Constable Arrested Disposing of Liquor

Simon Duff Charged in Police Court this Morning Before Magistrate Mc-Mordie and Bail is Allowed.

Simon V. Duff, a member of the city police force, was this morning charged in the police court before Magistrate McMordie with exposing for sale and offering to sell 24 double cases, 4 single cases and 12 bottles of liquor for the sum of \$5,000. Duff pleaded not guilty and the case was adjourned until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning and he is now out on \$1,000 bail of two sureties of \$500 each.

REDUCTIONS IN ASSESSMENT ON MARINE SITES

Court of Revision Made Concessions to Appellants—Assessment Down One Half.

The Court of Revision at its session yesterday afternoon made some rather drastic reductions in the assessment roll, especially on waterfront property. A feature of the sitting was an argument which took place between L. W. Patmore and W. E. Williams, city solicitor, over the powers of the Court in making equalization. City Clerk Woods pointed out that the only power the Court had in this regard was to make changes limited at 10 per cent.

Discussing the appeal for a reduction in waterfront assessment, Ald. McLennan, in opposing them, stated that Albert & McCaffery last year had made a large profit in business passing over their wharf. Mr. McCaffery in making his appeal stated that special inducements had been offered to the Prince Rupert Spruce Mills and he felt that all should be treated alike.

Most of the waterfront assessments were reduced from one third to one half. Those obtaining reductions were Akerberg & Thomson, Prince Rupert Lumber Co., Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Rupert Marine and Ironworks Co., Albert & McCaffery and Georgetown Lumber Co. The appeals of Joseph Rousseau and Fred Cannon for reductions in the city sections were not entertained.

TWO MILLION FURS AT NEW YORK AUCTION

Pelts From All Parts of the World and of Many Varieties on Exhibition.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—About ten million dollars' worth of raw furs from all parts of the world have been placed on show here preliminary to being sold at the fifth annual midwinter auction in the Masonic Hall. The sale, which commences Monday next, contains more than two and a half million separate pelts, including about 80 distinct varieties.

DEFINITE STEP FOR NEW SCHOOL

Board of Trustees Decides That It will be Built as Originally Planned.

EXCAVATION CONTRACT WAS LET LAST NIGHT

It was decided at last night's meeting of the Board of School Trustees to erect the new school building on Hays Cove Circle facing 6th avenue and over the \$7,000 pipe line as was originally intended. This will necessitate the removal of this pipe line by the city. Tenders are to be advertised for in Prince Rupert, Vancouver, Victoria, Winnipeg, Calgary, Edmonton and Medicine Hat for the construction of the building.

In the extraordinary estimates brought down last night \$150,000 was allotted for the building itself, \$14,000 for furnishings and equipment, \$1,200 for dental clinic in connection with the new school besides \$2,000 for improving the present school grounds and \$600 for a new room being furnished. This makes a total of \$167,800 for extraordinary expenditure this year.

The tenders for the grading of the Hays Cove Circle school site were opened last night and the work was let to V. Basso-Bert, et al, who were the lowest tenderers. The tenders were as follows:—

T. L. COUNCIL MET COL. PECK

Drew Attention to Labor Trouble, Groundhog Coal and Oriental Labor.

A delegation from the Trades and Labor Council consisting of President E. Blue, Secretary A. Ellis, A. H. Allison and J. Gillis, interviewed Col. C. W. Peck, M.P., before he left for the south on the Prince George en route to Ottawa last night.

The delegation advocated the establishment of labor districts with a fair wage adjuster in each instead of one adjuster for the whole province as at present. They also drew the member's attention to the employment of Oriental labor on the waterfront when returned men were needing work. The member expressed himself in favor of the former recommendation and stated he would take it up at Ottawa. When the government took over the G. V. P. the employment of Orientals would probably be abolished.

The delegation also recommended the opening up of the Groundhog coal fields, the marketing of local produce in this city and labor troubles at the dry dock. The member was sympathetic on all the questions and promised to give his attention to them.

The Sources of Campaign Funds to be Public Under New Dominion Election Act

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, Feb. 13.—A cabinet committee in charge of the drafting of the new Franchise Act has almost completed its work. The proposed new act is based on the assumption that former acts are to all intents and purposes obsolete. The War Time Elections Act is not in good repute; the act of 1919 is designed only for by-elections, and the old Dominion Act has, it is claimed, become largely unworkable owing to important changes in recent years in the method of preparing the provincial lists, which were used as a basis for the federal work. The federal franchise, for instance, has been conferred on women, but in Quebec women have not yet been declared eligible to vote for representatives to the legislature.

It is stated that the new act will provide for the preparation of provincial lists to be made the basis for the federal elections. The War Time Election Act and By-Elections Act both provided for the preparation of lists by enumeration. The new act will, it is understood, perpetuate the principles.

In the matter of qualifications many of the objectionable features of the War Time Election Act will be abolished and the provisions of the By-Elections Act will be adopted.

A further provision of the new act, it is rumored, will be requirements that the sources of campaign funds be made public. Strong pressure is being brought to bear to have the principle of proportional representation applied in future federal elections.

SCHOOL BOARD FAVORS CLINIC

Have Provided for Free Treatment in Schools of City in Estimates.

The Board of School Trustees decided last night to bring down with their annual estimates the sum of \$1200 for the establishing of a dental clinic in connection with the city schools. This sum will include the fitting up of a temporary room and the equipment for the room.

Dr. A. H. Bayne, appeared before the School Board at its regular meeting last night and pointed out the need of such an institution for the children of Prince Rupert. He also pointed out that the time was opportune to take the matter in hand when the new school was proposed. In the meantime temporary quarters could be arranged for, the most important requisites being the equipment and light. He was willing to give one-half day a week gratis for a year to the work and was quite sure the other dentists would also be willing to do this. One and a half days from the dentists of this city per week would be quite sufficient for the child population. It would be necessary, however, to have the clinic stationed in the school house because it would not be desirable or best to have the children in the dentist's offices. One thing the dentist clinic would accomplish would be the removal of the child's fear of a dentist.

Finally after some questioning and discussion it was decided to provide for the clinic in the estimates, and Dr. Bayne was thanked for his public spirit and generous offer.

FISH ARRIVALS

The Liberty with 30,000 lbs. arrived at the fish wharves this morning and sold her catch to the Cold Storage at 15.5c and 6c. The Alliance came with a broken shaft and 1,000 lbs.; Rennell, 8,000 lbs.; Marguerite, 6,000 lbs.; and Agnes B., 4,000 lbs. The last four all sold to the Cold Storage for 11.3c and 6c.

THIEPVAL HERE ON FISHERIES PROTECTION

Mine Sweeper Arrives Last Night and May be Stationed at Digby Island.

The trawler Thiepval arrived in port last night in the course of her duties in the fisheries protection service. She is a fine craft, apparently well suited for the work and carrying a crew of 27 officers and men. She is a sister ship of the Givenchy and Armentieres both of which are now on this coast. One of the three will be stationed at this port all the time.

The Armentieres is now in dock at Esquimalt and it is understood that when she comes out the Thiepval will take her place and she will come to Digby Island. Which will remain here permanently is not known.

The officers in charge of the Thiepval are Capt. George Ford, formerly chief officer on the Malaspina; Chief officer, Stuart Kerr; Second officer, Mr. Freeman; Chief Engineer, S. McMaster; Chief Steward Stuart Ruffell.

ASK TENDERS NEW WHARF AT STEWART

Calling Tenders in Fisheries Department.

Step by step Prince Rupert will have to win her way to recognition as a national port. Yesterday it was announced in this paper that tenders were to be called here for building a launch and also for outfitting a number of Dominion Government patrol boats. This follows the establishment of Prince Rupert as a separate marine district and is a distinct gain. It is to be hoped that Prince Rupert people will bid on these contracts and try to secure them locally.

Dental Clinic For the Schools.

We take great pleasure in congratulating the school board on the step they have taken in providing in the estimates for the establishment of a dental clinic for the children. It is a move in the right direction and one that will be appreciated by parents who have the real welfare of the children at heart. The next step will be to get the clinic in operation.

Much News From Great Britain.

The News is publishing a great deal of news from Great Britain. This is because just now that country is wrestling with a great many problems which are of particular interest, especially to labor. The action taken in England will have a great effect on action which is likely to be taken elsewhere in the future. Britain has been a pioneer in democratic movements, and is still to the fore. It was there that parliamentary government was first evolved and it is there that the fight is going on against the control of human lives by the big monied interests.

The Irish question is also of great interest wherever the shamrock is grown, and it is because of this that the News features the telegraphic despatches having to do with those countries.

Time to Slough Right of Appeal.

Now that the Dominion Parliament is about to meet soon, it seems opportune to mention once more the objection taken in this country to the right of appeal which now exists to the Privy Council of Great Britain in legal cases. It is not often that the right is exercised as a very few of all the cases tried ever find their way across the Atlantic for final decision. What we contend, however, is that no cases should be tried outside of Canada.

It is a reflection on the ability of Canadian judges to say that they are not as competent to judge in points of Canadian law as are British judges. The common law of England obtains, wherever there are no Canadian laws covering cases, and both English and American judgments are quoted in courts in matters of precedent. Equity is the same in every country, or should be. The difference between the law as administered in this country and in Great Britain is simply the difference in local laws from those of Britain and the different conception which the judges may have of the rights and liberties of the people.

As an example it may be mentioned that in the law of libel there is an old English saying "the greater the truth the greater the libel." It is a long time since newspapers here have been punished for telling the truth. The conception of justice here is against it. It may be law, but in most cases, it is not justice. Canadian judges recognize the plea of "public interest" and rule accordingly.

We believe that the judges on this side of the Atlantic have just as much ability as those on the other side, and they are in much closer touch with the aims and aspirations of the people, and for that reason the right of appeal to the Privy Council, with all its attendant evils, should be abolished.

EDUCATION IN CITY IS SERIOUS PROBLEM

Lack of School Accommodation May Make it Necessary to Refuse Admission to Children

School Superintendent MacDonald appeared before the School Board at its regular meeting last night and pointed out the serious condition of overcrowding in the city schools. The matter had become so bad that some children were held back from promotion this year. Something would have to be done immediately or the schools would have to refuse pupils admission. The superintendent recommended the immediate finding of new quarters and opening of a new room.

L. W. Patmore, who acted as chairman, sympathized with Mr. MacDonald and the teachers. The overcrowding, he felt, was making it impossible for the teachers to work efficiently. Mrs. Kirkpatrick pointed out the danger to the health of the children by crowding 40 or 50 in one room. Principal Brady drew attention to the fact that after September another division would be absolutely necessary at the high school.

To help in relieving the situation it was decided to refuse admission to all who had not yet reached their sixth birthday. Superintendent MacDonald also suggested allowing beginners to enter only at the opening of the fall session. The scheme had worked successfully in Vernon.

WILDE AND MASON MEET MARCH 12TH

In the Letter Box

Editor Daily News:—

I read with some interest the report of an interview of one of your staff with R. K. Neill, manager and vice-president of the Premier Gold Mining Co. at Salmon River, B. C.

Referring to the question of white cooks, I know of one instance where a white returned soldier was hired in Prince Rupert and taken by the company to the Premier Gold Mining Company's property at Salmon River, and after he worked but ten days, he was discharged because a Chinese cook and his assistants had arrived from the southern part of the province in response to a wire previously sent them by the Premier Gold Mining Co.

The returned man appealed to the local Great War Veterans' Association for help and the association, realizing that there are two sides to a question, something which R. K. Neill apparently fails to take into consideration, wrote to Mr. Neill asking for particulars of this case. It is over three months since that letter was written but to this date the G. W. V. A. have received no reply. The returned soldier cook's services were quite satisfactory. This was ascertained from an unbiased source over two months ago, and this one instance of injustice needs some explaining away by Mr. Neill.

Mr. Neill says "after all, the bulk of money invested in mining development represents the hard earned money of working men and women," etc. Possibly it does but is there much of this money in the coffers of the company he represents, the Guggenheims?

In conclusion Mr. Neill states: "It is immaterial to me whether I ever return," etc. Will it affect the district much if he stays away from it? It will go ahead despite his leaving it, and although many people will no doubt go about in sackcloth and ashes, yet I don't think there will be many deaths as a result of Mr. Neill's leaving the district, and perhaps in Mexico or Russia or even in his own adopted "God's Country" and "Home of the Free and the Brave" he will find a "Country where the laws are enforced and where an investor will get an even chance to make a profit on his investment."

MEN'S VIEW OF STRIKE AT THE PREMIER MINE

Answer Given to R. K. Neill Whose Interview on Subject Appeared Wednesday.

The following letter has been received from J. H. Burroughs in answer to an interview given the Daily News by R. K. Neill: Editor the News:—

The statement of R. K. Neill, vice-president and general manager of the Premier mine, Stewart, as to the origin and conduct of the strike now in effect at that mine is so full of misstatements and misrepresentations, whether intentional or not the writer is unable to say, that I ask that in all fairness the men's case be given equal prominence in your paper.

The remarks of the News representative preceding the reported utterances of Mr. Neill allude to the possibility of the new territory receiving one of the worst knocks that it could receive by the enforced shutting down of the Premier Mine on "account of the unreasonable labor conditions as set forth by Mr. Neill." Let the readers of the News judge as to who is showing "unreasonableness," the miners or the management.

Chinese Cook.

The sole cause of complaint on the part of the men was the incompetent Chinese cook. Previous to this man being employed a returned soldier had been giving every satisfaction, and I have proof that he was fired without any reason whatever, the manager in charge of the mine, Mr. Pitt, admitting, when asked, that he was a good cook. There was no question of drunkenness on his part. He was fired after being there ten days or less and the present incompetent Chinese cook put in his place.

Mr. Neill says that the men "were not honorable enough to come to me personally about any grievance"—with some totally irrelevant remarks about "O. B. U. leaders"—an animal which does not exist.

Many Complaints.

Constant complaints were pre-

sented to the proper quarter, the foreman, and as often met with a promise of something to be done that never materialized. If men cannot eat what is set before them they cannot work. Finding no improvement in the food put before them the men took the final step to force things to a showdown. They all signed a demand for the removal of the incompetent cook and for a competent man to be put in his place. This is presumably the "peremptory" demand alluded to by Mr. Neill. How would he characterize the previous requests, many times repeated, that had been contemptuously ignored by the management? Was this or was it not giving the management "a reasonable chance" to remedy matters?

The reply they received was: "You can all go down the road if you like; the Chinaman stays." So they went, and were joined by the men from the road camp then working. A strike was declared and pickets established to meet every boat, and the efforts to prevent the recruiting of men to act as strikebreakers have been so efficiently supported by labor along the coast as far as Tacoma, that the company is unable to work the mine, as Mr. Neill admits.

23 White Cooks.

Mr. Neill says that he has had to fire 23 white cooks in 18 months. At one time last summer the company had four camps working, with a cook in each. Each of these camps contributed to the total of cooks fired; they did not all come from the mine camp, as inferred by Mr. Neill. Moreover, for the nine months from February to November, 1919, there were nine or ten cooks at the mine, of whom one was fired for drinking, and the other was the returned soldier before mentioned, who was apparently fired to make room for the cheaper Chinaman.

No Objection to Chinese.

It is well to point out that the men do not demand the dismissal of the incompetent Chinaman. They have nothing against him on the score of his nationality, nor to him remaining in the employment of the company in any capacity other than that of cook. One point that Mr. Neill overlooked in discussing the "impossibility" of getting sober white cooks, is the fact that the Premier mine is the only mine in the Stewart district that employs an Oriental in that capacity. All the rest appear to get complete satisfaction from the white cooks. Other camps pay \$150 up for their white cooks. The fact that the Premier only offered \$125 may be the explanation for their brief stay on the job. Although the wages of the miners have not entered into the dispute, the Premier mine pays less than any other mine in the district.

Since the declaration of the strike the men have sought every opportunity for a settlement with the resident manager, Mr. Pitt, and on each occasion they have been rebuffed. They have not discovered the slightest trace of any disposition to discuss the matter "reasonably" on his part. The strike is still in effect, and will continue so until the company shows a reasonable disposition to meet the men, or, as Mr. Neill says, decides to close the mine down first.

Matter of Epithets.

Mr. Neill alludes to the time when he had to have working for him some men with pro-German leanings. The period which Mr. Neill has in mind is understood, and the only answer necessary is that Mr. Neill apparently classes any worker who thinks that the company does not pay enough wages or is in any manner dissatisfied with his treatment at the hands of the company as necessarily a pro-German, Bolshevik, etc. These epithets may have carried weight in the past, but they have been used so often on such flimsy justification that they have become hackneyed, and the use of them by Mr. Neill at this late date is but evidence of the fact that he recognizes he is beaten on the strike question. It

MEN'S VIEW OF STRIKE AT THE PREMIER MINE

(Continued from Page Four)

is a display of what amounts to childish petulance in his resentment of the fact, which is no doubt very unpalatable to a representative of the Guggenheim interests.

Mutually Agreed.

On January 5 last W. G. Harris, superintendent of the Premier, came to me to discuss the matter of the strike, and the possibility of settlement. We mutually agreed that it was a trivial matter at best and capable of easy and satisfactory solution. He gave me his personal assurance that if I lifted the ban at the government employment agency in order to let him take up some 15 men for the mine, the matter would be settled to the satisfaction of the men on strike on his arrival. He signed the following statement of the understanding on which the strike was called off locally as being correct: (The letter was addressed to the secretary of the strike committee.)

Signed Statement.

"Mr. Harris, manager of the Premier, has been in my office this afternoon, and discussed the nature of the trouble with me. He has agreed to settle the trouble to the satisfaction of the men affected, and on this assurance, supported as to the dependability of Mr. Harris by Bro. Potts and Lel. Robertson, I have cancelled the strike notice and posted a notice that the trouble is in process of adjustment.

"My reasons for taking this action are as follows: (1) The wires are down and there is no possibility of getting in communication with you. (2) The boat leaves on Wednesday, January 7, and Mr. Harris wants to take up 15 extra men with him, to be put to work in addition to the men on the ground. (3) The next boat will not leave until two weeks have elapsed, and it would not be fair to the management to postpone the resumption of work a day longer than is necessary after the above assurances have been made by Mr. Harris."

I concluded that I had not settled the strike, that being left to the men themselves to do after seeing Mr. Harris and hearing his version of what he would consider a satisfactory settlement.

Changed His Mind.

Instead of taking 15 men Mr. Harris took about 23. On arrival the letter above summarized was received by the strikers and a committee immediately formed to see what the settlement was that was to be offered. Mr. Pitt apparently over-ruled Mr. Harris, and while saying that the agreement had been made and would have to be lived up to, finally changed his mind and absolutely refused to recognize it. The late comers accordingly joined the ranks of the strikers, and are now qualified, in Mr. Neill's estimation probably, to be classed with the Bolsheviks and pro-Germans, but nevertheless the majority of them were returned

soldiers. Their end of the trouble is now in the hands of the lawyers, they considering that they have a claim for wages for all the time they have spent in Stewart, they having expressly made it understood before they went up that the strike would be settled to the satisfaction of the strikers when they arrived.

Who Responsible?

Here again, where and on whose shoulders does the lack of reasonable consideration lie—on that of the official acting for the strikers or on the part of the mine management? Did the above action show a real desire to meet the management on any prospect of reasonable settlement or was it the work of a "hot-head?"

As to Mr. Neill's concluding remarks, they can be re-read in the light of the facts as above recorded. If this is the manner in which the Guggenheim interests handle their labor problems, then with us, as with Mr. Neill, it is a matter of indifference whether he ever returns or not. His reference to his possible departure to "where the mining laws of the country are enforced," has no bearing on the dispute, because the strikers have broken no law—unless it be the Guggenheim law of spineless submission to Guggenheim rule.

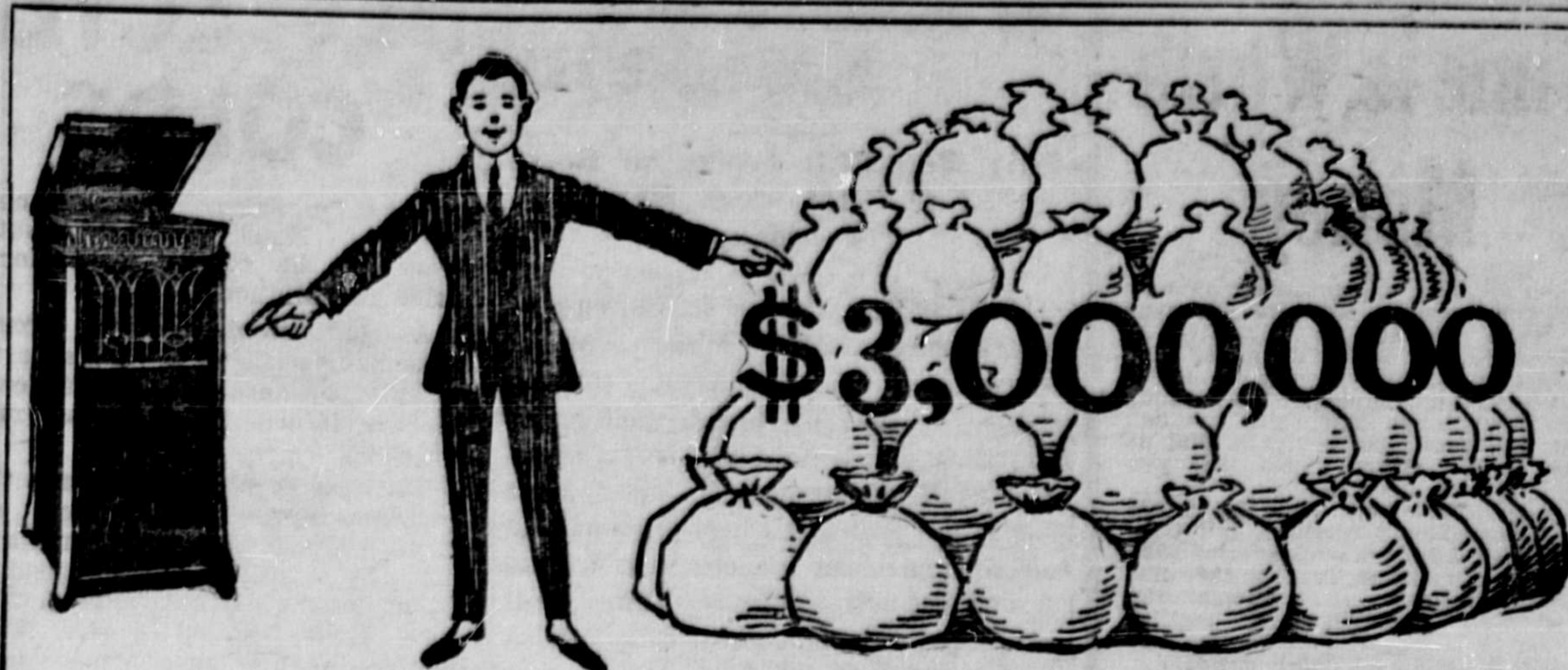
