Root Amendment to Exclude Canada from League of Nations

Hon. N. W. Rowell Says Canada Will Not Consent to Any Impairment of Her Voting Right and Proposal Will Not be Accepted.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, February 16.—"If the United States should accept the Root reservation either in its original form or amended, suggested and should also adopt the preamble as proposed, Canada, as one of the nations of the British Empire and a party to the treaty, would be called upon to decide what action she would take under these conditions. There can be no possible doubt that Canada's decision will be. She cannot and will not consent to any impairment of her status and voting rights under the treaty. Therefore, when the action on the treaty is taken by the Government of the United States, if ratification can only be secured by the adoption of the Root amendment, so far as Canada is concerned she will not give her consent thereto."

JOHN SMART DIED TODAY

Found Lying on Floor in Pool-Room in Pool of Blood.

John Smart, a well known figure about town, died in the General Hospital this morning from a severe injury to his head which he sustained when he fell and struck some hard object. He was found in a pool of blood in "Our Pool Room" at 9:40 this morning by Warden Bailey and immediately rushed to the hospital where he was admitted at 9:50. He had a very ugly wound on the back of the head which looked as if it had been inflicted by a severe blow. The call was rung in to the police station and the officer immediately went to the scene. On the way to the hospital Smart tried very hard to speak but could not make himself audible. Just before reaching the institution he took a fit caused by a clot of blood on the brain. Mr. Smart had been a resident of the city for some time. At one time he was employed in the local office of the Canadian Pacific Railway and at the time of death was engaged in clerical duties at the roadmaster's office of the Grand Trunk. He spent a few months last year in a cook camp at Alice Arm. He is a man of middle age and lived for a time at the Empress Hotel.

An inquest will be held later and the funeral arrangement has not yet been made. It is not known whether he had relations or not in this country.

NATIONS LEAGUE SESSION ENDS

Important Matters Regarding Poland is Placed Under Its Guarantee.

LONDON, Feb. 14.—The Council of the League of Nations has concluded its first session. The next meeting is fixed for March 15 at Rome.

On the motion of Baron Mitsui of Japan the Japanese Representative Council agreed to place under the guarantee of the league the stipulations of a treaty between the United States, Great Britain, Italy and Japan on the one side, and Poland on the other, so far as they affected persons belonging to racial, religious and linguistic minorities in Poland.

AN INTERNATIONAL COURT OF JUSTICE

THE HAGUE, Feb. 14.—Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland and Holland will be represented at a conference to discuss the formation of an international court of justice.

DAUGHTER OF MR. AND MRS. C. GRAHAM DIED

Funeral to Take Place on Wednesday Next.

Constance Jane, the five-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chris Graham, died at the home on Sixth Ave. yesterday. The child had been ailing for some time past and her death was not unexpected. General sympathy will be felt for the sorrowing parents as they are old timers here, Mr. Graham being an engineer on the railroad. The child was born in the city.

Interment will take place on Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Fairview Cemetery, Gr. Grant conducting the funeral service. Arrangements are in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers.

INCREASE IN VALUE OF FOREST PRODUCTS

VICTORIA, Feb. 16.—The total value of the forest products in British Columbia for the year 1919 was \$70,285,000 as against \$54,060,000 in 1918, according to an interim report issued by the Provincial Lands Department.

OTTAWA, Feb. 16.—An order in council determines that any officer or private of the Canadian expeditionary forces listed as missing for six months shall be officially reported dead.

HOLLAND AND THE FORMER EMPEROR

THE HAGUE, Feb. 16.—Holland probably would not be unwilling to accede to a polite request from the Allies to put former Emperor William farther from the German frontier than he is at present, it has been learned, but would undoubtedly resent any dictation as to sending him to a Dutch island or any particular place.

President Wilson Does Not Approve Action of Allied Premiers Re the Adriatic

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

PARIS, February 16.—Hugh C. Wallace, American ambassador, delivered to the Foreign Office a memorandum from President Wilson in which the President said he could not approve of Premier Lloyd George's proposed settlement of the Adriatic question, which has been submitted to the Jugo-Slavs. "Le Temps" says President Wilson allowed it to be understood that the United States would find it impossible to continue in conference if the Allies settled the Adriatic question without consulting the

United States. The greatest discretion is being observed as to the contents of the reply and it will not be made public until after receipt by the President of the United States.

Fred J. Dixon Not Guilty of Seditious Libel at Winnipeg Decides a Jury

WINNIPEG, February 16.—Fred J. Dixon, M. L. A., was found "not guilty" on the charge of seditious libel. The verdict was given shortly after 10 a. m. today.

Dixon waited calmly for the announcement and smiled with satisfaction when the foreman's words were uttered.

There was a demonstration of cheering by the crowd in the court room.

The trial developed out of the strike troubles of last summer. Dixon was a labor member in the legislature. The crown withdrew the charge against J. S. Woods who was charged with a similar offense.

Two More Arrests Out of Duff Case

Jack Hoskins and Bessie Riley Charged With Offering to Sell Liquor And Are Remanded till Tomorrow.

Jack Hoskins and Miss Bessie Riley appeared before Magistrate McMordie in the police court this morning charged with exposing for sale and offering to sell 24 double cases, 4 single cases and 12 bottles of intoxicating liquor for the consideration of \$5,000. Both pleaded not guilty and were remanded until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning. They are connected with the Duff case and were arrested as a result of the evidence already taken in that case on Saturday morning. They are alleged to be connecting links in the supposed liquor ring.

The arrest of Bessie Riley makes the fifth implicated in the case and under the same charge.

It was made on Saturday evening by Warden Bailey. The complete evidence has been given in the Duff case and Magistrate McMordie will probably give his finding tomorrow morning. Then the four other cases will be proceeded with. L. W. Patmore is defending Hoskins and Bessie Riley.

All the five have been granted bail at \$1,000, but so far Hoskins is the only one who has been able to raise sureties for that sum so is the only one who is not confined to the lock-up. Bessie Riley is confined to the Salvation Army barracks.

RAILWAY STRIKE IS POSTPONED

Action Deferred Until General Conference Can be Held.

DETROIT, Feb. 16.—The strike of 300,000 members of the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and railway shop laborers set for Tuesday was indefinitely postponed last night by Allen Barker, international president of the union, in accordance with a request of President Wilson that action be deferred until the general conference of railway union committeemen is held.

MRS. TEKLA STEWART PASSES YESTERDAY

Has Been a Resident of this City For Twelve Years.

The death occurred yesterday afternoon of Mrs. Tekla Stewart at the Kaiken Rooms. The deceased was 34 years of age and was the wife of David Stewart, a prospector. She has resided in the city for 12 years and is quite well known.

The funeral will take place from the B. C. Undertakers' parlors tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock, Dr. Grant officiating.

LABOR UNFIT TO GOVERN NATION SAYS CHURCHILL

Believed in Sending Troops to Russia But Willing to Send Supplies.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WINDSOR, Feb. 16.—Winston Churchill, secretary for war, in addressing his constituents declared that labor was unfit to govern a nation. This is a reiteration of a statement made recently, which aroused a storm in the press and a storm of indignation among labor interests.

In referring to his policy toward Russia, which has been the object of strong criticism, Churchill said: "I never believed in sending British troops to Russia, but short of that I have done everything in my power to help local anti-Bolshevik forces. It was a matter of honor that we should help them with arms and equipment, but each and all of the allied powers will rue the fact that they could not take more determined action to crush the Bolshevik peril at its head before it had grown too strong."

Lloyd George Seems Secure.

In spite of the many attacks on them by the opposition the Lloyd George Government in Great Britain is holding its own in Parliament and seems likely to last for some time yet. That is making the labor men uneasy as they are very impatient over the matter of nationalization of the mines. It may be a year or two before they are able to bring the matter before the people in a constitutional way. If the British Constitution provided for the initiative and referendum the miners would be provided with a means of taking a vote of the people and perhaps avoiding a big strike.

We do not believe it is right for the miners to strike on a constitutional measure of that kind. There is a method provided for righting wrongs or securing reforms, and labor men must learn to be patient in regard to such matters. They cannot expect to get everything at once. They must also learn to abide by the decision of the majority and at the last election the vast majority was with the present Government.

Mace and Sword Relics of Barbarism.

The Lord Mayor of Dublin is to discontinue the carrying of the mace and sword before him and the placing of them on the table during sittings of the city council. Probably they will never reappear.

In all probability the reason for the removal of the mace and sword is simply a means of showing dislike for British institutions, yet the Lord Mayor is undoubtedly right. The mace and the sword are relics of barbarism and should be discarded on such occasions.

In this country we have discarded many of the old forms, but we still have a few. Our form of proclamation is a most ridiculous one. It is time that royal proclamations, if used at all, should be written in modern English. This continual harking back to old forms and old ceremonies is out of keeping with the age in which we live. The old forms are interesting as relics, but not as being of any practical value.

The point of view of the Indians on this coast is a good one. They dislike to exhibit themselves in any but the most modern guise. They say they have turned their backs on the old customs and forms and have become a new people with new ideas and ideals. So should we. With the ending of the war we shall have to become a new people with new ideas and ideals or we shall be left behind in the advancement of the race.

Liquor Cases are Sole Topic of Conversation.

The liquor cases are the sole topics of conversation these days. The people are hungry for news respecting them. There is a general feeling that there is more to be heard yet. The people are on the qui vive and there is much idle talk and speculation in regard to who is behind it all. No one believes that the men who have been arrested are the principals. Somebody with money is handling the business.

The police force seems to be active just now and the public are expecting that they will not rest just yet. An ugly cancer has to be cut away before the body is again sound, and this underground illegal traffic must be suppressed if the city is to be in a healthy condition.

Administration of United States Doomed.

The crew of the American ship of state are quarrelling among themselves, a pretty sure indication that the ship is in danger. Wilson and his party are certainly doomed to retire to obscurity as soon as the people of that country get an opportunity to say so. They have outlived their usefulness for the present and another president with a totally new administration will take charge a year hence. Unfortunately for the United States the constitution of that country is so inelastic that there is no way of hastening the consummation of an event which is a foregone conclusion.

SWITZERLAND IS ADMITTED TO THE LEAGUE

Swiss People Will Have to Vote on Proposal Before Effective.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, Feb. 14.—The Council of the League of Nations has agreed to admit Switzerland as a member of the League, accepting the Swiss Government's conditions for maintaining neutrality and her refusal to participate in any military operations under the auspices of the League or to permit the passage of foreign troops through Swiss territory, but agreeing to participate in any economic pressure applied by the League, Switzerland's admission being subject to a Swiss referendum confirming these conditions.

Mr. Balfour, British representative, announced a commission composed of members of the Council, who would be instructed to summon a conference of the states concerned to study international exchange and finance difficulties.

Sport Briefs

The newly formed Pacific Coast
International Baseball League has
set a salary limit which will en-
sure the various clubs to secure
first class playing talent. Already
the various club owners are
scouring the country for players
and some of the best ball tossers
in the minors will be seen in ac-
tion on Northwest diamonds. Both
Seattle and Tacoma will be
represented by exceptionally
strong clubs, while Vancouver and
Spokane may be depended upon
to furnish first class ball for the
fans.

There are very few athletes
who have made good both in pro-
fessional hockey and baseball.
Toronto has the distinction of
having turned out a couple of
these rare birds. "Babe" Dye,
who is playing with the St. Pat-
ricks in the National Hockey
League, is to play with the Maple
Leaves in the International League
this summer, having signed a
contract a few days ago. Another
Toronto boy, Andy Kyle, played
pro. hockey with the old Sham-
rocks and also played in the
American Association, establish-
ing quite a reputation as a hitter.

Con Jones, as representative of
the British Columbia Football As-
sociation was upheld last week in
his stand regarding B. C. football
by the Dominion officials in To-
ronto. Ex-President Campbell of
the D. F. A. stated that the B. C.
F. A. was the association granted
affiliation with the Dominion as-
sociation and Jack Russell, oppos-
ing Jones, could not be recog-
nized. The D. F. A. officials ridic-
uled the idea advanced by Rus-
sell that affiliation with the gov-
erning body would involve pro-
fessionalizing of players.

It was decided at the convention
to bring out only one Old Country
football team to Canada this
summer and Jones was given
credentials to use in England for
conducting negotiations. Although
the decision as to what team will
be brought out is dependent on
what agreement Con Jones can
effect with the clubs on the other
side it was suggested that the
Newcastle Uniteds should be
highly acceptable to soccer fans
throughout the Dominion. Jones
will leave for the Old Country
from New York on the Adriatic
sailing on February 14.

B. C. IS DOING MORE THAN ANY PROVINCE

VICTORIA, Feb. 14.—In the
Legislature yesterday Premier
Oliver declared that British Co-
lumbia, in proportion to its popu-
lation, made greater response to

lishment of the veterans in civil
life.

SASKATOON, Feb. 14.—After four hours' strenuous and at times exciting debate in which there was mixed condemnation and praise of the Dominion Government, the Saskatchewan Grain Growers in convention decided to leave their entry into provincial politics for this year. The matter will probably come again next year.

DEATH SENTENCE FOR GREEK OFFICIAL FOR ACTING FOR GERMANY

LONDON, Feb. 16.—The trial of the former Greek general staff, accused of acting on behalf of German interests during the war, is concluded. Two are acquitted, one sentenced to death, and a fourth gets penal servitude for life.

BUENOS AYRES, Feb. 16.—Bolivia has formally laid claim to a Pacific port in the province of Arcia, northern Chili.

ASSESSMENT REDUCED TO SAME AS IN 1919

Grand Trunk Property Was Main Subject at Court of Revision on Friday.

At the Court of Revision Friday the appeals of the assessment on the Grand Trunk Pacific waterfrontage was disposed of and the assessment of 1919 was finally adopted for that property. The assessment of Block G which includes the dry dock lands was readjusted. By the ruling of the Court of Revision the G. T. P. is assessable to the extent of \$547,000 and the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Co., \$291,600.

Many appeals for reduction in city property were heard but the most of them were left to stand as they are on the assessment roll. Lots 13, 14 and 15, Block 16, Section 2, belonging to L. and A. Brooksbank and A. Harris were reduced from \$900, \$1,040 and \$870 respectively to \$600 each. The court has adjourned until Tuesday morning.

J. V. Collier, of Francois Lake, charged with assault against his wife and daughter, was committed to the Prince George jail last Friday to await trial in the county court.

A. Kilpatrick, G. T. P. divisional superintendent, returned from a trip east on Monday night. While in Winnipeg Mr. Kilpatrick secured 60 lots on the townsites for the use of the Agricultural Association as fair grounds.

Donald Daniel was fined fifteen dollars last Thursday for being drunk and Antwine Daniel and Mark Pierre paid ten dollars each on the same charge. All three are Burns Lake Indians.

Development work is going on in good style on both the Cassiar Crown and Babine Bonanza mines. It is expected that rich ore will be encountered this spring.

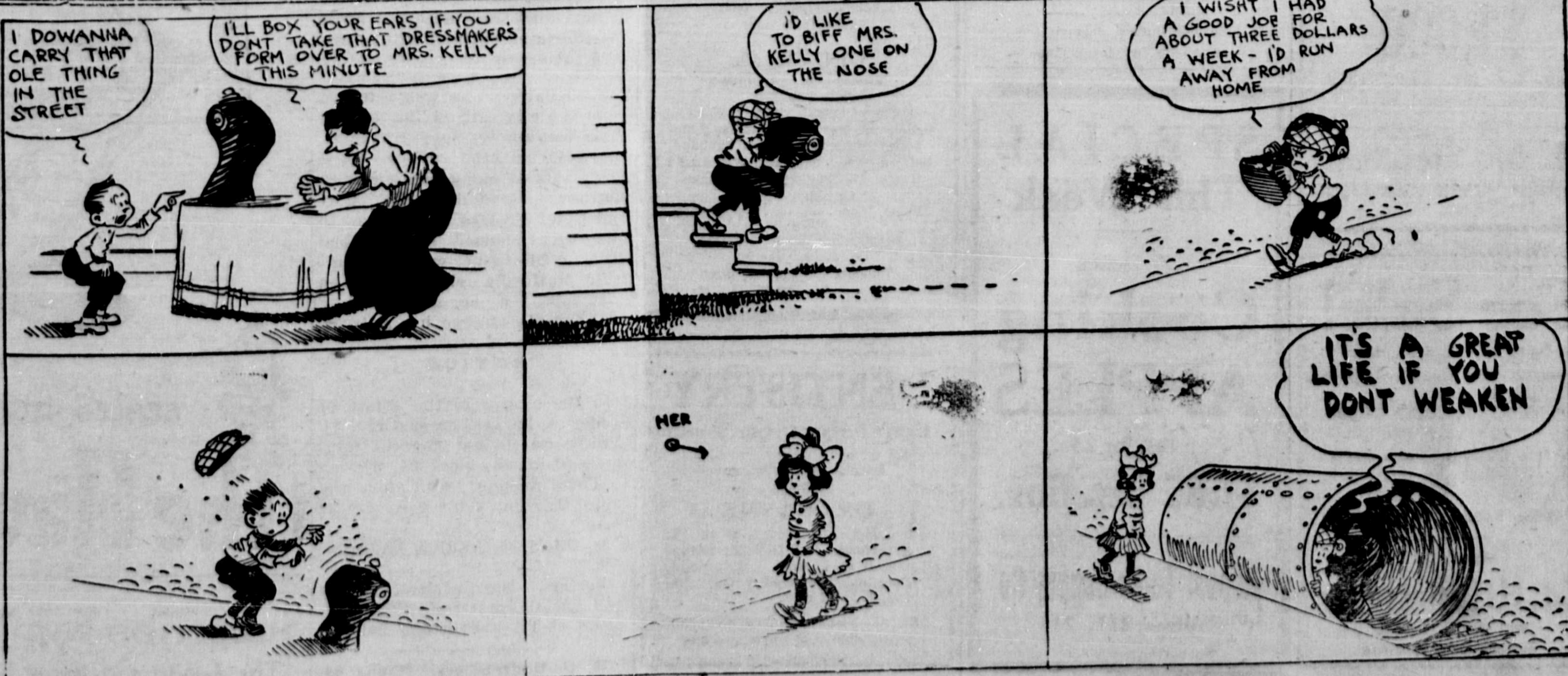

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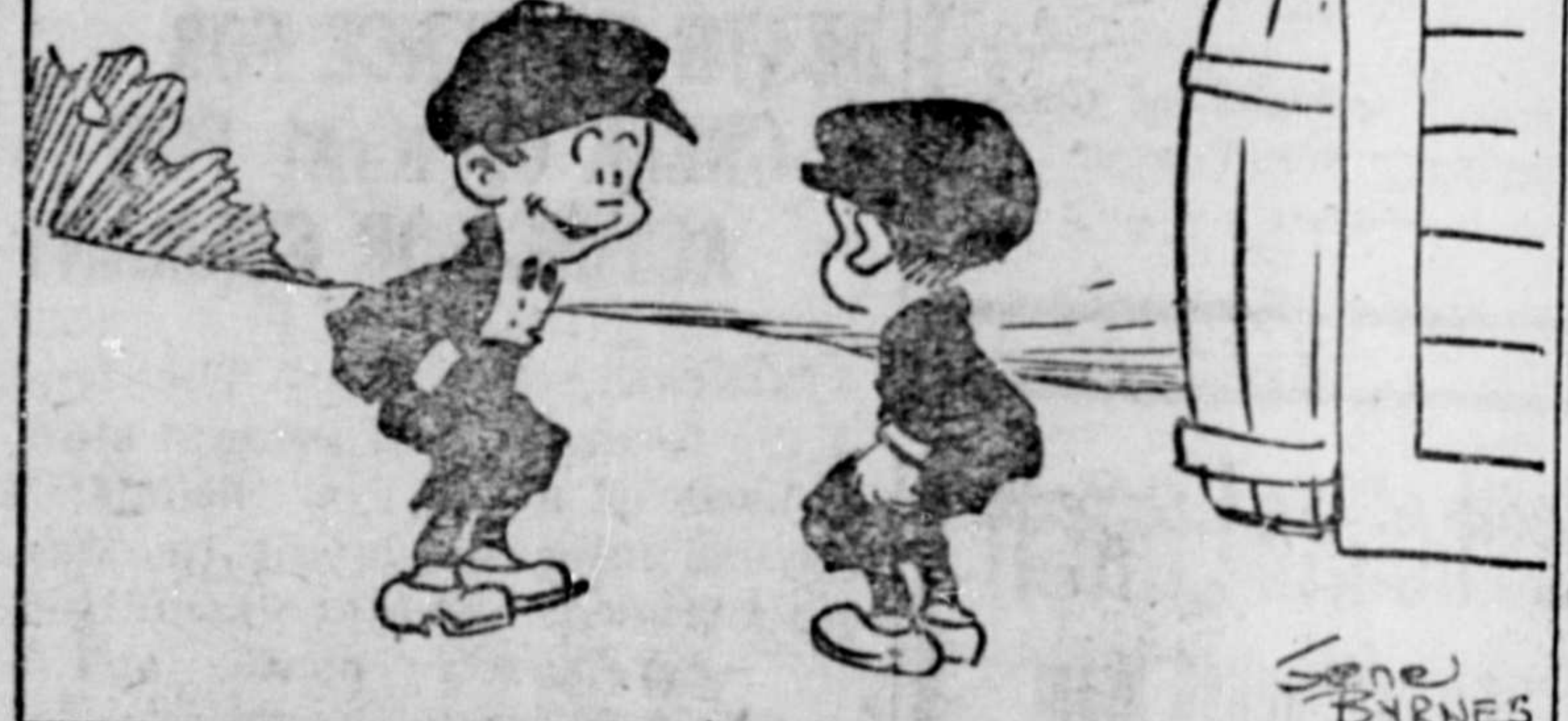
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
