United States Is Responsible For Currency Trouble

That is Opinion of British Bankers, who Ask That Country to Ease up and Help European Countries Along.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

PARIS, January 31.—That speculation is not responsible for the depreciation in the franc and the pound sterling toward the dollar is the consensus of opinion of British and French bankers obtained in financial circles in Paris. Hard work, economy, restrictions on imports, increased production and additional taxation are remedies unanimously prescribed by financial men here. The British bankers say however that willingly or unwillingly or merely by the fact of circumstances, the United States is responsible for depreciation of the currency on the European Continent.

"We had forecasted that the pound would go down to \$3.50 or perhaps to \$3," said Evelyn Toulmin, director of Lloyd's Bank Association, today. "We were partially prepared for the emergency but it would be a great advantage to us if the United States would ease up and help us along for a little while. Great Britain owes that country £800,000,000. We will pay that sooner perhaps than seems to be the general impression. France owes the United States \$500,000,000. The present situation will obtain as long as Europeans are not brought to a realization that Europe must supply its own needs. Then only will the exchange problems in Europe be settled.

"The period to be bridged may extend for four or perhaps five years. It is during that time that we shall need American assistance. Hard work and economy are the only remedies. There is no short cut."

LONDON, Jan. 31.—Thursday's further fall in the value of sterling exchange in New York has intensified anxiety over the exchange situation and focussed attention on the conference to be held between the Chancellor of the exchequer and the bankers early next week.

GET AFTER ALL PROFITEERS

Board of Commerce Gets Busy and Will Punish Wrong-Doers.

OTTAWA, Jan. 31.—The Board of Commerce has issued a set of regulations which have reference to the formation and operation of a commission as defined in the Combines and Fair Prices Act.

The regulations constitute a "drag in which all existing and proposed combines, as defined by the Combines and Fair Prices Act are proposed to be drawn and as the board may have opportunity, they will be examined good and defensible selected from the bad and those seeming to call for dissolution or punishment proceeded against."

DEFENSE OF REALM ACT IS ILLEGAL

So Decides English Court of Appeal in Regard to Right of Ejectment.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, January 31.—Three judges of the Appeal Court decided today that the provisions of the "Defence of the Realm Act," giving immunity to munition workers in certain areas against ejectment from their homes, constitutes a violation of the Magna Charta. The decision has created much interest among lawyers.

The lower court had held that the owner of a house occupied by munition workers was debarred from recovering his property by the Defence of the Realm Act regulations. The Court of Appeals in reversing this decision declared that the provision of the Act was a "grave invasion of citizens' rights, rendering the seeker after justice liable to imprisonment."

FINE ARTS BUILDING SWEEPED BY FIRE AT NEW YORK YESTERDAY

NEW YORK, January 31.—Art treasures valued at \$750,000 were destroyed by a fire which swept through the annex of the American Fine Arts Building yesterday. While the fire was raging 1400 students, including 200 young women, marched in safety from neighboring buildings.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS TAKE UP QUESTION SWISS NEUTRALITY

BERNE, Jan. 31.—Switzerland is anxious that the League of Nations may take up the question of Swiss neutrality in the near future.

TROOPS REVOLTED AT VLADIVOSTOK

VLADIVOSTOK, January 31.—Three hundred government troops revolted here yesterday. They arrested their officers and refused to take orders from the Government authorities. The men were forced to surrender this morning.

\$2,000 FOR NEW NURSES' HOME

Judge Young Hands Check to the Hospital Board on Behalf of Red Cross.

ERECTION OF NEW BUILDING IS URGED

At the annual meeting of the Hospital Association last night Judge Young, on behalf of the Red Cross Society, handed a marked check for \$2,000 to the president of the Hospital Board to be used as a nucleus to the fund for the erection of a nurses' home.

In presenting the check the Judge said that all were agreed as to the necessity of the home. The Red Cross executive was unanimous as to the need. The erection of a building has been too long delayed. He read the resolution of the Red Cross Society which was moved by Mrs. R. L. McIntosh, seconded by Mrs. F. G. Dawson and signed by the secretary, Mrs. N. E. Woodland. It provides that the money be used exclusively towards the erection of the home, and that out of the sum mentioned a sufficient amount be retained to suitably furnish the nurses' living room in such home.

Judge Young said he understood that they already had a suitable site, the title of which is in the hospital. The object was a worthy one and the public of Prince Rupert and district was generous.

The society had also decided to present the library to the hospital for the use of convalescents. They could have both the 150 books and the shelving, the condition being that they be removed from the hut immediately.

On the motion of W. E. Williams the generous gifts were accepted by the Board with thanks and the secretary directed to open a special account for the fund for the new home.

NEW BRITISH TERRITORIALS

Churchill Outlines Scheme for Organization of Volunteer Force.

LONDON, Jan. 31.—Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary of state for war, in outlining the reconstruction of the territorial forces, said they would be organized as a territorial army comprising fourteen divisions, approximating as closely as possible the regular army division make-up.

Churchill declared the territorial forces would not be sent to foreign war theatres unless they volunteered for this service and unless Parliament endorsed it and the reserves had been called up.

WAR VIOLATORS LIST COMPLETE

More than 800 Names are to be Handed to Germany and no Revision Allowed.

PARIS, Jan. 31.—The list of German war violators has been completed by the Allied countries. It contains more than 800 names of those who transgressed all the rules of international warfare.

It is understood that the final list will be handed in to Germany on February 10 and that it will not be revised.

ACTION OVER BUILDING DOCK TO BE HEARD

Grant Smith & Co. & McDonnell Suing Government for Over Quarter of Million Dollars.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, January 31.—Action against the Government concerning the payment for excavation of 28,276 cubic yards of earth and 31,100 cubic yards of rock, the amount in each case respectively being \$44,703 and \$292,110, will be heard in the Exchequer Court on February 4.

The action is that of Grant Smith & Co. & McDonnell, Ltd., of Vancouver for work done in connection with the building of two big concrete wharves at Victoria on a contract signed March 9, 1914.

The dispute is as to what percentage of excavation work should be paid for rock rates, and the company claims that they had to blast to the extent for which they claim for rock excavation. They were being paid 52c per cubic yard for earth and \$9.10 for rock.

MRS. DAN MARTIN IN STREET ACCIDENT

Sustained Very Severe Injuries at Vancouver and is at the Hospital.

Word has been received privately in this city of the very serious injuries sustained by Mrs. Dan Martin, a resident of Prince Rupert some six years ago, in a street accident in Vancouver. Mrs. Martin was leaving her home on 24th Avenue, East, last Friday afternoon and while hurrying to catch a street car was run down by a large motor truck. The injuries were very serious as her nose and both jaws were broken, and she received serious injuries about the head. Besides this, she sustained a compound fracture of the leg below the knee. She was immediately rushed, unconscious, to the hospital where she has received no visitors.

Mrs. Martin had a host of friends in this city who will much regret to hear of the painful accident. Since leaving Prince Rupert she has lived at Anxox, more recently moving to Vancouver. Her husband, Dan Martin, was connected with the city water-works department.

CELESTIAL EMPIRE IN HAD ENGINE TROUBLE

Big New England Trawler Calls for Repairs Below Deck; Gone Today.

The big New England Fisheries trawler Celestial Empire came into Prince Rupert yesterday afternoon with engine trouble. After unloading 5,000 pounds of halibut which had been caught while coming north from Vancouver, the vessel had repairs made and left for the banks at noon today.

The Celestial Empire will fish on the banks adjacent at the Queen Charlotte Islands but as she works out of Vancouver her catches will be taken there.

MILLIONS SPENT ON EX-SOLDIERS WHO ARE OUT OF WORK

OTTAWA, Jan. 31.—In the neighborhood of a million dollars has been paid to ex-soldiers out of work from the employment appropriation. To the first week of January there had been 17,000 applicants who benefited to the extent of nearly \$600,000. A. E. Rose, C.B., who has charge of the administration of the fund, said it was certain the total to be spent would not be more than \$3,000,000.

No Agreement by Senate Committee Regarding the German Treaty of Peace

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—The treaty compromise is referred back to the Senate without report as the bi-partisan conference failed to reach any decision. There is no indication what action will be taken in regard to it.

The question of food relief for Europe is an important subject before the ways and means committee of Congress. In some of the European countries food is very scarce and dear and the people are badly in need of help.

NEW DIRECTORS FOR HOSPITAL

Five Chosen at Annual Meeting of Hospital Association Last Night.

At the annual meeting of the Prince Rupert Hospital Association in the City Hall last night Judge Young was elected honorary president and five directors were chosen, D. G. Stewart, W. E. Williams, J. B. Roerig, D. C. McTae, and J. C. McLennan. Other directors will be appointed by the Provincial Government, the City Council and the Ladies' Auxiliary. D. C. Stuart was chosen auditor. Reports were read from the directors, the matron, and the Ladies' Auxiliary and the financial report showed a debt of \$5,000 and many expenditures needed. Votes of thanks were passed to the Ladies' Auxiliary, Daughters of the Empire, and other organizations that had helped the hospital during the year. The Ladies' Auxiliary had raised \$1,342 which had been spent on new linen and other necessities, while the I. O. D. E. had equipped a much-needed nursery.

LARGE NUMBER OF IMMIGRANTS

Increase in 1919 Over Previous Year Numbered 67,393.

OTTAWA, Jan. 31.—Immigration to Canada for the calendar year 1919 totalled 117,633, an increase of 67,393 over 1918. Of these 57,251 were from the British Isles, principally soldiers' dependents, and 52,064 from the United States. In 1918 the totals were: British Isles, 4,484; United States, 40,194.

Immigrants from the United States brought with them cash and effects amounting to \$18,419,406, compared with \$7,351,047 in 1918.

Immigrants who took up residence in Canada last year in British Columbia numbered 3,601. British settlers last year in British Columbia numbered 8,346.

About 100 persons were in attendance at the whist drive and dance given by the Sons of England for members and friends in the K. P. Hall last evening. The party was arranged by the S. O. Mrs. J. Vierick won the first ladies' prize. S. M. Newton and W. Hughes tied for the gentlemen's prize and on the cut of the cards it was awarded to the latter. Consolation prizes went to Mrs. Will Edmunds and John Myhill-Jones. Music was provided by the Empress Orchestra.

DENTAL CLINIC BIG ADVANTAGE TO COMMUNITY

Dr. A. H. Bayne, Addressing St. Andrew's Society Gives Facts and Figures.

GREAT BENEFIT TO WELFARE OF CHILDREN

The address given by Dr. A. H. Bayne to the St. Andrew's Society last night on Free Dental Clinics for School Children was much appreciated by the members and a fuller insight into the workings of such an institution was furnished by the doctor. Dr. Bayne states that he would be willing to give half a day per week to the work and if this was done by the three dentists in this city it would mean 1 1/2 days per week which he considers ample for the 700 school children in attendance at the city schools. In Vancouver, where there are 10,000 children attending school, ten days a week are given.

"The health of any community is its greatest asset," said Dr. Bayne, in the course of his address last night, "and the mouth is the portal of the human system. A neglected, unclean and unhealthy mouth precludes the possibility of a healthy individual. The unfortunate train of results that are caused by a broken down and diseased set of teeth are too well known to all intelligent people to need elaboration, but, a well known fact gains force by repetition. Decayed teeth not only interfere directly with the process of nutrition but they favor the propagation of disease germs so that the child whose vital resistance is already lowered, if not entirely broken down, falls an easy prey to disease.

Advantages Evident.

"The solution is a free dental clinic. It may sound a big proposition but when the city does this—as do it, it must—it will be one of the greatest advances in the matter of public health ever made by the community. In view

PRICES HIGH UNTIL PRODUCTION GREATER

So Declares Reginald McKenna When Government Asked to Bring Down Cost.

LONDON, Jan. 30.—Reginald McKenna declares that lower prices will not obtain until production is increased. Any sudden deflection would be disastrous to trade. The buying capacity of the British public has been doubled since 1918. The country must reduce expenditures to a figure lower than tax revenues.

The declaration was in answer to the miners who asked that prices be reduced by the Government.

ASK REFERENDUM ON PROHIBITION

Dental Clinics

Matter of Health.

We desire to draw special attention to the report of the address on Free Dental Clinics delivered before the St. Andrew's Society at its meeting last night. The idea of the doctor is that there should be systematic examination of the teeth of the school children with a view to better attention being given them. It is not really the doctor's idea. It is the idea of every educationist that is up to date. It is a step in the evolution of morality, where a stage is reached where it is declared that the child is more important than money, whether it be the child of the rich or the child of the poor.

Editors Should Surely Visit Prince Rupert.

Prince Rupert will have to be on her best behavior when the British journalists visit the city next summer. The thing just now, however, is to make sure that they come. The Provincial Government has gone on record as desirous that they should visit, what they style "the north." The mayor and other organizations are doing their part. If anyone else has a suggestion that will help, this is the time to speak, for the arrangements are now being made, and once made, it is to be presumed they will not be changed. It will be useless to come out with a tirade of abuse when through carelessness the harm has been done. We might urge all our northern members to get very busy in connection with the matter, although doubtless they are already on the job. The letter to the mayor in regard to it was from our own representative, but there are also Messrs. Manson, Mobley and Ross who may help and Colonel Peck may also be able to add his urge.

Few Business Failures in Year.

There were few business failures either in Canada or the United States during last year. It is easy to do business on a rising market. In Canada there were only 755 commercial defaults, the smallest since 1881. Of the failures 213 were manufacturers and 494 traders, while the remainder were chiefly agents and brokers.

In the United States the number of failures was only 6,451, which is less than half of one per cent of all those doing business. In 1915 almost one and a half per cent of the businesses of that country failed, and these bad years will come again.

Publicity is Desirable.

The Victoria Trades and Labor Council has decided that it will admit reporters to all their meetings unless the matters to be discussed are of a specially private nature. They say that they get better results by admitting the regular newspaper reporters than by handing out reports through officers of the Council.

Reporters, being human, often make mistakes. As they almost always are working against time, they cannot always be as accurate as they would like to be. Yet the one requirement that every editor demands is accuracy. It is the essential of all journalism. Considering the difficulties under which the newspapermen work the wonder is that they do not make more mistakes. The average newspaper article is correct, and readers know it is probably correct or they would not read it with such avidity.

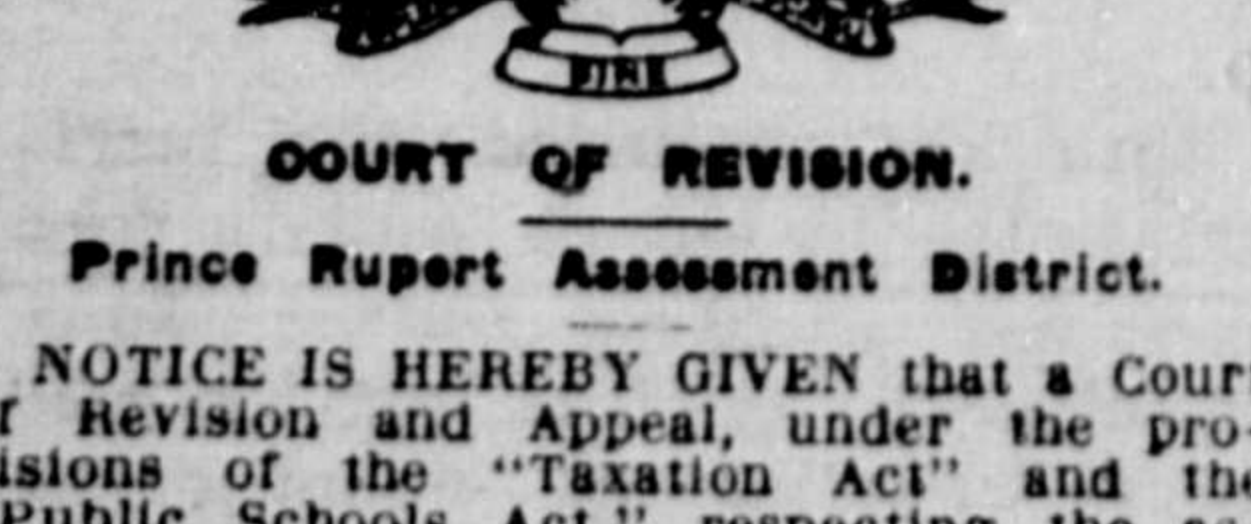

DENTAL CLINIC BIG ADVANTAGE TO COMMUNITY

(Continued from Page One.)

of the fact that in those schools where free dental clinics have been in operation a scholarship has improved, the health rate benefited, spread of epidemic diseases reduced, absence from school diminished and the percentage of "hold-overs" due to failure of promotion also considerably lowered, it would seem that the economic value of the free dental clinic is self evident.

"The atmosphere in the classroom where all the children have received systematic dental treatment and oral prophylaxis is much purer and freer from mal-odor than the air in adjoining rooms where they have not had the same beneficent treatment. A clean mouth and a good looking, well-cared for set of teeth must necessarily generate a sense of self respect in the minds of the children who will carry on the activities of our city in the near future.

Successful Where Tried.

"All the world now realizes that prevention is more important and more economical than cure. The evil influence of the ravages of decay cannot be remedied or cured in the last analysis but they can be prevented. Ultimately free dental clinics will be established in the city. Why not now? The city of Bridgeport, Conn., has just reported that the result of five years' work showed that, first, the cost of educating the children in the year 1913 amounted to 42% of the budget and in the year following this was reduced to 17%, a saving of over 59%. Secondly, the decay in 15,000 children was reduced 33 1-3%. Thirdly, the number of children failing to pass in their examinations for promotion was reduced in some grades as much as 50%. Fourthly, the death rate from diphtheria, scarlet fever and measles was reduced over 70%. Fifthly, during the influenza epidemic the death rate was lower than any other city of the same size in the United States.

Caused by Teeth.

"The medical and dental professions have conclusively proved that many serious systematic diseases are directly caused by diseased teeth and gums. Records from the Toronto Public School show that over 95% of the teeth are in a condition which is a positive menace to the health and mental activities of the children and reports made from other clinics prove conclusively that the same condition exists in every public school. The fact that so large a percentage of school

children have defective teeth is proof that the problem is a most serious one, and one that must be taken from a public standpoint for the future safety of our citizens.

Is Public Duty.

"The problem is too gigantic for the dental profession to handle privately. Exactly similar to educating the great mass of pupils, it is distinctly a public health and educational problem and can only be taken care of by the municipality. The comparison of entire classes of children who have received dental service in the school clinic is simply astounding. The notably remarked improvement in mentality, improved appetite, absence of pallor, attendance, efficiency and attentiveness in the grades that have received dental treatment over a period of a year or more are matters of highly satisfactory records.

"Rendering free dental service to the school children is no more pauperizing to the parents than that of giving them free education. Each child is as much entitled to every possible health activity in its behalf as it is to an education."

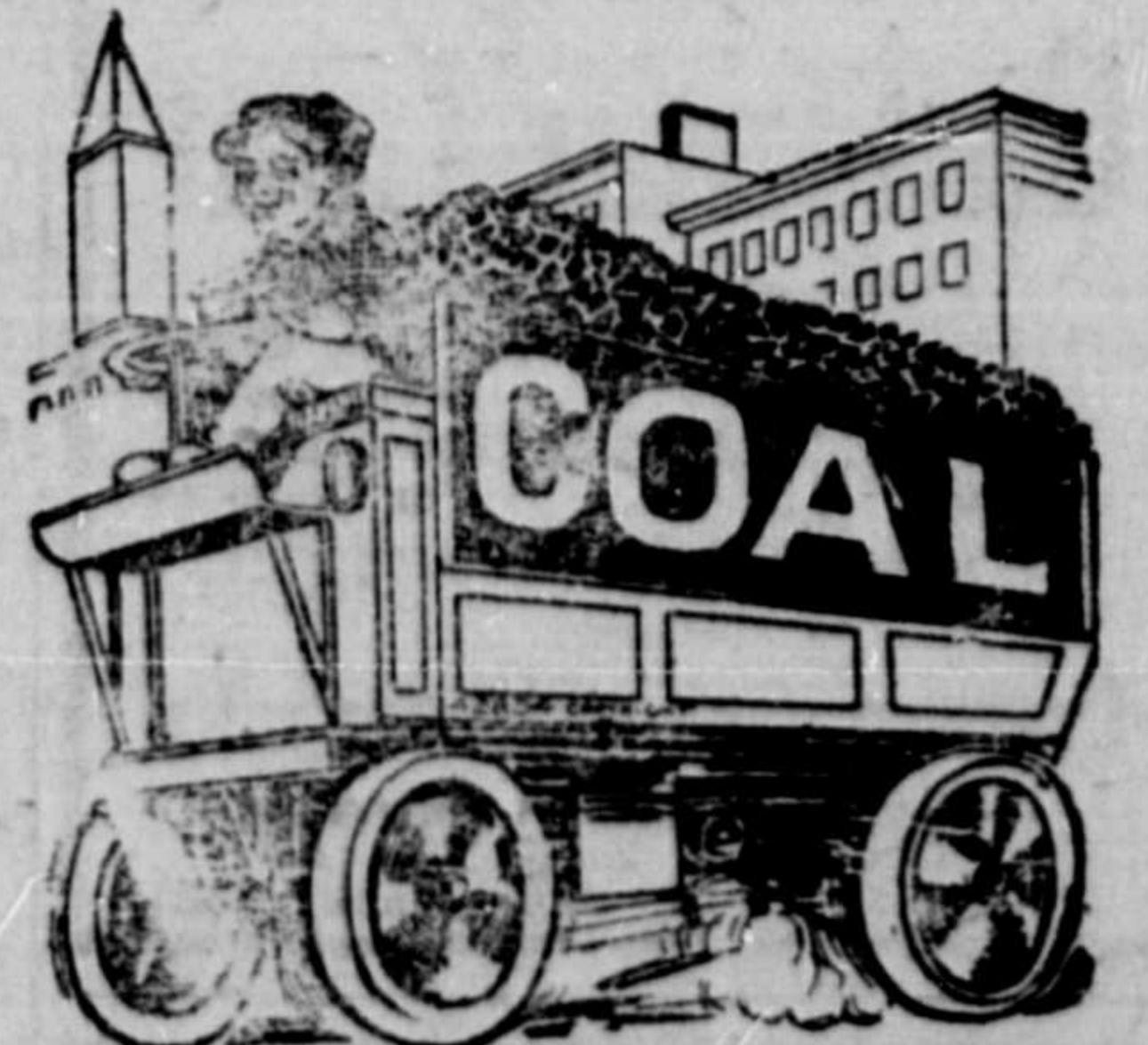

He also holds the world's scoring record for which he received a medal in 1907 from the old country football union. Holding also a champion sprinter's record, Vancouver sportsmen think that he should be of invaluable assistance to the budding athletes of that city if his services can be obtained.

Bobby McLean, the champion skater of the world, is now on his way to Christiania to defend his title in a series of races with Oscar Matheson, the European champion. Bobby McLean is 25 years of age and was born at Chicago, Illinois. In 1917 he joined the United States air service and for two years has done no skating. He has participated in 1,500 races and makes \$10,000 a year, much of which he puts by. It is said he has won so many medals that he cannot pin them on his chest.

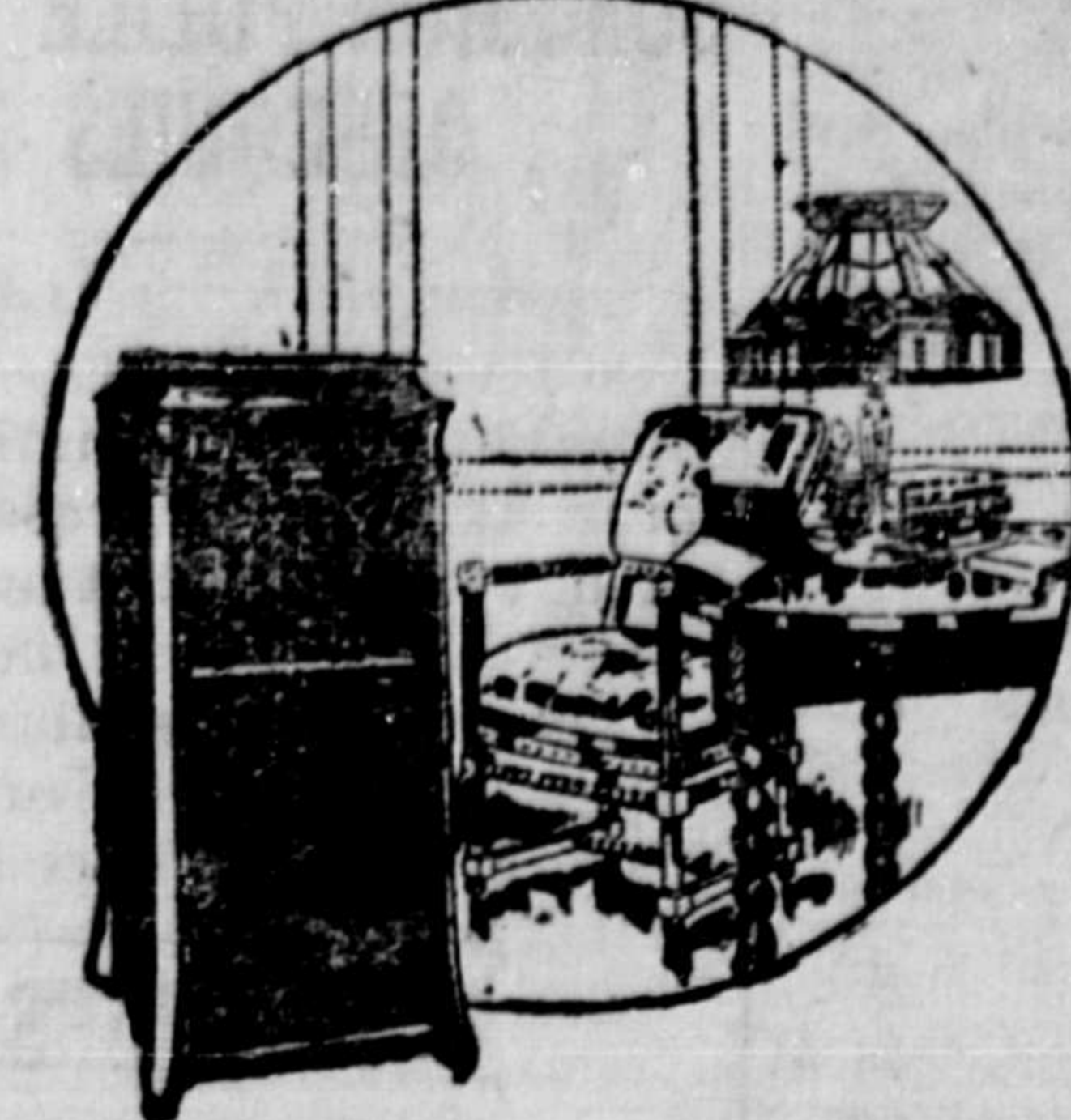
