## Prince Rupert as A Public Library Radiating Centre

### Victoria Librarian Suggests that Under Co-operative Plan Many Benefits May be Secured for Whole District.

The possibility of Prince Rupert becoming the radiating centre for libraries throughout the central and northern district of British Columbia is a subject that was discussed by the editor of the Daily News recently with Miss Helen Stewart, chief librarian at Victoria and president of the British Columbia Library Association. Miss Stewart is an enthusiast in regard to the scheme and she pointed out how it would be possible for the towns and villages of the district to benefit from a co-operative movement along these lines.

Briefly the scheme is to have a radiating centre at Prince Rupert with a trained librarian in charge and to have sub-stations or subsidiary libraries at all the surrounding centres, all contributing to the common fund for the purchase of books and the upkeep of the scheme.

The advantage of the scheme to Prince Rupert would be that it would at once have the advantage of a trained librarian and a better choice of books than it could have by establishing a library alone.

The advantage to the outlying points would be that they would at once secure a small library, the books in which would be changed at regular intervals, thus giving the same advantage that would be secured from a larger permanent library.

## GEN. DENIKINE'S ARMY RETREATS

### Falling Back on Six Hundred Mile Front and Now in Critical Position.

London, Jan. 2.—The position of General Denikine, the anti-Bolshevik leader in south Russia, is daily becoming more serious. Reports received by the War Office show that his retreat is continuing along virtually the whole of a six hundred mile front and that the Bolshevik drive against his centre with the purpose of cutting his army in two has brought about a critical situation from which it will take the greatest skill for Denikine's army to be extricated.

## NEW PILOTAGE ORDER GAZETTED AT OTTAWA

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)  
OTTAWA, Jan. 2.—An order in council gazetted this week establishes the new pilotage district of British Columbia, which now extends from the international boundary between Canada and the United States in the south, to the boundary between Canada and Alaska on the north, excepting the waters of the pilotage district of New Westminster.

The new order cancels those fixing the limits of the pilotage districts of Vancouver, Nanaimo and Victoria-Esquamalt, and the new district is to be known as the pilotage district of British Columbia. Payment of pilotage dues in the district is made compulsory.

## UNTIMELY ACCIDENT TAKES CAPT. WM. SELIG

### Struck by a Locomotive at Cow Bay This Morning—Lived One Hour.

Captain William Selig died at 11 o'clock this morning at the General Hospital as a result of injuries sustained at 10 when a locomotive ran into him. The captain, who was deaf, was crossing the railroad track at Cow Bay, carrying a tank on his back, and, evidently not hearing the approaching engine, was run down and carried a distance of nearly 100 feet before the engine came to a stop.

Constable Adams and Dr. L. W. Kergin were immediately on the scene and Captain Selig was at once rushed to the hospital where it was found his back, head and leg was injured severely. About an hour later he passed away, not losing consciousness till the end.

Captain Selig was an old and respected citizen of Prince Rupert and was interested in the fishing as well as the mining business. His cheerful person will be greatly missed in the city and a host of friends will join in the general regret at his untimely passing. He was 43 years of age and was born at Bogler's Cove, Lunenburg County, Nova Scotia. He was married and has a cousin, Wm. J. Selig, resident in this city.

An inquest is to be held tomorrow and funeral arrangements which are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers, will be announced later.

## Health Commission Gets Local Support

### Large Number of Delegates Give Move- ment Entire Approval and Suggest Minor Amendments and Additions.

The meeting of the Provincial Health Insurance Commission inquiring into public feeling in this city as to proposed legislation along the lines of Mothers' Pensions, Maternity Insurance, Health Insurance and Public Health Nursing was held in the Court House on Wednesday afternoon. Members of various public bodies had been invited to attend to express the views of their organizations and many availed themselves of the opportunity. The Commission that received these recommendations was made up of E. S. H. Winn, chairman, who is also at the head of the Workmen's Compensation Board; Mrs. C. Spofford, a well-known Victoria welfare worker and active member of the W. C. T. U.; Duncan McCallum, past president of the B. C. Federation of Labor and now of the Labor Department, and Dr. T. B. Greene, a medical man who was overseas with the 5th B. C. Hospital. The secretary of the commission, R. W. Lane, was not with the commission, Miss N. Fitzgerald, a Vancouver court stenographer, taking the minutes.

In opening, Chairman Winn drew attention that the commission was merely a receptive body to gain an insight into public opinion on these matters and when their tour of the province was finished they would frame a report of the recommendations for the legislature. From this report would probably be based any action that the Government might take on these matters. The opinion was growing in strength that to be efficient a person must be healthy and it was generally felt that many people did not enjoy good health merely because they could not afford it. Thus the idea of Public Health Nursing and Health Insurance.

It was a well known fact that the birth rate of the country was decreasing, because people could not afford the cost. Maternity Insurance would stimulate the birth rate and make proper attention for mothers a possibility where in many cases both mothers and children suffer for lack of it. Mothers' Pensions would insure the proper raising of children, even if the bread-winners were not present.

The object of the meetings of the commission was to ascertain if the public believed in the principles of Health Insurance and if so how would the operation and administration of it be carried out.

The first delegate to appear before the commission was D. S. Cameron representing the Great War Veterans' Association. He stated that his organization was perfectly in accord with the prin-

## Indian Frontier Scene of Severe Fighting in Another "Little War"

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

LONDON, January 2.—Dispatches from British India under date of December 18 and 20 show considerable fighting to have occurred between the British expeditionary forces and the revolting tribesmen. Severe losses were sustained in the ranks of the tribesmen and the British were apparently put to a hard test before they defeated them. The dispatch from Mandannackak dated December 18 says that the British column was fighting against 20,000 Mahsuds in one body, and another force composed of Mahsuds and Waziri who occupied the hills of Jandola. The British attacked and captured the ridge of Sarkai, driving the tribesmen from their positions, upon which the British later pitched their camp. The retreating enemy was followed closely by aeroplanes.

On December 19, the tribesmen counter attacked in huge numbers and the British were compelled to retire owing to the heavy casualties sustained at Sadbag Hill, which they had previously taken after a stubborn resistance.

## Cannery and Fishing Restrictions Removed

### Prince Rupert Delegation to Ottawa Successful in Attaining Their Objective

Acting Mayor Rochester received the following telegram last evening from Mayor McClymont in Vancouver:—

"Minister of Marine has withdrawn cannery and fishing licence restrictions. Now open to all British subjects."

This information will be received with considerable satisfaction throughout the community interested both directly and indirectly in the fishing business. It means that any British subject can either build a cannery if he wants to or go fishing for salmon, without having to secure a licence through the cannery companies as at present. This should add greatly to the number of independent fishermen, who will sell their fish where they choose.

With the permitting of gas boats to operate in salmon fishing on the rivers, the full success of Colonel Peck and Mayor McClymont, who composed the delegation to Ottawa, will have been achieved.

## MAYOR CHURCH BECOMES MAYOR OF TORONTO FOR HIS SIXTH TERM

TORONTO, Jan. 2.—Thomas Langton Church was re-elected mayor for his sixth consecutive term. He defeated his strongest opponent, Controller Samuel McBride, by 5,000 majority and the Labor candidate, J. H. Ballantyne, by 20,000. The following is the total vote: Church, 25,630; McBride, 20,814; Ballantyne, 5,612.

## MISCALCULATION SETTING BLAST CAUSES DAMAGE

### \$10,000 Worth Railroad Property Destroyed When Discharge Goes Wrong Way.

An explosion with rather serious results occurred yesterday afternoon in the G. T. P. yards when one of the coyote holes driven behind the Knox Hotel, where the yards are being widened and extended, was shot. Evidently the accident was caused by a miscalculation of the direction the rock would be thrown and the result is that, instead of blowing up and in, thereby breaking up the rock, the powder blew out of the hole, throwing tons of boulders on the main tracks and leaving only the outer track intact for traffic.

A dozen cars spotted on the damaged track were wrecked, five being entirely destroyed. One of the cars completely destroyed was a refrigerator. Besides these, three oil cars were smashed and all the oil contents thrown out and forming lakes around the tracks. One car loaded with salmon was turned completely over but the contents will be saved. The fortunate feature about the accident was that not a person was hurt and this was rather miraculous as rock was thrown at least a hundred yards radiating in many directions.

Clearing operations are going on today. The car that can be removed are being taken out and the rails, which were badly bent, are being uncovered and removed. The debris will be well gathered up and taken away by tonight and tomorrow should see the tracks in operation again.

Superintendent McCall, interviewed by the News this morning, stated that the occurrence was purely accidental but was most unfortunate for the foreman in charge, who is reported to have left town. It was yet impossible to form a very accurate estimate of the damage but it will probably reach \$10,000 in rolling stock and railway property.

Radiating Centre For All Activities.

Prince Rupert is anxious to become a radiating centre for trade. Every businessman would like to see close co-operation between all points in northern and central British Columbia and with that in view an Associated Board of Trade has been suggested for the whole district.

We take pleasure in commending the proposal made by Miss Helen Stewart to have a radiating centre here for the advancement of every section of the district in general knowledge and literary entertainment through the medium of the public library. Under such a scheme Prince Rupert could show the smaller towns that there is something other than mere money making in which the city is interested. The towns would benefit to a very large extent by the facilities offered by Prince Rupert. Each would bear its fair share of the costs and each would benefit.

This is an age of co-operation. It is an age when people are recognizing that extreme individuality of people or communities is not for the general benefit. Here is an opportunity to get in line with the spirit of the age.

Must Develop Every Need at One Time.

There are those in the community who say that there is but one thing needed just now, and that is sewers and streets. We take no exception to their enthusiasm along those lines. We believe those are the greatest needs of the day. We must not, however, forget the human development. We have already arranged to spend some money on the education of the children. The next step is to provide for those who wish to enlarge their mental horizon by means of books.

We spend a thousand dollars in this city without much thought. The expenditure of about \$2,000 here would provide the nucleus for an institution that may be far-reaching in its influence throughout the community. With the co-operation of the surrounding districts we might build up an educational centre that would make for better things in this great country.

The Daily News suggests that this scheme be given fair consideration, especially at this time when policies are being formulated and plans made for the coming civic year. Letters bearing on the subject will be welcomed and it is hoped that some scheme may be worked out which will at once unite the various centres of the district and benefit each.

### MOLYBDENUM IS FOUND IN LILLOOET AREA

New Use Found for Scarce Metal Makes increased Demand Certain and Supplies Important.

The invention by John Oliver Arnold, professor of metallurgy at Sheffield University, of a new steel in which molybdenum instead of tungsten is used, calls attention to yet another of the undeveloped mineral resources of British Columbia, says the Victoria Colonist.

Some six or seven months ago Mr. J. A. Hodgkinson, managing director of the Island Mines, Limited, and Mr. Crawford Coates, the president, discovered a big deposit of molybdenum in the Lillooet Mining Division, adjacent to the P.G.E. This is probably the biggest deposit of the mineral reported up to the present, although it is not all improbable that there are many others even larger to be found in the Province as time goes on and the mineral wealth is developed. At that time neither Mr. Hodgkinson nor Mr. Crawford Coates thought much of the find, neither the value of molybdenum nor a knowledge of the commercial uses to which it might be put being very apparent at the moment. When announcement of the discovery of the English professor came through in the London dispatch, however, they realized that the time was opportune to call attention to the deposit in the Lillooet country.

It is interesting to know that Mr. Moreton Frewen, the well-known British economist who came through the Province with Premier Oliver about two months ago, his special mission being to look into the mineral and timber possibilities of British Columbia, visited the Darcy Division in the Lillooet country and met both Mr. Hodgkinson and Mr. Crawford Coates. Whether Mr. Frewen discovered from other sources that there were rich deposits of molybdenum in the district is not recorded, but neither of the heads of the Island Mines Company took the trouble to impress upon him the facts of their find, at that

### COUNTRY WILL NOT GIVE UP PROHIBITION

Mrs. Spofford, Well Known Welfare Worker, Confident for Dominion Prohibition.

BUT DOES NOT EXPECT IT TO COME THIS YEAR

Mrs. C. Spofford, commissioner on the Health Insurance Board, who is also closely connected with the activities of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, has worked in the interests of prohibition for many years. She has done much public work along temperance lines and understands the progress of the liquor question in this country very thoroughly.

"This country will never give up prohibition. People are becoming too educated to take that retrograde step. It is true that the present prohibition is loose and very ineffective. That is a fact that everyone must admit. Even the attorney-general of the province admits that there must be liquor legislation at the next session of the Provincial House. The prescription evil will have to be remedied and the liquor allowance will probably be cut down to the limit of 8 ounces. The way it is now anyone can get liquor in almost unlimited quantities. It is sold on order and not on prescription. The dry laws will also have to be more strictly enforced."

Mrs. Spofford said that Dominion prohibition would come in course of time, although there would be a fight for it. As far as the Dominion is concerned the country will be wet again after January 1, but the Federal house will probably begin legislation on the question at the next session. At present a commission consisting of some of Canada's cleverest men is framing a report to hand the federal government. On the recommendations of this report will be based the legislation that will follow. Though the question will be taken up at the next session, Mrs. Spofford does not look for Dominion Prohibition this year. There are a great many monied interests who will work against it tooth and nail and these will have to be conquered.

time not realizing that it was of any value commercially.

**Big Surface Outcrop.**  
This deposit shows a big surface outcrop, a vein from 15 to 18 feet in width and traceable on the surface for about 800 feet, being reported. The surface ore assayed showed 8.41 per cent; stripping revealed ore which runs from 16-18 per cent. Copper and gold are associated with molybdenum in its natural state. There has been no development work in the area referred to up to the present, although there has been of course the usual amount of prospecting, and the fact that there has of late been increased activity on the part of some of the bigger New York mining concerns in connection with the tale and placer gold deposits indicates that American money will be ready to put into development work should the Canadian and British capital not be forthcoming.

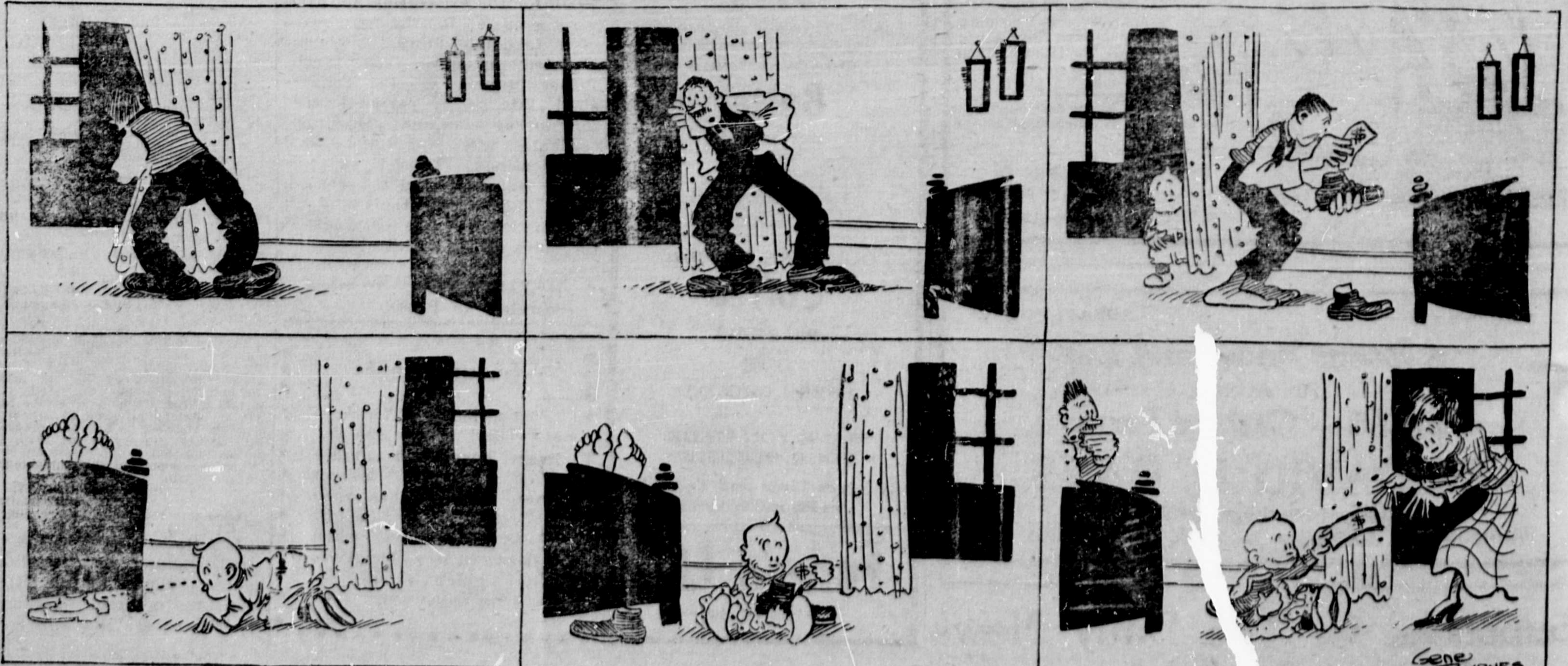

## Prince Rupert as A Public Library Radiating Centre

(Continued From Page One.)

ent collection. They would also have the advice and help of the trained librarian at the centre and the help in the purchase of books which such a trained person is only able to give.

### Local Plan.

For Prince Rupert it would be necessary to have a building or commodious room heated and lighted. Miss Stewart suggests, from information supplied her, that the Red Cross hut might be removed to connect up with the present reading room and that the women's reading room should also be in the same building. It would be much easier to handle if all were together. The library would co-operate with the schools and ladies' societies and would be the centre for intellectual development. If it were possible there should be an auditorium connected but that is not necessary at first. The essentials are a trained librarian and a collection of books with a place in which to house them.

A librarian would cost about \$1,500 a year and the other coincident expenses would not be high. Books could be purchased partly from a city grant and partly from a tag day or entertainments or similar means well known to those interested in civic welfare schemes.

### For Other Towns.

The associated libraries would be supplied with collections of books according to their needs. For instance, a small library of 100 books could be secured by payment of \$50 a year, the actual computed cost of the service. These could be changed from time to time as arranged, the associated library to pay all transportation charges.

The scale of fifty cents per volume per year has been worked out by Miss Stewart and those collaborating with her in the scheme for Vancouver Island, of which Victoria is the radiating centre. Already Duncan, Nanaimo and Alberni have joined the scheme and others are expected to come in soon. The money contributed from outside points is at once invested in new books in addition to the sum contributed at the centre.

### Scope of Organization.

Directly after the new year commences Miss Stewart is going to Nelson, to organize a centre and a number of the surrounding points have already agreed to join.

For Prince Rupert it is suggested that Anxoy, Alice Arm, Stewart, Queen Charlotte Island points, Surf Inlet, Swanson Bay, Ocean Falls, Terrace, Usk, Hazelton, Smithers, Telkwa, Vanderhoof, and Prince George might co-operate and other places could come in from time to time as they became interested.

The plan as outlined is already in operation in various parts of the United States, but could be modified to suit local conditions. It has all the appearances of a workable plan.

## ANCIENT JEWELRY SEEN IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—Jewelry worn by an Egyptian princess of the twelfth dynasty, 1900 years before the Christian era, is now on display at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. It is declared to be the finest collection of personal adornment ever brought out of Egypt.

When marauders entered the tomb of Princess Sathathorunut at some odd moment in the last 3,800 years, they took away her mummy and even the wonderfully wrought funeral trappings, but overlooked a niche containing the wonderfully wrought ornaments she wore in attending the ancient equivalent for a first night at the opera.

Professor William Flinders Petrie, head of a British archaeological society, dug the collection out in 1914, and today it looks as bright as if it had just come from the makers.

The jewels are identified as belonging to the princess by her name and the name of her father in cartouches on the larger pieces.

## HEALTH OFFICIALS ON THE WARPATH

### Synopsis of

## Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3.50 an acre. Proclamation now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Pastoral pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of 10c per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted immediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 50 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 5 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditionally upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

### PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

### SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

### GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1918, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commission. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

### ERNEST LAPOINTE IS COMING MAN SAYS J. K. MUNRO

"As your gaze rests on the opposition, you notice that one man is missing—probably the only man you would really miss in the whole talented outfit," says J. K. Munro in McLean's Magazine. "That man is Ernest Lapointe, the big Kamouraska lawyer. That is, he was from Kamouraska when he last sat in the House. When he comes again his address will be Quebec East. He has succeeded to the seat of the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Furthermore, he is fast taking the Laurier place in the habitant hearts. When Ernest Lapointe came to Parliament in 1904, he was a big country lawyer who could scarce speak a word of English and who promised to cut as much figure in his country's history as the average member who blossoms for a Parliament or two and then vanishes from the political horizon or becomes a decoration of the Red Chamber. Lapointe was young, the picture of smiling good nature, and so generally a pleasant part of the landscape that he grew popular. But his knowledge of the English language grew even faster than his popularity and he plodded along, gaining ground session by session. But it was only recently that it began to dawn on the House that a successor to Laurier was in its midst. By this time Lapointe had not only learned but mastered the English language. Moreover, he was eloquent, with a sound common sense behind his eloquence, and a knowledge of constitutional government such as is possessed by few men in Canadian public life."
