## GRANBY AND THE C.P.R.CO.

Victoria Report Says Properties to Be Taken Over.

VICTORIA, Dec. 30.—Rumors at noon are still insistent that the Granby Company's holdings will be taken over by a company in close alliance with the Canadian Pacific. It is believed that the report is true.

## MECHANICS WANTED FOR SERVICE WITH CANADIAN AIR FORCE

Walter Hume Has Been Appointed Recruiting Officer Here.

Pay will be granted during the training period with uniform, travelling allowance and transportation.

## Naval Armaments Causing Concern to London Papers

Advise Conference between Great Britain, Japan and United States on Question

LONDON, December 30.—Insistence upon the desirability of restricting the construction of naval armaments and the holding of a conference on the subject between Great Britain, Japan and the United States has been renewed again by the London newspapers.

The London Times, saying that the belief was widespread in the United States that Britain was bound by treaty to support Japan in the event of that country entering war with the United States, devoted more than half of a long editorial in an effort to convince the people of the United States that this belief was "grotesquely false."

The question of naval armaments is giving concern to leading statesmen of Europe as it is the general feeling that if United States and other nations are to continue lavish expenditures in extensive improvements to their navies, Britain will be compelled to take the same course and the efforts of the League of Nations towards the security of world peace will be greatly endangered.

The local branch of the Boys' Naval Brigade is making satisfactory progress under the able guidance of G. V. Ewitt. The boys are all keen and enthusiastic and as the Spring comes on and it becomes possible to get to sea for instruction, it is expected that great strides will be made towards getting material ready for Canada's navy and merchant marine.

Already there are ten uniforms here with five more to follow for the first fifteen recruits on the list, whilst Russell Buffer, coming sixteenth, will get the uniform that has been donated by L. M. De Gex, manager of the local branch of the Bank of Commerce.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 30.—The appointment of G. M. Sinclair, for nine years manager of the Royal Bank at Eamloops, to the Prince Rupert branch has been officially confirmed. He succeeds A. W. Cameron who is going to the assistant-managership of the Vancouver main office.

## Fish Production in Canada Drops

On British Columbia Coast Salmon in November decreases but Halibut and Herring rise

OTTAWA, December 30.—The value of the fish catch in Canada during the month of November just past decreased nearly \$1,000,000 from the figures for the same month a year ago. The catch for both coasts this November was 38,220,800 pounds valued at the boatside at \$1,155,153. There was a decrease of more than 3,000,000 pounds in the aggregate catch of haddock, cod, pike and pollock on the Atlantic coast.

The catch of salmon on the Pacific was 16,700,000 pounds less than that of November, 1919, while the catch of herring was 14,600,000 pounds greater. Halibut was taken in greater quantities by Canadian and American schooners, the latter bringing in more than two-thirds of what was landed in British Columbia.

**Hard Winter for  
Senate Aspirants.**

It has every appearance of being a long, hard winter for senate aspirants, says the Toronto Saturday Night. Their gloom has been deepened by the announcement that most of the existing vacancies will be kept in cold storage for members of the parliament and cabinet ministers who are tired of the day's burden and heat and of whom, the public is correspondingly tired. This policy of selection from the inside has taken much joy out of the lives of those patriots who are convinced that the state should award them adequate protection by the gifts of something tangible in recognition of their past political services. The feast is set but the banquet is set apart for those who have already dined and wined at the public expense and for whom these life sinecures are reserved.

**Haven for  
Tired Politicians.**

Premier Meighen has eight vacancies in the upper house at his disposal and the appointments to the senate is one of his prerogatives. Although ministers from the provinces interested are consulted sometimes the final choice rests with the leader of the government. He can go ahead and consult no one if he so chooses but his path is being made miserable by the importunities of those who think that they could shed lustre upon the Chamber of Sleep. Ever since there has been a senate it has been regarded in the light of a most comfortable form of paid up annuity insurance. It is the real old man's home where the worn out professional dispenser of political prescriptions might find a quiet abiding peace with the title of Honorable tacked to his name and such little perquisites as free transportation on all railroads, subsistence allowance of twenty dollars a day for the sessions, membership in the best clubs and four thousand dollars a year. It is regarded by many a distressed mariner on the stormy sea of politics as the real harbor for his waterlogged chaloupe. Afar he sees the glimmer of its beacon and with the words of the old hymn "Pull for the Shore" on his lips, he bends to the oar.

Sir George Foster.**

The Borden government had considerable trouble with a hostile senate but in the course of time the Grim Reaper came to Borden's aid and the actively pugnacious majority was changed into a docile minority. Today the Meighen government has a handsome lead in the Senate over and above the eight vacancies which Mr. Meighen has up his sleeve of that well-worn sack suit of his. Mr. Meighen is keeping his own counsel and no one can pull a closer lip than he. He has cabinet reconstruction on his hands and there is no nicer way of disposing of one of the problems than by appointment to one of the cushion jobs of Sir George Foster. He is fitted admirably for the senate and could make philosophical speeches by the hour with none to say him nay for they would all be asleep. There are other members who have also seen their best days in the house and with a general election around the corner, with frenzied farmers and ferocious Flynnis, anything is apt to happen. There are many of the Old Guard looking for a place into which to crawl. Arthur loveth his own and the needy are about the hearthstone.

**TOUCHING SCENES  
AT ABBEY TOMB****Fact that Soldier Is Unknown  
Attaches Unusual Feeling**

LONDON, Dec. 30.—Scores of touching incidents have been witnessed at the tomb of Britain's "Unknown Warrior" in Westminster Abbey as long lines of men, women and children have passed the black marble slab covering the grave, for several days since the burial there of the unidentified soldier.

The fact that no one knows the name of the man who lies beneath the slab leads many to offer tributes in the hope perhaps that the body is that of a missing son. The mother of one of the thousands of unknown warriors, any one of whom might be reposing in Westminster Abbey, laid three war medals, the Mons Star, the Victory Medal and the British War Medal on the grave as she passed in the line. They had been awarded to her only son who was wounded three times and afterwards reported missing.

A soldier's modest offering of flowers bore the inscription: "In loving memory of my two pals and all the other pals."

The epitaph placed on the slab reads: "For King and Country—Greater Love Hath No Man Than This."

## CHARGES MORE SLAVE TRADING IN AFRICA

LONDON, Dec. 30.—Charges that there has been a rerudescence of slave trading practices over wide areas in Angola, a Portuguese possession in West Africa, have been presented to the Assembly of the League of Nations by the Anti-Slavery and Aborigines Protection Society. These charges are contained in the copy of a memorial previously sent to the British government including evidence from Portuguese and other sources concerning alleged slave trading.

The Society appealed to the League of Nations to take cognizance of these charges and, if possible, secure an exhaustive inquiry into the whole system of Portuguese labor in West Africa.

### TAFT GIVES FORD VERBAL FLAYING

Says Statement Jews Trying for  
World Power is False

CHICAGO, Dec. 30.—William Howard Taft, former president, verbally flayed Henry Ford, automobile manufacturer, for his attacks on Jews, which have been appearing in Ford's weekly publication.

Taft said statements in Ford's paper that the Jews are trying to gain control of the world is false. In pointing out the fallacy of the statement that Jews are the leading capitalists and international bankers of the world, Taft cited that more than half of the thirteen million Jews in the world are still suffering not only oppression and persecution, but the bitterest penury and starvation.

They have appealed to legislators and members of commercial bodies in the United States to aid them in bringing about passage by Congress of a federal incorporation act for American companies in China, which is expected to come before Congress in December.

VERNON, B.C., Dec. 30.—Among the thousands of tributes from all over the Empire laid at the foot of the cenotaph erected in London "to the unknown warrior," was a wreath from the people of Vernon.

It was placed there by Rev. E. P. Laycock, formerly of Prince Rupert, and bore the inscription "From the people of Vernon, B.C., in proud memory of their glorious dead."

### Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records may be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions without adjustment, but must make necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for two years and make improvements to value of \$100 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than two years, and has made proportionate improvements, may be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be granted provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Persons holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he farms, without actual occupation, provides necessary improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted lands.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites; those not so used after fulfilling residential and improvement requirements.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mineral rights may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and surviving in His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person to four years and one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 25, 1918.

Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys advanced for return of moneys advanced and interest paid since August 4, 1914, on account of pre-emption fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Armed Forces or dependents, acquired direct or indirectly, and from entitlement to March 1, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from persons who failed to complete purchases in original fortunite of fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price, due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area.

Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

### SHANGHAI AMERICANS WANT TAX EXEMPTION

Claim Put at Disadvantage to  
English who do Not Pay

SHANGHAI, Dec. 30.—American commercial bodies here and American commercial interests generally in China are engaged in a campaign to induce the United States Congress to pass a law relieving them from payment of income tax to the United States Treasury.

They have appealed to legislators and members of commercial bodies in the United States to aid them in bringing about passage by Congress of a federal incorporation act for American companies in China, which is expected to come before Congress in December.

### NOT MUCH NEW CONSTRUCTION WORK

Owing to Great Deficit C.N.R. will Confine Expenditure to Improvement

OTTAWA, Dec. 30.—Owing to the great deficit in the operation of the Canadian National railways it is not expected that much new construction will be undertaken next year, but that expenditure will be confined to improvements on existing lines. Certain branch lines in western Canada have been promised and some are partially constructed, but any plan of general extension is not contemplated. It was desired to construct the 30-mile cutoff between the Canadian Northern and Grand Trunk Pacific and thus reduce in length the Canadian National transcontinental system, but it is scarcely possible this will be done this year.
