## Last Labor Minister Resigns; Miners Ask Profits Reduced

**George N. Barnes Leaves Lloyd George Cabinet; Men will Meet Premier in Regard to Selling Price of Coal and Cost of Living.**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, January 28.—George Nicoll Barnes, minister without portfolio, has resigned from the cabinet. The significance of his resignation lies in the fact that it is the final withdrawal of labor from the coalition government. Up to the present time the cabinet has been to some extent representative of all the interests, with the old time Conservatives predominating. While there have been many rumors that Lloyd George would break away from the Tory influences and lead a new national party, there have been no official signs of any such action on his part.

**Miners Make Demands.**

The miners' delegates are to meet Premier Lloyd George. According to report they will ask that the Government reduce immediately the price on industrial export coal and proceed with limitation of the profits of the coal owners, the limitation to be retroactive.

It is also demanded that the Government take steps to reduce the prices of food and clothing to a reasonable basis. They threaten as an alternative to demand an immediate all-round increase in wages.

## ODESSA ABOUT TO FALL INTO HANDS OF REDS

All Allied Consuls, Except American and Argentine, Have Left for Trebizond.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

GENEVA, Jan. 27.—The Roumanian Press Bureau at Berne says that all the allied consuls at Odessa have left for Trebizond, Asia Minor, except the United States and Argentine representatives who are remaining to protect the foreign population. The despatch adds that 20,000 members of the Red army well equipped with airplanes, machine guns, and tanks are now stationed within an artillery range of Odessa which it is expected will capitulate at any time. The tanks in the possession of the Bolsheviks were captured from the British.

**INFLUENZA IS STILL SPREADING**  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Influenza continues to spread over the country. The total number of cases reported here is 14,805 and they are not all in Michigan. More than 2,000 new cases have been reported from the state of Michigan.

## ERZBERGER BADLY HURT

Shot Splintered Shoulder and Lodged There; Very Painful.

**GERMAN WORKERS OPPOSE 6-HOUR SHIFT**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

BERLIN, Jan. 28.—An X-Ray examination of the wound suffered by Mathias Erzberger, vice-premier and minister of Finance in the German Government, who was shot by Oltwig von Hirschfeld as he was leaving the criminal courts building, shows that a bullet splintered part of the shoulder where it lodged firmly. The wound is extremely painful it having bled very much and Erzberger is very weak as a result.

Rumors of a monarchist outbreak failed to materialize. Troops remain on guard in the streets.

There has been a conference of representatives of 1,000,000 workers who are opposed to the introduction of a six hour working shift. They say that under present conditions this would be impossible.

## FINNS ADVANCE INTO RUSSIA

Inhabitants of Border Villages Are Fleeing Panic Stricken.

ARCHANGEL, Jan. 28.—A force of 2,000 Finns with machine guns and a long train of horse and reindeer transport which recently concentrated on the Russian frontier near Petchenga, have already crossed the border.

The inhabitants of the frontier villages are fleeing, panic stricken refugees to Norway.

## NEED OF POWER IS DISCUSSED

Committee of Board of Trade Meets Committee of City Council Regarding Increase.

**STEAM OR OIL AS A TEMPORARY EXPEDIENT**

Last evening the Civic Committee of the Board of Trade, consisting of D. G. Stewart, F. G. Dawson and H. F. Pullen, met the Utilities Committee of the City Council to urge upon them the desirability of providing plenty of power, not only for the use of the citizens but for new industries that might be induced to come. E. F. Duby also was present for the purpose of laying before the committee a proposal that the city should supply the Prince Rupert mill with sufficient power for them to operate a planing mill and other improvements which they propose making if they get sufficient power.

Each member of the Board of Trade committee drew the attention of the Utilities Committee to the need of cheap power in large quantities in order to develop a new industrial city. It was the one essential in inducing industries to come.

Mayor McClymont at the request of Chairman Perry canvassed the whole ground. He explained that at the present the Shawatians plant was carrying all the load it could, but as a temporary expedient they were proposing to negotiate with the drydock for power or to put in an auxiliary plant of their own, either Diesel oil or steam, until such time as the power load made it a business proposition to install some larger source of power. The opinion seemed general that eventually the city must look to Khtada.

**Khtada.**

F. G. Dawson strongly urged that steps be taken at once to develop Khtada or some other large source of power as by the time it was available the load would have increased sufficient almost to take care of the bond payments.

The Mayor spoke of the situation at Wark Canal and the general opinion of the committees seemed to be that it would not be wise to undertake the development of so small a power. There had been many suggestions of industrial development on the Skeena River but so far none of these had materialized. It was possible, however, that some of them would in the near future.

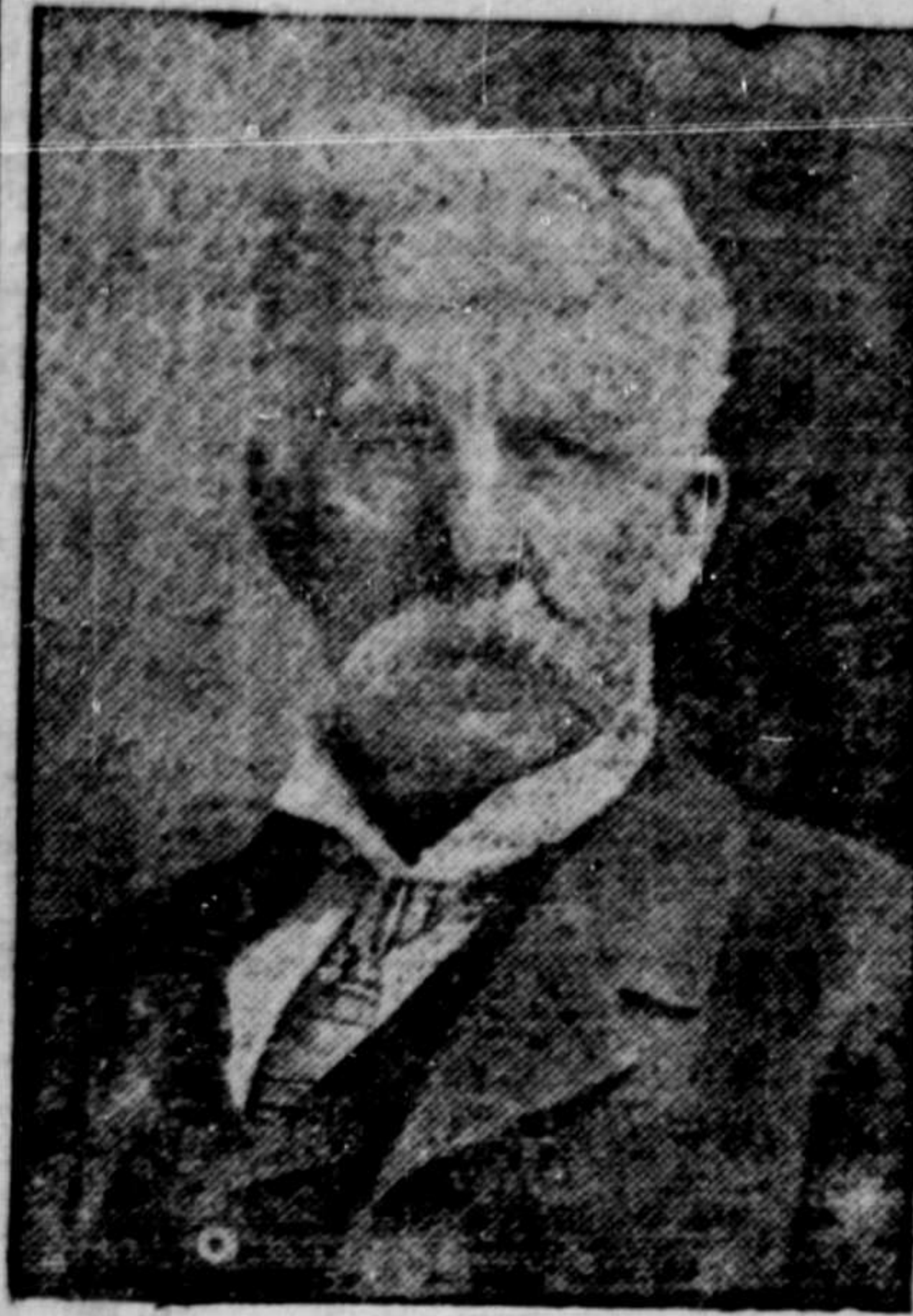
Before the delegation withdrew Chairman Perry explained that the committee had met that evening to discuss the question of power and it was opportune that the Board of Trade committee had been able to meet them on that occasion. They would open negotiations with the drydock people and also secure further data in regard to steam and oil power. The larger question would also be kept to the fore.

The members of the Utilities Committee present were Chairman Perry, Mayor McClymont, Alderman Murray and Superintendent of Utilities T. C. Duncan.

## HUNGARIANS WILL NOT SIGN

Count Apponyi Will Take Refusal to Accept Treaty to Paris.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, Jan. 28.—Count Apponyi, head of the Hungarian Peace delegation, will leave for Paris carrying an absolute refusal to sign the Peace Treaty in its present form, a Vienna dispatch says.

BUDAPEST, Jan. 28.—Count Apponyi declares that the peace terms are impossible to fulfill. It is estimated that the monarchist vote cast in the elections approximated a 95 per cent of the total number of ballots.

## NEUTRALIZE BALTIC SEA

Conference Decides That Course Will be Taken but Details Not Settled.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, Jan. 28.—A Moscow wireless dispatch says it was unanimously decided at a conference of the Baltic States at Helsingfors that they accept the plan for the neutralization of the Baltic Sea. Final details have been postponed for another conference which will include representatives other than the Baltic States not present at the original meeting.

## CONSTITUTIONALITY OF COMMERCE BOARD

Case to be Argued Before the Supreme Court of Canada.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 28.—In the Court of Appeals yesterday the case of the Crescent Creamery Co. vs. the Board of Commerce of Canada was adjourned for further hearing until March 1, when it will again be dealt with if the Court of Appeals has any further power.

The constitutionality of the Board of Commerce to act has been set down for argument before the Supreme Court of Canada and until this is established, the courts of this province will have no power to deal with the case.

## BRITISH CREDIT

Austria Reported to Have Been Loaned 1,000,000,000 Crowns.

VIENNA, Jan. 28.—A British credit for 1,000,000,000 crowns has been negotiated by the Austrian republic for the purchase of raw materials, it is unofficially reported.

## RADICALS REACH CITY OF PETROGRAD

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—The radicals, 249 in number that were recently deported from the United States to Soviet Russia, have reached Petrograd.

## Large Increase in Canada's Trade is Shown by Returns

**Exports \$353,812,931 Higher than Imports for Last Year; Adverse Balance With U.S. Affects Exchange.**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, January 28.—The volume of Canada's trade in the year which ended December 31, 1919, exceeded that of the previous twelve months by approximately \$80,000,000. The imports for 1919 aggregated \$941,007,700, \$31,000,000 more than for the previous year. The exports amounted to \$1,294,920,372 or \$51,000,000 more than 1918. The balance of trade in favor of the Dominion in 1919 was \$353,812,931. In trade with the United States, however, Canada has an adverse balance of \$285,893,931. This determined the exchange rate between the Dominion Government during 1919 was \$168,020,659.

Imports from Great Britain last year totalled \$87,516,819, compared with \$72,879,109 in 1918. Exports to Great Britain reached \$528,035,514, or approximately \$40,000,000 less than in 1918. Canada's imports from the United States in 1919 totalled \$740,580,225, compared with \$741,336,304 in 1918. Exports to the United States aggregated \$454,686,294, against \$433,182,149 in 1918.

The most striking increase in imports in goods was from Cuba, which reached \$12,500,000 compared with two millions in 1918. The increase was due to larger imports of sugar.

## PENSION HIGHER FOR DISABILITY

Expected to Advance Rate From \$720 to \$900 and Upward.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, Jan. 27.—The need of an increase in the total disability pensions to soldiers has been brought to the attention of the authorities in Canada and the probability is that at the coming session of Parliament recommendations will be made for a jacking up of such pensions in Canada.

It is pointed out that in nearly all particulars the Canadian pensions are higher than those in the United States. Prior to December 24 the total disability pensions in the United States ranged from \$300 to \$400 and in Canada they were \$720. The United States raised the total disability pensions, making them range from \$900 to \$1,250 a year, increasing according to the number of dependents.

It is expected that Canada may recommend an approximation of the United States rate.

## JUGO SLAVS WILL ACCEPT ULTIMATUM

BERNE, Jan. 28.—The Jugo-Slav Government has decided to accept the ultimatum of the allies with regard to settlement of the Adriatic controversy. The decision was reached by a small majority after a long session.

## FOOD PRICES MAY GO STILL HIGHER

Potatoes Being Held in Washington State Awaiting Rise.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

CLEVELAND, Jan. 28.—Higher food prices for 1920 were predicted by delegates to the convention of the Cannery Association.

SEATTLE, Jan. 28.—Investigation has disclosed that thousands of tons of potatoes are being held by growers waiting for higher prices.

**Shipbuilding Trial Is Yet to Come.**

It does not seem to be generally understood that there has been no trial of the shipbuilding dispute as yet in the law courts. All that has taken place is a chambers application at which affidavits were submitted and those who made the affidavits were cross-examined to try to prove whether or not the affidavits were correct.

Suit has been entered by Newman Erb to obtain control of the shipyards and drydock and this will be tried in the Supreme Court when witnesses will be examined and documents produced. In the meantime the board of directors that was in control previous to the change, will remain in control. Mr. Manson and Mr. Mullen are both members of that board.

**German Republic Not All Safe Sailing.**

All is not safe sailing in the new republic of Germany. A dispatch of yesterday indicates that the country is still much disturbed politically. As long as the ex-kaiser is so near home there will be intrigue after intrigue to replace him on the throne. Not only are there many enthusiasts who believe in the monarchy as an institution, but there are those who hope to profit by espousing a cause that has the power to grant favors. It will be some years before Germany settles down to a stable government.

**Many Rumors of Developments.**

Many people are investigating the possibility of starting industries in the neighborhood of Prince Rupert. Mention has been made previously of the big mining holdings of the Granby Company up the Ecstall River and of the possibility of a pulp plant being established in the same neighborhood. Several other industries have been mentioned, not forgetting the smelter at Port Edward. All these likely developments up the river along with the need of an outlet for the people of this city, make a road to Port Edward one of the necessities of the day.

A question has arisen as to whether a road to the mouth of the Skeena should follow the route of the railway or go around the Island in the other direction. It is said that there is much level land the other way, that it would be easier to build, and that from a scenic point of view it would be preferable, to the southerly route. That may be all true. Before the road is commenced the both routes should be examined and the best decided on. Perhaps, as has been suggested, there is a better way of crossing to the mainland than at the present bridge near Zenardi Rapids.

**Library Sympathizers Should Express Themselves.**

There are many people in this city who are keen on getting a public library. This is the time to make their influence felt. We suggest that they get together and urge on the mayor and council the necessity of providing this very necessary institution. This is the time when policies are being formulated and, we take it, the council is glad to have the help of citizens in deciding what things are most necessary.

A citizen discussing the question within the past few days, told of the difference it made to Dawson when the library was established. "It changed the whole tone of the place," was the way he expressed it.

It is stated that Russell will carry credentials from 56 out of 64 football clubs in British Columbia.

The decision to send him east was made at a meeting of the B. C. Football Association yesterday afternoon. Con Jones also intends to leave on Saturday.

**1919 HEALTH REPORT**  
**SHOWS "FLU" EFFECT**

Great Increase of Deaths Generally in Province—Increase of Births in Prince Rupert.

The twenty-third report of the Provincial Board of Health has just been received. The deaths in this city from July, 1918, to June, 1919, numbered 132 as against 53 for the year preceding. This period included the time of the influenza epidemic and the increase of deaths was general all over the province. The total deaths for the province in that period was 6,696, as against 3,882 for the year preceding. Only six localities in the province showed a decrease, these being Nakusp, Tete Jaune Cache, Clayoquot, Fort St. John, Slocan City and Telegraph Creek.

The total births in Prince Rupert for the same period was 120 which showed an increase of nearly 40 over the year preceding. The total births for the entire province in the year were 6,969.

STOCKHOLM, January 28.—As a retaliatory measure Swedish employers will begin a lockout immediately if the labor unions decide to continue the strike in this country.

**Synopsis of  
 Land Act Amendments**

**PRE-EMPTIONS**  
 Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.  
 Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.  
 Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-irrigated.  
 Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.  
 Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.  
 At least 2 years' occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause be granted interim certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.  
 Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided application is made prior to expiration of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture.  
 Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.  
 Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.  
 Surveyed areas not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.  
 For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.  
 Mill, factory or industrial sites of at least 2 acres may be leased for 99 years. If not purchased, conditions include payment of stumpage.  
 Natural hay meadows inaccessibility by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS**  
 The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or assigns of deceased pre-emptors may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, to the present time. This privilege is also made retroactive.  
 No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by holders on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918.  
 Taxes are remitted for five years after the date of pre-emption, on acreage, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.  
 Interest on agreements to purchase direct or indirect, remitted from settlement to March 31, 1920.

**SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.**  
 Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase owing to forfeiture, on fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes are distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

**GRAZING.**  
 Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provided for grazing districts and range administration under Commission. Annual grazing permits issued on established numbers raised; priority for purchase of land held by stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers up to ten head.
