Status of Canada in League of Nations.

By the amendment to the Peace Treaty as proposed in the United States Senate it is proposed to eliminate Canada Australia, South Africa, India and New Zealand from voting at meetings of the League of Nations. If the amendment passes it means that the condition of the United Sates entry will be the exclusion of this and the other countries of the British Empire. As we are in the League to stay, it is to be presumed the United States will remain out, if those are her conditions.

It seems as if the United States was overestimating her importance. Every country would like to see her join the league but not under such conditions. Canada is already a member and Lot seven (7), Block forty-one (41) it will take a great deal of pressure to make her withdraw. 


