



Large Increase in Canada's Trade is Shown by Returns

Exports \$353,812,931 Higher than Imports for Last Year; Adverse Balance With U.S. Affects Exchange.

(Special to The News via G T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, January 28 .- The volume of Canada's trade in he year which ended December 31, 1919, exceeded that of the revious twelve months by approximately \$80,000,000. The mports for 1919 aggregated \$941,007,700, \$31,000,000 more han for the previous year. The exports amounted to \$1,294,-020,372 or \$51,000,000 more than 1918. The balance of trade n favor of the Dominion in 1919 was \$353,812,679. In trade with the United States, however, Canada has an adverse balance of \$285,893,931. This determined the exchange rate between he two countries. The total amount collected in customs duties y the Dominion Government during 1919 was \$168,920,659.

Imports from Great Britain last year totalled \$87,516,819, compared with \$72,879,109 in 1918. Exports to Great Britain reached \$528,035,514, or approximately \$40,000,000 less than ponyi, head of the Hungarian in 1918. 





veyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making

necessary improvements on respective Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year.
