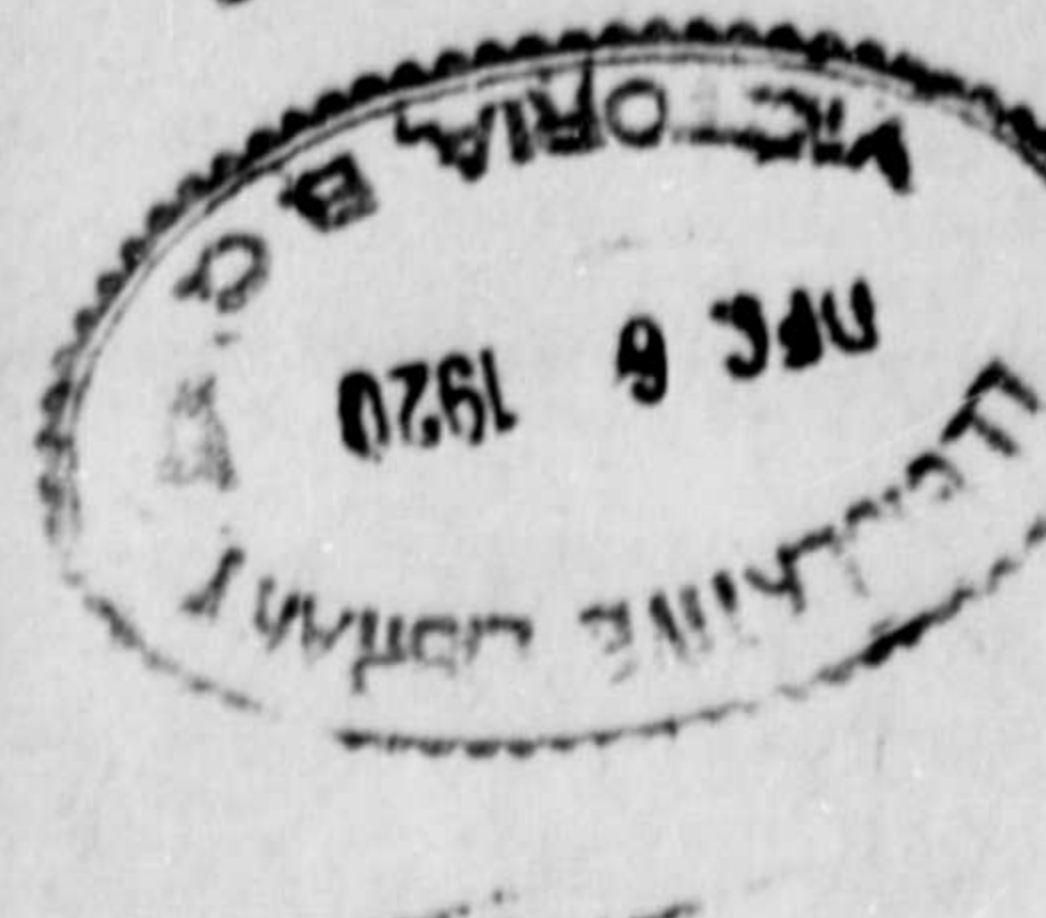



Liberals will have a Good Majority in the Legislature

Vancouver gives five and Victoria three; Premier is elected in two places; Independents near vanishing point

VANCOUVER, December 2.—It is now conceded that the Liberals have been returned to power throughout the province although probably by a smaller majority than last term. Vancouver city gave five Liberals out of six and Victoria three out of four. All the ministers are returned although Dr. King had a close contest in Cranbrook.

Premier Oliver won both in Victoria and his home constituency, Delta. It is expected that he will retain his seat in the capital and that Rev. Alex. Paterson of Delta will be the choice of the Liberals in the by-election.

In Vancouver five Liberals, M. A. Macdonald, Mrs. Ralph Smith, Ian McKenzie, Hon. J. W. deB. Farris and Alderman Ramsay were elected. W. J. Bowser is leading for sixth place and it is suggested he may yet be defeated by the absentee vote, but that is hardly likely. The Vancouver vote is as follows:

In Victoria the three winning Liberals are Hon. John Oliver, Hon. John Hart and Lieut. Jos. Clapham, and the Conservative, Hon. Canon Hincheliffe, formerly editor of the B. C. Bantams. Pte. Frank Gielma was defeated. Dr. Ernest Hall and George Bell, independent Liberals, were also defeated. Adjoining Victoria, F. A. Pauline won in Saanich and M. P. Jackson in the Islands, while R. H. Pooley retains Esquimalt as a Conservative.

Yale Defeat.
 The Yale defeat is blamed on the action of Joseph Walters who was the sitting member but whose name was omitted from the Liberal ticket. He ran and was defeated.

Of the former soldier party only Kenneth Duncan of Cowichan and Geo. Hanes of North Vancouver remain. There are, however, many soldiers in the party ranks. Major Dick Burde of Alberni, the editor of the Alberni News, who was defeated by Brig. Gen. Money was a picturesque character.

Pattullo Retains People's Confidence

Re-elected for Prince Rupert by large majority, but just how large is not yet known

While the local returns are not complete and cannot be made up until the absentee vote has been counted, there is no doubt whatever but that Hon. T. D. Pattullo will be re-elected to represent this constituency for the next five years. As the whole province seems to have gone Liberal again, it is practically certain that he will retain his position in the Government as minister of lands.

The campaign was short but brilliant. The four candidates all worked hard and received good support from their own particular followers and the only feeling of bitterness apparent is that of the old line Conservatives over an attempt to stampede the Conservatives to vote for S. M. Newton. This attempt seems to have failed but it left a trace of bitterness. It was generally thought that the move was authorized from the Conservative headquarters at Vancouver.

Polling started slowly in the morning but as the day advanced it speeded up and every facility was given every voter to express himself. The election arrangements were in the hands of E. H. (Continued on Page Five.)

Kergin Makes Strong Run and Wins Easily in Atlin

Returns from Atlin Electoral District are fairly complete and show Kergin well in the lead, so well that it seems impossible for the absentee vote to make any material change in the situation. Anox, Alice Arm, Atlin and Telegraph Creek went strong for the Liberal. Ross, the Conservative, polled a heavy vote in Stewart, while George Casey, the Socialist labor man of this city, made a consistent run, winning only at Anox mine. Following is the detail:

Local Company May Complete Two Ships

New Concern is headed by S. S. Magoffin and is Ready to Pay Wages and Carry on if Given Contract

With the object of completing the two steel ships now lying unfinished in the drydock at Hays Creek, a local company headed by S. S. Magoffin, railroad contractor of this city, and D. R. Finkelstein, a financial broker of Winnipeg, is being organized. Mr. Magoffin and Mr. Finkelstein have been negotiating over the wire for some days and tonight Mr. Finkelstein will arrive here. The idea of this company was taken up by Mr. Magoffin on the suggestion being made to him that the government would probably accept a definite proposition for the completion of the ships. It is proposed by the company to pay off wage claims and other indebtedness immediately and commence work at once. Mr. Magoffin and Mr. Finkelstein have ample funds at their disposal to start operations under these terms. Their proposition is endorsed by prominent business men of the city and some of these are to be offered membership in the company.

Public Spirited
 The completion of the ships will be carried out on a cost plus basis under the supervision of a government representative. In talking of the proposition to the News this morning Mr. Magoffin stated that it was not with a view to making profit directly out of the work that the company was being formed, but if expenses were only covered the indirect profitable result to the city and business people generally would be sufficient incentive for the company to get operations started again and the ships completed this winter. It is not desirable that this work should get into the hands of a southern shipbuilding firm, for it is likely that they would merely finish the hulls and then haul them south for completion.

The following is the proposition that has been put up to Hon. C. C. Bellantyne, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, in a telegram sent to him by Mr. Magoffin:

Formal Tender
 "A local company has been formed with efficient organization and ample capital to finance the completion of the ships here at once. I have wired Colonel Peck the details. The form of tender would be on the cost plus percentage basis, as this would be the only method under the circumstances for the immediate resumption of shipbuilding. The work would be done under the supervision of your representative, all expenditures being approved by him. The company is in a position to pay all wage claims and such other creditors as you authorize. A lump sum bid by any reputable firm is out of the question under the present conditions.

"This company is organized primarily for the purpose of relieving the present intolerable and very serious local situation by offering the government an opportunity to resume shipbuilding activities here with competent management and sufficient capital. The company is composed mainly of public spirited local men. Personally I am satisfied that the cost plus tender would be the most satisfactory for all concerned and the cheapest for the government. Please consider this telegram as a formal tender and advise."

PATTULLO IS APPRECIATIVE OF THE TRUST
 Urges Election of Strong Mayor and Council for Coming Term.
 Hon. T. D. Pattullo, who is leaving for the south tonight to take up his departmental work at Victoria, said this morning he wished to express through the Daily News his appreciation of the confidence the electors had placed in him. He would go back to his work with renewed enthusiasm, knowing well that he had the people with him in his endeavors. He was particularly gratified at the election of the big Liberal four in the north.

Speaking of civic affairs, he urged that Prince Rupert choose now a strong mayor and council for the coming term as it meant so much to the city to be well governed. As a resident of the city and one whose interests lie here, he was particularly interested in the power question. He hoped that within the next year there would be an opportunity for the people to take a decisive step toward securing a proper supply.

Glorious Victory Seems Complete.

It was a glorious victory. So far as can be seen Liberalism has triumphed. The north went solid for the big Liberal four and as a result the influence of the north will be great in the Government for the next few years.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo and Alex. M. Manson have both justified themselves in the eyes of the electors and will have an opportunity to carry on. Perry wrested Prince George from the Conservatives and Kerwin retained Atlin for the Liberals.

The minister of lands by his fearless attitude and frank stand on public questions made a great impression throughout the north and his influence was powerful in winning the seats.

It must not be forgotten either that John Oliver was the magnet that attracted many. The people in most cases were inspired by the valiant fight he has put up for good government in this province and were determined to stand by him.

While local prejudices influenced the vote in some of the smaller constituencies, it is evident that wherever there was a chance to realize the issues and to get away from petty politics, the Liberals were given heavy support.

The Thing to Do Is Work Together.

The thing to do now is get busy. We have had our fight, and we are not gloating over much. The people won, not the Liberals. The victory is for democracy and good government as opposed to reaction on one side or Bolshevism on the other.

In the north great things should happen within five years. The future is ours. We have made a good beginning. The people are looking to the fertile valleys along the G. T. P. to make homes and soon they will be looking even farther north to the valleys of the Naas and the Peace.

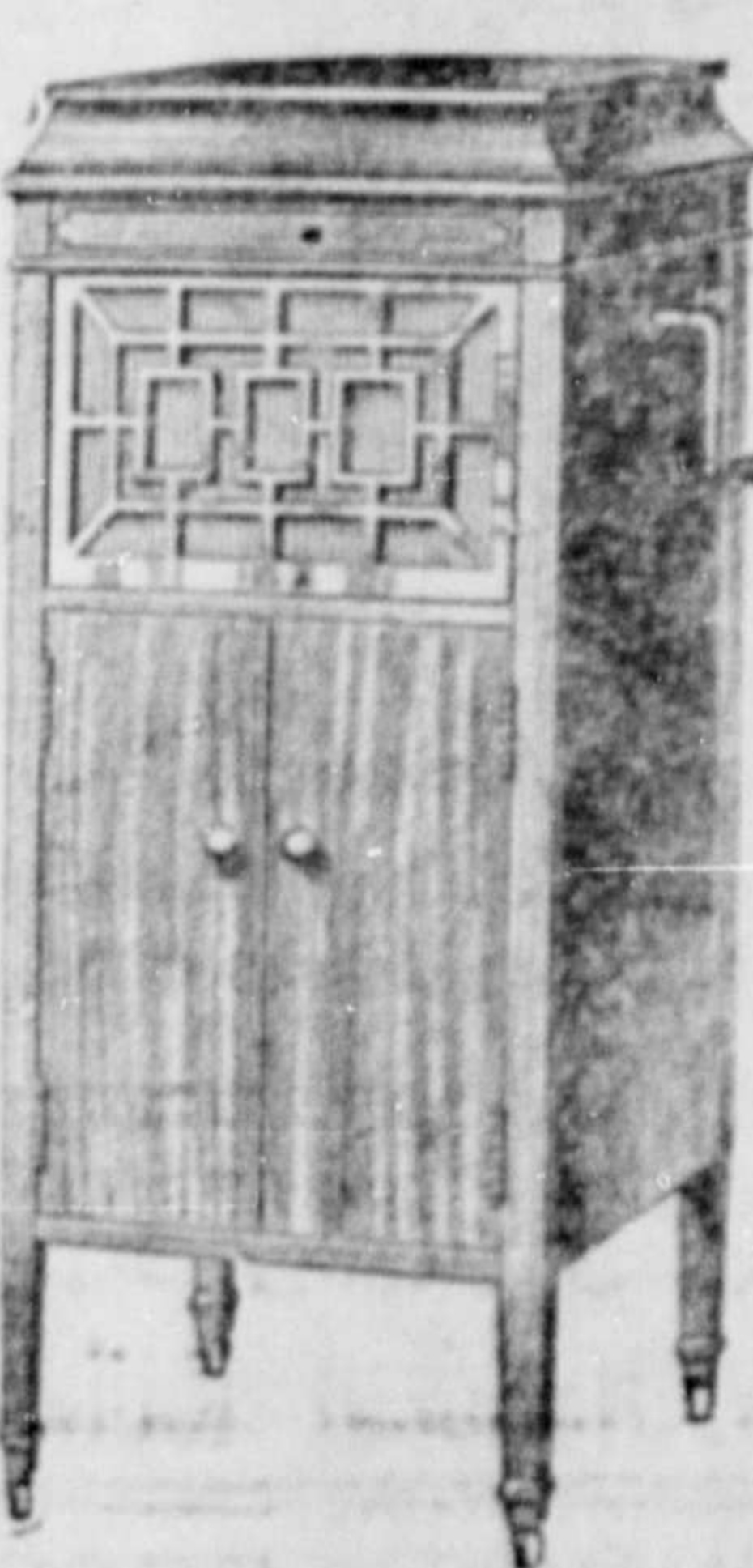

NOME PAPER TELLS WHAT BLONDE KIND ESKIMO LOOKS LIKE

Captain Joe Bernard, whose exploits in the Far North have won him considerable fame, arrived recently in Nome on his schooner Teddy Bear. Bernard was accompanied by A. Anderson, another explorer, and Apuktwana, the first "blonde Eskimo" to reach the outside. The party has been exploring in the Arctic seas for four years.

Describing the "blonde Eskimo," the Nome Nugget says:

"In appearance he is little different from the Eskimo of this section. His home is in the bleak region along the Southern shores of Coronation Gulf. He is stout built, with a light copper colored skin, straight black hair and possesses sparkling dark brown eyes. The cut of his clothes is about the only thing by which he may be distinguished from the local Eskimo. Bernard says he is an average example of the males of the "blonde" tribe. Bernard, like other recent visitors to Coronation Gulf region, is in no degree inclined to endorse Stefansson's description of the alleged blondes and says while there are some of them who have reddish brown hair and light eyes, they are scarcely light enough to be considered blondes even by an extraordinary stretch of the imagination. Captain Bernard is figuring on taking the quaint savage to the outside world.

TIED HANDKERCHIEF TO WEATHERCOCK

A pupil at a "school" for steeplejacks at Godalming, England, climbed the leaden spire of the parish church at midnight and tied a khaki handkerchief to the weathercock, 170 ft. above the ground. He made the climb without apparatus and while wearing a trench coat. When he descended he was met at the foot of the tower by a policeman, who took him into custody, but the incident ended with an apology to the vicar and a promise by the master steeplejack to remove the handkerchief.

SENSATIONAL MURDER CASE STIRS ENGLAND

Trial of South Wales Lawyer is Followed by Whole Country with Interest

SUSPICIONS ARE QUITE GROUNDESS
Man Married Again Within Three Months of Wife's Death and Arsenic is Found

A poison trial of extraordinary interest came to an end at Carmarthen when Harold Greenwood, a South Wales solicitor was acquitted on a charge of murdering his first wife. For over a week the progress of the case was watched by the country with the closest attention and every daily newspaper devoted columns of space to the presentation of the evidence and to descriptions of the exciting scenes both inside and outside the court.

The trial merely served to deepen the mystery of Mrs. Greenwood's death. No one was able to show how arsenic found its way into her body, and there was even room for doubt that the poison was the ultimate cause of death. The defence propounded a multitude of theories to account for the presence of a substantial amount of arsenic, and the Crown made a remarkable attempt to advance a fresh hypothesis at the last moment when they discovered that the main prop of their case had broken down.

Local Gossip
To understand the position as it was submitted to the judgment of a jury, it will be necessary to trace events leading up to the trial in their natural order.

The Greenwoods—husband, wife and four children—lived in an imposing house in Kidwell, on the Bristol Channel, too small to be called a town, but big enough to resent the name of a village. It was self-contained enough, however, to enjoy a good gossip and to interest itself actively in the affairs of its social hierarchy the Greenwoods, the vicar and the doctor.

Everyone agreed that during the twenty-three years of their married life the Greenwoods were on affectionate terms, and that though Mrs. Greenwood was a trifle jealous of her husband's friendship with Miss Griffith, the doctor's sister over the way, that jealousy did not disturb the harmony of the household. Mrs. Greenwood was a gentlewoman, given to charity and good works, and with her private income of £900 a year she assisted in the maintenance of the home. She was in delicate health, had a weak heart which rendered her liable to fainting turns and had a fibrous tumor which occasionally set up hemorrhage.

On Sunday, June 15, 1919, the family sat down to a lunch of roast lamb, gooseberry pie and custard. Wine was placed upon the table and, as was her habit, Mrs. Greenwood partook of it. Later in the day she became ill and complained that the goose-

berry pie, which sometimes disagreed with her, had upset her again. There was vomiting and diarrhoea, and at three o'clock the following morning she died, with her husband (who was weeping), her elder daughter, Irene, the doctor and the district nurse by her bedside. The doctor gave a certificate that death was due to valvular disease of the heart.

The Weed-Killer Story

On September 24, 1919, Mr. Greenwood obtained a marriage licence and a week later he was married to a Miss Glwys Jones. That was the signal for the storm clouds of suspicion to gather round Rumsey House. The custom requiring a man to pay homage to his wife's memory by remaining a widower for at least six months had been broken and this tit-bit of gossip was turned over and over on the tongues of the villagers until it grew into something sinister.

A whisper went round that Mr. Greenwood—he was plain "Greenwood" now—had at one time or another had in his possession great quantities of weed-killer, a deadly poison, one pinch of which on a threepenny-bit would hold enough arsenic to kill a full-grown man. Then it was recalled that the symptoms of Mrs. Greenwood's illness were consistent, not only with acute indigestion, but with arsenical poisoning. It was but a step from that to concluding that murder had been committed and the motive was there ready-made. Even before his second marriage Mr. Greenwood had been dressed up by the village gossip as an elderly flirt and his name had been coupled with the names of the doctor's sister, the district nurse, an intimate friend of his late wife and two women whom he had never before heard of.

The police began to sift the rumors and very soon it was evident that they suspected the husband.

Mr. Greenwood's answer to the charge made against him was in one sentence: "I did not do this thing." That was his attitude from beginning to end.

The Inquest

In April of the following year Mrs. Greenwood's body was examined and a quarter of a grain of arsenic was found in her viscera. From this the Crown experts inferred that there must have been at least two grains in the body before death. An inquest was held in the village hall opposite Mrs. Greenwood's opened grave, only two hundred yards away from Rumsey House. On the second day of the inquest, June 16, 1920 (the first anniversary of Mrs. Greenwood's death) the coroner's jury returned a verdict of murder against Harold Greenwood, who was at once arrested. The jury, acting mainly upon the evidence of the parlor-maid, were of the opinion that the wine taken at luncheon had been used as a medium for administering the weedkiller. At the magisterial hearing which followed, the family doctor said he had given his patient two morphia pills on the night of her illness. That statement was carefully noted by the defence.

The accused man lay in Carmarthen gaol for four months awaiting his trial at the Winter Assizes before Mr. Justice Rhearnman and a jury. His second wife stayed on at Rumsey House with her stepchildren and paid almost daily visits to her husband.

Murray's majority in Telkwa is simply a compliment to his personal popularity.

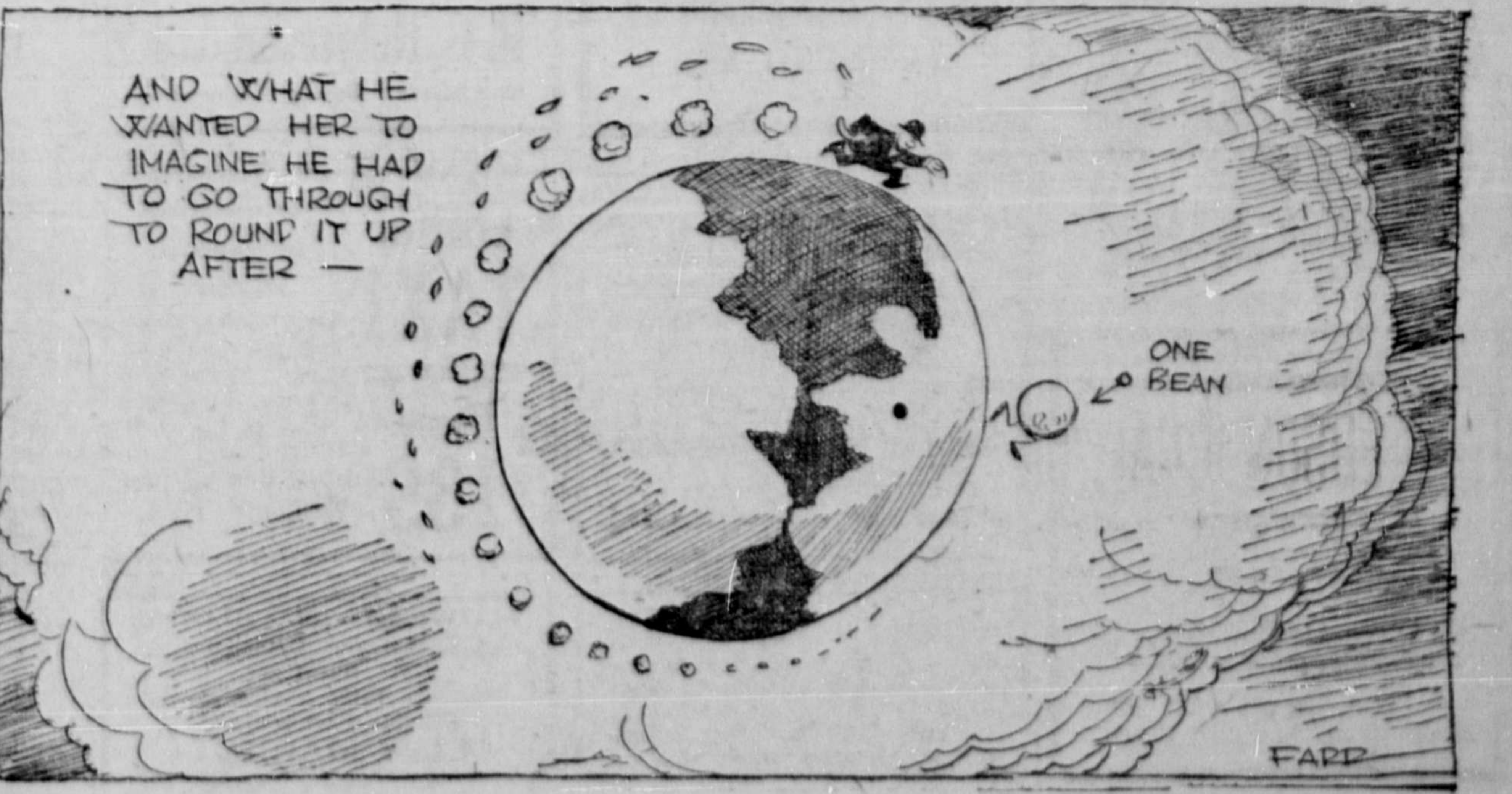

THROWS BLAME ON THE ROYAL

Captain of Marmion Gives Evidence in Collision Case at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 2.—Wreck Commissioner MacPherson yesterday opened an inquiry into the collision between the steamers Princess Royal and Marmion, the latter having with her the barge Louisiana in Grenville Channel. Captains Williams and Evans were assessors.

The Royal came on and in an endeavor to avoid a collision put the helm to starboard trying to bring the Marmion parallel with the oncoming ship. The result was a glancing blow.

Capt. Jorgensen of the Louisiana substantiated the evidence.
