Duff Nine Months In Okalla Prison

Police Constable is Sent Down by Magistrate McMordie This Morning; Difficult and Disagreeable Task.

Simon V. Duff was convicted this morning for offering to sell and exposing for sale \$5,000 worth of liquor and sentenced by Magistrate McMordie to nine months' imprisonment with hard labor at Okalla Prison Farm.

Magistrate McMordie showed considerable emotion in delivering his decision, stating that sometimes in his duties as a magistrate he found the cases both difficult and disagreeable and this was most decidedly so. His duty, however, was to find the guilty and he was compelled to find Duff guilty. He had betrayed the trust as a police constable and had broken the law. The case would bring the blush of shame to all returned soldiers. The cases against Bessie Riley, the Leachys and Hoskins were proceeded with.

EVIDENCE IN LEACHY CASE

Prisoner Takes High Moral Ground in Defending Himself in Court.

The case of Dan Leachy was heard this afternoon and the evidence is now all in. Charles Miller testified as to seeing Leachy at the bath house. He referred to the son, Richard, and told to go out with him and would let him know later; as to this was on the first night when he did not have the liquor so the deal was declared on the second night he had again and had been sent out Richard. Later they came and Richard said that they would go through. When he left Dan Leachy on Thursday night the deal had been all right. Duff was in the bath house that night and was talking to Leachy.

and said that his father had nothing to do with the case and knew nothing about it. Duff and himself were the only parties taking part in it and the affair had been arranged by Duff and himself from start to finish, Duff handling the fine points. Any arrangements with other parties had been made by Duff and he knew nothing of the matter. An agreement between Duff and himself for the sharing of the \$5,000 had not been arranged.

The liquor had been moved from Lipsett's house over a week ago and taken to Jack Hoskins' cabin at Seal Cove. On the last trip with the liquor Duff had been picked up at the corner of Sixth Avenue and Tatlow and proceeded to the Cold Storage. Duff told me about Lipsett's liquor and I told him of the offer by Miller. Matt Videck was not told of the participants of the case.

Dan Leachy is remanded until Thursday morning also. The hearing of the fifth party implicated in the Duff case, Jack Hoskins, will come up tomorrow morning when he will face the same charge.

BIG FIGHT OVER OPEN FISHERIES

Strong Influences Being Brought To Bear to Defeat the Project.

There is likely to be a big fight over the matter of open fisheries. Some Vancouver business men held a meeting recently and petitioned the Dominion Government to hold over the open fishing regulation and up to the present no instructions have been sent out in regard to the matter. It will be done by order-in-council, which has not yet been passed.

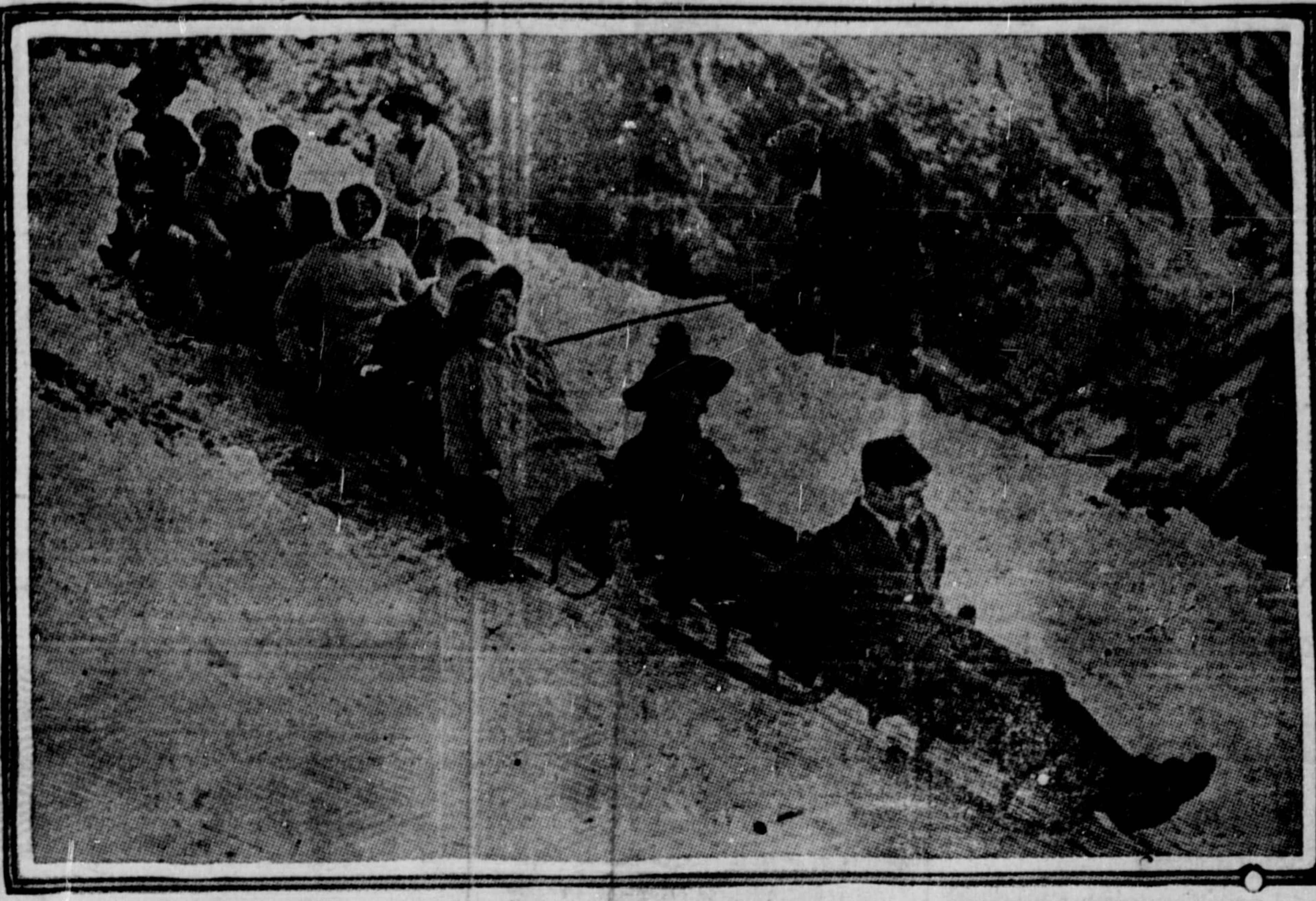
It is understood that every effort is being made by the canners to prevent the opening of the fisheries. The argument used is not that the packers will advantage but that the fish will be better conserved under present conditions.

Colonel Peck is on his way to Ottawa by way of Vancouver and he will have all he can do to hold his own against the strong influences which will be brought to bear, especially in view of the illness of the Minister of Fisheries and the absence and illness of the Premier.

In view of the fact that no regulations have yet been officially promulgated it has been suggested that local public bodies might well take some steps to counteract the strong Vancouver influence.

Sultan to Remain Head of Turkish Empire But the Dardanelles Open to All

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, February 17.—In connection with another meeting held by the Supreme Council of the Allies to take up the Turkish question it was reiterated in conference circles that it had been decided to permit the Sultan to remain in Constantinople as the Turkish sovereign, but that the Dardanelles would be placed under international control.

Liquor Cases Continued In Police Court Today Before Police Magistrate

Bessie Riley and Richard and Daniel Leachy appeared before Magistrate McMordie in the police court this morning charged with exposing for sale and offering to sell liquor for the consideration of \$5,000. The case continued well into the afternoon and at the time of going to press was still being proceeded with. All the evidence has been taken in the Riley case and Mrs. Riley was remanded till 10 o'clock Thursday morning. Richard Leachy pleaded guilty and will be sentenced later. His father, Daniel Leachy, pleaded not guilty.

The first witness in the case, Charles Miller, told of meeting Bessie Riley at her cigar store on Fulton Street for the first time on Wednesday night last. He told her he had come from Ketchikan to buy liquor and she said that she might be able to fix him up. She told him to come with her and he took her to the bath house where he introduced her to the Leachys. In the meantime Duff came in but did not pay much attention to him.

\$100 a Case.
She talked to the Leachys in confidence for a few minutes and then the subject of liquor was spoken of in her presence. He was told that it could be bought but not for less than \$100 a case. Miller was then told to go back to Bessie Riley's and wait. He waited for about an hour and then they called up for him to go back. "I went back and arranged for the liquor and they asked for money but I did not have it," he said. "They then said the deal was off but I said that I would be back."

Cross-Examined.
Examined by Mr. Patmore, defending Bessie Riley, Miller said that the only connection Bessie Riley had with the case was when he showed her the \$5,000 and when she had been present at the bath house when the deal was going through.

Bessie Riley was then called in her own defence. He had come to her store on the night in question and told of wishing to buy liquor. She told him that he ought to be able to get lots

around town. At that time she was entertaining a friend in her dining room and left to go out and get some records for her gramophone from the bath house. Miller expressed the desire to go along with her and went along where she introduced him to the Leachys. He appeared to be known around there before. He started to talk to the Leachys and Bessie Riley excused herself and went home.

Friend of Hers.
"I told the Leachys that Miller was a friend of mine and that he was looking for liquor. Before going home I played three records on their machine," said Mrs. Riley.

"The next day the Leachys called on me inquiring for Miller. I called him up and told him to come up. Then, when he arrived, I sent him over to the bath house. I knew nothing about the liquor sale but had merely been told by the Leachys once that if anybody wanted to get liquor to send them to the bath house. I told him about others where I thought he could get liquor before I mentioned the Leachys." Here Mr. Patmore's examination ended.

W. E. Williams, city solicitor, inquired from Mrs. Riley who the parties were she had told him about before the Leachys and she mentioned four local residents, one of whom, however, had his on an island and was afraid to touch it. Before Mr. Williams' examination Mrs. Riley stated that she had gone through so much in the last few days that she could not remember everything.

No Real Information.
Mr. Patmore examining her again found that she had no reliable information as to where liquor could be got. She denied seeing any money and Miller was no special friend of hers. The first suspicion she had had of trouble was when Leachy told her the next day about Duff and Richard Leachy being at the police station.

Mr. Patmore in summing up the case said that as there was no rebuttal by Charles Miller of Mrs. Riley's contradictory evidence it must be accepted as the truth. The important point in her favor was that she had told Miller of other places where he could get liquor before the Leachys. There was nothing in the case to do but conjecture. Mr. Williams had to go far afield to associate her with the case as an accomplice. He criticised the B. C. prohibition act as being against all law and justice. It would be an outrage to convict the woman on such evidence. She had known nothing about a theft or sale and Duff had not taken her into his confidence. She had no direct connection with the matter; and no indirect, either, other than any ordinary citizen might have.

Allegedly an Agent.
Mr. Williams stated that Bessie Riley had been the first party to whom Miller had gone on his quest for liquor. She introduced Miller to the Leachys and had been practically an agent. The

WILL ATTEMPT RESTRAINT OF SCHOOL BOARD

City Council Consider that Trustees are Handling New School in Arbitrary Manner.

The presenting of the extraordinary estimates for school purposes for the present year was the cause of a general discussion of school matters at the city council meeting last night. They have been referred to the Finance Committee for report. The City Council will also endeavor to obtain a restraining order on the placing of the new Hays Cove School directly facing Sixth Ave., as has been decided by the School Board. To this end the city solicitor is being consulted.

Alderman Perry urged the Finance Committee to consider carefully the classification of the estimates. He also referred to the joint conference that the city council had been invited to attend with the School Board and to which only two members of the School Board came. The mayor did not favor the putting of the school directly facing Sixth Ave. He considered that it would be better to place it on either side of the circle so as to add to the appearance of the longest avenue in the city which was Sixth Ave.

Was Overruled.
Alderman McLennan stated that he had been the only member of the School Board who had opposed the putting of the school directly facing Sixth Ave., but he had been overruled. He felt that by placing the school to one side a more suitable sports ground could be allowed for. Alderman Dybbavn also opposed the placing of the school facing Sixth Ave. He favored another conference of the city council and the school board at an early date.

Alderman Rochester could not see why two or three members of the school board should handle the matter of a \$150,000 school in an arbitrary manner. The placing of the school facing Sixth Avenue would be making a monument. He objected to the city council being made a goat of at a conference and being ditched the way they were. He felt that 7 per cent of the people would favor placing the school to one side of the circle.

Status of Canada in League of Nations.

By the amendment to the Peace Treaty as proposed in the United States Senate it is proposed to eliminate Canada Australia, South Africa, India and New Zealand from voting at meetings of the League of Nations. If the amendment passes it means that the condition of the United States entry will be the exclusion of this and the other countries of the British Empire. As we are in the League to stay, it is to be presumed the United States will remain out, if those are her conditions.

It seems as if the United States was overestimating her importance. Every country would like to see her join the league but not under such conditions. Canada is already a member and it will take a great deal of pressure to make her withdraw. That is the attitude taken by the Government, and the people will back them on this matter.

Ability of Labor To Govern a Country.

Winston Spencer Churchill, son of Lord Randolph Churchill, the spectacular son of a spectacular father, believes that labor is unfitted to rule. Apparently he believes that the Churchills and their ilk are the chosen of the Lord to rule the common people.

Some of the labor people will doubtless ask what particular ability has been shown by many of those who consider themselves the Lord's anointed. They will ask why it is that after so many years of rule by aristocrats, there is so much poverty and suffering and injustice in the world. As a matter of fact the average member of parliament has never made any study of the science of government, whereas the labor leaders in most cases have read very widely and have taken every opportunity to study conditions in countries where advanced legislation is in force.

If the Churchills, the Cecils and the other ruling families of Great Britain had been able to eliminate the slums of the big cities, to clean up the filth, to provide that every worker should have a living wage and had succeeded in doing away with the injustices and inequalities which obtain in that country, there would be some reason perhaps for a perpetuation of the type of administration. While it must be admitted that considerable has been done, there is yet much to do. The men who have returned after fighting the battles of the nation and seeing something of what is going on in other parts of the world and rubbing shoulders with people from overseas, are getting a new vision. They are asserting themselves, and rightly so.

Nothing could be better for Britain than for a labor administration to take charge. They will likely do so when opportunity offers, for, from all accounts, they are gradually gaining strength in the country.

From this it must not be inferred that every laboring man is suited to become a legislator or that all labor leaders are level headed or suited for governing. There are, however, many labor men just as capable and just as clear in their ideas, if not clearer, than men from other walks of life.

Women Lawyers In This Province.

The January number of the British Columbia Monthly has an interesting article on "Women Lawyers of British Columbia" illustrated with four half tones of the four ladies who at present are practising law in the province. They are Misses Ringland, Paterson, Kitchen and Lalonde. Of these Miss Ringland of Victoria is an expert on municipal law. Miss Paterson has already made several appearances in court as counsel; Miss Kitchen is in the office of A. H. McNeill, K. C., while Miss Lalonde is a proficient French scholar and often does duty as interpreter in law cases. The B. C. Monthly gives a short sketch of each which is interesting to everyone who likes to keep in touch with the advancement of civilization.

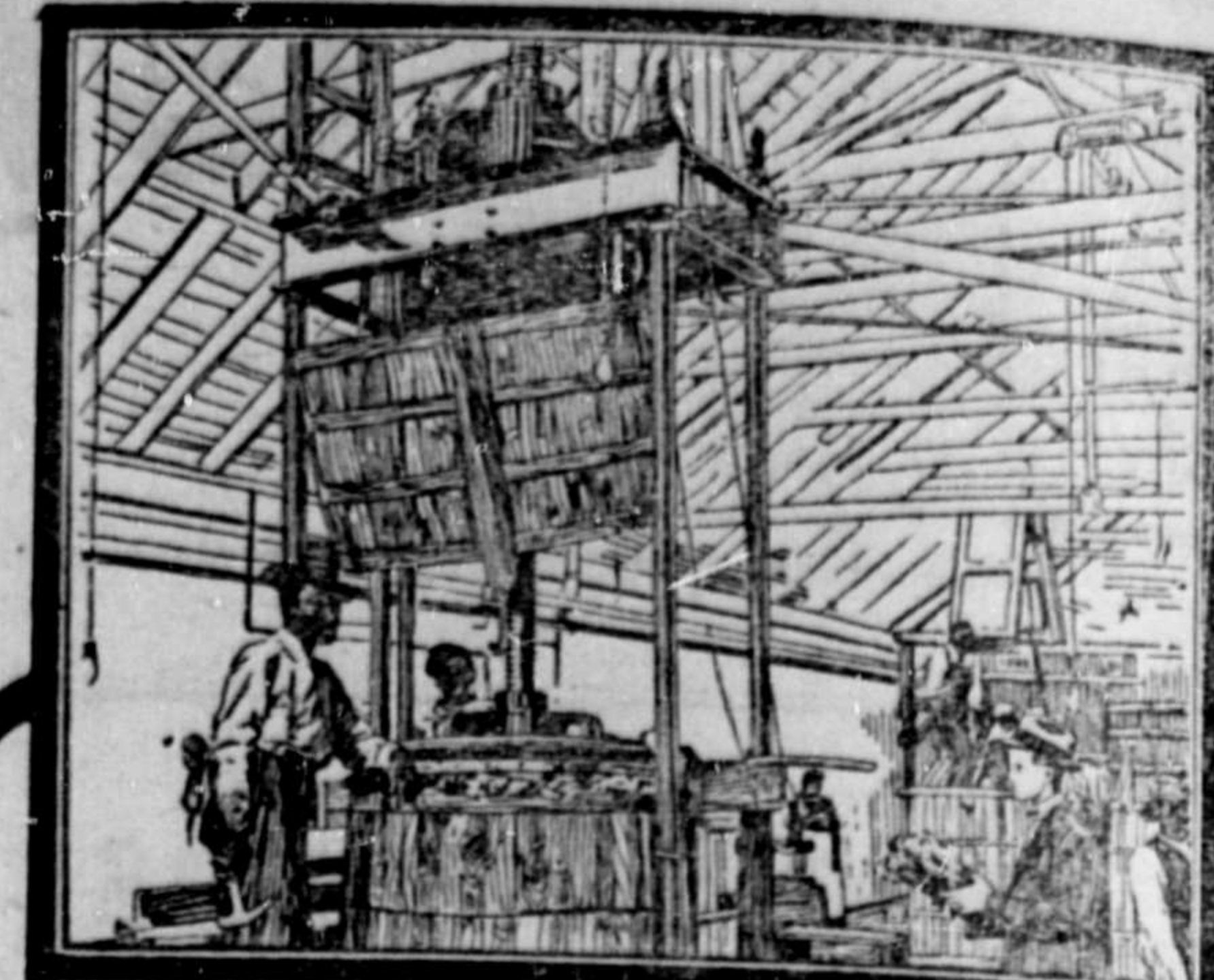

CITY TO STAND PAT ON COW BAY

Letter From Patmore & Fulton Asking for Decision as to Stand.

A letter was read at last night's city council meeting from Patmore & Fulton as to the city's position on the Cow Bay dispute. According to the letter, the G. T. P. is to make application to the Railway Commission in the near future for permission to fill in Cameron Cove, but the company first wants to know the city's stand.

A reply is to be sent to the law firm stating that the city considers it has waterfront rights in that vicinity and that pending the taking of the matter up with the Provincial Government, the Railway Commission and the G. T. P. it is going to "stand pat" for those rights. It was not the opinion of the council that the railway company would go ahead with improvements under the present conditions.

ARRIVED SUNDAY DIED ON MONDAY

Harry Molony Who Had Been Visiting Here Three Months Passed Away at Victoria.

The death occurred in Victoria on Monday morning of Harry H. Molony, father of Mrs. C. C. Clementson and Mrs. W. F. Benson of this city. Mr. and Mrs. Molony had been visiting here with their daughters for about three months and left for Victoria on Thursday night, arriving in Victoria on Sunday morning. News of Mr. Molony's death therefore came as a great shock to his daughters and to those who knew him here.

Mr. Molony is particularly well known in Victoria where he had lived for something like 26 years. He was best known as the manager and proprietor of the Brown Jug Inn at the corner of Government and Fort Streets which he kept for many years. Previous to that he was connected with the Dominion Hotel at Victoria.

Since the closing of the Brown Jug, Mr. Molony has conducted a summer hotel, Savira Lodge, at Shawnigan Lake, which was very popular with fishermen and others who spent their holidays there. Mr. Molony was an ardent sportsman and always took a keen interest in baseball as well as other games and sports. He was born in the United States about 55 years ago, but his long residence here had made him a keen Canadian. His sons-in-law in this city are W. F. Benson, purchasing agent for the Prince Rupert Dry Dock & Engineering Co., and son of a former member of the Legislature, and C. C. Clementson, order clerk at the same institution.

TANGLE IN HEALTH DEPARTMENT OVER NATURE OF DISEASE

Walter Shaw, of Pacific Rooms, Alleges Laxity in Health Department.

Walter Shaw appeared before the city council last night with objections as to the way he had been treated by the Health Department. It was stated that a contagious disease broke out in his apartments, the Pacific Rooms, where a number of families reside. Dr. Cade, the health officer, diagnosed the case as measles but the police had entered it as scarlet fever and had put a restraint, making he or Mrs. Shaw criminally responsible if anyone left the house and deaths occurred as a result.

The mayor and the board of health are investigating the confusion of the two diseases and are to adjust the matter. Mr. Shaw claims laxity on the part of the health officer in not cleaning up various parts of the city and objects to the stigma of scarlet fever being unjustly placed on his house.

The Indian child, who had the disease, died yesterday morning.

NO FURTHER INCREASE IN HEALTH SALARIES

Health Committee's Amendment Failed to Pass at Council Meeting Last Night.

An amendment was brought in by the Health Committee at the council meeting last night to the recommendation made at last meeting for increases in wages to the health department employees. The increases made in the utilities department this year were on a 10 per cent basis while the health department increases were in the neighborhood of eight per cent and the health employees had objected to this.

Alderman Perry moved that the amendment be not considered and was seconded by Ald. Rochester. The vote was then put and the amendment was declared lost, Aldermen Perry, McLennan, Dybhavn and Rochester voting that it be not considered and Aldermen Currie, Kerr, and Murray voting in favor of the amendment. Ald. Casey was not present.

FIR TREE SUGAR

The American Forestry Magazine Speaks of Discovery of Professor Davidson.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The American Forestry Magazine has an account of the growth of sugar on British Columbia fir trees. The discovery which is said to be of great value to chemistry, came as the result of investigations of Professor Davidson, chief of the botanical department of the University of British Columbia at Vancouver. A specimen of the product upon analysis is said to have indicated the presence of a large percentage of an extremely rare variety of sugar. While fir sugar is not expected to become a factor in the food supply like the product of the Canadian beet, the article advances the belief that it will prove useful. Indians have made use of the sugar for many years.

GERMAN-AMERICAN TRADE IS REVIVING

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—Trade between Germany and the United States is reviving rapidly. At least one line of exports to the United States has passed pre-war levels, that of china and porcelain.

COMMERCIAL AIR ROUTES ON THE PACIFIC COAST

Celebrated Official of the British Government to be Here March 1.

LOCAL HYDROPLANE SERVICE PROPOSED

Major K. E. Clayton-Kennedy, one of the world's most celebrated aerial men who did valuable work in connection with aerial activities for the British War Office during the war, is expected in Prince Rupert about March 1 to look into the question of inaugurating a transcontinental aerial trunk route with Prince Rupert as the Pacific terminus. In a personal letter written to J. F. McGuire by Major Clayton Kennedy this word has been brought to the city.

"A number of British government officials who managed the manufacture and operation of aeroplanes in England during the war have come to Canada," said Mr. McGuire to a News representative yesterday afternoon. They have made Montreal their headquarters for the purpose of studying the question of aerial transportation in this country. They are planning the establishing of several aerial routes in Canada including two transcontinental lines. For publicity they have established a monthly magazine called "The Aer plane in Canada" which made its initial appearance in December last. This periodical is affiliated with a similar organ which has been published in England for some time.

Head of Venture.

"The man who is at the head of this venture in Canada is K. E. Clayton-Kennedy who is planning the routes and establishing of services. Already, under the joint auspices of the Dominion Government and these officials a service between Montreal and Newfoundland was put in operation a few weeks ago.

"I received a letter from Major Clayton-Kennedy a week ago telling that he would be in Prince Rupert in about a fortnight to discuss the establishing of an aeroplane service in this district and more especially a local hydroplane service with coast points for the carrying of mails and passengers. The time for freight service is, as yet, deemed a little premature.

Conditions Favorable.

"Prince Rupert is the terminus of one of the proposed transcontinental trunk aerial routes and in addition there is in view this local service for which a need is keenly felt. The fact of a hydroplane being able to make the run between here and Masset or Stewart in an hour or so would greatly exceed the efficiency of any transportation systems we have at present. Besides this, the geographical conditions here make the use of the hydroplane very feasible.

"Major Clayton Kennedy and all the men who are working on the question in the east have expressed the emphatic opinion that no

country in the world presents a better opportunity for commercial aeroplaning than Canada and especially hydroplaning on the Pacific Coast.

Government Support.

"The Dominion Government is giving these men its whole hearted support in their endeavors in Canada and the work they are now carrying out is only the pioneering of a scheme that in a short space of years will be one of Canada's greatest transportation systems."

PRICES IN ENGLAND HIGHER THAN HERE

Milk a Shilling a quart in Bristol and meat Two Shillings a Pound.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

BRISTOL, Feb. 16.—The people here are still on rations. Just now the allowance is one ounce of butter each per week. A small amount of meat is allowed but as that is selling at two shillings a pound many are unable to afford to buy much, even if they were allowed to do so.

Milk is selling at a shilling a quart and is scarce at that. Bacon is more plentiful, the best cuts selling at half a crown a pound.

BOLSHEVIK TROOPS ARE CONCENTRATED BORDER OF POLAND

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WARSAW, Feb. 16.—Heavy concentration of Bolsheviki troops are reported at three points along the Polish frontier. Discussion of the peace negotiations to open in March continue in Warsaw and Moscow, however.

P. G. E. RAILWAY

Construction Will Not be Carried Beyond Prince George.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VICTORIA, Feb. 16.—The Pacific Great Eastern Railway will not be constructed into the Peace River country at present, Premier Oliver informed a delegation representing the associated boards of trade. The Premier intimated that Prince George would be the limit of the line according to present plans.

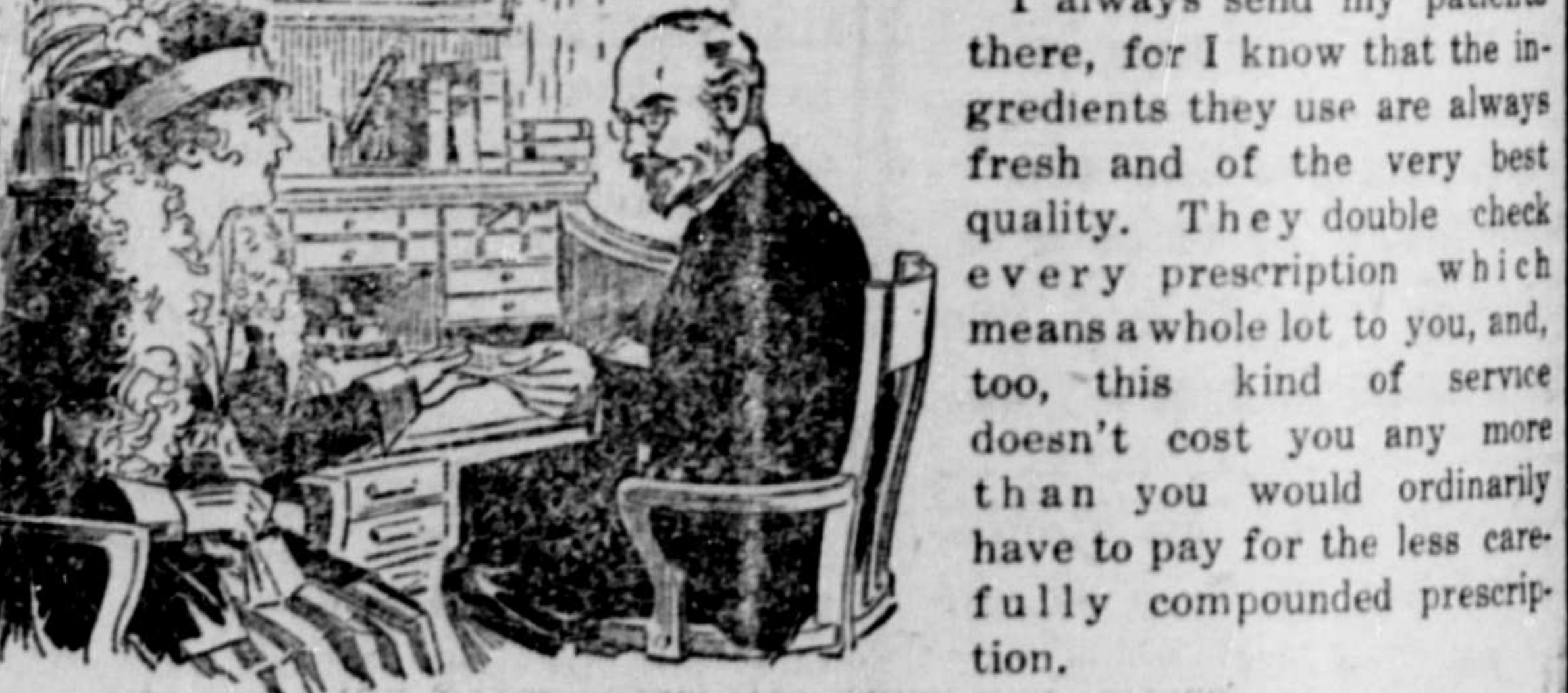
