Victoria Delegation Expects Strong Support For District

Sums Placed in Estimates for Aid to Local High School, Morse Creek Bridge, Government Buildings and Rebuilding Dock.

Terrace Bridge and Roads In North Are Considered

Queen Charlotte Islands Drainage, Usk Ferry, Road Surveys on Kaien Island and other matters Receive Attention.

The Board of Trade delegation which recently visited Victoria reported last night to the Board of Trade in a most optimistic mood. They say they had a good reception from the members of the Government and that sums have been placed in the estimates which, if passed, as seems likely, will be of great benefit to the community. The following is the report:

An amount necessary for construction of Government buildings at Prince Rupert has been placed in the Estimates, and is our understanding that \$100,000.00 is available for construction during the year 1920.

Local High School.
A very liberal amount will be carried in the estimates for a portion of the costs of a high school at Prince Rupert.

The Honorable the Minister of Lands, representative of this district, is working hard to increase allotment already made, but does not desire any reference to this until such times as he is in a position to make a definite statement.

An amount of \$6,000.00 will be put in the estimates for Section 2 bridge.

An amount will be carried in the estimates for adequate repairs to Government Wharf, as it is the intention of the Government to reconstruct same in order that the public may receive full benefit.

Publicity.
The matters of publicity for the north country in Government publications was discussed and the delegation assured that the northern and central British Columbia would have good treatment in this respect.

Strong representation has been made by the Bella Coola district for better road facilities to enable the opening up of the interior valley, and the minister has, together with Grazing Commissioner MacKenzie, will make a trip from the Grand Trunk to the head of the Bella Coola with a view to obtaining first hand information and determining exactly what is best for that district.

Queen Charlottes.
A reserve will be placed on the vicinity of Maer's Island, Queen Charlotte Islands, for the drainage of a large area in contemplation. The drainage of this area is a necessary pre-requisite of the construction of a road from Port Moresby to Tel-el. Last year an engineer investigated the situation and continued on Page Four.

TAUNTS STATES FOR HER DELAY ENTERING WAR

Italian Newspaper Makes Savage Attack, Incensed by Letter of Secretary Glass.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

ROME, Feb. 7.—The United States is savagely attacked by "The Epoca," which today prints a lengthy comment on the letter of Secretary Glass in regard to further credits to European countries.

"Secretary Glass," the newspaper says, "does not take into consideration that America did not participate in the war until Western Europe was out of danger, and that the United States took good care that Germany should not be excessively trampled upon and impoverished, she being an excellent American client."

GERMAN HONOR IS ENDANGERED

Prince von Buelow Says Men Whose Surrender Demanded Simply Did Duty.

WILL NOT SURRENDER MEN VOLUNTARILY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

BERLIN, Feb. 7.—"They simply did their duty to the Fatherland," was Prince von Buelow's view of the acts of the Germans whose extradition is demanded by the Council of Ambassadors of the Allies. In expressing his opinion of the demand von Buelow said he considered it an evasion of the treaty. It was compatible with German honor that not one of the men must be surrendered voluntarily.

MARINE DEPARTMENT MARKS VENN PASSAGE PAST METLAKATLA

An improvement that will prove a great boon to fishermen and other launch owners has just been completed by the Marine Department which has its headquarters at Digby Island with Captain Saunders in charge. The following are the locations of the buoys:

Red Spar Buoy in approximate five fathoms L.W. off the reef North of Grindstone Island.

Black Spar Buoy in approximately five fathoms L.W. off the outer rock which dries eight feet, to the Eastward of Wilgiapsh Island.

Black Spar Buoy in approximately two fathoms L.W. off the shoal approximately Two Cables West of Du Vernet Point.

Red Spar Buoy in approximately two fathoms L.W. off Dundas Point.

Red Spar Buoy in approximately four fathoms L.W. off Auriel Point.

CURRIE STARTING BAKERY BUSINESS

Former Confectionery Store to Become a Bakeshop

The building formerly occupied by "Candyland" has been purchased by James Currie who will re-open his bakery business there. Mr. Currie has made application for a building permit at the estimated cost of \$1,000. He will tear down the small building at the rear and build a modern bakery equipped with bake ovens in place of it.

Shipment of Cattle Here On Way to Graham Island For Currie Stock Range

What is probably the largest single shipment of cattle to pass through this port for the Queen Charlotte Islands is in town today and will be taken across on the Prince John when she leaves for the north island tonight or tomorrow on her return from Stewart. The shipment, which consists of 26 head of heifers, arrived yesterday morning from Calgary and is going to the ranch of Ronald Currie at Tow Hill near Massett. Mr. Currie is accompanying the stock and has been on the prairies for the last two months buying them. They are good healthy animals and will be used for breeding purposes.

Mr. Currie speaks very favorably of the prospects for the cattle raising business on the islands. He has three quarter section tracts of good grazing land there, and has already ten head of cattle on the land. The animals are to be used solely for beef raising as Mr. Currie is not in the dairy business. Developments of the lumbering and fishing industries in the vicinity of Massett has provided a good home market and it is not the intention of the owner to ship any of his beef from the islands.

The buying of this stock represents considerable investment. Bought at Calgary, they cost \$7 per head and the freight on them to this port was over \$400, in addition to the further cost of getting them safely across the straits. Mr. Currie, however, is quite confident of the success of his venture as meat is scarce on the Islands and consequently a good price is offered. The cost of feeding stock is simple as they can be grazed out all winter, although Mr. Currie intends to feed these in the barns during the most severe spells.

TEN-CAR FISH TRAIN OUT THIS MORNING

Five Local Companies Ship Fish by Canadian Express Co.; Bought Last Day or So

A fish special of ten cars, representing the big catches sold here in the last day or so, went out shortly before the passenger train this morning enroute to the eastern market behind engine 67. The train was made up of car load lots from the Booth Fisheries, Atlin Fisheries, Pacific Sea Products Co., Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., and Pacific Fisheries.

TO COLLECT DEBTS FROM ENEMY NATIONS

HAVANA DOCK IS DESTROYED

Conflagration Destroys Property Valued at \$10,000,000.

HAVANA, Cuba, Feb. 7.—There was a big conflagration here yesterday when the entire dock and buildings of the American Agricultural & Chemical Co. was destroyed by fire. The dock which was built of wood was totally destroyed, the loss being estimated at \$10,000,000.

Statement of Claim of Newman Erb in Dry Dock Lawsuit

Asks Court to Declare Meetings of Directors and Their Acts to be Illegal; Also Claims Damages

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VICTORIA, February 7.—Newman Erb's statement of claim against John L. Mullen, A. M. Manson, M. P. P., and others at Prince Rupert in connection with the suit for control of the Dry Dock and Government shipbuilding contracts has just been filed in the Supreme Court here. This crystallizes the plaintiff's case in a clean cut form. When the statement for the defence is filed, and this will be at as early a date as possible, the stage will be set for the big fight.

In the statement filed Erb asks for complete nullification of all dealings and transactions, such as the issue of shares, appointment of directors, etc., by the defendants, dating from and including the meeting of December 20, when William E. Williams and Miss Ethel Thompson assumed to be the sole shareholders and acted accordingly.

Erb asks for a declaration that all these proceedings were beyond the power of the defendants, were illegal and void, and asks in addition for damages.

The Directors.

The statement of claim filed by Knox Walker as solicitor for the plaintiff sets out that Erb, The Empire Ship and Dry Dock Corporation, W. M. Madden, H. B. Blanchard, I. M. Dittenhoefer, plaintiffs, and Alex. M. Manson and John L. Mullen, defendants, were the only shareholders in the company, and that the directors were the individuals named.

The Empire Company is cited as having 5,975 shares and each of the individual directors five shares each.

The document then alleges that in December last Manson, Williams, Mullen and Ethel Thompson conspired to usurp control of the company, and that on December 20th Williams and Miss Thompson wrongfully assuming to constitute themselves sole shareholders did, without notice to the real shareholders, purport to hold an extraordinary general meeting of the company. It alleges that they reduced the directorate from five to four, and appointed the defendants, J. R. Morgan, S. P. McMordie, E. C. Gibbons, and F. F. Schellenberg directors. At another extraordinary meeting held the same day the two defendants are alleged to have increased the capital of the company from \$500,000 to \$750,000.

A Loan from Mullen.

The new directors meeting on the same day are alleged to have allotted one share each to Williams, Miss Thompson, Mullen and Schellenberg, and to have granted Mullen a bonus of one hundred fully paid up shares in consideration for a loan of \$13,000.

The defendants are also alleged to have purported to hold an annual statutory general meeting of the company on January 3rd without notice to the plaintiffs and to have appointed Mullen Schellenberg, Gibbons and Morgan directors.

It is also alleged that defendants took control of the plant and contracts.

The remedy asked is simply a declaration that all of these proceedings were illegal, and consequently null and void, with a restoration of the situation that existed before December 20, and damages.

Smelter for This District Necessary.

A smelter is necessary in this district right at once. That is the opinion of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade and of practically everyone who has given the matter any study. A petition has been sent forward to Premier Oliver asking that a smelter be established at Port Edward or at some other point in order that the ores may be taken care of in this country instead of being shipped to the United States. The petition points out that already the smelter owners are buying up local mines and making them tributary to the smelters to the south. If there are no local facilities small owners will be bound to sell their mines as they cannot afford to ship ore and wait a long time for their returns. With quick returns many mines could be developed and prospects would be worked which otherwise would lie dormant for years.

It is not only Prince Rupert that is interested in this question. The interior mining districts all stand to benefit from the establishment of a smelter here and so do the mining camps up and down the coast, especially those at Stewart and Alice Arm.

We cannot afford to wait until some private company gets going. We have been fooled too many times with proposals from men who have professed to be prepared to commence work at once. What we want now is action that will insure that Canadian ore be smelted in Canada.

Probation is

Not Satisfactory.

The Daily News does not agree with the Board of Police Commissioners in putting the police force under probation. The police have worked for the city long enough for the commissioners to know what are their capabilities. If they are satisfactory, why worry them? If they are not satisfactory, let them out and put others in their places.

The employer that does not know whether or not an employee is satisfactory after years of service, is hardly suited to be an employer. We do not see that there is anything to be gained by putting the force on probation. If they were not satisfactory last month neither are they to be trusted this. If they did good work during the past year, they may be depended on to continue that good work. We believe that more depends on the commissioners than on the police force.

Must be Backed

By Commissioners.

The police of this city, we take it, do not differ materially from those of other cities. If they have orders that a certain thing is to be cleaned up, and they feel that the order is really meant, they will provide ways and means to do the cleaning. That is the work of the chief. It all depends on the backing he receives. It does not depend on the public utterances of the commissioners but on the real intent. This has been made clear not only here but in other places. We could quote many instances of apparent slackness on the part of the police force of cities, which with the same force was completely changed when the power behind showed that it was determined to have results.

We are not saying now that this city is worse than other small industrial and seaport towns. What is sure, however, is that, on the outside at any rate, the city has not a very savory reputation. We cannot afford to have such a reputation and for that reason, if for no other, we should see that the police are alert and always on the job. They are no terror to the men who keep the law, but only to those who break it.

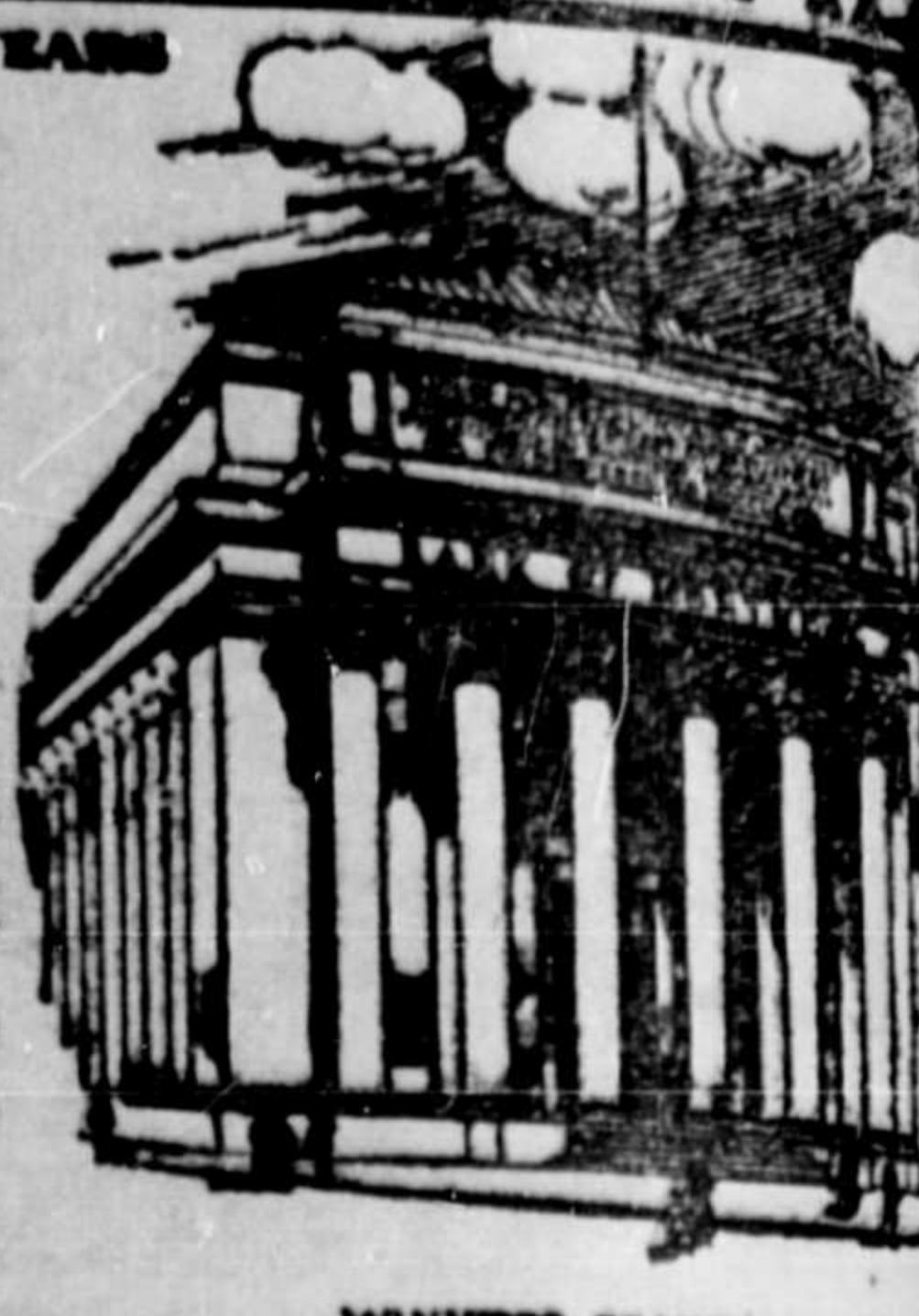

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URGE SMELTER HERE AT ONCE

Board of Trade Committee Sends Urgent Petition to Premier Regarding Matter.

**PLENTY OF ORE IS
ALREADY IN SIGHT**

A meeting of the Board of Trade last night approved the action of the committee in sending an urgent petition to Premier Oliver asking for the establishment of a 100-ton smelter unit here this year in order to prevent the mines getting into the hands of American smelters, and to keep the industry at home. The following is the petition, copies of which were forwarded to the member for the district, Hon. T. D. Pattullo:

The Petition.

Acting under pressure from the entire northern mining district, a delegation from this board called upon the Hon. Mr. Sloan, Minister of Mines, pointing out to him the absolute necessity of the immediate creation of a hundred-ton unit smelter to be located in the central part of this district, presumably near Prince Rupert, to take care of ore tonnage now being handled.

The Minister of Mines gave this delegation a very sympathetic hearing and promised to do everything in his power towards granting assistance along the most needed lines. He informed the delegation that he intended to make a personal survey of the entire district during the early summer, and while we know and feel that he will do this just as soon as he can possibly get away, we fear that the delay, slight as it may seem, will prove very injurious to the future mining interests of this part of the province.

Below we respectfully submit approximate tonnages in this part of the province:

Alice Arm District—Dolly Varden (daily), 100 tons; North Star, 25 tons; Last Chance, Tiger, Musketeer, Hosestake, 75 tons.

Stewart District—Premier, Big Missouri, Forty-Nine, Mineral Hill, Indian, Spider and Bush properties, the approximate tonnage of these mines, when in full operation, should be about 500 tons per day.

Apart from this we have the Silver Standard, producing 25 tons a day, as well as good showing properties such as the Sunrise, Babine, Hudson Bay Mountain and Cronin properties which will prove good shippers.

Already Alienated.

We would respectfully call your attention to the fact that the Premier, at Stewart, has passed into the control of the Guggenheim interests while the Forty-Nine, at Stewart, as well as the Last Chance and Tiger, of Alice Arm, are practically controlled by Guggenheim men. We particularly desire to draw your attention to this fact for the reason that, if prompt measures are not taken, for the immediate construction of a smelter here, to take care of the smaller properties they will in a very short time pass into control of the bigger interests, thus being the cause of the ore being shipped out of the country to smelters whose interests are affiliated with the Guggenheims.

This northern country is essentially a mining district and we know that both yourself and the Hon. Mr. Sloan will appreciate what we say when we state that we feel that our government should grant us the same support in the development of our mines as is done in the development of farm lands and other productive pursuits.

We, therefore, respectfully urge upon your government the advisability of going into this proposition immediately with a view to making proper arrangements for the construction of a smelter at or near Prince Rupert, thereby enabling the smaller property holder to successfully carry on his workings, aiding in the development of this district, and keeping the working of such properties under Canadian control.

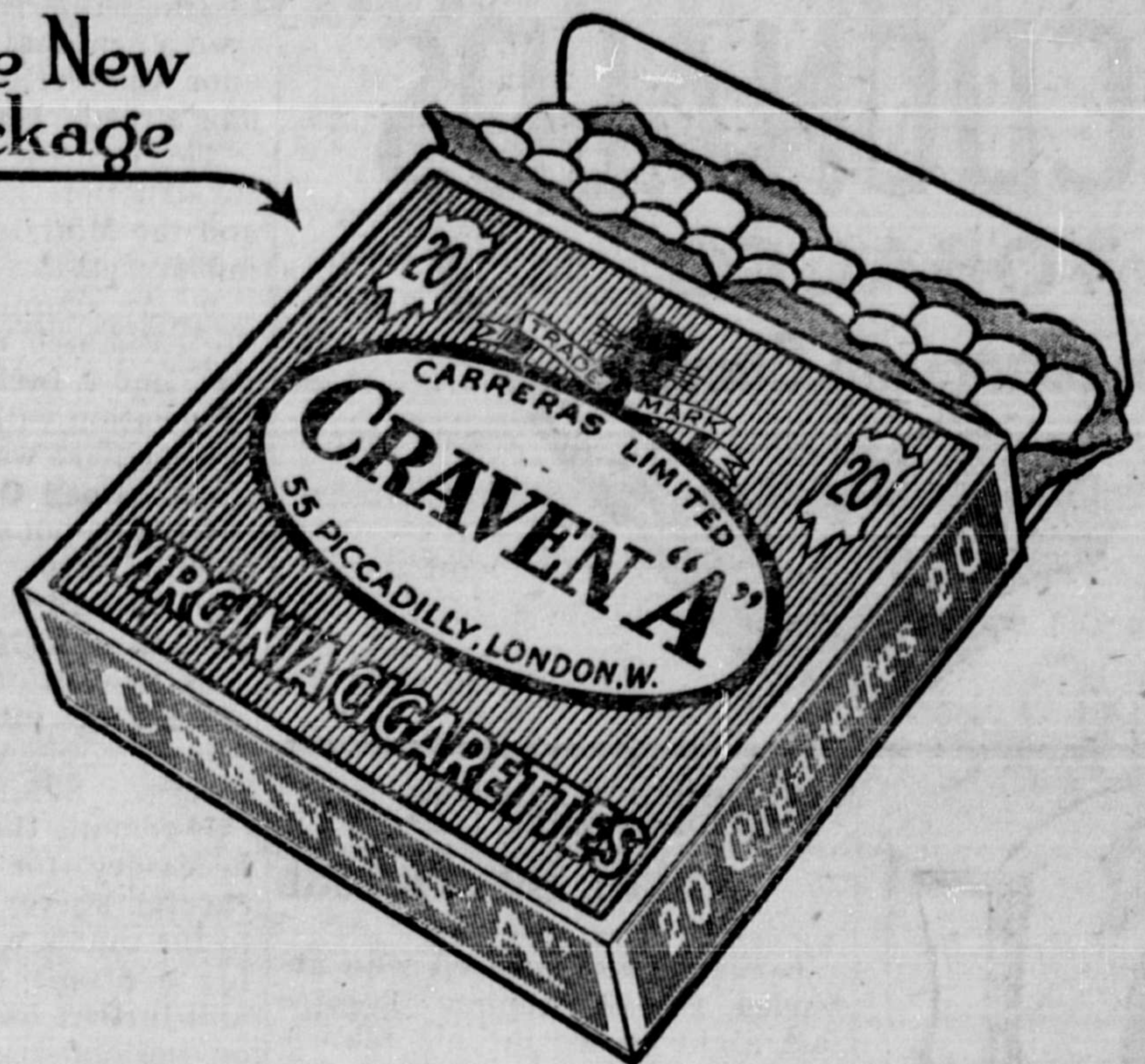

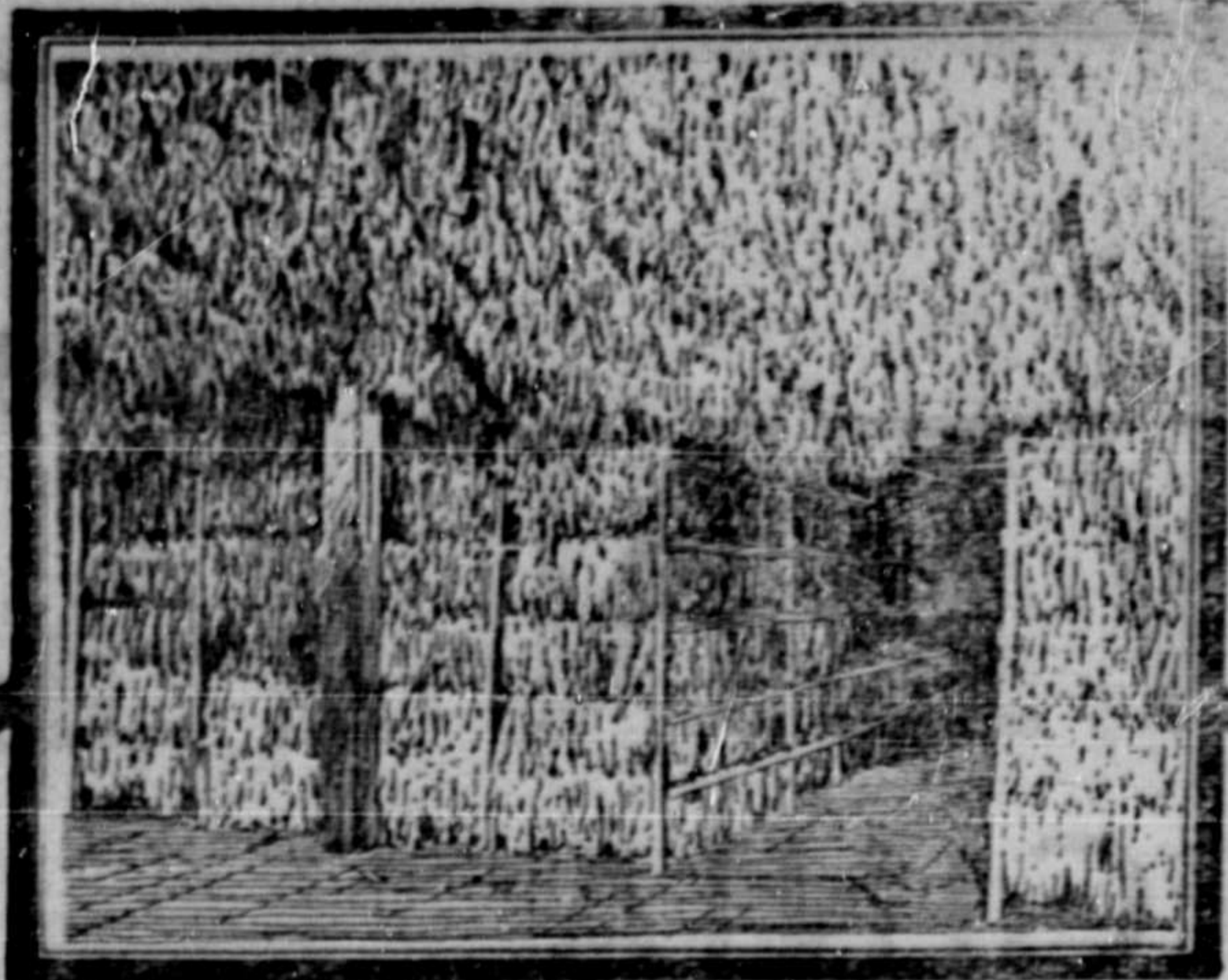

tion on the ground and the mat-
ter is now receiving the closest
attention of the Government.

Terrace Bridge.

8 Strong and forcible repre-
sentation was made by your dele-
gation for the construction of the
Terrace bridge with a view to
opening up some 100,000 acres of
good timber, agricultural and
horticultural land in the Lakelse
Valley, and many of the ministers
were privately interviewed with a
view to obtaining their individual
support. Everything possible was
done by your delegation with a
view to having this work under-
taken, and it was thought further
advisable that the town of Terrace
send a personal delegation to wait
upon the Premier—which action
has already been taken.

The outlook for securing this
construction is very promising,
and the Minister of Lands is do-
ing everything possible to assist.
9. An amount will be placed in
the estimates for a new ferry at
Usk, and a further additional ap-
propriation will also be placed for
development work in that district.

Road Out of City.

10. The construction of a road
leading from Prince Rupert to
Port Edward for extension beyond
was also ably represented by
your delegation, but on account
of lack of information nothing
definite could be obtained in this
respect. Before the Government
can commit themselves it will be
necessary for them to make a
careful survey of the road line
to the rapids with a view to locat-
ing a proper crossing, and they
will further have to get estimates
on the construction of a bridge.
The Minister of Lands has prom-
ised to have this attended to.

In the Matter of a Smelter

11. Your delegation had a very
agreeable interview with the Hon.
Mr. Sloan, Minister of Mines, who
gave us a very careful hearing
and who displayed the greatest
enthusiasm in the mining devel-
opment of this district. He thor-
oughly realizes the fact that his
Government should grant us every
assistance as we are primarily a
mining district, and with this
end in view he intends to come
north this summer and make a
personal survey of the entire dis-
trict with a view to determining
what our wants really are. Your
delegation made strong represen-
tation to him for a smelter to be
located at or near Prince Rupert
this spring—the central point of
the district. I submit a resolu-
tion which was forwarded south
to the Honorable the Premier last
night, copies having been sent
to all the ministers. In this con-
nection I may say that Mr. Cloth-
ier, the district mining engineer,
was given a copy of this petition,
which he forwarded south last
night with the strongest recom-
mendations that he could make.

Stewart Roads.

Representation was made to
the minister of mines relative to
improvement of roads in Stewart
mining district, and as the esti-
mates will carry certain reserva-
tions for this work we are assured
by him that every possible as-
sistance will be given in this re-
spect.

In closing, I think it but proper
that favorable comments should
be made on the untiring assis-
tance which the Minister of Lands
gave your delegation. He was
with us every time in strong sup-
port of every question raised, and
made it possible for us to get very
favorable interviews with other
ministers.

FORM BRANCH

PRINCE RUPERT

Fishermen's Protective Association Being Organized and Charter Applied for.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VANCOUVER, Feb. 7.—It is proposed to form a branch of the British Columbia Fishermen's Protective Association at Prince Rupert. Organizers will visit that port in the near future and it is expected that there will be a fairly large membership there. Up to the present the organization has not been incorporated but steps are now being taken to secure a Dominion charter. The aims of the organization are to foster the industry, to secure the employment of white fishermen, and especially those with British affiliations, and also to make it contributory to the establishment of a strong naval reserve on this coast. The association will also try to help create a market for fish products.

METHODIST MARINE MISSION FOR COAST

This to Be Included in Proposals in National Campaign For Funds.

Ten dollars per member is the National Campaign objective of British Columbia Methodism. Approximately 15,200 members are to be canvassed for \$150,000 during the week, February 9-14. This follows out the apportionment for the Dominion, 400,000 Methodists being expected to contribute for extension purposes \$4,000,000.

One of the projects which has caught the imagination of the whole church, according to reports from the east, is the Marine Mission which is to be operated along the Pacific Coast. The successful campaign in the Japanese missions at the Coast is being used extensively for publicity purposes throughout the Dominion.

Strong Leaders.

In raising its share of the church's objective, British Columbia has the advantage of strong leaders. Toronto is relying on the wealthy of the church capital, the city being out to raise \$850,000 of the conference's \$1,100,000 objective. Saskatchewan has the inspiration of Brock, the first circuit in the whole country to pass its objective and "keep going."

Not even Toronto can boast more successful conventions than Vancouver, although the eastern city has contributed many of the leading Victory Loan campaigners to the Methodist National Campaign.

Other Objectives.

Some of the conference objectives are as follows: Alberta, \$205,000, Saskatchewan \$300,000, Manitoba \$350,000, London \$550,000, Hamilton \$600,000, Bay of Quinte \$360,000. The province of Ontario is counted on for \$2,800,000.

LITTLE CRIME IN PAST MONTH

Chief of Police Had a Satisfactory Report for Commission.

The chief of police presented his report for the month of January at the meeting of the Police Commission yesterday morning. The report shows a notable decrease in crime in the city. Also many undesirables have been forced out of town with its consequent effect on the peace and order of the city. Despite this, there are a few annoying cases of questionable persons but action is going to be taken against them immediately with a view to getting rid of them. One in particular seems to be fighting the ends of justice.

There was \$502 collected during the month in fines. Twenty-seven cases came up and 14 convictions were made. Considering the number of convictions the amount collected in fines is very satisfactory. There were 6 cases under the drug act with 1 conviction, 2 convictions out of 4 prohibition cases, 2 charges of keeping disorderly houses and 1 conviction, while 1 charge of being an inmate of a disorderly house brought 1 conviction. Lack of evidence was responsible for the most of the withdrawals.

The report was received and filed.
