

Both Europe and Canada Find Difficulties in Financing

Opinion Expressed that United States will Eventually Ratify Treaty of Peace and Join League of Nations; Perley Leader at Ottawa.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, February 3.—America's refusal to help carry Europe's financial burden is not upsetting the British Government. British officials are convinced that the United States will eventually ratify the Peace Treaty and join the League of Nations. The plight of Europe is practically the same as it was four years ago, only financial ruin threatens it instead of military. The republics requiring assistance must give securities, financiers

Canadian Situation.

OTTAWA, Feb. 3.—As an aftermath of the war the country has a difficult financial situation to face. At the end of December the national debt stood at \$1,838,000,000. In interest and pensions alone the Government must meet an expenditure of \$150,000,000 each year for the next generation before the regular expenditures to carry on the Government are touched. The Government has also to make compensation for the expiry of the business profits war tax formerly yielding \$90,000,000. In order to do this it is probable that there will be a readjustment of the income tax on corporations.

The leadership of the House is now in the hands of Sir George Perley, K. C. M. G.

CABINET WILL TAKE UP TWO WAR PROBLEMS

Disposal and handling of Enemy Property Are to be Considered; Austrian Committee Sitting in Paris.

OTTAWA, Feb. 3.—The cabinet is to consider the question of what action the Dominion will take in regard to the disposal of the Peace Treaty dealing with debts and enemy property. The two main questions are whether Canada shall or shall not adopt the principle of clearing up the matter of these debts and whether or not she shall exercise the right reserved to the Allied Nations in the Peace Treaty to liquidate enemy property and utilize the proceeds for the payment of damage sustained by confiscation or sequestration of the Canadian Nationals in Germany. The meeting of the committee is now before a sub-committee sitting in Paris.

HOLLAND NOT ASKED PROPERLY

Give up Kaiser on Criminal Grounds Instead of Political; Might Have Done so at First.

AMSTERDAM, Feb. 3.—A press dispatch states that it is quite possible that the Dutch Government would consent to the extradition of the German war criminal, provided that the extradition is asked on the grounds of criminality instead of being asked on political grounds. It states that if the extradition of the ex-Kaiser had been requested on criminal grounds, the opinion of the government might have been different.

THIS PORT AS A NAVAL BASE

Captain McCoskrie, in a Letter to Minister of Marine, Has Set Forth Its Advantages.

At last night's council meeting a letter was read from Captain E. McCoskrie, harbor master, to Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Minister of Marine, setting forth reasons why Prince Rupert should be chosen as the naval base for the Pacific coast of Canada. The captain endeavored to show why points in the south were not suitable and why Prince Rupert was the logical place for the setting up of such a base.

Esquimalt would not be suitable because it is too near to a long stretch of coast-line that would forbid free entry of war vessels. Further, it was situated too far inland and there are no suitable islands outside for the placing of armaments. Besides this, heavy fogs often proved of great inconvenience there.

The same objections would pertain to Vancouver and the current at Brockton Point, the entrance of the harbor, was too swift for safe navigation of large war vessels. Further, its railways all ran into the United States, which might prove a disadvantage.

Neither Comox nor any other point on Vancouver Island would be suitable as they would all suffer from similar disadvantages.

There were many points enumerated in favor of Prince Rupert. It had a harbor second to none and was over 500 miles from the United States. If Skidegate Narrows were dredged there would be three open entries from the Pacific Ocean with Dixon Entrance and Hecate Straits by way of Cape St. James. Tucks Inlet would make a safe haven for war vessels, the only way of attack being from the air. Besides these natural advantages there already was a first-class drydock and marine depot here. The city was the terminus of the all-Canadian railroad, the Grand Trunk Pacific, and neither the city nor this railroad could be dominated by the States.

The letter was put on the table for a week and the thanks of the council are to be extended to Capt. McCoskrie.

KIEL TO BECOME A COMMERCIAL HARBOR

LONDON, Feb. 2.—The naval port of Kiel has been leased to the town authorities and will be converted into a commercial harbor.

TRAIN MAKES MILE AN HOUR

Weather Conditions on Peace River Road Very Severe and Train Stalled.

EDMONTON, Feb. 3.—Twenty-six miles in twenty-four hours is the record of Thursday's run of the Peace River train on the Edmonton, Dunvegan and B. C. line. "The storm conditions in the north are very severe, with the snow lying from four to five feet deep at many parts of the line. The train for the Peace River country which left here on Thursday morning is reported this morning to have made only a hundred miles out of the city. On Friday morning it had reached Jarve, some 74 miles from Edmonton, while the Spirit River station, where the train terminates, is still some 300 miles further on.

Soviet Russia Invites a Friendly Settlement With Poland on All Questions

LONDON, February 3.—Confirmation was received by the Polish Government in conjunction with the Allies regarding the offer of peace made by Premier Lenine.

The Soviet Russian foreign minister Tchitcherine, Minister of War Trotsky on behalf of the Council of People's Commissaries made an offer inviting friendly settlement of all disputes and outstanding questions between Poland and Soviet Russia.

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CIVIL SERVANTS BEFORE HOUSE AT VICTORIA

Conservative Member Asks Adjournment of Debate to Discuss Matter Arising From Rupert.

VICTORIA, Feb. 3.—Charles F. Nelson, the member for Slocan moved the address in reply to the speech from the throne on the re-assembling of the Legislature yesterday afternoon. Dr. Sutherland of Revelstoke seconded and both spoke highly of the conduct of the affairs of the Province under the present government.

Referring to the working of the Prohibition Act, Mr. Sutherland said the present system of prescriptions was a farce and he was glad to see that something better was proposed.

R. H. Pooley, Conservative member for Esquimalt, moved the adjournment of the debate in order to go into committee of the whole to inquire who was responsible for printing "The Civil Servant," the organ of the Provincial Civil Service Association. He understood that certain officials had been ordered to appear before the cabinet on Tuesday morning and had received a strong intimation of the Government's displeasure over the tone of the first number.

Prince Rupert Affair.

Mr. Pooley said that Mr. Pattullo had told two members of the Land Department that they must quit active participation in publishing the magazine or quit their jobs. They decided to quit work for the magazine. He understood the reason for the Minister's displeasure was a note under "District News" in the "Civil Servant" giving the scale of wages among Prince Rupert civil servants, commencing with a constable at \$155 down to a clerk at \$100.

Frank Mobley Died At Victoria Today

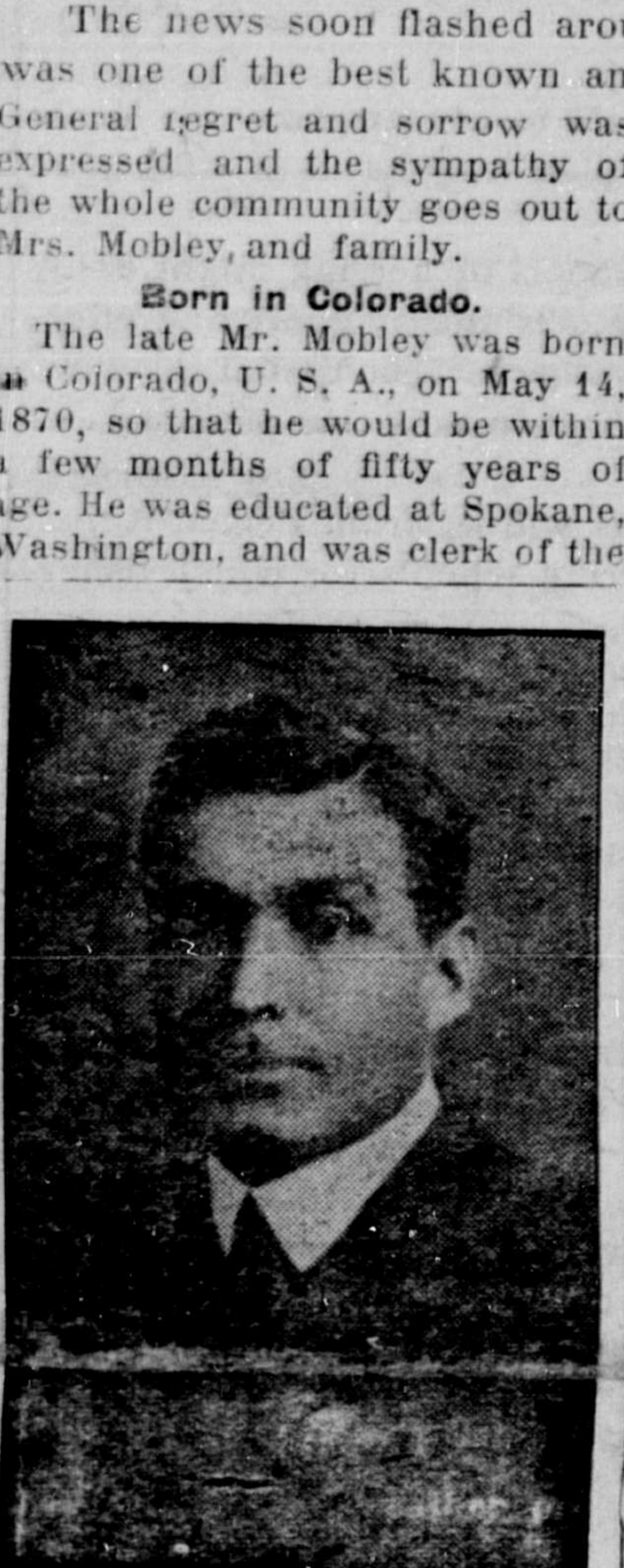
Member for Atlin in Legislature was Victim of Septic Poisoning; News Came as Shock to People Here.

Prince Rupert people were shocked to hear of the death this morning at Victoria of Frank Harry Mobley, member of the Legislature for Atlin and for many years a resident of this city. Word had been received by Mrs. Mobley that he was seriously ill and she had planned to leave for Victoria on tonight's boat, when the telegram arrived telling that he had passed away as a result of septic poisoning.

The news soon flashed around the town, where Mr. Mobley was one of the best known and most highly respected citizens. General regret and sorrow was expressed and the sympathy of the whole community goes out to Mrs. Mobley and family.

Born in Colorado.

The late Mr. Mobley was born in Colorado, U. S. A., on May 14, 1870, so that he would be within a few months of fifty years of age. He was educated at Spokane, Washington, and was clerk of the

municipality of Cheney until he came to British Columbia in 1895. Mr. Mobley was appointed justice of the peace at Atlin, which constituency he represented in the legislature to the time of his death.

Mr. Mobley was always keenly interested in Prince Rupert, where for a number of years he has made his home. He has always taken a deep interest in public affairs. He was a member of the first municipal council of the city and also served a term as license commissioner. In 1912 he was president of the Board of Trade.

In partnership with D. G. Stewart, Mr. Mobley was a member of the firm of Stewart & Mobley in this city and also was a shareholder in F. H. Mobley Co. at Discovery, Atlin, where he also was interested in hydraulic mining in that district.

In 1893 Mr. Mobley married Miss Ida Josephine Colvin of Colfax, Washington and there were three children, Harry who with his wife live at the family residence on Fourth Ave.; Cecil who died several years ago, and an infant Frank, who was born only last August.

Sportsman.

Mr. Mobley was a keen sportsman and as a big game hunter was unexcelled. Many trophies adorn the walls and floors of his home and of the city clubs, all of which were brought down by his trusty rifle. In this city he was a member of the Prince Rupert Club and in Vancouver he held membership in the Terminal City Club.

Of societies he held membership in the Masonic craft and was an Oddfellow and a member of the Artie Brotherhood.

Ardent Liberal.

In politics the late member was an ardent Liberal but he was broadminded enough to be able to look on both sides of any question. He was party whip and as such held the respect of both the leaders and rank and file of his own side of the house and was

a friend of every member of the opposition.

The late member for Atlin died in harness. He went south a week prior to the opening of the Legislature in order to attend a meeting of the Game Conservation Board of which he was a member.

His son, Harry Mobley, and D. G. Stewart will leave this evening for Victoria on the Chelohsin to fetch the body to Prince Rupert where interment will take place.

PEACE TREATY AGAIN COMING BEFORE SENATE

Senator Lodge Will Bring It up a Week from Today—Two Parties Join in Decision.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—The Republican and Democratic leaders here have joined issues to bring back the Peace Treaty into the open senate early next week. The Democratic plan was to reopen the treaty debate a week from tomorrow but Senator Lodge headed that off by giving notice that he would bring the matter up a week from today. The Democrats have accepted the earlier date.

WHALEN PLANTS HAD BIG OUTPUT

Sir George Bury, President of Company, Tells of Big Year Past—Will Be Greater Yet.

VANCOUVER, February 3.—Sir George Bury, president of the Whalen Pulp and Paper Co., announced yesterday that the company last year has paid the best percentage of dividends in its history. The plant produced during the year 4,500 tons of high-grade pulp, three million feet of lumber, six million shingles and two hundred thousand boxes. "With the completion of improvements now in hand at the plant this output will be greatly increased," was the statement of Sir George.

Prince Rupert As A Naval Centre.

There have been rumors from time to time as to why Prince Rupert may or may not become a naval centre. Captain McCoskie has assembled the facts very clearly and the next move will be to place these before the proper authorities.

When Prince Rupert was first located, a good many objected because they said Kaien Island was too near the Alaskan boundary line. They said it would never become a naval base on that account. It might be well perhaps to combat that suggestion in the letter which is forwarded to the naval authorities.

Aeroplanes in Fishing Industry.

In southern waters it is planned to use airplanes to locate shoals of fish. It is said that this plan may be used with good effect for tuna and sardine.

In British Columbia waters, schools of herring might easily be located by means of airplanes much more rapidly and effectively than in any other way. The range of vision from the plane being so much larger than from a boat, makes this plan particularly suitable.

Possibly before long aeroplanes will fly from Prince Rupert for the purpose of locating the herring schools for which fishermen are now looking.

Veracity of Mining Men Often Challenged.

Do mining men tell the truth? That is a question that is often asked and which usually raises an incredulous smile, few being so brave as to intimate that every one is an Ananias and yet everyone showing that mining stories like fish stories are to be taken with a grain of salt.

The difficulty is with a few men who are not miners but who as promoters and boomsters stop at nothing in their efforts to rouse interest in certain mines or prospects and to swindle the public. Already there is a tendency to talk that way about Stewart and Alice Arm. We have had men come to Prince Rupert with stories so wild that no newspaper would dare to print them. In Vancouver recently there seems to have been one man and one newspaper who was sufficiently gullible to be led away with wondrous tales. These tales injure a district more than do the knockers. They make people wonder whether any of the stories told are true.

The facts in regard to the mines of Stewart and Alice Arm are sufficiently wonderful without using the imagination to conjure up Eldorado yarns. There are rich mines and good prospects at both places, but the boomsters would kill interest in them all. What the public would like to have would be accounts of development from time to time with actual finds, described by reputable men who refuse to exaggerate for the sake of effect.

Exaggerated yarns gave Stewart a long sleep once before, and it would be a pity to have the history of that time repeated. We suggest that the people of the mining camps form a miners' protective association for the purpose of lynching any man who goes out and spins about the place yarns which have no basis in fact.

NEW PREMISES FOR THE ROYAL FISHERY PLANT

Provincial Government Spending
About \$1,000 in Making Ex-
tension to Shed; \$5,000
by Companies.

The shed at the government wharf is being extended eastwards 56 feet to accommodate the handling of fish by the National Independent and the Royal Fisheries plants. To make this improvement the removal of several shabby structures is necessary and the appearance of the wharf will be much enhanced as well as making it much more convenient. The new addition will not be the full height of the present shed, but will be only 12 feet high. It will cost the Provincial Government in the neighborhood of \$1,000 to make the necessary alterations. The addition will continue flush with the present shed, leaving a ten-foot frontage and six feet will be left at the end as a public passage.

The National Independent Fisheries will retain their plant, as at present, inside the shed and the new addition will be occupied by the Royal Fisheries. At the present time the two companies are using the same facilities and considerable inconvenience and confusion is experienced. On the completion of this work each company will install its own travelling scales, elevators and ice crushers, ice conveyors and ice houses. The plants will be then of a more modern nature and will be in a position to handle more fish and handle it more efficiently.

The expenditure involved by the companies will be in the vicinity of \$5,000.

BORROWING POWER CAUSES DISCUSSION

City Fathers Argued Over the
Advisability of Amendment to
Municipal Act.

The borrowing powers of the city aroused considerable discussion at last night's council meeting when the mayor brought in a report recommending against the proposed amendment to the Municipal Act raising the city's borrowing power over 20 per cent of its assessment roll. The mayor felt that, with a power of borrowing 3 1/3 million dollars yet before this limit was reached, this action was a little premature. He explained that the work of the city could go on for many years inside this amount, especially as the debt of the city was continually being reduced and the assessment becoming higher.

Alderman Casey was inclined to differ from the mayor. It was his contention that the city would have to raise this 20 per cent limit to establish public works on a sound and unlimited basis. He said that the present system was, ultimately, going to lead to confusion and unfairness in taxation. He felt that, at least, the advice of the authorities should be gained in raising this 20 per cent limit.

Alderman Dybhavn was in favor of dropping the matter at the present time as the city's borrowing powers were ample for some time to come. Ald. Perry felt that Ald. Casey's contentions were quite in order and that he also desired a fair assessment.

Finally, after much discussion, Alderman Dybhavn moved and Alderman Kerr seconded, that the matter be left on the table for a week and in the meantime the aldermen could study the matter.

ADVANCE OF WAGES TO GARMENT WORKERS

Twenty per cent Granted to Piece
Workers and \$6 a week
to Cutters.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
CINCINNATI, Feb. 3.—Approximately 100,000 garment workers in the United States and Canada have been granted an increase of wages as the result of a conference between representatives of the United Garment Workers of America and the Union Garment Workers Manufacturers' Association of America. Piece workers are to get 20 per cent increase and cutters an advance of \$6 a week.

In the Letter Box

DENTAL CLINIC FOR CHILDREN

Editor The News:—

I note with pleasure the assertions of Dr. A. H. Bayne in regard to the need of a dental clinic in the schools of Prince Rupert. It is very timely indeed and would add greatly to the efficiency of the children both mentally and physically.

While practising in the city of Vancouver with Dr. A. R. Baker, we were called upon to examine the teeth of the inmates of the reform school at Point Grey which upon examination were found to be in a very unsatisfactory condition, due to lack of care that a clinic properly conducted would totally eliminate.

In the schools of Vancouver Dr. Jerold Plant, a class-mate of mine, is the examiner and I understand he gives one-half day a week to the good cause.

There has been a saying among the dentists that "a clean tooth will never decay." These children should be taught in the schools how to keep the teeth clean, and be advised by a competent dentist from time to time as to the condition of the teeth. Charts should be given each child showing the condition of the teeth at time of examination. The parents could then have their family dentist do the work for the child, and when completed make his report to the dentist that examined the teeth in the clinic. These examinations should be conducted at least every three months in order to take advantage of the inroads of disease.

I would gladly give one-half day a week of my time at the office or at an established clinic in order to help the good cause along. I only wish I could devote my entire time to a clinic of this nature without compensation.

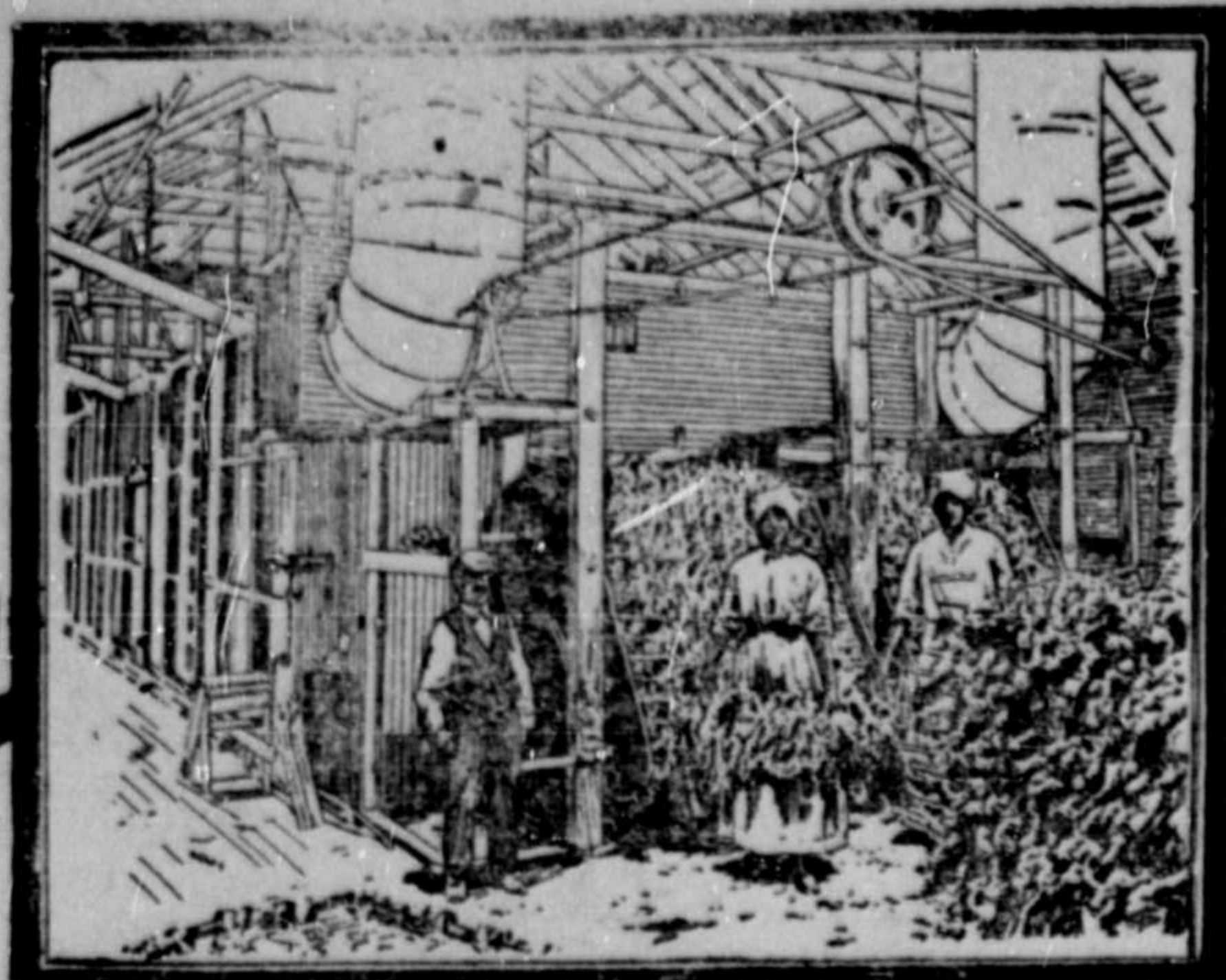

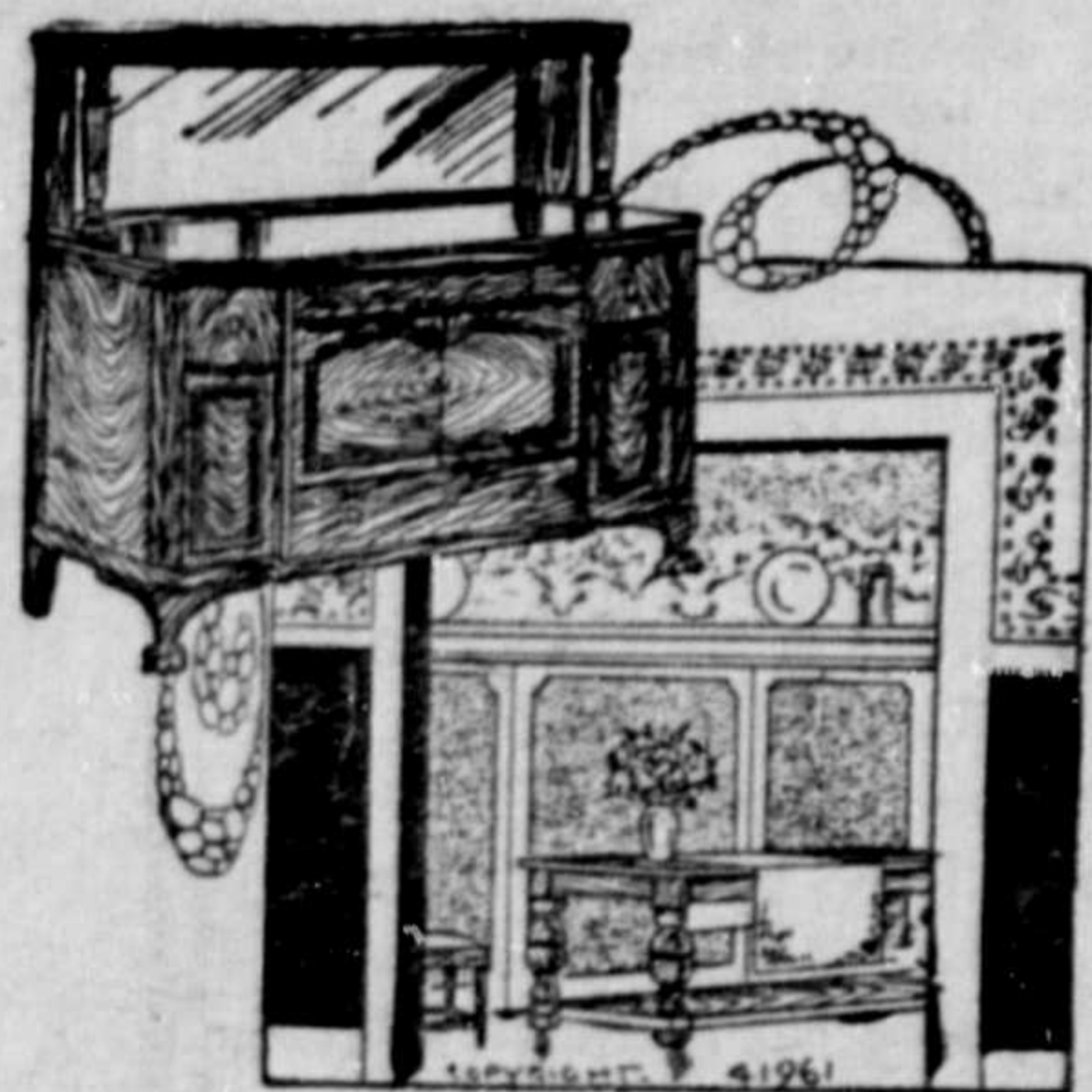
