RAILWAY HAS COAL BUNKER QUESTION IN HAND

CITIZENS ALREADY ARE MANIFESTING INTEREST IN MUNICIPAL CONTESTS

Railway People Are Working on Plans for a Coal Plant

Orders were given in September to commence gathering data and formulating scheme for handling Black Diamonds at this Port

VANCOUVER, December 23.—The Canadian National Railway Company is already preparing plans for coal bunkers at Prince Rupert. Captain Nicholson, head of the steamship service, in an interview stated that the matter had been under consideration since September last and it had been decided to go ahead and prepare plans for a coaling plant with a view to supplying bunker or cargo coal for either coasting or deep sea purposes.

"I am glad to know that the government of Alberta is interested in shipping coal into and from Prince Rupert," said the captain. "But you will see that we have not been behind hand in realizing the possibilities of the business. It is likely that any plant built will include a conveyor system adaptable to all stages of the tide and other conditions. On this the engineering department will have to decide."

Officer's Opinion
An officer of one of the other shipping companies was very keen in regard to the possible construction of bunkers. He said that if his concern should construct their boats to coal it would be a distinct advantage to be able to bunker at Prince Rupert. The saving of time over Union Bay would be as much as nine hours.

Trans-Pacific Service
"Do not lose sight of the possibilities of trans-Pacific service out of Prince Rupert," said Captain Nicholson. "It is very important. It means a great deal to the city of Prince Rupert and to the railway company. The dock that is now being built, while intended particularly for the handling of salmon, can be used for ocean shipping and the first business done will undoubtedly be handled at it."

NEW STEAMER UNION LINE

Tentative Plans have been Prepared for 220 foot Steamer for Northern Run

VANCOUVER, Dec. 23.—The Union Steamship Company have tentative plans prepared for a new and larger steamer to take the place of the Chelohsin on the northern route. The Chelohsin would be taken to the logging run out of Vancouver for which she was originally designed.

The new plans provide for a steamer 220 feet long, larger than any vessel the company now operates. The demands of the Northern run, which would include among other ports, Ocean Falls, Prince Rupert, Anxox and Alice Arm, make the necessity for a larger boat apparent.

All the boats of the Union Company are kept very busy now catering to the traffic of most every point North of Vancouver as far as Alaska.

BANK OFFICIALS CHARGED MAKING FALSE BALANCES

LONDON, Dec. 23.—Two officials of the Farmers' Bank, which suspended payment a few days ago, are facing charges of making false balance sheets. Misery has been occasioned to many small depositors at the Christmas tide as a result of the failure.

MAYOR APPLYING TO GOVERNMENT TO GET MONEY FOR STREETS

Mayor McClymont is winning today to Premier Oliver asking that the provincial government advance at least \$50,000 to allow for starting of the work of Tarvia B street surfacing, the recommendation for which was adopted at last Monday night's council meeting.

This action is taken on word being received that the government is advancing money to municipalities for the carrying on of public works as a relief measure for the unemployment wave that has reached the province. Mayor and Mrs. McClymont leave tonight for Vancouver where they will spend the holidays. The mayor expects to be back before the last meeting of the present City Council.

BRICKLAYING TO ROOF BY JANUARY FIRST

Despite Loss of Time in Bad Weather, Col. McMordie Reports Good Progress on School.

Despite the fact that during the three weeks of bad weather recently, the workmen on the Hays Cove Circle School could only work four days, Col. McMordie, speaking of the work this morning, said that the bricklaying up to the roof will be completed by January 1 if the present favorable weather continues. Two-thirds of the bricklaying is already done and satisfactory progress is still being made.

UNEMPLOYMENT OVERSHADOWING

Half a Million Registered Unemployed in Britain—Half of Them ex-Soldiers

LONDON, Dec. 23.—The unemployment in Britain this Christmas is even overshadowing the unrest in Ireland. There are half a million men registered unemployed and half of these are ex-soldiers. Three million pounds have been granted by the government to assist in schemes to provide work.

PRINCE RUPERT ARRIVES SAFE

Salvage Company Gets Crippled Vessel Safely Into Port After Uneventful Trip.

MADE TRIP UP COAST ON OWN PROPULSION

When Crews Had Meals Algerins Draw up and Men Transferred to Her—Electricity out of Business.

Twelve weeks after having gone aground and sunk at Swanson Bay the big Grand Trunk Pacific passenger liner Prince Rupert drew into Prince Rupert harbor last night at 9:15 under her own steam and one of the biggest salvage jobs ever performed on the Pacific coast was brought to a successful conclusion.

No Electricity.
Crippled and battered from her wreck and the weeks spent submerged in the salt water, the once beautiful steamer is indeed a sorry sight and contrasted in a marked manner as she lay alongside her sister ship Prince George at the Grand Trunk Pacific dock last evening. Her forward mast is entirely gone and the after one is broken off not far up. Her after funnel is crumpled and the steam from her boilers comes up through a broken-off steam pipe. Her dynamos being completely destroyed the only lighting aboard the vessel was that of lanterns. Her port and starboard lights and a lantern attached to her forward mast were the only lights on the black hulk as she approached the dock in the darkness.

Stopped for Meals.
It is with a good deal of relief that the B. C. Salvage Co. have got the vessel successfully in this port for the accomplishment of that practically completes their responsibility. The trip up the coast from Swanson Bay was uneventful. The Rupert travelled at a slow rate of speed all the way under her own propulsion and the Algerine, the salvage steamer, followed up close behind ready for any emergency. As galleys and all else on the wrecked steamer are ruined and out of business when the crew manning the vessel had to have meals the boats stopped and the Algerine pulled alongside, the men transferring to her.

Glad to Get Here.
Captain Donald was on the bridge of the Rupert and Chief Engineer Dave Cochrane was in the engine room, while Captain Logan, of the B. C. Salvage, and A. L. Brownlie, port engineer, were also aboard supervising generally. When the vessel pulled up to the dock last night there were many townsfolk down to see and as the officers came ashore there were many congratulatory handshakes. On pleasure being expressed to Captain Logan on the safe arrival of the ship here, the captain, looking grim and weatherbeaten in his working clothes and gum boots, said:

GOVERNMENT IS NOW CRITICIZED

Did Ever Lloyd George More Frankly Confess Bankruptcy Statesmanship?

LONDON, Dec. 23.—The Government is being subjected to much criticism from the opposition press on the inadequacy of its unemployment plans. Lloyd George's suggestion that emigration to the colonies is the only remedy has been seized upon by the Westminster Gazette, which asks: "Did ever the premier confess so frankly to the bankruptcy of his statesmanship?"

Labor leaders declare that the 15 shillings which the unemployed are now qualified to receive is quite insufficient.

GERMANY IS ABLE TO PAY

This is Conclusion of Delegates at Brussels Reparation Conference.

BRUSSELS, Dec. 23.—At the conclusion of the first phase of the conference to discuss German reparations, the delegates seem to have a good idea of Germany's ability to pay and of the assistance that the Allies must give Germany to meet their demands. Informal discussions will continue.

CANDIDATES ARE CHOSEN

At the meeting of the Great War Veterans' Association last evening a resolution was unanimously passed supporting J. H. Kelly and Thomas Silversides as candidates for aldermen and Wilfred Macdonald for police commissioner in the forthcoming municipal election. Both Mr. Silversides and Mr. Kelly have assented to the nominations and Mr. Macdonald's acceptance is to be solicited by wire although he stated his willingness to run for the police commission before he left for a business trip in the south. Mr. Silversides leaves tonight for a ten days' trip to the south. It is not known if Mr. Macdonald will be back in time for the campaign. After the regular business of the association last night there was a musical and social gathering at which Capt. C. B. Fornby presided. There were songs and refreshments, with Mr. Webster at the piano and D. Rodman, James Kelly, J. Eggleton, J. Reid, George Durham and J. Wilson, the soloists.

Municipal Election May Be Interesting

Competition Already Assured for the Offices of Mayor, Aldermen and Police Commissioner; School Board Quiet

Interest in the municipal elections is manifesting itself earlier this year than has been the case for some years and already there is competition assured for the offices of mayor, aldermen and police commissioner with several candidates formally announced to be in the running.

George W. Nickerson and Alderman Rochester are the candidates for the mayoralty already announced. Both are prominent business men and likely there will be a keen contest for the office.

All the present aldermen, it is understood, are seeking re-election with the exception of Aldermen McLennan and Currie who have announced their retirement.

SPREAD RAIL CAUSES GRAND TRUNK TRAIN TO LEAVE THE TRACK

TORONTO, Dec. 23.—A spread rail caused the wreck of a Grand Trunk train from North Bay, due here at 8 o'clock this morning. The train left the track north of Gravenhurst. The passengers escaped with nothing more serious than being shaken up slightly.

FIRST COPPER FROM SYDNEY INLET GOES TO TACOMA SMELTER

VICTORIA, Dec. 23.—The first shipment of copper concentrates has been made from the Tidewater Copper Company's plant at Sydney Inlet, on the west coast of Vancouver Island, to the Tacoma Smelter.

REPORTED TO BE DEAD BUT HAS RETURNED HOME

WINNIPEG, Dec. 23.—Major R. E. Mills, who was reported to have been killed in Siberia at the first of the year, has returned here. Until a few weeks ago his wife and relatives thought him dead. There was a happy reunion with the wife and two children.

WOULD REDUCE HERRING RATE

West Coast Vancouver Island to Be Equalized with East Coast on Local Charges.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 23.—Herring packers with plants on the west coast of Vancouver Island decided at the Pacific west-bound freight conference yesterday on lower rates to equalize more nearly with rates from the east coast of the island.

At the present time the west coast pays \$5 local rate from the Island to Vancouver and \$10 from here to the Orient, while the east pays but \$2.50 to here and the same \$10 to the Orient.

PEACE STILL HOLDING GOOD

There is, However, a Hitch in the Irish Peace Discussion—Clute to London.

DUBLIN, Dec. 23.—There is no truth to the reports that peace negotiations have been broken off and there is but a hitch in the peace discussion. The belief is expressed that negotiations will soon be resumed with good prospects for success.

It is reported that Archbishop Clute has returned to London for further consultation with the premier.

ENDORSEMENT OF ALDERMAN KERR

Trades and Labor Council Also Wants S. D. Macdonald to Run for Police Board.

The Trades and Labor Council has endorsed Alderman George Kerr as candidate for the aldermanic board at the forthcoming municipal election and also has assented unanimously to the candidature of S. D. Macdonald for the police commission. The former has expressed his intention of seeking re-election, while Mr. Macdonald, it is understood, has not made up his mind as yet. A committee has also been delegated by the Trades and Labor Council to wait on the candidates for the mayoralty to ascertain their views on certain matters of policy in which the council is particularly interested.

CLASH AT FERRARA OVER SOCIALISTS

Four Were Killed and Thirty Wounded When Demonstration Organized.

BOLOGNE, Italy, Dec. 23.—There has been a serious clash at Ferrara where the Socialists had organized a demonstration to protest against attacks upon their deputies. Four were killed and thirty wounded.

Germany Making Bid.

Germany is coming out boldly with her bids for admission into financial and industrial circles of the world and her propaganda is being distributed further and further afield. Different views are taken as to whether she should be accepted into these circles but one point is often lost sight of. In asking to be accepted Germany is going to benefit herself and strengthen herself. If taken in she will gradually gain strength and power and it was her strength and power that the Allies spent over four wearisome and disastrous years fighting to conquer. Are British people or Canadians going to patronize Germany so soon? Her military strength is being curbed, but is her financial and commercial strength to be allowed to advance?

Is Power Still the Aim?

The decision rests with the conclusion that may be drawn as to the condition which now exists in Germany. Two years ago the country was governed by a "mailed fist" which seemed to hold absolute control. The world knows what this "mailed fist" attempted to do to the rest of the nations and the question arises: Is the "mailed fist" eradicated from Germany? Is the nation now in a condition of true democracy? Does it now exist with a promise in its constitution for fair play within itself and outside of itself or is power still its ultimate aim no matter what the cost? Simply, is Germany now autocratic and military, or is she democratic and peace loving?

Wait Till She Shows Up.

If Germany has reformed then there may be no danger of accepting her and treating her with that forgiveness that Britain too freely extends. But if she has not reformed then she must be refused commercial dealings with us. But no one knows what Germany's present status is and it may take a long time to find out. All of Europe is now passing through a stage of evolution and it seems that it would be well to see what Germany evolves to. Constantine came back—so might Wilhelm. In the meantime the course for us to take with these commercial offers is that of aloof interest. Germany's new existence has not been proved so we should not yet be enthusiastic about regaining her friendship in even commercial lines.

LITERATURE OF REDS BANNED FROM NORWAY

Importation from Russia is Stopped Except Purely Scientific

CHRISTIANIA, Dec. 23.—To stop the importation of Russian Bolshevik propaganda, the Norwegian government has prohibited the importation of literature from Russia no matter in what language it is printed. The only exception is strictly scientific non-political literature.

It has been charged here that the Norwegian socialistic headquarters have been the centre for the distribution to other countries of Russian soviet propaganda literature which is imported from Northern Russia by way of Northern Norwegian towns.

This literature is printed in Moscow in different European languages and preaches civil war and revolution.

It is re-exported by Norwegian agencies and through different channels it is smuggled into other countries. This action has caused unfriendly feelings towards Norway and in some instances Norwegian vessels and crews have encountered trouble in foreign ports.

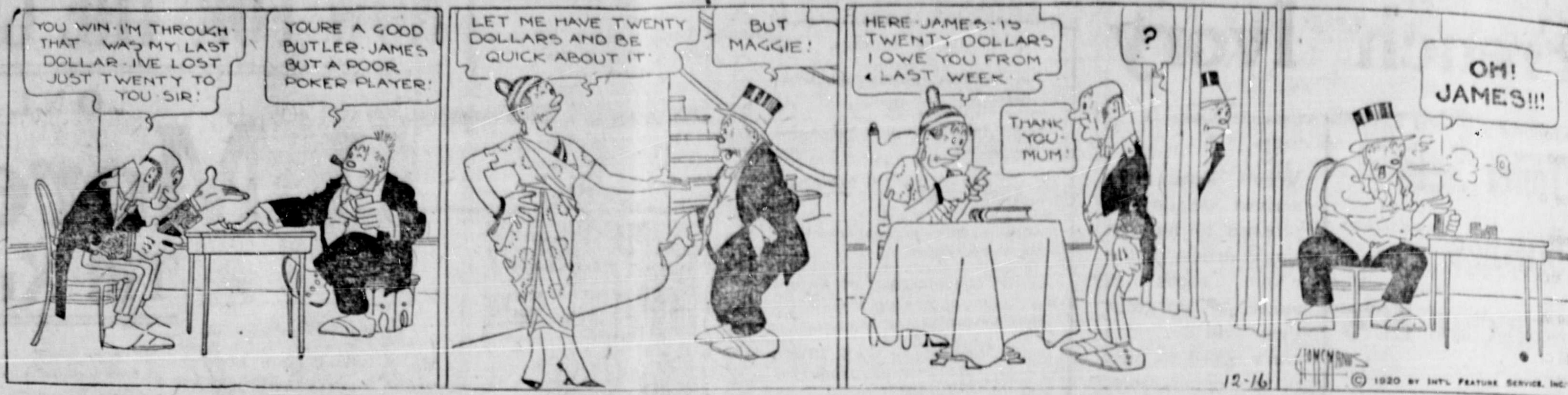

LONG MUSH TO FT. MACPHERSON

Mounted Police Mushers Arrive from Hat River and will Leave for Mackenzie New Years

DAWSON, Dec. 23.—An expedition of Royal Canadian Mounted Police, consisting of five mushers headed by Sergeant Dempster has returned to Dawson after spending two weeks relaying supplies to Hat River 150 miles from Dawson. About New Year's the party will make a final dash for Fort McPherson near the mouth of the Mackenzie River, where they will meet similar expeditions from Herschel Island and Rampart House. The party will be back here in February or March and will likely bring advice from Fort Norman, the new oil centre, and also from the whalers and the explorers wintering along the Arctic Coast in the vicinity of Herschel Island.

GERMAN FINANCIAL FIRM SENDING OUT TRADE LITERATURE

Is Not Getting a Very Enthusiastic Welcome Here and is Looked at Askance

There have been received in the city pamphlets from the "Bank für Handel und Industrie," a German banking institution of Berlin, towards "initiating and increasing business relations between itself and clients at home and abroad." To stimulate the foreign end of its business this institution is also sending out a publication, "Foreign News."

This is not the first German firm that is sending out its propaganda to this country, but the literature is being looked at askance and enthusiasm is not aroused. It is evidently too soon after the war for business relations to be considered with any spirit of enthusiasm.

COLORED MAN GETS SIXTY DAYS' HARD

Benny Brown had Bad Police Record and Served Before

Benny Brown, the colored man, was up on remand before Magistrate McMorde this morning on the charge of having in his possession a concealed weapon, an article known as a knuckle duster.

Upon going into the witness box to give testimony in his own behalf, he gave his explanation of how he came to be on the S.S. Cleghorn the evening of his arrest. Upon being asked by the magistrate as to whether he had ever been up in court before for an offence, he stated that he had been twice, once for sedition and once for indecent exposure.

Warden Bailey upon being called produced a telegram from the chief of police in Vancouver showing that he had been four times before the authorities in British Columbia and had served a two-year term in the penitentiary.

The magistrate informed the accused that it might have been better for him if he had stated the truth whilst on oath in the box, and sentenced him to sixty days' hard labor.

Took Objection.

Before being taken to the cells by the police constable, the prisoner took strong objection to the severity of the sentence, remarking that a fine he thought would have filled the bill.

Warden Bailey again proved the efficacy of the finger print method of criminal investigation, as by its use he was able to obtain corroborative evidence of this particular prisoner's record within four hours of his wiring the Vancouver police. Warden Bailey was the only member of the local police force who was able to state in court this morning just exactly what a knuckle duster was, through having had occasion in the past to have seen them produced in police court proceedings.

DAWSON WAS ENDANGERED

Fire Threatened Food Supply of
Klondyke—Carnegie Library
Burned

DAWSON, Dec. 22.—Several
fires which threatened serious
damage have occurred in Dawson
and vicinity in the past few days.
The weather is very cold and so
below weather is being experi-
enced.

Several hundred dollars damage
was done to the large general
store of the Northern Commercial
Co. The fire department and the
citizens made one of the most im-
portant fights against fire in the
history of the camp, for 90 per
cent of the food supplies of the
entire Klondyke are stored in that
block. Had it been destroyed
3,000 people, dependent on this
stock in Dawson and for miles
around would have faced starva-
tion before spring.

Another fire of unknown origin
did damage to Dawson's hand-
some Carnegie Library. The
damage to the building alone is
\$2,000, which is not covered by
insurance. The fire department
flooded the building, but only five
per cent of the books were lost.

ALEXANDER BELL VISITED EDINBURGH

Aged Inventor of Telephone said
it was Good to be "Home"

EDINBURGH, Dec. 23.—Dr.
Alexander Graham Bell, the in-
ventor of the telephone, paid the
other day what he described as his
farewell visit to his native city.

In reply to a complimentary
address by the Lord Provost, Dr.
Bell, who was warmly applauded,
recalled in an address some of his
early memories. He said that
although he had spent most of his
life in the United States and had
been an American citizen for 50
years, he was glad to be "home"
once again. "I feel I would like
to have a last look round my
native city before I grow too old,"
he added.
