Newman Erb Has Injunction To Take Control of Dry Dock

Legal Fight in Progress to Secure Control of Company. Mr. Justice Murphy Issued Injunction Saturday. Argument In Court Tomorrow.

(Special to the Daily News via Government Telegraphs.)
VANCOUVER, B. C., January 12.—Armed with the sealed injunction order of Mr. Justice Murphy, Newman Erb, the American railway magnate, left Vancouver Sunday morning for Prince Rupert to take over the personal direction of the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Co., says the Vancouver Sun this morning. In the meantime the legal battle over the control of the company, in which Erb claims to be chairman of directors, will be resumed at Victoria on Tuesday morning. If on that occasion E. C. Mayers, counsel for Alex. Manson and his associates, can show that his parties have a greater financial interest in the company than Erb and his associates, the injunction granted on Saturday to put Manson et al out of control will be dissolved and Erb's trip to Prince Rupert will be fruitless. It is Erb's contention that he and he alone is financially interested.

The proposition facing Mr. Mayers is that he must convince the judge that his clients have a greater financial interest in the company than the New York magnate, as Mr. Justice Murphy stated that he would leave the control of the company in the hands of the party having the greatest financial interest.

Erb alleges that he is a creditor of the company for \$85,000 and that he is personally liable on a bond to the Dominion Government for \$320,000, guaranteeing the completion of the contract for the ships now being built. He also alleges that the Manson group have no financial interest in the company. Unless by the time of his arrival the injunction has been discontinued, Erb will immediately take control by putting his own people in charge of the company's office and works.

AEROPLANES TO HAVE BASE AT PRINCE RUPERT

Four Stations to be Established in B. C. on Government Work; Air Board to Have Hundred Machines Soon.

VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 12.—Prince Rupert will be one of the four bases for aeroplane operation in British Columbia, according to Major D. MacLaren, D.S.O., member of the Canadian Air Board. The other stations are expected to be on Vancouver Island or on the lower mainland, Kamloops and Banff. These machines will be under government control and will be operated chiefly for fire ranging work, government survey and photographic expeditions. Their use will be of very great assistance in each of these departments, and will save much time in the newer parts of the province where communications are poor.

Some time during the Spring, the Canadian Air Board will have at its disposal a hundred aeroplanes.

Alleged Admiral Himself is Arrested by Revolutionaries Who Now Control.

FINNISH GENERAL TAKES COMMAND WESTERN FRONT

LONDON, Jan. 12.—According to the Daily Mail's Harbin Correspondence dated January 9, the All-Russian Government in Siberia says that Irkutsk is wholly occupied by the Social Revolutionists and that Kolchak's Army has been completely dispersed. Japanese civilians have been evacuated from Irkutsk. A Moscow wireless dated Friday intimates that Admiral Kolchak, head of the All-Russian Government in Siberia, has been arrested at Irkutsk.

One Command in West.
STOCKHOLM, Jan. 12.—General Mannerheim, the former Finnish premier and commander of the Finnish White Forces in the struggle of 1918, is shortly to have all the anti-Bolshevik forces on the Western Russian front from the White Sea to the Black sea, under his command.

FEW ARRIVALS AT THE FISH WHARVES

Princess Mary Cleaned up Frozen Fish at Atlin Fisheries Wharf.

There were two boats in for the Fish Exchange yesterday morning, both selling to the Pacific Sea Products Co. at 13.7c and 10c. These were the first boats in for over a week. The Orient had 14,000 pounds and the Valid 4,000 pounds.

The Fisher arrived this morning with 16,000 pounds which has not yet been sold.

The Princess Mary southbound from Alaska on Saturday evening called at the Atlin Fisheries wharf and took out twelve tons of frozen salmon and halibut.

SILVER CONTENT OF CANADIAN COINS TO BE MADE LESS

High Price of Silver Induces Melting Down of Coinage for Profit.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, Jan. 12.—The silver content in Canada's silver coins is to be greatly reduced by an order published in the Canadian Gazette which states that "at the end of January, 1920, the standard for silver coins of currency of the Dominion of Canada shall be, that of 1,000 parts of weight, 800 shall be of fine silver, and 200 of alloy."

Sir Henry Drayton, minister of Finance, stated that this would bring the Canadian coinage to the same level as that of many other countries, and would check any melting of silver coins for the sake of the silver. With the rise in the price of silver, many Canadian coins would be disappearing from circulation, and there was a practical certainty that they were so being melted down.

BRITISH AND RUSSIAN PRISONERS EXCHANGE

All Arrangements Practically Concluded and Exchange of Prisoners Commenced.

COPENHAGEN, Jan. 12.—The negotiations between Maxim Litvinoff and James O'Grady, representing the Russian Bolsheviks and the British Governments respectively, for the exchange of prisoners have nearly reached a conclusion satisfactorily and an agreement has been arrived at on all fundamental points.

The release of British prisoners in Russia is said to have commenced already, and the British government is arranging for the release of Russian prisoners.

Carpentier's Manager Says Championship Fight Will Be Pulled Off in New Jersey

BORDEAUX, France, Jan. 12.—Georges Carpentier knocked out "Blink" McClosky at the beginning of the second round on Saturday. At the conclusion of the fight, M. Deschamps, Carpentier's manager, announced that he had telegraphed Jack Dempsey's manager that the Dempsey-Carpentier fight would take place in New Jersey on September 6 (Labor Day).

News to Dempsey.
LOS ANGELES, January 12.—"All arrangements for me to fight with Carpentier are in Kearns' hands," Jack Dempsey said in respect of Deschamps' statement that the contest would be held in New Jersey on September 6. "I have made no effort to keep up with the various proposals made. This New Jersey affair is news to me, but may be it won't be to Kearns."

Would Prevent Fight.
SACRAMENTO, Cal., January 12.—Governor Wm. D. Stephens of California announced today that he would ask the Federal Government at Washington to impose passport restrictions that would prevent the proposed world's championship bout between Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier at Tijuana, Mexico, just across the border line from California.

GERMAN POLITICAL SITUATION SERIOUS

Reported in Belgium that Government Has Been Overthrown and Unoccupied Districts in Throes of Strike.

BRUSSELS, Jan. 12.—Travelers from Germany bring unofficial reports that the German government has been overthrown and that the Socialists are the masters of the situation in that country. It is also declared that a general strike has been declared in those parts of the country not occupied by the Allied forces.

Peace Terms Ratified In Paris on Saturday

United States Only Nation now Not on Full Peace Footing with Germany. The Kings Congratulations.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, January 12.—Replying to a loyal message from the citizens of London on the occasion of the ratification of the Peace Treaty, the King has telegraphed to the Lord Mayor of London as follows: "With all my heart I reciprocate their hopes and fervently pray that, please God, this day may be the dawn of a new era in which the people of the British Empire may forever live at peace with themselves and with all men."

Ratifications Exchanged.
PARIS, January 12.—The ratifications of the Treaty of Versailles were exchanged and peace between Germany, France, Great Britain and the other allied and associated powers, with the exception of the United States, became effective at 4:16 o'clock on Saturday afternoon. There were eleventh-hour rumours of a further postponement, but these proved to be groundless. Outstanding comment on the situation is that it leaves the United States the only power which was actively at war with Germany not now on a peace basis.

Will the League be Real?
LONDON, Jan. 12.—Whether the League of Nations is to be a real thing or an imposture depends upon the attitude of the peoples, and not the least the British people, is the opinion of Lord Robert Cecil, who as chairman of the executive committee of the League of Nations Unions, issued the statement today.

BORDEN WENT WITH JELICOE

Sailed on Cruiser New Zealand for South America and Cape-town thence London.

HALIFAX, N. S., January 12.—Premier Sir Robert Borden sailed with Admiral Viscount Jellicoe on board the cruiser New Zealand leaving here Saturday. It has been learned here that the "New Zealand" is bound for the Port of Spain, Trinidad, from where she will sail for Pernambuco, Montevideo and Cape Town, and from the latter port she will return to London.

STRIKERS FIND THAT NEGOTIATIONS IMPOSSIBLE

Claim That Nobody in Authority at Shipyards so Strike Cannot be Settled; Gone Back to Work.

"The men who went out on strike at the dry dock last week have decided to go back to work until such time as the differences between the heads of the shipyards company are settled. At the present time negotiations are impossible as nobody down there seems to have any authority, thus a strike is useless." This was the explanation given to a Daily News representative this morning by D. S. Cameron, secretary of the local Central Labor Council, O.B.U., when inquiry was made as to the outcome of the strikers' meeting at the O.B.U. Hall on Saturday afternoon. The hall was crowded to overflowing with the strikers and their sympathizers.

WOMEN STUDENTS DINE IN HALL WITH BENCHERS

First Time Feminine Graces Displayed in Historic Building Since Queen Elizabeth's Reign.

LONDON, Jan. 12.—Four women who were recently admitted as students to the Temple "dined in the Hall" with the benchers. This is the first occasion of such a privilege being accorded and the first time any women have been permitted at a Hall dinner since Queen Elizabeth visited the first performance of Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night" in the same hall.

MILWAUKEE MEMBER DENIED SEAT TWICE

Victor Berger, Representative for Milwaukee, Excluded From Washington House for Second Time.

NOMINATED AGAIN FOR THE THIRD TIME.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 12.—Victor Berger, socialist, who was elected representative to the House from Milwaukee, has been denied his seat in the Federal House of Representatives for the second time. Chairman Dellinger of the Election Committee, said that Berger was excluded the first time "not because of his so-called Radical views, nor yet because he is a socialist but because he is ineligible to membership under the provisions of the constitution of the United States. This will disqualify him permanently."

Again Nominated.
MILWAUKEE, Wis., Jan. 12.—The Socialist Committee of the Fifth Wisconsin Congressional District, within half an hour of receiving news that Victor Berger had been excluded from Congress, for the second time re-nominated him.

BRITISH STEAMER WRECKED IN CHANNEL

WEYMOUTH, England, Jan. 12.—Thirty-five members of a crew of forty-four, belonging to the British steamer "Trefoil" were drowned when the vessel was wrecked on the Kimmeridge rock near St. Albans Head during a violent gale in the channel on Saturday.

The War Stimulated Personal Saving.

Great Britain has not yet finished taking stock of the gains and losses caused to the Empire through the war. The greatest loss was in killed and disabled, and after that in shipping. The latest Admiralty report shows that 2,479 ships of a tonnage of 7,59,090 gross, were sunk.

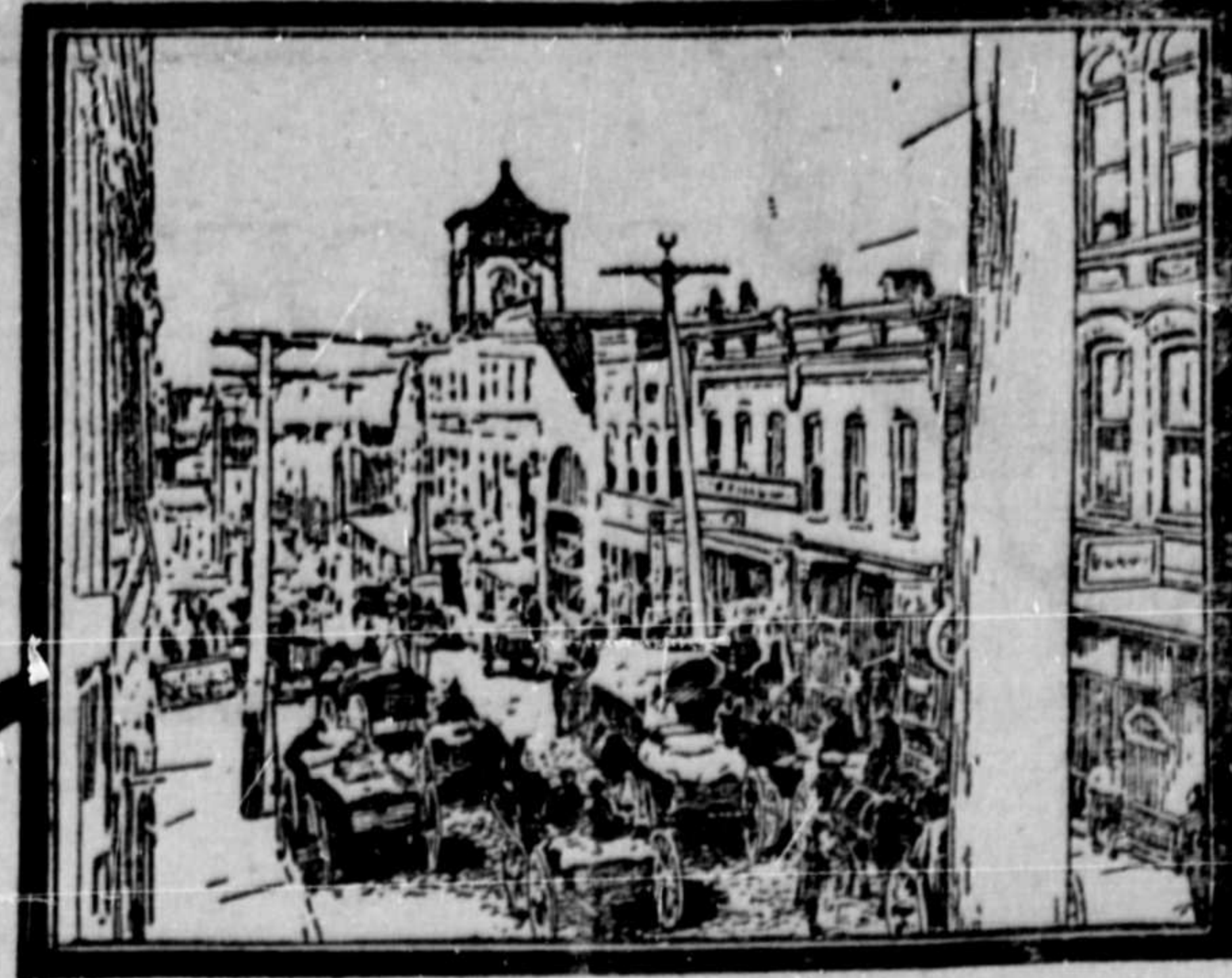

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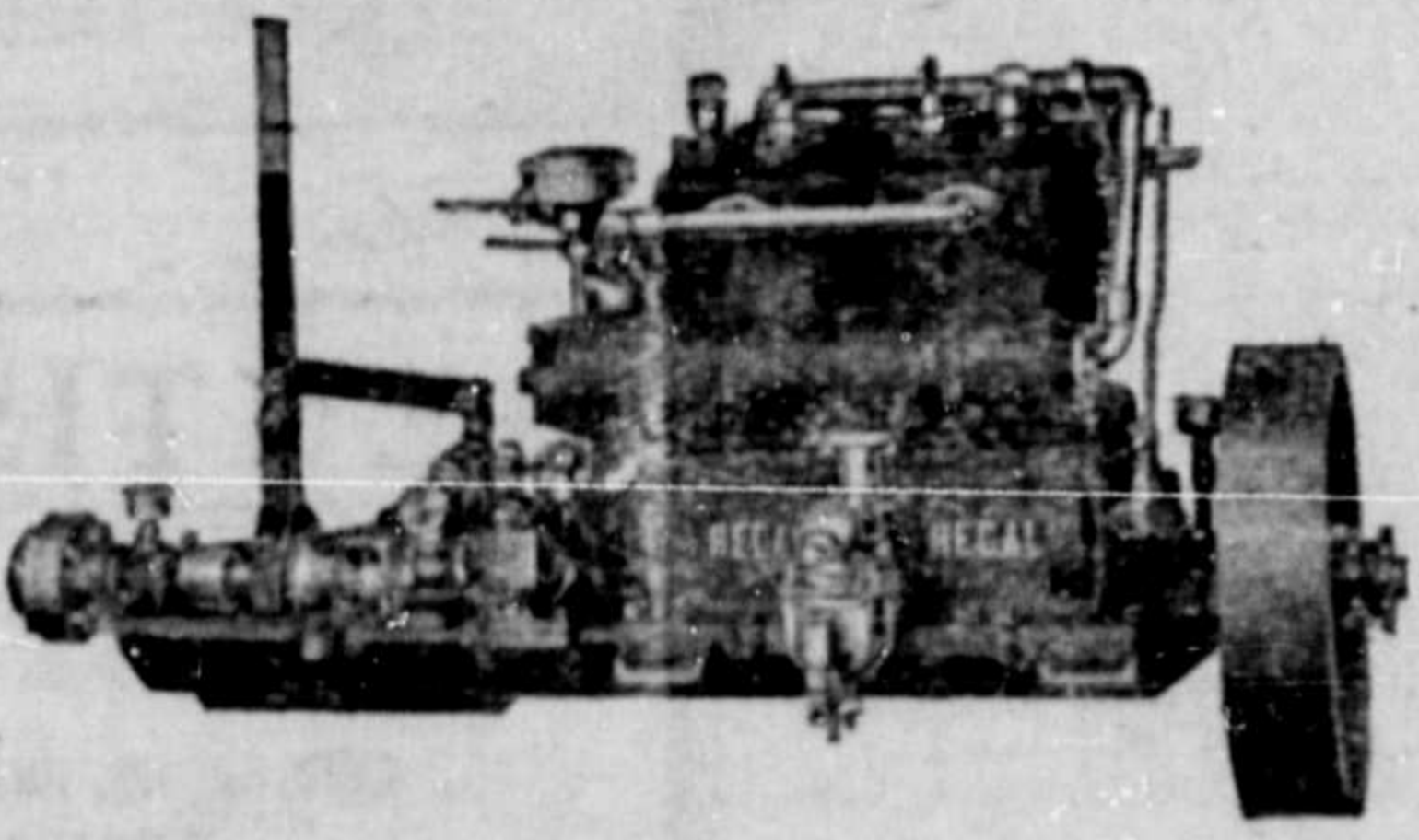

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**DOLLY VARDEN
 LAWYER PLEADS
 FOR ANNULMENT**

States That B. C. Legislation is Ultra Vires, Conflicting with Dominion Law.

The method adopted by the Dolly Varden Mines Co. in upsetting the British Columbia legislation handing the Dolly Varden mine over to the Taylor Mining Co. comes as an appeal to Ottawa to annul the Dolly Varden Mine Railway Amendment Act as being ultra vires and in conflict with the Dominion Winding Up Act.

R. T. Elliot, the Canadian solicitor for the Dolly Varden Co., has recently wired to Ottawa alleging that the B. C. legislation is illegal. It is claimed that the British Columbia government proceeded to create statutory liability and that the bankruptcy and insolvency proceedings were too drastic divesting the Dolly Varden Co., as it did, of all assets even surplus to the debt.

There is a year after the passage of the act before the Dominion Government is required to take action nullifying the B. C. legislation and in this case the time does not expire until April 12. The department of justice has replied to the communication acknowledging the protest.

NATIONAL DEBT NOW TOTALS \$1,838,131,058

Excess of Revenue Over Expenditure Dwindled During December Month Compared with a Year Ago.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, Jan. 10.—The excess of ordinary revenue over ordinary expenditure in December was only \$1,300,000. In December of last year the excess was \$12,000,000. For the nine months ending with the close of the calendar year, the ordinary revenue was \$253,964,000 and the ordinary expenditure \$237,220,000, the excess of revenue over expenditure being \$16,744,000. During the corresponding nine months of 1918, the ordinary revenue was \$222,485,000 and the ordinary expenditure, \$124,539,000. An excess of revenue over expenditure on capital account, including war charges, during the nine months was \$272,000,000. During the corresponding nine months of 1918, it was \$236,000,000. The National Debt was increased during December by \$20,291,000. It now totals \$1,838,131,058.

ADVISE KAISER TO RETURN TO GERMANY

Not Considered Seriously by the Dutch Cabinet—Suggestion Made by First Chamber.

THE HAGUE, January 12.—The first chamber of the Dutch parliament has drafted and presented a memorandum to the cabinet suggesting that it is desirable for Holland to request Former Kaiser Wilhelm of Germany to leave Holland and return to his own country. FIFTH CONCERT BIGGER SUCCESS

John Graham Proved Surprise to City Audience—Great Reception.

On his singing "Little Irish Girl" the audience demanded his recall. "In a Persian Garden" was most beautiful as rendered by his clear smooth tenor and "In Memory" held the audience without a whisper. He sang two other selections, "Bid Me to Love" and "Give Me a Little Tender Thought," but probably the most appealing and the one most fully enjoyed was his final encore "Somewhere a Voice is Calling," which has often been heard but never more effectively and sympathetically.

ARTHUR MANSON GETS NATIONAL ATHLETIC CALL

Real Prince Rupert Boy Gets Big Appointment on Dominion Committee.

TORONTO, Jan. 12.—The committee for the Canadian Amateur Athletic Association have been appointed. The following members represent British Columbia on the various committees: (Championship committee, Arthur Manson, of Victoria and formerly of Prince Rupert; National Registration Committee, David Leith, of Vancouver; Records Committee, D. O. Sullivan, of Victoria; Affiliation and Alliance Committee, S. Malcolmson, of New Westminster.

Arthur Manson, the representative on the Championship Committee, is a very well known Prince Rupert boy whom athletic men have commented on as being an athlete with a future. Ever since the days of 1907 when he first came to Port Simpson at the age of 9 years he has been a leader in sports among his fellows.

Coming to Prince Rupert in 1908, where his father was appointed government agent and later elected M. P., Arthur at once got in with the small boy athletic organizations, such as they were, and used to play scrub baseball with the rest of the youngsters on the streets.

Before his high school days were over he had taken his place in grown-up baseball, where he has always made his best showings, and since that time a Prince Rupert baseball team has not been complete without him. Even as late as last summer he was sent for to come from Victoria and play for Rupert in some of the inter-city games.

He is a steady and patient athlete and never takes flighty spells that are so common on the athletic field. Go the game favorably or the other way, he is always wearing a smile, with the result that he never loses his head and has many times come to the rescue when only skill and coolheadedness could win out.

All Prince Rupert fans will be proud of Arthur Manson as he goes ahead in the athletics of Canada as well as the larger cities. They will be doubly proud because many of them helped to train him and his credit in the sporting spheres is clean and well-merited and is, more than any place else, Prince Rupert's credit.

Sport Briefs

The Callies and the Drydock basketball teams engage in the sixth Gilhuly Cup series game tomorrow night. This will be the first encounter of these teams this season and, as both are strong teams it is expected a good match will result.

Now that the Morse Creek dam is in good shape it seems unfortunate that the weather continues to remain so mild. A few nights of good frost would put a fine sheet of ice on the stream and it would be unnecessary to travel far to take advantage of it.

Prince Rupert has made a name for itself in many circles but probably it never got such a boost in the sport world as it does now with the appointment of one of its pioneer school boys elected to a committee position on the National Amateur Athletic Association. No more efficient and cleaner sport than "Art" Manson could be selected to represent B. C. on this board and he is sure to live up to the honor conferred upon him.

A movement is now on foot in the Old Country to change the present offside rule in soccer football. The new idea is similar to the rule introduced by Frank Patrick some years ago in regard to offside. The proposal is to divide each half of the field into equal sections. Thirty yards from each goal will be the section where players can be offside. The remaining sixty yards in the center of the regulation field between the two goals will be like they are in hockey and here a player cannot be offside. It appears to be a good way of speeding the game and will eliminate the unnecessary delays caused by offside in



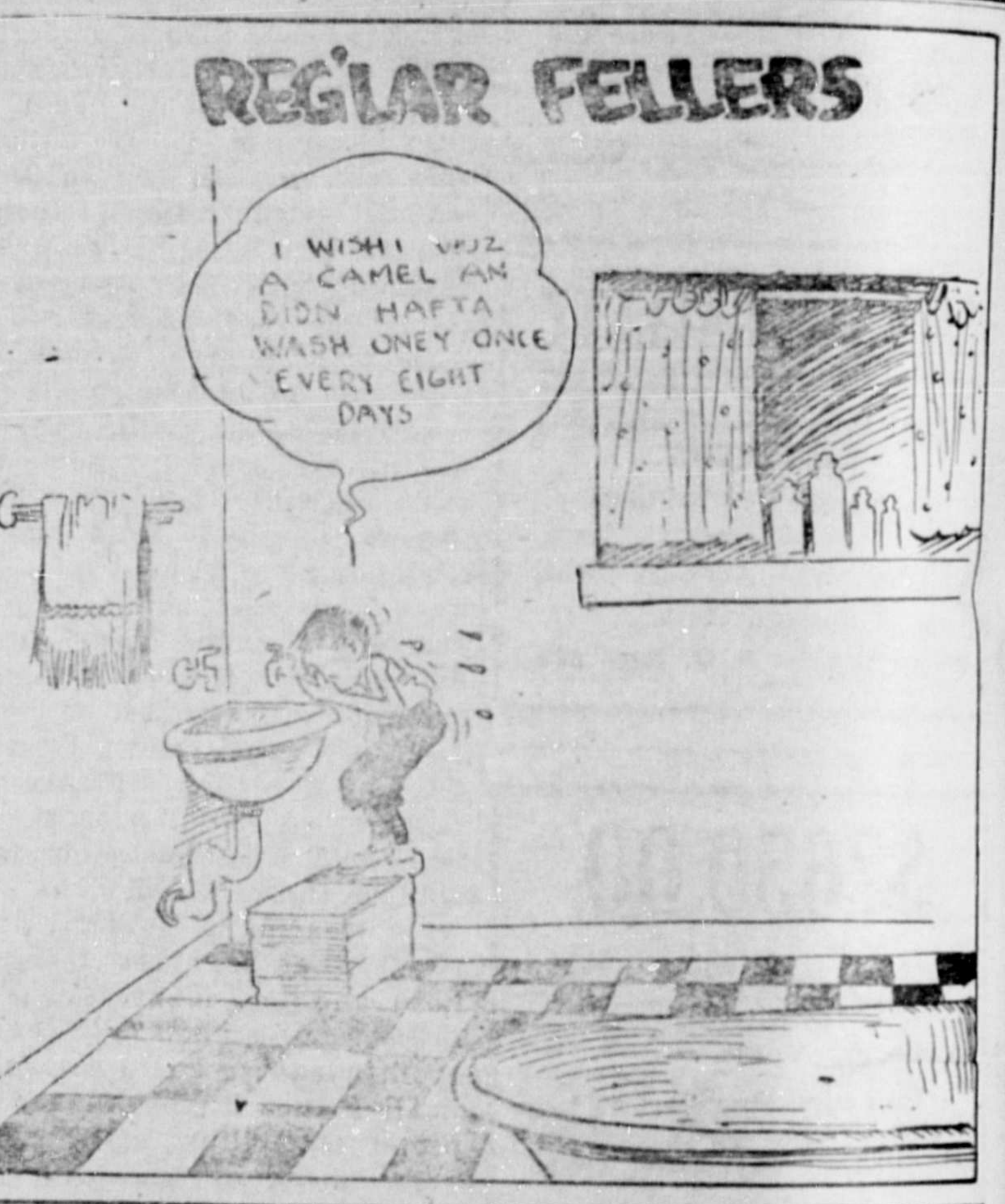

MAKE \$7,000,000

Montreal Commissioner Has Plan to Reduce City's Debt. An ambitious scheme to reduce the debt of the City of Montreal by about \$7,000,000 has been drawn up by E. R. Decary, chairman of the administrative commission, who states that it will be carried out very shortly. Mr. Decary states that the city will liquidate that part of the city debt held in England, amounting to about \$45,000,000, and finance the transaction by floating another loan in Canada and the United States. At present rates of exchange this would net the city about \$7,000,000. The proposed issue would be repayable in twenty years, and a sinking fund would be provided to take care of the payments on the principal. This was one of the most important points of the scheme, said Mr. Decary, as one reason for Montreal's enormous debt, amounting to \$122,000,000, and the fact that past administrations had failed to provide a sinking fund.—Financial Post. 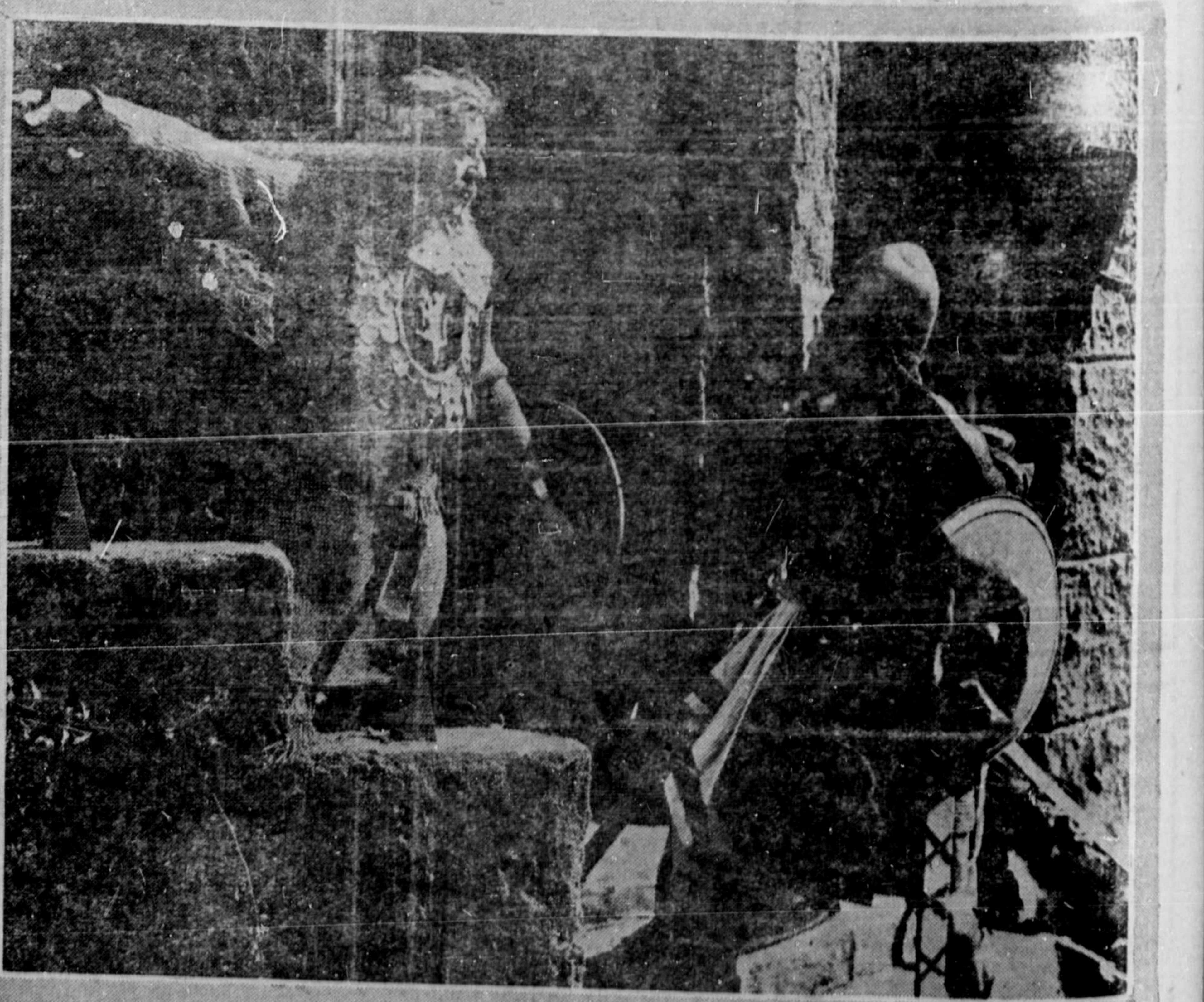
