Rupert to Reach Port This Afternoon

SHIPBUILDING OPERATIONS ARE NOW AWAITING SETTLEMENT OF CREDITORS

Prince Rupert is On Her Way North

Sailed from Swanson Bay under Own Steam at 5 o'clock This Morning and will be Here This Afternoon

The wrecked G. T. P. steamer Prince Rupert left Swanson Bay this morning at 5 o'clock under her own steam and is expected to reach this port between 4 o'clock and 6 o'clock this afternoon. Her engines were successfully turned over yesterday for the first time in over two months, during which time she has been submerged in the creek mouth at Swanson Bay.

The vessel is being conveyed north by the Algerine and is in charge of Captain Donald with Chief Engineer Cochrane, who was on her when she wrecked, in the engine room. Some of the crew of the George are also coming north on her.

WASHINGTON IS CALLING HERE

Gas Freighter of the New England Fish Co. will Arrive Today For the First Time.

HAS TRIAL SHIPMENT OF FROZEN FISH FOR EAST

The New England Fish Company's gas freighter Washington, Captain Jennings, will arrive this afternoon at 4 o'clock from Ketchikan with a trial shipment of Belleanna frozen fish which will be shipped east over the G. T. P. and will take up a whole train. This will be the first call of the Washington at this port and many will be interested in her. She was bought by the New England Co. last fall for freighting between Ketchikan, where the company has a large cold storage plant, and railway cities in British Columbia. It is not known whether the New England Co. will continue sending their fish this way as this shipment is but an experiment. If all goes well and satisfaction is given it is likely the shipments will continue. The fish will be handled over the wharf of the Allyn Fisheries here and will be sent east in refrigerator cars.

WAS ARRESTED AS STEAMER PULLED OUT

Benny Brown Arrested for Having Offensive Weapon in Possession

Just as the S.S. Chelohsin was leaving for the south last evening Constable McDonald arrested a colored by the name of "Benny" Brown on a charge of having on his person a concealed weapon, to wit a knuckle duster. It is believed by the authorities that the man in question has a lengthy police record, and they are awaiting advice from the southern coast cities.

Upon the appearance of the defendant this morning before Magistrate McMordie, the city solicitor asked for an adjournment until tomorrow, which was granted despite the expressed wish on the part of the colored gentleman that the case be proceeded with on the spot. The latter stated that he was anxious to leave for the South for the holidays, not to mention his curiosity to find out what the peculiar little metal playthings he was accused of being unlawfully in possession of had let him in for.

The Prince Rupert will make her landing this afternoon at No. 1 shed and tomorrow will move to No. 2 where her cargo will be discharged. She is to be put on the drydock on Friday so as to have her safely up before the holiday season commences.

The actual injury sustained by the vessel, it is understood, is not very extensive and there is only one rip about twelve feet long which has now been patched. Her interior is badly bedraggled with woodwork torn out during the operations of the divers, with rotten blankets and clothing lying around, and her shining brass work splintered and black with sea water and mud.

Credit Divers.
The work of the salvage company and the divers has been receiving much praise up and down the coast. The company itself gives much credit to the six divers who were on the job and did all the submarine carpentering. These men put in sixty days steady under water working sometimes at a depth of sixty or seventy feet handling great timbers ten feet long and 12 inches thick. The perfection of their work was proven when the boat floated successfully first time.

Nicholson Speaks.
VANCOUVER, Dec. 22.—Capt. Nicholson arrived this morning on the Prince John from Swanson Bay. He said the Prince Rupert was in very bad shape. Her decks were buckled, bulkheads are burst and all the interior work except the windows is practically useless. The job of renovation will be a very large one. Specifications are to be prepared ready for bids by December 29. Capt. Nicholson complimented the salvage work for the London underwriters, using the Pacific Salvage Company's plant with Capt. Logan in charge. Repairs will take several months.

PAID FINE WITH COUNTERFEIT BILL

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—Fined \$2 for a misdemeanor, a peddler took a roll of bills from his pocket and handed a "ten" to the clerk in the Essex Market Court recently. 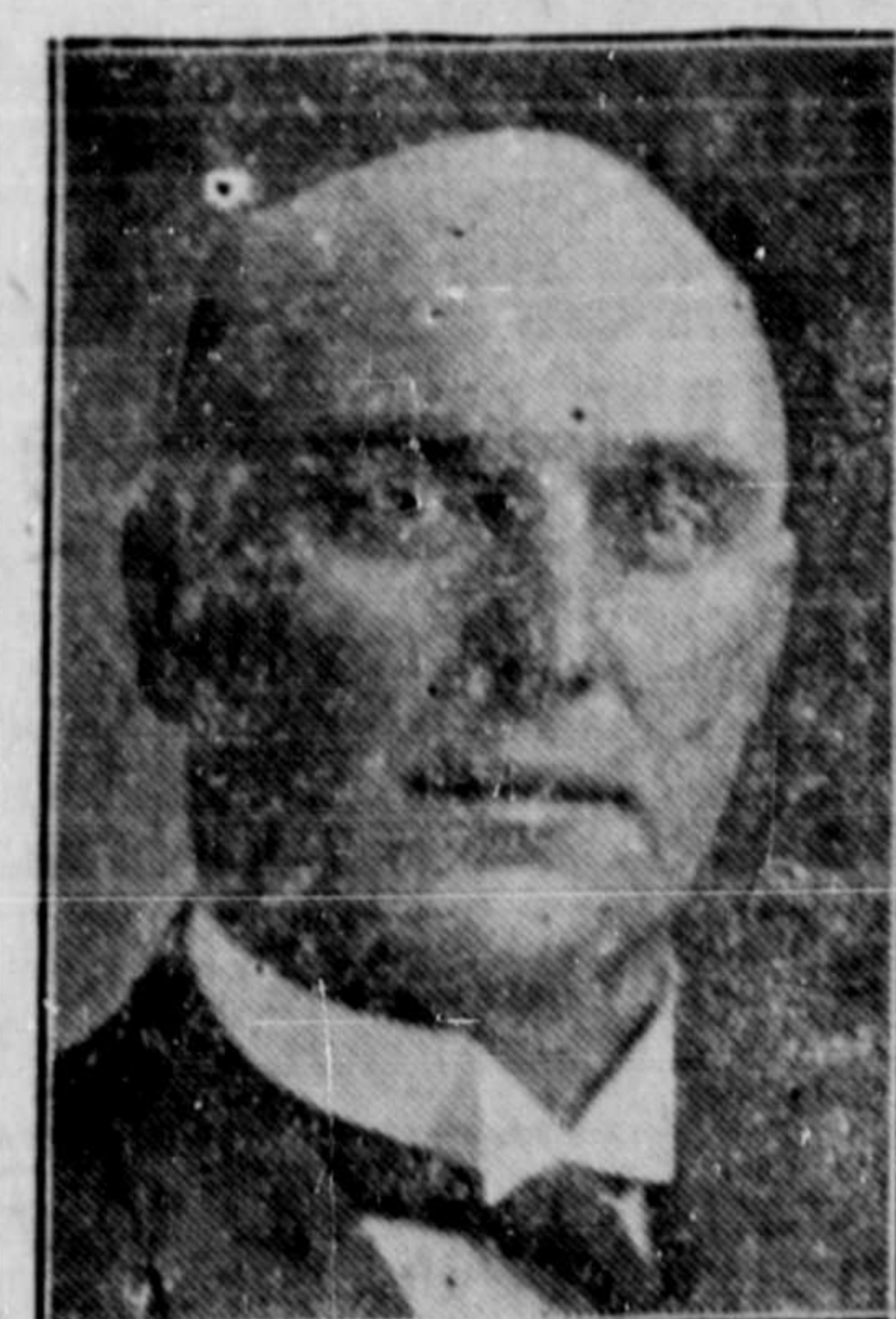
APPEAL UNLIKELY AGAINST DECISION

DOCK WORK START SOON

So Says Col. Peck in Wire From Ottawa—Creditors Holding It Up Now.

The following telegram was received yesterday afternoon by S. E. Parker, president of the Board of Trade, from Col. Peck at Ottawa: "Am leaving tonight for Vancouver and will arrive on Christmas Day. The Department will get work on the dry dock started in the near future, but at present it is held up by the creditors. Will be in Prince Rupert before creditors' meeting and will return here when necessary. If you have occasion to communicate with a member at Ottawa you can do so with Dr. Alfred Thomson, member for the Yukon, who is looking after the interests of the district in my absence."

PILE DRIVING NOW STARTED

Big Pile Driver Set up and Driving Piles From the Shore.

Pile driving at the new Grand Trunk Pacific salmon dock commenced yesterday. The big pile-driver, which was built on the ground, has been set up and is now working from the shore driving piles into the sand which has been brought over from McNicholl Creek. One of the dredges is still busy on the work of over-casting the sand above tide level. Digging sand at McNicholl and bringing it across the harbor is also proceeding with dispatch.

LONDON-PARIS AIR SERVICE CARRIED MANY PASSENGERS

LONDON, Dec. 2.—British and French companies conducting the London-Paris air service carried from September 2, 1919, to October 30, 1920, 3,932 passengers, 499,885 pounds of goods and covered altogether a distance of 302,000 miles.

IMMORAL MAN WAS RECOMMENDED FOR DAUGHTER MARRY

GENEVA, Dec. 22.—M. Wader, a wealthy resident of Bienne, Switzerland, has just sued a detective agency for wrongly recommending an immoral man as the husband of his daughter and has obtained a verdict of £140 with costs against the agency.

The prospective father-in-law engaged the agency at a cost of £500 to investigate the reputation and habits of the young man who had asked for the hand of his daughter. The detectives reported that the youth was worthy, reliable and sober.

After six months of wedded life the bride returned to her father's home with the information that the bridegroom had dissipated her dowry in riotous living and gambling.

CAR SHORTAGE IS STARTING AGAIN

Schooner Heligoland Cleared for Seattle Yesterday with 55,000 Pounds on Account of the Market.

There are no refrigerator cars in the yards today but eight are reported for arrival tomorrow morning. The halibut schooner Heligoland called here yesterday with 55,000 pounds but seeing market conditions unsatisfactory on account of car shortage, cleared for Seattle.

The Yakutat, 38,000 pounds, Daisy, 20,000 pounds, and Flatery, 3,000 pounds, are in today and will likely wait for the fish sale tomorrow morning on the arrival of the cars.

ANTLERS OF HUGE ELK IN MICHIGAN

Pioneers Say That One Was Never Seen in Country.

TRAVERSE CITY, Mich., Dec. 22.—Antlers measuring eight feet from tip to tip and huge bones believed to be those of an immense elk have been unearthed on the shore of Pross Lake, Leelanau County, by a trapper. Excavation is being continued. Pioneers here cannot recall ever seeing an elk in this region.

Five Hundred Dollar Fines Imposed on Liquor Sellers

M. M. Churchill and Eva Pennington Given Sentences; Patmore Makes Biting Remarks about "Stool Pigeons"

Proceedings at the police court this morning were quite interesting, and for a few moments the atmosphere was even tense, when Mr. Patmore appearing for the defense in the Pennington case up for hearing, stated that he "would not believe a stool-pigeon on a stack of Bibles." Magistrate McMordie informed Mr. Patmore that in his position of police court magistrate, he was there to hear evidence and not listen to comment, but the defending counsel was nothing daunted, and replied that he was in order and could give voice to that opinion in any court in the land.

There was a large attendance of interested spectators to listen to the case, which resulted in evidence of a decidedly conflicting nature being brought out. Ratherly interest.

The man by the name of Wright who gave evidence in the M. M. Churchill case yesterday again occupied the centre of the stage, and, if anything, was more glib than on his first appearance. He seemed to have an almost fatherly interest in the defendant, constantly alluding to "Eva" in an almost affectionate manner. He was most insistent that it was solely brotherly and philanthropic motives that induced him to escort his newly made friend Schrieber down to Mrs. Pennington's house to procure spirits of some kind for the former's sick wife.

Special Constable Schrieber denied that any mention of his wife was made during the transaction.

Charitable Act.
Mrs. Pennington went in the box to give evidence on her own behalf, stating clearly and straightforwardly that she only gave Schrieber the bottle of liquor after consulting her husband, and feeling assured that she was really doing a humane and charitable act.

Before the magistrate pronounced sentence, Mr. Hooper, the city solicitor, stated for the benefit of the court as well as the public generally that the two men Schrieber and Howe were properly appointed special constables, and that their duties were not specially confined to bootlegging, but to police duty generally in the city.

Fined Five Hundred.
Magistrate McMordie fined the two defendants M. M. Churchill and Eva Pennington for an infraction of the Prohibition Act five hundred dollars with fifty cents cost, respectively.

MONEY FOR HIS FUNERAL BOGUS

Had Been Kept Against Funeral for Sixteen Years.

ELKHART, Ind., Dec. 22.—The money laid away by Walter Moody for his funeral expenses was found by bankers to be counterfeit after it had been spent to meet burial costs for the man, who died two weeks ago. The money, in new twenty dollar bills, had been kept inviolate in the Moody home for sixteen years. Moody's widow, who became his second wife years after he set the money aside, will have to make good the loss.

The case of Joe Polk, up for forgery today was again adjourned in Judge Young's court to January 5.

RESTORATION FOR AUSTRIA

Former Emperor Charles, who is Exile in Switzerland, Seems Confident.

BUDAPEST, Dec. 22.—Former Emperor Charles of Austria-Hungary has sent a letter to his supporters here encouraging them in the hope that he will be restored to the Austro-Hungarian throne.

"Powerful agents are at work to restore the Austro-Hungarian monarchy and thereby prevent the Austrians from joining Germany" the erstwhile monarch wrote from Prangins, Switzerland, where he is still in exile. "Wait patiently, our trusty and well-beloved, the circumstances are favorable and with the help of God I shall return to my faithful Magyar subjects." The letter was brought by a confident to Charles' adherents headed by Prince Louis Windischgraetz, uncle Julius Andrássy and Baron Joseph Szebenyi. If it be warned his partisans against making alliances or conspiring with adventurers because, he wrote, he had no doubt about the ultimate victory of the legitimistic principle.

"My claim," the letter continues, "is supported by the Vatican and backed by the French aristocracy, the clergy and the higher military circles. I hope that the Catholic population of Croatia and Slovakia will be only too glad to return under my sceptre and King Ferdinand of Rumania will not refuse some territorial concessions from me, who saved his throne at the time when Rumania was occupied by the Germans."

CHICAGO POLICE USE GAS BOMBS IN MAKING ARRESTS

CHICAGO, Dec. 22.—Ammonia gas bombs will be used by Chicago police to drive criminals into the open when they barricade themselves in buildings, Chief of Police Fitzmorris has announced. "The gas will be contained in regulation army hand grenades. Lead plugs will be used to cork up the grenades and a four-inch fuse attached will melt the lead when lighted, and release the gas, according to the scheme devised by city engineers."

AUTO ACCIDENTS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—A total of 3,808 persons were killed in automobile accidents, or died as a result of injuries received therefrom, in the United States last year, it is announced by the Census Bureau.

How many children are asking these days the question, "Is there a Santa Claus?" A little girl asked this question twenty-three years ago in a letter to the New York Sun, and the letter was answered in an editorial in that paper, written by one of the wisest and kindest of the great masters of the language who wrote editorials for that paper during the last century. The editorial, and the answer, are among American newspaper classics. It appeared in the New York Sun December 24, 1897, and is here reproduced for the benefit of those who have not read it and for the further enjoyment of those who have for none can read it too often:

Letter of a Little Girl

"We take pleasure in answering at once and thus prominently the communication below, expressing at the same time our great gratification that its faithful author is numbered among the friends of the Sun:

"Dear Editor: I am 8 years old. Some of my friends say there is no Santa Claus."

"Papa says 'If you see it in the Sun it's so.'"

"Please tell me the truth, is there a Santa Claus."

Answers

"Virginia, your little friends are wrong; they have been affected by the scepticism of a sceptical age. They do not believe unless they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge."

Say There Is A Santa Claus

"Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as the love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its

highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus! If there were no Virginia! There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished."

"Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas Eve, to catch Santa Claus, but even if they did not catch Santa Claus coming down, what does that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not there. Nobody can conceive or imagine all the wonders that are unseen and unseeable in the world."

Will Always

Make Children Glad

"You tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes noise inside, but there is no veil covering the unseen world which has the strongest man, nor even the united strength of the men that ever lived, could tear apart. Only faith, fancy, poetry, love, romance can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real? Ah, Virginia, in all this world there is nothing else real and abiding."

"No Santa Claus? Thank God! he lives, and lives forever. A thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the hearts of all childhood."

Is Leaving on a Trip to the West Indies—Rumored Intends Join Western Land Company.

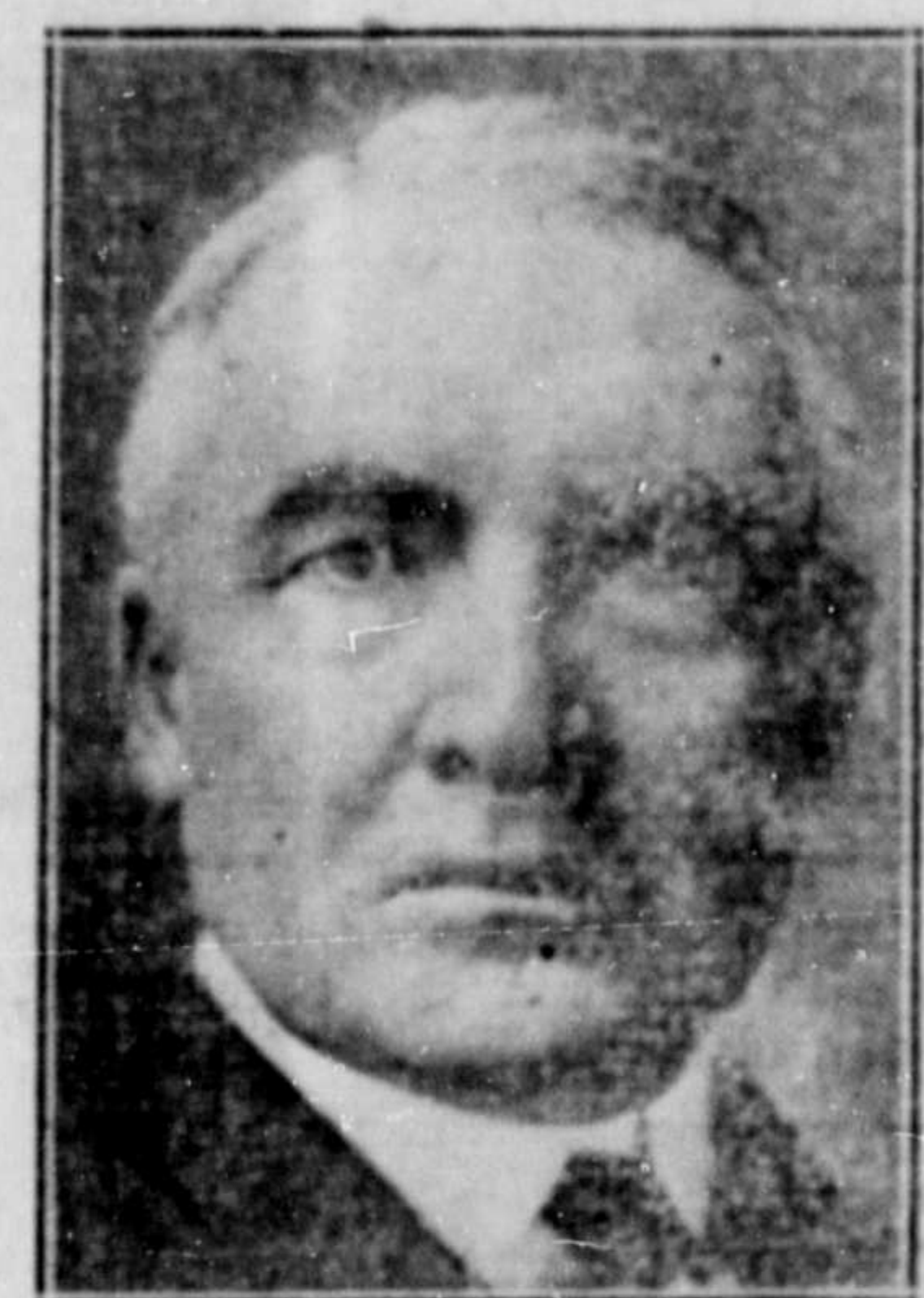
OTTAWA, Dec. 21.—Hon. J. A. Calder, minister of immigration, will shortly leave for the West Indies, and will be absent until after the New Year. The trip, it is understood, has no official significance, though there is little doubt that the minister will do some conferring with regard to the ultimate putting into effect of the terms of the reciprocity pact recently negotiated and awaiting final ratification.

There are those who believe that Mr. Calder will not much longer remain in public life. By his speeches on his western tour the minister, it is thought, has pretty well cut his cables with western connections. It has been rumored prior to the tour that Mr. Calder contemplated joining a western land company.

WILL VISIT PALM BEACH BEFORE INAUGURATION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—President-elect Harding, according to information received here, will spend the last four weeks before his inauguration at Palm Beach, Fla.

At Palm Beach, it is said, the



President-elect and Mrs. Harding will be the guests of Edward B. McLean, publisher of the Washington Post, and Mrs. McLean, who were their hosts last week in Washington.

Close friends of Mr. Harding say that the plan is for the President-elect and Mrs. Harding to leave Marion for Palm Beach about February 9, arriving in Washington March 3, the day before inauguration.

Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

December 22, 1910

Thirty firemen have met their deaths in the flames of a million dollar "fireproof" building in the Chicago stockyard district. Eleven firemen were killed in a Philadelphia conflagration. Frozen water hydrants are menacing these cities, preventing the fighting of fire.

With a long tunnel driven 1,450 feet, orders have suddenly been issued to close down work on the Red Cliff mine at Stewart. The closure causes a sensation in mining circles.

At last night's council meeting, Mayor Stark expressed the wish that at the aldermen would endeavor to get together at a suitable time to have their photograph taken in a group. "The first city council of Prince Rupert will be a historical one," he remarked.

Thomas McClymont has taken out a permit to build a \$5,000 cottage on Borden Street. Mitchell, Currie & Watt are the contractors.

A group of Vancouver and Seattle capitalists have divided \$19,000,000 as the result of the sale of seventy-five square miles of coal lands near Telkwa. The coal on this field is reported to approach almost to anthracite quality.

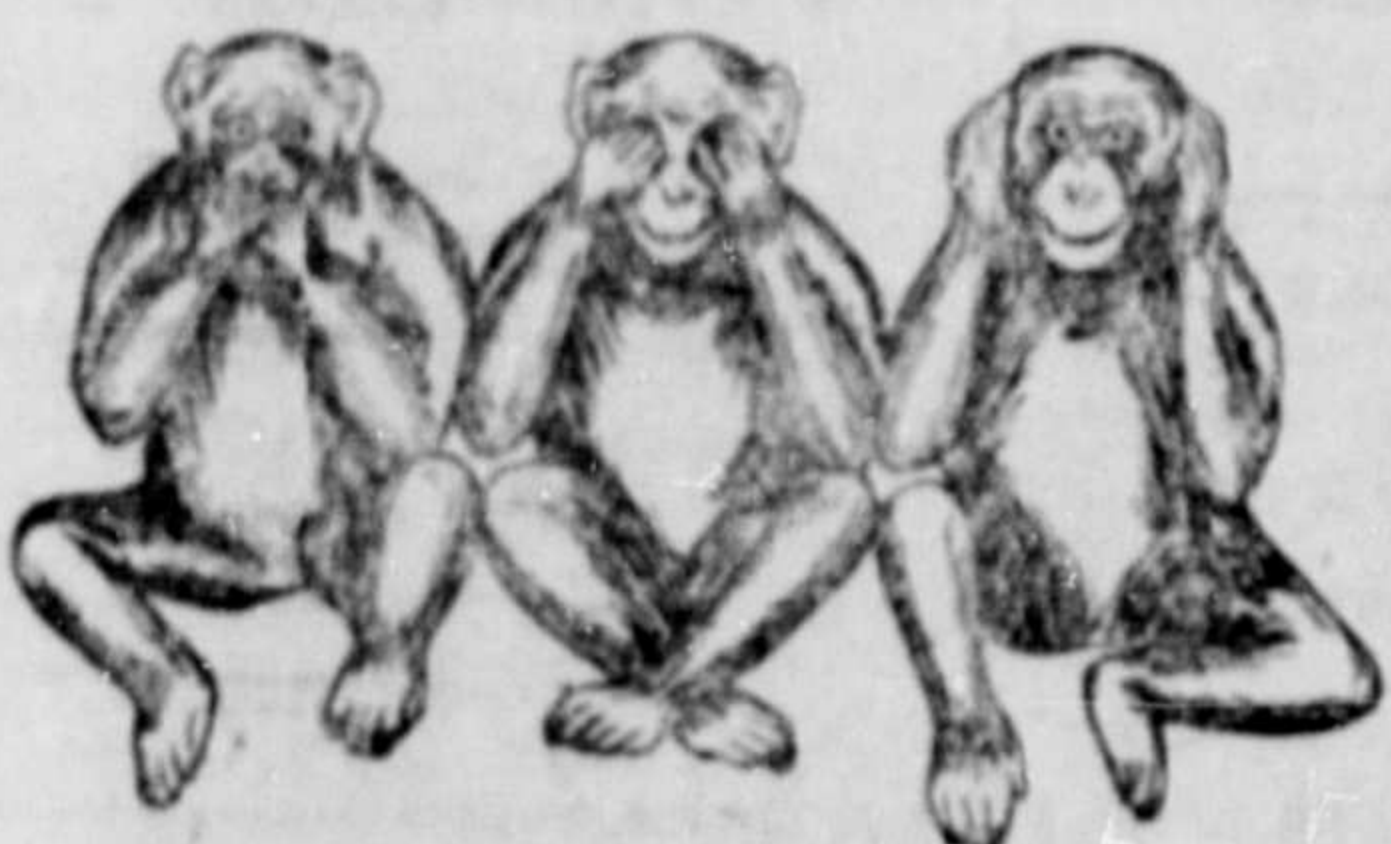

BATHS FOR PUBLIC

Municipal Council Sees Necessity
and will Erect Them

PARIS, Dec. 22.—The Paris
Municipal Council has decided
that public swimming baths are
not only a necessity, but that they
are likely to prove a paying ven-

chitects to prepare plans for three
baths to be erected in Paris
within 18 months. The only

DEAN INGE ON GROUP MIND

Speaks Before Eugenics Education Society; Authority Spurned says Speaker

Addressing the Eugenics Education Society at Wigmore Hall, London, Dean Inge said that members of the eugenics movement were initiating a crusade against the real causes of half the ills which afflicted mankind, but they were still looking upon many quarters as unpractical cranks who wished to interfere with the right of every man and woman to choose a mate. The enemy of eugenics was the anti-scientific temper. At the present time there was a general revolt against the dictatorship of science. There was a great re-emergence of superstition. People were no longer ashamed to believe what they wanted to believe. In politics the anti-scientific temper was rampant. The revolution which more than a hundred years ago guillotined Lavoisier, "having no need of chemists," was now proclaiming it had no need of "intellectuals" of any kind. "The vogue of irrationalists and emotionalists like Benjamin Kidd and Gilbert Chesterton shows what the reading public likes," said the Dean. "The trained mind finds it difficult to realize how utterly confused are the springs of action of the majority—how self interests, and prejudice, and mob contagion, and sentiment, and the wish to believe are combined in an irrational jumble, out of which emerges a something which psychologists dignify by the name of the 'group mind,' but which is really an undisciplined and unsifted bundle of emotions and prejudices, gathering by preference sneaking encephalitis nodulosa round a sentiment rather than an idea. Such is the mentality of the average man who, strong in his numbers, spurns all authority and treats the warnings of science with contempt."

Nineteenth Century England, the Dean proceeded, was a going concern. Post-war England was a zone of concern. The goose that laid the golden eggs was having its throat cut at this moment. There must before long be a thinly disguised repudiation of the scraps of paper on which the nation's debts of honor are inscribed.

BIG MOONSHINE OUTFIT FOUND

Alleged Moonshine Joint is Discovered at Juneau—One Man is Placed Under Arrest

Fire caused by an explosion of gasoline and which ignited alcohol, not only resulted in the discovery of one of what is claimed to be one of the largest stills yet located in Alaska, but also resulted in the arrest of the alleged "moonshiner," says the Juneau Empire.

The fire was in the old Sharick house, a two-story residence, on Gastineau Avenue, up the hill about half a block. The man arrested was John Edwards, better known as "Frozen Foot Johnson."

Big Explosion
Edwards, or Johnson, did not turn in the alarm, for various reasons, but the fire call was made by others who heard the explosion, which shook the hillside, and who saw the smoke issuing from the windows which had been broken by the explosion.

The Fire Department members were quickly on the scene and with chemicals extinguished the fire which was burning in the ceiling of the room where it originated and where it had gradually spread to the roof of the house. Burning alcohol was stubbornly fought, this fluid having been scattered about the room according to the firemen as the result of the explosion.

Chief of Police T. E. P. Keegan arrived at the house shortly after the fire boys had begun work and placed Edwards under arrest. He was then turned over to Deputy United States Marshal W. R. Garster who reached the house shortly after Edwards' arrest was made.

Squealed Itself
Chief Keegan made the complaint which charged "operating a still and having liquor in one's possession."

Edwards was taken to the Federal jail. He received slight burns about the face and arms and his hair was singed in many places. He refused the jailer's request to summon a doctor.

The "still," which consisted of two large tanks, containing mash, various arrangements of coils, etc., together with three barrels of mash, was taken to the Federal jail storehouse under direction of Deputy U. S. Marshal N. O. Hardy.

Chief of Police Keegan stated that he and Federal authorities had been keeping a watch on the locality where the fire occurred for several weeks, but that the alleged moonshine joint squealed on itself.

When the court of revision on the municipal voters' list sat, the name of Percy Webster was ordered struck off the list as it was understood he was deceased. However, M. M. Stephens, his local agent, says that Mr. Webster is, rather, resident in England.

SOCIALIZING COAL FIELDS

German Miners Say They Have Been Deceived by the Government.

BOCHUM, Germany, Dec. 21.—The General Committee of the German Coal Miners' Federation has notified Chancellor Fehrenbach that they intend to force through the Reichstag a law for the socialization of the natural coal fields.

In an open letter to the Chancellor, the Committee has called upon the government to make an unequivocal declaration on the issue. The miners also demanded to know how soon the government proposes to submit to the Reichstag the draft of the new law.

The miners' letter to the Chancellor sets forth that, in view of the promise given to the miners by the government last March and in order to fulfill the Spa agreement and supply the home demands for fuel, the miners have willingly agreed to work overtime in order to stimulate production. They now charge the government with procrastination and allege that they have been deceived in the deliberations carried on by the Socialization Commission and the conference in committee sessions of the Imperial Economic Council.

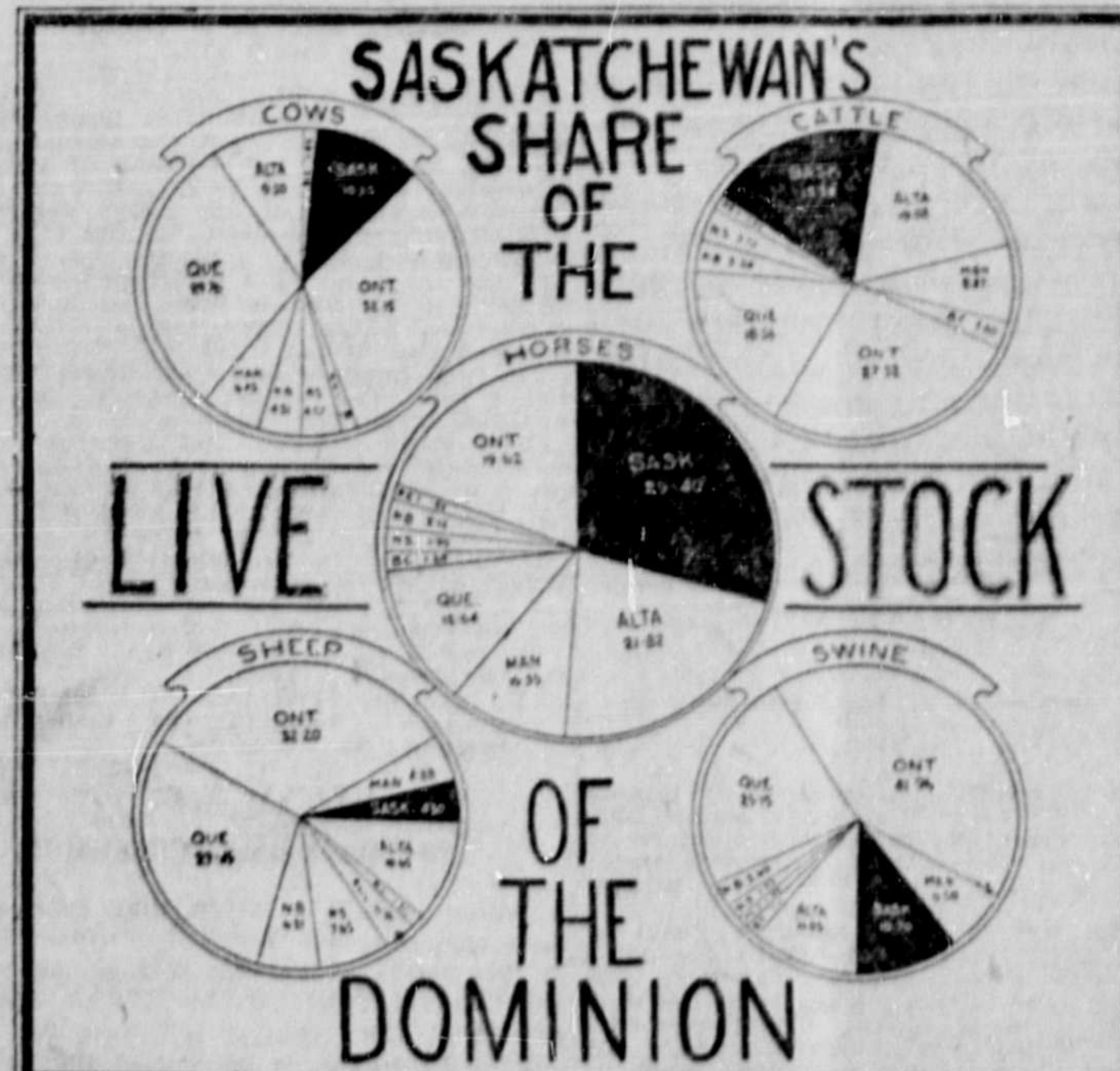

HAYTI COST LIVING IS NOT VERY HIGH

Room and Board at Luxurious
Hotel is \$4 per Day—Not All
Pleasant

PORT AU PRINCE, Dec. 22.—
Labor and living are cheap in
Hayti. There is a hotel in Port
au Prince, rated as the best, that
charges only \$1 a day for a room
and three square meals. True,
the rooms are small, with the
ancient wash-bowl, and unlook-
able doors, with concrete floors
and rugs, but they are clean
and comfortable.

The same meals could not be
obtained anywhere in the United
States at double the price. Lun-
cheon is a regular dinner and
dinner is much like an eight-
course feast. They never serve
less than two or three meats when
one, according to the American
habit, would be enough. There is
frat in abundance in Hayti and a
boy standing on the front porch,
overlooking the sea, often picks
the breakfast oranges.

Chicken Dinner

The favorite dish is the
chicken, served 365 days in the
year without the least variation.
Nobody ever wants to see a
chicken after staying three weeks
in Hayti. A Haytian boy, waiting
faithfully on a guest for twenty-
one meals, beams his delight
when tipped three gourdes, which
is sixty cents. The maid, whose
chief duty is to spread the mos-
quito net, almost drops to her
knees for the same fee weekly.
The boy who fetches the water
and fixes the shoes gladly slips a
man extra towels for three
gourdes a week.

Laundry at American rates
would cost more than room and
board in Hayti if there were
laundries. There is much to go
out from each room daily to
washerwomen and it comes back
spick and span at nominal cost.

Baths Hard to Get

But Hayti has not reached the
point where it may bid for tourist
travel. A man, stopping at the
best hotel here for the first time,
feels rather foolish when he asks
for room and bath and is con-
ducted to a little house 50 feet
away where he may get a shower.

It's a hard life for women.
The best, however, is in sharp
contrast with the worst, for the
over gets 20 cents a day, and
thousands of natives live only on
fruit that grows wild everywhere,
the year round, like the roses.

ALICE ARM

There is already two feet of
snow on the ground at the beach
here.
