Allies Are Still Out After Wilhelm

Repeat Original Demand to Holland with Rebuttal of Legal Argument Against Extradition of Former Kaiser.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, February 6.—The Allied reply to the Dutch note refusing extradition of the former Kaiser will be a distinct repetition of the original demand that he be delivered to them for trial. It is stated on good authority here today that the note, which was drafted in Paris, was received at Downing Street late yesterday and was submitted to Premier Lloyd George and his cabinet for their inspection before being transmitted to Holland. The outstanding feature of the Allied communication is a rebuttal of the Dutch legal argument against extradition. The communication cannot be really classed as a reply, for it is a distinct repetition of the original demand for the surrender of the former Emperor of Germany.

WILL PROVIDE FOR INFLUENZA

Several Cases Reported But of a Mild Nature—Committee Appointed.

At a meeting of the Hospital Board last evening it was decided not to admit flu cases into the hospital. In order to make provision, however, a committee of three composed of W. E. Williams, J. B. Roerig and Alderman Perry was appointed to act in conjunction with a committee of three from the City Council to make arrangements for a temporary hospital. There are several cases in town but it is of a mild form. The mayor has not yet appointed his committee but he says it will be the Board of Health, composed of Aldermen Casey, Kerr, Currie and himself. They will at once make suitable provision for any cases that may need attention.

900 NAMES OF MEN DEMANDED

Former Turkish Minister of War Among Those Wanted By the Allies.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
BERLIN, Feb. 6.—It is learned in addition to the names previously given, the extradition list includes the names of Frederick von Ingenohl, Djemal Pasha, former Turkish minister of war; Rupert von Geyser and Admiral von Schroeder, former commanders of the naval corps. These men were unanimously demanded. The list received in Berlin contains approximately 900 names, fully eighty per cent of the men are unknown, even to the general public of Germany.

FULL HOUSE AT G.W.V.A. SMOKER

First Affair of Kind by Veterans Was a rousing success; House Was Full to the Doors.

The turn-out for the G. W. V. A. smoker in the Empress Theatre last night filled the big house to capacity and the event was a success from every standpoint. The program presented was excellent and every number was enjoyed by the appreciative audience. Smokes were provided in plenty and drinks were also served, nothing being left undone that could promote the satisfaction of those present and the veterans indeed proved again what royal entertainers they are. The smoker opened at 9 o'clock and about 11 sandwiches were served while the Westholme orchestra provided music during the intermission. Shortly after 12 o'clock the final bout was fought and the gathering broke up.

Colonel C. W. Peck, V. C., M. P., presided as chairman and the opening number was a selection by the St. Andrew's pipe band which drew much applause from the house and had to appear twice during the evening. After their first appearance Col. Peck made a short address on the pipe music telling how he had come to be inspired by it.

Old Time Songs.

A solo "Bonnie Mary of Argyll" was rendered by Wm. Murray and R. Robertson again sang his comic songs "Nobody's Satisfied" and "My Old Woman." The two most excellent solos of the evening were sung by J. Stuart Pudney and Mr. Harris of Vancouver. Mr. Pudney received roars of applause on singing the old favorite "Mother Machree" and answered with "There's a Wee House on the Hillside." Mr. Harris was the none less well received and his full bass was delightful in "Dreams of Long Ago" and "My Home is on the Sea."

The appearance of Billy Oram, the popular entertainer of pre-war days, was probably one of the most appreciated features of the whole program and Billy showed that five years of it with the forces had not made him lose any merit as a comedian. He appeared as a Hazelton visitor and simply brought the house down with his comedy sketches and humorous songs. Jimmy Toomy also proved most entertaining with his comic songs and step dancing. He was encored again and again and was very generous in responding. Will Edmunds proved, as always, delightful with his songs. The first was a comic song "How Was I to Know" and he answered the loud applause with a trick song, "The Gazoo."

Boxing Matches.

Of course, the feature of the evening was the boxing. The first preliminary was fought between two local youngsters, Harry Gawthorne and Jack Crossley. Although reputed to be an exhibition sparring match, the fight developed itself, on account of Crossley's aggressiveness, into a slugging battle royal and both boys finished up at the end of three two-minute rounds with noses bleeding profusely. The second match was between Len Sherman and his brother, Tom, and like the first was declared a draw. Some good work was shown, Tommy appearing to be the speediest of the pair. J. CLUBS AGAIN ARE DISCUSSED

Law Enforced at All Without Distinction—Chief Reports Improvement.

At this morning's meeting of the Police Commission, social clubs and their conduct came in for a good deal of discussion. The matter was brought up by Commissioner Myhill-Jones who was led to believe that some arrangement had been made between the proprietors and the Police Commission which hindered the execution of the law by the police force. On the city clerk reading the official minutes of the commission meetings it was found that the commissioner was under a misapprehension and that any club having tin-horns, professional gamblers or rake-off runners in its employ could be closed down and the owners punished.

Commissioner Hill felt that all the clubs in the city should be treated alike. As far as he knew they were all receiving rake-offs, but it seemed very difficult to prove this fact. He did not consider the Prince Rupert or the Wanderers' Clubs were on any different footing from the "submarine" and they all should be treated alike. There was no more reason to raid one more than the other.

Improvement.

The chief reported that there was considerable improvement in the club situation during the last two or three weeks. In fact, it seemed difficult to get games in some of them. Two clubs in the city are reported to have closed up altogether. "If I ever can obtain any proof that any of the clubs in this city are conducted in any way contrary to law, I certainly will take action against them," said Commissioner Hill. "There are all kinds of reports about them being run contrary to law. There are too many misunderstandings between the police commission and the police force and I am tired of this dilly-dallying, delay and misunderstandings and want to see something done."

KING'S COLLEGE AT WINDSOR IS BURNED

Many Notes Outstanding Causes Depreciation Of Currency; Will Improve

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, February 6.—A gradual reduction of the number of Dominion notes in circulation is planned by the Government as a means of improving the financial system. A return issued by the Finance Department shows that on January 19 there were Dominion notes in circulation amounting to \$318,090,089, secured in gold to the extent of \$114,821,062 and in approved securities to the amount of \$154,237,000. Gold is, therefore, about 35.9 per cent of the total issue.

At the end of the financial year the amount of the notes outstanding was \$298,058,697 and the gold security was \$116,014,654, or 39.9 per cent of the total issue. Of the Dominion notes outstanding \$144,428,000 were secured by a deposit of approved securities.

PROVINCIAL POLICE HAVE FINE LAUNCH

"Luelco" Has Been Bought at Victoria for Police Duties Out of This Port.

Chief Minty, of the Provincial Police, is in receipt of a letter from the department at Victoria notifying him that a splendid launch, named the "Luelco" has been bought by the government for the service of the local provincial police. The launch is now lying in the inner harbor at Victoria and is to be brought north at the earliest possible date.

The "Luelco" is a modern vessel and is equipped with the best of machinery and appliances. It is of the Bridge-Beck cruiser type with a length of 35.2 feet over all and a beam of 9.3 feet. It is equipped with a 2-cylinder, 4-cycle heavy duty Atlas engine rated at 15 British h. p. This engine will make the boat a very speedy craft. The gross tonnage of the launch is 9.86 tons and is registered as 4.98 tons. She has two seventy-five-gallon fuel tanks and one six-gallon tank which will give her a cruising radius of over 1,000 miles. The boat is reported to be in first class condition throughout.

The announcement of the department of its purchase of the vessel gives considerable pleasure to the local provincial force as the need of a boat exclusively for police work has long been felt. With the filling up of the district with settlers, calls are often made on the force which require immediate action. Hitherto, it has been impossible to visit remote places without great expense and inconvenience. The regular headquarters of the vessel will be at this port and will be a material addition to the local mosquito fleet.

FRIDAY PASSENGER TRAIN IS PUT ON

Regular Freight Will Carry one Passenger Coach for Accommodation of Local Traffic.

Effective this morning a passenger coach was added to the local Prince George-Prince Rupert freight train for the convenience of local passengers. This service will be maintained from now on. The train leaves at 8 o'clock Friday mornings and returning, arrives here Sunday afternoons.

GOLD MINING

Four Dollars an Ounce Premium Due to Exchange Rate with United States.

TORONTO, Feb. 6.—Gold mining companies of northern Ontario are today receiving \$4 an ounce premium on the gold produced. This is due to the sale of their product at a premium of 18 per cent in the United States.

INCREASE IN EMPLOYMENT

British Columbia Getting Busier According to Report from Ottawa.

C. firms indicate increases of employment in the following industries: Lumbering, leather and leather goods, metals, pulp, paper and printing, wood-working, quarrying and mining, and miscellaneous, lumbering and quarrying and mining showing the most substantial additions.

GERMANS SAY IMPOSSIBILITY

Members of Cabinet at Berlin Unanimous Against Surrendering Men Demanded.

BERLIN, Feb. 6.—At the conclusion of tonight's cabinet session a member of the Government informed the correspondent that the ministers were unanimous in endorsing the statement that the surrender of the men demanded by the Allies mentioned in the unofficial list or any other list was an utter physical impossibility.

The cabinet meeting lasted several hours and was attended by Mathias Erzberger, vice-premier and minister of finance, whose appearance was his first since he was shot in the shoulder in the recent attempt to assassinate him.

JOURNALISTS MAY NOT COME THIS WAY

Letter Received by Mayor Does Not Look very Encouraging.

There is some doubt regarding the possibility of the British journalists visiting Prince Rupert next summer. The telegram sent by Mayor McClymont to J. C. McLennan has been handed to F. J. Bird of the Province and he and John Nelson of the World will have the making of arrangements.

In a letter to the Mayor, Mr. Burd says the time of the visitors in British Columbia will be limited and the people of Okanagan and other places are asking for a visit. The delegation will be in Canada 45 days and in B. C. eight days.

Lord Grey is Still A World Statesman.

When Lord Grey left the United States where he had been British Ambassador to Washington, there were many surmises as to the reason for his sudden departure. Now it is all cleared up. He went to give personal advice to the heads of the Allied governments in regard to settlement of the difficulty over the signing of the Peace Treaty and the entry of the United States into the League of Nations.

It seems to be a foregone fact that the Democrats will be defeated at the next election. Already the Republicans are in a majority at Washington, but under the inelastic form of government at the American capital there is a president with wholly different views from Congress. Having in view this condition, Lord Grey went to Europe to urge compliance with the request of the United States in certain respects. What he suggests is a compromise. He was in close touch with the situation in the United States and he is also in the confidence of the ruling powers of Europe. For that reason his advice is likely to be taken.

Useless Ravings Regarding Exchange.

It is useless to rave at the United States regarding the present condition of the exchange market. That country is worse hit than Canada or Great Britain. Every country interested is inconvenienced, but the nation that suffers most is the United States. If she cannot sell her goods, how can she prosper? She manufactures much more than she can use and unless she can sell in the markets of the world, her factories must close. Already she is feeling the effect to some extent and conditions will soon get worse and some action will have to be taken to set matters right.

Those who require goods manufactured in the United States will have to wait until the exchange is improved. Present rates are almost prohibitive. In the meantime we can look on with complacency for, while we are inconvenienced, we do not suffer to any extent. It should not take long to set matters right.

Are Combining to Keep up Prices.

Some of the grocers are combining to keep up prices, and they are to be charged with the offense before the Board of Commerce. If they are over charging, it is quite the correct thing to punish them, but if they are after a legitimate profit, there should be no offense.

Nearly all businesses in nearly all cities combine to set prices. Under modern conditions it has to be. The one-price system makes it necessary. The labor unions also combine to set the price at which they will sell their labor, the farmers combine to say at what price they will sell their wheat. Possibly the fruit growers are among the worst offenders. They get together in their associations and refuse to sell a pound of fruit at less than the price they themselves set. This is an age of getting together, of amalgamating interests, of team work, and while there will be found many injustices connected with it, the system is bound to win out in the long run.

Combines Should Be Supervised.

We do not think that combines of any kind should be given a free hand. They should be supervised. The Government should have some say in setting the prices, just as they control the railway rates. Too much profit is made on many articles, but there is little to be gained by stopping firms combining. It is simply putting back the hands of the clock.

We shall have to get used to big combinations if we ever expect to eliminate private ownership. It will take years of training in big business to make us fit to run the affairs of the community under one head.

Peace Incomes and War Prices

TEN years ago a Canadian clergyman was forced by illness to retire from active work. The largest salary he had received in the forty years of his ministry was \$1000 and a furnished house. The average did not exceed \$800.

On this sum he had maintained and educated his family. He and his wife were given to frequent hospitality. They supported every good cause, and even contributed to the maintenance charges of the Church they served.

A Minister's Budget

By good management and economy they were able to carry an endowment insurance policy, pay an assessment to their Church Superannuation Fund, and accumulate some small savings. When that clergyman was superannuated in 1909, he bought a house. His income during the first year of retirement was as follows:—

The retiring allowance from the Church (being \$10 for each year of active work)	-	-	-	-	-	\$400.00
Interest from investments	-	-	-	-	-	100.00
Wedding fees and sundries	-	-	-	-	-	75.00
Summer supply work	-	-	-	-	-	100.00

Against this total of \$675 stood the charge for taxes, insurance and maintenance of the house; say, \$75, leaving a net annual income of \$600.

The Shrinkage in Values

Before the war, the rise in the cost of living had necessitated careful management of this income. Today, the pressure is too great to be borne. If the statisticians are correct, the dollar of 1913 is worth now in purchasing power about 47c.

Therefore, the real income available to

maintain these people of refinement and culture is \$282 a year.

Do you say that this is an exceptional case? On the contrary, scores of retired clergymen are not so well situated as this one. Some are tasting the bitterness of destitution, since in a few instances no retiring allowances are provided for.

Veterans of the Cross

These men gave a lifetime of unselfish service for their Church, their country, their neighbors; visiting the sick, burying the dead, comforting the bereaved, preaching Christ crucified, and doing their part in making Canada "God's country." In a

time when the payment of pensions to old employees is accepted as a reasonable thing by industrial firms, these veterans deserve more consideration than they have been getting from the Christian people of this Dominion.

The Forward Movements

The Superannuation, Beneficiary or pension funds of the five Communions co-operating in the United National Campaign must be largely increased to yield a reasonable and an adequate income for these old heroes of the pulpit.

They ARE heroes. They make no complaint. They still are found doing all that their strength will permit for the great and noble Cause to which they devoted their lives. They still are enduring hardness as good soldiers of Jesus Christ.

BIG PROGRESS PREDICTED FOR THIS DISTRICT

Review of Mineral Production for
1919 Was Satisfactory;
Decreased Production.

A preliminary review and esti-
mate of mineral production in the
year 1919 for British Columbia
has been prepared by Wm. Fleet
Robertson, provincial mineralog-
ist, and has just been released by
the King's Printer's office in Vic-
toria. The estimate is made be-
fore the official reports of the
resident engineers and gold com-
missioners of the province have
been received and is regarded
simply as a preliminary review
of the progress of the past year,
together with an estimate of the
quantities and value of the sev-
eral mineral products of the pro-
vince but it is believed that it will
prove to be approximately cor-
rect.

The report shows an estimated
mineral production to the value
of \$33,421,333 in the province,
being \$8,361,141 less than 1918.
The decrease in production, as
compared with the preceding
year, loses its adverse significance
when it is considered that the
1919 production is still material-
ly greater than that of any year
prior to 1916, and that the larger
productions of 1916-17-18 were
due to the stimulus of the war
and the inflated metal prices at-
tendant thereon. The decrease
is almost entirely due to copper,
the price of which immediately
fell on the signing of the armis-
tice.

Clothier's Report.

Resident Engineer George A.
Clothier, for this district reports
that the year 1919 has been a
crucial one for mining in the
north country, as many prop-
erties have been bonded, proven,
and will be shipping ore in the
near future. The year 1919 has
been one of extraordinary ac-
tivity and the outlook for this
year and the future are decidedly
promising. Salmon River (Stew-
art) and Kitsault River (Alice
Arm) have almost reached boom
proportions but the majority of
the properties are held by wealthy
companies who can go through
with developments and the gen-
eral public has not to any extent
risked its money. This year the
smaller operators may get in and
take advantage of properties
stocked for the purpose.

Less From Granby.

The output in the district for
1919 has fallen short of last year
due to the lessened production in
the Granby plant at Anyox, but,
as said before, this can by no
means be taken as an indication
of the falling off of the mining
industry. Gold and silver pro-
duction in the district have
shown an increase due to the ac-
tivities at the Dolly Varden (Alice
Arm), Premier (Stewart) and the
Surf Inlet mines.

The Bella Coala mining division
has shown very little activity dur-
ing the year although a few
claims have been staked. There
has been some staking of coal
and oil claims on the Queen Char-
lotte Islands besides small work
on some of the mines. A trip was
made by Mr. Clothier into the
Stikine Mining Division during
the summer. Quite a revival of
interest in that section and re-
newed activity is looked for this
year. In the Atlin district 1919
has been the dulllest year since
the camp started. This condition
was due to the lack of labor and
the increased cost of producing
gold.

PEOPLE DIE FROM SUBSTITUTE LIQUOR

CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—Over one
hundred victims lie seriously ill
or blind as a result of drinking a
substitute for booze and several
have died. A new epidemic of
bootlegging is responsible for the
trouble.

GREENVILLE IS ASKING HELP FOR NEW CHURCH

Large Building Proposed to be
Erected in Autumn by
Natives.

Following their progressive ac-
tion in installing of an up to date
electric lighting system for their
village, the people of Greenville,
on the Upper Naas are now con-
templating the erection of a new
church building the latter part of
this year. Already contributions
to the amount of \$3,347.50 have
been received, practically all the
Greenville people subscribing. Of
this amount \$700 was raised by
the Women's Auxiliary.

According to the plans for the
new building, it will be 40 feet
wide by 90 feet long, which will
meet the needs of the Greenville
Indians for some time to come.
It is estimated that the cost of the
structure will be around \$10,000
and to defray this expense, assis-
tance is being asked from the peo-
ple of Prince Rupert, who have
the welfare of the Indians at heart.

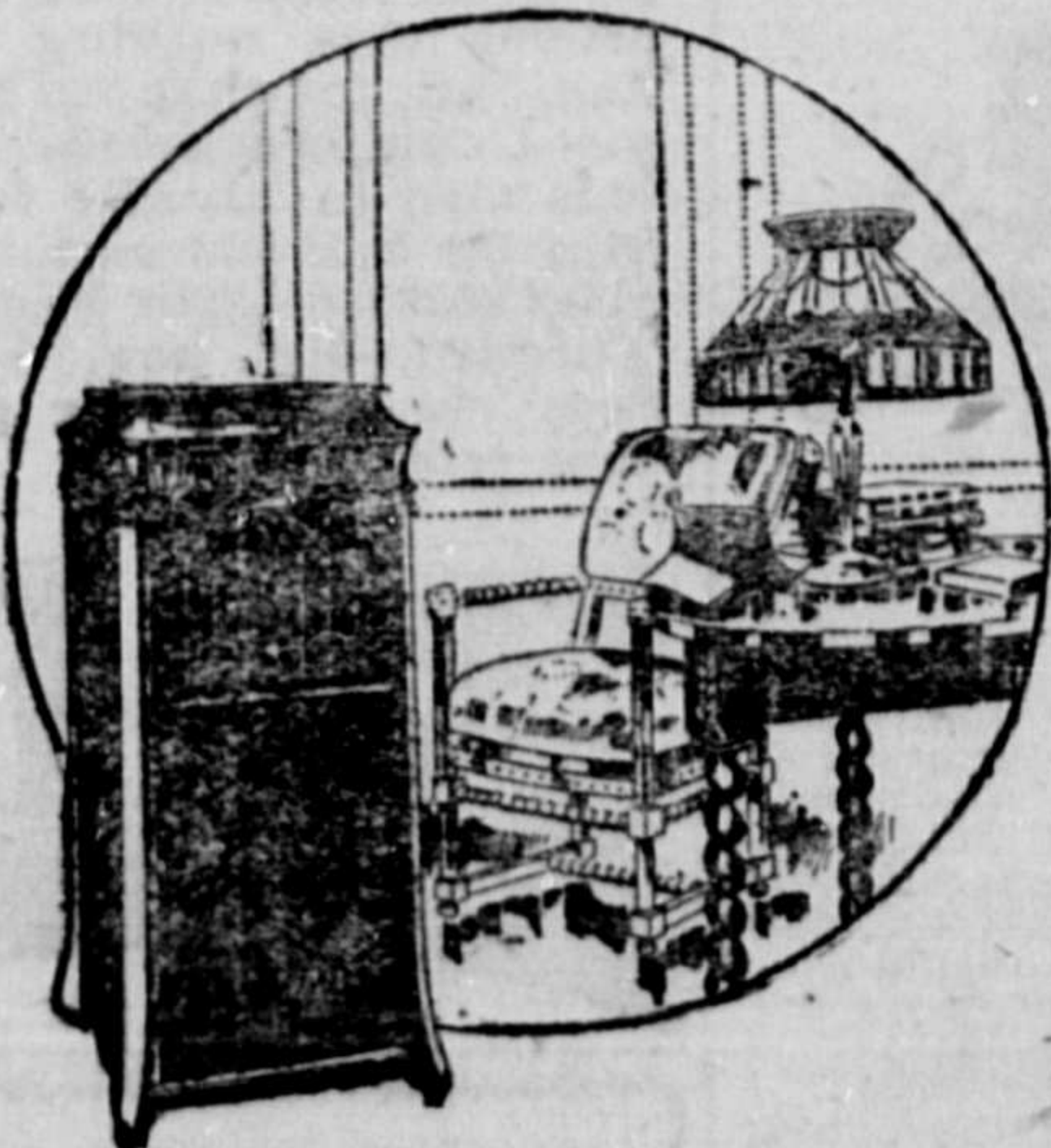
