## Complete Evidence Given in The Simon Duff Liquor Trial

### Police Tell How Trap was Laid at Seal Cove into which Other Constable Walked; Part of Liquor Ring Counsel Alleges.

Before a crowded court room the evidence in the case of ex versus Simon V. Duff, charged with exposing for sale and offering to sell liquor for the consideration of \$5,000, was presented in the police court this morning. Jail Warden Bailey, Sergeant Adams, Charles Miller and Captain H. K. Freeman gave evidence. W. E. Williams, city solicitor, prosecuted and L. W. Patmore appeared for Duff. Miss B. McKay acted as court stenographer. During the course of the trial Daniel Leachy was arrested in the court room as being implicated in the case, from evidence taken this morning.

After hearing the evidence the case was adjourned until 10 o'clock on Tuesday morning.

Warden Bailey, the first witness examined, told of being directed to the residence of Harry Lipsett over the theft of liquor. He had an interview with Mr. Lipsett over the theft and proceeded to tell the court of the conversation but was checked by L. W. Patmore who maintained that evidence could not be given based on conversations other than with the accused. After he had taken one Charles Miller into his confidence with a view to getting the liquor back he had told him to work on the case. (Objection by Mr. Patmore). Miller had gone to work on the case and on the early morning of February 13 arrested Richard Leachy who was sent to the station in the care of Constable Leek.

**The Police Trap.**  
After the arrest of Leachy, accompanied by Sergeant Adams, the information of Miller, the constable Nabethong was hired at Cow Bay to go to a float at the Cold Storage plant where a liquor trap had been arranged for by Miller. (Objection by Mr. Patmore). Accompanying Bailey on the launch were Charles Miller, John Miller, Harry Lipsett, Constable Adams and Capt. Freeman. They were in charge of the launch. They left Cow Bay and before arriving at Seal Cove all except Charles Miller were concealed in various parts of the boat. Pulling alongside the float the boat was up and the accused, Simon Duff, could be plainly seen standing there. A conversation between Duff and Miller then took

ed and sent to the station. Then the trip to the Cold Storage was made with the officers and others. Arrived at the Cold Storage float Miller again met Duff and asked him where the liquor was. He said it was in Matt Videck's taxi so loading started. He corroborated Bailey's evidence as to the loading of it. After 29 cases had been loaded Duff asked for his money and was told to come into the boat. This was done and the arrest followed as stated by Bailey. After the arrest the remaining cases of liquor were loaded on the boat. Questioned by Mr. Patmore, Miller stated that there were guns in the party although he did not know how many.

**Corroborative Evidence.**  
Matt Videck told of being called by Richard Leachy between 1 and 2 o'clock on the morning in question and going to the Gold Storage where he saw Miller, Duff and Jack Hoskins. The truck was sent back and then cases were loaded at Jack Hoskins' shack at Seal Cove and taken to the float where they were loaded on the boat. He saw Duff once at first but did not see him after he went on the boat. Sergeant Adams corroborated the evidence of Warden Bailey and stated that he saw the hands of Duff and Miller not more than two inches apart. Captain Freeman corroborated the evidence of the constable in regard to the trip.

**Liquor Ring.**  
In closing his case W. E. Williams stated that the evidence showed clearly that Duff was the ring of a ring that had made an attempt at selling liquor. He cited Bessie Riley, Daniel and Richard Leachy and Jack Hoskins' cabin as being other parts of the ring. Duff was clearly guilty of the offense of offering liquor for sale.

Mr. Patmore argued that there was no tangible evidence to show that Duff was connected with this ring although it probably existed. In the first place the liquor in question was not his to sell. The only charge that could be proven against Duff was that of having liquor in his possession. In connection with the case Richard and Daniel Leachy were each charged with exposing for sale and offering to sell liquor for the consideration of \$5,000. Their hearings come up on Tuesday at 10 o'clock. They were granted bail at \$1,000.

## LANSING AND WILSON QUARREL

Secretary of State Resigns—Accused of Usurping Powers of President.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—Robert Lansing ended his career as Secretary of State after President Wilson had accused him of usurping the presidential powers by calling meetings of the cabinet during Mr. Wilson's illness.

Correspondence between President Wilson and Secretary Lansing beginning February 7 was given out tonight at the State Department. The correspondence is goldy polite and between the lines runs an undercurrent of animosity that dates back to the Peace Conference in Paris, which both attended.

Lansing's resignation was accepted to take place immediately.

## CANADA AND PEACE TREATY RESERVATIONS

Changes by United States Must Not Affect Voting Power of This Country.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

OTTAWA, Feb. 14.—Renewed urgent representations have been made to the Imperial authorities against agreement to any Peace Treaty reservations which will affect the status or voting power of Canada in the League of Nations.

The proposed reservations before the United States Senate are particularly in view, especially reservation 14.

## PRISONERS TO BE EXCHANGED WITH RUSSIA

Arrangements Completed With Soviet Government and Pact Signed.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

COPENHAGEN, Feb. 14.—Prolonged negotiations between Jas. O'Grady representing Great Britain and M. Litvinoff on behalf of the Russian soviet government ended in an agreement which was signed Thursday under which the British war prisoners in Russia will be released and Great Britain will provide transportation for repatriation of Russian prisoners in neutral countries.

It was also arranged that the Archangel Government exchange Bolshevik prisoners for white prisoners held by the Bolsheviks.

## NORTH VANCOUVER FIRE DEPARTMENT IS OUT ON STRIKE

NORTH VANCOUVER, Feb. 14.—Capt. J. E. Sparks and eight other members of the North Vancouver fire department went on strike yesterday at noon. They claimed that they were being discriminated against in the matter of wage increases.

## OIL REPORT CAUSES RUSH TO DAUPHIN

Queues Wait Outside Land Titles Office in Bitter Cold to Register Claims.

DAUPHIN, Man., Feb. 14.—A reported discovery of oil in this district is responsible for the influx of a large number of prospectors who waited in queues outside the Land Titles Office in the bitter cold to file entries for claims.

Up to yesterday afternoon a large number had been unable to secure entry to the office.

## British Government Sustained 188 to 44

### Austain Chamberlain in Defence of Administration Refers to "Dry" Law of United States; Lady Astor Comments.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

LONDON, February 14.—The amendment of Sir Arthur Steel Maitland, Unionist, regretting that the Government's expenditure had been allowed to continue at so high a rate, with the consequent depreciation of national credit and increase in the cost of living, was rejected by the House of Commons by a vote of 188 to 44, and the House then adopted the address.

Austen Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, in reply declared the Government could not be blamed for the high prices which were the result of the world crisis. Among other things, he said, the world's sugar production was short and because the United States was "dry" the people there were using much more sugar. "To add to the miseries of the world, the United States goes dry," Mr. Chamberlain declared.

A Labor member interrupted with "for the benefit of the world," to which Lady Nancy Astor added, "and humanity as a whole."

These interjections called forth laughter and cheers.

Mr. Chamberlain continued that because the United States no longer drank alcohol, they wanted a much greater amount of sugar to compensate. He would not say that the United States should not have gone dry, but the effect was distinctly unfortunate and he thought that the moderate drinker who like himself seldom used it, but had his own opinion of the use of alcohol was a good citizen too.

## PEACE RIVER OIL REPORT PRESENTED

Hon. T. D. Pattullo Suggests that More General Exploration Should Be Conducted This Year.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

VICTORIA, Feb. 13.—The report of J. C. Gwillim of Queen's University on oil possibilities of certain portions of the Peace River District was tabled in the Legislature. It states that the portion most worthy of close investigation is the strip of country lying between the gentle dip towards the great syncline and that of the area of disturbed geological formation adjacent to the mountains.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, who tabled the report, said it was highly desirable that much more extensive work of a general character be carried on during the coming year by the Government. The bulkhead sandstones are considered to be the shoreward equivalent of the Peace River sandstones and the Loon River shale. It is near the base of the latter that oil is found on Lower Peace River at about 1,100 feet below the river level.

## POLISH PEACE PLANS

## REMOVE MACE AND SWORD AS OUT OF DATE

Lord Mayor of Dublin Instructs That Badges are not to be Carried Before Him.

The Lord Mayor said he had discretionary powers regulating use of paraphernalia of his office but he declared he had given instructions that, during the remainder of the term of office, the sword and mace should not be carried before him or placed on the table.

Forward Movement Is Explained.

One of the local clergymen was asked for a short editorial article on the Forward Movement. He has summarized it as follows:—

The Forward Movement, as far as Canada is concerned, has this great feature, that five Protestant churches are seeking to bridge the denominational chasms of bygone days and are working at the same time with the same methods for the same purpose, the logical outcome of which is the One Big Union of Protestantism.

The Forward Movement is a call to prayer; church members hereafter must be a praying people. The restoration of the family altar is one of the cornerstones of the campaign.

The Forward Movement is a pledge to service; even as Christ worked for others so must those who bear His name. The Church is calling upon her sons and daughters to do the work that other organizations leave undone.

The Forward Movement emphasizes the stewardship of life and possessions. Our life is not our own; we are not consulted either as to its beginning or its end, and if there be no higher future than we are the playthings of a malignant devil and not the offspring of a benignant God. Taking the highest view of life—and no one is ever justified in taking any lower—the church is again stressing the highest prerogatives of humanity from the standpoint that life and talents belong not to ourselves but to a Supreme God. Hence this week in Canada the members and adherents of Protestantism will raise the sum of eleven million dollars as a minimum gift towards the betterment of the world; and the Church will be able to announce from her pulpits tomorrow that thousands of young men and women are willing to be equipped to go wherever they may be sent as teachers, ministers, doctors, nurses, deaconesses and social service workers generally, that the world may be won for Christ.

## GOVERNMENT IS ASKED FOR RESIGNATION

Soldier Member Thinks Oliver Should Have New Mandate From the People.

VICTORIA, February 13.—The fourth session of the Liberal Government, headed by Premier Oliver, has had a rather busy week. The administration is by no means in danger but a few of the members are showing marked independence, several of the former supporters having cut away their allegiance altogether. These have not joined the Bowsar; opposition in the House but have split into smaller factions, which do not succeed in accomplishing anything.

On Wednesday G. S. Hanes of North Vancouver, a former supporter of the Government, revived charges of graft in connection with the construction of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway. Mr. Hanes did not make any marked impression.

On Thursday Frank Giolma, soldier member for Victoria, capped the climax with a demand for the immediate resignation of the Government. He made no material progress and probably did not expect to do so. The burden of his plea was that while the administration had made a good showing in dealing with the problems facing it when the late H. C. Brewster came into power in 1916, still conditions had now so greatly changed that it was improper to proceed without a new mandate from the people.

It is the belief here that Premier Oliver has no intention of going to the country at present.

## G. W. V. A. DANCE USUAL SUCCESS

Nearly 400 Were Present at Auditorium Last Night.

The attendance accorded the Great War Veterans' Association at their annual ball last night again filled the big auditorium, on Sixth Avenue to its capacity. The affair was a public one and the Veterans indeed lost none of the patronage and support that is given them by appreciative Prince Rupert people.

Shortly after 10 o'clock last evening the grand march commenced, led by the pipers. After several promenades around the hall the strains of the orchestra broke out in the first waltz and the dance was commenced. Very soon one of the largest crowds of dancers gathered in a Prince Rupert hall was on the floor.

At midnight delightful refreshments were served and instead of the dancers going to the supper room, it was decided to serve the refreshments in the main hall. The new plan worked very successfully and the supper was eaten with promptness and despatch.

Gray's Orchestra supplied the music to the delight of the dancers and the orchestra was back to its old form with Will Edmunds recovered from his illness and back at the cello. Jack Frost handled the floor as master of ceremonies and Secretary D. S. Cameron attended to money matters at the door. The G. W. V. A. entertainment committee were in charge.

**SHIPBUILDING AND REPAIRS AT DRY DOCK**

New Vessels Will be Taking Definite Shape Soon—More Men to be Employed.

**BOARDING HOUSE AND FIRST AID STATION**

Even if litigation is now on between moneyed interests that affects the entire ownership of the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Shipbuilding Co. control, this condition would never be betrayed by a visit to the plant where 300 men now have steady employment. At the yards the rattle of riveting and drilling machines, the red glare of the iron casting and the ring of hammers on machine work tells the story that operations both in repair work and actual shipbuilding are going on steadily despite the circumstances.

The most interesting part of the yards, of course, is that devoted to shipbuilding. Here the work is going on with more despatch than has been the case since the keels have been laid. One hundred men are devoting their time to the different departments necessary to the work. To the ordinary eye this seems slow but when one actually goes to the yard and sees the detail that must be followed in punching every hole in the plates, the bending of the steel beams and the fitting of each part this seeming slowness of a large hull taking shape can easily be understood. In April the crew of men on shipbuilding is to be doubled.

**Frames up Soon.**

At present the only evidence of hulls are the keels and the bottom plates but in the course of a week or so the contractor in charge says that the frames will be going up and then the structures will begin to take on the actual appearance of ships. Many machines are in operation getting the plates ready for fitting and iron workers are busy in the foundry casting the different fittings for the upper parts of the hulls. Manager Pillsbury and Superintendent McHaffie are now personally superintending the work.

**Repair Work.**

Repair work is also taking the time of a large number of men. The Prince Rupert has completed her underwater repairs and was recently inspected by a representative of Lloyds. The upper work is being completed and she is nearly ready for commission. It is thought that she will resume her coast run on February 26, when the Prince George will enter the local dock.

The car barge for the Whalen Mills was completed this week. There has been a lot of truss work in the interior of the barge that has been done with heavy beams and timbers and is not visible from the outside.

**Smaller Jobs.**

There are a number of smaller jobs as well. The fishing boat Dorreen is having her hull replaced and C. P. Riel's boat, the Imperieuse, which was recently sold to J. P. Hawkinson, of Alice

Arm, is receiving a complete overhauling. The Washington Towing and Barge Company's barge 35 is receiving hull repairs, the barge having struck the beach at Graham Island while loaded with lumber from the Island mills. The Tilamook is spending the winter, tied up at the dock and will be overhauled before being commissioned for the Ketchikan run this spring.

**Comfort and Safety.**

Arrangements for the accommodation and convenience of the employees are also worthy of mention. The big boarding and rooming house accommodating 200 men, at the yards, under the management of L. D. Burr, an experienced commissary man, is running very smoothly and the fare offered the workers is of a high quality and there is no scarcity of it. The big dining room is a picture of cleanliness and neatness. Later it is proposed to instal a complete commissary and lounging rooms. Upstairs, over the dining room, are the sleeping quarters which are also commodious and well conducted.

**First Aid.**

Another notable feature at the yards is the first class first-aid station which is supervised by D. McAloney, an experienced first aid man and trained nurse as well. The station is located conveniently at the gate of the yards and is equipped with all the appliances required by the Workmen's Compensation Act. It is a very clean and sanitary station and is equipped with an operating table, sterilizing outfit, medical appliances and emergency kits. Here anyone meeting with an accident, minor or major, can receive efficient first aid treatment.

**RESIGNS IMPORTANT POST TO VISIT CANADA**

Col. Grant Morden Coming to Look Into Many Financial Interests in Dominion.

LONDON, Feb. 13.—Col. Grant Morden has resigned from the chairmanship of the British Cellulose Co. He intends to take a long trip to Canada in the very near future.

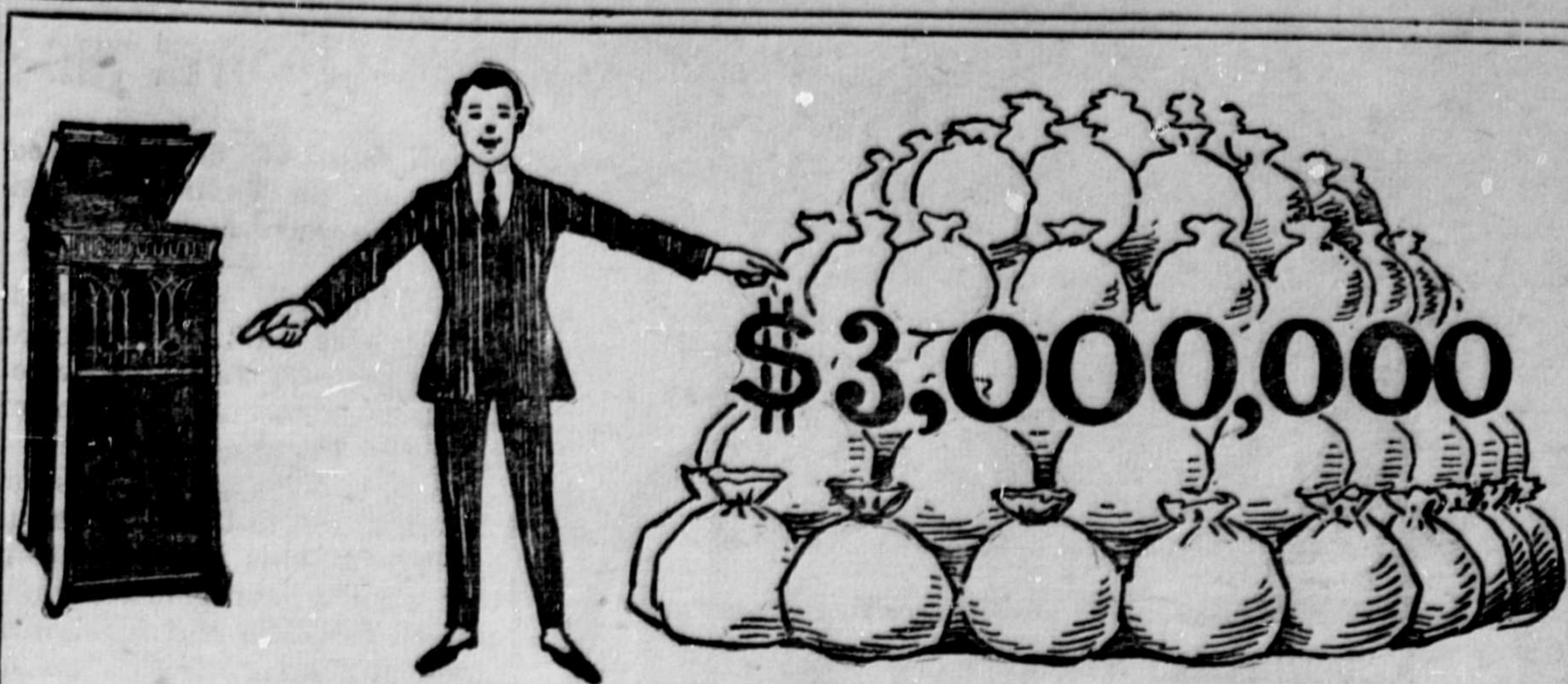

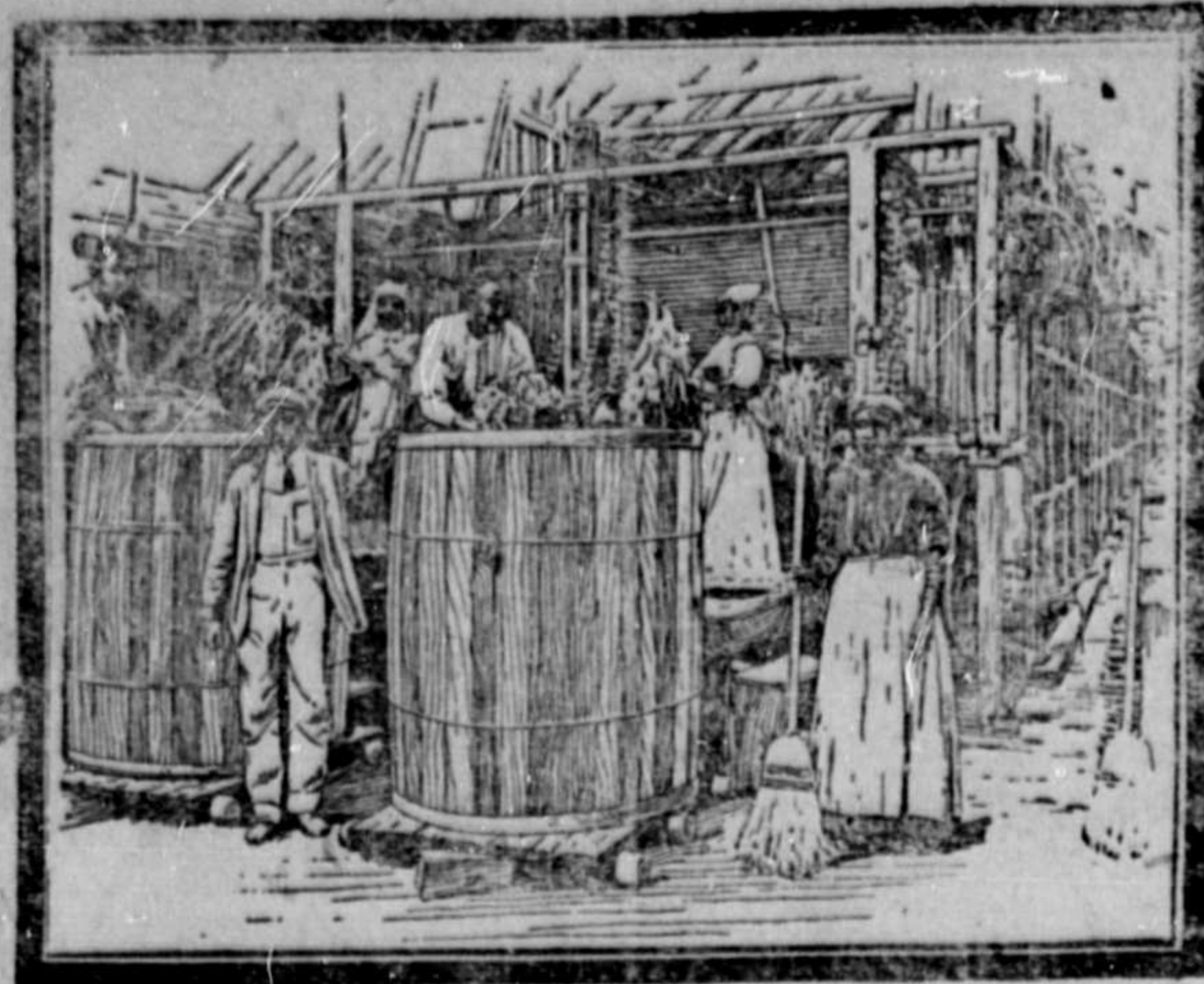
