## Vancouver and Victoria Are Badly Shaken by Earthquake

### No Damage Reported Except Windows Broken; Centre of Disturbance Thought by Expert to Have Been at Victoria.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VANCOUVER, January 24.—One of the most prolonged earthquake shocks that ever visited the vicinity shook the city shortly after 11 o'clock last evening. Excited people rushed out of the buildings but no damage resulted beyond some window panes broken.

The motion of the quake was lateral. Side to side vibrations occurred apparently in an east and west direction. The shock was felt most severely in highlands, a few bricks falling from tops of houses. Some Vancouver people thought that there had been an explosion in the Nanaimo coal mines. Reports from Nanaimo state that five shocks had been felt.

VICTORIA, Jan. 24.—Prolonged earthquake shocks which were felt here last night were found by F. Napier Denison, superintendent of the Dominion Observatory, to be of local origin. The shock took place at 11 p. m., its duration being five seconds. The centre of disturbance, he said, was either in the straits of Juan de Fuca or the Straits of Georgia. It was felt at all points communicated with, but damage is reported from none of these places.

Considerable alarm was occasioned here as the first surmise was that of an explosion on James Island where the big chemical works is situated.

SEATTLE, January 24.—Three distinct earthquake shocks were felt here last night. The cracking of brick walls here and Bellingham was reported.

VANCOUVER, Jan. 24.—(noon)—No reports of damage from last night's earthquake developed this morning. Reports from various points near the coast indicated that the shock had been felt generally.

## PEACE TREATY FRAMERS ARE OUT OF LUCK

Lloyd George, Clemenceau and Wilson Already Met With Reverses and Lloyd George Next.

PARIS, Jan. 24.—Ill fortune has attended those statesmen intimately associated with the framing of the Peace Treaty of Versailles in the opinion of David Lloyd George of Great Britain. In conversation with members of the Chamber of Deputies, the British Premier is said to have expressed the opinion that the Peace Treaty was hard luck for anyone having had a hand in it. "Yes," the deputy is quoted as replying, "Premier Orlando is out of office, Premier Clemenceau is again in private life, and President Wilson has met with reverses in Washington. Only you have been spared."

## ICEBERGS FORCE STEAMER SOUTH ON NORTH ATLANTIC

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Icebergs near Cape Race forced the liner Stockholm, which arrived from Gothenberg, Sweden, more than thirty miles out of her course during her voyage. This is an indication of early spring, as flocks of the size of those sighted do not, under normal conditions, drift so far south until late in February.

## COMPENSATION ACT DECLARED ULTRA VIRES

Appointment of Board in Violation of B. N. A. Act, Says Chief Justice.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 24.—According to a decision rendered by Chief Justice Matthews in the Court of King's Bench the Manitoba Workmen's Compensation for Injuries Act is declared to be ultra vires of the Provincial Legislature and the Compensation Board is shorn of its power as a judicial body.

The decision is based upon the holding that the appointment of the Board is in direct violation of the British North America Act.

## 65 BATTERIES ARTILLERY FOR THIS COUNTRY

Initial Move in Formation of the Canadian Militia is Taken.

OTTAWA, Jan. 24.—The initial phase in the reorganization of the Canadian militia was entered upon yesterday by the issuance of an order by the militia department authorizing the organization of a field and heavy artillery for Canada.

Under the order it is proposed to organize and train during the coming year fifty field batteries and fifteen heavy or siege batteries.

## Twelfth Burns Banquet Had Record Attendance Three Hundred Guests

With an attendance of Scots and their friends that numbered 300 or over, the twelfth annual Burns Banquet was held in the St. Andrew's hall last night. The crowd was more enthusiastic than has turned out for many a year, the attendance was the greatest yet and, in every way, last night's event proved the biggest and, probably, the best ever held in the city. A spirit of satisfaction and relief seemed to pervade the very atmosphere of the banquet hall, a spirit caused by the fact that all the boys who went to France and Flanders are now home again with the exception of two men. Around the festive board could be

noticed the faces of those who had not been there for many a year while they were away on their mission of national salvation on the battlefronts. Besides the returned men there was a large representation of the best citizenry and the membership and support of the St. Andrew's Society was fittingly manifested by the representativeness of the gathering. There were Irish, English, Welsh, American and even French among the guests.

The banquet tables, six of them seating 50 each, completely filled the entire large hall. The catering arrangements were in the hands of the St. Regis Cafe staff, the waiters of that restaurant being out in force to attend to the needs of the guests. The tables were burdened with their loads of tempting delicacies and the spread was indeed sumptuous. There were salads of many varieties and to suit all tastes. Cold meats and meat pies accompanied these.

Enter King Haggis.

The feature, of course, was the haggis which coming in from the kitchen steaming hot in its true style was borne by John Tait, attired in Scottish uniform led by Piper James Sturgeon, who himself was clad in the full highland regalia. ## JACK M'GINNIS UP ON MURDER CHARGE

Got Six Months Here Last Year For Theft of Blankets From Empress Hotel.

Jack (Curley) McGinnis, who is well known in northern police circles and who was sentenced to six months in this city last year for stealing blankets from the Empress Hotel, is now in Okalla prison, having been committed last week for trial on the charge of being implicated in the murder of Andy Groven last fall. With him is associated Blackie Ford, who is alleged to have committed the murder and Robert Graham who turned King's evidence and exposed McGinnis and Ford. The murder, it is believed, was the outcome of an attempt to commit theft.

## SEVERAL KILLED IN RAILWAY STRIKE IN ITALY YESTERDAY

## Influenza Spreading Throughout East

### Many Large Cities Report Outbreaks; Detroit has Over 1500 Cases; Toronto Reached.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—The influenza is spreading throughout many cities of the United States and is rapidly approaching the epidemic stage, the public health commissioner states. For some days past alarming reports have come from Chicago, but now other cities are joining in drawing attention to the condition.

ST. PAUL, Jan. 24.—Minnesota is gripped by the new flu epidemic which caused as many as 10,000 deaths last year, Dr. Charles E. Smith, executive officer of the state board of health, announced.

Baltimore, January 24.—Eighty-seven new cases of influenza and 23 cases of pneumonia were reported to the city health department yesterday. There were no deaths from flu but two from pneumonia.

DETROIT, January 24.—Seven hundred and sixty cases of influenza were recorded by the public health officer during the day, bringing the total since the beginning of the present outbreak to 1,523.

MEMPHIS, Jan. 24.—Theatres and all places of amusement are closed by the board of health owing to the prevalence of influenza.

TORONTO, Jan. 24.—The epidemic of influenza seems to have reached this city. Eight cases were reported at the Toronto General Hospital.

## EIGHTY-FIVE COMMUNISTS ARE INDICTED

Grand Jury Charges Members With Advocating Overthrow of Government.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Eighty-five members of the Communist party were indicted by a special grand jury probing radical activities. The Grand Jury indicted thirty-eight of the Communist party.

The eighty-five are named in one general conspiracy indictment charging them with advocating the overthrow of the Government by revolution.

## VICTORIA LEADS IN HOCKEY LEAGUE OF THE PACIFIC COAST

VICTORIA, January 24.—With three teams all lined up again level for a fresh start in the Pacific Coast Hockey League race, Victoria repeated the performance of the beginning of the season by a win on the home ice, this time at the expense of Vancouver. ## REFUSES TO MARRY THE YEAST MAGNATE

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Rev. H. C. Wasmund, of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Brooklyn, says he will not perform the wedding ceremony for Julius Fleischmann, the wealthy yeast manufacturer and former mayor of Cincinnati, and Mrs. Laura Hylan Hemingway.

Fleischmann recently was divorced by his wife.

## HOLLAND WILL GIVE REFUGE TO BANISHED

That is Ground They Take in Regard to Former Emperor Wilhelm.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

PARIS, Jan. 24.—In a note to the Foreign Office by the Dutch ministers, Holland takes the ground that the Dutch Government is not a party to the Peace Treaty which condemned William Hohenzollern, and that it cannot recognize it as an immediate duty to associate itself with "this act of high international policy of the

It declares also that the constituent laws of the kingdom and the traditions of the country which always afford a ground of refuge for banished refugees, will not permit the government to defer to the wishes of the Entente by withdrawing from the former Emperor, the benefit of its laws and traditions.

The declaration is made that the people of the Netherlands cannot betray to his foes those who have confided themselves to Holland's free institutions.

## HOME RULE BILL BEING PREPARED

Committee of British Cabinet is Working on It Readiness for Parliament.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, Jan. 24.—Now that Lloyd George is back from Paris, the British ministers are getting their proposed legislation in shape.

Ireland comes first. A committee of the cabinet is busy completing details of the Home Rule measure for the opening on February 10. It follows closely the lines of the proposal made by Lloyd George on December 22, though subsequent discussions here and in Ireland may give rise to some modifications in Ireland's favor as to finance and customs and excise powers.

## ALICE ARM FROZE OVER WEDNESDAY

Alice Arm is frozen in from communication with Anxox. Last Tuesday the local boat, "Wake," made the last trip, but was unable to get through the ice on Thursday. Connections for the Arm with the Prince George on Thursday were thus cut off and a number of passengers from here to the mining town were forced to return here by the same steamer as accommodation could not be obtained in Anxox. It is possible that the "Wake" may resume service again today or tomorrow.

mostly from his own nation. These criticisms had been caused by the appearance of works that should have been edited and eliminated.

His private life had also been severely criticised but on investigation it was found that his grossness had been far surpassed by Shelly and Byron. His private life should be forgotten but his message of beauty and sweetness should alone be remembered. Dr. Grant then referred to many of his great poems, some of which were the greatest of their particular kind in the English language.

#### Bonnie Scotland.

J. H. Kelly replied to the toast of "Bonnie Scotland" in a vein of humor that quite captivated the listeners. He referred to it as the land where many had spent their childhood and met their sweethearts, the scenes nearest and dearest to the heart of any man. Last year he had visited the sod and had come back to Canada with the conviction that the Scottish spirit in this country was not what it should be. It was a great old country and had done much for the world and in quality its men, cities and all other attributes were on a par with or excelled the rest of the world. He expressed his disgust that the toast to Scotland should be drunk with soda water.

#### Canada.

Fred Stork, who had attended every Burns banquet since the first one down in the Grand Trunk Inn in 1908, answered the toast to "Canada." From the Atlantic seaboard to the mouth of the Yukon River every city, town and hamlet was this night celebrating the immortal memory. All the Scots immigrating from the old soil had seen the country from east to west. The country had just passed successfully through a great struggle and the boys of Canada had done themselves credit. A brilliant future was in store.

The toast to the "Laddies Who Fought and Won" was responded to by Capt. McGregor, V. C., and Major G. E. Gibson. The former told a touching story of an experience in the battlefield. Major Gibson expressed the feeling that those who had truly won were those who had remained lying in France. He said that the present generation of Canadians was not the quality of those of 30 years ago.

#### The Lassies.

Miss McLenaghan responded to the toast, "The Lassies." She remarked the novelty of a lady being on a Burns banquet toast list. This only went to show that women were taking their place in the affairs of the world and were accomplishing men's work and duties.

Mayor McClymont replied to the toast to our city and mentioned several of the questions that, at the present time, were most interesting to those anxious for the progress and development of the city.

#### Program.

Mrs. Wm. Millar, Mrs. Jarvis McLeod and Miss Beatrice Killen sang with the true native accent and were applauded again and again. R. Dowther, R. Robertson, Wm. Murray and J. N. Sinclair also sang, some in a humorous vein while others were along romantic lines. All met with due applause. Principal Brady in his inimitable style showed that he could recite in Scottish dialect. He gave the poem "Ochiltree" and responded to an encore with a humorous love letter in which certain local people took leading roles.

The St. Andrew's pipe band took down the house with their numbers and were recalled for a third appearance by special request. The orchestra of the society provided the music and after the toasts were completed the hall was cleared and dancing was indulged in. W. Vaughan Davies and Mrs. Killen assisted with the accompaniments. The memorable gathering broke up at 3:30 in the morning. The great success attained was due largely to the efforts of the Burns' Night Committee made up of Captain McGregor, W. H. W. Murray, Howard Steen, J. Kelly and James Irvine.

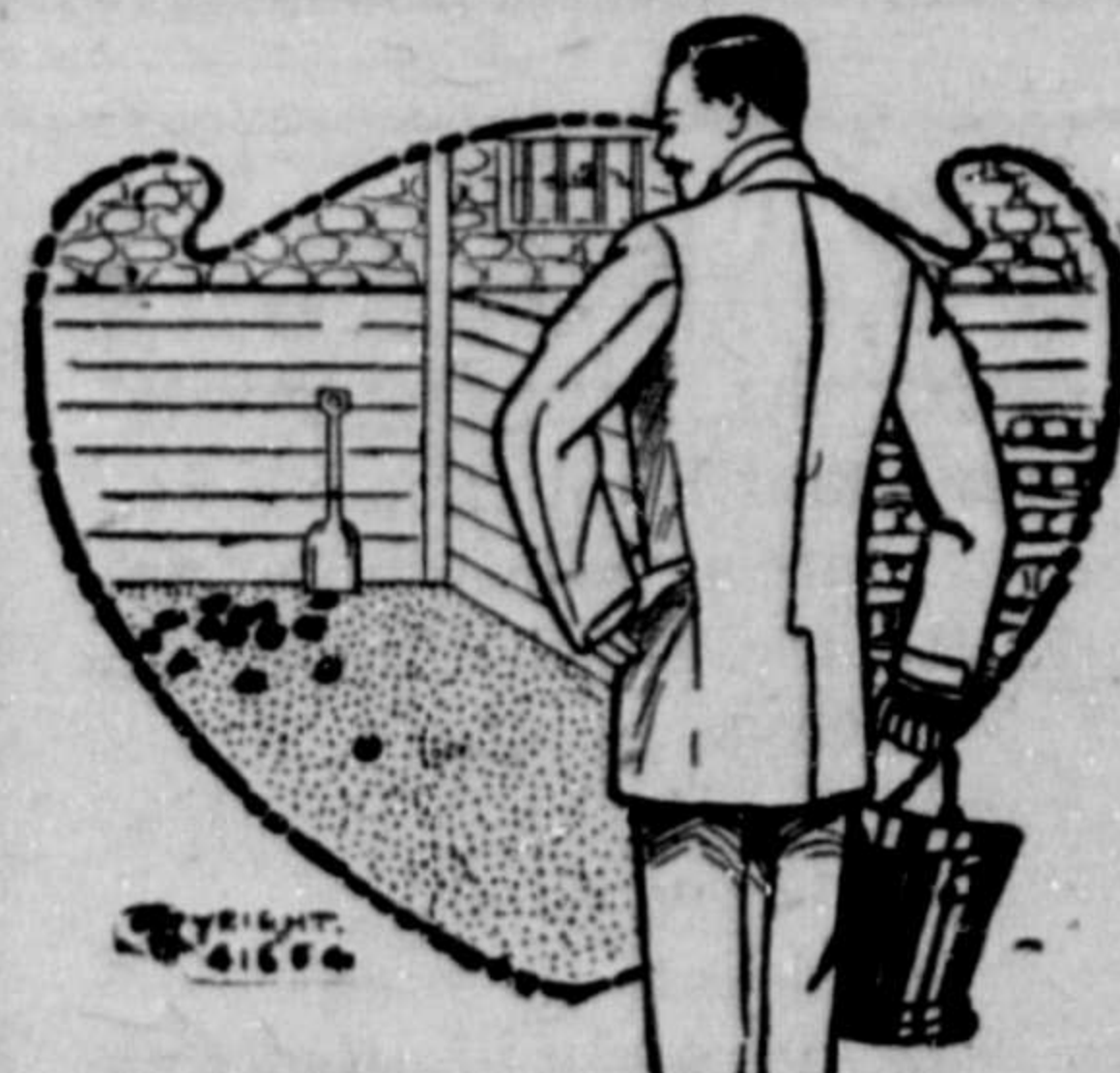

on the market. Of these six are in Central British Columbia, one at Smithers, three in Francois Lake country, one at Martin Lake and the sixth at Prince George, the total area being 70,000 acres. These well all be open for settlement in the spring, according to Duncan Munro of Terrace, who is a member of the Board.

Mr. Munro says that the area at Telkwa is sold out and a good many settlers have taken advantage of the Vanderhoof lands. Many private owners also have sold their properties, largely through the advertising secured from the Board.

Taken as a whole, Mr. Munro says he considers the working out of the Land Settlement Act has been a great success. It has been effective in keeping down the price of land to a reasonable level and of bringing in a large number of settlers, both of which ends are most desirable. He quoted many instances to show how effective the act had been.

In conjunction with the operations of the Land Settlement Act the Provincial Government had loaned money to settlers to aid them in stocking the land after they had it. The result has been most beneficial. Some of the farmers had already paid for their cattle and had at least half of the herd left free of debt.

**REFINERY IS  
BADLY NEEDED**

Memorandum Prepared by Com-  
mittee of the Board of Trade  
For Delegation to  
Victoria.

**DRAWNS ATTENTION TO  
COPPER SHIPMENTS**

A committee of the Board of  
Trade headed by J. B. Roerig pre-  
pared a memorandum for the use  
of the delegation going to Victoria  
dealing particularly with the need  
of a refinery, samplers, the steel  
industry and Government roads.  
The report does not deal with the  
establishment of a smelter as  
that seems to be provided for by  
the proposal to establish one at  
Port Edward as set forth by  
Messrs. McMillan and Coy. The  
section of the report dealing with  
the need of a refinery is as fol-  
lows:—

"The advantages of a refinery  
are manifold, besides creating the  
industry at home and the corre-  
sponding employment of labor it  
will be readily seen that as now  
operating here, the copper indus-  
try is partly at least contribut-  
ing towards our adverse trade  
balance. Copper is a large factor  
in the trade of Canada and al-  
though nature has endowed us  
with tremendous deposits of this  
important element, it is at pres-  
ent necessary for us to seek the  
American markets for the bulk of  
the commercial copper used in  
Canada. This condition is abso-  
lutely opposed to our own trade  
and welfare. Before proceeding  
further we want to make it per-  
fectly plain that we believe in  
giving every encouragement and  
protection to foreign investors,  
yet we believe we can still do  
this and at the same time enjoy  
the fullest benefits arising from  
the exploitation of our natural  
resources, and not permit any  
company to take out of our coun-  
try products that are needed  
within the Empire at the same  
time working a positive injury to  
our adverse trade balance."

**Stimulate Production.**  
"Authorities seem to agree that  
the chief economic difficulty af-  
fecting our present exchange rate  
comes in the importation of the  
raw material necessary for the  
maintenance of Canadian indus-  
tries. The slogan just now  
throughout Canada is to stimu-  
late industrial production. How  
are we to do this if the most im-  
portant basic materials entering  
into industry are sent to the  
United States where we must go  
to purchase our requirements of  
products, the original source of  
which lie within the confines of  
Canada? It is true that some  
mining companies do refine their  
metals in Canada and the refined  
product is sold here, but we main-  
tain that all of the metal produc-  
tion should be held in our own  
country.

"For example we will take a  
company like the Granby. This  
company is rich and successful  
and we think without injury to  
itself at the same time with great  
benefit to the Dominion should  
refine its metals to the finished  
state where they are produced  
from the ores. We believe that  
the Granby Company, however,  
will oppose the suggestion of  
building a refinery of their own  
here or even the erection of a re-  
finery by the Government. The  
reasons for this may be selfish.  
The control of the Granby Com-  
pany is supposed to be very close-  
ly connected with the Great  
Northern Railway and as now ob-  
taining every pound of blister  
copper produced at Anox is  
shipped to New Jersey for re-  
fining, not over the natural route  
through Canada but is forwarded  
to Tacoma for shipment over the  
Great Northern Railway. Canada  
does not benefit from the trans-  
portation of this product even, as  
it is naturally entitled to do.

**Canadian Transportation.**  
"The output from Granby last  
year, it is stated, was 20,000,000  
pounds, a falling off from the  
previous year of about 9,000,000  
pounds. Last year's output was  
equivalent to five thousand car  
loads of freight that was denied  
Canadian transportation com-  
panies. Then again, the Granby  
Company is supposed to be af-  
filiated with the American Copper  
selling interests. Therefore, it  
would appear unlikely that the  
Granby Company would take  
kindly to any proposition leading  
to the establishment of a refinery  
either by themselves or by the  
government.  
"During the war it became ap-

parent that some of the Nickel  
being mined in Ontario was find-  
ing its way into the hands of the  
enemy, owing to the mining com-  
panies there conducting their  
operations along similar lines.  
Legislation was passed compell-  
ing these companies to refine  
their metals within the Dominion.  
We feel that if it was necessary  
for the Government to do this in  
the case of nickel, the reasons  
should be equally sound in the  
case of copper and the other  
metals.

**Zinc Treatment.**  
"The existing situation regard-  
ing zinc is even more aggravating  
than that of copper. As far as  
our own locality is concerned it  
appears that there are large  
bodies of zinc ore at Alice Arm,  
Owen Lake, White Sail Lake and  
Hazelton, which could be profit-  
ably mined if a home market  
were available. Although Canada  
is a large consumer of zinc it  
must go to the American markets  
to obtain the bulk of the com-  
mercial product. The Silver  
Standard mine near Hazelton has  
shipped several cars of zinc ore,  
produced along with its silver-  
lead ores, to Oklahoma for treat-  
ment owing to the absence of a  
nearer market. The lengthy  
freight haul on the raw ore alone  
in this case would constitute a  
good profit on the ore shipments.  
Therefore in considering a re-  
finery it would appear that zinc  
should be regarded along with  
copper."

## FUR MARKET IS NOT LIKELY TO HOLD LONG

Manager of Edmonton Firm Gives Views Regarding Products on the Prairie.

EDMONTON, Jan. 24.—Louis Phillipson, manager of the International Fur and Hide Company, dealers and importers of raw furs and hides, advises against speculation in fur under existing uncertain conditions of the present and future market. Speaking of the raw fur situation generally, Mr. Phillipson said:

"The market is holding up at the present time, but it is generally expected that a considerable drop will occur in the spring, particularly in muskrat fur, which has eased off considerably in price within the last two weeks.

"It is expected in the spring that there will be a good demand for fancy fur such as marten, fisher and foxes. It is difficult to state at the present time what the future will be in regard to prices, but it is generally agreed that the wisest plan under conditions prevailing would be not to speculate

in fur, but to take advantage of the present high prices and sell according to the market."

Questioned in regard to the supply of the different furs this year, the manager stated: "Ermine or weasel are plentiful. Rats are scarce, but a big catch is expected in the spring by the trappers. The scarcity of this fur this winter, was chiefly due to the heavy snowfall early in the year, making it very difficult to trap rats with any success."

"Coyotes are about the normal catch. Black bear are not very numerous, but are expected to show a better catch later on. The present prices on this skin are the basis established at the last October sales in New York and St. Louis. Mink is in good demand, the catch this year in Alberta being fairly good."

## KOLCHAK PRISONER HAS BEEN CONFIRMED

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, Jan. 24.—Confirming the report to the effect that Admiral Kolchak, the former head of the Omsk Government in Russia, is a prisoner, in the hands of the revolutionists at Irkutsk, the Daily Mail's Harbin correspondent in a despatch dated last Thursday says the indications are that his life is in danger.

George Young, road foreman of the Atlin district, arrived from Anyox on Tuesday night. He reports continued activity in the Alice Arm district.
