Nationalization of Mines is Discussed in British House

Lloyd George Says Miners Federation Really Wants Control of Industry Which would be a Misfortune to Country.

Labor Leader Defends the Proposed Policy in Speech

Declared it would not mean Formation of a Bureaucracy as Charged by Leader of the Government; Sure To Come.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, Feb. 12.—Discussing the nationalization of mines which was brought forward by resolution in the House of Commons yesterday by William Brice of the Miners' Federation, Premier Lloyd George definitely stated his opposition to such a step. He said it would discourage industry and it would be impossible to have nationalization without forming a bureaucracy. What the Miners' Federation really wanted was full control of the coal industry, and that to hand it over thus would be disastrous to commerce and a misfortune to the miners themselves. Brice, who was the first speaker when the debate on the speech from the throne was resumed, contended that the miners had been led to suppose that the Government would accept the recommendations of the coal commission. He declared that nationalization would not mean a bureaucracy. The Government might delay nationalization but, he predicted, it would not prevent nationalization coming.

RAILWAYMEN SUBMIT CASE TO PRESIDENT

Director General of Railways Fails to Reach Agreement With Employees.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Failure to reach an agreement with representatives of more than 2,000,000 railway employees on demands for increased wages, Director General Hines decided to submit the whole case to President Wilson for decision.

An appeal to the president is to be taken at the request of the union leaders after they had conferred with Mr. Hines for two hours and after he had informed them there was no hope of an agreement under present conditions.

NUMBER DIE IN TORONTO

Influenza Claims Total of 292 Victims Since Beginning of Year.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

TORONTO, Feb. 12.—Influenza raging throughout the province of Ontario, few sections having escaped the epidemic. In the cities the affection is spreading rapidly. All lines of business and every profession is affected and school attendance is gradually lessening in every city and town.

There have been 138 deaths from influenza direct and 154 from pneumonia in Toronto since the first of January, a total of 292. Yesterday there were 17 deaths from influenza and 15 from pneumonia.

MAYNARD CASE GETS AIRING

Wife Claims that Husband Drove Her Into Street—Is Leaving Town.

The Maynard case was given another airing in the police court this morning when Mrs. Maynard appeared in the police court charged with vagrancy and being a common prostitute. According to the evidence given by Constable McGlinchey in the box this morning he was taken to the Muchida Rooms last night by E. Maynard, husband of the accused where he found the woman in Room 4 with another man. He arrested and took her to the station.

E. H. Maynard, husband of the accused, stated that his wife had left his house saying that she had others who would keep her as well as he could. He had inquired since about her from her father who had said that she was going to Ketchikan. Maynard claimed that his wife was mixing up indiscriminately with every "Tom, Dick and Harry," in town.

Mrs. Maynard then gave her tearful story. She had left home about a month ago following a quarrel with her husband over a post card. She believed that all this trouble was a frame-up between her husband and his friends. She had met the man in question last Saturday, not knowing he was married. He had coaxed her to go to his place and this was the first man she had been mixed up with since leaving her husband. She was going to Ketchikan. She claimed she had been good to her husband but he had told her to take her children and go into the street.

The magistrate remarked the serious nature of the trouble and remanded the case till 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

John Currie, a rancher who has recently been employed as ship's carpenter at the Drydock passed away in the General Hospital on Tuesday afternoon. International Conference On Finance Is Considered; United States is Obstacle

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, February 12.—J. Austen Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, announced here that the Government was willing to participate in an international financial conference if invited by one of the neutral nations or by the League of Nations, on being satisfied that the conference would assume a really representative character.

The announcement was made in reply to a recent memorial from bankers and others.

The Daily Chronicle said that the Government wished to make it absolutely clear that in the event of Great Britain's participation the Government could not support or take a share in any scheme involving an addition to the liabilities of Great Britain for expenditures in the United States.

Mr. Chamberlain agreed that the inference drawn by the authors of the memorial was not exaggerated. He declared the attitude of the United States Government was a matter of first importance, as it seemed doubtful whether the United States participation could be attained, and this must gravely influence the utility of such a conference.

Drink Question Down For Legislative Action In Great Britain This Year

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, February 12.—The drink question was briefly discussed in both houses of Parliament yesterday. Earl Curzon told the House of Lords that a bill on the subject to be introduced would contain provision for shorter hours of sale. The experiment of state management would not be dropped, he said.

In the House of Commons the subject was alluded to by Sir Donald Maclean. "The fact that America has gone dry is an economic fact of the gravest importance to Great Britain," he said. He declared the British expenditure for drink absolutely staggered him. The country spent more than £164,000,000 for drink in 1914 and this expenditure increased steadily until it was £259,000,000 in 1918. It was estimated that the expenditure for the year ending March 31 next would be nearly £400,000,000.

PATTULLO WILL ACT FOR ATLIN

While District is Without Member He will Be Glad to Look After Its Interests.

The following telegram was received this morning from Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands and member for this district:

"Realizing that your paper has a considerable circulation in the district of Atlin I would ask you to announce to the people of that constituency that, on account of the death of the late member I shall be glad to receive representation from anyone in Atlin District at any time and to, in the meantime, do everything I can to further the interests of the district."

DEFINES POWERS OF HUNGARIAN REGENT

BUDAPEST, Feb. 11.—Legislation defining the powers of the temporary regent, who is to be appointed by the Hungarian Government, is being drafted. The object of the law is to prevent the regent from usurping the throne.

VOTE \$20,000,000 SHIP CONSTRUCTION

OTTAWA, Feb. 11.—To complete the ships under construction for the Canadian Government, Parliament will, it is understood, be asked to vote \$20,000,000 at the approaching session.

Strongly Opposed Home Rule Proposal

Hon. Arthur Henderson Says Labor not Be Party to Withholding Symbol of National and Political Liberty From Ireland.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, February 12.—"Labor will take no part in another betrayal of Ireland and will not acquiesce in any policy of further withholding from the Irish people the symbol of national and political liberty," Arthur Henderson, labor leader, said today.

Commenting on Premier Lloyd George's speech in the House of Commons, in which he expressed the intention of bringing up his new Irish Home Rule Bill during the present session of parliament, Henderson asserted that the Premier's plan did not have a single friend in Ireland. Lloyd George's program will not solve the Irish problem, he asserted.

WATERFRONT ASSESSMENT ON APPEAL

Court Hearing Cases Today in City Hall—Many Witnesses.

The Court of Revision, consisting of Mayor McClymont (chairman), Aldermen McLennan, Rochester, Casey and Perry, held its third session this morning when the business of the court was actually commenced. Yesterday adjournment was made out of respect to the late Frank H. Mobley, M.L.A., whose funeral was then taking place. Secretary Woods and Assessor Clements were also present.

The business this morning was entirely a discussion of waterfront assessment, arising from the first case on the list, that of Lot 1, Section 1, Block F, belonging to Akerberg & Thomson. The persons giving evidence were D. Thomson, W. E. Williams, Capt. H. B. Babington, W. E. Fisher, M. P. McCaffery and L. W. Patmore.

The main point taken was that the fifty per cent increase not only increased their taxes fifty per cent, but owing to the terms of their lease it raised the amount they must pay the railway company as rental fifty per cent. The lessees say they have to spend a lot of money before the property has any value at all.

The case is continuing this afternoon and should be decided today.

FAMOUS JINGLE POT COAL MINE CLOSED

Has Produced 800,000 Tons of Coal Since Opening.

NANAIMO, February 11.—The famous Jinglepot coal mine closed for good yesterday. Although but 71 acres in area, since 1907 it has produced 800,000 tons.

VANCOUVER TO SINGAPORE

New Service to be Instituted About End of Week by Dollar Company.

The first ship on the New York-Vancouver-Orient run of the company will be the Grace Dollar from New York on April 12.

GENERAL WRANGLE WILL SUPERSEDE GENERAL DENIKINE

BUDAPEST, Feb. 12.—General Denikine will be superseded in active command of anti-Bolshevik forces on the Southern Russian front by the thirty-year-old General Wrangle.

Gen. Wrangle's Cossacks have been long the backbone of the resistance to the Bolsheviks.

ANOTHER QUAKE FELT IN MEXICO

Shock Was Felt at Victoria Seismograph—Centre Believed Vera Cruz.

VICTORIA, Feb. 12.—An earthquake, estimated at 2,600 miles distant from Victoria, was registered yesterday, the record continuing for nearly two hours. It is believed to be centred near Vera Cruz in Southern Mexico.

Smelt Iron Ores
In this Province.

F. A. Pauline, member for Saanich in the Provincial Legislature, has been advocating the establishment of iron smelting and steel works in this province. Naturally he is interested in Victoria and neighborhood, and thinks the smelter should be established there to handle the Texada Island and Port Renfrew ores. We should have a different opinion.

Mr. Pauline says he visited the Steel Smelters Co. at Seattle which is smelting British Columbia ores. The ores treated are magnetite and the electric process is in use. In the Legislature he showed samples of the iron after being treated.

The member for Saanich promised during the last election that he would do his best to secure the establishment of a smelter in British Columbia and he has been after it ever since. He is one of the quiet members of the House, but he is very keen and enthusiastic and does not chase anything that looks like a mirage. He has to be shown.

Verbal Battles
Are Out of Date.

The combative Premier and the aggressive Leader of the Opposition have got into a verbal and point of order clash quite early in the session of the Legislature, says the Victoria Colonist. The thirst of Mr. Bowser for information that will enlighten the public is consuming, while Hon. John Oliver entertains a chronic belief that his opponent seeks for nothing except data from which to base assaults upon the Government. These political manoeuvres call up memories of the old days before the events of the war tore up cherished traditions by the roots and played havoc with the "established orders," political, social, commercial and industrial. Then when an editor entered upon his daily grind barren of ideas upon subjects of discourse for the enlightenment and entertainment of his readers, he always could double-shot his guns, port his helm and discharge broadsides into the battered hulk of his esteemed contemporary of the day or swipe at the unoffending head of the then premier or leader of the opposition. And it is a fact past understanding now that the readers of the press of that day enjoyed the performance. The fiercer the assault, the keener their appreciation of it.

Pauline Adopts
The Newer Method.

The moral of this appears to be that our political leaders are not quite up to date in their ideas and methods. Many of the old systems have passed away, to be succeeded by conditions to which leaders and representatives of the people must bow or be broken. In a restricted sense the exchanges between Mr. Bowser and Mr. Oliver are entertaining, and possibly they have their uses in the transaction of public business. But we question whether the remarks of F. A. Pauline, the modest representative of Saanich, delivered in the House yesterday, were not considered of more importance to the Province than the utterances of either. Mr. Pauline had news to impart that threw light upon a subject upon which most of the people were in the dark, and suggestions to make vital to future progress and prosperity. He announced that steel of the finest quality was being made in Seattle from the magnetite iron ores of the Province, and that the process of refinement was electrical. And he had an exhibit on his desk to prove his assertion. For the present that is all that is necessary to say on the subject.

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ALICE ARM HAS GREAT ACTIVITY

Work Continues Steadily Right Through Winter Season on Many Properties.

MUCH ACTIVITY WILL MARK COMING OF SPRING

ALICE ARM, Feb. 12.—Despite the fact that winter has the district in its grip at the present time, winter activity this year is many times greater than ever before in the history of the camp. There are nearly 100 men steadily employed in mining operations alone, 40 of these working on the Dolly Varden mine which is shipping on the average of 2½ tons per day to the beach by dog team and horses for shipment to the Selby smelter at San Francisco. Besides the ore being actually shipped the dump is increasing and by the time trains are again in operation there will be plenty of ore to keep them all running at full capacity, making as many trips per day as possible.

Prospects Bright.
Prospects for the coming summer season are also very bright. The Taylor Engineering Co. have recently started camp building at the Wolf mine for the installation of a water power compressor there and the railroad is to be extended from the Dolly Varden mine to the Wolf. Rumor has it that ore bunkers at the wharf are to be put in this season. A new steam compressor is being installed at the Dolly Varden mine besides the one already in operation there. The old gasoline compressor at the Dolly Varden is not used now, the two new ones being operated by oil burners.

North Star.
At the North Star mine a lot of good ore is ready to be taken out as soon as the Wolf extension is completed. Many other properties will also take on activity when this work is completed. Among these are the Toric, Tiger and Musketeer. On the two last mentioned claims the bondholders have at present men working proving up the properties. Other claims in the district show much promise and this summer should prove them up and make a number of new shippers.

Other Properties.
The Last Chance, belonging to Archie McPhail, is under bond to Price and Keith of New York, who are also interested in the Premier mine at Stewart. A diamond drill is working double shift on this property. After it is finished at the Last Chance the diamond drill will be moved to another claim, belonging to E. Pickett, which Crawford and Keith have also bonded. Development on a smaller scale is going on on the David Copperfield, Last Chance, Moose, Homestake, and Matilda claims.

Tunnel Contract.
A further contract for tunnel work on the Musketeer which has been sold by Al. Miner, Miles Donald, D. Cameron and J. Strombeck to J. D. Meenach of Seattle, has been let to A. McGuire. Already the tunnel is driven 100 feet but it is being continued with dispatch in order to have the mine a ready shipper when the Wolf extension is made. The mine is 40 feet above the railroad grade and is a most ideal shipping proposition.

Altogether, present activity is so great and the future is so bright that Alice Arm looks like a boom camp for the coming year and a season of great prosperity and increase in population is looked for.

Needless to say a most enjoyable time was spent, the party breaking up soon after one o'clock. Besides leaving, the raiders expressed themselves musically as to the unwitting host and hostess who had entered into the spirit of the occasion and done their best to add to the enjoyment of the evening.

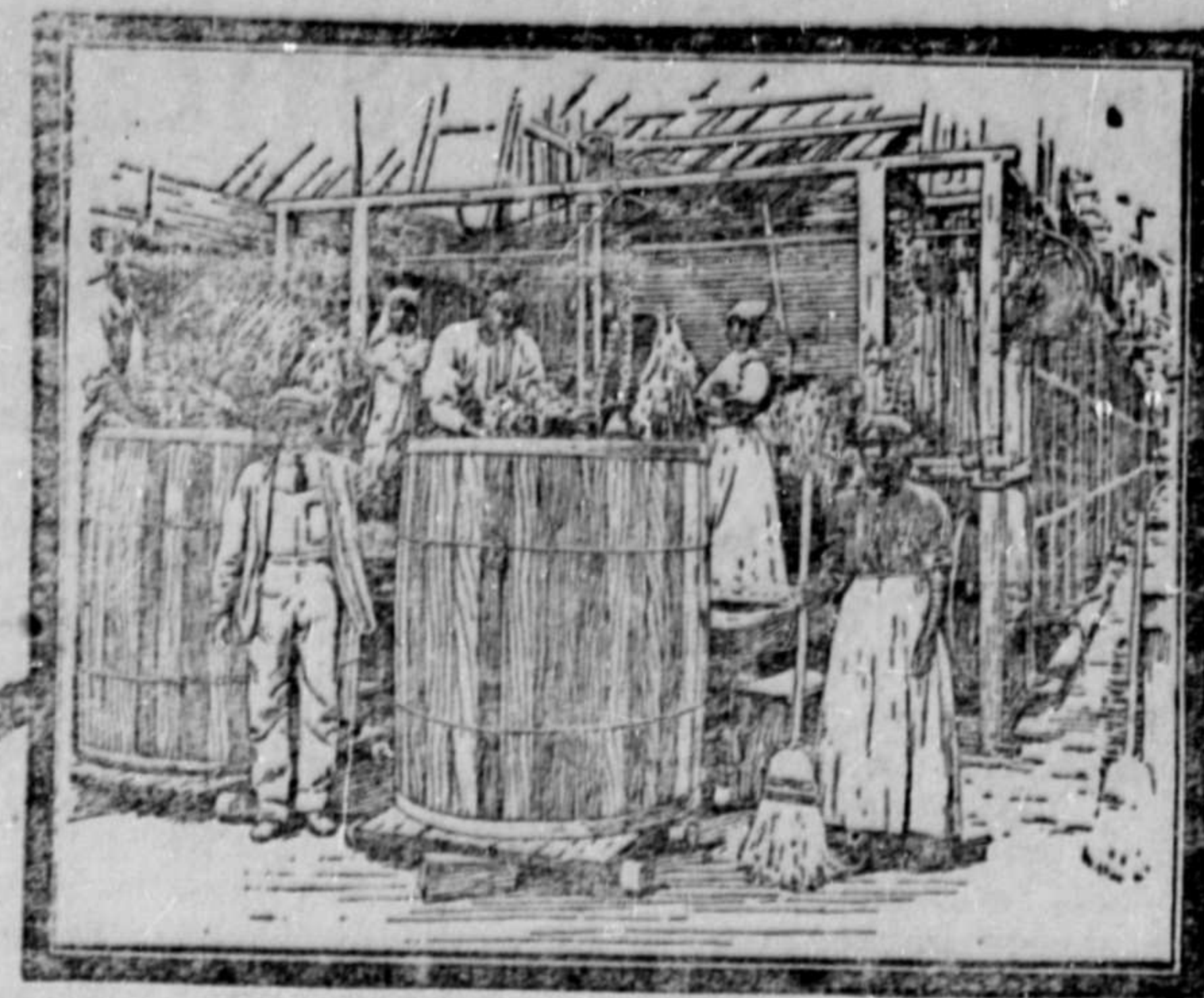

ONTARIO TO VOTE

Will Decide Whether Province to Be Bone Dry or as in B. C.

TORONTO, Feb. 11.—It has been decided to ask the Ontario Government to provide for a vote as to whether liquor may be legally imported from outside the province or not.

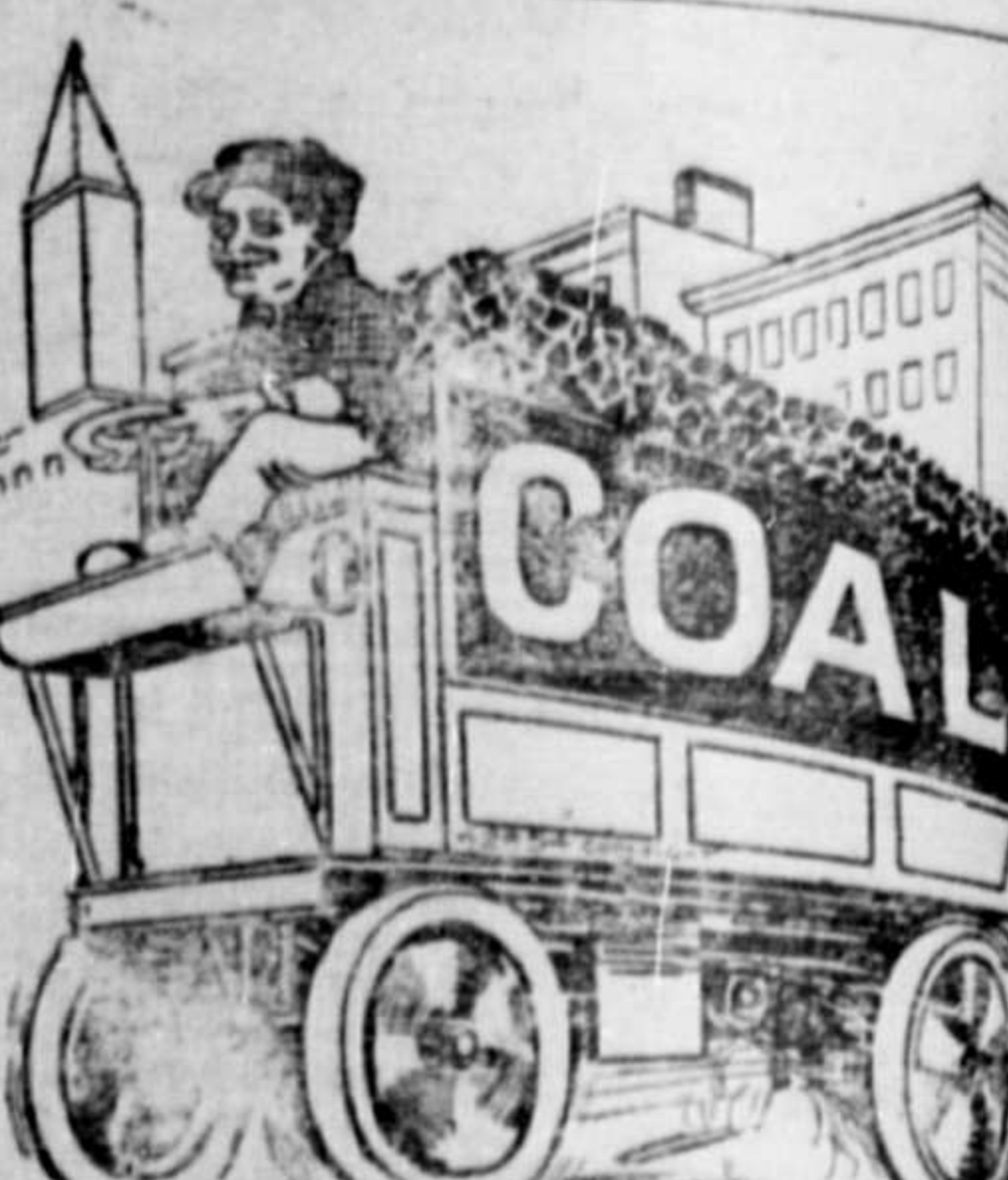

Sport Briefs

These balmy spring days bring back the hankering among the baseball fans to get up on the Aeropropolis or over on the Market Square and get the hypnotic sphere in action once more. However, one particularly bright noon day last week one of the fiends was sitting at lunch beside one of the local experts and the expert quickly dispersed his anticipations for anything immediate in the grand old game for he says they never start here before April. However, sporting gossip generally starts long before the actual performance and, indeed, baseball gossip is almost as interesting as the real old action with the rooting and cheering.

The same expert said that if we had a town team as excellent as we had last year we would be doing well. But there is no reason why we should not because our home-run king is still here and this last winter has kept himself in good form at basketball. On the same team is our star pitcher who also remains in good trim. Besides the members of last year's district conquerors there have been some new men come in who held enviable reputations here two or three years ago. So there seems to be no reason why the Prince Rupert team should not be as good as the aggregation that took 13 out of 16 games last year.

In this "man's town" active support of baseball financially should be given by the many people who are so interested in it. Ever since the first scrub teams were made up here ten years ago the burden of financing them has always fallen on one or two persons and now is the time for a change. There is no doubt that baseball is the most popular sport played here and that is sufficient reason why it should be given fair support. Divided among many the cost would be little, more interest would be taken in the games and the unfairness would be removed. Even though the same people who went hundreds of dollars out of pocket last year over it state they are willing to do the same thing this year, why should they?

An example might be taken from smaller towns in the district like Alice Arm and Anyox. At both these places there have been baseball clubs organized for several years. A membership fee is charged and a button is given out to all members. Besides being a financial assistance such organizations lend an "esprit de corps" to the community teams and have proven to be good successes in both places. They are organizing up there now. What is the matter with Prince Rupert?

We may look for a better brand of competition this coming season than we have ever had before. Stewart is a boom camp now and so is Alice Arm. Before this, the teams at both places have consisted of older men but now younger men from the cities are drifting in and among them are always to be found those who have played good ball in the larger towns. For this reason

Rupert will have to work harder to keep her laurels than ever before and it is very unlikely that Ketchikan will be the only Northern town that will prove a serious contender. Alice Arm, Anyox, Stewart, Hyder, Ocean Falls, Swanson Bay and Ketchikan may be expected to bring forth good rivals and form a regular Aurora Borealis League.
