Relations Between Britain and Japan

Despatch Received from London in New York says Changes to be Made

NEW YORK, December 29.—Australian High Commissioner Sheldon says that Australia is ready to combine with America to bar the Japanese. A despatch from London says that Britain is considering amending the Japanese-British treaty under pressure from the Dominions.

FINANCIER IS TAKEN

John L. Etheridge, of Morris Bros., had Prison Record

PORTLAND, Dec. 29.—John L. Etheridge, fugitive ex-president of Morris Bros., bond dealers with offices here and in Seattle and Tacoma which failed to open their doors on Monday, has been arrested in Minneapolis.

Etheridge is a convict with two prison terms in New Jersey. His firm bought Edmonton city bonds and was unable to pay for them.

AERIAL TRAM PREMIER MINE

Northwest Mining Truth Says That One is Projected.

The Northwest Mining Truth of Spokane dated December 2 carries the following:

"Rimlet Tramway Co. of this city has been commissioned by the American Smelting and Refining Co., through H. A. Guess, managing director of mining operations, who spent some days in the city a few weeks ago, to make a complete investigation of transportation problem confronting the Premier Gold Mining Co., operating in the Portland Canal District, with the ultimate purpose of constructing an 11-mile aerial tramway to tide water at Stewart. It is understood that it has been found almost impossible to keep the road from the mine in repair, at least with economic results, though large sums have been spent. The drop between the No. 2 tunnel, where shipments originate, and tidewater is about 1400 feet, of which 900 feet occurs in the first three miles. It is believed that an aerial tramway can be constructed at a reasonable expense, although some power may be necessary to start the load and keep it moving over the flatter areas." The mine now has several hundred tons of high-grade ore ready for shipment, averaging value being estimated at about \$500 per ton in silver and gold.

The Portland Canal News says that officials of the company at Stewart deny that an aerial tramway is being projected and when Mr. Guess was questioned by the News as to transportation problems at Stewart on his recent visit here he made no mention of it.

TEN PER CENT DROP IN RAILWAY WAGES

MONCTON, N. B., Dec. 29.—Beginning with January 1, it is understood that a 10 per cent reduction in working hours will be put into effect in the C.N.R. shops at Moncton and in other shops all over the system. The management has proposed to the shop employees that instead of laying off any men during the winter months a forty-hour week instead of forty-four be worked from January 1 until April 1. At a meeting of the labor unions here it was agreed to accept this proposal and consequently the reduction in working hours is expected to go into effect the first of the year.

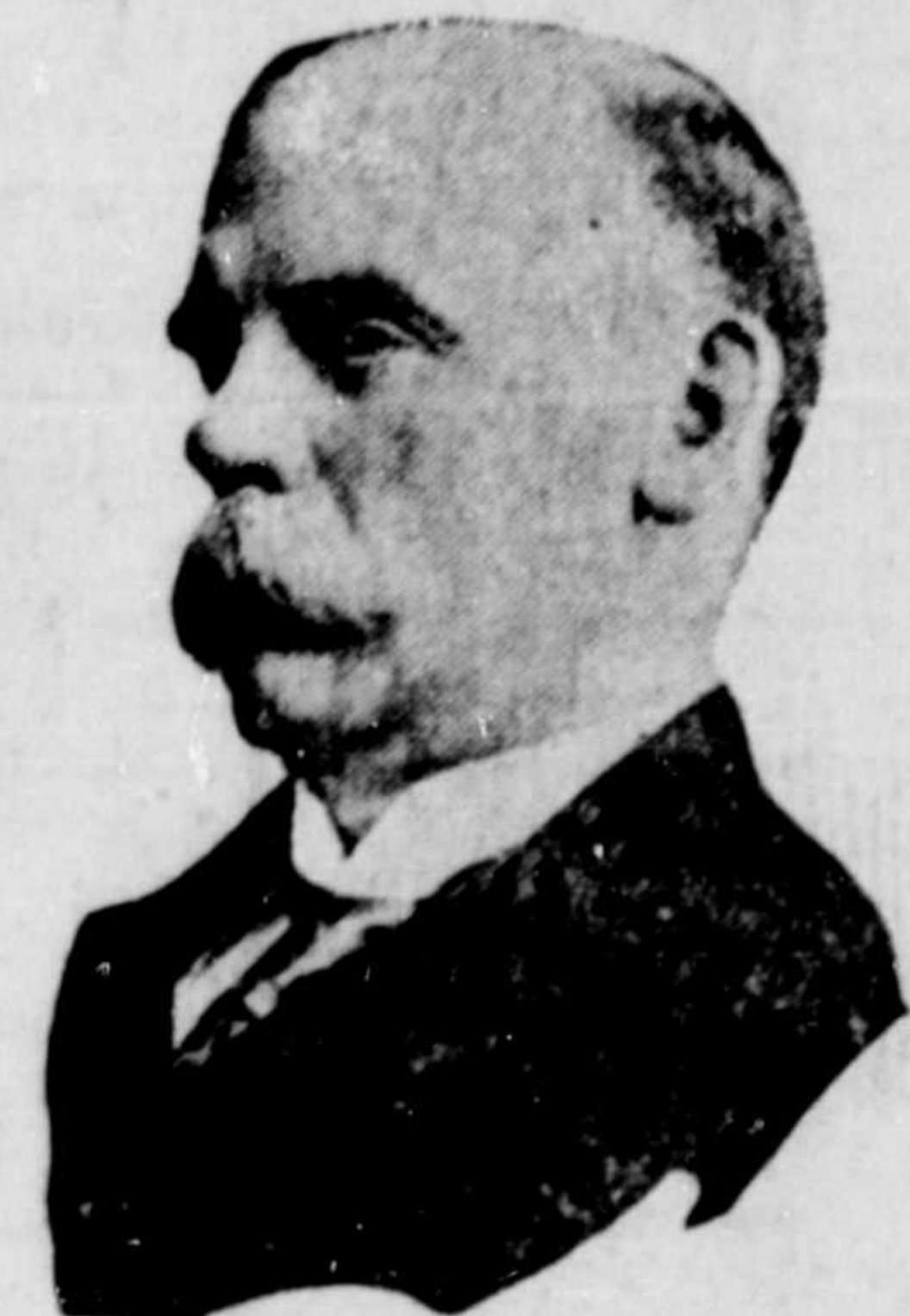
SCHOOL BOARD REMOVES ORDER

STEAMERS FOR THE NEW NORTH

Port Simpson, Craft Well Known Here, Being Shipped to the Mackenzie River.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 29.—Capt. T. P. Kelly, the assistant chief commissioner of the Hudson's Bay Company, is here to place the contracts for two boats for shipment knocked down to the lower Peace and Athabasca rivers.

The Port Simpson, one of the company's boats in service in the early days on the Skeena river, is being dismantled for shipment to the Peace or Mackenzie rivers to assist in the rush that is expected in the spring.

HINDU CHARGED WITH SUPPLYING LIQUOR

Chunga Singh Appeared in Police Court and was Remanded

It was not old Gungba Din, the Hindu water carrier immortalized by Rudyard Kipling, but a gentleman of the same race, of the name of Gungba Singh, who could be more aptly described as a beer carrier who appeared before Magistrate McMordie in the police court this morning charged with supplying liquor to an Indian youth named Roderick Pollard of Port Simpson. Both the Indian and the Oriental on being addressed by the magistrate gave but slight evidences of ordinary intelligence.

Upon getting at the facts of the case, which was rather difficult, as the Indian boy was typically stoical and reticent, offset by the volubility of the Hindu, it transpired that the latter had stood the Indian lad several drinks of beer at a local bar. Gungba Singh went into the witness box in his own defence, the case being finally remanded until tomorrow to allow the accused to bring further witnesses.

BIG CONTRACT ON GOLD COAST

J. W. Stewart and Associates Reported to have Secured \$17,000,000 Job

VANCOUVER, Dec. 29.—It is reported that Major General J. W. Stewart and associates have been awarded a contract by the British Government for the first unit of a railway and other development work on the African Gold Coast at a figure of \$17,000,000.

SUDDEN MOVING AT ALICE ARM

Railway Out of Commission 20 Miles Had to Walk 18 Miles.

It was certainly not very cheering news that was sprung on the boys at the Dolly Varden mine early on the morning of the day following Christmas. Awakened by the foreman from their slumbers shortly after five o'clock, told to get up, roll their blankets, get their breakfast and then, and "hike" over a snowy trail a matter of eighteen miles to the town of Alice Arm in time for dinner if they wanted any, as none was going to be served at the mess that day, or for some time to come for the matter.

As things looked at the moment the peace and goodwill spirit with which all had had been imbued the previous day was shut off at the main and a very natural feeling of grouch and soreness took its place. In many cases a good deal of inconvenience and hardship will be attendant upon most of the miners, especially at this season of the year.

The little town of Alice Arm, which had been temporarily buoyed up by the circulation of a considerable amount of money through the cashing of the men's cheques, some of them having a considerable amount coming, will possibly have to face a lengthy period of hard times until the big mine opens up again. It is reported that the bootleggers and blind pigs are doing a thriving business, the camp bearing a distinctly open appearance.

INVESTIGATING IN MISSING MAN CASE

Warden Bailey Finds No Clue as to Disappearance

Nothing further has developed in regard to the mystery surrounding the disappearance of H. A. Dyke, the missing dredge employee. Warden Bailey, who has been carrying on a most careful investigation, has traced the actions of the missing man up to nine o'clock on the evening of Christmas Eve. He was then seen by fellow employees at the corner of Sixth Street and Third Avenue dressed in his walking out clothes and apparently, like everyone else, enjoying the Christmas Eve festivities. It was learned by Warden Bailey that he must have returned to his room at the Central Hotel and changed again into his working clothes some time that night, as the latter were gone from his room and the other suit was there in their place. He did not occupy the room that night. It is believed now that he did not have much money on him. Fear is expressed that some accident may have overtaken the man on the waterfront, though there was nothing to take him down to the dredges that is known of.

D'Annunzio Surrendered In Fiume This Morning

FIUME, December 29.—D'Annunzio this morning surrendered all his powers to the Fiume communal council. General Cavigaglia will arrange conditions for peace with a delegation from the council today. In the meantime hostilities have been suspended in the Fiume valley.

SHIP REPAIR MEN ARRIVE

ARMISTICE IN FIUME

EDITORS URGE CURTAILMENT NAVY SCHEMES

Felt that if America Goes Ahead with Ambitious Plans will have Do Likewise

LONDON, Dec. 29.—The British newspapers are calling upon Great Britain, Japan and America to curtail their naval expenditures by mutual consent. The editors agree in the fear that if America carries out her scheme for a new naval program England will have to do likewise.

ARCTIC WRECKS LEWIS ISLAND

Seattle Halibut Schooner Well Known Here is Now Ashore in Bad Plight.

The Seattle halibut schooner Arctic hit the rocks of Lewis Island at 3:10 yesterday morning and is now heeled up in a bad position on the beach with her captain and crew standing by.

This news was brought to town today by Ole Phillipson, one of her crew, and the cook named Johnson. The big schooner went up in a blinding snow squall and is in such a position that she cannot be floated off for some time so an effort is being made to have a tug boat go off and pull her off. The vessel is in bad plight for she is heeled on a rock and rises and falls with the tide so there is danger that she will be smashed up if a storm comes up. The Arctic, which is a 65-foot schooner, is owned in Seattle, but is well known here for she has often sold her catches at this port. When the wreck occurred the boat was on the way south from Ketchikan to Seattle where the crew had intended spending New Years.

Strong Editorial in Vancouver Paper.

A Vancouver Sunday morning editorial says in part: "Facing a deficit of sixty-odd million dollars on National railways and the people burdened with enormous taxes on incomes and the necessities of life, one would expect the Dominion Government to come to its senses in the matter of non-productive expenditures. Every business man in Canada, regardless of his political affiliations, will read with disgust and alarm the announcement that Premier Meighen and his colleagues have contracted to spend from four to eight million dollars of the Canadian taxpayers' money on a drydock at Victoria which is known to be about as practical a business proposition as building two costly railway stations in Vancouver within one hundred feet of each other and the initial outlay is not the most serious one involved. Transfer the millions wasted on non-productive investments such as the Prince Rupert dry dock and the outer wharves at Victoria into real live business and revenue producing propositions and the country would not be facing the situation of bread lines in every Canadian city."

Rupert Wants Her Dry Dock Going.

The editorial comes out boldly with the facts and places the situation in a clear and unmistakable light. Prince Rupert's cry is "Operate the dry dock" and it is hard for us to understand why the government is going to duplicate it at Victoria when here it already owns one that is up to date, efficient and capacious and could be put into operation on almost any kind of a marine job in very short notice. Its position is as convenient and strategic as Victoria's, and it truly seems unreasonable that while such a plant as the local one remains idle that another one in its same mould should be going in at Victoria.

Vancouver Wanted It Herself.

Vancouver's protest against the Victoria dock is not actuated by any desire to see all the business come here—that is a certainty. The reason for her protest is the fact that Victoria is getting the plant that she wanted so badly herself and fought so hard for. If Vancouver had obtained the new drydock she would not have come out with a cry like the present one. Prince Rupert's stand is that she wants to see her plant operating for what it would mean to the city in a business way. At the same time the extravagance of the putting in of the new dock at Victoria cannot be overlooked no matter in what political color one may view the situation.


Board of Trade Working Hard.

The Board of Trade has been making every effort to get the local dock reopened to repair business and is still working to that end. In even the past few weeks business has been lost that might have been done here and big jobs are now offering again. If these jobs are lost without an attempt having been made to get them by placing tenders or if the local yard is passed up because it is not in operation, it will be another grievance that will rankle in the minds of the people. More power to the efforts of the Board of Trade and success to their energy!

BIG QUANTITIES OF LIQUOR COMING WEST

Over One Hundred Carloads per Month Shipped West from Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, Dec. 29.—More than ten times as much liquor as a year ago is now being brought into western Canada in carload lots, it was authoritatively stated here. A quarter of the carload shipments coming into the west remain in Winnipeg, and, with few exceptions, it is "hard stuff."

Those in close touch with the transportation of liquor state that the shipments from eastern Canada into the west have gradually increased till well over one hundred carloads per month are now being handled into Winnipeg for local use and distributing centres throughout the prairie provinces and British Columbia, to say nothing of express shipments which are especially heavy in anticipation of "high" observance of the festive season. Increased shipments are partly traceable, it is stated, to preparation against the indefinite period of drought, expected to commence in Manitoba in January.

Special Policemen

Few instances have been reported of thefts of liquor shipped in carload lots, largely because the railways are employing constables who do nothing else but ride in trains in which there are liquor shipments, this business giving employment to constables who otherwise would have been without employment.

While the express companies take every precaution to guard against the small shipments of liquor entrusted to their care, it is said that purchasers consider themselves lucky if 75 per cent of what they bought arrives. A story goes the rounds of a westerner who received nothing but a case of empty bottles. It is said the case was placed on a radiator in a car, heated until the corks popped, and the liquor poured into a container without the case being opened.

Berkeley, California, Police to Adopt More Drastic Methods

BERKELEY, Dec. 29.—With more than one hundred University of California students caught by the police during the past week engaged in dice games, Chief of Police August Vollmer has announced that a new policy for the handling of gambling offences would be adopted by his department. Beginning Monday, every student caught gambling will be arrested for violation of a city ordinance, will be prosecuted in the local police court, and a transcript of the evidence in the case will be submitted to President David P. Barrows of the University, with the recommendation that the student affairs committee take action in the matter.

The popular gambling game among the University students, according to police reports, is "African golf." In several instances during the week games have been interrupted by the police after they had run all night. One game was broken up in a room of one of the principal hotels near the campus.

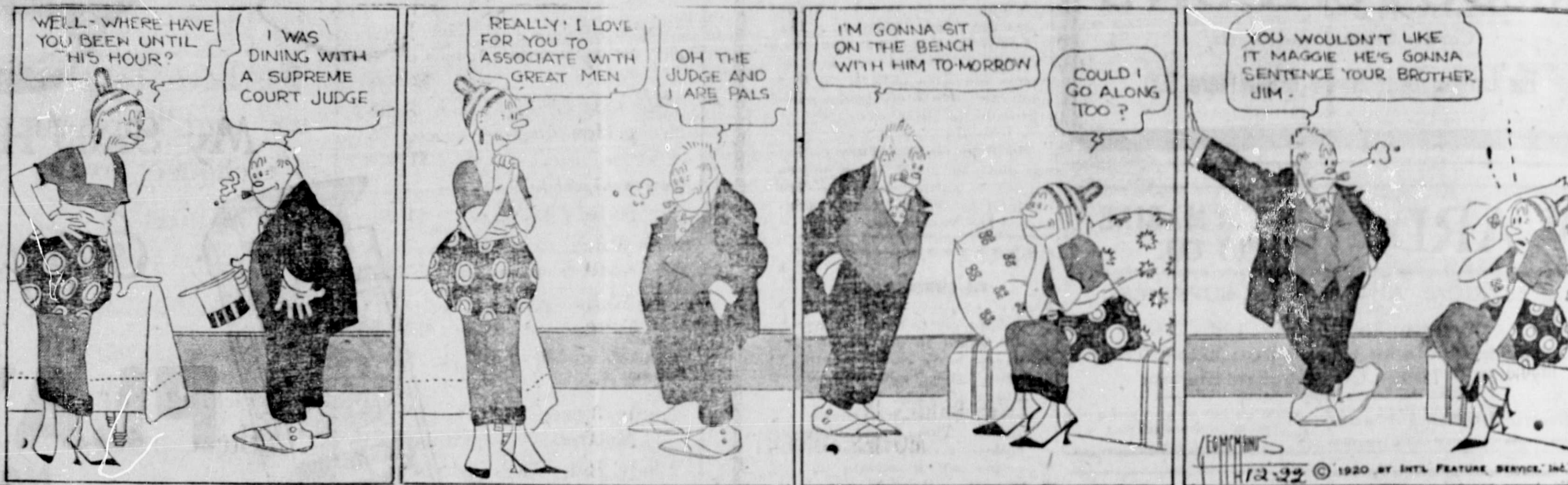
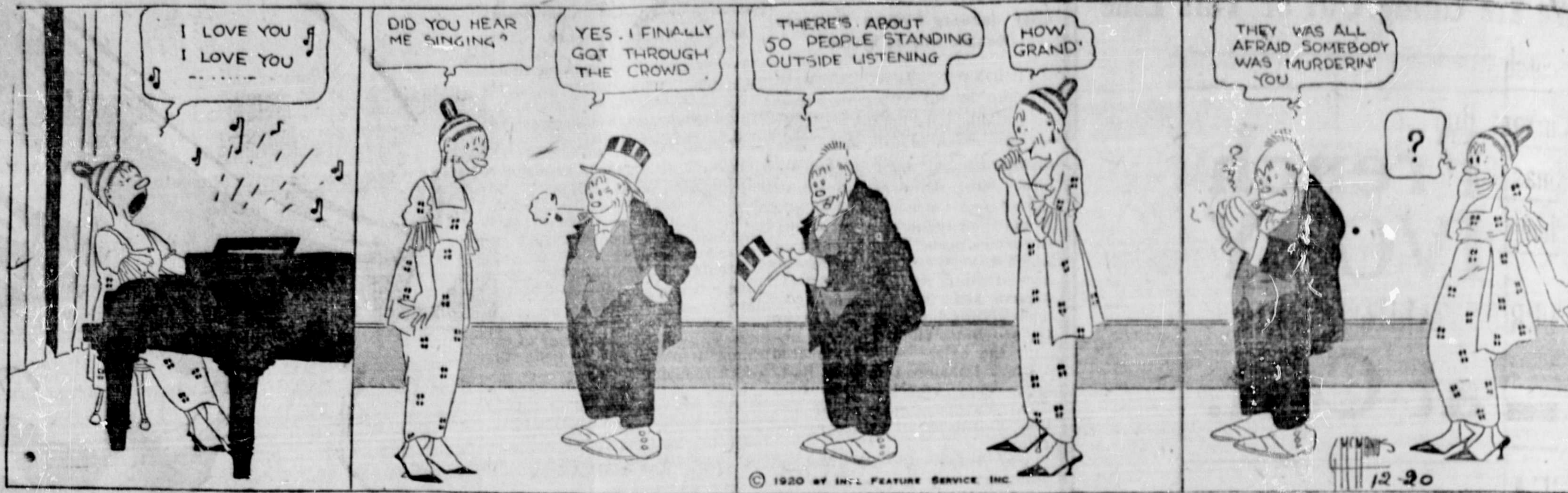

CLOTHIER AND ALASKAN ROAD

Asks Co-operation of Governor Riggs on Unuk River Road

A request has been received by Governor Thomas Riggs from G. A. Clothier of Prince Rupert, resident engineer of the North-western Mining Survey District of British Columbia, for co-operation in building a wagon road up Unuk River and into the mineral district lying across the International Boundary on the Canadian side, says the Alaska Enquirer. Mr. Clothier states that if he can be assured of American co-operation he will ask the Provincial government for funds to carry out his portion of the project.

The road suggested would run from Burroughs Bay up the Unuk River valley for a distance somewhat greater than 25 miles. There is already some travel through the valley over a trail constructed by the Alaska Road Commission. Little is known about the country adjacent to the river, but maps show it to be of conglomerate formation favorable to mineral deposits. Just what mineral deposits have been uncovered on the Canadian side of the border is not known.

Governor Riggs will probably submit the communications of Mr. Clothier to the Territorial Road Bureau, but it is likely that some investigation of the district would be necessary before a definite recommendation for road-work could be submitted or considered.

KELLEY PLANS ON ECONOMY

Makes Reports to Hon. J. D. Reid on Co-ordinating of Railways.

OTTAWA, Dec. 29.—President Kelley of the Grand Trunk, who is chairman of the committee of management appointed under the Grand Trunk acquisition act, has made a report to Hon. J. D. Reid, minister of railways, covering economies effected in the co-ordination of the operation of the Grand Trunk and Canadian National systems up to November 30 last. Although much has been accomplished in the process of consolidation, there are still many matters under consideration in

connection with which there are legal or physical difficulties which must be dealt with before parallel tracings can be abandoned, and more direct connections established which will permit a further considerable saving in train mileage. Capital expenditure connected with the consolidation of facilities to date amount to \$508,475 at an annual cost of \$75,927. But this expenditure will result in a saving per annum estimated at \$965,775. In addition there is a credit to capital account of Canadian National railways from salvage of \$338,000.

Eastern Lines.

A saving of over \$300,000 per annum is rendered possible by the routing of freight by Grand Trunk between Toronto and Napanee and Ottawa, and Grand Trunk between Napanee and Montreal. Similarly a further saving of \$100,000 has been made possible by more economic routing of passenger traffic in Ontario. In addition, a saving of about a quarter of a million a year will result from the combining of Toronto passenger and freight terminal facilities and staffs. 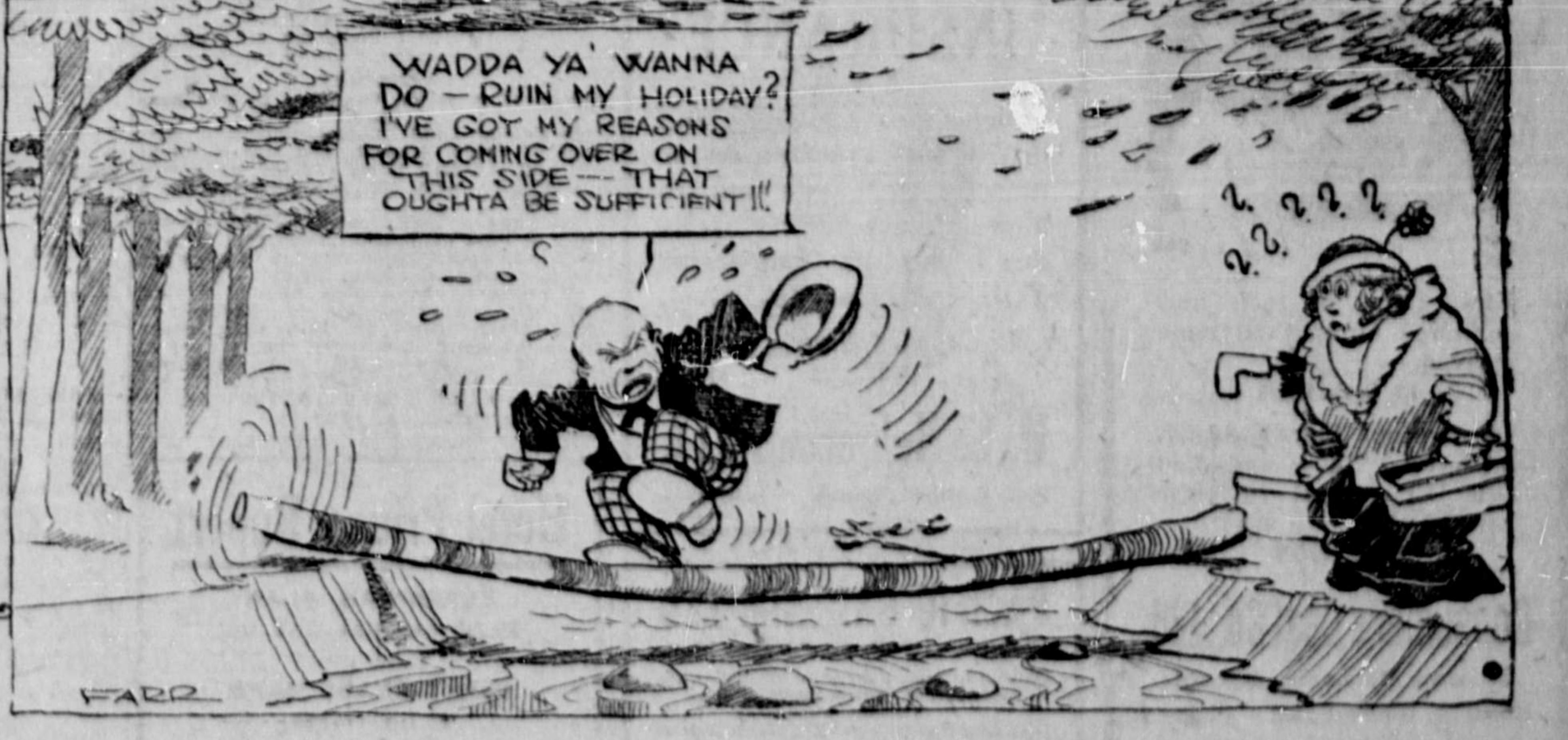

**MAYOR CHURCH
RUNNING AGAIN**

He and His Opponent Samuel Mc-
Bride Have Much in
Common.

TORONTO, Dec. 29.—"Dick" Whittington, who was three Lord Mayor of London, had nothing in length of mayoralty service on "Tom" Church, better known as "Tommy" Church, but more dignifiedly described as Thomas Langton Church, K. C., who has been for six consecutive years "the boy bachelor" mayor of Toronto, Canada, and is offering himself for election on New Year's Day for the seventh term. There are many, in addition to Mr. Church himself, who are confident that he will be Mayor Church for the seventh year. Why shouldn't "Toronto the Good" continue on the list of Canadian mayors as "that city of Church's" is the question propounded by the present mayor's enthusiastic supporters.

Apparently the only serious opposition that Mayor Church will encounter in his appeal for reelection will be Samuel McBride, former member of the Board of Control, and for many years a city councillor. McBride is putting up a vigorous campaign and is enlisting considerable support among business, professional and other interests who declare that "it is time for a change." On the other hand Church has undoubtedly made many friends during his long incumbency of office, and is prepared to make a stiff fight to retain what his municipal opponents have for some time been describing as "Tommy's life job." There is no other issue of any outstanding importance between the two candidates.

Opposed Before.
McBride ran against Church last New Year's Day, and was beaten by a plurality of about 5,000 votes. There was a third candidate at that election—J. H. H. Ballantyne, who received 5,589 votes, and Church was elected by plurality vote on a minority of 685 under the combined totals of the two other candidates.

Mayor Church's doughty opponent is a lumber merchant. Publicly does not count for much in the contest, both Church and McBride are "Tories" and both are members of the Orange Order, as is also Ballantyne. McBride is a candidate for municipal honors in the city of Toronto.

Another thing both "Tommy" and "Sammy" have in common is the sporting instinct. Church was recently elected a member of the International Baseball League and McBride is president of the Hill-West Racing Association. They have both been connected with athletic and sporting activities for many years, and both are of Toronto birth and education. At the same time the City of Toronto takes its municipal politics very seriously, as witness the fact that it sacrifices a New Year's Day holiday for civic electrification, results of elections for the city council, board of education on that day are always awaited with great interest by all classes of the city's population.
