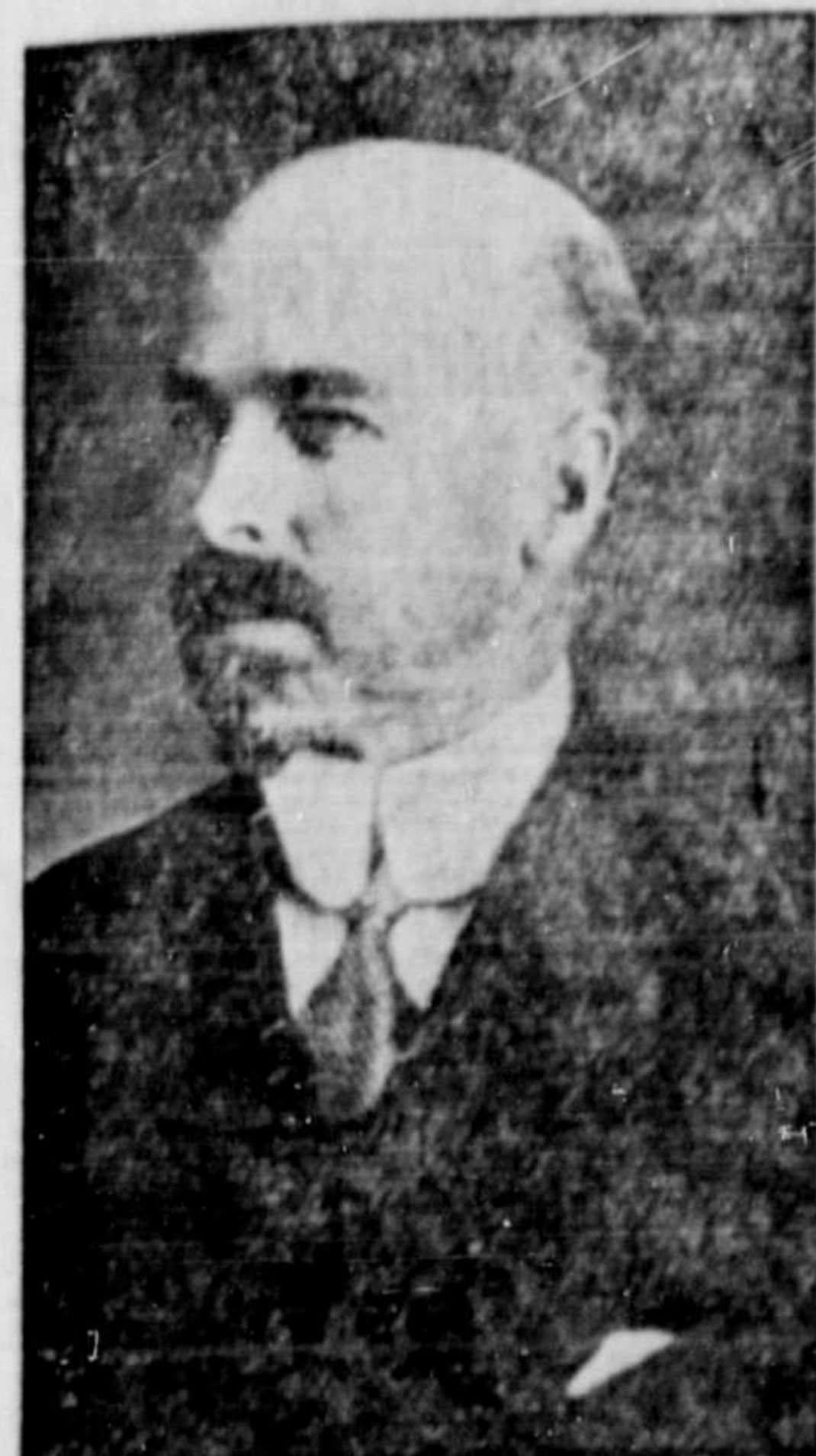

Political Leaders on Election Result

Premier says Victoria and Delta rebuke to those who assailed his personal honor; Bowser could have won if

VICTORIA, December 3.—Premier Oliver when seen yesterday after the results were known said: "The result shows the electors' approval of the Government's administrative achievements. The Delta and Victoria victories are a rebuke to the assailants of the premier's personal honor. The election was the cleanest ever held, thanks to the new Election Act." The premier emphasized that all not voting on Wednesday would have their names dropped from the list and would have to re-register.

W. J. Bowser commenting on the result as follows: "If it had been a straight fight without independents in the field, the Conservatives would have won with a substantial working majority. There was a heavy independent vote against the Government. They will have a bare working majority. The lavish Liberal expenditure on advertising was a big factor in Oliver's success."

COMPLETION IN PRINCE RUPERT

Word From Ottawa Still Reassuring—Mr. Magoffin Is Asked for Tender at Once.

In reply to the telegram sent by K. S. Magoffin to Hon. C. G. Balfour offering to complete the ship at the dry dock, a telegram was last night received by Mr. Magoffin from the minister requesting him to send in his bid at once. It was explained that other public tenders were being called for and that the most favorable tender would be accepted for the completion of the ship in Prince Rupert. D. R. Finkelstein, Mr. Magoffin's associate in his proposition, arrived last night from Winnipeg and today the tender is being prepared.

Col. Peck has also sent a reply to a Board of Trade telegram in which he states that there was no doubt in his mind that the ships would be completed in Prince Rupert.

In the meantime the sheriff's proceedings at the dock have been further stayed until the first of the week.

TEMPERANCE OFFICER IS NOW OUT ON BAIL

MORE RESULTS IN THE NORTH

Seems Alex. Manson Has Biggest Percentage Majority in Province—Fort George Close.

Related election reports from various outside places in the north further assure the election of the "solid four" for Atlin, Omineca, Fort George and Prince Rupert. There have been gains for Forinby in Prince Rupert but not sufficient to change the standing although he is now giving J. H. Burroughs a hard run for third place and is close behind.

In Omineca late reports further increase Alex. Manson's majority and it is apparent that he has swept his constituency with a greater percentage of majority than any other candidate in the province. He has nearly twice as many votes as all his three opponents have together. Neither Prudhomme nor Kelly proved contenders and the only opposition was from Captain Murray, the Conservative runner up.

Mayor Perry, of Prince George, seems to have had the closest fight in the north although he now has a very fair margin over Sam Cocker, Conservative, and there are only a few smaller polls to be heard from. The Atlin situation is the same as yesterday, no new returns having yet been received.

PREMIER THANKS NORTHERN PEOPLE FOR THEIR SUPPORT

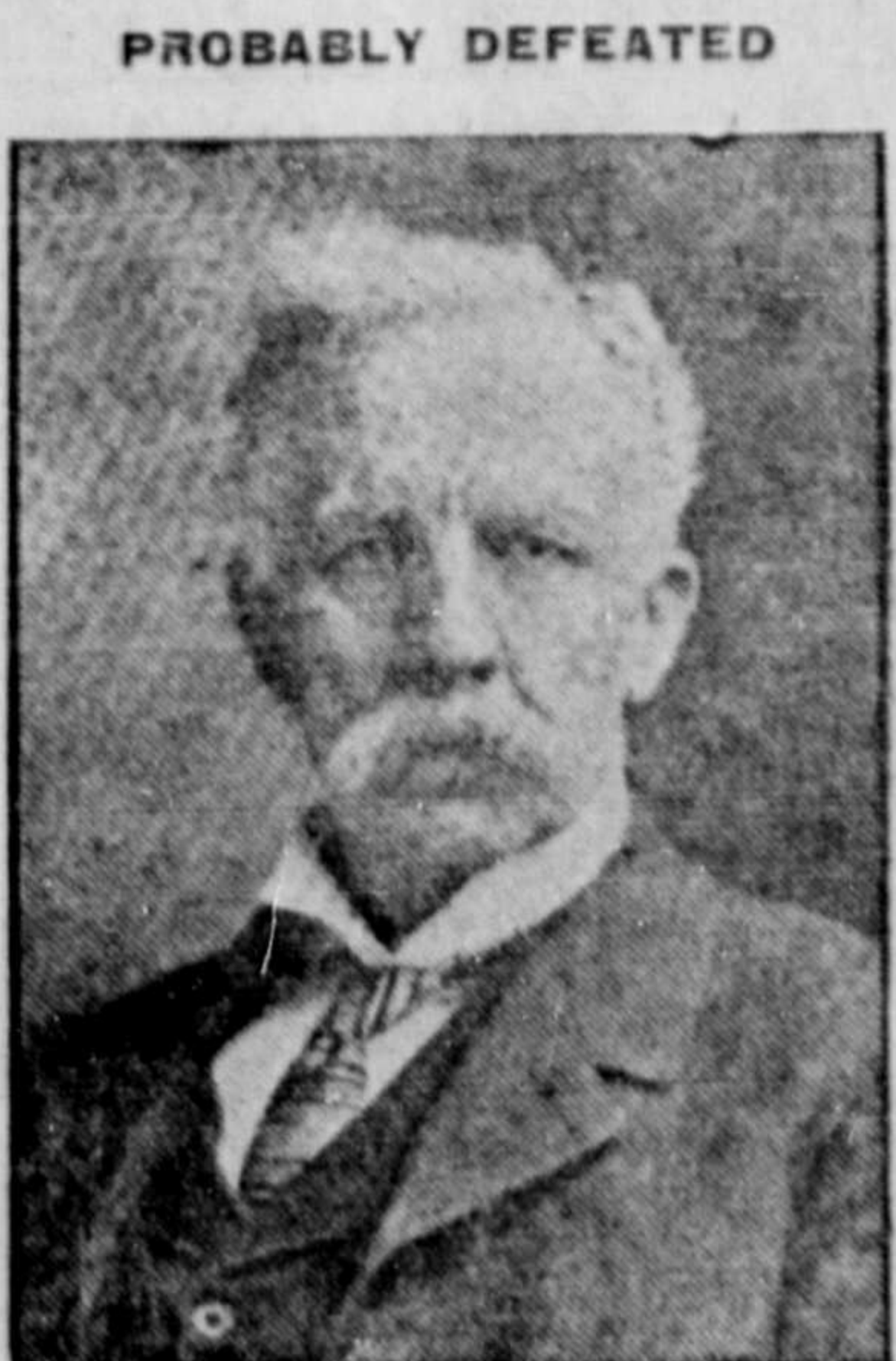

A Prince Rupert billiard tournament was organized last evening at a meeting held in the Wanderers Club. A handsome cup has been presented by the Trail Club for the series and there are to be five teams in the competition consisting of six players each. These teams are the Wanderers, St. Andrew's, Trail, Elks, and G. W. V. A., who are represented on the committee by R. H. Shockey, J. A. Allen, M. J. Condon, B. F. Self and H. M. Jepson respectively. W. F. Roberge was chosen secretary of the tournament. The first game will be played on December 6 and the schedule will be announced later.

Tried to Commit Suicide in City Jail and is in Serious Condition.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 3.—Saylor Malone, the man who was committed for trial here on a charge of holding up the cashier of the Imperial Oil Co. last night, attempted to commit suicide by severing an artery in his wrist while in the jail. He is in a serious condition.

Celebrate Tonight Liberal Victory

Little change in situation except that John Keen probably defeated; Manson may be Speaker and Kergin Whip

VANCOUVER, December 3.—While there are still several seats in doubt, it is practically certain that the Government will have a working majority in the next legislature. Premier Oliver is delighted with his success and that his ministers have all, apparently, been returned. The absentee vote may possibly affect the standing of Hon. Dr. King, minister of public works, whose lead at Granbrook is a small one. Hanes of North Vancouver, and Duncan, the independent Liberal of Cowichan, it is certain will vote generally with the Government and Rev. Thomas Menzies of Comox, the farmer-soldier, was formerly a Liberal.

Unless, as is unlikely, the final count upsets the present result, John Keen is defeated in Kaslo. He will probably be succeeded as speaker by the elevation of A. M. Manson of Omineca to the position. He is at present deputy speaker. If Bert Kergin's election is confirmed, as is expected, he may succeed Charles Nelson as government whip, a position held by the late Frank Mobley. Nelson is defeated in Slokan.

All the ministers at the capital are coming here tonight for the monster Liberal celebration of victory. A band will meet the boat and will head a parade to the Hotel Vancouver.

INQUIRY INTO COLLISION

Capt. Rippon of Royal Suggested may have been Confict of Orders

VANCOUVER, Dec. 3.—At the marine inquiry yesterday before Commissioner Macpherson and two assessors regarding the collision between the Princess Royal and the Marmion with a barge in tow, Capt. Rippon was the first to take the stand. He said that the Marmion struck his ship in Grenville Channel on November 6 while he was on his proper course going slowly. He suggested that the Marmion was steering one way and the tow the other.

Witnesses agreed that the fog was the chief factor in the collision. During the afternoon Chief Engineer Findlay and Quartermaster Roberts of the Marmion testified as to the orders received prior to the collision, while Second Mate Anderson corroborated Capt. Rippon's evidence.

DOCTOR UNDER MURDER CHARGE

Dr. Blumberger of Vancouver is Arrested and Coroner's Jury Finds Against Him.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 3.—That Dr. Blumberger performed an illegal operation on Mrs. Joseph Mitchell in connection with whose death he is held on a charge of murder, is the finding of the coroner's jury here.

Mrs. Mitchell was a teamster's wife who died at the General Hospital from blood poisoning, and Dr. Blumberger was afterwards arrested.

Christmas is Almost Here.

Christmas is almost here and the people are looking for Christmas presents for their friends and they want to know where to go for them. There is scarcely a person in the city who is not puzzled to know what to give a brother or sister or somebody else's brother or sister. Father or mother require different kinds of presents. While a box of cigars or a pipe is the right thing for one person, a silk handkerchief or a box of ties is more suitable for another.

We are all helpless as we approach the festive season and toward the end we become frantic and rush to a store and buy the most unsuitable things. The store-keeper who is able to help patrons out of this difficulty is doing them a great service and at the same time likely to bring business to his store.

Toys for children are a special line and not so difficult to choose as are presents for grownups. In every case, however, the Christmas present is something that almost everyone wants to buy and which almost every merchant has to sell, the difficulty is to connect the merchant with the buyer and let the latter know exactly what there is to offer.

Useful Things Most Acceptable.

Useful articles are the most acceptable to the average person. The average man or woman wants something that is of real value, not necessarily expensive, but that can be used in some way. It may be a picture, but if so it should be one that would fit in with the other pictures in the recipient's home. To give a hat to a man who would not wear one or a hat, is foolish. The present should suit the person getting it or it will not be welcome.

Home Made Articles Always Acceptable.

Home made things are nearly always acceptable. There are, however, exceptions to this rule. Even home made things should be suited to the requirements of the person to whom they are given. The writer remembers many home made articles which are still stored carefully away as remembrances of the sender, but absolutely useless for any other purpose.

The difficulty with many people is that they do not try to put themselves in the place of the receiver. If they like red neckties they think everyone else should do so and accordingly inflict their friends with them. If they think cambric handkerchiefs are the proper thing they never stop to consider that their friend never uses anything but silk. The acceptable present is one that fills a need. It is really better to send nothing than to give what does not carry with it a real welcome.

Shop Early and Avoid the Rush.

It is very commonplace to say "shop early," yet it is necessary to remind people every year that the time to buy is days or even weeks before Christmas. During the last few days there is usually a rush on the stores and it is most disappointing to find that none of the things you had planned to buy are to be found. As the season advances many of the things have been handled a good deal and are not bright and fresh as a present should be.

The store keepers and clerks should be considered in this matter but they are not. What appeals to the average man or woman is personal convenience, and the buying early is more convenient in that better service is secured, a better selection of goods and less likelihood of failing to please the person who is to be the recipient.

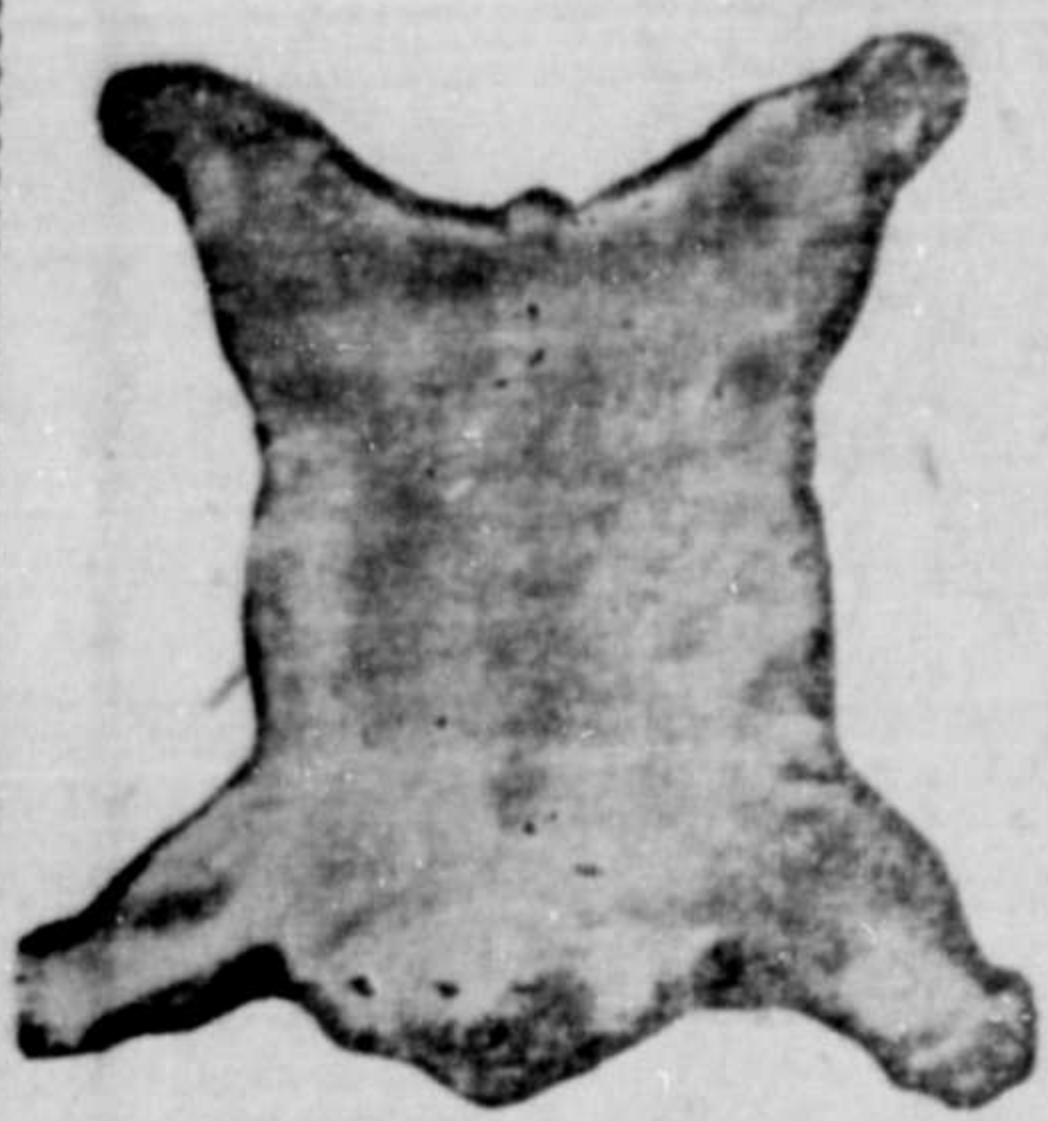

BRINGING UP FATHER



Liberal Members Elect to Legislature of B.C.

Men of various occupations among those probably returned Wednesday; Only one actually elected

While there are as yet no members of the legislature elected except Dr. Sutherland, who was returned by acclamation, it is not expected that there will be many changes in the lineup of those who are now in the lead.

And there are many who would like to know something about the members elect, a few words about each of the Government supporters is given and this will be followed by a similar mention of the opposition men. There are a good many lawyers again elected and the medical profession is well represented. There are also farmers, merchants, civil engineers, and brokers. In the cabinet the only lawyer is Hon. J. W. deB. Farris, the attorney-general. The list follows.

LIBERALS

Atlin

Herbert F. Kergin, a pioneer of the North, came from St. Catharines, Ont., and first worked at the Georgetown Mill, later living at Port Simpson, Port Essington, Stewart and Alice Arm. He is a brother of L. W. and W. T. Kergin of this city and is a master mariner running the boat "Wake" between Anyox and Alice Arm.

Cariboo

John M. Yonston, a farmer of Alexandria. This is his second term as representative from this district.

Chilliwack

Hon. Edward D. Barrow, Minister of Agriculture, was member last session. He is a practical farmer from Chilliwack and a splendid organizer.

Columbia

John A. Buckham, the Golden druggist, carries on his business in that town. This is his second term.

Cranbrook

Hon. Dr. James H. King, Minister of Public Works, before being called to the cabinet practised medicine in Cranbrook. This is his second term.

Delta

Hon. John Oliver, Premier, farmer for many years in Delta constituency.

Fort George

Harry G. Perry, the new member for this district, is at present the mayor of the city of Prince George. He conducts a men's furnishings store, is a Justice of the Peace and President of the Board of Trade.

Grand Forks

Ezra C. Henniger conducts a feed store in Grand Forks. This is his first term.

Greenwood

Hon. Dr. John McLean, the Minister of Education and Provincial Secretary, was formerly a practising physician in Greenwood.

The Islands

Malcolm B. Jackson, K.C., is the senior member of the Victoria law firm, Jackson and Baker.

Kamloops

Frederick W. Anderson is a Kamloops civil engineer. He was a member for the constituency last session.

Nanaimo

Hon. William Sloan, Minister of Mines, who is re-elected, is a resident of Nanaimo. He made a cleanup in the Yukon in the days of the rush.

New Westminster

David Whiteside, re-elected member, is a member of the New Westminster law firm, Whiteside, Edmonds and Whiteside.

North Okanagan

Dr. K. C. Macdonald is a Vernon dentist. This is his second term in the legislature.

Omineca

Alex. M. Manson, the re-elected member, is a member of the law firm, Williams and Manson, of Prince Rupert. He was deputy speaker of the house last session and introduced a great deal of new legislation.

Prince Rupert

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, is a pioneer of the North. He was engaged in clerical work in the Yukon gold rush days and came to Prince Rupert twelve years ago, establishing a general brokerage business. His cabinet duties keep him in Victoria most of the time.

Revelstoke

Dr. William H. Sutherland is a member of the firm of Sutherland and Hamilton, physicians and surgeons. He was elected for a second term by acclamation.

Saanich

Frederick A. Pauline is a retired wholesale merchant residing at Oak Bay. J. Piercy, who was in the wholesale business in Prince Rupert in the early days, was his partner some years ago.

Vancouver

Mrs. Ralph Smith, who was elected for a second term by a majority of some 5,000 over the next candidate, is the widow of Ralph Smith, whose seat in the legislature she took at his death. Mrs. Smith has a son at Prince George and another son was also at Alice Arm a year ago as secretary to Major Angus Davis, then manager of the Dolly Varden mine.

Captain Ian M. McKenzie, a member of the Vancouver law firm of Mackenzie & Boyd, and president of the Vancouver Great War Veterans' Association.

Hon. J. W. deB. Farris, who is re-elected, is a member of the law firm, Farris & Emerson, and was attorney-general in the last house.

M. A. Macdonald, a Vancouver lawyer, was attorney-general with the original Brewster administration four years ago.

James Ramsay is a candy and biscuit manufacturer. He has been alderman of Vancouver for some years and this is his first appearance in the legislature. He is the head of the firm of Ramsay Bros.

Victoria

Hon. John Oliver, premier, although given a hard run at Delta, had no difficulty in securing a substantial majority over all others in Victoria.

Hon. John Hart, minister of finance, is a member of the financial firm, Gillespie, Hart & Todd.

Lieut. Joseph B. Clearbue is a Victoria barrister residing in Oak Bay. This will be his first term. He was a Rhodes Scholar and on the completion of his course at Oxford studied law at Victoria until the outbreak of war.

SOUTH AFRICAN PARTY CONGRESS

General Smuts Successful in Unit- ing Group of Moderates in That Country.

The South African Party Congress was held at Bloemfontein last week and at the close of a remarkable speech by General Smuts, the Prime Minister, a resolution embodying the principles of his speech was moved by General Smuts and unanimously adopted, amid scenes of great enthusiasm, says the Manchester Guardian. The effect of the resolution will be the formation of an expanded South African party, embracing all sections of the people in support of the Constitution and against the Nationalist policy of secession.

Smuts Speaks

General Smuts said the position was that the Nationalists had become a republican party whose chief aim was to secede from the British Commonwealth. They still talked of acting constitutionally, but how long would they be satisfied in their headlong course with that position? Their ideas of what was constitutional were very elastic.

"Hereinizing (reunion) has failed," continued the speaker, "because the Nationalists insisted upon independence. Hence today the Nationalists' motto is 'South Africa a republic,' while our motto is 'South Africa a nation.' We are really the national party of South Africa and they have become a republican party." The Prime Minister proceeded to quote from speeches by General Botha, Steyn and Herzog showing the great common spirit there was at the time of the union. Who had wandered away since then? he asked. He emphasized that there had been no interference by England, and that South Africa had grown to a higher status, which secession must destroy, quite apart from separating the white races. The tendency of the Nationalists was to create a new and more dangerous "Uitlander" question. A house divided against itself could not stand.

Earnest Appeal

General Smuts made a vehement, earnest appeal, urging the necessity of a strong Government party on non-racial lines to guide South Africa through the present critical times. South Africa was threatened on the one hand by a strong party working deliberately for political revolution and on the other by a smaller but growing party straining for a social and economic revolution, and behind them was the spectre of Bolshevism, which made even Laborites nervous. And the natives meantime, observing all this, had begun to talk of their African Republic. Consequently, looking to the great future within Africa's reach he was now making a last attempt to form a new united party of all moderate citizens, of whatever race or party, to form a strong Government. He did not demand too much from anyone, no dissolution or extinction of the South African party, but reorganization and expansion, the opening of the door for others. The details could be threshed out later.

Mr. Burton, the Minister of Finance, strongly supported General Smuts, and revealed the fact that only the state of his

ELECT GOOD MAYOR.

Editor Daily News:—

Perhaps you would let me back up the advice of Hon. T. D. Pattullo when he urged the people here to elect the best possible mayor and council for the next year. There should be a man at the city hall who will keep down expenses on the needless things, see that the public utilities pay their way and that there is no embezzlement in connection with their conduct and the information that is given out in connection with them. On the real big things there ought to be a forward policy that would put this city in a position where she belongs.

Go After Power.

Take that power question that Mr. Pattullo talked about. We should have had power here years ago, but we did not, so it is no good bemoaning the loss. What we can do now is look to the future and if we see a chance of getting a good power supply, just go after it.

It is easy to elect a mayor who will sit in the chair and sign checks, preside at the meetings and be chief commissioner of police. Anyone can do that. I should like to see, sir, a man there with some real initiative who would get out after the things we need.

There are always a lot of men who will be looking for a job to conduct the people's business when they do not know enough to make a success of their own business. Any man, for instance, can run a hotel if he has a monopoly and is mean enough not to give the public proper service. It is not very hard diggings to make money that way. That is a lot easier than running the business of the city and going out after a power proposition and putting us on the industrial map.

Managing Directors.

There is talk, sir, of two or three hotel men asking the people to make them managing directors of the city business and there are other people talked about for this job. Now look at them: Perhaps some of them are all right, but are they big enough for the job? Can they do the work if we make them head of the business. Perhaps so and perhaps not, sir. I should say it would be better to make no experiments but put in a man that is up to date with his business and that has made a success. Then you can expect to have your city go ahead and be a great place, for although the railway is trying to put us out of business they won't be able to do it if we have the right mayor.

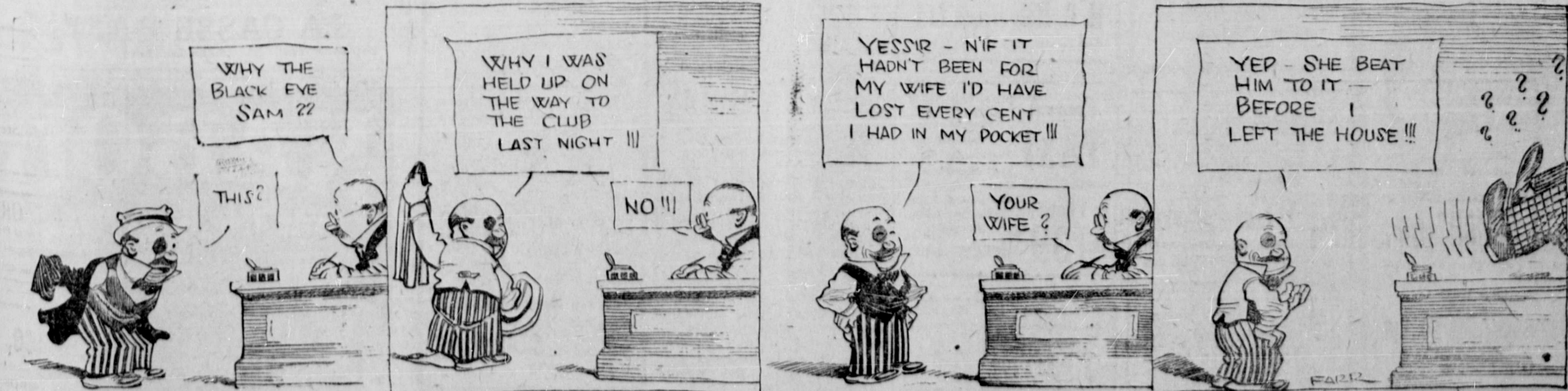

GERMAN PROFESSORS WISH TO FORGET WAR

Issue Signed Statement in Reply to London Times

BERLIN, Dec. 3.—Ten university professors, who are members of the Reichstag, have decided on the following reply to the manifesto recently sent to Germany by a number of professors of Oxford University:

The undersigned German university professors in the German Reichstag, even after taking cognizance of the statement of the Vice-Chancellor of Oxford University, believe that they are speaking in the name of German science in replying to the letter of the Oxford professors published in the Times on October 18 in the same spirit in the following way:

Science knows only one aim—namely, the search after truth. It requires for the performance of this one task the common labor of all, regardless of national boundaries. The world-war interrupted this joint labor and dissolved many personal ties. We are ready to resume these connections and by common labor relegate to oblivion everything offensive, spoken or written, in both camps. Our hopes are set on the future. Our tasks, after the bitter experiences of mankind in the past, are greater and more urgent than ever. May scientific work contribute to the promotion of the spirit of justice and conciliation in a mutual national respect, without which the reconstruction of the shattered world is impossible.

This statement is signed by Drs. Beyerle, Graf zu Dohna, Goetz, Kaas, Kahl, Moldenhauer, Radbruch, Reiser, Schrieber and Shycking.

REFORM IN INDIA

Protest Made by National Liberal Federation at Bombay

LONDON, Dec. 3.—The Indian Reform Committee have received a telegram from the President of the National Liberal Federation of India, the central organization of the Moderate party, in which it is stated that:

The Council of the National Liberal Federation of India met at Bombay on October 31 and the following day, under the presidency of Sir P. S. Sivaswamy Aiyar, a former member of the Madras Executive Council. A resolution was adopted unreservedly condemning the non-co-operation movement as fraught with danger to the best interests of the country and bound to lead to lawlessness. The Council affirmed its faith in constitutional effort as best calculated to facilitate the development of sound national life and the early attainment of self-government and expressed disapproval of any form of agitation which tended to undermine respect for law and order and to accentuate racial hatred.

A protest was recorded against the failure of the Government of India to impose adequate punishment upon the officers who practiced oppression during the period of martial law in the Punjab and also against the birking of discussion in the Imperial Legislative Council. The unsatisfactory which was being followed with regard to the Punjab disturbance was largely preventing due popular appreciation of the reforms.
