Montreal Gazette Comes Out Against Union Government

Conservative Organ says Party has "Filled its High Purpose" and has "Outlived its Usefulness;" New Party Is Proposed.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

MONTREAL, February 10.—Under the caption "The Political Situation," the Montreal Gazette, which has hitherto been a supporter of the Union Government, publishes an editorial advocating the establishment of a new political party, which shall coalesce and form into a dominant party "The political forces antagonistic to the fiscal policy of the United Farmers, as well as the pro-Union policy of the rump of the Liberals." The Gazette says in part: "Having filled its high purpose through the war with general acceptance and no mean measure of efficiency, the Government has manifested since the termination of hostilities a remarkable inaptitude to win and hold favor. The Union party is not united. It is a party that has outlived its usefulness."

Senator McLennan.

TORONTO, Feb. 10.—Senator J. S. McLennan of Sydney, N. S., and Ottawa, Conservative, has issued a manifesto looking to the formation of a new political party in Canada.

The manifesto is said to hold that national legislation and expenditure should be made for national ends, but that while the Government should be national, it must be recognized that it can be attained by the application of selected means to specify and local

COUNCIL IN FAVOR OF CANADIAN GOODS

On the recommendation of the National Manufacturers' Association the following resolution was adopted unanimously by the city council last night for the purpose of supporting the move to put Canadian goods on a more healthy basis:

"Resolved that this council endorse the principle that public supplies be purchased in Canada wherever they can be secured from Canadian factories reasonably. And, further, that all the municipal offices in making purchases shall be and hereby are requested to consider the importance of securing Canadian products."

BODY OF LATE MEMBER HOME

Last Rites for Respected Member for Atlin Will be Held Tomorrow Afternoon.

The funeral of the late Frank H. Mobley, M. L. A., will take place tomorrow afternoon under the auspices of Tyee Lodge No. 66, A. F. & A. M. A preliminary service will be held at the Masonic Hall at 1:30 and following that the service at the church will take place, Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant officiating. If the weather is fine a procession of Masons in full regalia will follow the body to the graveside in Fairview Cemetery where the last rites will be performed.

Yesterday afternoon the body arrived from Victoria on the Princess Mary, accompanied by the son of the deceased, Harry, and his business partner, D. G. Stewart. The body is now lying at the family home on Fourth Avenue. Many floral tributes arrived with the remains yesterday afternoon from friends in the south. Mrs. Troughton, sister of the deceased, and wife of Dr. Troughton, ship surgeon on the "Empress of Japan," also arrived for the funeral accompanied by her son.

At 5 o'clock on Friday afternoon a funeral service was held over the body at Victoria, Rev. J. G. Inkster officiating. There was a large attendance, including members of the cabinet, W. J. Bowser, leader of the opposition, representatives of the civil service staff, Queen City Chapter and Victoria Chapter, O. E. S., the Nazarene Shrine of the White Shrine of Jerusalem, and many other organizations. The president of the Victoria Liberal Association was also in attendance.

The pallbearers were Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Dr. Sutherland, M. L. A., W. R. Ross, M. L. A., James Schofield, M. L. A., John Yorston, M. L. A., and D. G. Stewart. The session of the legislature on Friday afternoon was a short one and nearly every member was present at the ceremony.

Wants Provincial Shipping Policy

Member for Islands Riding Objects to U.S. Control; Jones of Okanagan Would Stop Oriental Immigration.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VICTORIA, February 10.—A Provincial Government shipping policy, under which this province could export lumber and other natural products to foreign markets and not as now, be subject to dictation from San Francisco and Seattle shipping interests, was urged by M. P. Jackson, Liberal member for the Islands riding in the Legislature yesterday.

Mr. Jackson made a plea for the conservation of the timber wealth of the country, claiming that Canada was annually culling more than nature was annually replacing.

A provincial scheme of land clearing was also advocated by the member for the Islands.

Representations to the Dominion Government to the end that Oriental immigration into the province should be stopped, was urged by J. W. Jones, Conservative member for South Okanagan, who declared the Chinese, Japanese, and East Indians were rapidly acquiring large land holdings and by their system of cheap Oriental labor acquiring an important position in the agricultural industry, one that will become dominant, he feared, unless steps were taken to prevent it.

It was decided at last night's council meeting to extend the city telephone system to the drydock and Section 2. The putting in of a permanent line to the drydock will cost \$600 and to Section 2 \$1,500.

Weston Coyney, publisher of "Resources," has asked the city council for a position as publicity commissioner of the city. Mr. Coyney pointed out in his communication to the council last night that on getting out his high class magazine he was already fulfilling the duties of a publicist, commissioner only without salary. His application for such a position was referred to the finance committee for report at next Monday night's council meeting.

The incorporation of the Stewart Mercantile Company, Limited, is listed in this week's issue of the B. C. Gazette. The new company is to take over the business of the present Stewart Trading Co. It is capitalized with \$20,000 divided into 2,000 shares. G. E. Austin is associated with the company which will carry on a general business. The head office is at Vancouver and the business is carried on at Stewart.

ESQUIMALT AND VANCOUVER GET CASH FOR DOCK

Amounts included in Dominion Government Estimates Prepared for Submission to Parliament.

OTTAWA, Feb. 10.—Public works estimates to total approximately \$21,000,000 have been prepared for submission to Parliament. These estimates include provision for a dock at Esquimalt and at Vancouver, the contract for which is still being held up and has not yet been awarded.

MULLEN-ERB CASE AGAIN UP IN COURT

Commission Appointed to Take Evidence in Montreal, Pittsburgh and New York.

FURTHER SECURITY FOR COSTS ASKED

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VANCOUVER, Feb. 10.—Judge Morrison yesterday granted an application of the Mullen interests in the Erb-Mullen case for commission to examine certain witnesses in Montreal, Pittsburgh and New York. The commission will operate from February 19 and the evidence will be returned by March 22.

The Erb interests made no objection to the appointment of the commission.

Judge Morrison is considering application made by the Mullen interests for a further security costs from Erb, the former of \$200 granted by Judge Morrison being considered inadequate.

When allotments of \$2,500 each Alex. Macdonald and G. T. C. Mills were granted last night under the Soldiers' Housing Act the cost of the fund for Rupert was set up with the exception of \$2,000. In granting these loans was also required by the committee that the contractors erecting the houses put up bonds to the full value of the house to guarantee proper construction.

From an enquiry he made last night, Alderman Dybbavn elicited the fact that the Finance Committee is dealing with the question of having the position of city auditor on a more satisfactory basis.

Martial Law in Kentucky Over Attempt to Lynch a Lexington Negro Murderer

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LEXINGTON, Ky., Feb. 10.—Lexington and all of Lafayette County was placed under martial law yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock by Grig. Gen. Marshal.

The rioting began yesterday morning when a mob, bent upon lynching William Lockett, a negro who confessed to the murder of ten-year-old Geneva Hardman, was fired upon with rifles and machine guns by the state militiamen as the mob was storming the Lafayette county court house to get the negro during his trial.

J. M. Rogers, a farmer of Woodford County, was shot by the guardsmen during the fighting. He died from injuries received, bringing the death list to five.

Martial law still prevails here. Six hundred federal and state troops are patrolling the streets to prevent further rioting. The city is quiet but the authorities fear a recurrence of the violence. Five hundred additional state

troops are en route from the camp at Taylor, Ky.

Lockett was found guilty by the jury of murder in the first degree and was sentenced to die in the electric chair on March 11.

The shooting temporarily dispersed the mob and gave the authorities time to rush Lockett to a secret place of safety. The mob then formed again and looted pawnshops and hardware stores to get firearms.

Promise of Great Interest in Fishing.

Authorities say that the outlook in the fishing industry at this port is unusually good. Many of the well known skippers and others are preparing to move to this port to live in order to escape paying the fifteen per cent exchange on the money they earn here. This means that Prince Rupert will become the permanent home of more fishermen.

There will be a large increase in the number of fishing boats operating from this port. A number of boats have been built locally and also in the south boats are being outfitted for fishing, making this their headquarters.

On the whole the outlook is good for a busy season. People in the East are making enquiries, the Government is proposing to start returned men in the business, and everywhere the interest in Prince Rupert's great staple industry is growing.

Hard on Waterfront Industries.

The assessments have been increased on the waterfront properties this year. As the rentals on the properties are calculated at six per cent on the assessed values, it seems that the raise of fifty per cent in the assessment means an increase of fifty per cent in the amount of rent the lessees will have to pay in addition to the increase in taxation. This is so large an increase that it will almost put some of the industries out of business.

We want industries in Prince Rupert and the last thing to be done is to try to handicap them. The waterfront properties are simply water rights. The wharves have to be built by the lessees and also to be kept up by them. For that reason alone it looks as if a fifty per cent jump in their rent and taxes is out of all proportion to the values, especially at a time when there is an outcry for lower assessments.

Restrict Export of B. C. Raw Materials.

Sir Lomer Gouin announced recently that there was a possibility of further restrictions on the export of pulp and pulpwood from the province of Quebec. He urged that the natural resources of the province should be exploited at home.

A similar condition exists in British Columbia to that in Quebec. Efforts are being made to carry away all the raw materials from the province to supply American factories. The ores and the pulp, are in great demand in the States, but they should all be finished in British Columbia. If the present attempts to carry everything away continues, there will be an agitation in this province to have it stopped.

There are all the facilities in this province for paper mills and for smelters and refineries. There is no desire to handicap existing industries, but British Columbia interests must be considered first. We cannot have the natural products of this country exploited for the benefit of some other country. We are glad to have Americans here, we like to see the color of their money, we like them as a people, but they must treat us right. If they take our ore, they must put it through as many of the processes as possible in Canada.

An examination for Rangers in the Forest Branch of the Lands Department will be held in the Court House, Prince Rupert, on March 3rd, 1920.

Applications to take examination will be received up to the day of examination by the District Forester, Prince Rupert, from whom application forms may be obtained. All statements made by applicants as to experience, education and fitness are subject to verification by Examination Board.

First Performance of "The Magistrate" was Well Received by Crowded House. Repeated Tonight.

And even today people are still laughing about the humor of "The Magistrate."
The play was good from start to finish. There was not a dull moment. Everyone who attended, and the house was packed, was pleased at the result. Those responsible for the event must have been well content with the way in which their efforts had succeeded.
The story resolves itself around a bit of deception and is designed to show how dangerous it is to vary from the exact truth. Mrs. somewhat elderly police magis-Posket has recently married a lrate but has falsified her age, taking off five years. Her son who really is nineteen years of age, she introduces as a boy in knickers, only fourteen, caressed and played with by the girls wherever he goes. It is not necessary to say more to show what complications may arise.

The Parts.
As Police Magistrate, J. Stuart Pudney is really splendid. His is the leading part and he carries it off as one to the manner born. It would be difficult to imagine the play with a less efficient Mr. Posket.

Agatha Posnet, wife of the magistrate, was portrayed most ably by Mrs. Bowness. Her enunciation is particularly good and the part was efficiently taken.
Miss Cheston as Miss Verinder, the girl who was always hungry, acted the part to perfection, although sometimes she lacked confidence somewhat and did not speak as loud as those in the back seats would have liked. Her acting however, was first rate.

Love Crept In.
There were times during the love scenes when Rip Boyd and Miss Kemp could not be heard at the back of the theatre, but the two as Cis Farlington and Beatrice Tomlinson were a scream. Cis, as the incorrigible fourteen year old lad, whom his mother thought perfect, and who eventually led the magistrate astray carried off the part to perfection. Beattie, the demure little music teacher, was a delight and both make love as if experienced in the art.

George Dunham was really fine as Capt. Horace Vale and with W. E. Fisher, as Colonel Lukin, and A. H. Gee, as Mr. Bullamy, another magistrate, the list of heavy parts is pretty well exhausted. Achilles Blond, proprietor of the Hotel de France, had a proper, lordly appearance and Mr. Dalziel, as Isidore the waiter, kept up the proper Frenchified tone of the place.

George Hill made an excellent Wormington, clerk of the court, and Inspector, Messiter and Sergeant Lugg were well portrayed by J. F. Maguire and Jack Frost.

The Servants.
Popham and Wyke, maid and butler respectively, were most important parts, and they were well taken. Mrs. Duncan could not have improved the character of the servant girl and Frank Moore looked and played the part of the butler in side whiskers to perfection. Pat Burke did well as Constable Harris.

There were some complaints of the long waits between acts, but this will probably be set right tonight. Yesterday was really the first occasion on which all the stage properties had been used and the result was wonderful. The organizers and the director must have been wonderfully pleased at the result of the first performance. The audience certainly was.

Four Good Reasons for a National Forward Movement

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on Him should not perish but have everlasting life."

DESPITE the four years' fury of War, and the year of uncertainty just ended, the people of Canada have prospered. Yet, spiritual glories revealed to us in the great Conflict are being clouded by drifts of class-hostility, mutual suspicion and cynical materialism.

The world is troubled. Old conceptions are giving place to new. Yet, the Kingdom of God remains, firmly grounded on the great principle of love. It has the one remedy for a world diseased:—"Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved."

Five Christian Communions—Anglican, Baptist, Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian—call their various constituencies and the whole nation to a livelier and more sacrificial Christianity. They are making a great financial appeal. It is fitting that the public should know the reasons.

1 The Decline of the Dollar

The sharp rise in prices the world over has affected injuriously the position of every man working for a fixed salary. Missionaries are in this category. Stipends that were ample in 1900, and nearly adequate in 1912, are utterly insufficient in 1920. There has been no general increase in these stipends. There cannot be, until the Canadian people scale-up their giving to balance the decline in purchasing-power of the Canadian dollar.

International exchange has been unstable. Money for export has been subject to heavy discounts. In view also of the increased cost of materials and of labor, any new building programme abroad has been out of the question. But the need for new buildings is imperative. Some missionaries are living in clay-floored huts.

New Standards are Necessary

The Anglican Synods, the Baptist Conventions, the Congregational Union, the Methodist Conferences, and the Presbyterian General Assembly, have set new standards for the salaries of Clergymen actively engaged in Canada. But, for the Missionaries, and for the Superannuated Ministers, no increases have been possible.

One of the aims of the Forward Movement is to show the fine-spirited, generous, Christian people of Canada that the old standards of giving for Missions must be revised. It is impossible to maintain existing stations, even on a pre-War basis, without more men and much more revenue.

2 The Call from Abroad

Coincident with this financial difficulty, new and glorious opportunities for the extension of Christian teaching have appeared. In India, literally millions of "outcastes" are pleading for Missionary preachers and doctors. In China, a new National spirit has been born. Missionary teachers are urgently required to help formulate the National system of education. Hospitals, Missionary nurses, doctors and dentists, are heartily welcomed by the people. From Japan, Africa and the Islands of the Sea, comes the same story.

3 The Home Responsibility

Here in Canada, the work of evangelizing Indians and Eskimos must now be undertaken wholly by the Canadian Church. The rapid growth of our cities, the expansion of the West, the great immigration of the last twenty years, and the depopulation of rural areas, make a four-fold problem which can be solved only by radical readjustments of policy and greatly increased resources of men and money.

4 The Pressure on the Colleges

Finally, the decline of the dollar has created difficulties in financing the Colleges and Universities established and maintained for the training of the Clergy. Last year, one College which had been able before the War barely to subsist, faced an additional charge for coal alone of \$1600. All other expenditures have risen in like proportion. Christianity has been the mother of Higher Education. A thoroughly trained Ministry is the great need of the times.

The men of faith, filled with the Holy Ghost, who proclaim the Gospel story by the frozen Coppermine, beneath the cone of Fujiyama, along the banks of the Yangtse and the Ganges are the product of our Canadian Colleges. There the Vision first appeared to them. The Church must stand behind these institutions.

The Unity of Faith and Prayer

These are the facts. Faced with such conditions, the Church leaders, at first, were appalled. They went to their knees, first in separate denominational groups, then in company. Putting aside for the time being differences of religious temperament, considering only their common belief in the Everlasting Father, the Almighty Son, and the everpresent Holy Ghost, they prayed together. Then they arose, thrilled with a glimpse of the wonderful Missionary opportunity, to appeal together to the whole body of Christians in Canada.

The Greatest of All Gifts

You are a believer in the Lord Jesus Christ, and in the Gospel He proclaimed. Your country has become great through Christianity. The hope and love of the Gospel have warmed your heart and illumined your life.

Next week you will be asked by the representatives of your Church to show practical proof of your convictions. Be prepared—not to give a trifle out of your abundance, but to taste the full sweetness of Sacrifice.



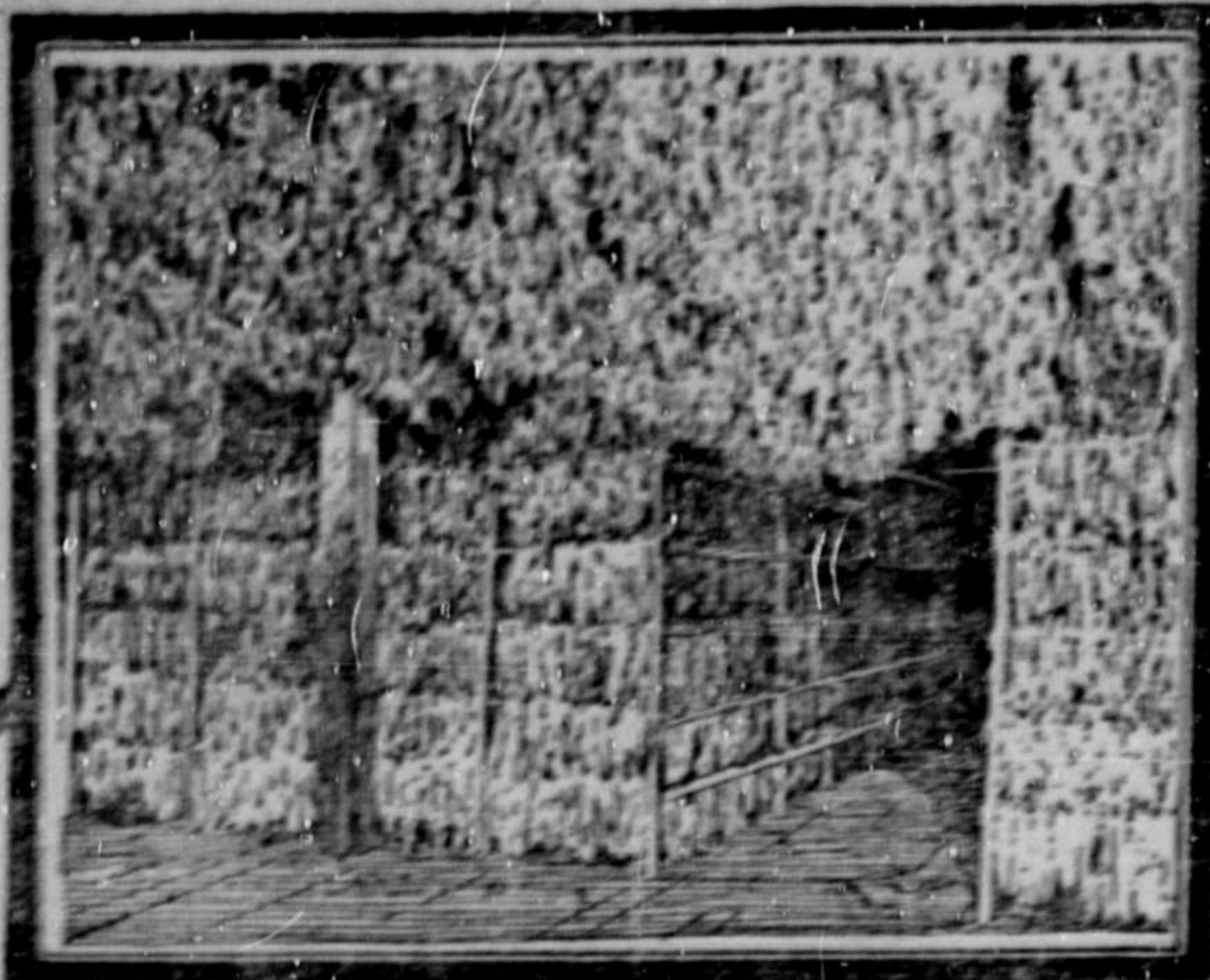
