Major Gen. Mewburn Retires From The Unionist Cabinet

Shake up in Cabinet Before Sir Robert Borden Leaves for Long Holiday. Sir George Foster Looked Upon as Acting Prime Minister.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

OTTAWA, January 2.—Official announcement is made that Major General Mewburn, minister of militia, has retired from the Unionist Government and that there has been some shifting of portfolios and more changes to be made before the departure of Sir Robert Borden for the south for a long rest. Political conditions will be maintained for some months at least and the government will remain as it is until the return of Sir Robert. The cabinet shifts announced place the Hon. Martin Burrell, who has been secretary of state, at the head of the Customs Department which has been without a minister since Sifton succeeded Carvell as minister of public works. Sifton assumes the post of secretary of state in succession to Burrell.

The acting minister of militia will be the Hon. J. A. Calder, minister of immigration and colonization, while the Hon. J. D. Reid, in addition to being minister of railways, will assume the department of public works. The coming changes will include the uniting of the militia and soldiers civil re-establishment departments, while the immigration and colonization will go back to the department of the interior. Should the western provinces be given their natural resources, for which they have been agitating for many years, the department of the interior would not be so important as it is at the present time, and one minister could administer both interior and immigration affairs.

The belief is that when the amalgamation of the departments of the interior and immigration and colonization takes place, Calder will permanently take over the portfolio of minister of militia and the department of soldiers civil re-establishment will be merged with militia. Sir James Lougheed will remain the government leader in the Senate, but perhaps dropped out of the cabinet.

It is also definitely announced that Sir George Foster, minister of trade and commerce, will be acting prime minister during the absence of the premier. He will not, however, undertake to lead the House through the session, and it is likely that when Parliament reassembles a Unionist caucus will be held to choose a House leader. The probabilities are that the choice of the party will fall upon Hon. C. J. Doherty, who has filled this position acceptably in the past.

COASTAL SHIPS PAY PILOTAGE

New Regulations Will Cause Change of Registry to Several Ships.

VICTORIA, Jan. 3.—Under the new pilotage regulations, the G.T.P. steamers "Prince Rupert" and "Prince George" and the C.P.R. "Princess Victoria" must pay pilotage dues or change to Canadian registry. The G.T.P. big steamers are registered at Newcastle on Tyne, England, where they were built and the "Princess Victoria" at Glasgow, on the Clyde where she was constructed. People here are wondering whether the G.T.P. steamers will have Vancouver or Prince Rupert, where the company's Pacific headquarters are, as their home port.

As these new pilotage dues are to be collected in and out of every port of call, it is expected that the their vessels to Canadian registry companies affected will change at the earliest possible moment and thus save considerable sums.

SURVEY OF NEW TOWN STARTED

Alice Arm Development Co. to Put Townsite on Market.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

ALICE ARM, Jan. 3.—Last week an engineering party of eight members arrived from the south to commence the survey of the Alice Arm townsite. The lots and streets will be planned by this party and operations are beginning at once in order to have a good start by spring. It is expected that there will be a rush into Alice Arm this summer unprecedented in the history of Northern British Columbia and the number who flock in will require to have some accommodation. Under the present circumstance with a townsite on a mud flat this would be impossible.

The proposed townsite is on the side hill northwest of the present townsite and belongs to a company known as the Alice Arm Development Co. This company obtained the property some years ago with a view to, some day, turning it into a townsite. Now the time seems opportune and operations are commencing. It is expected that a ready sale will result when the surveys have been made as the present system of squatting on a townsite with ill-defined boundaries between an Indian Reserve and private property has long been a cause of dissatisfaction and the residents will only be too glad to become owners of their own properties.

The planned townsite is in a good healthy location on a hillside and the matter of installing public utilities will be both feasible and economical. Sufficient water supply is in easy reach and sewerage problems will be easily provided for.

GEN. SIR JOHN ROSS, D.S.O., APPOINTED O. C. FOR B. C.

WAR PRIZE SCHOONER RETURNED TO OWNERS

Recalls Interesting Squabble Between Judge and Counsel in 1916 at Victoria.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 3.—The schooner Oregon which was seized in April, 1916, and condemned in the prize court held here, has been returned to her former owners. This is the vessel whose case caused the violent quarrel between the judge of the prize court, Mr. Justice Martin, and Mr. Luxton, counsel for the Crown, after which came the cancellation of Mr. Justice Martin's commission as Prize Court Judge.

The fate of the schooner Leona which was also condemned by the prize court, is still undecided.

BIG DEMAND NOW FOR SILK HATS IN EUROPE

Demands for Toppers Come From Sweden and Holland, But Final Destination is Germany.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

LONDON, Jan. 2.—One of the busiest trades now in Great Britain is the manufacture of silk hats. This business has been practically at a standstill during the war, but has revived now in a remarkable degree. The demand now far exceeds the production of all the factories engaged in their manufacture.

The local orders, which are fairly heavy are being supplemented by big demands from Sweden and Holland, but the ultimate destination of the chapeaux de luxe being shipped to the continent is believed to be Germany.

338,137 RETURNED SOLDIERS IN CANADA

One-Eighth of Them Want to Take Up Land and Nearly One-Tenth Have Arranged to.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

OTTAWA, Jan. 3.—Since the signing of the armistice 332,537 officers and men of the Canadian Army have been repatriated, these all having served overseas. Prior to the armistice 65,000 officers and men had been returned to Canada and demobilized. This makes a total of 338,137 members of the Canadian Expeditionary Forces who have returned to civil occupations since the beginning of the war.

Out of this total of 338,137 men, 44,278 have applied to the Soldiers' Settlement Board for qualification certificates to enable them to take up land. The number of land applications approved at the close of the year was 33,986.

IMPORTATION OF LIQUOR IS WITHIN THE LAW

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

OTTAWA, Jan. 3.—Until such times as the various provinces enact legislation under the Federal Act, which provides that a plebiscite may be taken on the importation of liquor, such importation is within the law of the Dominion of Canada, according to an authoritative statement made here tonight. However, up till the present, the province of Quebec is the only one which has issued wholesale liquor licences and the only one from which Canada's thirsty ones may get relief.

MACKENZIE KING MAY COME TO PRINCE RUPERT

Arrangements Being Made for Liberal Leader to Speak in Victoria and May Come Here.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

VICTORIA, Jan. 3.—The Victoria Liberal Association is arranging for MacKenzie King, the leader of the Liberal party in the Dominion House of Commons, to speak here on January 20. A meeting will also be held in Vancouver at which MacKenzie will speak, and after this the Liberal leader will probably visit Prince Rupert. He is keen on visiting the northern centre about which he has heard so much.

OLD TIMERS IN COURT TODAY

Tom Lee Stays Open Too Late, Pays \$25; Same for Drunk.

Tom Lee, an old offender against the Early Closing By-law, was fined Twenty Five dollars or thirty days imprisonment this morning.

Nels Johnson, another old offender, paid Twenty Five Dollars, or an option of 40 days, for New Year's celebration.

Kittie Beattie, charged under the B. C. Prohibition Act, was dismissed.

CANTEEN PROFITS COMING TO SOLDIERS

Every Canadian Soldier to Receive About Fourteen Shillings.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

LONDON, Jan. 3.—The reported estimates of the full amount of canteen profits made on the western front and available for distribution among the British fighting forces are all tremendously exaggerated, according to authorities here. The total amount available will not exceed £2,000,000. It is true that a huge business was done, but the cost of distributing the goods was correspondingly high, thus bringing down the profits.

According to the proposed division, every British soldier will receive ten shillings, every Canadian soldier about fourteen shillings and every Australian soldier seventeen shillings. The reason for the distinctive amounts is the higher pay received by the Dominion and Commonwealth troops.

Already £70,000 has been advanced on the Canadian account, of which £50,000 has been remitted to Ottawa. The remainder has been retained here to carry on the work of the committee investigating separation allowances claims, which committee has done so much to alleviate suffering among the dependents of Canadian soldiers.

POWER LINE ENGINEER DIES AT GRAND FORKS

Frank J. Conyer, Well Known in Boundary Country, Dies as a Result of Explosion.

GRAND FORKS, Jan. 3.—Frank J. Conyer, assistant superintendent of construction on the power line being built to Copper Mountain from Bonington is dead as a result of burns which he received while lighting his kitchen fire on Sunday.

BRITISH CHAMP WINS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 2.—Bob McCormick, the lightweight champion of England, knocked out Frank Farmer, the light heavyweight champion of the Pacific Coast in the ninth round of a scheduled ten round bout.

Anarchists Rounded Up Over All U.S.

Raids Made by Government Agents in Thirty-three Cities From Coast to Coast--Deportations Will Follow.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., January 3.—The greatest round-up of radicals in the history of the United States was made by the Government acting through the Department of Justice agents in thirty-three cities scattered from coast to coast, last night. The raids were conducted in the following cities: New York, Baltimore, Boston, Buffalo, Chicago, Cleveland, Denver, Des Moines, Detroit, Grand Rapids, Hartford, Indianapolis, Jacksonville, Los Angeles, Kansas City, Louisville, Milwaukee, Newark, Omaha, Philadelphia, Pittsburg, Portland, Maine; Portland, Oregon; San Francisco, Providence, St. Paul, Springfield, Syracuse, Toledo, and Trenton.

The object of these raids, Assistant Agent Garvin said, was to obtain for submission to the Department of Labor, cases for deportation for "a very large number of our most dangerous anarchists and radical agitators." The agents of the Department went out prepared to catch the radicals with the goods on them. A general charge of attempting to overturn the government by threats and violence will be preferred against the persons arrested during the raids.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—It is estimated that there will be more than 3,500 Reds in custody when the Government completes the round-up of revolutionary radicals, according to the figures of the Department of Justice at noon today. The raids are continuing this morning and the actual arrests already total 3,000. Important documents, firearms and explosives have been seized in some of the Red headquarters. High explosive bombs found at Newark, N. J., had been prepared for mailing. The chief spirit of the Milwaukee branch was found burning papers in his home when arrested.

The largest numbers of those arrested were found at New York, where 650 were gathered in; Detroit, 500; Chicago, 221; Buffalo, 136; Cleveland, 100; Philadelphia, 200; Newark, N. J., 150; Scranton, 45; Milwaukee, 80; Seattle, 6; Portland, Ore., 22.

Reports to the Department state that among the documents seized in the raids were papers showing that the radicals and anarchists intended putting forward candidates in the November elections, who would be supposedly reputable citizens, whose Bolshevik affiliations would not be disclosed until they had achieved office.

WM. SELIG'S FUNERAL NOT YET ARRANGED

Burial Pending the Arrival of Deceased's Brother From Seattle.

Arrangements for the burial of Captain William Selig who was killed yesterday at Cow Bay have not yet been made. This morning a wire was received from his brother, George Selig, of Seattle, requesting that the body be held at the B. C. Undertakers until he arrives in the city. He will probably be here on Wednesday.

This morning the coroner and jury viewed the body and the inquest will be held on Monday evening at the Court House. It is believed that the direct cause of death was internal injuries. The skull was not fractured although there were scalp and back wounds and a leg was broken.

EXPECT SETTLE TODAY PILOTAGE DISPUTE

Departments Collects Pilotage Dues But Cannot Provide Pilots, Who Work Independently.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

VICTORIA, Jan. 3.—The dispute between the pilots and the Department of Marine is causing an anomalous state of affairs. Ships entering here have to apply to the former secretary to obtain the services of a pilot while the new secretary appointed by the Government is in control of the office, but has no pilots to supply. The pilotage dues are all collected by the Government and not by pilots, themselves. It is expected that the dispute will be settled today.

SOVIET RUSSIA WISHES REOPEN RELATIONS

Makes Overtures for Resumption of Diplomatic Relations With Italy.

CLAIMS BIG GAINS IN SOUTH RUSSIA

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

LONDON, Jan. 3.—M. Tchitcherine, the Bolshevik foreign minister, has proposed to Italy the resumption of relations between that country and Soviet Russia, says a Moscow wireless received here today. The minister points out that the imminent control of the Black Sea coast route by the Soviet Government will open the Black Sea to Italy.

The Bolshevik message continues that their forces have occupied the important stations of Yosovo and Dolia and are marching upon Mariupol, an important seaport on the Sea of Azov. A large quantity of guns and bombs was captured in this region, as was also the entire Markhoff division, one of General Denikine's corps, the Moscow report adds.

Prince Rupert's Delegation To Ottawa are Successful.

The information received by the citizens yesterday that the delegation sent to Ottawa to impress upon the Government the necessity for progress in connection with fishery matters in this district, had been successful in their object is a matter of gratification. It is always well to know that we have made our point. The more so is this in matters connected with the Dominion Government. The impression is abroad, rightly or wrongly, that Ottawa knows little—and cares less—about Prince Rupert. We know now that Ottawa's information is possibly more up to date regarding Prince Rupert and the district of which it is the centre since Colonel Peck, Mayor McClymont and ex-Mayor McCaffery, president of the Board of Trade, have brought the Government Department of Fisheries round to the Prince Rupert way of thinking. It is up to the people of the city to keep the Government in the Prince Rupert way of thinking, too. For there is lots to think about.

What the Removal of Licence Restrictions Mean.

Prince Rupert's delegation has convinced the Government that, while it is wise and necessary to protect the salmon, it is in no wise necessary to protect the canneries nor the fishermen, by exclusive licences. With the restrictions removed and licences for every British subject, anyone with the money may enter the cannery business. And of course no one will remain in any business unless it pays. Nor will anyone even enter any business unless there is some prospect of it paying either. Any British subject with a boat and net may enter the rivers and fish for salmon without first obtaining a licence through some cannery. This should mean that many white men will go fishing with gill nets. They will have their own boats and gear and will sell their fish wherever they get the best price, instead of at present being tied to one cannery. With gas boats permitted on the Skeena, they will make their headquarters in town, outfit their boats and purchase all their supplies here, instead of at the cannery stores, whose supplies come mostly direct from the south.

Independent Fishermen Must Receive Encouragement.

What should happen, however, will not happen unless the people of Prince Rupert see to it. Unless the people of Prince Rupert have faith first of all in themselves, in the district in which they live, and in the industry which they wish to foster, Prince Rupert people must be prepared to invest their money in canneries and in fishing boats and in fishermen. Fishing is our chief industry and to obtain the full benefit, it ought to be centred in and directed from Prince Rupert. The cannery companies at present are controlled and directed from the south, as are many other companies and there their profits go. The Government's Inspector of Fisheries is located in Vancouver except for a few months in the year. This district demands an inspector resident in the district all the year round. It requires Prince Rupert capital invested in canneries. It requires Prince Rupert capital invested in fishing boats. It requires the profits from the fisheries of the district to remain in the district to be re-invested in further development of the industry which means so much to us. It is up to the people of Prince Rupert to take advantage of their opportunity.

Those Who Cannot Fish Can Finance the Fishermen.

Fishing, like farming, is a speculative operation. But unlike farming it has no laborious seedtime and the harvest is reaped during many months of the year. Last season about 800 boats fished for salmon on the Skeena, the great majority of which were cannery boats. This coming season, with gas boats permitted and the licence restrictions removed, there may be 800 independent boats operating, whose headquarters in most cases would be in town instead of at the isolated canneries. The government has been requested to assist returned soldiers to establish themselves in the fishing industry as they have others in farming. And the opportunity will be afforded many who cannot go fishing themselves to acquire a share in a fishing boat.

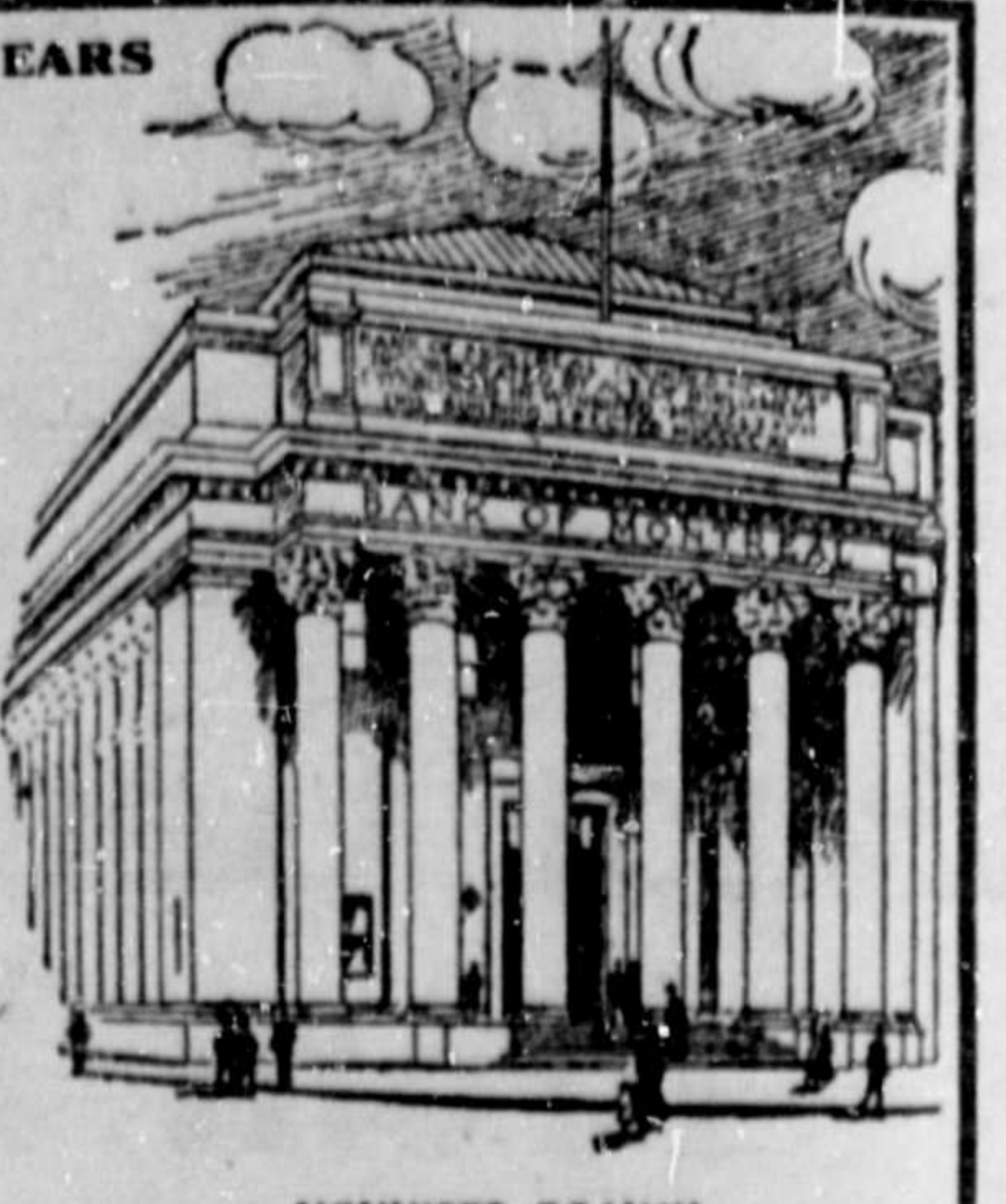

LIQUOR MAY NOT BE ADVERTISED

Nor Are Agents Allowed—Buyers Must Shift for Themselves.

Now that the war-time restrictions have been raised and Dominion prohibition became a thing of the past on the first day of January, many of the prospective buyers still wonder how they are going to import liquor. Inter-provincial liquor traffic being again permitted, some people looked for the glaring advertisements, giving address of liquor firms in Alberta and other provinces who would export liquor to British Columbia, but were disappointed. It is true that liquor may be ordered from another province and may be delivered here, but agencies or advertising of ways and means and the names of companies is forbidden by an amendment to the B. C. Prohibition Act adopted March 29 last year.

The following excerpts amending Section 52 of Chapter 49 of the B. C. Prohibition Act gives the new law regarding importation:—

"No person shall canvass for, receive, take or solicit orders for the purchase or sale of any liquor or act as agent for the purchase or sale of liquor.

"No person shall distribute, publish or display any advertisement, sign, circular, letter, poster, handbill, card or price list, naming, representing, describing or referring to any liquor, or to the quality or quantities thereof, or giving the name or address of any person manufacturing or dealing in liquors or stating where liquor may be obtained, but nothing in this section contained shall apply to the receipt, or transmission, of a telegram or letter by any telegraph agent, or operator, or post-office employee, in the ordinary course of his employment as such agent, operator or employee."

CLEMENCEAU WILL NOT STAND FOR SENATE

PARIS, Jan. 2.—Premier Clemenceau, addressing the electors at Draguignan, said he would not again be a candidate for the Senate.

GOOD SUPPORT BEING GIVEN HEALTH BOARD

E. S. H. Winn, Chairman, Pleased With Public Attitude on Health Insurance.

E. S. H. Winn, chairman of the Health Insurance Commission, that sat here on Wednesday afternoon last, states that the work of the commission is receiving great support at all places visited. Already a large number of cities have had the sittings of the commission and it is expected to reach Vancouver on January 19. In all the places visited there has not been a single adverse note to the intention of the government in the matter of health insurance.

After the Vancouver sitting the report and recommendations of the commission will be framed on the information as to public feeling and ideas gained at the various sittings. It is expected to have this report complete towards the end of the month, to present at the next session of the legislature.

TWO C.P.R. BOATS ARRIVE THIS WEEK

"Beatrice" in Tomorrow Morning and "Mary" Monday.

The Princess Beatrice is one day late this week and will not arrive here until tomorrow morning. The Princess Mary leaves Vancouver tonight for Prince Rupert and Alaska and will arrive here on Monday about noon. She returns south on Friday. The Princess Beatrice will sail for the south at 8 o'clock Sunday night.

INDUSTRIAL REVIVAL IN WESTERN PROVINCES

Big Conventions of Manufacturers and Financiers in B. C. and Alberta This Year.

(Special by G. T. P. telegraphs.) CALGARY, January 3.—With a meeting of the British Columbia and Alberta committees in Calgary shortly after the New Year, final plans for the 1920 industrial congress will be discussed and completed. The gathering will include manufacturers and financiers from all over the Dominion and the United States. The delegates will visit the most important industrial centres in Alberta and will meet in British Columbia early in June. Exact dates have not yet been fixed.

PEACE TREATY MAKES BIG ARMY REDUCTION

Nine-Tenths of German Army Must Go Before March 31.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—Germany's present armed forces are estimated by the British War Office to total close to a million men. This force is divided into a regular army of 400,000 men; land forces of regularly armed navy constabulary, 40,000 to 50,000; temporary volunteers and regular reserve army, 150,000 to 200,000, and civil guards numbering between 300,000 to 400,000.

Under the terms of the Peace Treaty Germany is compelled to reduce her regular forces to 100,000 by March 31 and the number of gendarmes must not exceed the number in the police department in the year 1913.

The reduction of the regular German army in compliance with the treaty obligations is proceeding but at a slower pace than had been originally contemplated owing to the delay in the ratification of the peace treaty.

COLLEGE APPOINTMENT FOR REV. F. W. KERR

WINNIPEG, Jan. 3.—The Rev. F. W. Kerr, minister of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, New Westminster, and formerly of Prince Rupert, B. C., has been appointed to the Chair of Education in Manitoba College.

CIVIL LAW RESUMED

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 2.—Military rule which has been in force in the Gary, Ind., steel district since the inception of the nationwide strike, has now been rescinded.

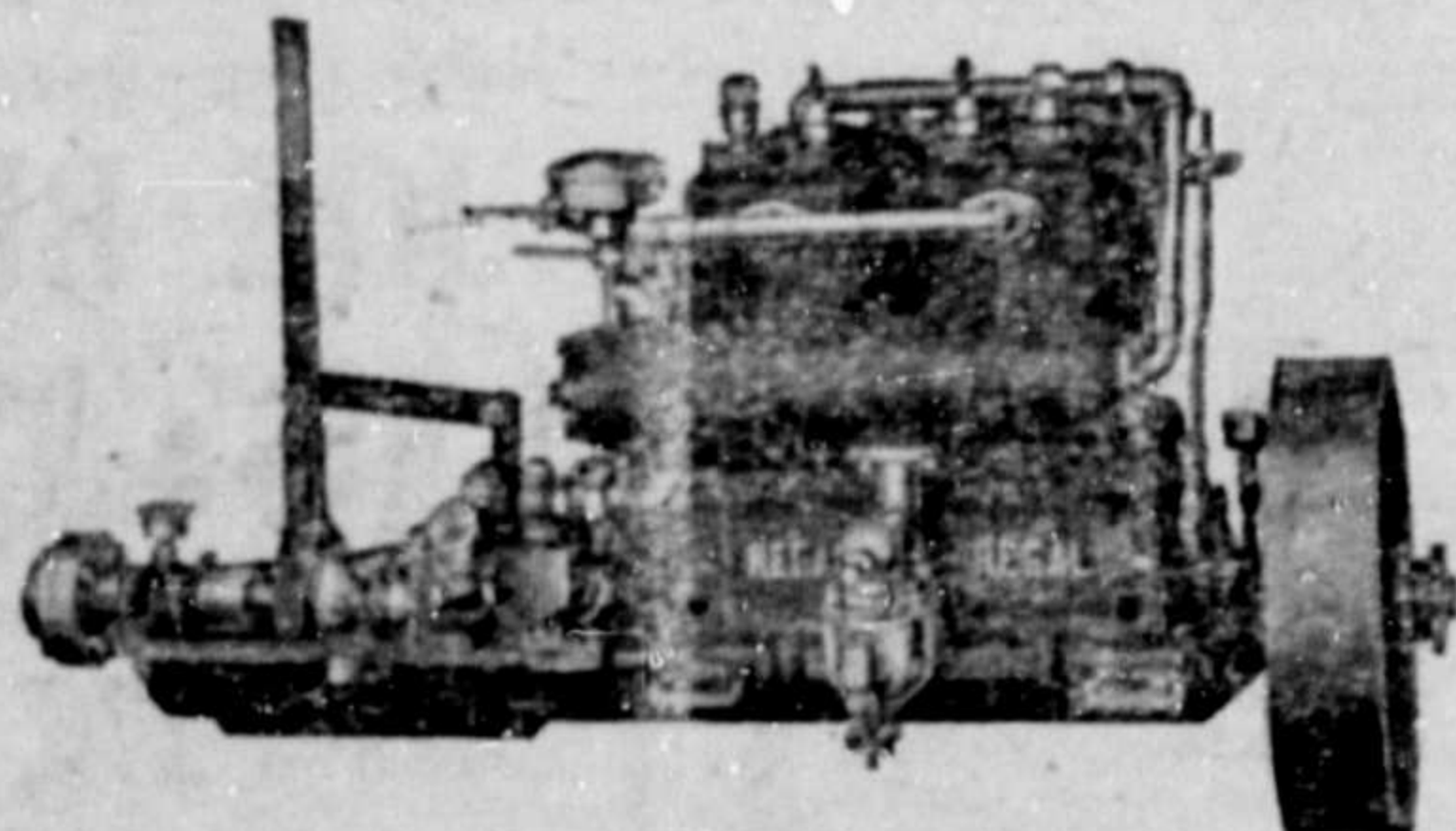

TALY RESTRICTS ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

ROME, Jan. 2.—The sale of liquor containing more than twenty per cent alcohol will be permitted in Italy only between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Sales must cease at noon on Sundays and are prohibited on holidays.

"A Bylaw of the City of Prince Rupert to authorize the City of Prince Rupert to construct in conjunction with the Government of British Columbia a bridge connecting Section One with Section Two, and to create and secure a debt to the amount of \$12,000 to pay the City's share of the cost of such bridge."

BYLAW NO. 1
A BYLAW OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT TO PROVIDE FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A CITY BUILDING ON FULTON STREET FOR MUNICIPAL PURPOSES, AND FOR CREATING AND SECURING A DEBT OF \$50,000 TO PAY FOR THE SAME.

WHEREAS the present accommodation for the various municipal departments of the City of Prince Rupert is insufficient and it is deemed advisable to erect a building for the purpose of providing additional accommodation for the use of the various Municipal Institutions;

AND WHEREAS the purpose of paying for the said building, it will be necessary to incur a debt to the extent of \$50,000, and that sum by the issue of Serial Debentures payable in thirty (30) years from the 1st day of April, A.D. 1920, and bearing interest at the rate of six per centum (6%) per annum;

AND WHEREAS the said sum of \$50,000 is the amount of the debt which this bylaw is intended to create;

AND WHEREAS it will be necessary to raise each year during the period of thirty (30) years, by special rate, the sums set out in the Schedule to this bylaw, for the payment of principal and interest of said debt;

AND WHEREAS the value of the whole rateable land and improvements of the Municipality, according to the last revised Assessment Roll, being the roll for the year 1919, is \$21,051,580.00;

AND WHEREAS the whole debt of the City of Prince Rupert, not including for local improvements and school purposes, is \$828,774.59, which is not twenty per centum (20%) of said assessed amount;

AND WHEREAS this bylaw cannot be altered except by the consent of the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council;

AND WHEREAS THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:—

1. It shall be lawful for the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert to erect a public building to be used for the accommodation of the various Municipal Institutions of the City of Prince Rupert, such public building to be according to plans and specifications prepared by the City Engineer, and approved by the Municipal Council of the said City which plans may from time to time be altered, amended or added to during the construction of said building, and the Municipal Council shall see it in any of such cases the plans of such alterations, amendments or additions shall be approved as above provided for to the original plans, the intent of this bylaw being that the City in constructing the said building hereby authorized shall have full authority to make the said building such as hereinafter mentioned.

2. For the purpose of paying for the construction of the said building hereby authorized it shall be lawful for the said City of Prince Rupert to create a debt to the amount of \$50,000 which debt shall be payable in thirty (30) years from the 1st day of April, A.D. 1920, for which debt Serial Debentures may be issued to be secured as hereinafter mentioned.

WHEREAS it is deemed advisable to construct a wooden bridge connecting Sections One and Two in the City of Prince Rupert, said bridge to be as nearly as may be on the line of Second Avenue;

AND WHEREAS the Government of British Columbia proposes to pay toward the construction of the said bridge, the sum of \$6,000;

FORMER PRINCE RUPERT MEN IN PORTLAND, ORE.

J. A. Thompson and J. F. Matheison Now Located in Rose City and Engaged in Fish Business.

CONSTRUCTING FACTORY FOR CURING SALMON

The following from one of last week's issues of the Portland "Oregonian" will be of interest to the many friends of J. A. Thompson and J. F. Matheison, late of the Cold Storage Company here:

"Erection of a modern fish smoking and packing plant establishment in Portland was made known yesterday with the completion of arrangements whereby J. F. Matheison and J. A. Thompson, fish packers of Prince Rupert, Canada, obtained a five-year lease on the old Mount Hood brewery property on the East Side, with option to buy. Leasing arrangements were concluded by Leon H. Bullier of the E. E. Taylor company, who announced the transaction. Work on remodeling the plant to fit the needs of the industry and in erecting additional buildings and installing machinery will start tomorrow, it is announced.

Mr. Matheison and Mr. Thompson, who have had nearly 20 years experience in the fish industry at Prince Rupert and elsewhere, will establish their headquarters in Portland, they announce, and from here will send the product already well known in Canada, throughout the country. The property over which the men obtained control is located at the corner of East Ninth and Marion streets, and measures 400 by 200 feet. It is owned by S. W. Peterson, who is making the alterations to suit the new tenants.

Fish from Astoria and lower Columbia river points and from Puget Sound will be used at the plant, and during the run of chinook salmon the plant will expend all its energies caring for these fish alone. Dried, smoked and salt fish will be turned out, the smoked fish being prepared under a new system, which, the packers claim, will produce a superior article.

It is expected the plant will be in operation within a month, and it will employ, it is said, between 30 and 40 people to begin with, enlarging the forces as the business expands.

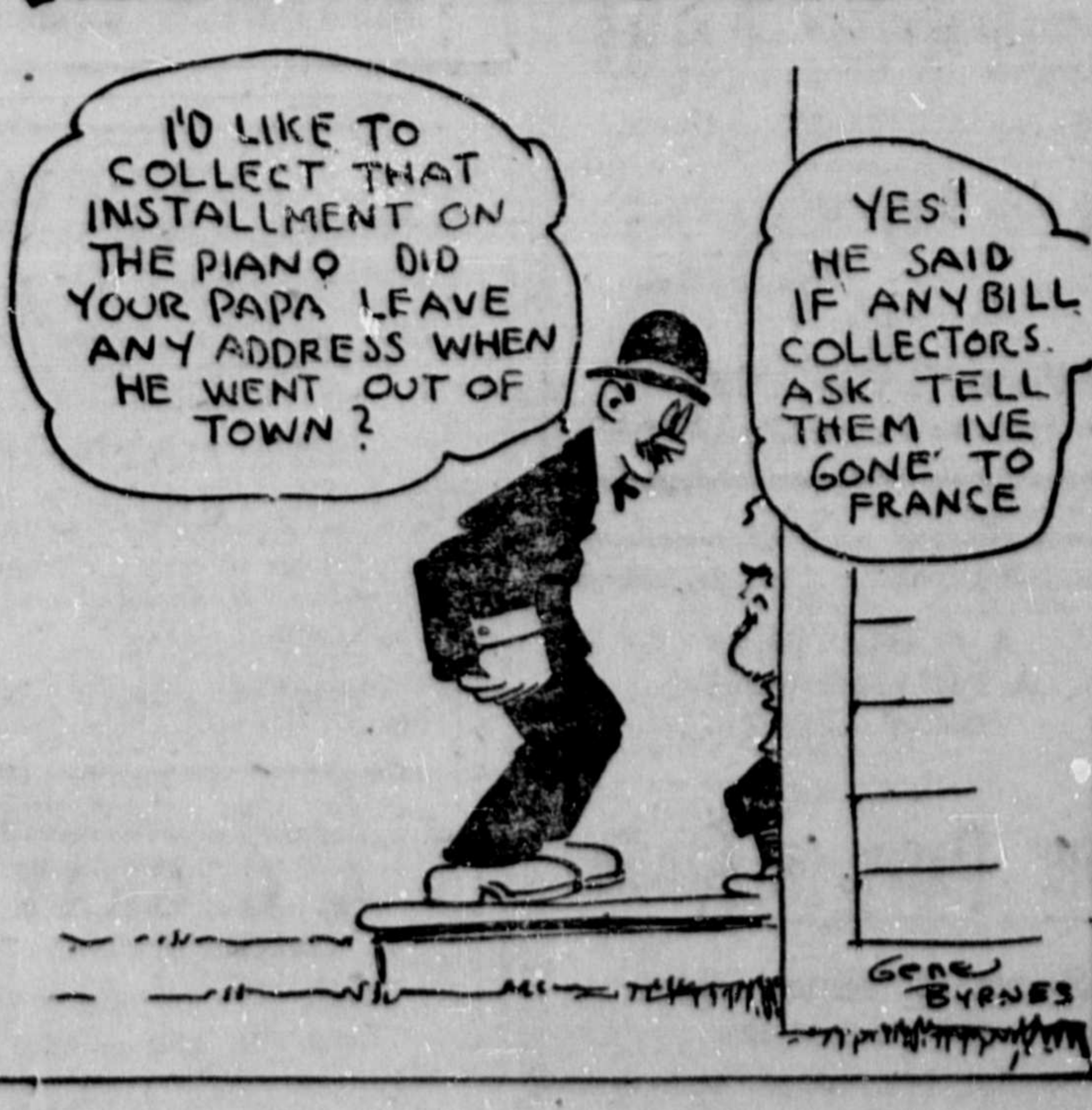

BUILDING IN VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, Jan. 3.—During 1919, building permits issued in this city numbered 1,232, representing a total value of \$2,271,361, compared with 829 permits issued in 1918 aggregating the value of \$1,410,384.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$200 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture.

Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased on conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and settling with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchaser claims whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
