Train Wreck on The Canadian Pacific Railway Yesterday

Number are Killed and Injured, Including Vancouver and Victoria People, as Result of Rear End Collision On Main Line in Ontario.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
NORTH BAY, Jan. 26.—Fifteen are believed to be dead and a large number injured as a result of a train wreck on the Canadian Pacific Railway which occurred at Corbiel, 11 miles east of here at 10:30 Sunday morning.
Number 1 Canadian Pacific Express for Vancouver was due here at 10 a. m. running in two sections, Number 1 section being stalled owing to the failure of the engine to make steam under the condition of severe frost. Number 2 section came around a curve, the locomotive of Number 2 section telescoping the rear sleeper of Number 1.
It was said that torpedoes had been placed and other precautions taken by the crew of the stalled train.
The western dead include Mrs. Hugh Peden, 173 7th Ave. Vancouver; Wallace and Hugh Peden, sons of Mrs. Peden; Jas. Tilley, Vancouver; a son of C. H. Beale of Vancouver.
Those living in the west who were injured include Charles H. Beale, Vancouver, slight cuts; Capt. Leslie D. Burrows, Victoria, head injured and back; Lieut.-Col. R. Innes, Victoria, injuries to back and right arm; Miss McLaughlin, Vancouver, hands cut and face bruised; Capt. McLaren, presumed of Victoria, cut about head; George Rasmussen of Seattle, internal injuries; Mrs. George Rasmussen, Seattle, internal injuries.
MONTREAL, Jan. 26.—(Noon)—The dead in the wreck on the Canadian Pacific Railway at Corbiel, Ont., on Sunday morning remained at eight, according to official advice received today.

P. G. E. CONSTRUCTION TO SOUTH OF PRINCE GEORGE IS STARTING

Much Equipment on the Ground and Accommodation for a Hundred Men is Now Ready.

PRINCE GEORGE, Jan. 26.—This week operations commence in real earnest on the construction of the P. G. E. railway south of here. There are already on hand thirty miles of rails which will be laid as soon as the small trestle across the Fraser at the edge of the town is completed. Thirty flat cars are on their way here and a ten-ton industrial locomotive crane is now in the yards. A million feet of bridge timber is ready and the Stone Creek mill, 25 miles to the south is about to start cutting. The Northern Construction Co., which is in charge of the work, is building a 30 by 100 foot warehouse and accommodation will soon be ready for 100 men.

WOMEN TAKE THE METHODIST CHURCH SERVICE

Miss Hudson in Charge and Address by Mrs. H. B. Holmes.
The members of the Women's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church conducted the service at the Methodist Church last night. There was a large attendance and much interest was taken in the proceedings.
The service was in charge of Miss Hudson, the representative of the Women's Missionary Society in this city. The address of the evening was given by Mrs. H. B. Holmes, who, taking for her text the message of Christ to his disciples, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," urged the need of missionary work. Her address was clear and to the point and was much appreciated.
Others who took part in the service were Mrs. Perry, Mrs. Nuttall, Mrs. W. H. Kergin, and Mrs. Waddell. Mrs. W. T. Kergin read the responses.
The whole service was somewhat of a missionary character and advantage was taken of the opportunity to present to the congregation an account of the work of the Women's Missionary Society. It was in line with the forward movement which is occupying the minds of all church people just now.
Rev. T. H. Nuttall is just now in Vancouver attending meetings of the Forward Movement committee and it was owing to his absence from the city that the ladies undertook to conduct the meeting. Mrs. Linnell, who was to sing, was unfortunately taken ill and was unable to attend.

BIG REWARD IS OFFERED IN IRELAND

Ten Thousand Pounds to be Given For Information Leading to Conviction of Murderers.

DUBLIN, Jan. 26.—A proclamation posted in Dublin today contains an offer by the Lord Lieutenant, Viscount French, of 10,000, for information which within three months will lead to the conviction of any persons guilty of the murder of fourteen police officers whose names are given.
The list begins with Detective Smith of Dublin, who was assassinated last July, and ends with those of Deputy Commissioner Redmond, murdered in Dublin last week and Constable Finegan, killed at Thurles.
The reward of 10,000 pounds offered for such secret information as is calculated to lead to the conviction of any of the offenders in the cases named. Any person concerned in or privy to the murders but not actually guilty of them, who gives the required information, is promised a free pardon and the special protection of the crown.

IRISH SLUMS ARE APPALLING

Correspondent of Daily Mail Says Social Improvement What is Needed in Ireland.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, Jan. 26.—One positive result of the English parliamentary laborite delegation going to Ireland will be the withdrawal of opposition by the English labor party to the Government's present plan for Home Rule in Ireland, according to the Daily Mail's correspondent, who is accompanying the delegation.
The correspondent says it is clear that what is most needed is not an exchange of political formulas but an improvement of the social conditions and of the internal economic situation. He gives as an instance Limerick, where he says trade is paralyzed through strike actions and that the slums are appalling and their occupants ragged and hungry.

NEW FRENCH WAR SUPREME COUNCIL

Nine Generals Will be Chosen Later to Act With Foch and Others.

PARIS, January 26.—Marshals Foch, Joffre, and Petain and Major General Buat make up the new French supreme war council. Nine generals will be chosen later to act on the council.

GERMAN GOVERNMENT CLOSES REPAIR SHOPS OWING TO AGITATION

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
BERLIN, Jan. 26.—The Government's decision to close the railway repair shops in Berlin, Hanover, Frankfurt, Darmstadt, Götting and other points is due to the steadily receding volume of output from them, due to the passive resistance by workers under the influence of communistic agitators.
The closing of the shops will mark the most drastic action yet undertaken by the cabinet and the Prussian ministry.
The shops put out of commission are to be reopened only when conditions warrant it and the workers agree to piece work schedules.

SHIPPING BOARD FRAUD CHARGED

Capt. John F. Blane Indicted for Wrongfully Accepting Commissions.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
SEATTLE, Jan. 26.—Other indictments involving officials of the Emergency Fleet Corporation and Northwest shipping men will follow the indictment of Captain John F. Blane, the former North Pacific District manager of the corporation, who was arrested charged with having accepted commissions while with the shipping corporation. He was released on a \$10,000 bond.
Investigators for the Government assert that frauds in the Government work on this coast total many million dollars. The Grand Jury will reconvene tomorrow.

MORE INFLUENZA IN SPITE OF EFFORT TO CHECK SPREAD

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—Despite strenuous efforts by the health authorities to check the spread of influenza, there were 2,855 new cases during the past 24 hours, an increase of 494 cases over those reported during the previous day.

VERY RICH ORE SHIPPED FROM DOLLY VARDEN

Forty-Seven Tons Nets the Owners After Paying Expenses \$57,000.
Reports reaching here indicate that 47 tons of ore has been shipped from the Dolly Varden mine since the heavy snowfall made it impossible to operate the railway. This has been brought down over the track by means of the teams that take supplies into the mines. The net proceeds of the 47 tons was \$57,000, the gross being a very considerable amount more than that.
Naturally it is only the richest ore that is shipped during the winter. The rest is left on the dump to be handled by the railway in the spring.

HUGH GUTHRIE IS MINISTER OF MILITIA

OTTAWA, Jan. 26.—On Saturday Hon. Hugh Guthrie, who has been Solicitor General in the Union Government since its formation was sworn in as Minister of Militia to succeed Hon. S. C. Mewburn, who relinquished the post a few days ago.
Guthrie will retain the portfolio of Solicitor General.
With the departure of Hon. J. D. Reid to Florida on Saturday night Hon. J. A. Calder, who has been acting Minister of Militia, became acting Minister of Railways.

ALBERT STRUCK BAR AT MASSET

Superintendent Beaumont States Damage Not as Serious as Reported.
The Prince Albert struck the bar at Masset on Friday night on her return from there and came into Rupert under her own steam on Saturday afternoon. A survey of the damage done to the vessel was made here on Saturday afternoon and it was found that she was perfectly seaworthy so continued on her way to Vancouver. It is probable that she will go on the ways there for further examination and repairs. Superintendent Beaumont says that the damage, if any, is very slight.
The Prince John was rushed off the local drydock yesterday to take a cargo of pulp from Swanson Bay to Seattle that must be there by January 28 to be loaded on an ocean steamer at that port. Captain Moorehouse, the regular skipper of the vessel, is at present in the south and she was taken south last night by the pilot.

TO BRING BRITISH FOOTBALL TEAMS TO THIS COUNTRY

VANCOUVER, Jan. 26.—Con Jones, the local sportsman, will leave for Toronto on Saturday to confer with the president of the Dominion Football Association in connection with a proposal to bring to Canada two British cup-winning football teams for a tour of the Dominion.

ASQUITH IS OPENING POLITICAL CAMPAIGN

LONDON, Jan. 26.—Former Premier Asquith is opening his political campaign at Paisley. Owing to the complications that have arisen, there has been somewhat of a swing of popular feeling away from the Lloyd George Government and Asquith expects to take advantage of that.

SANCTIFICATION OF JOAN OF ARC

ROME, Jan. 26.—The ceremony of the sanctification of Joan of Arc will be performed next May with great solemnity, according to an announcement from the Vatican. Special quarters are being prepared for French pilgrims.

Soldier Fishermen Or Soldier Farmers.

The Dominion Government is aiding soldier farmers to settle down on the land. The idea is that we need production. Another form of production is to catch the fish that are going to waste in the ocean. Already some of it is being taken care of but much more fish might be caught.

The proposal has been made and endorsed by the fishermen in public meetings and also by the Great War Veterans that the Dominion Government should treat those who wish to become fishermen with the same liberality that they treat those who wish to farm. The suggestion seems reasonable enough and it is difficult to understand why there should be any hesitation on the part of the authorities in endorsing it and putting it in force.

To bring a man home from the war and set him up on a farm in the wilderness is playing at contrasts. It does not look very reasonable, unless it be for a man who is used to the farm. Even if he is taught the new business, the life is so different from the life in France and Flanders that there is doubt of its success. On the other hand to teach him the fishing trade is to give him excitement such as he is used to. There is sport in the game. It is a hard life perhaps, but it is full of interest. There is no business that the Soldiers Re-establishment Committee might better consider than that of fishing on this coast.

It will cost little more to set a man up in the fishing business than it does to set him up on a farm, and there is much greater hope of his being able to pay back a loan from the result of his work in the fishing business than there is from the output of the farm. The return would be much quicker.

Another thing to remember is that all men are not constituted alike. The business that one likes, another does not care about. We cannot all be farmers. There are many who would like to be fishermen. In view of the demand and of the opportunities, it seems the reasonable course for the Dominion Government to give the returned men an opportunity to take up fishing as a means of livelihood.

Fisheries Worth Much to Port.

Much interest has been taken in the summary of the fishing for last year as published in this paper Friday. In spite of drawbacks the catch for the year amounted to nearly fifty-nine million pounds. It is difficult to compute the value of this fish, but at an average price of ten cents a pound it is worth nearly six million dollars. How many places on this coast have an income from one industry only of anything like that amount. Nature has been good to us and it is for us to make the most of our opportunities. We must conserve our fisheries, but we must also make the most of them.

Refinery Would Be Great Thing.

A recommendation from the Board of Trade to the Government is that a refinery should be built on this coast for the purpose of converting the blister copper produced here to the commercial article. Mention is also made in the memorandum that the blister copper is shipped east over an American railroad instead of being sent by the natural route through this port. These are important matters.

We would like to suggest that now that the Government controls the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific Railways, it use its influence to have the copper shipped by this port. Formerly a few car loads were sent out over the road. Of late, however, even that has stopped and an American line carries it.

We do not think that anything should be done to hamper the Granby Company in its operations. We want industries and if we are to get more we must treat them fairly. If we go trust hunting here we shall soon have no industries to hunt. What is suggested is that until a refinery is built on the coast the copper should be carried over the Canadian National Railway by way of Prince Rupert. It is understood that the same rate could be secured from here as from Tacoma and that the long water haul would be saved.

To the Editor,— I notice in the columns of your paper an announcement of a company preparing to drill for oil in the vicinity of Skidegate. Let us wish them speed and great success. I haven't a dollar in holdings in that area but my faith is there in so far as the Queen Charlotte Islands is concerned.

You will remember an item I wrote you the latter part of 1919 where attention was called to a portion of the east coast of Graham Island as very favorable for oil in merchantable quantities, also touching indications here on a portion of the townsite. However, I didn't see the item appear in print. Of course I might have made it a little strong, but we know that in order to promote the oil industry here in the north-west, irrespective of indications, has been like trying to raise the dead.

But let us keep faith. Indications show that ground is being gained in this great northwest where unquestionably oil lies in merchantable quantities.

Vancouver and vicinity is not without her portion of oil in ample abundance, even in face of the fact that to date nothing of importance along that line has been accomplished. Why? Because efforts that have been made were in sedimentary deposits of overflow from the main oil sands and strata. WANT SAMPLERS FOR PROSPECTORS

Board of Trade Asks Provincial Government to Aid Mining in That Respect.

In the memorandum prepared for the Board of Trade by a committee headed by J. B. Roerig for presentation to the Provincial Government the matter of the establishment of samplers was discussed. The memo says:

Under an act of the Legislature provision was made for public sampling works. It would appear that samplers are a highly important adjunct to the mining industry, especially when the mining is done by a number of smaller operators, and we should think that they should be under government control.

Since a sampling works does not require a large capital outlay as compared with smelters and refineries and would be useful pending the erection and operation of the latter, it would seem that the time has arrived to see that our northern camps are properly provided for in that respect, without undue delay. Our understanding of the functions of a sampler are that it is equipped with machinery to automatically sample the ore and accurately determine its metal content, making a nominal charge to producers for this service and is prepared to pay for the ore sampled, on the basis of the sample and determinations made, or else the shipper may consign the ore to a smelter elsewhere. Thus the shipper is not entirely in the hands of or at the mercy of the smelter in so far as the determination of the metal content of his ore is concerned.

Check on Smelter.

In the case of ore sampled in transit to the smelter the producer has the results of his ore as determined at the sampler when making his settlement with the smelter by which he has a check on the smelter settlement. Then, it is a fact that owing to the high freight rates on small shipments, the smaller operator is sometimes unable to ship his product with profit, and then to the small operator is at times hampered for sufficient working capital and is unable to stand the long delay in receiving the money for his ores from a smelter situated at a long distance from the point of origin of the shipment. Provided the determinations as made by the sampler were satisfactory to the shipper, then the shipper could get his returns immediately.

In Other Countries.

By the assembling of small lots in this way the sampler would be able to obtain the minimum freight rates on the shipments to be made in turn by it. There would appear to be a need for sampling plants built and operated at once by the Government at Alice Arm, Stewart and Prince Rupert. Samplers have long been in operation successfully in other countries and we fail to see how we are to give encouragement to the mining operators, more especially to the smaller operators, whom after all, we look to mainly to open up our mines. It may seem likely that there will be opposition to samplers by those that may favor the existing smelters
