## Couzetlan in Mexico Totally Destroyed by Earthquake

Two Thousand Casualties including more than One Thousand Dead, according to an Official Report. Great Damage Done at Other Points.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

MEXICO CITY, January 7.—The city of Couzetlan was destroyed utterly by Saturday's earthquake, which caused two thousand casualties among the inhabitants, including more than one thousand dead, according to official reports given out last night by Presidential Military Headquarters. From advices received from officers stationed at Vera Cruz, which was the centre of the disturbance, the entire garrison at Teocela was killed or injured. The dead among the soldiers numbered thirty and the injured sixty.

Virtually all the roads in the surrounding district are either flooded or destroyed, according to reports, making a survey of the destruction a matter of great difficulty. Many different points are still entirely cut off and have yet to be heard from as to the extent of the damage done.

At Barranca Grande, near Couzetlan, the dead are reported to number six hundred. At Port Barranca, the sea rose twenty-five metres high in a huge tidal wave, doing a great deal of damage as it rolled on the coast.

## WASHINGTON IS DETERMINED TO SUPPRESS REDS

Will Expend Million Dollars Enforcing Laws Against Bolsheviks.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The determination of the Government to carry its fight to a finish in its endeavor to rid the nation of the Communist and Communist Labor Party members is expressed by the Department of Justice officials here. More than twenty-five hundred of the radicals are now awaiting deportation proceedings as the result of the recent nationwide raids.

Over a million dollars, it is estimated, will be used in the enforcement of the laws against the radicals and their deportation and more than that amount if it is found to be required to keep the United States free from undesirable citizens of foreign extraction.

## PULP MILL FOR BUCKLEY BAY

Proposal to Install One Unit This Year and Operate Sawmill; New Principals.

VICTORIA, B.C., Jan. 7.—F. L. Buckley has left Victoria on a visit to Seattle where he will meet with his principals regarding putting in of a new pulp mill at Buckley Bay on Masset Inlet. The proposal at it stands at present includes the installation of one unit of the new mill this year, and the Masset Timber Company's mill will also be operated to capacity. A splendid water supply for this new industry in the Queen Charlotte Islands will be ensured by the damming of the river near the lake.

Negotiations have been in progress previously with reference to this new Pulp Mill with large English interests, which, however, fell through some time ago.

## STEAMER FARES ARE INCREASED

Prince Rupert to Vancouver Fare Now \$26.30—Increased Operation Cost Causes Rise.

Effective January 1, passenger rates on the Coast steamers have been increased on all lines between Vancouver and Alaska about 23 per cent. This action has been deemed necessary by the companies operating in the services on account of the increased cost of operating. Labor and fuel are the main items of increase in the operating end and the increase in the tariff is considered no more than proportionate with these increased operating costs.

The fare between here and Vancouver which in 1913 was \$18.00 and up until the end of 1919, \$24.25, has been raised to \$26.30 including war tax. The fare to Anxox is now \$8, including meals and berth.

## BIG INCREASE IN RAILROAD BUSINESS 1919

W. P. Hinton, General Manager of Grand Trunk Pacific, Issues Statement.

MUCH PLEASSED WITH INCREASE IN PAST YEAR

WINNIPEG, Jan. 7.—The following statement has been given out here by W. P. Hinton, vice-president and general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and Steamship lines:—

"There has been a notable increase in traffic handled by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway during the year 1919 over the previous year. The increase in freight business approximates an increase of 15 per cent, while the passenger revenue shows a 34 per cent increase. The year just past has been the best yet for passenger traffic on both railroad and steamships. Each month has shown a gradually increased amount of traffic over the lines and this is taken as an indication of an exceptionally prosperous season in 1920, in which all transportation companies will share.

"Despite drought and failure of crops the Grand Trunk Pacific moved 20 per cent more grain in 1919 than previously. The lines also handled 650,000 tons of commercial freight, chiefly from the new mines along the railway line in Alberta which now number 42. This, of course, does not include the coal used by the railway itself, most of which was obtained from the mines along the line.

"The lumber business also proved one of great importance in the traffic during the past year. There are now 36 mills located along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific, 34 of these being in British Columbia. In addition to this there are 20 mills contiguous to Prince Rupert that use the Grand Trunk Pacific lines.

"Fish shipments have also been of great importance and have increased greatly. This includes salmon, halibut and black cod. Mining prospects in Central British Columbia, although not yet in the shipping class show great promise of soon being such.

"Settlers are going in freely to the fertile sections of Central British Columbia, including the Bulkley and Nechako valleys, where millions of acres of the finest lands for agricultural, fruit growing and stock raising purposes, in a splendid climate, are available in the four hundred mile district between the Rocky Mountains and the Pacific Ocean. "Western Canada is undoubtedly entering upon an era of unexampled prosperity, in which the Grand Trunk Pacific will have a large part through the development of the new country which it has opened up."

## MAYOR AND MEMBER RETURNED TO CITY

Arrived From Vancouver on the Prince George at Noon Today.

Colonel Peck, V. C., and Mayor McClymont both arrived from the south on the Prince George this afternoon after having been absent from the city for nearly a month. During their absence they attended a conference with C. C. Ballantyne, Minister of Marine and Fisheries at Ottawa, on questions relative to the fishing industry in this country.

They come back with the report that their efforts in obtaining reform have met with considerable success and changes are to be put in force at once.

## EASTERN CITIES WANT SINGLE TAX

System Already Discarded in the West Being Actively Canvassed in the East.

While there are agitations in Eastern Canada, and especially in Ontario, favoring the single tax, or a modification of it, as a solution of taxation problems, Western Canadian cities are looking to higher assessments on improvements to meet theirs. Western Canada has tried the single tax, and Eastern Canada has not, with the possible exception of Ottawa and one or two other places that have only recently adopted the principle. The West has had enough of the single tax, and there is a warning for the East in its experience. Edmonton, Calgary, Saskatoon, South Vancouver and many other Western municipalities are raising the scale of taxation for improved property as the only way out of their financial troubles.

## FIFTH CONCERT BY SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA

The fifth concert to be given in the Westholme Theatre on Sunday will commence at 9:15 p.m. Admission will be by ticket to be obtained from members of the orchestra and from the local drug and music stores. Doors will be open from 8:50 to 9:15 p.m. for ticket holders, and after 9:15 for general admission.

Owing to an increase of 60 per cent in the price charged for the use of the theatre, patrons are requested to contribute to the collection, which will be made at the door, as liberally as possible, so that expenses may be met.

## MACKENZIE KING CRITICISES GOV'T.

Reviews Political Situation at the Present Time and Shows Cause of Ontario Conservative Debacle.

NEWMARKET, Ont., Jan. 7.—W. L. MacKenzie King, the Liberal leader in the Dominion House, characterises the record of the Union Government as a policy of drifting. He reviews exhaustively the political situation existing in the Dominion at the present time and claims that the Union Government has no constructive policy.

He declares that exasperation with the Government which had usurped the right of the people to govern themselves was the cause of the fall of the Ontario Conservative party.

## Advocates Public Owned Fisheries

Hon. Wm. Sloan, Fisheries Commissioner for B.C. Recommends to Dominion Government Ambitious Course to Conserve Industry.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VICTORIA, B.C., January 7.—The Hon. Wm. Sloan, Commissioner of Fisheries for British Columbia, in a memorandum forwarded to C. C. Ballantyne, Minister of Marine and Fisheries in the Dominion Government, advocates the Dominion Government taking over and operating the fisheries of the province, or else giving the Provincial Government the right to do so.

He says: "I suggest that the Government should assume the sole right to enter the salmon fishing industry, even although that may mean the payment of compensation to those firms already in the business. The plants of Northern British Columbia will in a short period be as valueless as the plants on the Fraser River, if the existing policy of depletion be continued. In that case the history of the Fraser will be repeated. The government can reduce the overhead expenses by several hundred per cent and in consequence can sell cheaper. It can employ returned men, put up a uniform pack and insure a continuance of the salmon run.

Mr. Sloan advocates the establishment of government cold storage plants at Prince Rupert and would eventually include all the fisheries under the government scheme.

## DON PECK LOSES REPAIR ACTION

Full Claim for Amount Due is Awarded to G. T. P. Development Company.

Yesterday Judge Young handed down his decision in the Grand Trunk Development Co. versus Don W. Peck awarding the full claim of \$1,554.28 to the plaintiffs. The case has been standing for the last two months and the evidence was heard a few weeks ago. It arises out of repairs made on a tug-boat for the defendant, who had counter claims in the action.

## TRADES AND LABOR ENDORSATIONS FOR THE CIVIC ELECTIONS

At an Executive meeting of the Trades and Labor Council held last evening, it was decided to recommend to the Council that the names of Alderman George Casey and George Rudderham be endorsed as candidates for election to the City Council for 1920. These two names are in place of Messrs. Allison and Greer previously endorsed by the Trades and Labor Council, but who did not accept. With S. D. Masdonald in line for election to the Police Commission, this completes the slate of the Trades and Labor Council for this year's elections.

George Ambrose, of the Carpenter's Union, and an old-timer in the City, is also being urged to run for election to the City Council. Should he decide to do so later, his name will also be put up for endorsement by the Trades and Labor Council.

## WORKMEN TAKE SHARES IN SHIP BUILDING YARD

Cholberg of Victoria to Employ Only Shareholders in Ship Construction.

## WORKMEN AGREE TO NOVEL EXPERIMENT.

VICTORIA, B.C., Jan. 6.—The workmen, at a big meeting with the Cholberg Shipyards here, have agreed to take shares in the company which will proceed with the building of wooden vessels here for the Dominion Government. Under an Order-in-Council passed by the Federal Cabinet, whatever shipyards contract with the Dominion Government to build ships on the 75 per cent loan basis must have at least 60 per cent of its workers returned soldiers.

At the meeting held here it was agreed that the only workers employed on the construction of these ships will be shareholders in the Company, and that the ordinary Trades Unions would not be recognized in the yards.

## COMPANY WILL NOT PAY MORE

Supt. Schellenberg Takes a Decided Stand on Strike Question.

The 35 laborers who walked out at the drydock yesterday morning demanding an increase of wages from 55c to 65c are still out today. Speaking to the Daily News this morning, Superintendent Schellenberg said: "The company has no intention of acceding to the demand because we cannot afford it. It is higher than is being paid in the south for the same class of work and the company will stand firm. Plenty of men can be obtained to do the work at the prevailing rate and if they cannot, then the plant will close. The strike will only be settled by the men returning to work or other men being obtained to take their places. The men walked out without notice and the trouble was probably inspired by a couple of agitators anyway."

## O. B. U. Not in It.

D. S. Cameron, general secretary of the O. B. U., disclaims that the Central Labor Council had anything to do with the strike as none of the men out are members of the organization. The Council has advised the strikers to go back to work pending arbitration in which the organization would be willing to assist. Tonight a meeting of the strikers will be held when a decision will probably be reached as to the continuation of the strike.

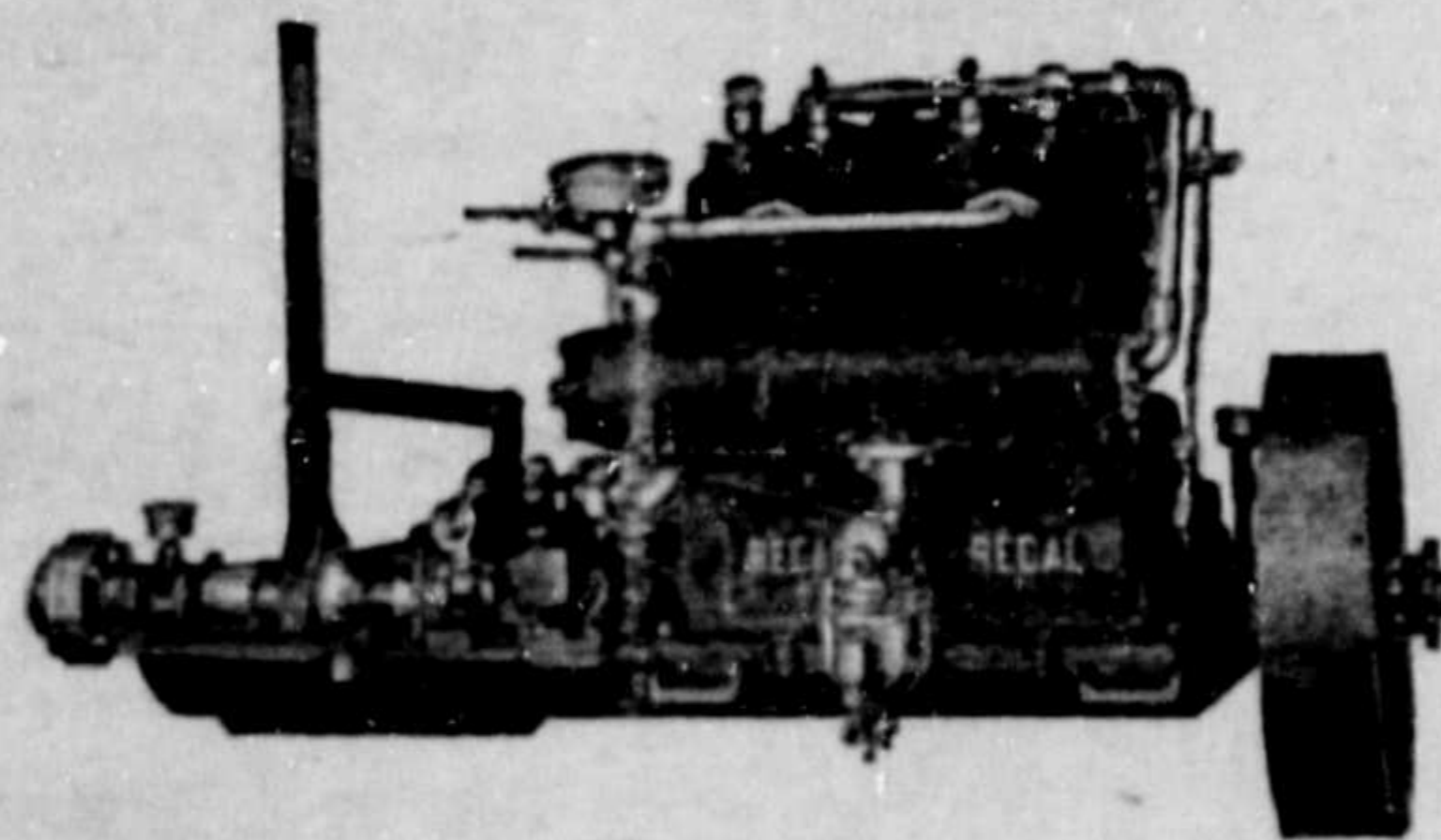

# Cabinet Looks Back On Year's Endeavor

**Provincial Credit Rehabilitated and Much Progressive Legislation is Result of Years Labors.**

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

VICTORIA, January 7.—Without in any way attempting to presuppose that every adult person in the Province of British Columbia is satisfied with the manner in which the Oliver Government administers the affairs of the province, it should be safe to say, in looking back over the past year, that at least some of the fruits of progressive legislation already are being garnered for the benefit of all concerned.

When the electorate decided that the time had come to end the career of the late administration there was evident a general conception that as a corollary to the advent of a Liberal Government all wrongs would be righted and British Columbia once again would be a land flowing with milk and honey. There were those, of course, who were no strangers to public service and who chose to temper the hope for better things with an intimate knowledge of the state into which conditions generally had been allowed to drift.

**An Empty Treasury.**

Unhappily, the tide showed no signs of turning and after two years of war the stern facts confronted the people of the province in dollars and cents. The treasury was empty and financial obligations had leapt to many millions. A general house cleaning at James Bay was inevitable.

Admittedly, this brief retrospect discovers nothing new. The fact does remain, however, that the task which confronted the present administration when it assumed office in the waning days of 1916 was not the ordinary one such as successive governments have a right to expect to find. On that account its works in advance were penalized by heavy handicaps and the future already was heavily mortgaged.

**Stocktaking Time.**

It will be recalled, too, that the late Premier Brewster characterized the year 1917 as a year of stocktaking. He was even too optimistic in supposing that so short a diagnosis of the ills from which the province was suffering would be sufficient upon which to prescribe the ingredients for an effective remedy. It was not until

after the session of 1918 that the present guardians of the public service actually found their feet and were able to deal intelligently with an actual and properly estimated condition.

With these facts once again placed in their proper perspective, therefore, the Government of the day is entitled to all credit for the excellence results from its labors which have been patent to opponent and supporter alike through the year which is now ended.

**Much Good Legislation.**

The year 1919 has witnessed the operation of a batch of constructive legislation. Opponents of the Government have been free with criticism; but the general public in no part of the province has appeared to manifest any definite hostility to its policies.

Nobody likes additional taxation and there have been grumbles from time to time. The old adage, however, is as true today as it was of old, "You cannot have your cake and eat it." The province had been spending a great deal more each year than it had been receiving. There comes a time, however, when that sort of thing must stop.

Nor is it necessary to emphasize that the country's obligation to the former members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force and the conditions resultant from five years of war are the responsible factors for a still more or less top-heavy policy of expenditure. These are, of course, uncontrollable features of government, which are common to the whole of the British Empire. They constitute the toll of war. Nevertheless it is a condition that is not calculated to add to the popularity of any Government, particularly when that Government has been obliged to follow a predecessor whose lavish hand in the matter of public expenditure was not hampered by considerations which have made themselves felt during the last twelve months.

**Rehabilitating Credit.**

Reversion to a policy which contemplates an even ledger balance, however, has been responsible for rehabilitating the credit of the province and the genuine endeavor on the part of the administration to get back to normal has been evident to those financial interests to whom the province has disposed of its bonds from time to time. Recent flotations, moreover, have demonstrated to the country that British Columbia is keeping her house in order to the extent at least of cutting her cloth according to her measure.

Among the outstanding legislation accomplished by the Government in the last year is the new Department of Industries, the Public Utilities Act, the Community Settlement scheme and the Better Housing Act, iron and steel, oil, railway construction, irrigation, roads, social legislation, and the appointment of a Commission of State Health Insurance, public nursing and widows' pensions, are a few of the other matters which have received close attention.

**A Good Year.**

There are many other important phases of development to which the Government has directed its attention. But as it will have been observed at the outset, the time for them to become obvious in their practical form and intent may yet be some distance away. Suffice it to say, however, that the year 1919 has demonstrated the value of a stock-taking programme which took every cabinet minister to different sections of the province and provided him with first hand information upon its needs.

## Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after five years' residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased for five or ten years.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
