate copies of the same wire which read:

"The cabinet council met regarding the drydock today. Wages will be paid in a few days, certain tenders are being called from private firms as well as the Department itself and work will be resumed at the earliest possible moment.

"Ballantyne has done his utmost to unravel the tangle and facilitate the resumption of work. Will stay here until the whole situation is cleared up."

The telegram was read by Mr. Orme at C. B. Formby's meeting in the Empress Theatre last night and the good news quickly spread all over the city and overshadowed even the election prospects as a topic of conversation.

ST. ANDREW'S ANNUAL BALL

Hall Presented Pretty Scene Last Night—About 300 in Attendance.

St. Andrew's Hall presented indeed a pretty scene last evening for the big annual ball of the St. Andrew's Society. The whole premises were thrown open to the 300 or more guests and the affair was as eminently successful and enjoyable as ever.

The Westholme Theatre Orchestra which provided the music was augmented to a seven piece body and was very lively and full of spirit. Miss Mabel Adams and James N. Kelly provided the extra music.

The decorations of the hall were a feature and it is a long time since St. Andrew's Hall was so profusely set up. At either end of the hall were the Scottish emblems painted on drums which were inset with electric lights, making a pleasing effect through the tasteful coloring. These decorations were the work of J. Brough. The entire room was decorated with the blue and white of the order in streamers of crepe paper set off with profuse evergreen hangings.

Refreshments were served at our sittings at midnight. After this the dance was renewed with vigor. The interspersing of some Scotch dances and quadrilles in the program was pleasing to both participants and spectators.

S. D. Macdonald and W. M. Brown were the masters of ceremony. The dance committee comprised Howard Steen (chairman), George Dalgarno, W. R. Martin, J. Brough and J. Simpson. Mrs. W. Reid and Miss M. Ryan were on the reception committee and W. Reid, W. H. W. Murray and A. Kinghorn attended to the introductions. The Ladies' Auxiliary gave invaluable assistance to the whole affair. Algie Hunter and W. R. Martin were on the door.

WILL BE ONE OF SOLID FOUR

Perry Had Fine Meeting Last Night—Formby Strong at Terrace.

TERRACE, Dec. 1.—The Conservative candidate and his supporters played up strong the overseas service of Capt. Formby at the meeting here Monday night. A good many of the soldiers here seem likely to vote for him. Pattullo should get a majority here with Formby a pretty good second.

PRINCE GEORGE, Dec. 1.—Perry's meeting here last night was enthusiastic and successful. He is sure of a majority. He will be one of the solid four.

FAVOR AUSTRIA.

GENEVA, Dec. 1.—The League of Nations sub-committee unanimously favors the entry of Austria into the League.

Small Morning Vote at Vancouver, but Absentee Poll is Extremely Large

Conservative Lawyer Scrutinized Removed from Booth on Order of Deputy Officer; Liberal Confident, Conservatives Hopeful.

VANCOUVER, December 1.—The morning feature of the election here was the light city vote and a proportionately large absentee vote. At Dominion Hall the loggers and other outsiders crowded the absentee booth to the number of 350. These ballots were deposited before 11 o'clock, leaving 80 men in line awaiting their turn.

E. A. Lucas, barrister, Conservative scrutineer, was this morning removed from Dominion Hall by a constable on the order of a deputy returning officer on the ground that he had no business there. Lucas claimed that the absentee's booth was left absolutely unprotected. The secrecy of the ballot was difficult to maintain at times as there were 29 candidates for the six seats and the ballot form is three and a half feet long and it was occasionally found trailing beneath the short curtain of the booth.

At the Liberal headquarters the people were "extremely confident" The Conservatives were "hopeful." There are in all 158 candidates in 47 constituencies and Liberals are running in each except Cowichan, where a Liberal, Kenneth Duncan, is running as an independent. He is really a supporter of the Government. The lineup includes 32 soldiers, 22 farmers, of whom the Premier is one, and 19 lawyers.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 1.—(Later) After four hours of light polling there was a rush of voters at all the stations toward noon and a heavy vote is now anticipated. This judgment has a vital effect on the fisheries of British Columbia, where the control is in the hands of the Dominion, although that control has been challenged.

Soldiers Are Doing Well On Northern B.C. Lands

Captain F. C. Brown says Could Not Find Dissatisfied Men in Vanderhoof and Fort Fraser Districts when on Visit

VANCOUVER, December 1.—Capt. F. C. Brown, head of the Soldier Settlement Board in B. C., is back from an inspection of the soldier settlements in the north, including Fort Fraser, Telkwa, Smithers, Vanderhoof and Terrace. He says that in Vanderhoof and Fort Fraser he asked to see the dissatisfied settlers, but found all satisfied and making excellent progress, with one or two exceptions.

Around Telkwa and Vanderhoof the soldier settlement men were the most active element in the communities. Despite bad weather payments would be made much better than was expected. The total number of soldiers settled in the districts mentioned is something like two hundred.

Mayor McClymont Quits Mayoralty

Announced His Retirement This Morning; Alderman Rochester will be Candidate, Confirming Rumor to that Effect

After three years as chief magistrate of this city, Mayor Thomas McClymont is to retire at the end of this year and will not be seeking re-election at the municipal election next month. This was the announcement that the mayor made this morning when seen in his office by the Daily News.

The report that has been going on the street for a day or so that Ald. Rochester will be in the field for the chief magistracy was confirmed today when Mr. Rochester was seen.

"Quite a few people have been asking me to enter," said Mr. Rochester, "and it is not beyond the bounds of possibility. I have not, of course, absolutely decided, but unless something happens in the meantime I probably will. I am not seeking the position and I think the man who has been mayor for three years could well carry on.

"My policy has always been honesty and I intend to continue that and I do not care who I hurt following up that policy."

PRIVY COUNCIL ON FISHERIES

Says Federal Government Controls Fishing in Tidal Waters.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—The Privy Council judgment was given today in the case of the Dominion Government versus the Province of Quebec. The case concerns the powers of the province to grant fishing rights in tidal waters and is somewhat involved. Mainly it favors the Federal contention that control of the fisheries in all tidal waters is vested in the Dominion and not in the provinces.

PROSPECT FOR COMPLETE VOTE

More Voted This Morning Than at Temperance Plebiscite—Number of Absentees.

At noon today 433 votes had been polled in the provincial election polling booths on Second Ave. Despite the rather unpleasant state of the weather this exceeds the number of votes cast on the morning of the prohibition plebiscite when 376 had been recorded. Everything points to a larger number of votes being taken today than was taken for that plebiscite when the total was but 1437. Public interest has undoubtedly been stimulated a great deal over the present contest and the fact that one's name is cut off the list if he does not vote today also tends to make the vote a good one.

There were 46 absentee voters who took their affidavits before Returning Officer Mortimer in the course of the morning. These come from most points on the coast including Vancouver, Victoria, Atlin, Comox, Omineca, Fort George, Richmond, Esquimalt and Lillooet.

PONZI GETS FIVE YEARS

Financial Wizard Sentenced Today For Using the Mails to Defraud.

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—Ponzi, the financial wizard, was sentenced today to five years' imprisonment for using the mails to defraud the public.

He is the man who a few months ago caused such a sensation by promising his clients immense rates of interest and in many cases paying them. He operated on a huge scale and people rushed to invest in his fake operations. He was arrested by the authorities when it was found that he was getting away with so much money, even though there seemed to be nothing against him then.

George H. Collins, manager of the Canadian Fish & Gold Storage Co., has returned from attending a directors' meeting at Montreal. He says that investors are everywhere looking towards Prince Rupert. The local plant will be in operation within a year.

INSPECTOR OF MOUNTIES DIES

A. L. Bell, Formerly of the Yukon, Was Prominent Mason.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 1.—Inspector A. L. Bell, officer commanding the mounted police here, is dead. He lived for seventeen years in the Yukon and was latterly quartermaster and paymaster. He was prominent in Masonic circles at Dawson, being the past master of Yukon Lodge No. 45 and past master of Klondyke Chapter No. 151.

The funeral will take place on Thursday and will be with military honors.

The late inspector leaves a wife in ill health residing at present in California. A brother lives here and his parents are at Mountleban, B. C.

Election is Now Almost Over.

If there is any candidate who has not yet voted, there is time to do so up to seven o'clock, when the polls close sharp. The results will be announced in the Empress Theatre, which has been taken for the evening for that purpose.

The results should begin to come in about 7:30, and the first returns from the local count will be thrown on the screen about that time, giving the first indication to the public how things are going locally.

The meetings last night have made the Pattullo supporters more confident than ever that their candidate will win and that by a substantial majority.

Good Humor Has Prevailed Throughout.

A feature of the campaign which has been most pleasing has been the unfeeling good humor which has prevailed throughout, and the lack of bitterness in any of the political attacks which have been made. Political fights are often stern affairs and much heat is sometimes generated without any apparent reason. This time there has been a clean fight and there are none of those bad flavors left, which often follow an election. The brown taste in the mouth is one of the worst features of the morning after a political debauch.

Readers of News Will Welcome Change.

The readers of the Daily News will welcome a change in the subject matter of the paper, following the close of the election. For several weeks election news has of necessity crowded other matters almost into a corner. To such an extent has this been done that there have been some protests from readers.

The Daily News has no apologies to make for giving so much space to the political campaign. The Government of the country is so important that it must of necessity overshadow everything else. Even the telegraphic news has been as political in its tone as local. Newspaper men everywhere recognize the importance of governmental affairs and consequently give much space to them.

Election times are periods for propaganda. The Socialists capitalize this to an even larger extent than others. They do not usually expect to win but they use this opportunity to conduct an educative campaign as to their peculiar tenets.

Drydock Settlement Cause for Congratulation.

The announcement made last night that the drydock and shipyard would be working again soon and that all wages would be paid immediately, was the best news Prince Rupert people have heard for some time. Many had become pessimistic over the outlook, and it must be admitted there was cause for worry. Now the prospect is much brighter for a resumption of work and a general improvement of business in the city.

It is to be hoped that the freight rates will be so adjusted by the Railway Commission at its sitting this month, that the local mills may reopen early in the spring and continue regular shipments and that an assembly wharf for lumber may be built here. The building of the dock and the new government buildings here will provide employment for a good many and the addition to the government dock and other work around the city should help to keep everything moving.

FISH ARRIVALS WERE VERY BIG
 More than Twice as Much Fish This November as Last Year

Halibut returns recorded on the Prince Rupert waterfront for the month of November show a great increase over the same month in 1919. There were 2,270,000 pounds landed during the month as against 1,000,500 pounds in the month last year.

There were many big schooners calling in Prince Rupert harbor during November and finding market conditions much better than usual the most of them discharged their catches, satisfied with the prices offered at the sales in the Fish Exchange. Indeed, the price amounted to a very high figure about the middle of the month, the highest on record, 23c, being then paid.

Towards the end of the month there were a great number of big schooners in and the law of supply and demand made the price drop considerably. The price was very fluctuating, one day the low level of 10.1c and 5c being reached. There were 331,000 pounds which went south.

The prospects for December are quite normal. It is not generally a big month for fish arrivals, but there are a number of the big schooners out now and they should be back in port in a fortnight or three weeks. Many of the big boats will spend Christmas in Prince Rupert, while some will go to Seattle where the fishermen have their homes.

ALASKA MINING INSPECTOR PLEASED WITH THE OUTLOOK

After having mushed something over 500 miles through the interior of Alaska with a pack on his back and travelled by every known conveyance, including steam boats, gas boats, Indian canoes and railroad trains, B. D. Stewart, Territorial Inspector of Mines, is back in his office in this city, says the Juneau Empire.

Mr. Stewart said today that he found the mining districts of the interior rather quiet, but that considerable prospecting was going on and that several districts, including the Tacolna, Kuskokwim and Kantishna looked very promising. He had nothing but praise for the work being done by the Alaska Road Commission in several districts and said it was doing much to open up country heretofore considered inaccessible.

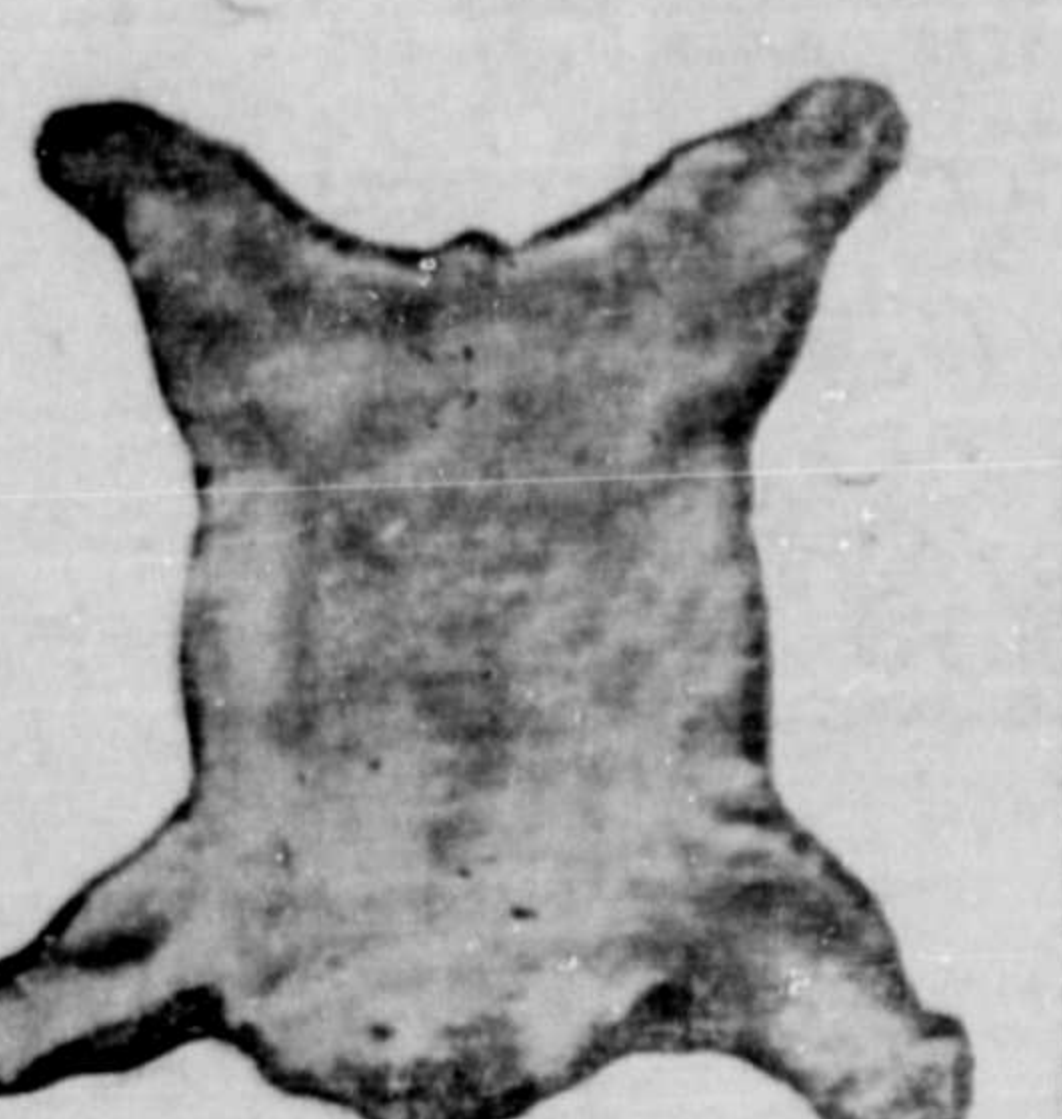

The matching of Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier to battle for the heavyweight championship of the world is now history, but there is one point that has been overlooked by the sporting public. It is the fact that the World's Boxing Trust has been formed and hereafter will have its say in every great fight staged in the world and will dominate the fighting game. It is made up of Tex Rickard, chairman, William A. Brady, John Ringling, representing America, and Charles Cochrane, representing England.

Tex Rickard is the one "Big One" on this trust and it is he who formed it, but Brady, Ringling and Cochrane form a mighty "Big Three." Rickard is a master mind and a promoter of unlimited nerve, Brady is one of the ablest judges of pugilists in America, Ringling, originally a circus man, is out for a square deal, and Cochrane, who got the cinch in an engagement with Carpentier, is as famous a sports promoter in England as Rickard is in America. Cochrane has amassed a fortune out of sport and the theatrical business.

Horse owners are going to have a big winter at the Tia Juana and Havana races this year. Purses totalling \$650,000 have been hung up for the 100 days meet and unrestricted betting will be in vogue. HELIGOLAND RESIDENTS

Appeal Sent to Britain Asking Preservation of Rights from Germany

LONDON, Nov. 29.—An appeal to the British nation has been received, signed by 48 inhabitants of Heligoland, stating that they desire the help of Britain in the preservation of the rights accorded to them under the Anglo-German Agreement of 1890. These rights, they say, have been practically all abolished by the German authorities. It is pointed out in the appeal that the agreement also stipulated for certain rights to be preserved to Great Britain. If the agreement is annulled by the war, as the Germans assert, these rights are annulled also.

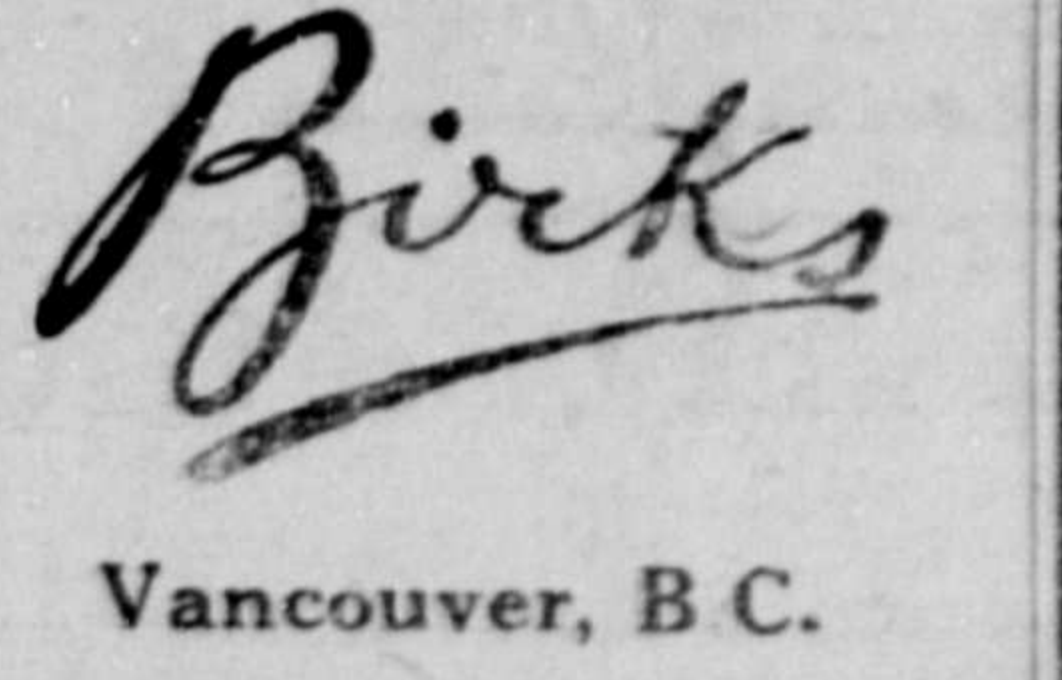

territorial water rights for fishing, foreshore rights and fishing rights and privileges, real and personal property, patents, machinery, warehouses, wharves, fish-traps, canneries and fishing-stations and other buildings and easements in the Province of British Columbia or elsewhere as may be found necessary or desirable for carrying on the business and furthering the objects of the company; (i) To purchase, charter, build or otherwise acquire steam and other ships or vessels for the purpose of the company or for any other purpose; (j) To manufacture ice for the company's use and to buy and sell the same, and carry on a general business as dealers in ice, and to acquire water rights for the same.

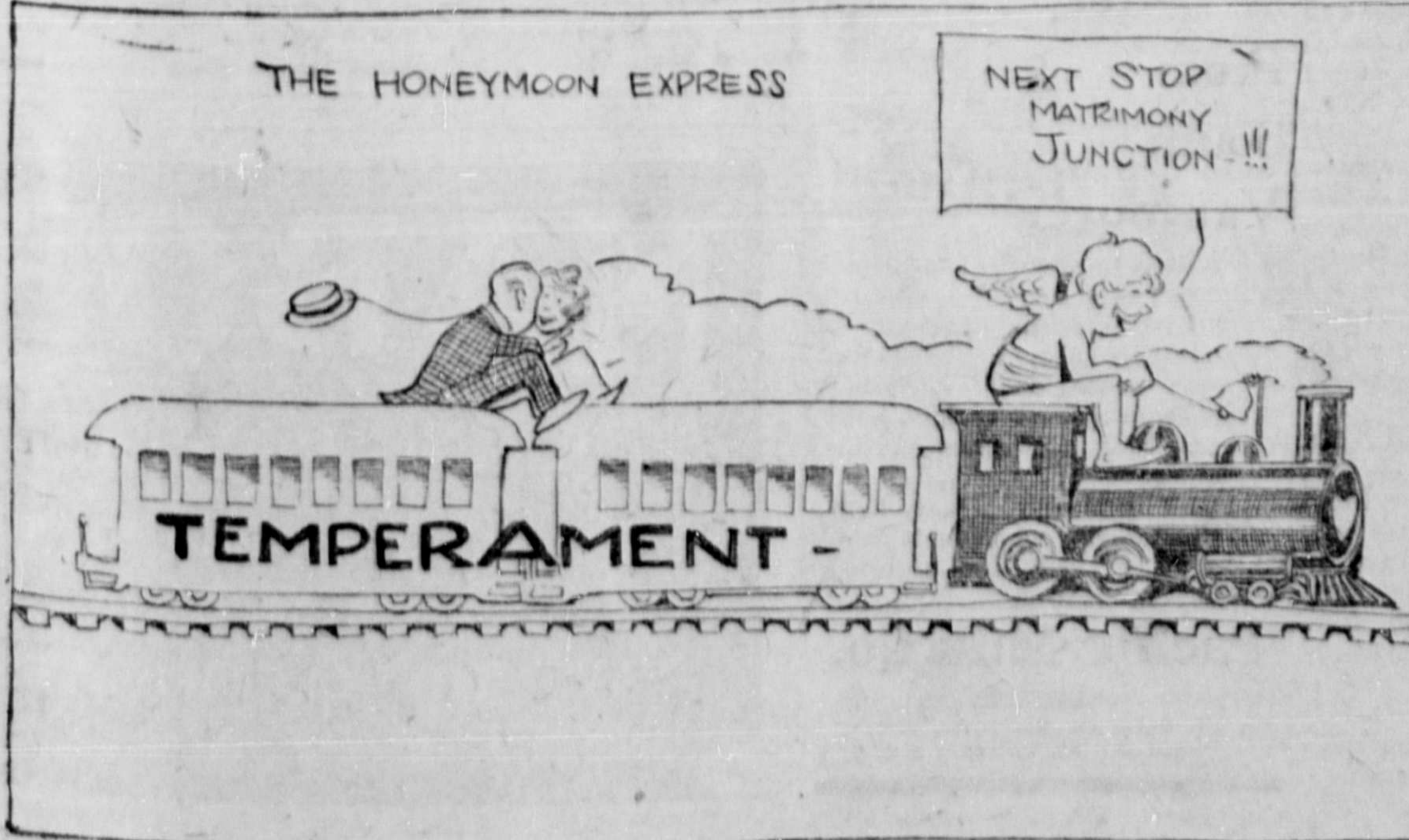

LONDON, Nov. 30.—Arising out of the split in the German Independent Socialist party, at the Halle Congress, when it was decided by 237 votes to 156 to support the Moscow International, steps have been taken to unite sections of the Left wing in a united Communist party. The "Rote Fahne" has addressed a manifesto to "Comrades of the Independent Socialist party" and "Comrades of the Communist Labor party" asking them all to unite in one Communist party and proclaiming that "the dictatorship of the bourgeoisie can only be overthrown by the iron fist of the proletariat and by the dictatorship of the proletariat." The manifesto is signed not only by the German Communist leaders, but also by the Bolshevik representative Sinovieff and by the leaders of the severed left wing of the Independent Socialists. A provisional joint executive is to be set up under a representative from the executive of the Moscow International.
