Defensive Alliance Against Bolsheviki

Representatives Meet at Helsingfors; Important Conference of Allies at Paris Discusses Policy Regarding Soviet Russia.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, January 16.—Representatives of Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania and Poland are at Helsingfors to arrange for a defensive alliance against the Soviet Government of Russia.
Bolshevik successes are occasioning serious alarm and an important conference is to be held in Paris on military and naval matters. Several of the British ministers are in attendance as well as Baron Beatty, commander of the Grand Fleet, and Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson, chief of the imperial staff.
There is no intimation as to what action the powers will take but it is understood that either they will deal diplomatically with the Russian Soviet or will organize a military campaign against them. The consensus of opinion favors diplomacy, especially in view of recent utterances of David Lloyd George, Prime Minister of Great Britain.

POWERS ASK EXTRADITION OF EX-KAISER

Note Sent to Government of Holland
by Supreme Council
of Allies.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
PARIS, Jan. 16.—The Supreme Council has despatched a note to the Dutch Government asking for the extradition of the former German Emperor. The note will probably be received on Saturday and will come before the Dutch Government at an early date.

It seems likely that no immediate reply will be received as the Government of Holland will give the matter consideration before sending a reply and will carefully state their reasons either for refusing the request or for allowing the deportation of the former monarch.
Wilhelm is still at Amerongen, Holland, whither he fled to take refuge with Count Bentinck, when the German outbreak took place which resulted in the downfall of the German army with consequent capitulation. All sorts of fantastic tales are sent out in regard to him. One is that he has occupied himself in chopping wood, this in spite of the fact that he has a withered arm. Another story says he is crazy, and yet another that he is a worn out, broken down old man. All these stories seem to have been sent with the idea of securing sympathy for the former Kaiser.

GRANBY FINANCES

It is expected that some new financing will be undertaken in the near future by Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting & Power Co., says the Financial Post. Neither the amount nor form has been definitely decided, but it will probably consist of about \$2,500,000 debentures.

She accused Baklanoff of bringing her to America five years ago, although he had a wife and several children in Russia.

Local Member Reviews Business and Industrial Situation in Province

The necessity of team work between the people and the Government in order to develop the vast resources of Northern British Columbia was emphasized in an interview given by Hon. T. D. Pattullo to a Daily News representative in Victoria a few days ago. The member for this district said:
"It is gratifying to know that the outlook for 1920 is so favorable.

"During the year 1919 there was no excuse for any one in British Columbia being out of work, at all events during the working season. If there were any idle men in Vancouver and Victoria, it was because they did not choose to leave those cities, as there was plenty of work all over the province. There is always a between season in British Columbia, by reason of the shutting down of work in the late fall, but even today there are certain classes of work in which it is difficult to secure labor to carry it on.
Future Promising.
"We are now upon a development basis in British Columbia and the future is most promising. In this bright outlook no part of British Columbia shares more largely than Northern British Columbia.
"There is a very keen and wide interest in mining development at the present time, and the coming summer will be particularly active.
"The timber business generally is in a healthy condition and there is far more timber activity in the North than many people

think."

RIOT AMONG NAVAL FORCES AND TROOPS

Insufficient Bread Supplies at
Toulon, France, Precipitates
Mutiny.

LONDON, Jan. 16.—A wireless despatch from Berlin says that riots and mutinies have broken out among the French naval forces and troops at Toulon, the naval and military port of France on the Mediterranean. Food shortage was the cause of the trouble, the men having received insufficient bread supplies, caused by the general shortage in France.

Mayor McClymont Is Again Elected

Four Members of City Council Returned; Myhill Jones is Police Commissioner; Bridge and Sewer Bylaws Passed And Telephone Defeated.

Thomas McClymont has been elected for a third term as Mayor of Prince Rupert, an honor that he shares with his chief opponent at this election. While his majority was considerably reduced, yet a substantial number of citizens showed that they had confidence in him to carry on the affairs of the municipality. By virtue of his office he remains chairman of the Police Commission.

Taken on the whole the election was a clean one and little ill feeling was engendered. Mr. Newton made a good running and had he been the only one in the field except the mayor, there is a possibility that the result might have been different.

The only lady member was defeated this year, but as she holds two public offices in the city, that of member of the school board and the hospital board, her services are still retained to that extent in the public affairs of the municipality.

Alderman McLennan is a member of the school and hospital boards and he formerly was a city official, and is well known.

Alderman Murray, who is new to public life, is an old time Prince Rupert resident and he should make an efficient worker, as he certainly recognizes the needs of the city and has practical ability.

The new police commissioner is also new to public life. He is president of the Sons of England, and because the former commissioner was head of the St. Andrew's Society, the contest was looked on by some as being of an international character. As Mr. Jones was the choice of those who polled in the "Mac" box, this could not have had much influence. The result was a surprise to many.

The fate of the bylaws was doubtful from the first. The passing of the bridge bylaw makes possible the connecting of Section 2 with the rest of the city by means of a suitable structure, to which the rest of the city by means of a suitable structure, to which the Provincial Government will contribute one-third of the cost. The people did not consider the telephone building necessary and refused to sanction borrowing for repairing the old sewer. It will be for the council to find ways and means for carrying on these utilities.

Get Together and Work for City.

Now that the elections are over and the mayor and council and police commission are all definitely chosen, there is nothing to do but forget the elections and get down to work in the interests of the city. We have had the fun of a contest. Now let us have the hard digging to make the year a successful one.

In a city this size there are always a lot of local prejudices to be overcome. Men are often influenced by petty motives instead of by a broad sense of justice. Often we know each other too well to respect motives. The more we get away from all pettiness and forget ourselves in the general interest, the better it will be for the community.

Should Newspapers Be Controlled?

The United Farmers' Convention is going to consider the matter of organizing a chain of papers across the continent, says "Printer and Publisher." The plan seems to be to get a newspaper backing for the Hon. Mr. Crerar, who expects to head the farm movement in Canada, and on the strength of that movement become the next Premier of the Dominion.

One of the things that the farm element has talked against for years has been a paid or controlled press. They have been the foremost to speak of the influences that were being exercised to corrupt the city press. Would a chain of farm papers, controlled no doubt from Winnipeg, correct this state of affairs?

The policy would no doubt be decided at the head office, and handed down to the various links in the chain of papers. The papers would then to all intents and purposes become the paid organs of the men holding views approved of by the Farmers' Council.

It may be hard to convince some classes of the community that the great majority of the papers in Canada are free to express their own views, and they have been doing it in unquestioned style in recent years. Papers have spoken out against parties that they had served and served well, for years. The whole tendency of the age is away from editorial control by any central force. Certainly, the establishment of a chain of papers across the country, controlled and dictated to by a central Farm Council, or some such organization, would not meet with approval. It would be a move directly opposite to the trend of the times. It would be like tying a number of papers up to a policy that would be set for them by some central organization.

If the Farmer movement hopes to secure the sympathy and support of any number of people in the cities and towns, they would be well advised to keep out of the chain of paper idea. It smacks of a centralization of control, and a dictation of policy that is foreign to the frank and outspoken attitude of an increasingly large section of the press.

Car Shortage Is General.

Speaking of the general shortage, Frank B. Carvell, chairman of the Railway Commission, said recently: "The people of British Columbia have no idea how they are supplied with cars; that is to say, relatively speaking. In the Eastern Provinces the railways have to go on much shorter allowances of rolling stock. The fact is that between 21,000 and 22,000 more Canadian cars are on the United States rails today than there are American cars on Canadian rails. At least one-tenth of the cars owned by Canadian railroads are locked up in the United States, and we are afraid to let more go there. It is one of the most serious problems before us.

"Canadian railways, as well as every other public utility in Canada, are suffering from the high cost of everything, just as you and I are. It is a pretty serious thing to order further service unless it can be proved that there is sufficient business to warrant it. Railways as a rule want to do business, and sometimes the public doesn't recognize what it costs to run a railway."

C. I wish to verify his report in the daily press of December 5, as I, with three delegates of our union gave him the report he published. As stated by him there has been but one book given in to me by a salmon fisherman who had gone over to the O. B. U. There has been none of the halibut or beam-trawl fishermen given in their books. They must surely know when they join the O. B. U. they are not considered members of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union, as a member of any dual organization cannot belong to our union. There may be some of our members other than salmon trawlers in the O. B. U. but they have not admitted it to the agent here. The men have a perfect right to please themselves, but they must surely know as before stated, they cannot uphold the two. Yours, etc., (signed) J. H. MEAGHER, Agent of the Prince Rupert Branch of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union of the Pacific."

ASK GOVERNMENT TO RESIGN OFFICE

Labor Men in East Would Try to Convince Administration by Mass Meetings.

Halifax, Jan. 16.—Taking a leaf from the gathering of the Farmers in Winnipeg, local Labor men are advocating the calling of public mass meetings in all the larger industrial centres of the Dominion to pass resolutions calling for the resignation from office of the Federal Union Government. It is the desire of those advocating this course to avoid the suggestion of it being a class movement. The plan is to make the mass meetings representative of all classes of the community.

The movement is prompted by the intimation from Ottawa that the Administration proposes to "hang on" till 1923. It is believed by many that a series of representative public meetings in all parts of the country calling for its resignation would have a pronounced psychological effect and also help to convince the Government that it has already overstayed its welcome.

Lumber Co., represented by Mr. Skead, of Calgary, are putting in the plant and the machinery is now on its way to Smithers. Mr. Skead is already interested in the Smithers Lumber Co.

GOVERNOR RIGGS TALKS OF MINES

Goes to Washington to Try to Secure Aid for Service to Hyder.

Governor Riggs of Alaska is, according to a Seattle paper, going East to try to induce the American Government to aid an American line of steamships to Hyder. At present there is launching between that town and Ketchikan. The Alaska governor is quoted as giving the opinion that the quartz district just beyond the head of Portland Canal is believed by Northern mining men to be the richest silver proposition ever discovered in the North and some insist that it will hold several new world's records. The Alaska territorial government, co-operating with the forestry service and the Alaska road commission, will have opened a highway up Salmon Creek across American territory and to the border of British Columbia by summer. Over this route the silver ore will be brought, in all probability, to Hyder for transshipment to outside smelters. The forestry service, if necessary will build a dock at the new town of Hyder and as there is no possibility of reaching the new quartz country without going through Hyder, it is expected traffic will flow over the Hyder dock.

What is irksome to Governor Riggs is the fact that American steamship lines do not touch at Hyder, while the Grand Trunk vessels do drop in there at regular intervals. The Alaska executive is eager to provide for regular calls by steamers that start from and arrive back at Seattle.

The Hyder question will be one of the matters taken up by Governor Riggs while on the outside. This will open up the whole question of control of Alaska steamship routes and encouragement of service, which is expected to figure on his trip.

...ver realized could be possible. The timber resources of Northern British Columbia are far more valuable than many people in the North have hitherto understood, and are bound to contribute largely to the general prosperity of Northern British Columbia.

In respect of agriculture, the agricultural lands of Northern British Columbia, for mixed farming and dairying purposes, cannot be surpassed, and the development already begun will continue upon an increasing scale.

Beyond Question.

"In respect of the fishing industry, Prince Rupert is, of course, the metropolis; so that with fishing, mining, lumbering and agriculture, Northern British Columbia is bound to rapidly expand. Its wealth and resources are beyond question. It is only a question of how rapidly development will take place.

For the year 1920, with the large influx of people which is certain to come, provision must be made to receive them. The

Government is alive to the situation in Northern British Columbia and is determined to do its part in fostering and encouraging every development movement, but while the Government must do all in its power, in a governmental way, yet the whole responsibility does not lie with the Government. A responsibility lies also with the people who already are resident in the district. They should be ready and willing to assist all newcomers, as well as to help each other. There must be teamwork all along the line. Too many people think that what they can do is too small to bother about, but they forget that the aggregate of this seemingly small effort amounts to a very great deal and should not be lost to the benefit of the country. The Government and the people are one and there must be an undivided effort to assist development wherever the possibility shows itself.

The development of the mines of the northern districts makes a smelter a genuine business proposition. The site at Port Edward would serve the water borne ore and also would be very convenient to take ore from the Hazelton and other mines up the line.
