PUBLIC BUILDINGS ARE BURNED AT CITY OF CORK

STREET SURFACING SCHEME IS READY FOR THE CITY COUNCIL TONIGHT

Cork Devastated by Fire on Saturday and Sunday, while Terrorism Held Sway in City

City Hall, Carnegie Library and Corn Exchange Burned as well as Private Residences; Men Shot by Police

DUBLIN, December 13.—Several large sections of Cork were devastated on Saturday night and Sunday after shooting from ambush at the military party was reported. The fire was under control last night but the damage is estimated at between ten and fifteen million dollars, the costliest destruction of property since the reprisals began in Ireland.

A group of public buildings on Albert Quay including the city hall, Carnegie library, and a portion of the corn exchange were burned as well as private residences.

Newly arrived parties of auxiliary cadets marched through the streets holding up and searching pedestrians and firing into the air, following the ambush of auxiliaries within half a mile of the barracks, twelve of them being wounded by a bomb thrown from a lorry.

The conflagration followed the ambush of the military at Pilton Cross, when four persons were killed and many wounded.

Three civilians were taken from houses and shot dead. Then the fires started and there were bomb explosions. Firing was heard and the populace were panic-stricken.

In the Summerhill district, shortly after curfew, two brothers named Delaney were reported taken from their homes and shot, one subsequently dying. During the hour before curfew terrorism held sway.

TENDERS ARE TOO HIGH FOR COURT HOUSE

Delay in Letting Contract Made Necessary by Excessive Cost of Building.

VICTORIA, Dec. 13.—There is some delay in the awarding of the contract for the new court house at Prince Rupert. The bids were opened on Monday last and it was found that they were higher than the \$400,000 estimate which was passed by the Legislature for the structure. As a result the Government cannot go ahead but will probably call for new tenders in the near future. No official statement in regard to the matter has yet been made.

DREDGES HAVE TO COME ACROSS ON ACCOUNT OF WIND

Shaft of One is also Broken—Everything on This Side of Harbor Today.

There is no work going on at McNicholl Creek today by the Grant & McDonald dredging outfit and the two dredges and the barge house float are on this side of the harbor. The shaft on one of the dredges is broken and the other had to come across on account of the storm that has been sweeping straight up the harbor towards McNicholl Creek for the last twenty-four hours.

In the meantime the work is going on as usual for the one dredge is being repaired and the other is busy casting up the gravel at the wharf site.

A constitution was adopted as follows:

1. To take a stand for clean political life.
2. To counteract undue influence working to the detriment of the district and citizens.
3. To combine, if necessary, with other associations, local or district, aiming at similar ends.
4. The evolution to a higher political life in so far as the same accords with the constitutional law.
5. The endorsement and support at will of any candidate or candidates who stand for similar ends, are independent in their attitude on public affairs, and who are opposed to the present system of party discipline and control in so far as that discipline and control is a menace to the public welfare.
6. To conduct a campaign of education along sound political lines.
7. To endeavor to protect communities and citizens in the district from discrimination at the hands of those in power and at the same time strive for the elimination of party patronage and its evils.

Labor and the Methodist Church are Discussed at Open Forum by Local Men

Rev. T. H. Nuttall States Case for Church and is Criticized by Speakers; Socialism is Religion

In closing an address on the social program of the Methodist Church at the open forum last night, Rev. T. H. Nuttall in answering criticism said it was an antiquated idea that the church runs after the capitalist class. The Methodist church was very practical and had done more to make British Columbia safe for white people to live in than any other organized body. In China, where men were working for ten cents a day, the church was working to get them more. The church was not a class organization. He was in the church just because it was not a class organization.

A class organization was an out of date thing. The church includes all classes.

"If there has been a friend of the poor throughout the ages it has been the church," declared the speaker. The Methodist church was formed because they believed the church had got away from the gospel. It had been largely the church of the laboring classes, at first in England.

Board of Works to Submit Street Plan

Council will Consider Report Tonight; Tax a Surfacing will Cost \$55,000; Life Five Years

The recommendation of the Board of Works and the city engineer for the tarvia surfacing of Second and Third Avenues and by-streets will be submitted at tonight's council meeting.

The report places the cost of the work at \$55,000 and divides it 65 per cent on the city as a whole and 35 per cent on the property abutting and no bylaw will have to come before the people. This scheme will make a tax of .2978915c per front foot on property abutting for a term of five years with interest at 7 per cent. Many property owners, it is expected, will pay the tax in one year. The work will have a life of five years.

COLONEL PRIOR FISHING BOAT DIED YESTERDAY TETON GROUNDS

Passed Away at Hospital, Victoria—Had Long Record of Useful Work.

Went on Frederick Island in the Storm Wednesday Morning But is Now Safe.

LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR FOR NEARLY A YEAR

Represented Victoria in House of Commons Three Terms—Premier Seven Months.

VICTORIA, Dec. 13.—Lieutenant-Governor E. G. Prior died last night following an operation on Saturday for intestinal trouble. This old complaint recurred several weeks ago, necessitating his entering the Jubilee Hospital where he died. Had he lived until next Saturday he would have completed a year as Lieut.-Governor. During his regime he has proved to be a genial and popular host. He entertained, among others, the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire, the members of the Imperial Press Conference and the Northwest Rotarians.

The late Colonel Prior was born near Ripon, Yorkshire, on May 31, 1853. He was educated at Leeds and became a mining engineer. In 1873 he came to Canada, settling at Nanaimo, where he was mine manager and later mine inspector. He founded the big hardware firm E. G. Prior & Co., Ltd., which is still a successful business.

As Politician.

In politics Colonel Prior was a prominent figure. He was a strong Conservative and in 1886 was elected to the Legislature at Victoria. Two years later he was chosen as the representative of the B. C. Capital at Ottawa representing Victoria for three consecutive terms in the House of Commons. He was Premier of B. C. for seven months from November, 1902 to June, 1903.

The Colonel was a famous marksman. He commanded the Bisley team in 1890 and two years after he was appointed commander of the Fifth Regiment Canadian Artillery. He was twice married and leaves one son and three daughters.

NURSE WAS KILLED

VANCOUVER, Dec. 13.—The woman killed at Vancouver by an automobile when she stepped off the sidewalk was Mrs. A. Draper, of this city, a nurse.

The fishing schooner Teton, Capt. Bert Hanson, went aground on Wednesday morning on Frederick Island on the west coast of Graham Island in a raging storm and is now lying in a sheltered position on a sandy beach at Pearl Bay near Morgan Point. This is the news that was brought to the city by F. Fryer, one of the crew, who reached the city on the Prince Albert yesterday from Masset, after having made a tramp of some four miles through the bush to that point. Captain Hanson is now standing by the vessel and the insurance people will shortly investigate the accident. It is understood the boat is not badly damaged.

The Teton is a 46-foot gasoline boat of 25 gross tonnage and 17 registered. Her home port is New Westminster and James W. Fryer of that city is the managing owner.

SILVER TAKES ANOTHER DROP

Goes Below Sixty Cents in New York Following Break in London

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Bar silver continued to decline in the local market yesterday, selling at 59 1/2 an ounce, a new low record after London reported to 38 1/2 pence, which is now the minimum at that centre.

London, which controls the silver market, attributed the steady shrinkage of prices to the lack of demand from China, the largest consumer.

Many silver mines in Canada and the United States, especially those producing low grade ore, have suspended production during the last month or two.

PLAN RAISE HOGS ON CEMETERY SITE NEAR VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, Dec. 12.—The city council here has decided to dispose of the garbage collection system and turn over the garbage to a private company which plans to raise up to 10,000 hogs on 200 acres of the unused cemetery site owned by the city at Burnaby.

City Bond Sale
Relieves Situation.

The situation in regard to civic finances is relieved to a very considerable extent by the sale of \$150,000 worth of local bonds to a Toledo bond house, as recorded by the Daily News on Saturday. The same concern has an option on the remainder of the unsold city securities, amounting to approximately \$180,000, and if these also are taken the city will be in a position to proceed with new improvements, although care must be taken, even then, as it will be difficult to borrow much more money.

The Section Two bridge will now proceed at once, according to the information given out by the mayor. Tenders will be invited on the plans, which have already been prepared and approved. This will not only provide work for the unemployed but will also be a great thing for the residents of the west end of the city.

Paving By-law is
Also Made Possible.

Voting on the paving bylaw is made possible by the sale of the city securities. It would have been useless to have voted to lay pavements if there was no money to pay for the work after it was done. With the relief in the money situation, this may now proceed. The ratepayers, it is understood, will have an opportunity to decide whether or not they want the streets paved and are ready to pay their share of the work. It is up to them to decide.

There is no doubt but the paving is badly needed. It cannot be done immediately as fine weather is necessary for the laying of tar, but preparations can be made for it if the necessary by-law is approved by the electors.

Happy Medium in
Spending Money.

There are the two opposing ideas always prevalent in any city. On the one hand there is the desire for improvements, which every progressive city must have. We all would like to see the city nicely paved, good sidewalks, bright lights, good sewers, plenty of water and power and also a street car service. These are all good things but they have to be paid for. There is a limit to the borrowings of every municipality and Prince Rupert is no exception to the rule.

The tax payers do not want to have to pay much more than they are paying today. Already the taxes are high. But it is impossible to have improvements without paying for them. That is true, no matter what system of government we may have. We must pay for what we get. In view of this condition the happy medium is the best in conducting the affairs of a city. We must show progress, but at the same time we must be careful and see that every dollar spent counts in the long run.

IMPERIAL OIL
CO. HAS SPENT
TWO MILLIONSBeen Prospecting Five Years in
Alberta and Other Western
Fields

EDMONTON, Dec. 13.—Two million dollars have already been expended by the Imperial Oil Company in the exploitation of the Northern Alberta oil fields and the future program of the company calls for the expenditure of considerably more, says Vice-President C. O. Stillman, of the Imperial Oil Company in a communication received by A. M. Frith, of the Edmonton Board of Trade.

The letter of Mr. Stillman comes as a result of a resolution passed recently by the board of trade, which expressed the appreciation of the board's council for the work of the Imperial Oil Company in western Canada.

The Letter

Mr. Stillman writes as follows: "Your letter of 17th November is received, conveying an expression of appreciation of the council of the Edmonton Board of Trade of the work of our company in Western Canada. This letter has been considered by our board of directors and we wish to express to you the thanks of the board for such a mark of appreciation on the part of your council."

No Privileges

A few years ago, after very careful consideration, we decided to make an appropriation for the purpose of prospecting for oil in the Western provinces. For three years a very careful plan of geological examination of Alberta and Saskatchewan was carried out, and for the past two years an energetic drilling campaign has been carried on by us, which will be carried on until the fields we are testing are proven or condemned. We have asked for no special privileges, but are operating in all instances the same as any individual or company may do. These operations require considerable courage and a great deal of money, as we have already expended about two million dollars and our future program calls for the expenditure of a great deal more.

Gratifying

"We realize the advantages of having the sentiment of the western people with us in our operations and it is particularly gratifying to have such an expression as we have received from your board. Will you, therefore, please convey to the council of the Edmonton board of trade the sincere thanks of our company."

In the last forty-eight hours 3.7 inches of rain has fallen, one-third of the year's total.

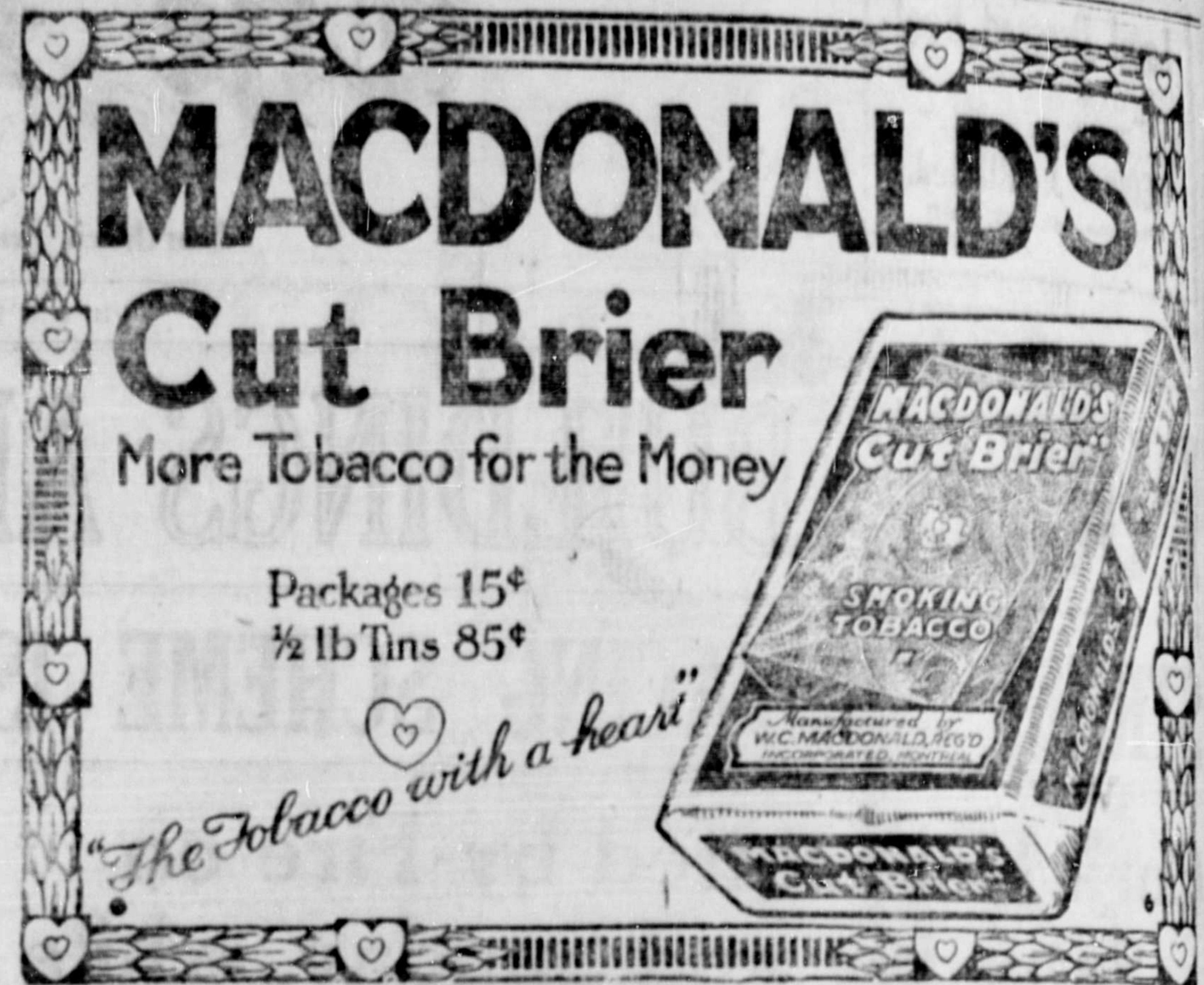
Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Patmore are moving into their handsome new residence at the corner of Borden and Taylor Streets.

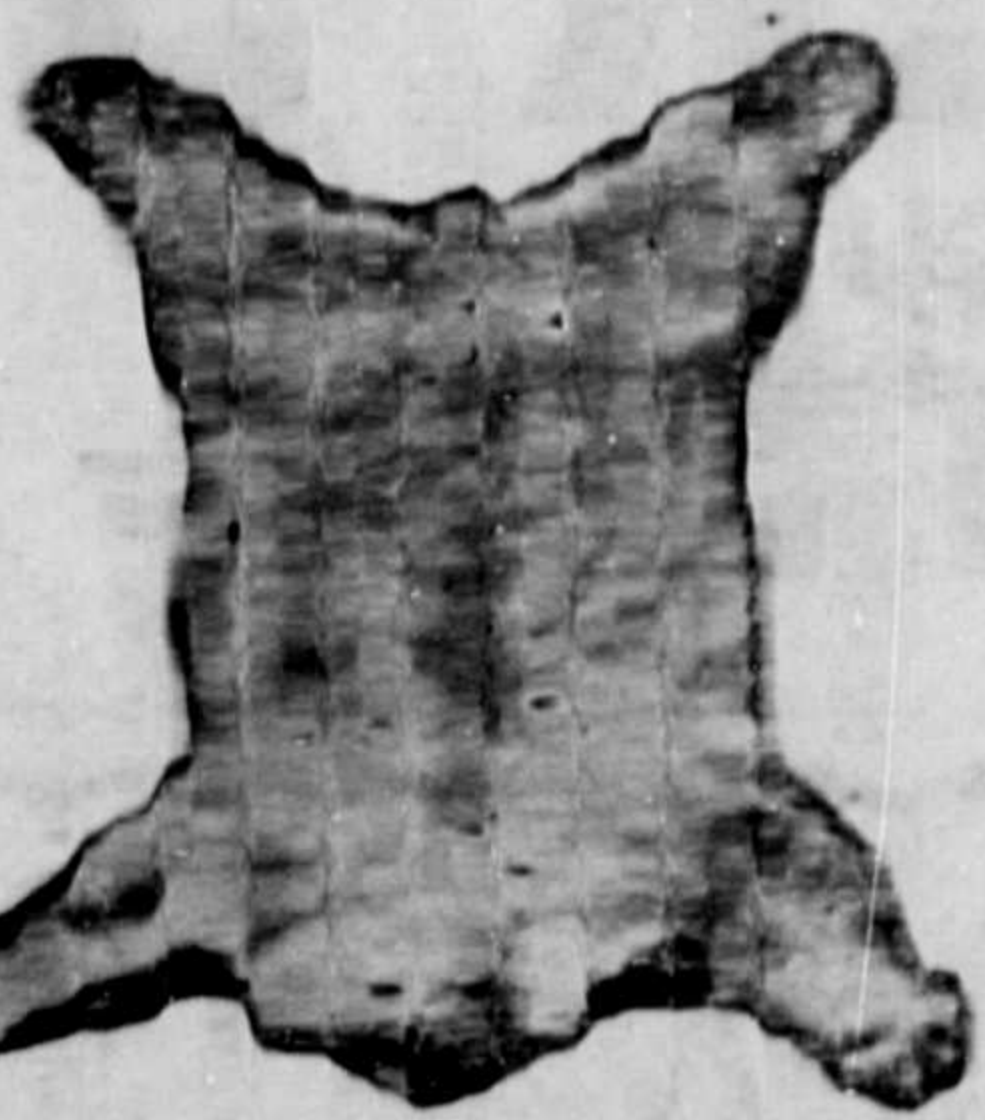

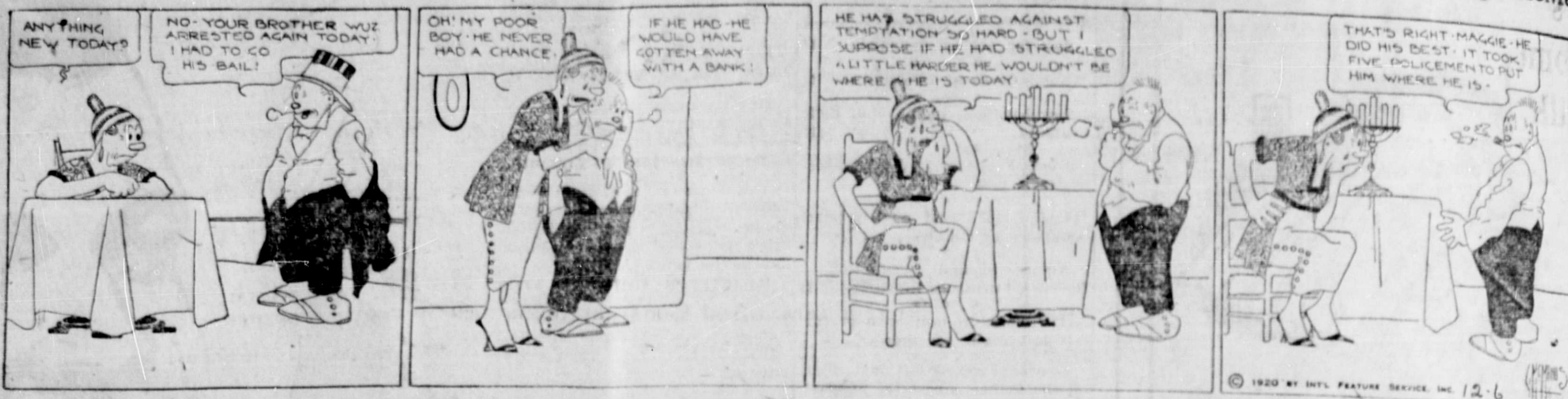

BRINGING UP FATHER



LABOR AND THE METHODIST CHURCH ARE DISCUSSED AT OPEN FORUM BY LOCAL MEN

(Continued From Page One.)

with the most recent conference (two years ago in Hamilton where a social program had been outlined as follows:

Social Program.

1. We declare all special privilege, not based on useful service to the community, to be a violation of the principle of justice, which is the foundation of democracy.

4. We declare that forms of industrial organization should be developed which call labor to a voice in the management and a share in the profits and risks of business. All forms of autocratic organization of business should be discouraged. We call attention to the remarkable and unchallenged success of the co-operative stores, factories, and steamship lines of England and Scotland, as great examples of democracy in industry.

3. We declare it to be un-Christian to accept profits when laborers do not receive a living wage, or when capital receives disproportionate returns as compared with labor.

4. We recommend Old Age Insurance on a national scale, in which the annuity paid shall be based upon the average earnings of the country, each year of a man's effective life. This would protect all citizens from the fear of penury in old age, and at the same time would make every citizen directly interested in both the prosperity of every business in the country and the good health and industry of every fellow citizen.

5. We condemn speculation in land, grain, food-stuffs, and natural resources, as well as the frequent capture of unearned wealth through the over-capitalization of commercial enterprises. We place the principle of the Golden Rule before the man who seeks wealth by investment, and then endeavors to escape impending loss by unloading upon others. These are dangerous forms of economic injustice in which we cannot engage without sin. Is there not in our Church a wide-spread call for repentance and confession of sin in this regard?

6. As the people are virtual partners in every business enterprise, we condemn that profiteering which takes out of them profits not justified by the value or cost of the service rendered. We recommend the enactment of legislation which shall secure to labor a fair wage adequate to a proper standard of living, to the business a fair profit adequate for its continuance, and to the public all returns in excess of these.

7. We are in favor of the nationalization of our natural resources, such as mines, water-powers, fisheries, forests, the means of communication and transportation, and public utilities on which all the people depend.

8. We call attention to the closed or company town as a menace to democracy, in that the citizens are in danger of being robbed of freedom of political action, and of power to demand proper sanitary, educational and social conditions for themselves

and their children.

9. As followers of the Carpenter of Nazareth, we sympathetically seek to understand the problems of life as they confront the classes of labor in Canada, and thus rightly estimate the pleas they make for justice, and find in them allies in the struggle to realize the ends of fair play, humanity and brotherhood.

10. The Church has a message to all classes of people. All citizens in the ranks of employees, on account of living in a Christian land and being endowed with its free citizenship, are under obligation to do faithfully the work for which they take the wage, to treat no engagement as a "scrap of paper," and to carry a brother's heart toward all their fellow-citizens. "Speak every man truth with his neighbor, for ye are members one of another," wrote St. Paul. For the same reason all the virtues are called for. Thus the facts of life, as found in our human relations, carry with them a divine sanction, and demand of all alike the observance of the great commandments of the law, and the new commandment which Christ has given us.

Remarkable Vitality.

A lot of people seemed to think the church was a dying institution, continued the speaker, but for a dying institution the Methodist church showed remarkable vitality. It had a membership of 490,000 which was increasing rapidly. During the past year they had raised eight million dollars.

As one who believed in the cause of labor, Mr. Nuttall said he thought they might get together. Labor would be stronger if allied with the church and the church would be stronger if allied with labor. The church was not an economic organization but moral and spiritual. He asked that they be judged by their highest and not their lowest product.

Not Carry Forward.

Walter Shaw spoke of the resemblance of the church and labor movements in their method of developing mental intoxication. While the idea of co-operation seemed good, it did not carry forward and little practical development would result.

J. H. Burroughs did not agree with any reform program. These programs did not benefit the workers, who still remained wage-workers and sold their labor for just sufficient to enable them to live. Reforms reacted to the advantage of the employing class, the one dominant class. Domination of the superior over the inferior continued.

Several others spoke, some of whom were opposed to Christianity or the church. One man said the speaker did not recognize the anti-religious aspect of the Socialist party. In the gospels they could find no organization started to benefit the workers. All Christ taught was a new kingdom in the world to come. He quoted "Servants, obey your masters," "Blessed are the meek," and "Wives obey your husbands," the last being suggested by Mrs. Booth, the chairman of the meeting. He would have had more respect for the reverend gentleman if he kept to the church. They could get all they needed in the Socialist party and did not need the church.

Superstition.

Charles Lemon wanted to know if the church believed in superstition yet. Mr. Nuttall said he believed the world was created by an all-wise and just being.

Mr. Lemon said he did not believe in the supernatural or superstition or reform in any form or manner.

One speaker said the workers were entitled to all they created. "The world for the workers, and nothing short of that," would satisfy them.

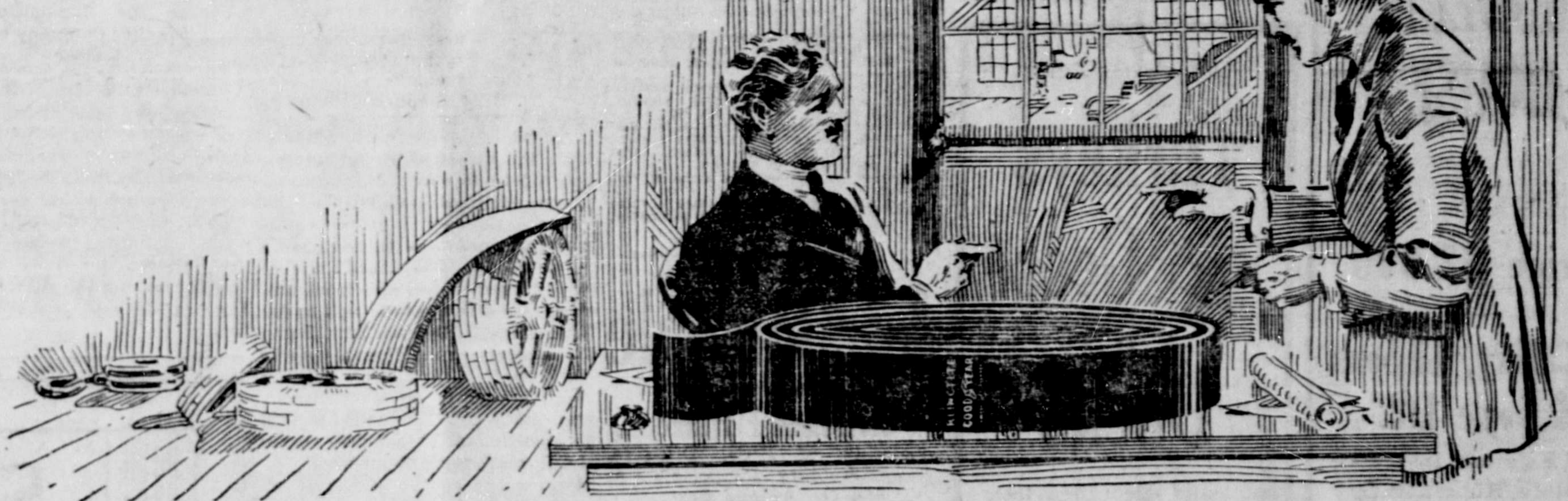

ERECT MONUMENT TO FAMOUS POLE WHO LED CHARGE

WARSAW, Dec. 13.—The Poles
are using some of the gun metal
shavings by their army from the Bol-
sheviki to cast a monument to be
erected in this city to Father
Skorupka, the heroic young army
chaplain called "The Savior of
Warsaw."

It was Father Skorupka who led
the first successful charge that
turned the tide when the Red army
was at the gates of Warsaw on
August 15. He fell before Bolshevik
bullets, but his regiment advanced.
From that moment the Red retreat
began.

Father Skorupka, who was only
27 years of age, was a former boy
scout and scoutmaster and was
an active Red Cross worker before
going to the front. He took par-
ticular interest in the organiza-
