General Yudenitch Arrested Running off with Army Funds

Opposition to Bolshevik Near Irkutsk Seems to Have Disappeared; Polish Troops Pursue Soviet Army in Eastern Siberia.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 LONDON, January 30.—Reports have been received from Reval that General Nicholas Yudenitch, commander of the Russian Northwest army, which was badly broken last fall during an unsuccessful drive for Petrograd, has been placed under arrest by order of General Balakovitch, a Finnish officer, who commands a street in Petrograd.
 Stockholm, Jan. 30.—An Esthonia telegraph agency reports that General Yudenitch, who contemplated leaving with a large sum of money belonging to the northwest army, was arrested by order of the Army Procurator.
 LONDON, Jan. 30.—Difficulties of supply have probably stopped the advance of Bolshevik troops west of Irkutsk. The resistance to the Soviet army seems to have disappeared.
 WARSAW, Jan. 30.—Polish troops continue in pursuit of the Bolshevik troops in Eastern Siberia. The peasants have revolted and occupied the goldfields and fortified districts.

FLU IN EUROPE AND IN STATES

Washington Report says Disease is Taking Mild Form—Deaths at Rome.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Influenza is generally increasing throughout the country, announced the United States Public Health Service. Reports indicate that the disease is taking a mild form.
 ROME, Jan. 30.—Deaths from influenza in Rome on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday aggregated 122.
 MONTEVIDEO, Jan. 30.—Sixty cases of influenza have been reported aboard the Spanish steamer Reina Victoria Eugenia from Barcelona. The passengers, numbering 1,000, were disembarked at Quarantine Island.

Association and Grocers Charged

Are Alleged to be Offenders under Combines and Fair Prices Act; Board of Commerce Offers to Prosecute.

 OTTAWA, January 30.—Mr. Roebuck, representing the Attorney-General of Ontario, appeared before Commissioner Murdock and made application that the Board of Commerce charge the Wholesale Grocers' Association of Canada and certain wholesale and retail grocers not yet named, as offenders against the Combines and Fair Prices Act.
 Roebuck was informed by Commissioner Murdock, acting Chief Commission O'Connor concurring, that the board would charge and try, not only the association named, but also all other persons and corporations, which the Attorney-General or his agent might name.
 Formal charges will be formulated by the board.

DOES NOT LIKE THE BRITISH ZION POLICY

Vatican Enters Protest Regarding Palestine Reoccupation.

 ROME, Jan. 30.—The Vatican has entered a protest against the pro-Zionist policy of Great Britain in Palestine. The movement to establish the Jews in Palestine has been steadily gaining ground of late.

THE BOARD OF COMMERCE GETS PAPER CONTROL

Action of Paper Mills Makes it Necessary to Have All Orders Carried Out.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 OTTAWA, Jan. R. W. Breadner, who temporarily succeeded R. A. Pringle, K. C., as paper controller, has resigned and his resignation has been accepted. The whole question of paper control has been placed with the Board of Commerce.
 The Government has determined that, owing to the recalcitrant mills having given so much trouble in connection with the supplying of newsprint, the control should be placed in the hands of a body having the greatest possible powers to see that its orders are carried out.

EDITORS SHOULD SEE THE NORTH

This is Opinion of Mayor and Minister of Lands and Has Been Acted Upon.

BRITISH JOURNALISTS MAY SEE THIS COUNTRY

The following letter has been received from Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, by the mayor regarding the proposed visit of British editors to Canada next summer:
 "Mr. Crandall, of the Montreal Star, and other newspaper gentlemen waited on the government recently to request its assistance towards looking after a large party of British editors who contemplate visiting Canada in July and August. It is understood that this will be the most important journalistic party that ever visited Canada. My information is that they will be in British Columbia from the 16th to the 22nd of August.
 "I brought up the question of their stay in British Columbia with a view to ascertaining whether or not they would visit the north. Mr. Crandall stated that they might not have time but stated that the entire arrangements were in the hands of the committee in charge for B. C. The other members of the government agreed with me that the visit of the party would be far from complete unless they made the trip to the north country.
 Interest Citizens.
 "I am writing in order that you may interest the citizens of the north and that you may take up the question with the committee in charge with a view to having the party go north by the G. T. P. boat and over the G. T. P. east. As contemplated at present, I believe, they propose to run a special train over the Canadian National and the C. P. R. railways. It would probably necessitate, when they come to Vancouver, having their train sent around to meet them at Prince Rupert and personally, I think that should be done because the party cannot possibly have an adequate idea of B. C. merely by visiting Vancouver and Victoria.
 "Mr. John Nelson, of the Vancouver 'World', and Mr. F. J. Bird, of the Vancouver 'Province', are at the head of the committee in charge for B. C. I think you should get in touch with them at once and, if necessary, thereafter, you should send someone down in an endeavor to make arrangements that the party go north.

Trans-Atlantic Service By Airship Planned by British Flying Combine

 LONDON, January 30.—Four of the largest aviation firms in England are negotiating with regard to a combine with the eventual purpose of the development of a trans-Atlantic service. The combine embraces all the air ships which the Government does not require for the army and navy.
 Experiments have been arranged for early spring, when a short trip will be attempted, after which an endeavor will be made to put into effect a bi-weekly service to New York, the trip taking 60 hours.

FRANCE AND VATICAN

Country Said to be Against the Resumption of Diplomatic Relations.

PARIS, Jan. 29.—All the country is opposed to a resumption of diplomatic relations with France with the Vatican. Opinions are freely expressed and there is no doubt of the feeling that exists.

MURDERER IS ELECTROCUTED

Gordon Fawcett Hamby Retains Ironic Composure to the Last.

OSINGTON, N. Y., Jan. 30.—Gordon Fawcett Hamby, murderer, bank robber and train bandit, whose crime record reaches from coast to coast, and culminated in the murder of two Brooklyn bank employees in December, 1918, was electrocuted yesterday in Sing Sing Prison.
 Hamby maintained to the last the ironic composure, which marked his demeanor from the hour of his arrest in Tacoma, Wash., last June.

WOMEN WAITED ON COMMISSION

Auxiliary of Central Labor Council Will Take up Minimum Wages, Jail Accommodation and Weights.

A delegation consisting of Mesdames Booth, Iverson and Hammond from the Women's Auxiliary of the Central Labor Council, O.B.U., met the police commission at a special meeting held in the mayor's office yesterday. The minimum wage law, jail conditions in the city and weights of the head were taken up.
 Mrs. Booth acted as spokesman for the delegation and wanted to show if the minimum wage laws for female help were being enforced. If not they wished to know why not and if so how enforcement was ensured. H. S. Wallace Co. and the Bank of Montreal were both called up during the meeting by Mayor McClymont, and he was assured that the act was being lived up to in both places. The matter of Harry Hanson's advertisement for a girl to answer phone calls offering \$1 a day was referred to and it was the opinion that this would be contrary to the Minimum Wage Law. At the suggestion of Commissioner Myhill-Jones it was decided that some form of notice will be put in the local papers notifying employers that clause 13 of the Minimum Wage Act will be enforced strictly here. Also J. D. McNiven, the chairman of the Minimum Wage Board, is to be communicated with to obtain information on future action. Any specific cases of the violation of the Act that come to the information of the Police will be strictly prosecuted.
 Jail Accommodation.
 In the matter of jail accommodation for women in the city jail it had been reported that conditions were disgraceful. The chief was called and he reported that last year only two women had spent an entire night in jail although 39 had passed through. Although arrangements had been made for the housing of women prisoners at the Salvation Army barracks the Army had, of late, seemed reluctant in giving this accommodation. The mayor explained that there was a delegation in Victoria at the present time urging the need of provincial buildings in this city and probably a proper jail would be one of the matters taken up by this delegation.
 The delegation also asked if the law in regard to weight requirements for coal and bread were being lived up to. They were informed by the chief that the law in this matter was being enforced and tests were made at frequent intervals. Reports were made at each meeting of the police commission and were reported by the local newspapers whose representatives attended the meetings.

STEVENS AGAIN TALKED OF FOR CABINET POST

Generally Felt that B. C. Will Not, However, Get Three Ministers.

 OTTAWA, Jan. 30.—The arrival of H. H. Stevens, member in the House of Commons for Vancouver Centre, has raised the rumor here that the new head for the Department of Public Works has been found. Mr. Stevens, for the past year or so, has been placed among the possibilities for cabinet positions and it was expected that upon the retirement of Martin Burrell that he would be appointed to succeed. Instead of being retired, Burrell has recently been transferred to the Ministry of Customs and British Columbia could scarcely be entitled to three ministers, as Dr. Tolmie, of Victoria, is Minister of Agriculture.
 There has been talk of the creation of a Minister of Taxation which could support the collection of the taxation revenue and might—conceivably—do away with the Minister of Customs.

OLIER BESNER QUIETLY WEDS

Bride is Mrs. Rossina Roberge; Left for South on Prince George for Honeymoon.

The marriage of Olier Besner and Mrs. Rossina Roberge took place quietly last evening, Rev. Father McGraw officiating. The witnesses of the ceremony were Joseph Rosseau and Winnifred Gratton, the marriage being strictly private. Last night Mr. and Mrs. Besner left by the Prince George to spend their honeymoon in the south.
 Both Mr. and Mrs. Besner are well known and popular old timers of Prince Rupert and the congratulations of their host of friends will be expressed. Mr. Besner has conducted the New Knox Hotel here for many years and is known all over British Columbia and the Yukon. Before her marriage Mrs. Roberge was with the H. S. Wallace department store and has also lived here for many years.

Jail Accommodation For Detained Women.

The activity of the Women's Auxiliary of the Central Labor Council in regard to jail accommodation for women deserves all praise. There is no proper accommodation here, and the suggestion that its provision is a matter for the provincial authorities is also wide of the mark. It is not the duty of the provincial authorities to provide a lockup for the city, although it is perhaps their duty to provide for those offering outside the city. At Victoria the provincial jail, a very costly and extensive establishment erected by the late government, was closed soon after the present government came into power, in order to save expense, and the city lockup is used there by the provincial authorities, the Government paying for the accommodation in each case.

There is great need here for a temporary lockup for female prisoners, and it is the duty of the city to provide it.

Visiting Editors Should See District.

Mention was made recently of the desirability of having the visiting editors come this way and see something of this part of the country. It now develops that the member for the district, Hon. T. D. Pattullo, has been busy in the interests of the place and he asks for co-operation here, which co-operation he is already receiving.

Naturally there is a tendency of the people of the southern part of the province to think that they are the whole show. They have already been informed, however that such is not the case. It might be well to bring even further pressure to bear to induce the visitors to come this way. It is very important that they see this district and that we get all the advertising that is coming to us. Such advertising cannot be purchased. It is invaluable.

Will Come to Trial Very Soon.

The Erb-Mullen case, involving a dispute over the control of the shipbuilding plant and drydock at this place, seems likely to come to trial in five or six weeks' time. It cannot be allowed to drag on long, for meanwhile the work is suffering. It must be impossible to carry on with good effect until the matter has been cleared up.

Naturally the sympathy of most people will go to the local board. While the matter is before the courts, it is impossible to make any comment further than to say that judging from the facts brought out at the chambers hearing, Mr. Erb did not live up to his agreements. He put practically no money into the concern but he expected to take handsome profits out. It was an example of high finance to which we are not accustomed. When the facts and figures were made public it took away the breath of the people here. It was astounding. That a man should be able to come here from New York, get fifty-one per cent of the interest in the local shipbuilding industry for practically nothing and then try to oust the man who organized the concern was beyond the understanding of the lay mind. Perhaps there will be other information come to light at the trial that will modify this opinion, but the sworn information modified by cross examination before Judge Murphy is certainly enlightening. There are many phases of this case that it is difficult to understand. In the meantime all we have to do is to wait for further information. It must occur to many, however, the people of Canada, who are financing this big work, should have some say as to its conduct.

FRENCH FLYERS' UNION FORMED

Minimum Wage, Employment Agency, Accident Fund and Insurance to be Worked Out.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

PARIS, Jan. 30.—The aviators of France have formed a union and decided upon minimum salaries for flyers. They have also adopted a standard form of contract for membership. Second Lieutenant Marchal, who flew across Germany and dropped proclamations on Berlin, has been elected president of the new union. The union will open an employment agency, adopt an accident fund and will make a study of insurance for its members.

Sport Briefs

The Dry Dock and Sons of England Basket Ball teams meet tonight in the tenth scheduled game of the City Senior League. At the present time the Dockers remain well in the lead of the league with a record of four victories and no defeats. The main interest in the race now seems to rest between the Travellers and the Sons of Canada, who are tied with a 2-2 standing, for second place. Should the Sons of England by any chance defeat the Dry Dock aggregation tonight either of these two energetic teams would then have a good chance to get to the top of the league. Much interest is already manifested in the outcome of the game between the Sons of Canada and the Dry Dock on February 6. The mainstay of the Dock teams seems to be Clementson as he has done more than 90 per cent of the scoring this season. For team work it would be hard to judge between the three leading teams and it is the clever work of the star shooter that has contributed largely to maintaining the shipbuilders in the big lead.

Frank Patrick, president of the Pacific Coast Hockey Association, has published an open letter in the Vancouver Sun of January 26 answering the common talk in sport circles that the Pacific Coast Hockey games are "fixed." This talk has become exceedingly common of late and the explanation of the president is very convincing and should put at rest any doubts in the public mind as to the squareness of the games. Patrick challenges any person who pretends to be in possession of information that the games are "fixed" to demand a government investigation, not only to cover the present season but any other season. One of his chief defenses against the "fixed" talk is that players would not take the bumps and knocks they get if the games were arranged beforehand. He states that the whole desire of the Association is to produce the best hockey in the world and maintain a high standard in the quality and fairness of the games.

The fact that there is some division in British Columbia football circles which has come to light over the proposed arrangements to bring two old country football teams to Vancouver and British Columbia in the coming summer. The charter members of the British Columbia Football Association are backing up Con Jones in his trip to the old country on which he leaves tomorrow. It is believed by many that he will also be supported by the Dominion Football Association, which he will meet in Toronto on February 7. However, the new B. C. F. A., which has been recently organized, is opposing Jones having not been able to agree with the charter members on the dates of the games. They are sending Jack Russell east as a special delegate to upset the plans of Con Jones if possible.

Many football men who are in a position of authority seem to favor Jones and resent the action of the new association. Con Jones has done a lot for sport in this province. His long suite being lacrosse which he practically put on its feet in Vancouver. He has always backed up sport and his present scheme to place all the profits coming from the Old Country teams' visit to the support of sport in the schools is very worthy. Jones has also on foot plans for the formation of a new football league consisting

of teams from Vancouver, Nanaimo and Cumberland this summer. In the past great interest has been taken in football competition between island and mainland teams and it is his desire to revive this interest.

ADVISE DRINKERS TO GO EASY IN EFFORT TO FORCE PRICE DOWN

Excessive Price for Wines Prevails in France—Increase Over 1000 per cent. Since War.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

PARIS, Jan. 30.—French newspapers have been poking much fun at Canada and United States for the rigid enforcement of prohibition measures but some of them are now advocating temporary temperance to bring down the excessive prices demanded for wines.

Wine which before the war varied in price between 10 and 15 francs per hundred litres now hovers between 100 and 120 francs. This is the price paid to the vineyards.

OPPOSE DAYLIGHT SAVING THIS YEAR

HALIFAX, Jan. 30.—The Nova Scotia farmers are unanimously opposed to the re-enactment of the daylight saving scheme and are protesting against the railways advancing their clocks.
