Crimes with Which Germans Charged by Allied Council

Murder and Outrage, Massacre and Destruction among Evil Deeds for which Leaders will Have to Account when Surrendered by their Government.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, February 5.—The list of charges against those Germans whose extradition has been demanded has been made public by the Council of Ambassadors here. It includes:
Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria, deportations from Lille and Valenciennes.
Duke of Wurtemberg, charged with massacres at Namur.
Field Marshal von Kluck with assassination of hostages at Ypres and massacre of civilians at Aerschoot.
Field Marshal von Mackensen with pillages in Roumania.
Baron von der Lancken, with murders of Capt. Fryatt, British secret agent, and Miss Edith Cavell, British nurse.
Admiral von Capelle with submarine outrages.
Field Marshal Liman von Sanders with massacres of Armenians and Syrians.
General Stenger, with issuing orders to take no prisoners.
General von Mantouffel, with the sack of Louvain.
Lieut. Werner, Capt. Valenter and Capt. Forstner, with submarine outrages.
General von Tesma with the execution of 103 civilians and Count von Bulow with destruction and murders at Aerschoot.

Lord Grey Advises Terms with States

Who de Paris says Lloyd George and Clemenceau have been Persuaded to Turn Wilson Down and make Terms with Majority.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, February 5.—Lord Grey in a recent letter to the London Times declared in effect in favor of admitting the United States to the League of Nations on their own terms. Lord Grey never made one reservation aimed at representation which the dominions have in the League of Nations. A change in this policy was not accepted. His letter contained this message:
"The self-governing dominions are full members of the League. They will admit and Great Britain can admit no distinction of that right. What is the self-governing dominions are in the theory of their constitution they have in effect ceased to be colonies in the old sense of the word. They are free countries, independent as regards all their own offices and parliament responsible only in those matters which concern the Empire as a whole. It is a special status which there can be no deviation from."

MUCH SYMPATHY FOR FAMILY OF FRANK MOBLEY

Many Messages of Condolence Have Been Received by Mrs. Mobley.

Many messages of condolence have been delivered to Mrs. F. H. Mobley, widow of Frank Mobley, who died at Victoria last Monday. These and the many expressions of sympathy and regret that have been made locally have gone to show the esteem in which the late member for Atlin was held. Among the messages received were touching ones from Premier and Mrs. John Oliver, Hon. and Mrs. T. D. Pattullo, Dr. Sutherland, M. P., and many Atlin and Vancouver friends. A resolution of sympathy was also passed by the Northern B. C. Agricultural and Industrial Association and forwarded to Mrs. Mobley.
The following message was received from Captain C. H. Nicholson, manager of the G. T. P. Coast Steamship Service, by Superintendent Beaumont yesterday:—"Greatly shocked at the news of Mr. Mobley's death. Please convey to the family by sincere personal sympathy. Have learned to know him as a man deeply interested in the welfare of Prince Rupert and the northern country in the government. His purpose was honest and his methods conscientious in all his dealings, whether public or private."

HIGH AVERAGE

Ninety-two Per Cent of Attendance at Public Schools Last Month.

Superintendent MacDonald of the public schools reports as follows:—
Total number of pupils actually attending the public schools of the city during the month of January, 580. Average daily attendance 533.9, being 92 per cent. Beginners who came in at the first of February swell the attendance to beyond 600.

Collapse In The Exchange Market Is Most Serious In History of Finance

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
NEW YORK, February 5.—The most disastrous collapse in the history of the foreign exchange market took place yesterday and the situation is even worse this morning. There was a 25 per cent rate for demand loans and time funds reduced to a vanishing point following further withdrawal of Government deposits and Wednesday's disturbance on the stock exchange. Demands fell to 319, a decline of 14 cents from the former low point and 31 cents under last week's final quotation.
French, Belgian and Italian exchange remains at New York 15.12, 15.02 and 1.80 respectively, where discounts, extending from 68 to 77 per cent of normal quotations of 5.18 to the dollar.
Counter movements included new high premiums for bar gold and silver in the London market and higher quotations for the New York exchange at Canadian points.
MONTREAL, Feb. 5.—Exchange on New York advanced from 12 to 17 1/4.
OTTAWA, Feb. 5.—There is nothing new in the exchange situation, said Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, adding that conditions prevailing soon should bring home to Canadian people the necessity of spending money within Canada rather than abroad, as a means of bringing the value of the Canadian dollar back to normal.

BRING PRESSURE ON THE DUTCH

May Break off Diplomatic Relations or Blockade Ports if Demands Not acceded to.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
PARIS, Feb. 4.—The Entente rejoinder to the refusal of Holland to grant the allied demands for extradition of the former Emperor William is imminent. The Petit Parisienne says that while the note will be generally conciliatory it will consider, in the case of a refusal, measures going as far as breaking off diplomatic relations or a naval blockade of the Dutch ports.
It is possible that Holland will acquiesce if some definite charge is made against the former Emperor.

DEAL DIRECT WITH BERLIN OVER DEMANDS

Baron von Lersner Released From Office Because of Failure to Obey Orders.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
PARIS Feb. 5.—The Council of Ambassadors issued a statement saying that it was the decision of the Allies with regard to the German refusal of extradition for war crimes, to communicate direct with Berlin.
BERLIN, Feb. 5.—Baron von Lersner, head of the German Mission in Paris has been released from that office. Lersner had received explicit orders to transmit the allied note on the extradition demands to his government. Paris advices quote Lersner as declaring he had resigned rather than transmit the list of Germans demanded by the Allies.

SELL THEIR LAND

English Dukes Find Burden on Land Too Heavy to Make it Profitable to Hold.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—The Duke of Westminster is reported to be disposing of his valuable London estates and the Duke of Leeds is also getting rid of his estates on the borders of Yorkshire, and Derbyshire, owing to the heavy impositions on landed property.

CHRISTIANIA CUT OFF FROM OUTSIDE

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
CHRISTIANIA, Feb. 4.—Christiania has been cut off from the outside world for the past few days by a heavy snowstorm. All railways are now tied up and in many cases ski runners are bringing food to the passenger trains held by the deep snow.

ITALIAN CHAMBER OF DEPUTIES SUSPENDED

ROME, Feb. 5.—The sitting of the Chamber of Deputies was suspended yesterday owing to the clashes between socialists and members of the popular party.

SIR GEORGE PERLEY MEETS PREMIER ON ARRIVAL IN ENGLAND

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, Feb. 4.—Premier Borden of Canada was met at Portsmouth yesterday by Sir Geo. Perley, acting Canadian High Commissioner, on his arrival on Admiral Jellicoe's flagship. Together they proceeded to London. The premier's stay in England will probably be very short.

CLASHES OCCUR IN CILICIA WITH FRENCH

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
BEIRUT, Syria, Feb. 5.—Following in the wake of the extremist propaganda in Anatolia, clashes have occurred in Cilicia between the native and French troops. Forces from the mountains attempted a sudden attack in the regions occupied by the French and attacked a station of the Baghdad railway.
Troops sent from Aintab repulsed the larger attack.

IMPERIAL VETERANS

WINNIPEG, Feb. 5.—The Imperial Veterans Association decided on Vancouver as the next place for their annual meeting. Major T. B. Thomas of Vancouver, was elected president of the Association.

BERNSTORFF TOO

PARIS, Feb. 5.—Count Bernstorff, former ambassador from Germany to the United States, is among those whose surrender is demanded by the Allies for war crimes.

Acquired Railway On Moderate Terms Says G.T. Chairman

Sir Alfred Smithers Calls Meeting of Shareholders in London to Ratify Agreement with Canadian Government.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, February 5.—Sir Alfred Smithers, chairman of the Grand Trunk Railway, is convening a meeting of the shareholders for February 19 to ratify the agreement between his company and the Canadian Government. He has issued a circular stating that the Board of Directors after long and anxious consideration unhesitatingly by vote accepted the agreement.
The report states that all through the negotiations the Canadian Government persistently pressed the liability of the Grand Trunk for the Grand Trunk Pacific as the chief reason for acquiring the Grand Trunk on very moderate terms.

It can be at once stated, says Sir Alfred, that leaving out all other considerations the increase of expenses without an adequate increase of the rate has greatly aggravated the G. T. P. position in relation to the Grand Trunk. When the Government of Canada broached the question of ownership of the Grand Trunk it was stated that when the Grand Trunk was acquired there would be such an adjustment of rates as would permit of a fair return on the expenses.

EX-KAISER MUST BE INTERNED IF HE IS NOT SURRENDERED

LONDON, Feb. 5.—Sir Aukland Geddes, president of the Board of Trade, declared that if Holland persists in her refusal to give up the ex-Kaiser for trial, the Allies will at least insist that he be interned on some isle far away from Europe.

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GROCCERS ARE CHARGED WITH COMBINING

Complaint Says Against Interest of Consumers and Producers.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, Feb. 5.—On application of the attorney-general of Ontario, the Board of Commerce of Canada has served notice on a number of wholesale grocers in Ontario and Quebec and retail grocers in Hamilton, Ont., to answer charges of having formed a combine to fix the wholesale and retail prices of groceries and patented goods by the grocers of Hamilton.

The complaint charges eighteen wholesale grocers in Ontario and Quebec and sixteen retail merchants trading in the city of Hamilton with being parties to a combine calculated to operate to the detriment of and against the interest of public consumers, producers and others.

ALLIED DEMAND OF EXTRADITION WAS SENT BACK

Count Von Lersner Resigns and Returns to Germany—Returns List to Premier Millerand.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
PARIS, February 4.—Kert von Lersner, German charge d'affaires here, has returned the list of Germans whose extradition has been demanded by the Allies, to Premier Millerand with the announcement that he has resigned and is returning to Berlin by the first train.
A council of ambassadors has been called into extraordinary session to discuss the situation created by this action.

STUDY PEACE TREATY RUSSIA AND POLAND

LONDON, Feb. 5.—Poland has sent a tentative reply to the peace offer of the Bolsheviks that she is studying the proposed treaty. Meanwhile the Soviet Government has ordered the Bolshevik troops to stand on their present lines.

Effort of Churches to Extend Scope of Work.

The churches are making an effort to extend the scope of their work. They are realizing that special urges are required at times in matters religious as well as in the ordinary affairs of life. The business that does not make a special effort now and then is on the chute and will hit the water soon. In every line of endeavor it is necessary sometimes to arouse ourselves, to shake the cobwebs out of our brain cells, to make a resurvey of conditions and adjust ourselves to the new, sloughing off the old and unnecessary. So it is with the church. She gets into a rut sometimes and weas it so deep that it is difficult to dig herself out. Just now she is digging a little and she expects to free herself soon and arouse herself to new activity.

Depopulation of Rural Districts.

Various public men assign various causes for the depopulation of rural districts and the enlargement of the cities. Some point to the tariff. Others declare that farming is not a continuously profitable pursuit. Still others blame the educational system. But the curious thing is that the trend towards the city is similar in all countries.

Perhaps the fact that farms are larger than formerly may be a partial explanation. Agricultural machinery enables a man to cultivate a larger area than in the past. Perhaps also the natural desire of men to walk with a crowd may be one cause which the public speakers and writers have overlooked. Probably the drift to the cities is the result of many causes, some of which have not yet been even discovered.

Education And Religion.

The fact rather than the causes must be reckoned with. The plan of Consolidated Schools seems likely to meet the situation, so far as education is concerned. To consolidate the churches is not so easy. Frequently, in a district formerly well populated, four or five churches exist. Once they were in a fairly prosperous state. Now they serve only a few families and in some cases find it difficult to "carry on" without aid from the home mission funds of the various denominational bodies.

One or other of the little churches may be forced to give up the struggle. And yet, even in such districts, there is reason to believe that if the rural churches were better adjusted to the specialized task they face, they might awaken the interest of the body of non-church-goers generally found in such districts.

In the meantime, the task is to stir up the existing members, give them a vision of the place of power and influence, a lively, earnest church may have in any community, and awaken them to the splendor of their high calling as Christians. To settle the rural church problem, the first need is to give the people a new outlook on life.

The fine thing about the forward movements of the various churches as co-ordinated in the united national campaign, is that the appeal is not a selfish one. The members are urged not to consider their own troubles and difficulties, but to turn their eyes towards the mission fields at home and abroad, to realize the task of the church as a whole. It is a certainty that the liveliest home church is the one that is giving generously for the extension of the Gospel in less favored fields. Out of this call to Canadians for the stimulation of their spiritual life may come a solution of the rural church problem.

RUPERT MARKET COMPARES WELL WITH SOUTHERN

Merchants are Reluctant to Raise Prices Except Where Absolutely Necessary.

POTATOES HIGH AND ARE STILL GOING UP

The market list this week shows a tendency for a raise in the meat line, some of the items already having advanced. The new product, brills, is quoted for the first time and its economy and cheapness is emphasized. Being a local product and quite tasty it is expected to become a popular item on the tables of the city.

Potatoes are on the raise and their flight is expected to continue until the new crop comes in which will be a long time yet. They are now selling at 5 1/2c per pound, the highest in history.

In spite of the continued advance in prices, local merchants and wholesalers draw special attention to the fact that in many lines prices in Prince Rupert are lower than in Vancouver and raises do not seem to come into effect here as quickly as in the south. Compared with Vancouver market reports prices at this place are most satisfactory and merchants are reluctant to advance prices any more than is absolutely compulsory.

Peace Incomes and War Prices

TEN years ago a Canadian clergyman was forced by illness to retire from active work. The largest salary he had received in the forty years of his ministry was \$1000 and a furnished house. The average did not exceed \$800.

On this sum he had maintained and educated his family. He and his wife were given to frequent hospitality. They supported every good cause, and even contributed to the maintenance charges of the Church they served.

A Minister's Budget

By good management and economy they were able to carry an endowment insurance policy, pay an assessment to their Church Superannuation Fund, and accumulate some small savings. When that clergyman was superannuated in 1909, he bought a house. His income during the first year of retirement was as follows:—

The retiring allowance from the Church (being \$10 for each year of active work)	\$400.00
Interest from investments	100.00
Wedding fees and sundries	75.00
Summer supply work	100.00

Against this total of \$675 stood the charge for taxes, insurance and maintenance of the house; say, \$75, leaving a net annual income of \$600.

The Shrinkage in Values

Before the war, the rise in the cost of living had necessitated careful management of this income. Today, the pressure is too great to be borne. If the statisticians are correct, the dollar of 1913 is worth now in purchasing power about 47c.

MAN WAS HELD UP AT COW BAY

Robbers Threaten with Gun but Victim Had no Money.

Last night a Greek named Mike Isatus, of the drydock commissary was held up at Cow Bay at the point of a gun by two would-be highwaymen. At 9 o'clock a call was received at the police station regarding the incident and Sergeant Adams and Constable McDonald were immediately dispatched to the scene where no clue was to be found. The police are still working on the case today.

It appears that Isatus, who was flashily dressed, was returning to the shipyards from town and on Third Avenue, near the Pioneer Laundry, he was accosted by two men who inquired where he was going. The night was dark and stormy and the two men told him they were also headed in the same direction so they proceeded along together. One of the men was tall and thin while the other was short and stocky. When they were passing the Yacht Club the short stout person asked him for a match. While Isatus was getting the match, the tall man pulled a gun on him and the short one went through his pockets.

On finding that he only had 45¢ on his person he was told to "beat it" and warned not to tell the police. The two men then left post-haste in the direction of town along the railroad track. In his haste to inform the police, Isatus neglected to tell in which direction the hold-ups had left so they were not able to intercept them on their way up town. No trace has yet been found of them.

**MURDERERS ARE
DOWN WITH THE
'FLU' EPIDEMIC**

No More Prisoners to be Admitted
to Sing Sing Until the
Plague is Over.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—A phase
of the influenza epidemic is an
order issued at Sing Sing prison
refusing to admit any prisoners
until the flu plague is over. There
are now 58 cases in Sing Sing in-
cluding five condemned murder-
ers.

From Chicago comes a report
that there have been 109 deaths
from influenza in the last 24
hours with 782 new cases report-
ed. Pneumonia cases numbered
330 with 77 deaths.

The danger that many patients
will suffer from lack of heat in
this city has been removed. The
stationary engineers and firemen
working in hotels, apartment
houses and public institutions
have called off the strike as most
of the demands of the men have
been met.

**Serving the
New Canadians**

DURING the past twenty years Canada received three
million new settlers of whom about one million were
of foreign speech. The war interrupted immigration,
but soon the march westward will begin again.

Mutual Requirements
What do we expect of these new citizens? Respect for
Law and order, a measure of diligence, that they may not be-
come a charge upon the community, and a willingness to adjust
themselves to a new environment.
What do they expect of us, the native-born? Justice, sympathy and
kindness. They are entitled also to the stimulating influences of great
Canadian Ideals. They have a right to the Gospel of Christ, not only
explained in theory, but worked out in practice by Christian men and
women.

The Church Hampered
The Church has not been neglectful of these new Canadians, whether
settled in the crowded cities, or on the Western plains. But the effort
to reach them with the ministry of Religion has been made difficult for
lack of Missionaries to overtake the work, and by inadequate financial
means.

A Case of Misunderstanding
Many Church Members do not realize the magnitude of the task.
Lacking complete understanding of the situation, they have not sought
out spiritual leaders for these new Canadians, and have been content
with former standards of giving. Even with a slowing-down of immi-
gration, the needs have not been met. What will happen when the
flood-tide rolls in again?

Look! A Study in Contrasts
In the year 1800, the United States had a population of 5,308,483. During the next twenty years, 184,000 immigrants arrived in American ports.
In 1901, Canada had a population of 5,371,315. During the next fifteen years, the immigration to this Dominion reached a total of 2,906,021.
From 1904 to 1914, Canada accepted 250,000 MORE immigrants
than the United States received in the same period—despite the fact that the population of the Republic was ten times that of Canada.
