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Newman Erb Takes Control At Dry Dock This Morning

No Defense to Injunction Yesterday so Hearing Before Justice Murphy is Postponed Till Next Wednesday.

Accompanied only by his private secretary and servants, Newman Erb, the American capitalist, arrived last night from Vancouver on his private car, Toledo, of the Ann Arbor Railway. The journey was made from Vancouver over the Canadian Northern lines, joining the Grand Trunk at Prince George.

This morning he took charge of operations at the local shipyards and appointed J. H. Pillsbury as acting general manager. His injunction to take over the plant has been extended till next Wednesday as no defence was put in by the rival company at the hearing before Mr. Justice Murphy yesterday. Automatically Mr. Erb's temporary injunction is extended.

The new directors whom Mr. Erb is fighting are W. E. Williams, A. M. Manson, M.L.A., Miss Ethel Thompson, J. R. Morgan, S. P. McMordie, E. C. Gibbons, F. F. Schellenberg and J. L. Mullen. Alex. Manson and J. L. Mullen went south on Sunday night and the defence will probably be arranged on their arrival in Victoria today. Mr. Erb expects to go south tonight.

Mr. Erb Interviewed.

"I do not wish to wash dirty linen in public; there are laundries for that," said Mr. Erb, interviewed by a News representative this afternoon, "and I have very little to say. This morning I received a wire saying that the hearing of this case had been postponed till next Wednesday, January 21. The whole proceeding is most unfortunate and I hope that the public will not come to conclusions until the whole case has been heard. As long as there is litigation over the plant its development will be arrested and there will be difficulty in obtaining new contracts.

"F. F. Schellenberg and all those who have interfered with the operation of the plant by the true board of directors, of which I am the chairman and general manager, are permanently relieved. Their reinstatement will depend only on the finding of the courts. It is a case of usurpation, nothing more, nothing less, by this false board of directors and unauthorized persons."

OBJECTIONS TO ASSESSMENT OF CITY PROPERTY

Ratepayers Protective Association Formed Last Night—Want Property Assessed at Market Value.

MAYOR AGAINST INCREASE OF BORROWING POWER

Notwithstanding the storm last evening, there was a goodly gathering in the City Hall at the formation of the new Ratepayers' Protective Association. The meeting was called to order by S. E. Parker, and after the necessity for the association was explained by M. M. Stephens and E. C. Gibbons, officers were elected. D. G. Stewart was elected chairman, and D. McD. Hunter secretary. A committee of five will be chosen by the chair to prepare a constitution.

The matter of the assessment of city property was the chief matter discussed and opinion was unanimous that the present assessment was too high and was not based upon actual values. There were many speakers on the subject. The matter of the city being about to request the provincial authorities for permission to increase its borrowing powers above the 20 per cent of its assessment roll was also brought up. Mayor McClymont was asked directly as regards this matter. The mayor said that he was attending the meeting as a property holder interested in the objects of the association. The proposal to increase the city's borrowing powers was brought up during his absence at Ottawa and the mayor put himself on record as

being opposed to any greater borrowing powers being given to the city in excess of the present 20 per cent of the assessment roll. He thought that this was the only safeguard which the public would have under an extravagant council. He showed that the assessment on private lands had been reduced by roughly \$1,500,000 this last year, and that the assessor was independent entirely of the council in making up his figures. The matter was gone into very fully and several instances of inequality were given. A resolution was finally passed, moved by S. E. Parker and seconded by S. King, that there be an equalization and reduction of the assessment roll.

The meeting also went on record as being opposed to the new utilities bylaw calling for a \$50,000 expenditure for a new telephone exchange.

HILL TO MAKE DRASTIC MOVE

Would Put Entire Force on Month's Probation to Test Efficiency.

Commissioner Hill gave notice at last night's Police Commission meeting of the following motion which he will make at the next meeting of the commission:

"That the entire police force be put on probation for one month's time and that if any instances are found where it fails to do its duty the whole force will be dismissed and a new force engaged."

This action was brought about by it being reported that gambling devices which had been ordered to be put out of business several months ago were still running openly. The Chief of Police was asked to explain and he said that he did not know they were still being used.

Commissioner MacDonald said he would be behind the move if all gambling would be treated alike. It is believed that the commission as a whole will be in favor of the measure.

REFUSE ENDORSE ALDERMAN CASEY

Trades and Labor Council Turned Out Its Committee Report by 6-4 Vote.

The Trades and Labor Council at its meeting last night, refused to accept the recommendation of its legislative committee to endorse Alderman Casey and Geo. Rudderham as candidates for the aldermanic board at tomorrow's election. There was much discussion on the matter, the main objection to these men being their affiliation with another labor movement with which the Trades and Labor Council was not in sympathy. Some of the members also felt that Alderman Casey was taking too radical a stand in labor matters and others wanted to see his results as an alderman for four years.

The members supporting Alderman Casey felt that, even if he was associated with another movement, still he had always worked in the best interests of organized labor and they felt he would continue to do so. A motion was finally made endorsing the last recommendation of the legislative committee but this was defeated by a 6-4 vote. Another motion endorsing Alderman Elizabeth C. Kirkpatrick and William H. Wilson-Murray for alderman, and Simon D. MacDonald for police commissioner was carried unanimously.

The Soviet Ark Due To Land in Russia

No Negotiations Regarding Repatriation of Deported Anarchists. May not be Permitted to Land.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

HELSINGFORS, January 14.—The United States transport "Buford," known as the Soviet Ark, with the party of undesirable aliens deported from the United States on board, is expected to arrive at Hango, on the southern coast of the Gulf of Finland tomorrow. There have been no negotiations here with regard to the admission of the deported radicals and it is pointed out that an interesting situation would probably arise, should they be refused admission into Soviet Russia. This course is considered quite possible as it is known that a considerable portion of the opposition to Bolshevism in Russia is furnished by the anarchist element.

Trial of Caillaux May be Postponed Indefinitely. Senators Reluctant Sit now

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

PARIS, January 14.—Joseph Caillaux, the former premier of France, charged with intriguing to bring about a premature and dishonorable peace with Germany, will appear before the new Senate sitting as a High Court tomorrow at 2 p. m. Although both prosecution and defence are ready, there seems but the remotest possibility that the trial will proceed. The senators who met for the first time this afternoon reported that they were reluctant to sit as judges immediately and would ask for a postponement of the trial. Many of the senators favored setting January 27th as the date of the opening of the examination of M. Caillaux, while others favored even a longer delay.

To Save and Maintain Our Salmon Fisheries

Full Text of Hon. Wm. Sloan's Memorandum to Dominion Government on Question of Nationalizing Fisheries.

The following is the full text of the memorandum sent to Hon. C. C. Ballantyne by Hon. William Sloan, Commissioner of Fisheries, an excerpt of which was published recently:—

"The question of conserving the supply of salmon in our waters has long been one of keen interest. The 1905-07 Dominion Fisheries Commission, after a long investigation, recommended that 'effective measures for securing some limitation of the exploitation of the northern waters of British Columbia be adopted.' Acting on that report the Minister at Ottawa in 1908 set forth that no additional canneries would be licensed and that

the number of boats in each section would be limited. The Dominion-Provincial Boat Rating Commission of 1910 reported against any increase in canneries or boats, and no increase was made until 1912, when an additional cannery licence was granted on the understanding that only white labor would be employed in operating the plant and in catching the fish; an understanding that was never carried out. Further cannery licences were granted in 1913, 1916, 1917, and 1918. There are now some ten more salmon canneries in the North than there were in 1908, and many more gill and purse nets, and the deadly drag-seines are being operated, and traps have been installed in some localities. In 1917 the Dominion Government Commission, following hearings held throughout the North, reported that in their judgment 'neither the ambitions of an individual nor the business strategy of a company is in itself sufficient ground for a change of public policy, and we do not regard the general result of the Department's change in policy which began in 1912 as having improved the situation from the public point of view, and we believe that the removal of all restrictions, under the present conditions as to supply of salmon, would only open the way towards inefficiency and loss.'

To Prevent Depletion.
"It should be the first policy of the Government to prevent depletion, to ensure continuance and at the same time to eliminate useless competition and excessive overhead charges. The policy suggested by me is a move in that direction. If adopted it will conserve the supply and increase the earnings of the individual fishermen. There is abundant evidence that the salmon of the North and of Vancouver Island are rapidly being depleted. Unless they are given far more protection than is now afforded them they will go the way of the salmon of the Fraser. There is no doubt of that. The Fraser was once the greatest salmon river of the world. The vast schools of salmon that used to seek its waters annually have been fished out. As a salmon-stream it is now in the third or fourth place in the salmon-streams of this province. There has been no limitation placed on the fisheries of the Fraser, except a modest weekly period. They have been open to all that wished to engage. There are thirty-two canneries on the Fraser, but twelve of which have opened their doors this year, and combined they packed but 34,000 cases of sockeye salmon, and in almost every case they operated at a loss.

Entire Pack in 12 Days.
"At the present time the canning plants on the Skeena and Naas Rivers and Rivers Inlet could have this year put up the entire pack in less than twelve days of eight hours each, whereas they were operated for over sixty-five days. Fixed charges were needlessly heavy because of the numerous plants, and have resulted in such high prices as to seriously affect the public interest. A further increase in the number of plants and the amount of gear

employed on these waters will not better conditions.

"I believe that the withdrawing of restrictions in the fishing regulations, as proposed, will most certainly have a disastrous effect upon the runs unless at the time of amendment most drastic additions are made to the present weekly and annual closed seasons. If the fishing is to be thrown open to all comers, it will result in placing on the fishing grounds of the North and Vancouver Island the now unused Fraser River fleet of fishing boats. Depletion will surely result unless the present weekly close season of forty hours is extended to at least seventy-two hours, and to a further and material restriction of the present commercial fishing areas. To provide such an extension of closed hours will make it extremely difficult for fishermen to earn a weekly living wage without such a material increase in the price paid for fish as will add greatly to the cost of the product.

Complete Change Needed.
"I suggest that the time has come for a complete and radical change in the policy of handling our fisheries. It is time that the Government stepped in to seriously protect the fish, eliminate all useless competition, over-equipment and waste, to the end that the people may be able to obtain at a fair price one of the natural food products of this province. To permit a further depletion of the salmon fisheries of the province would be a policy which could only be characterized as a criminal policy. The fish of this province, notwithstanding the depletion of both the salmon and the halibut, are still one of its greatest food assets. They are one of the greatest assets the province possesses. With judicious handling the fisheries can be maintained if the present methods are to continue. The (Continued on Page 5.)

No Class Monopoly In Government.

In his appeal for a United Canada in his speech two days ago at Halifax, Mackenzie King, the Liberal leader, indicated his opposition to the monopoly of government by any one class of the community. He claimed that parliament must be like a mirror and reflect the aspirations of all groups. There should no more be distinctions of class in parliament than there ought to be in a municipal council. While the members represent the electors, their labors in the House are for the benefit of the whole country. And any parliament which does not represent the whole of the community seldom demits office retaining the confidence of the community. True liberalism is wide enough to embrace many shades of opinion—and even divergent opinions—and is bound by no narrow outlook. The essentials of all groups who stand for progress are capable of assimilation and would form the basis of a Canada United. Unity is the thing worth striving for.

True Values Better Than Fictitious.

There was a whole lot of horse sense talked at the meeting of the Ratepayers Protective Association in the city hall last evening when the assessment of city property was the chief subject discussed. Most of those attending were business men and property owners, and what many could not see was why assessment was so consistently above the real values of the property. Value is a relative term, and it fluctuates. The chief cause of the formation of this organization was that lots were often assessed at many times their market value, which is the amount agreed upon between a willing buyer and a willing seller. The problem resolved itself, in a few words, into a question of whether a high assessment with a low rate of taxation was preferable to a high taxation rate and a low assessment. It would seem to be the same thing in the long run. The chief difficulty is, however, that the high assessment value bears little relation to the true value, while on the other hand, the high taxation rate would not be one as to which there would be any dubiety whatever. Out of town property owners are sometimes grievously disappointed when they value their holdings at the amount assessed. They are often of the opinion that they possess property of a value which does not exist. With an assessment made approximating the actual value of the property, out of town buyers would know what to expect when turning their property over. The citizens on the other hand would be no longer stringing themselves along in the belief that the value of their property was two, three or four times as great as it really is. The consensus of opinion seemed to be that the time for such camouflage is over and that we might as well come right out into the open and have the real values declared.

First Meeting of League of Nations.

With the final ratification of the Treaty of Versailles, the League of Nations, which has been talked of for so long, is now an accomplished fact, and President Wilson has called for its first sitting. There are many odds and ends created and left over by the war which will take up a lot of the attention of the League to begin with, so from the first it will be operating for the benefit of all the signatory nations. The League of Nations will be a much more stable and efficient instrument for the preservation of peace than the so called peace conferences suggested originally by the late Czar. His was a step in the right direction and during the intervening years, has prepared the way for the present League.

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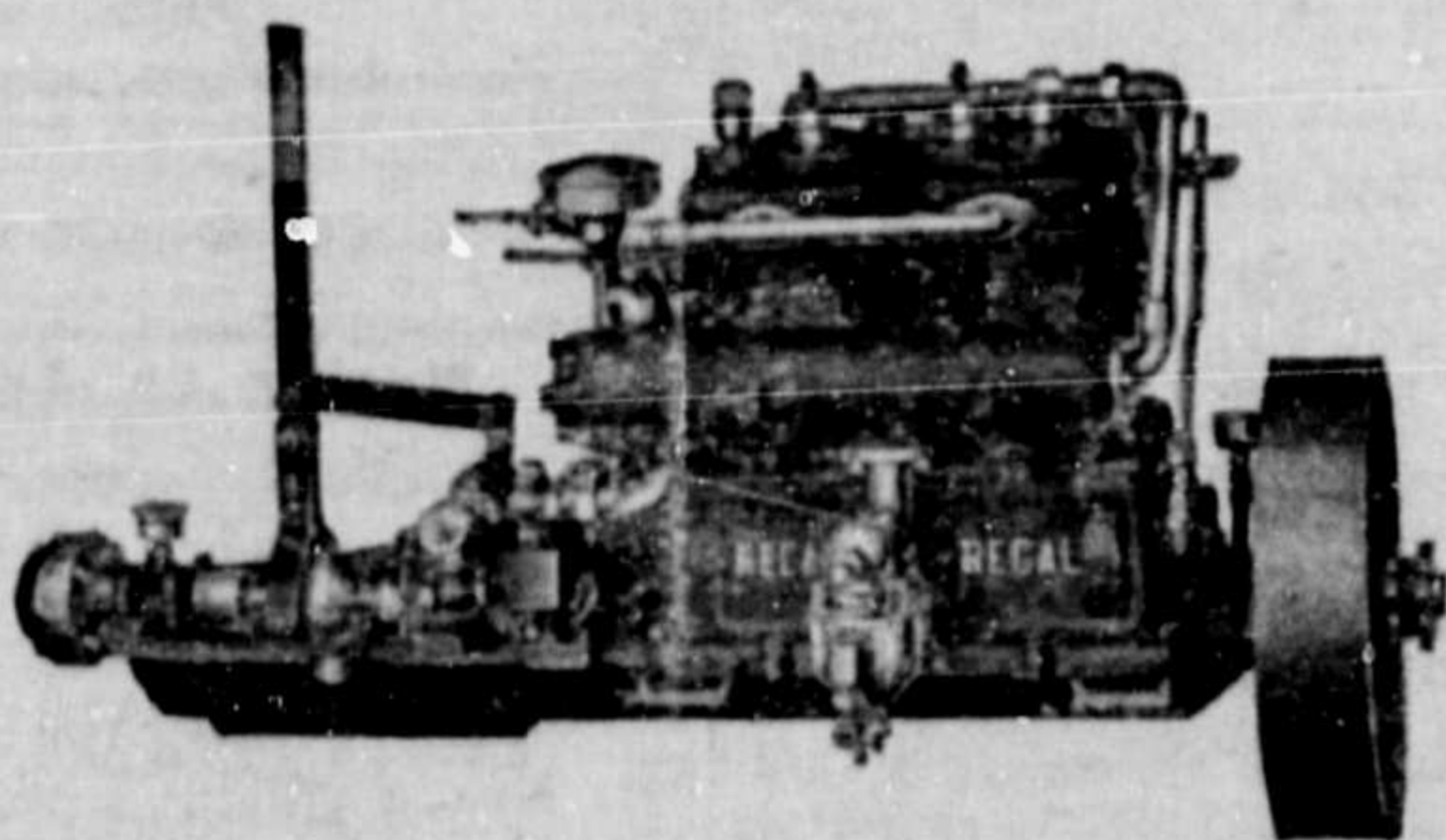

SUPREME COUNCIL DISCUSSES BALKANS

Constantinople to be Left With Turks in Opinion Given; Adriatic and Greece Also Considered.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
PARIS, Jan. 13.—According to the opinion of persons in close touch with the conference of the premiers in session here now, in the settlement of the Turkish problem it has been already decided that the Turks be left in possession of Constantinople, probably with full sovereignty, but after important concessions have been made in the way of administrative reforms.
The three premiers, Clemenceau of France, Lloyd George of Great Britain, and Nitti of Italy, met again today in continuance of the conference on both the Adriatic and Turkish questions, and the latter is supposed to have been the uppermost in the deliberations.

So far as Greece is concerned, while the Greeks would prefer to see the Turks entirely ousted from Europe, they appear to be concentrating their efforts on securing Thrace as far as the Enos-Midia line, established after the second Balkan war as the Turco-Greek boundary.

CARVELL ISSUES PEREMPTORY ORDER

U. S. Railways Traversing Canada Must Not Discount Canadian Currency.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, Jan. 13.—The Hon. Frank B. Carvell, chairman of the Railway Commission, has peremptorily ordered the Michigan Central Railway Company to accept at par Canadian money on their sleepers and diners on those parts of their system which traverse Canada. Complaint has been made that Canadian money was being refused by officials.

PEACE PROCLAMATION WILL TERMINATE ORDERS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, Jan. 13.—The proclamation of peace is expected to be published within the next few days. There will then arise the question of the new orders in council still in existence under the provisions of the War Measures Act. The War Measures Act terminates when peace is officially proclaimed, but it is probable that steps will be taken to continue in force until Parliament assembles the provisions of the orders in council mentioned.

QUESTIONS LEGALITY OF MANY BY-ELECTIONS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, Jan. 13.—The legality of the election of Sir Henry Drayton, the Hon. S. F. Tolmie, the Hon. Mackenzie King and all others returned at the by-elections held since last summer is questionable in the opinion of Alexander Smith, K. C., of Ottawa who is an authority on election law.

TORONTO, Jan. 13.—Mr. Justice Middleton, in charging the Grand Jury here, said that despite the Prohibition Act being on the statute book and enforced, crime was on the increase in the province of Ontario.

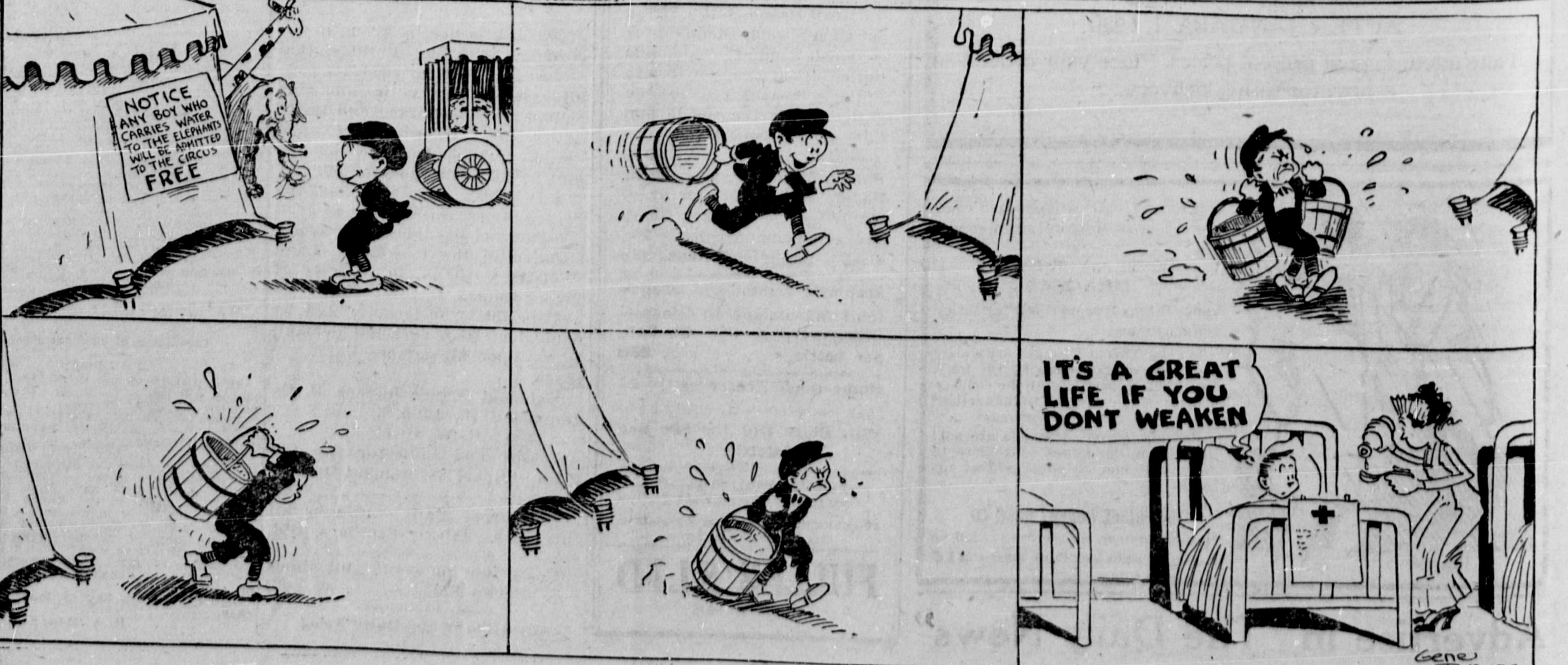

To Save and Maintain Our Salmon Fisheries

Continued From Page One.

Fraser River fishery demonstrates what will happen if things are to go on as they have been going.

"We have overdone the thing. We have drawn, and are drawing, too heavily upon our supply of salmon and of halibut. What we need is a complete and radical change of policy; a departure altogether different from past and existing methods.

The Time Has Come.

"The time has come when the Government should step in and take over our salmon fisheries and administer them for the benefit of the people as a whole and for all time. They should step in and take over the salmon fisheries just as the British and United States Governments have taken over the fur-seal fisheries of the North Pacific. Instead of licensing existing and new companies and individuals to take and handle our salmon fisheries the Government should take them over and handle them. By so doing the fish will be given full protection. There will be a radical reduction in equipment and a consequent reduction in overhead expenses that will materially reduce the retail price of both fresh and canned salmon. And at the same time the Government, being serious in its desire to help returned men, can do so by taking control of the salmon fisheries and install returned men to operate them.

"The governments of Great Britain and the United States took over the fur seal industry because it was essential to the preservation of the fur-seal. The fur-seal was threatened with extinction. Corporate and individual enterprise was killing them off. The Governments took them out of the hands of corporations and individuals and adopted a policy that has materially increased the numbers in the herds of fur-seals.

Sole Government Control.

"There is no inherent difficulty in taking over the salmon fisheries. The existing operating companies in the salmon fisheries have no operating rights beyond those granted them from year to year. The government is under no obligation to renew the licences formerly granted to them. I suggest that the Government should assume the sole control of the entire salmon industry, even though that may mean compensation where it can be shown that compensation is due. Many of the salmon plants on the Fraser are at present a liability and not an asset of the owning companies. The plants of Northern British Columbia will in a short period be as valueless as the plants on the Fraser if the existing policy of depletion is continued. The history of the Fraser will be repeated. The salmon fisheries of British Columbia will be depleted as Alaska is being depleted. The Government should bear this in mind in taking over existing plants that may be found necessary for the work under government control. The Government can, by combining its efforts, reduce overhead expenses by several hundred per cent. It can in consequence sell cheap. It can put up as good, if not a better and more uniform pack. Being a Government-guaranteed product it will be in greater foreign demand. And what is of greater importance it will ensure the continuance of the salmon runs.

Trawl Fish Too.

"Government owned and operated fisheries, and I do not continue the suggestion that Government ownership be confined to the salmon fisheries alone, for I would include trawl-caught fish, which together with the salmon would prove a valuable adjunct to the two transcontinental railway lines owned and operated by the Government. By the addition of large freezing and cold storage plants at or near Prince Rupert and Vancouver, the Pacific terminal ports of Government-owned railway lines, the Government will be in a position to supply the Northwest Provinces and Eastern Canada with fish at cheap prices, employ returned men, and to dominate the local fish food markets, to the immediate and lasting benefit of the fish and the people.

Give the Fish a Chance!

"The fish of the province belong to the people of Canada. They constitute one of their greatest natural assets. When our minerals and our timber are drawn upon they are lessened to that extent. Minerals cannot be replaced. Our forests may, at great expense, be restored by reforestation, but they then will not

be available for several generations. Our fisheries, on the other hand, will last for all time if they are properly handled. Depleted runs can be restored. The runs of former years may even be enlarged. All that is necessary to maintain our salmon supply is to ensure that a sufficient number of fish reach the spawning grounds. If the beds are well seeded there will be a certain return. The fish will do all the work necessary, provided the Government gives them a chance to do so. They will perpetuate themselves without cost. They will entirely disappear if left to corporate and individual control.

"The policy here advocated will meet with the approval of the people of Canada, since it means that the fisheries will be maintained in their interest, and that they may have fish at a cheaper price.

Sane Business.

"The policy proposed is a practical and sane business thing for the Government to undertake. It is a business that will pay dividends in a greater supply of fish, and at a cheaper price, not only to the people of today, but to our people that are to come after. Government control and operation is, in my opinion, the solution of this great economic question.

"The Privy Council decided that the right to administer the fisheries of this province rested with the Dominion, and that the right to fish was a public right subject to regulation by the Dominion. Provided the Dominion Government is not prepared to accept the policy here advocated, and operating our fisheries, I maintain that the Dominion should surrender that right to British Columbia.

"We are facing rapidly changing conditions, and the time is opportune to assure the conservation of the Pacific Coast fisheries for the present and the future benefit of the whole people of Canada rather than sacrifice this great provincial and national asset to satisfy the shortsighted greed of a small minority.
