CALLAUX WILL BE TRIED NEXT MONTH IN PARIS

Former Premier of France to
Answer Charge of Intriguing
With the Enemy.

PARIS, Jan. 15.—The opening
of the trial of Joseph Caillaux,
former premier of France, who is
charged with intriguing to bring
about a premature and dishonor-
able peace with Germany, has
been fixed for February 17.

BRYAN PREDICTS PEACE RATIFIED

Wants Senate will Bow to Public
Opinion Today.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—Wm.
Jennings Bryan predicts that the
United States Senate will bow to
public opinion and ratify the peace
treaty today. Now that other
countries interested have signed
and the treaty is in force, the
United States feels left out in the
cold. Politicians here had an idea
that they would have to be con-
sulted before anything final could
be done.

E. F. DUBY WILL AGAIN MANAGE LUMBER MILL

Here with Mr. Emerson to Take
Over Plant From Prince
Rupert Spruce Mills,
Limited.

NEW MACHINERY TO
BE INSTALLED SOON

E. F. DUBY, manager of the
Prince Rupert Lumber Co., and
John Emerson, a son of J. S.
Emerson, owner of the plant, ar-
rived yesterday to arrange for the
taking over of the Prince Rupert
mill from the Prince Rupert
Spruce Mills, Ltd., whose lease
has expired. From now on the
mill will be operated by the Prince
Rupert Lumber Co. with Mr. DUBY
manager.

In order to bring the mill right
up to date a large amount of new
equipment will be installed. This
will include a lath mill, a planing
mill, two dry kilns, and a gang
saw. The additions will enable
the mill to increase its cut and
also to manufacture its lumber
and prepare it for immediate use.
It will add somewhat to the pay-
roll and will enable the company
to supply lumber both in the city
and to outside points as required
for building and finishing.

Mr. DUBY, who is well known
here, will be welcomed once more
as a permanent resident. As soon
as he gets settled in the work
Mrs. DUBY will join him here.

It will be good news that the
mill is to continue without any
lengthy interruption to the work
and that so able and practical a
man as Mr. DUBY will be in charge.
Mr. DUBY says he expects to com-
mence cutting about March 1.

STEWART WHARF DIFFICULTY IS NOW EXPLAINED

Hon. Dr. King Things Dominion
Should Share Cost of New
Approach.

A day or two ago in Victoria
an interview was sought by a
Daily News representative with
Hon. Dr. King, minister of public
works, in regard to the delay in
the building of the public wharf
at Stewart. The wharf is badly
needed and in view of the expected
rush to that place this coming
spring, its erection is a matter
of public urgency.

Dr. King explained that the
erection of wharves was not a
provincial matter, as it had been
agreed between the Provincial and
Dominion Governments that work
of this kind should be undertaken
by the latter. The Stewart wharf
built by the Provincial Govern-
ment had been transferred to the
Dominion by order in council, the
only condition being that it should
be kept in repair. The approach
to the wharf was built by the Do-
minion.

The Dominion Government had
expected to renew the long ap-
proach, which originally cost
something like \$25,000, and which
today, it was estimated, would
cost nearly \$50,000. The Provin-
cial Government had, however,
built a mile and a half of road
from a point near the wharf to
Hyder at great cost and following
this the Dominion conceived the
idea of building a wharf from
this road and thus saving the
cost of rebuilding the approach.
In order to connect the wharf with
Stewart it would be necessary to
expend another \$30,000 in build-
ing a road or the Dominion Govern-
ment would have to repair the
trestle.

Should Share Cost.

Having in view the saving to
the Dominion of the new propo-
sal the Provincial Government
suggested that the Dominion
share the cost of the new piece
of road, and this they refuse to
do. It was this difference of
opinion that kept the Dominion
from going ahead with the work.
In the meantime, however, the
Provincial Government has trans-
ferred the site to the Dominion
so there is nothing to prevent the
new wharf being built at once.
Dr. King says the Provincial Gov-
ernment has made no provision
for the building of the rest of
the road and he thinks that in
view of the saving to the Do-
minion they should share the
cost.

The new road built by the Pro-
vincial Government is now in use
connected with the Dominion
Government trestle but the ap-
proach is in bad condition and the
present arrangement is only tem-
porary.

Dr. King is very much inter-
ested in the development of the
mining town and says he thinks
the road they have already built,
along with other improvements
completed and contemplated, will
have a good effect on the business
of the place as the town is now
connected with the rich Premier
and other mines.

He was emphatic that the Pro-
vincial Government had not de-
layed the improvements at that
place.

It is understood that the Do-
minion Government will proceed
with the erection of the wharf
early in the spring.

FALSE REPORT ABOUT BIG ITALIAN LINER

Reaches African Port With All on
Board Safe and Well.

TO PROSECUTE ONTARIO MILLS

Obstructed Customs Officers in
Discharge of Duties is
Allegation.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, Jan. 15.—The Fort
Francis Paper Mills are in opera-
tion again today although the
management still maintains its
attitude of refusal to obey the
paper controller's order demand-
ing them to supply the Canadian
paper market before the Ameri-
can. Customs officers have been
at the plant attempting to enforce
the order by seizure of paper but
have been withheld by the com-
pany from this action.

The government yesterday di-
rected that information be laid
under the criminal code against
the officials of the Fort Francis
Mills who have obstructed the
customs officers in the discharge
of their duties on Monday. The
crown attorney has been in-
structed by wire to commence
proceedings.

Mounted Police Called

OTTAWA, Jan. 15.—(Later.)—
The Mounted Police Force has
been ordered to see that the or-
der of the Paper Controller is
carried out and that delivery of
paper to the Western newspapers
is guaranteed. The cabinet coun-
cil has given its fullest instruc-
tions to the paper controller and
insists that his orders to the Fort
Francis mills be carried out to
the letter.

POLL TILL NOON REGISTERED TWO HUNDRED VOTES

Returning Officer Woods Esti-
mates Over Five Hundred Will
Be Cast by Closing
at 7 O'clock.

Up to 1 o'clock this afternoon
a very good vote has been regis-
tered in the municipal elections,
in fact, larger than had been
really expected by the officers in
charge. The number of votes
used up till a few minutes before
1 o'clock was 207. Although
there are 2,330 names on the list,
City Clerk Ernest A. Woods, who
is acting as returning officer, does
not expect that more than 550
votes will be polled, but it is very
likely that this number will be
reached on the strength of the
fact that nearly half that number
are already in. Last year's total
vote was 498.

The election officials are: City
Clerk E. A. Woods, returning of-
ficer; Harry W. Birch, deputy re-
turning officer and poll clerk; L.
D. Kendall, John G. Viereck, Alex.
Clapperton, and Charles R. Ste-
wart, deputies. The polls close at
7 o'clock.

FOREMOST LAWYER IS CRITICALLY ILL

JAP RUNS WILD; BREAKS WINDOW

Caused Considerable Damage
Throwing Rocks; Paid
for the Damage,
\$27.50.

Mizatu, a Jap, was in the Po-
lice Court this morning charged
with breaking windows. It is al-
leged he got into an altercation
with the proprietor of the Tokio
Tailors over the price of a suit of
clothes on Tuesday evening. He
failed to reach an agreement so
came back later, under the influ-
ence of "red-eye" and tried to
enter. The door was locked so
he took a running jump at it.
This failing he resorted to throw-
ing rocks with the result that he
caused window breakage to the ex-
tent of \$27.50. He was arrested
by Sergeant Adams.

The damage has been paid by
the accused and tomorrow he will
come up to answer for his mis-
deemeanor before Magistrate Mc-
Mordie.

LIQUOR CHARGE AGAINST WELL KNOWN PIONEER

R. J. McDonnell Charged Under
B. C. Prohibition Act—Much
Liquor Seized.

PRESCRIPTIONS FOR
SICK IN MINING TOWN

R. J. (Black Jack) McDonnell
appeared in the police court this
morning charged under the B. C.
Prohibition Act with having
liquor in his possession, without
reasonable excuse, in other than
a private dwelling. He was re-
manded until tomorrow morning
and is out on \$200 bail.

The arrest was made last night
by Sergeant Adams and Constable
Duff following a visit to room 60,
Prince Rupert Hotel, which ac-
cused alleged to have occupied.
Here were found two trunks, four
grips and three liquor cartons
containing 123 bottles of rum,
whiskey, rye and alcohol, all
labelled for prescriptions issued
by Dr. R. W. Bruner until recent-
ly of Stewart and dated November
and even as far back as Septem-
ber. Evidently they have just
been filled by a local druggist.

This morning the court officials
were kept very busy tabulating
the bottles and comparing with
the prescription forms. Several
discrepancies in issuances have
been found and some of the "pat-
ients," it is claimed, have not been
in Stewart for months.

BIG PROFIT MADE FROM LIQUOR SALES

Alberta Province Makes \$400,000
on Importations and Sales
by Vendors.

Edmonton, Jan. 15.—The Pro-
vincial Government of Ontario
has made a profit of approximately
\$400,000 on liquor imported
and sold last year through the
government vendors to the drug-
gists under the Alberta Prohibi-
tion Act.

Mayorality Candidates Were Heard Last Night At Big Theatre Meeting

Mayor McClymont Reports on Council Doings; Newton
Outlines His Policy of Progress and Montgomery
Will Clean up City; Aldermanic Candidates
Also Speak.

A crowd which nearly filled the Empress Theatre turned out
for the public meeting held by S. M. Newton, candidate for the
mayorality, last night. In opening the meeting Mr. Newton asked
that any candidate for civic office at this election come forward
and every one was invited to take the platform. Mayor McCly-
mont and the two aspirants for the mayorality, Ex-Alderman
Montgomery and Ex-Mayor Newton, were each heard as well
as Aldermen Kirkpatrick, Perry and Casey. A number of the
new candidates also made addresses.

Mayor McClymont.

Mayor McClymont told of the
progress made during the year
and emphasised the splendid
financial condition that the city
was in. He told of reports pre-
pared for the late council in the
matter of permanent road im-
provements and street grading.
If the G. T. P. and government
properties were brought under
taxation, ambitious schemes for
this permanent work could be
adopted and the taxes would be
no higher.

The mayor also dealt with the
power question. The capacity of
the present small hydro-electric
plant was being taxed at present
and extension would soon be a
vital question, especially if new
industries were to come in. The
mayor stated that the Wark
Channel proposition was practi-
cally useless on account of the
small water flow there in the
winter. The Ecstall system was
too big for the present demands
or those of the near future and
would plunge the city into debt.
It was his belief that the question
could be solved by a Diesel oil
system installed in the city that
would serve until the big Ecstall
scheme would be practicable.

The mayor also dealt with
sewers and stated that the \$10,000
sewer bylaw would keep the city
going until a new system could
be installed. In the matter of the
telephone exchange he had been
guided entirely by expert tele-
phone authorities. In hospital
matters he was in favor of the
per capita system until these in-
stitutions were taken over by the
state under whose control they
should properly come. This per
capita plan would mean increased
taxation but it was the duty of
the public to look after the sick.
Mr. McClymont recommended that
the 1920 council in renewing the
G. T. P. agreement do not let the
company off with a paltry \$15,000
in lieu of taxes on four million
dollars' worth of property. He
then reviewed the financial situa-
tion, telling of the healthy con-
dition and also stating that taxes
have been lowered under his
regime. He asked for support of
the Morse Creek bridge bylaw.

The mayor was questioned
about the tag day for Winnipeg
strikers and replied that he would
positively not give tag days to
raise money for the defence of
prisoners prosecuted for acts
against the British constitution.
He was also questioned on the
Emerson contract and replied
that it had been originally given
to encourage industry in the city.

W. H. Montgomery.

In opening his address Ex-
Alderman Montgomery launched
into a personal attack on Mayor
McClymont, laying the sole re-
sponsibility for the awful social
conditions in the city at his door.
Either he was wilfully passing up
the enforcement of the law or he
was unable to do so, either of
which made him equally guilty.
He also stated that Mr. Newton
had never said a word about the
condition in his paper. His first
move on being elected would be
to clean up the city. As it was
now, conditions could not be worse
if there was no police force at all.
Mr. Montgomery recommended
voting all the bylaws down as
they were unnecessary expendi-
tures. He took issue with the

NEWINGTON WILL ARRIVE TONIGHT

Government Lighthouse Tender
Coming With Supplies; Will
Repair Langara Light.

The government light-house
tender, Newington, Captain Bil-
ton, will arrive from the south
this evening or tomorrow morn-
ing having been reported in Mil-
bank Sound yesterday afternoon.
Owing to lack of facilities here
and rush of emergency work in the
south, the Newington has not yet
been transferred to the northern
district but is only making a spe-
cial trip here to make repairs at
the Langara light and bring re-
pair supplies for other points.

The new staff for the Digby Is-
land station has not yet arrived
but Captain Saunders is now in
Victoria and it is possible that he
may bring some of them back with
him. The staff to be installed im-
mediately will comprise only a-
bout six persons. There will be a
construction superintendent, fog
alarm engineer, fog alarm inspec-
tor, book-keeper and clerks. This
will be besides the crew of the
"Newington," who will make their
homes here when the vessel is
transferred. The whole matter
will be under Captain Saunders,
superintendent of the Digby Is-
land Marine depot.

The "Newington" is an old ves-
sel and has been in the govern-
ment light-house service for
many years. She was brought
out from the Old Country by the
government and carries a crew of
21 officers and men.

MINING MACHINERY GOING TO STEWART

Water Power to be Utilized in the
Premier Mine and Mill
Installed.

STEWART, Jan. 15.—A quan-
tity of mining machinery is on
order for the Premier Mine and
is expected to arrive soon. This
includes compressors, milling
machinery and the necessary ap-
paratus for installing a small
waterpower for use in the com-
pressors. The machinery will be
taken up on sleighs over the road
from here.

Board of Directors Is Being Chosen.

Today Prince Rupert people are choosing their board of directors to manage their business for the coming year. By the time this is read a good many will have voted, but others will not. Running a city is operating a big business. Shareholders of a business are very careful in choosing a board of directors, and the voters of Prince Rupert should be equally careful. Much of the success of the city depends on the manner in which its business is conducted.

Indians Light Their Village.

The Indians are lighting their villages along modern lines and in every way adopting modern methods of life. Their progress has been wonderful. Very soon they will make us look to our laurels to keep up with them.

In the autumn a suggestion was made that they should stage a pageant for next autumn's fair, in which would be shown the old and the new method of living in order to bring home clearly to everyone the immense progress they have made. It would be a pity for the idea to drop as the pageant if well carried out would redound very much to the credit of the Indians and would be an object lesson to the world in advancement. Incidentally it would prove a great attraction for the fair and would doubtless receive every encouragement from the people of this city.

Shipbuilding Trouble Very Unfortunate.

It is unfortunate that there should be friction over the control of the shipbuilding plant. Litigation tends to lower general confidence in the undertaking and in the ability of the local yards to handle contracts. The wish of everyone is that a speedy settlement will be arrived at and that work will proceed in a businesslike manner. Up to the present there have been numerous delays which reflect no credit on those who control the industry.

Provincial Estimates Are Being Prepared.

Provincial estimates are now being prepared in readiness for the opening of the session of the Legislature. In it will doubtless be included a sum for the commencement of the new Government Buildings in Prince Rupert, if Hon. T. D. Pattullo, the representative for the district, has his way. The buildings are badly needed and the Government is alive to the situation, their attention having been drawn to it by Mr. Pattullo. It is likely also that there will be a small appropriation for the Section 2 bridge.

We would like to suggest that this would be a good time for the Board of Trade or the City Council or both to prepare a memorandum showing why a road should be built to the mouth of the Skeena River. The Government will not spend money just now to provide a road for pleasure purposes. That is certain. There are so many demands for money for real development that they refuse to spend money to provide pleasure jaunts. What we must show them is that the road is a commercial necessity, then it will receive consideration.

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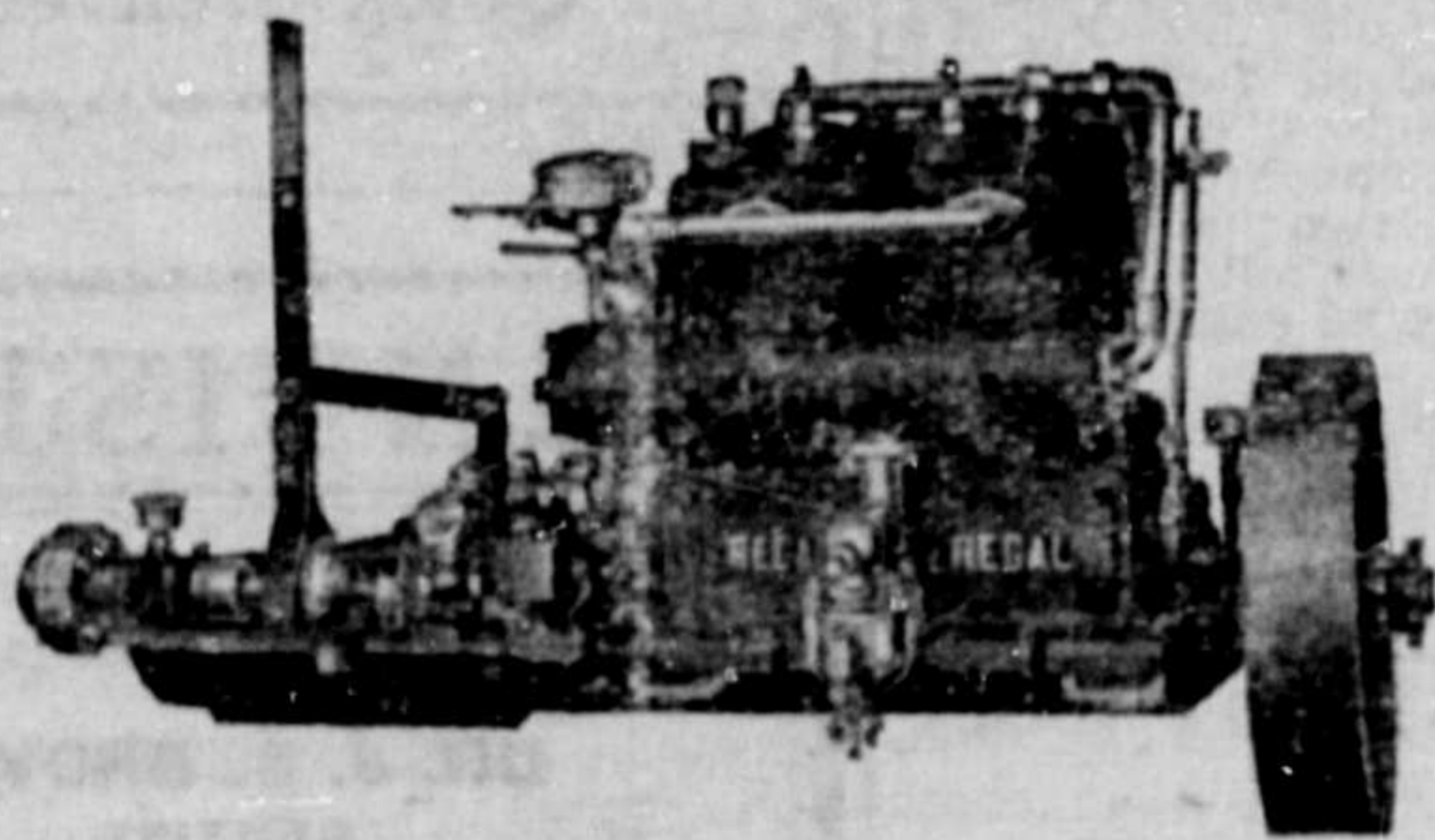

MAKE SHIPBUILDING CHEAPER AND BETTER

Surveyor for British Corporation Has Plans of Laminated System With Him.

Mr. Wallace, representing the British Corporation, and who visits this city regularly in order to inspect the ships being built here, brought with him yesterday a set of plans showing the laminated system of shipbuilding. This system, he says, is forty per cent cheaper than the old, and is accepted by Lloyds, the British Corporation and other insurance societies. In fact ships built that way are stronger than if built with plank. The hulls are built with four-ply lumber, the whole being less than five inches thick, but the grain is crossed, thus adding much to the strength.

Mr. Wallace is of opinion that Sitka spruce would be much better for shipbuilding than eastern spruce and that a better rate could be obtained. Anyone in the city interested in the matter would do well to see Mr. Wallace before he leaves, as he is an authority on shipbuilding and can give valuable information.

MAYORALTY CANDIDATES WERE HEARD LAST NIGHT AT BIG THEATRE MEETING

(Continued from Page One.)

mayor on the statement about the reduction of taxes. His own had increased rather than lessened. He was in favor of school extension and also of sewers. He pointed out the unsatisfactory condition of the health of the city.

Many people seemed to object to a workingman as mayor, but preferred the dressed-up business man. These men, he said, would always work towards their own ends in public office and in electing them the people deserved to be robbed. For himself he could make more money longshoring than he could from the mayor's salary but he felt it was his duty to society to run against two men who were incapable of handling city affairs. He was prepared to prove there were lots of blind pigs and gambling dens in the city. If the present condition was to go on, he stated that the people should vote for either of his opponents.

Ex-Mayor Newton.

Mr. Newton was the last speaker and stated in opening that he was delighted at the results of the meeting he had called. The speakers going before had emphasized points which he had intended dealing with and thus saved him. They had all been unanimous in their criticism of the present administration on different points. For some years civic affairs had been wallowing in the mud and there had been unnecessary bickerings. In fact the mayor admitted that they were "still considering." The speaker stated that he was standing on a platform of progress and he thought it was time there was some progress in civic business. People were becoming dissatisfied with the present state of affairs.

Mr. Newton defended the Wark Channel power proposition and stated that the present mayor had been instrumental in giving away half of the capacity of the present plant and thus brought on an acute power shortage in the city. Regarding the G. T. P. agreement the people knew him well enough to know that he would allow nothing to be put over by that company. During the coming year he felt that it would be necessary for the city to launch upon a scheme of general permanent improvements to maintain employment in the city. Until the G. T. P. question was settled there would be no work on terminal facilities and the Provincial Government seemed to show no inclination to do any work here yet. Embodied in his permanent scheme would be provision for sewers, roads, hard surface roads and cluster lighting. He favored the idea of local loans in the flotation of city bonds. This scheme of city improvement, he felt, would tide the city over a bad year.

Regarding the social condition of the city, Mr. Newton stated that he did not think it was nearly as bad as some chose to paint it. As chairman of the police commission for three years he had heard little criticism of himself and was prepared to stand on his record. Mr. Newton pointed out that the present mayor was seeking re-election without any definite platform, while he had a carefully prepared manifesto. "Why eternally keep a man down because he has shown a good record in public affairs? Give me a chance to put into effect my policy of progress and if I fall down, send me to Davy Jones' locker."

Aldermanic Candidates.

Ald. Kirkpatrick spoke in favor of public library, telephone extension, good sewers, the new school and in moral affairs she would fight to the death for a clean city. Ald. Casey spoke briefly and favored the sewer bylaw. Ald. Perry maintained his stand on the school question, criticized the Emerson power "plum" and said the present police commission was about the "rottenest bunch" he had ever seen. If the people had not liked his service in the past year they could defeat him. D. W. Morrissey favored additions to the present schools instead of a new building, maintaining this would be more economical. John Buckley and George Rudderham gave short speeches.

Pattinson, of the firm of Pattinson & Ling, returned yesterday from Port Simpson where he saw the street lighting system supplied by the Delco Light plant, which he has just installed, in operation. The new plant has cost the natives of the village over \$6,000 and there are 44 lights burning. Later the Indians intend to extend the system so as to provide for house lighting as well as street illumination.

The turning on of the street lights on Monday night last was attended with considerable celebration and a grand concert was held. The Indian band assembled at 6 p.m. on the bandstand in the street and a selection was played by the old lights.

Then Herbert Wallace, the veteran chief, delivered an address. "It gives me great pleasure," said Chief Wallace, "to have the honor of being privileged to turn on the lights of this village. In my own lifetime I have seen the natives of this village develop from a state of heathenism to civilization. May these lights be the forerunner of many other modern improvements."

He then touched a switch and the blaze of white incandescence lit up the village streets. Another band selection was played and the concert then adjourned to the Athletic Hall where a full program was rendered. Among the many pleasing numbers must be remarked the excellent choruses of the Grace Methodist Church Indian choir. Among those taking part were Misses Kelly, Ross, L. M. Deacon, Mesdames F. Ross, F. 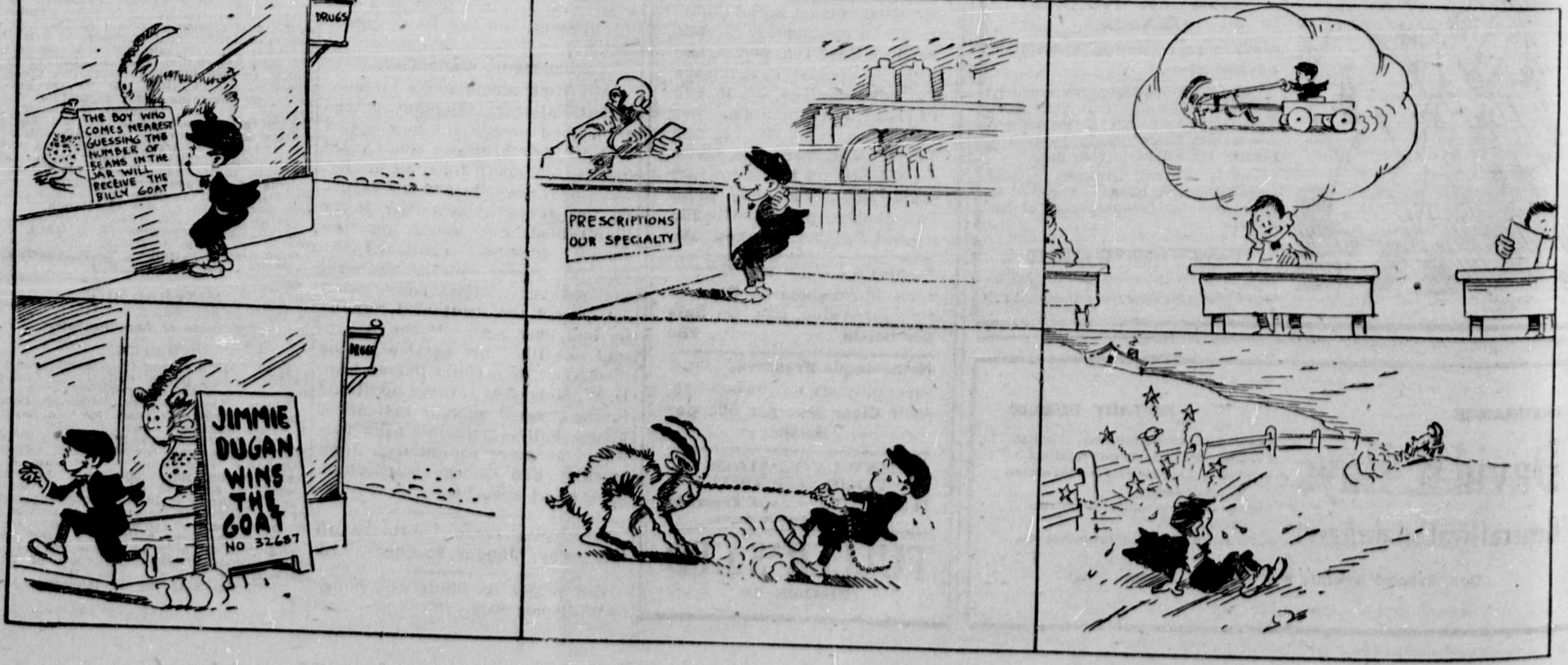

POLICE CHIEF'S ANNUAL REPORT

Shows Alarming Increase in Drug and Opium Cases—Many Fines.

The annual report of the chief of police was read at last night's meeting of the Police Commission. It shows a very slight increase of serious crime in the city, with the exception of infractions of the Opium and Drug Acts in which Prince Rupert is no exception to other places. The drug traffic, it appears, has increased most alarmingly all over the country in the past year. The worst offenders here are the Chinese. There were 42 drug and opium cases here during the past year which brought 40 convictions, one case being dismissed and the other withdrawn.

The total fines for 1919 came to \$8,653 as against \$4,328 in 1918. The comparison of the number of convictions and the amount of fines reflects creditably on the present jurisdiction as there was only one case more this year than last, but the fines were nearly double. There were 415 cases and 383 convictions this year. The average number of persons reporting under the Alien Enemy Act was 150 per month. The maintenance and expense of the Police Department has not yet been ascertained but it is expected that the financial showing will be better than ever before. During the year past the police collected \$674.25 in dog taxes, licenses and public hospital fees. This shows somewhat of a decrease from last year.

The convictions during the year are classified as follows:—Prohibition Act, 46; theft, 9; as-Prhibition Act, 46; Theft, 9; common assault, 10; assaulting police officer on duty, 1; drunks (an increase over last year, most cases having used extracts., 115; Motor Vehicle Act, 24; vagrancy, 20; Alien Enemy Act, 6; Drug Act, 40.

BERLINERS BAYONETTED

Demonstration in Front of Reichstag—Troops Fire on Crowd Trying to Rush Building.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

BASLE, Jan. 14.—Many persons were killed and wounded in Berlin yesterday when troops fired upon and bayoneted demonstrators who tried to rush the Reichstag entrance in protest against the exportation law, says a dispatch from Berlin, following an appeal from Die Freiheit, a radical Socialist organ, for the workmen to demonstrate in protest against the law.

Order Restored.
BERLIN, Jan. 14.—The police have finally restored order in Berlin following upon the riots before the Reichstag building. The Chamber is adjourned for two days.
