## British Bolsheviks Waiting Opportunity

### Claimed Working for Overthrow of Government and Establishment of Soviet Similar to Course in United States.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, Bolshevik agitators in this country are working energetically along lines similar to those projected by the radicals in America; namely, for the overthrow of the government and the establishment of a soviet form of government. It is probable that the plans on this side of the Atlantic have not yet reached the point achieved by those in the United States, but it is believed that the radicals here are rapidly reaching the point where they might seize upon some big labor strike as an opening opportunity for starting a revolutionary movement. While these facts are common knowledge it is said to be impossible for the British authorities under the present ultra-liberal laws of free speech to do much more than watch the progress of events. In other words it is declared that the British, broadly speaking, cannot take preventive measures, but must be content to deal with some actual events. The Red Idea, it is asserted, is to work for affiliation with existing organizations rather than force the organization of new societies. At the present time, the agitators cannot be reached by law, except for direct incitement to revolt, or some other breach of the peace. Still, Great Britain seemingly is not unduly disconcerted at the trend of events, believing in the power of the law to cope with any actual attempt to use force, and trusting in the good sense of the public not to be misled by propaganda.

## BOLSHEVIK SUCCESS IN SOUTH RUSSIA

### Occupy Denikine's Headquarters and Capture British Guns and Tanks Among Booty.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, January 8.—The Bolshevik forces have occupied the Yaganrogin territory of the Don Cossacks on the North shore of the Sea of Azov. A Moscow wireless says that the Red Cavalry have occupied Yaganrogin town, General Denikine's former headquarters at noon Tuesday. Among the booty captured were included several British guns and tanks.

## APPROVE AGREEMENT RE PURCHASE OF G. T.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, January 8.—Another step towards the completion of the government end of the agreement for the purchase of the Grand Trunk Railway system was made with the approval by the Governor in Council of the form of agreement between the Grand Trunk and the Government. The announcement was made today that the agreement had been approved.

## AERIAL MAIL TO ALASKA PLANNED

SEATTLE, Jan. 6.—A petition signed by 100,000 residents of Alaska and the State of Washington, asking for the establishment of aerial mail service between Seattle and the Northern territory, is to be obtained through the co-operation of commercial, social and fraternal associations within the boundaries of the state and territory, and it is to be sent to Otto Praeger, second assistant postmaster-general in charge of the aerial mail service.

The Aero Club of the Northwest—an organization which recently reached out and took in the Seattle Flyers' Club, composed of more than 100 Seattle men who "won their wings" during the—behind the movement for this colossal petition.

Derby to Boost Idea.

In the meantime Alaska has spoken in various forms in favor of the Seattle-to-Alaska aerial mail. The newspapers have been supporting the project enthusiastically, while various commercial bodies have asked for information on the subject, expressing a desire to co-operate if somebody will only show them the way.

Then, too, the Alaska Derby, the great round-trip race between Seattle and Alaska, set for early next summer or late in the spring, is expected to boost the aerial mail project.

## PILOTS' WAGES TO BE ADJUSTED

### Arrangements Said Completed by Which Allowances Made for Two Months Until New Scale is Ready.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 8.—It is understood that arrangements have been completed between the Coast Guards and Captain Robertson, in charge of pilotage affairs for the Dominion, whereby pilots will receive wage allowances for the next two months during which time a new schedule will be prepared and adopted by the Ottawa authorities, which it is hoped will be satisfactory to both the government and to the pilots.

## MORE MONEY TO OUST THE RED ELEMENT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Congress is asked to appropriate additional sums aggregating \$1,500,000 to prosecute the campaign now under way to clean up the violent element among the radicals in the United States.

## TO TEST AUTHORITY OF BOARD OF COMMERCE

OTTAWA, Jan. 8.—A test case in the Manitoba courts will determine whether the Board of Commerce shall continue to operate or else cease its existence through lack of legal authority.

## PORTA PREDICTED EARTHQUAKES WELL AS END OF WORLD

### Claims Other of His Predictions Will Be Verified Before Many More Months.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 8.—The violent earthquake shocks which caused such damage in Mexico on Saturday were part of the seismic disturbances which he predicted as the result of the conjunction of six planets on the same side of the sun, according to Professor Albert F. Porta. The professor was credited with predicting the end of the world on December 17.

The Mexican earthquakes and those which occurred on January 3 in the Canary Islands are to be considered as the product of the league of planets which he told of as far back as last August, Porta said. He claims that other of his prognostications would be verified within a few months.

## THE "SOVIET ARK" IN ENGLISH CHANNEL

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, Jan. 8.—The United States transport Buford, otherwise known as the "Soviet Ark," carrying on board a cargo of Bolsheviks expelled from the United States, is now lying in the English Channel awaiting further orders to her destination, before proceeding further. It is expected that she shall sail to some port giving access to Soviet Russia.

## MEDITERRANEAN STORM

PARIS, Jan. 8.—Twenty-seven persons were drowned when two vessels were sunk in a terrific storm which swept over the Mediterranean off the coasts of France.

## Troops Raid Sinn Feiners in Dublin

### Throughout Ireland Police are Armed With Lewis Guns. Soldiers and Police Seized Offices of Sinn Fein Parliament.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, January 8.—A dispatch received here from Belfast announces that the Government has equipped the police forces with Lewis guns in the movement against the Sinn Feiners in the south and west of Ireland. In Dublin itself, eighty soldiers armed with rifles and fixed bayonets and eighty trench implements raided the Sinn Fein Irish Parliament offices, those of the New Ireland Assurance Society, and of the Sinn Fein Society. The police assisted in the raid on the Sinn Fein offices. Dublin motor traffic is now reduced to a minimum as the result of an order issued by the Joint Strike Committee forbidding members of the Trades Unions to handle petrol.

## Organized Labor's Annual Interview With Officials To Discuss Eight Hour Day

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, January 8.—Organized labor will this afternoon have its annual interview with the Government. This meeting will be of special importance on this occasion in view of the labor principles incorporated in the Treaty of Versailles and the assent by the Dominion Government delegates to the conventions adopted by the International Labor Conference at Washington a few weeks ago.

The chief among the labor claims will be one for legislation for an eight-hour day and a forty-four-hour week. Labor men contend that this principle of an eight-hour day was frankly recognized by Canada in the Treaty of Versailles, and that effect should be given to such recognition through legislation, accordingly. Further emphasis is placed upon the fact that the Dominion Government delegates voted for an eight-hour day convention adopted by the Washington Conference. The Washington Convention calls for an eight-hour day and a forty-four-hour week for industrial workers.

## A.C. Garde Advocates Smelter For Skeena

### Draws Attention to Large Deposits of Iron Ore in Vicinity. Steel and Iron Needed for Shipbuilding.

The last issue of the Vancouver Sun carries an interview with A. C. Garde, the well known mining engineer of Prince Rupert. Mr. Garde discusses the establishment of iron smelting works and favors the Copper River district for the location of the smelter, because of the proximity of the vast fields of ore in that region. The ore is limonite which is better than magnetite for smelting purposes. In addition to the iron, there is an abundance of coking coal awaiting exploitation, and the necessary

fluxes, chiefly lime, are also available. The proximity of this district to the line of the G. T. P. is another important feature.

Continuing, Mr. Garde says: "British Columbia is practically the only section of the Pacific Coast which can produce iron ore in such large quantities and in addition has large deposits of other valuable minerals such as gold and silver lead. Steel plates for the building of ships were and probably are now sent into this country from the United States at a cheap rate under war measures, but that cannot be expected to continue, and when it does cease the natural question arises as to where the steel and iron are to come from. It is a national question and the sooner it is dealt with the better it will be for Canada."

"Shipbuilding depends upon the proximity of the smelter, and it is a matter of economics as to the desirability of transporting steel plates and iron a long distance to the yards as against placing the shipyards themselves close up against the smelter and iron works. If the necessary developments are carried out Canada will be able to supply the United States, and the eastern markets, which are opening wider and larger every year, will not be too big for the immense output of which British Columbia is capable."

## CONTRACTS FOR SHIPBUILDING STILL COMING

### Other Two Vessels to be Con- structed by Canadian Govern- ment—Sixty Steel Ships Already Authorized.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, Jan. 8.—That further contracts will be let for the construction of ships for the Canadian Mercantile Marine to bring the total number of the vessels up to seventy, and that thereafter shipbuilding yards throughout the Dominion will be assisted by bonuses, is predicted here as the result of a conference held by the Government and the representatives of the shipbuilders yesterday. Already contracts have been let for sixty steel ships over a score of which are now in commission.

## STATE OF SIEGE IN CATALONIA

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

MADRID, Jan. 8.—A state of siege has been proclaimed throughout the province of Catalonia. In Barcelona, the capital, there are over a hundred thousand people out of employment. Food is scarce and very high in price and the unrest among the population is very marked.

## BOYCOTT THREATENED

DELHI, India, Jan. 8.—British goods will be boycotted throughout Mohammedan India if the peace settlement come to by the Supreme Council in Paris with Turkey is not satisfactory to the Musselmans.

## BRITISH PLANS INTERNATIONAL AIR TRAFFIC

### Ambitious Plan for Aerial Pas- senger Transportation Ar- ranged by Big Firm.

WASHINGTON.—Alfred Nutting, clerk in American consulate general, London, Eng., writes to the Department of Commerce that it is reported that a large British combine, financially and well supported, and with which Messrs. Vickers are stated to be principally concerned, proposes to put into execution a world-embracing plan for passenger airship transportation.

Routes have been planned so that no important city will be over ten days' air journey from London, the following being the chief main lines and times occupied in making flights from London:—

It is pointed out that while the speed of airships is less than aeroplanes, it is five times greater than that of the average ocean liner, and a non-stop flight up to 10,000 miles is possible. The proposed fares from London will be: To New York, \$243; to Capetown, \$876, and to Australia \$696. This is, approximately, \$0.08 per mile, and mails will be carried at \$0.06 per ounce. The proposed type of airship is estimated to cost \$19,466,000, to have a capacity of 3,500,000 cubic feet, to be capable of a speed of 60 miles per hour, and of carrying 15 tons of passengers and mails a distance of 4,500 miles.

## CONDEMN LAW FORBIDDING WORKERS' RIGHT

### Alberta Federation of Labor Will Oppose Legislation Aimed At Workers' Right To Strike.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

CALGARY, Alta, Jan. 7.—Turning down the resolution of Alexander Ross, M. P. P., favoring a forty-eight hour strike in protest to the conviction of Russell in Winnipeg, the Alberta Federation of Labor this afternoon passed a resolution in its place, placing the convention on record as being opposed to any legislation aimed at the right of the working man to strike. The resolution which was finally passed declared Labor's unalterable decision to refuse to recognize any law which forbids the right to strike.

## BERLIN FOOD SITUATION SAID SERIOUS

### Only Two Weeks Supply of Flour Available and Shortage of Food Expected.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

BERLIN, Jan. 7.—The Berlin newspapers discuss at great length and with much concern the news statements given out by the government regarding the food situation in the immediate future, so far as Berlin is concerned. Mayor Wermuth and his associates in the surrounding municipalities are not satisfied with the assurance given them in conference with the government. They assert that the government is unduly optimistic in view of the actual conditions.

The National Grain Bureau is disposing of only sufficient wheat supplies to ensure flour deliveries for fourteen days. Unless the rural stocks are quickly moved, it is admitted that the capital is facing a genuine catastrophe at the beginning of February. The City of Berlin this week is allowing a turnip ration of two pounds to offset the potato shortage.

## PROHIBITION ROUND-UP IN NORTH VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, January 8.—One doctor, three hotel proprietors, a billiard hall owner and several others in North Vancouver will have summonses served on them by the police as a sequel to a round-up under the provisions of the Prohibition Act.

## And in These Days Labor Shall Hire Capital.

An interesting forecast was made recently by Sir George Paish, the noted British economist, while lecturing in London when he said he looked forward to the time when the working people would be their own masters and when capital would be hired by labor and not labor by capital. And in this statement, Sir George opened up a pretty field for speculation, and under given conditions he saw no reason why the experiments already being made in some small measure should not be entirely successful. Taking them the world round, the working classes have never had so much money before—to spend—or to save. Many have saved more recently than they ever did in previous years and now have a margin to subscribe to the capital fund.

## Many People Prefer To Take Chances.

With possession of collateral, as security for capital, working men would also secure a low rate of interest. It would then be for the individual to decide whether to hire capital and take the risk of a loss—or mayhap profit—or else remain with a fixed and definite wage. Sir George Paish was of the opinion that most people would prefer to take the risk of making a profit. That was the way of human nature.

## Interest First, Wages Second.

Under these circumstances, interest on the capital would be the first charge on the industry even before wages. The interest would have to be paid first, in order to secure more capital, by the use of which the payment of the wages would be made possible. An alliance with the professional classes was suggested by Sir George—with the men who knew how to manage, which is what everyone does not know. Meantime the alliance is between capital and the professions, although with the growth of the labor movement, this will gradually be swung about as labor finds that it needs experts in their own lines in big management.

## Progress of Country

## Reflected in Railway Returns.

The general increase of traffic, both passenger and freight, over the lines of the G. T. P. for the past year is symptomatic of the conditions of that part of British Columbia through which the line passes. The increase in business is decided and progressive and shows a steady acceleration. With a succeeding increase in the same ratio even, which the real figures will doubtless exceed, for 1920, a definite place in the order of things although already established, will be proven to those doubting, for the central portion of British Columbia. Already there are thirty-one sawmills operating along the line of the railway between the coast and the Alberta boundary, of which twenty are contiguous to Prince Rupert. Already the premier fishing port of the Pacific and the centre of the richest mining district on the continent, the optimism which has held up her population since the city was established is thoroughly justified.

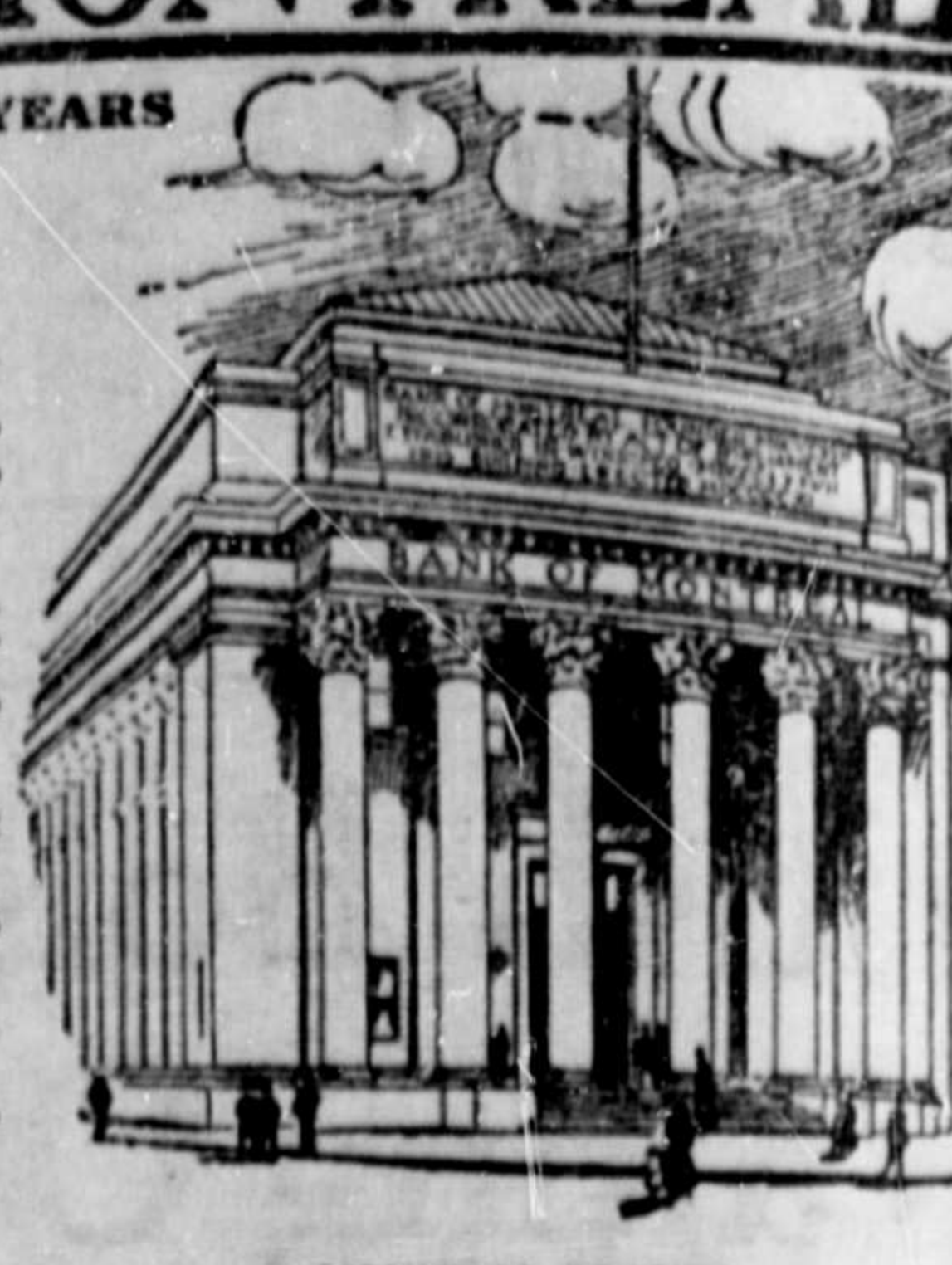

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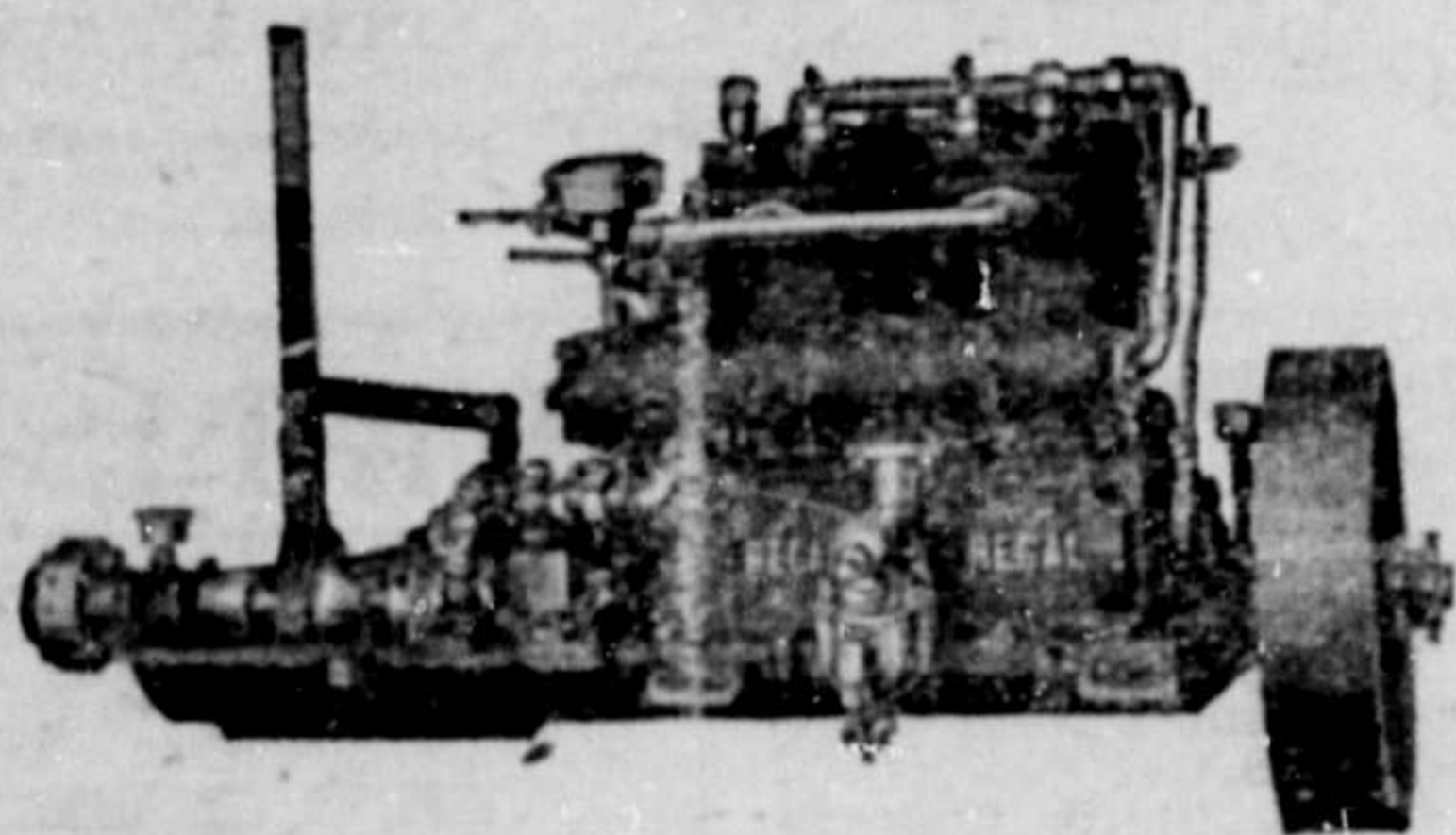

**THE DRYDOCK STRIKE**

Committee of Strikers to Wait on Company This Afternoon; Men Will Resume Work Pending Result.

A meeting was held last night of the laborers, steelhandlers and helpers working at the drydock, when it was decided to request 65c. per hour with the prevailing overtime rates. A committee composed of two of the striking laborers, and one each of the steel handlers and helpers, together with S. D. MacDonald, representing the Trades and Labor Council, and D. S. Cameron; the O. B. U., was formed to meet the company officials this afternoon and negotiate a settlement of the differences.

Pending the result of this meeting, it was agreed that the men return to work, and the majority of them started in this morning.

**FISHERIES DELEGATION SATISFIED**

Mayor McClymont and M. P. McCaffery Express Gratification At Outcome of Delegations' Efforts at Ottawa.

Yesterday the delegation which the city sent to Ottawa regarding the changes desired in the fisheries regulations, returned to town after, being away for several weeks. Colonel Peck, the member for the district, expressed himself at the meeting of the G. W. V. A. as more than satisfied with the success attained. M. P. McCaffery, another member of the delegation, when seen this morning coincided in his expression of gratification. "It is the most satisfactory," said Mr. McCaffery when seen this morning, "in that we have been fighting for these changes for a number of years. Great credit is due to Colonel Peck, our member of Parliament, and his being on the delegation was invaluable in obtaining the results secured. At the same time another citizen of Prince Rupert must not be forgotten, who although not one of the delegates, has fought for these reforms tooth and nail for the past ten years, and that is G. W. Nickerson. In season and out, he has advocated these changes, and when others had practically given up the fight, he never lost his enthusiasm. Any British subject can now compete with the present cannery firms, who no longer have a monopoly in their business, and likewise can obtain a licence to fish for salmon on the rivers, without having to go to the canneries to get it."

**The Mayor's Report.**

Mayor McClymont is also well pleased with the success of the mission and said:

"The cannery monopoly has been broken by the orders-in-council that our delegation has succeeded in having passed. The law passed three years ago that no canneries would be built for five years has been cancelled and, moreover, anyone can now build a cannery. The result is that operations on three new canneries are to commence almost immediately on the Skeena River which will probably be ready for next fishing season."

"Any person, provided he is a British subject, may now obtain a gill net license and there will be no limitation outside of the fact that the license holders must be British subjects. One thing that the delegation was not successful in getting was the use of gas boats in fishing on the Skeena River."

"On the whole I am very well pleased with the results of our mission as they have exceeded our expectations. The new orders will mean a more progressive and fair fishing industry on the Skeena River with British subjects reaping the benefits."

**STILL WAS SEIZED AT ALICE ARM**

Case Was Up Before Magistrate McMullin Yesterday—\$300 Fine.

O. M. Walker, a resident of Alice Arm, was yesterday fined \$300 by Stipendiary Magistrate McMullin for having a still on his premises. The arrest was made shortly before Christmas by Constable Scarlett and the complete outfit for the making of "moonshine" was found. Magistrate McMullin imposed a moderate fine but stated that if any other cases of this kind appeared from this quarter the stiffer penalty would be inflicted.

**THE TAXES ON JOHN D.**

NEW YORK.—An estimated value of \$1,000,000 is placed upon John D. Rockefeller's furniture, jewellery, "horses and carriages," and other personal effects in New York, in an itemized statement which his attorney presented in protest against the New York tax assessment of \$5,000,000. His application for a reduction of \$2,000,000 was granted.

## COLONEL PECK TELLS G.W.V.A. OF CONFERENCE

Success Achieved by Delegation  
Far Exceeded Expectations.

Colonel Cyrus W. Peck, V. C., M. P., addressed the Great War Veterans' Association at a special meeting last night on the fisheries question and the result of the mission of the recent delegation to Ottawa. Colonel Peck stated that the results achieved far exceeded the expectations of the members. The new reforms will now make a naval reserve on this coast a possibility which, under the old conditions was out of the question.

The delegation had met with much opposition from big interests and other sources but the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, was a broad minded man and could readily see where the reforms urged by the delegation were of great advantage to the Pacific coast fishing industry.

In the matter of the re-establishment of soldiers in the fishing business, Col. Peck stated that he had taken the matter up with the Minister and Commissioner Black. The outlook was very encouraging in this respect, but nothing definite had been done, so he could make no statement or promises.

## THRILLING PHOTOPLAY AT WESTHOLME TONIGHT

## NEW MILL FOR WHALENS IN WASHINGTON STATE

A four million dollar paper mill is to be erected at Port Angeles, Washington, to use British Columbia pulp, and will be in operation by next fall, according to George F. Whalen, who has returned to Vancouver from the east after organizing capital for the new industry. The money is largely from United States capitalists.

Operation of this plant opens up another channel for better marketing of British Columbia pulp, according to Mr. Whalen. It enables the paper consumers to avoid the high duty on Canadian paper. Whalen states that the demand for pulp from British Columbia is very strong and increasing rapidly. The Canadian directors of the company are Mr. James Whalen and Mr. George F. Whalen.

Atcheson at the Canal du Nord under very gallant and trying conditions. A body of the enemy had been overlooked in an advance and after a dugout had been passed a large number of them sprung up practically cutting off Lieut. Atcheson and his small platoon. Although severely wounded, the lieutenant led his men until the enemy had been overcome. Lieut. Atcheson enlisted as a private.

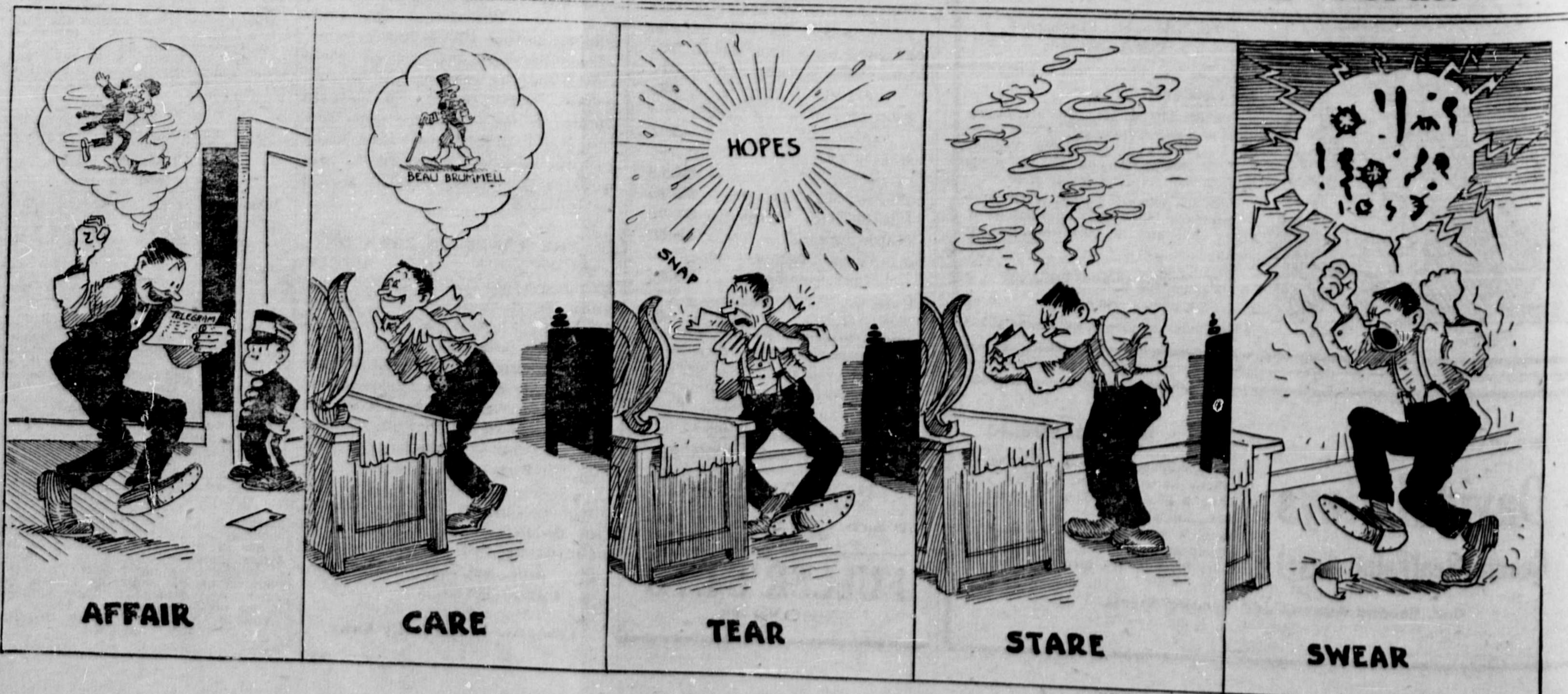

## PAPER MILLS THREATEN TO CLOSE DOWN

Because Government insists on  
Canadian Press Being Sup-  
plied Before Newsprint  
is Exported.

TORONTO, January 7.—R. A. Pringle, the Newsprint Paper Controller, in an interview here today referred to the threat of Price Brothers & Co., Ltd., to close the paper mills because the control of the Canadian paper product which was begun during the war under the War Measures Act was still being continued.

"This would be unfortunate," said the paper controller, "as it would be a serious loss both to themselves and to the publishers with whom they now have contracts running. It would also throw a large number of workmen out of employment." Continuing, Mr. Pringle said: "Price Brothers have absolutely refused to comply with the Government's orders and consequently the minister of customs has placed at their mills officials who will prevent the export of newsprint from Canada to the extent that may be necessary to ensure the Canadian press receiving their full quota of paper."

The extreme desire on the part of the paper manufacturers to export their product to the United States is brought about by the present state of the market and the exchange situation. Owing to the shortage of newsprint in the United States, publishers there are bidding against each other for supplies and have run the price away up above the controlled price in Canada. This together with the favorable exchange rates for exports, has led certain mills to cut down their supplies to the Canadian consumers, and Price Brothers, Ltd., to intimate that they would cease supplying newsprint to their Canadian customers at all. The paper controller immediately took the matter in hand and informed the manufacturers that Canadian newspapers must receive sufficient paper before any paper would be allowed to be exported.
