MAYOR DISPOSES OF \$150,000 OF CITY BONDS

SKIPPER'S CERTIFICATE IS SUSPENDED FOR YEAR AND FINE IS INFLICTED

City Bonds for School are Sold to United States Firm

Local Financial Situation Relieved so that Morse Creek Bridge can Proceed At Once; Option on Other Securities

Mayor McClymont this morning received a telegram from Spitzer, Rorick of Toledo that the option on Prince Rupert city bonds would be taken up. This disposes of \$150,000 for the building of the school at Hays Cove Circle.

The same concern has an option until May 1 next on \$180,000 city bonds at the same price. This covers all bonds issued by the city up to the present time, and unsold.

The negotiations for the sale were conducted by Mayor McClymont, when he was in the east. He first went to eastern Canada but getting no encouragement there, proceeded to Toledo and made a tentative arrangement with the firm which has now closed the deal.

The sale of these bonds by the city will leave the city council free to commence work at once on the Morse Creek bridge, the work on which has been held up awaiting a solution of the financial problem. The bond sale will pay the overdraft at the bank and as a result orders will be issued at once for the construction of the bridge and its erection will be financed through the bank until such time as the bonds are sold.

The payments for the bonds are to be made \$50,000 on delivery, and \$25,000 every thirty days until the money is all handed over.

STORM TODAY IS PREDICTED

Record Tide Two Feet Above Table Says Dominion Meteorologist.

VICTORIA, Dec. 11.—The Dominion meteorologist, F. Napier Benson, predicts a tide two feet above the height specified in the table today with heavy winds. The barometer is very low and a record storm is predicted from California to Alaska with its centre passing to the north of Vancouver Island and moving toward the interior of the province.

REPAY BANK SUICIDE MONEY

Sensational Development in Theft Case at Vancouver in Which Bank Manager Implicated.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 11.—J. S. Bancroft, former assistant manager of the Merchants' Bank, is expected to be committed for trial on Monday on the charges of theft, falsifying the ledger, and conspiracy with Phil Gevurtz to defraud. The preliminary trial was concluded yesterday.

The total shortage amounts to nearly \$70,000.

It transpired during the trial, when the evidence for the prosecution was given, that Phil Gevurtz, who is jointly charged, offered to commit suicide and repay the bank with the \$100,000 life insurance which he carried.

Superintendent Fraser said: "I don't want my office muddled up," and thereupon Bancroft accepted all blame.

GENEVA, Dec. 11.—Japan cannot reduce her armaments as long as the United States is increasing hers, Viscount Ishii, a delegate to the League of Nations, told the armaments committee, during a debate on the question yesterday.

COUNTY COURT OPENS MONDAY

Seven Cases Set Down to be Heard by Judge Young.

County Court sessions commence before Judge F. McE. Young on Monday morning and the following cases are slated in the order given:

Harry Ringstad vs. Redman Widing. The suit is over a loan of \$475 alleged by the plaintiff which is denied by the defendant. Patmore & Fulton have the case for the plaintiff, Williams & Manson for the defence.

H. Stelga and Axel Hagen vs. J. Blackford, for an alleged loan by the plaintiff to the defendant of \$174.90. The defendant denies the loan and makes a counter claim of \$150 as share of the fishing profits from the boat Giffen. Patmore & Fulton have the prosecution and Williams & Manson the defence.

P. McNiel, of Lorne Creek vs. The B. C. Exploration Co., of Vancouver, for wages amounting to \$400.39 claimed to be owing the plaintiff by the defendant. The defendant denies liability for the claim and makes a counter claim of \$750 is entered with the dispute note. Patmore & Fulton represent the plaintiff while T. B. Hooper appears as agent for R. G. Phipps, the solicitor for the defence.

Premier Mine.

J. Kaege vs. Premier Mining Co. The plaintiff claims \$298.60 as wages and expenses due as a result of going to Stewart where he was promised employment by the company under the conditions that the cook was discharged. The defence denies any agreement but offers to settle for \$31.35. Fisher & Oughton represent the plaintiff and Patmore & Fulton the defence.

Negotiations Fail Between Management and Employees Canadian National Lines

TORONTO, December 11.—It is definitely announced that negotiations between the Canadian National Railway employees and the management regarding President Hanna's order respecting politics have failed and that the committee has sent an application to Ottawa asking for a board of arbitration.

The order was made over a month ago and was to the effect that no employee of the railway should stand for public office and at the same time continue to be an employee of the company.

The men consider the order an infringement on their rights as citizens, while the company seems to take the ground that being employees indirectly of the Government, the Canadian National men should not engage in politics.

KNOCKED OUT SECOND ROUND

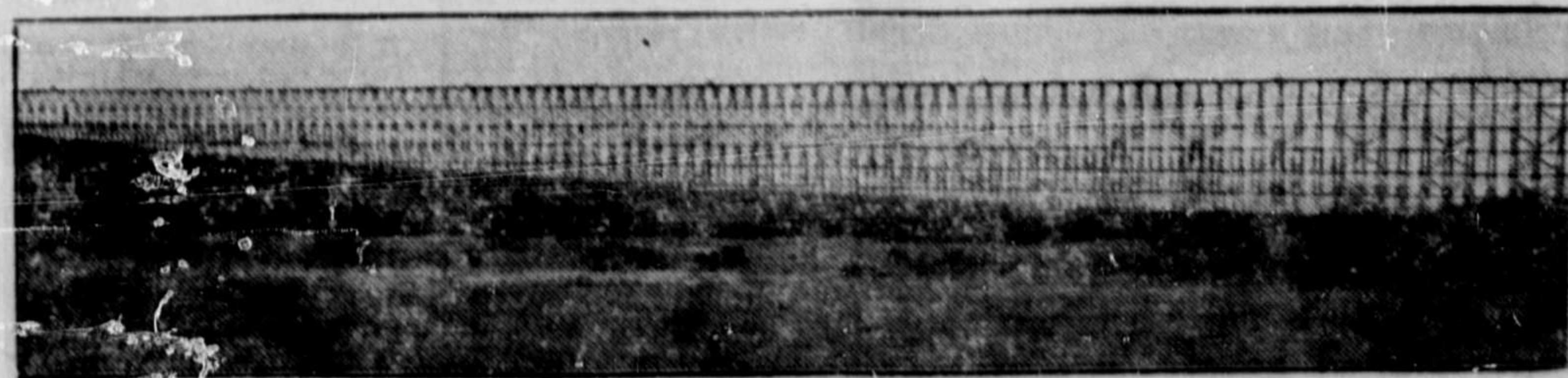
Frank Moran of Pittsburg is the Victor Over Joe Beckett.

LARGEST TRESTLE ON CONTINENT CONDEMNED.



Duhamel Bridge, spans the Battle River Valley about 8 miles southwest of Camrose, is 3,287 feet long, 118 feet high and contains 3,800,000 ft. of lumber. This bridge is the largest trestle on the continent and probably the largest in the world. The bridge has been recently condemned, for railroad traffic and plans are under way by which next year the Canadian Northern and Grand Trunk Pacific will enter Camrose over Canadian Northern tracks and a Union station built not far from the present Canadian Pacific Railway.

A telegram was received this morning from Lieut.-Col. C. W. Peck by S. E. Parker, president of the Board of Trade, in reply to a query informing him that the money to pay the employees of the drydock has been placed with the bank in Ottawa to be telegraphed here. 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TWO VESSELS WERE RACING

Eagerness to Get in First Caused Collision Between Charming and Royal.

CAPT. CAMPBELL FINED CONTEMPT OF COURT

Ordered to Pay Expenses of Inquiry for Rising and Protesting.

VICTORIA, Dec. 11.—Interesting evidence was given before Commissioner Macpherson in the inquiry into the collision between the two Canadian Pacific Coast steamship line vessels Charming and Princess Royal.

Capt. Campbell of the Charming in giving evidence admitted that eagerness to beat the Princess Royal into port was perhaps responsible for the collision. The steamers were entering Victoria harbor when they collided, doing slight damage.

Contempt of Court.

In his finding Capt. Macpherson laid all the blame on Captain Charles Campbell and lifted his ticket for twelve months.

Campbell rose and protested at the manner in which the trial was conducted and for doing so was adjudged guilty of contempt of court and ordered to pay the cost of the investigation, after he had refused to apologize.

QUIET WEDDING AT PRESBYTERIAN MANSE

Miss Moxley Becomes Bride of Frederick Cook of Pitman's Spur.

A quiet wedding took place yesterday at the Presbyterian manse, Rev. Dr. Grant officiating, when Miss Vida Mildred Moxley, daughter of Robert Moxley of Ottawa, and a sister of W. D. Moxley of this city, was married to Frederick Cook, manager of the Hansen & Allen mill at Pitman Spur.

The bride looked very pretty in a dress of tulle silk trimmed with beaded georgette and with hat to match. She was attended by Mrs. W. D. Moxley, while Mr. Moxley supported the groom.

Mr. and Mrs. Cook will live at Pitman Spur for some time.

Will be Missed From the City.

Many people, when they leave, are missed because they are of the spectacular kind, people who are before the public a good deal. There are always dozens of people of the quiet unassuming kind, however, whose going is not marked with as much gush but who are really missed even more than their more widely known fellow citizens. Mr. and Mrs. R. L. McIntosh are of the unassuming kind. Mr. McIntosh has already gone and Mrs. McIntosh will follow soon to live in Toronto. The Red Cross Society expressed very ably its appreciation of the work of Mrs. McIntosh in connection with the work of that organization, in the time of dire need when the nation was at war. The Daily News would like to add its quota of regret at Mr. and Mrs. McIntosh leaving. They will be missed a good deal and the hope is very generally expressed that they will return in the near future.

Lynching a Very Dangerous Practice.

Three men were lynched in California yesterday. They were taken from prison and hanged on a tree without the formality of a trial. They were murderers and deserved the fate they met, but the method of enforcing the moral law in this case was bad. To break the law in order to enforce it is at any time bad practice.

There is a law in the state of California for the punishment of such evil doers. If it is not effective, it is time the people of the state made it so. In view of that it is in the interests of justice to allow the law to take its course. There is always the possibility of some innocent person being punished under lynch law, where the guilty are punished under the passion of the moment. Mobs can easily be roused, often against those who are innocent. It may be that an innocent person happens to be in company with a criminal at the time of the trouble and he is at once adjudged guilty and punished. There is no opportunity given to explain or to prove the innocence. Many a person has swung to a tree for the crime committed by another person.

The first step in preventing the application of lynch law is to insist that all laws be enforced, even against lynchers. If there is a wholesome dread of the law, there is no need for individual action. It is only where there is danger that the prisoner may not get his deserts that action such as that taken in California is excusable.

Irish Question in Centre of Stage.

The Irish question still occupies the centre of the stage. It is the most difficult question there is. Of course those who see only one side think it is easy, but it is not. It is to be hoped, however, that something will be done before Christmas to stop the internecine warfare which has been going on so long, and which has aroused strong partisan feeling in many countries outside of Ireland and England.

Lloyd George has been able to settle a good many questions. His influence still seems to be the most potent there is in the old land. If he can crown his work by the settlement of the Irish question, he will have made himself a niche in the hall of fame which will be as permanent as history.

Only Country Not in League of Nations.

The United States is the only important country that is voluntarily remaining out of the League of Nations. There are big questions being discussed, not effectively perhaps, but all the same being discussed with the object of trying to provide an amicable settlement. Germany is anxious to go in, but has not yet been admitted. Because of the failure of the U. S. to become a participant, the American view has to be presented through the Canadian delegation, and that gives the Canadian members and their opinions an added importance. They do not act either officially or unofficially for the sister country, but they are looked on as representatives of a country holding similar and sympathetic views and their opinions are considered accordingly.

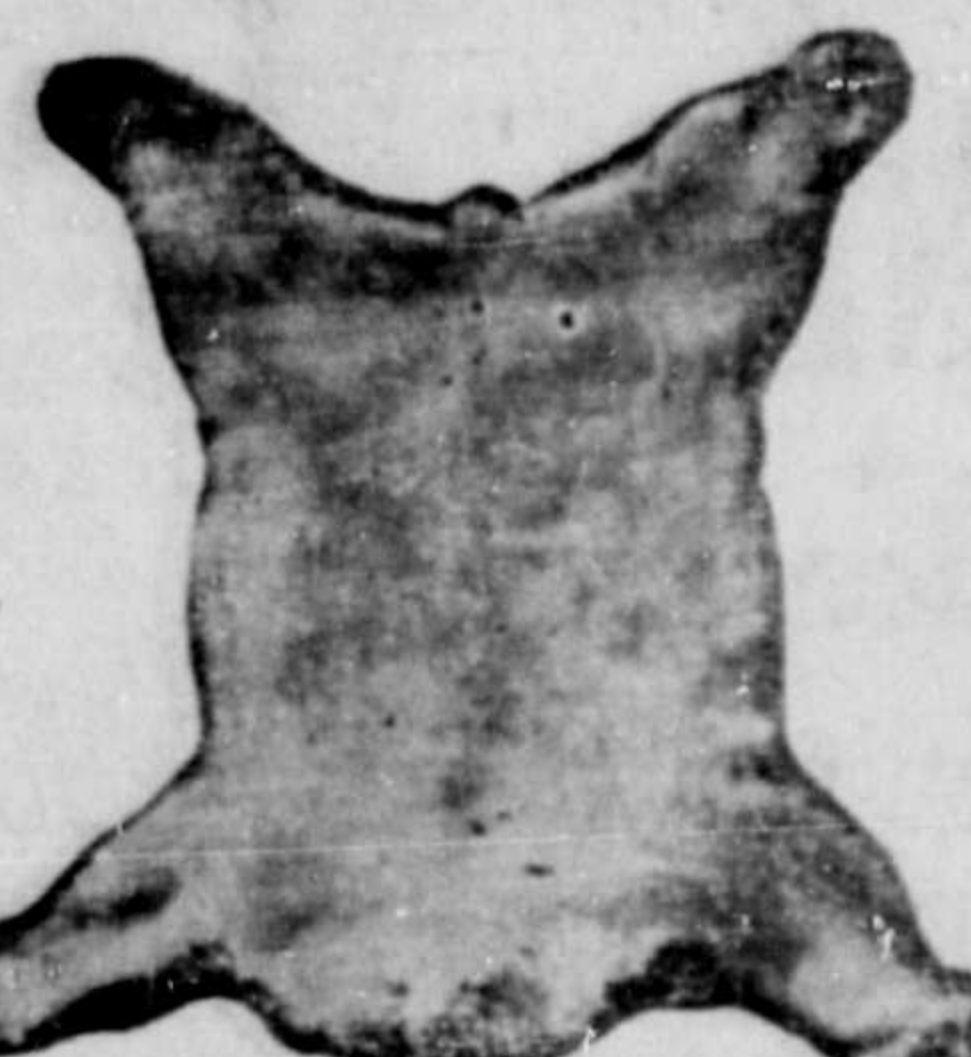

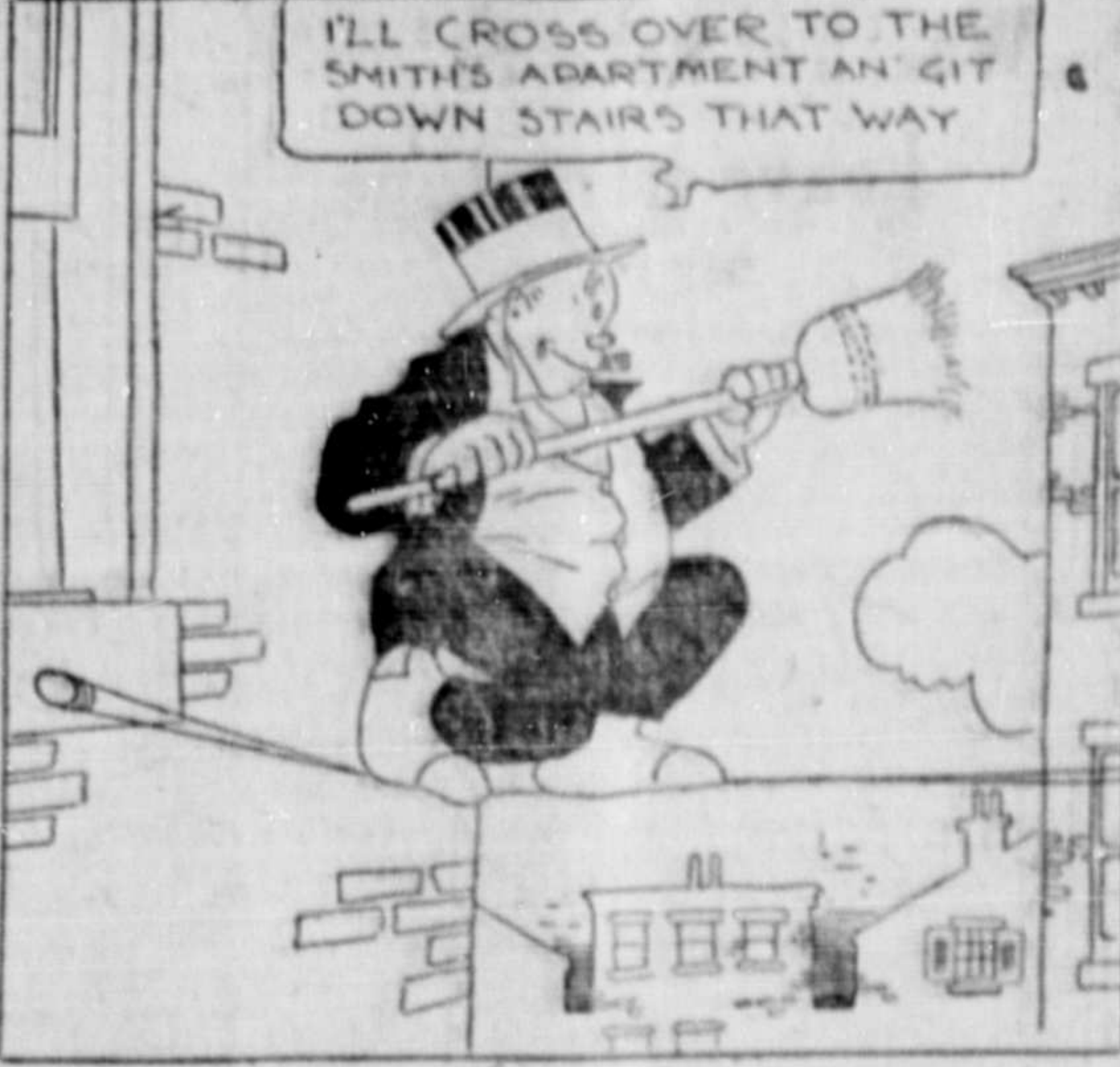
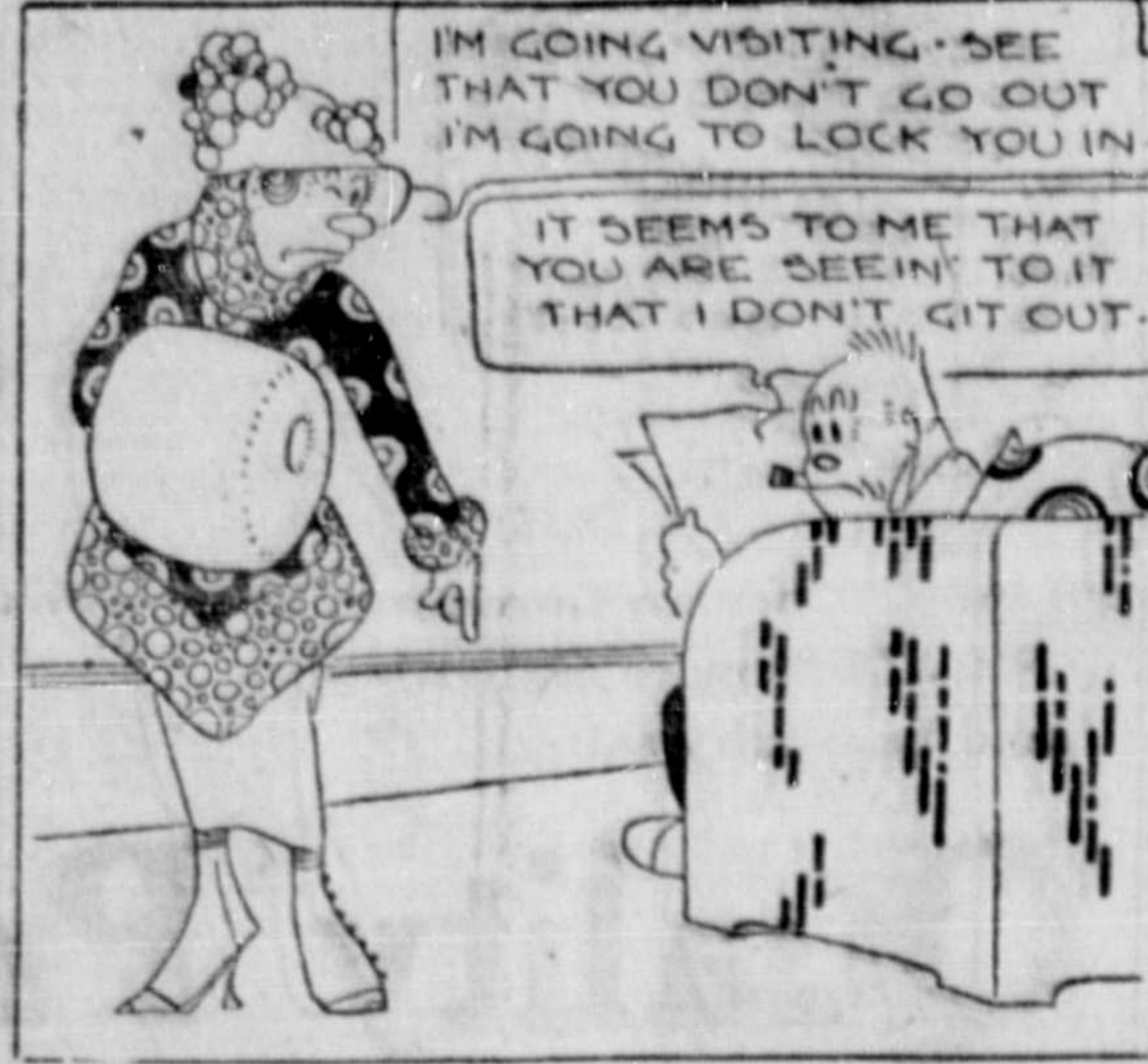

MAY CONSCRIPT GERMAN LABOR

Government Proposal is Being
Vigorously Opposed and is
Storm Centre of
Discussion.

BERLIN, Dec. 10.—Conscription of labor to increase production in Germany, a law for which is being drafted, would apply to girls and women as well as men and boys, all of whom would be compelled to render a year of service in mines, factories, on farms, in hospitals, or wherever the state directed.

The proposal, credited to Matthias Erzberger, former minister of finance, has become the storm centre of a discussion which has run the scale from invective and threat to ridicule, and now, with the law nearing completion, its proponents have made it apparent they will seek with deadly earnestness to force its passage through the Reichstag.

On the other hand the opponents of the measure, including the powerful socialist faction, have declared they will oppose the passage with every means at hand and should they fail will later seek to vitiate the legislation.

Pay Her Debts.

Herr Erzberger's plan is to supplement the tax laws he has already succeeded in passing with a measure that would compel increased production, result in a consequent increase in collectable taxes and so lend toward helping Germany pay her debts.

The socialists say the measure is a "capitalistic scheme" aimed at the working classes, who could derive no benefit at all from compulsory labor. They further point out that it probably could not be generally enforced and back up this statement with the argument that many of Erzberger's present laws have never been enforced, and no attempt has been made to enforce them.

Apply to Everyone.

While the law was intended primarily to affect the wage earners, it has, it is understood, during the drafting process been extended until it would apply to virtually every person in Germany, in one form or another, as an effort to bring industrial as well as agricultural production to its highest efficiency. However, the form in which it eventually may be submitted may be radically modified owing to the intense opposition.

In proposing and supporting the law, Erzberger is said to have had principally in view the effect of conscripted labor in the coal and timber lands.

The fact that there is now nearly 1,000,000 unemployed persons in Germany and that many factories have been closed is pointed to by labor leaders and some legislators as proof that such a law is a "chimerical proposal" and could have no appreciable effect. They also assert it would be expensive and would mean the establishment of a colossal government machinery to direct its enforcement.

Among prominent parliamentary leaders who have come out in opposition to the law are Philipp Scheidemann, leader of the Majority Socialists; George Gothein, economic expert and leader of the democratic party, and Bernhard Dernburg, former finance minister.

BODY OF BRAZILIAN EMPEROR TO RETURN

Will be Carried on Battleship and Members of Family may be Repatriated

RIO DE JANEIRO, Dec. 9.—The remains of the late Emperor Dom Pedro II. and those of his wife will be brought from Portugal to Brazil on the battleship Sao Paulo on that vessel's return from Europe, according to announcement by the government. Several members of the family of the former emperor are expected to return at the same time, this being possible through the recent act of congress revoking the banishment decree against them. The Sao Paulo carried King Albert of the Belgians back to Belgium after he had visited Brazil.
