# Japanese Troops Rushed to Siberia to Aid Admiral Kolchak

Reinforcements at Irkutsk for Anti-Bolshevik Commander. Denikine Loses Four Thousand Square Miles Territory.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., January 6.—Heavy Japanese forces WILLIAM SLOAN have been rushed across Siberia to Irkutsk to aid the forces of Admiral Kolchak there, according to a cable from Tokio to a Japanese newspaper at Honolulu. Recent dispatches indicated that several local social revolutionary insurrections had broken out in the Irkutsk district and that all was not as smooth as it might be between the All Russian government and the Czecho-Slovak armies, who are still in Siberia, employed in guarding the Says railway lines. Apparently the desposition of Admiral Kolchak as commander in chief in favor of General Semenoff is not finding favor with the admiral himself, but neither the general nor the admiral are on good terms with General Syrovey, commanding the Czecho-Slovak armies, which fought their way from southern Russia through the Bolshevik armies, on their way home to their own countries via Vladivostok.

> Pre-emption new confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Carpentier will put up a good Partnership pre-emptions abolished. but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective Pre-emptors must occupy claims for

five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant. Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 8 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be

granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence

of at least 2 years are required. Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include

payment of stumpage. Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.


