Thirty Million Dollars of Unbacked Notes Circulated

China and India are Draining this Continent of Precious Metals: Not Enough to go Around.

Silver and Gold Will be High in Price for Years.

Royal Mint Worked During War on British Coinage but for Eight Months has Turned out Canadian.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, February 18.—Because approximately thirty million dollars' worth of unbacked notes are in circulation in various countries of the world, the view is expressed here that for some years to come the gold and silver mines in Canada will have an unexampled opportunity to dispose of their product at exceptionally high prices.

There is not enough silver in the world to stand behind supported paper based on silver and the nations will be very eager to get as much as possible. This is believed to be the case with gold as well.

China and India are draining these continents of supplies, as new Indian methods demand that trade balances be settled, not with paper but with precious metals.

The products of the mines, which a few years ago were not commercially workable, can now in many cases be mined at a profit. The gold production in Canada for 1919 is valued at \$6,275,000 as against \$14,463,000 in 1918 and \$15,272,992 in 1917. For nine months ending December 31 last, export of Canadian gold totalled \$3,384,952 as against \$7,549,862 in 1918 and \$1,197,749 in 1917. Of this \$2,197,907 went to the United States and in previous years practically all went to the United States.

There is great possibility of expansion by starting up mines now lying idle and developing promising properties seems to be indicated. The Royal Mint in Ottawa has been running over eight months on Canadian coinage. During the year it minted for the British treasury several hundred million dollars' worth of South African gold to send to New York to support sterling exchange there. When that stopped the pound began to drop in value as measured by the American dollar.

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UNUSUAL FISH BROUGHT HERE

New Fish Landed at the Royal Fisheries Plant, is Denizen of Tropical Waters.

One of the halibut boats unloading at the Royal Fisheries plant at the government wharf yesterday brought in an unusual specimen. The fish was at first believed to be a monster black cod as it weighed 200 pounds.

It was later pronounced by expert fish men to be one of the species called jew-fish or sea bass. It is a rather unusual catch in these northern waters as its natural habitat is the Gulf of Mexico or the Lower California coast. It is similar to a black cod in color and flesh but is more the shape of a spring salmon and has scales like it and is very firm. The species has been caught before in the north but very rarely.

SIR DONALD MANN IS BEING SUED FOR QUARTER OF MILLION

TORONTO, Feb. 18.—Sir William MacKenzie and Sir Donald Mann are being sued by Annie Murray, James R. Murray, and George Murray of this city, for the recovery of \$250,000 alleged to be due as penalty on a bond dated June 27, 1913. The bond, it is said, was to secure payment of \$102,750, balance claimed as unpaid with interest on a mortgage alleged to have been executed by Elmer Ogilvie, real estate agent, to the plaintiffs for \$150,000.

Population of Sebastapol Panic Stricken by Advance of Reds; Odessa Outrage

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 18.—The population of Sebastopol, Russia's great seaport in the Crimea, is panic stricken over the Bolshevik menace. There is danger of a repetition of events which took place at Odessa when the Reds captured that city. Refugees are telling of the last hours spent in Odessa Harbor say that crews of ships were compelled to turn machine guns upon the crowds to prevent them from overloading and sinking vessels about to sail.

The Bolsheviks had begun raking the docks with machine guns while there were fully 5,000 still trying to make their escape.

Four More Countries Join League of Nations; Chile, Paraguay, Argentine, Persia

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, February 18.—Official notification has been received that four additional countries have joined the League of Nations—Persia, Chile, Paraguay, and Argentine. The admission of South American countries is regarded here as of particular significance, in view of the stand taken by the Canadian Government in respect of Canada's status and voting rights in the league. Paraguay, for instance, is a country of only a million population as compared with over eight millions in Canada, but Paraguay will now have the same voting rights in the assembly as the Dominion.

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COURT OF REVISION HANDLED MANY CASES

Few Changes Were Made, However, Yesterday—Sit Tomorrow Morning.

The work of the Court of Revision was nearly wound up yesterday when there was both morning and afternoon sessions, 96 cases being disposed of. There yet remain 3 cases for further consideration and 27 cases that have not yet been touched. The sessions will be resumed tomorrow morning at 10:30. Despite the large number of appeals presented yesterday, very few changes were made.

The assessment for improvements at the old Dominion Hotel on the corner of First Ave. and Eighth St. was reduced from \$2,000 to \$1,200. This property belongs to E. J. Walsh. Lots 21 and 22, block 39, Section 8, were reduced from the valuation of \$480 and \$500 to \$440 and \$450 respectively. These were appealed by E. H. Mortimer. Lot 12, block 16, Section 2, was reduced in valuation from \$940 to \$600. It belongs to the F. De Mussy estate.

BOLSHEVIST WINNING IN RUSSIAN ELECTION

Duff and Leachy On Theft Charge

Jack Hoskins was Before Magistrate on Trial for Offering to Sell Liquor and Remanded Until Tomorrow.

Simon V. Duff and Richard Leachy were this morning charged in the police court with stealing on February 5 and 6 from the residence of Harry Lipsett, 50 cases of liquor valued at \$1,300, same liquor being the property of Mr. Lipsett.

As this is an indictable offense the accused did not plead in the police court. On the request of W. E. Williams, city solicitor, adjournment was made until tomorrow when an important witness for the prosecution will be in court.

Jack Hoskins, the last member in the alleged liquor ring, came up before the magistrate this morning and the complete evidence in his case was taken. He is also charged with exposing for sale and offering to sell liquor for the consideration of \$5,000. The case was adjourned until tomorrow morning when Bessie Riley and Daniel Leachy will come up for the magistrate's decision and the cases against Duff and Richard Leachy, charged with stealing liquor will have preliminary trial.

The Evidence.

The first witness in the Hoskins selling case this morning was Matt Videck. He said he knew of some deal on the night of Duff's arrest. Some cases of liquor, had been moved from Hoskins' house at Seal Cove that night but he did not know how much, only there had been two loads. Jack Hoskins, Duff and himself had handled it and it had gone to the esgine room at the Cold Storage. Hoskins and the man on the Narbethong and himself had carried it from there down to the float where Charles Miller, and Duff were. Here ended Mr. Williams' examination.

Mr. Patmore, defending Hoskins, brought forth the fact that Videck knew the liquor was stolen when he was taking it from the wharf. He had been told by Dick Leachy of a company consisting of Harry Lipsett, Jack Miller, George Sweet and Simon Duff.

Not Known Stolen.

"I knew that the liquor was from Lipsett's house," said Videck, "and the next day I learned that Lipsett was not home when the liquor was taken. I had been told to stop on Fourth Avenue, until further instructions were given. Dick Leachy handed me the cases on the street and I put them in the car. I understood that they were from the verandah of the house. At that time I did not know it was being stolen, in fact, I did not know what was going on."

Charles Miller, who was next called, said that he was buying liquor last Friday morning and that he saw Videck packing the liquor down then.

Constable Bailey, who was present when Duff was arrested, testified to seeing the accused after, he had left the boat. He was on the dock and Matt Videck was also there. This closed the case.

Counsel Sum Up.

Mr. Patmore argued that it had not been shown that Hoskins had been involved in any transaction and that from the evidence there was really no case.

Mr. Williams stated that the evidence of Matt Videck proved the sale of liquor. The case was then adjourned to allow the stenographer to extend the evidence.

PRICES SOAR AT FUR SALE IN NEW YORK

Muskrat Reaches Highest Ever Paid and Other Advances Large.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—Touching a record mark of \$5 per skin, the highest ever paid at auction of raw fur in this city, brown muskrat was sold at the start of the second day of the sale. Mink easily captured second place with marmot, stone-marten, and marten following as named. The sales for the day reached \$1,600,000.

The grand total for the first two days' sale reached \$3,100,000. Compared with corresponding prices obtained at the October sale, figures showing the percentages of advances as follows: Mink, 100 per cent. Marmot, 75 per cent. Stone marten, 65 per cent. Brown muskrat, 60 per cent. Marten, 35 per cent.

MANY BLIND ARE FOUND ON PRAIRIES

Investigations Being Carried on There by National Institute.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 18.—A campaign for the care and training of blind persons and the prevention of blindness is being launched under the newly formed "Central Western Board" of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind. Dr. Daniel McIntyre, superintendent of the Winnipeg public schools, is chairman of this board. Its headquarters are at 745 Somerset block and it embraces Manitoba and Saskatchewan. A survey to determine the number of blind within this area is being carried on and to date 211 blind persons have been located in Manitoba and more than 300 in the two provinces.

The Canadian National Institute is already in touch with 6,000 known totally blind persons in the Dominion. Its aim in a general way is: To help these afflicted ones to become self-supporting, self-respecting citizens by giving them special industrial training; to bring brightness and hope into their lives by breaking the deadly monotony of sitting with hands folded in the darkness; to prevent blindness by teaching proper care of the eyesight, especially in the schools; and to help save persons with failing sight from becoming entirely blind.

War Memorial is Now Being Planned.

The Great War Veterans Association is now getting actively to work in connection with the war memorial which it is proposed to erect on the property above the city hall site. It is thought by the veterans that the time is propitious and that a commencement should be made with the work soon.

As this scheme has been under consideration for some time past, and as all the men are now home, who may be expected to return, this seems to be the time to get to work in real earnest to make the memorial an accomplished fact. It is for the committees to decide just what shall be done, but of this they may feel sure, that the people will be with them in establishing a suitable and permanent memorial of the men who lost their lives and of the other men who gave their services so freely and in many cases lost health or limbs for the cause.

Now that the site is already secured in a most suitable place, there should be little delay. All that is needed is to decide definitely on the plans and to raise the money.

Library Should be Separate Institution.

A proposal has been made to have the public library included in the scheme. If this is done we hope the library will not be made subsidiary to anything else. To place it away upstairs, or to give it a subordinate position would be to sidetrack what should be the most important institution in the city. It is doubtful if the public library should be included in this scheme, but if it is, it should be given the best ground floor position and a librarian chosen as one who will be first and foremost a librarian, not a janitor or caretaker.

It is usually bad for a library to be included in any scheme which caters to other activities than educational. It sometimes helps when raising money to have this scheme tacked on, but it is better for the library to be in a shack with a librarian in charge than to be an adjunct to something else.

The library is a purely civic institution and should be taken care of by the city. The War Memorial is a matter more for individual citizens, civic in the sense that it should be the expression of the civic spirit, the civic sense of appreciation of services rendered.

Revolutions Occur Regularly Here.

In this country we often have revolutions. Every time a government is overthrown, it is a revolution although a peaceable and constitutional revolution. In Ontario recently there was a revolution against the two old parties and a new one was formed which swept the country. That is a revolution of the right type. It is the method which must obtain in a proper self-governing country. Unless we are able to bring about changes in that way, and are willing to take defeat in a proper spirit, we are not really ready for self-government.

In this country there is every opportunity for self expression for every person or party. There is a proper constitutional means of obtaining redress at all times, although it is sometimes necessary to wait while the people are being educated along the right lines. If the reform is a right one, it will eventually win out.

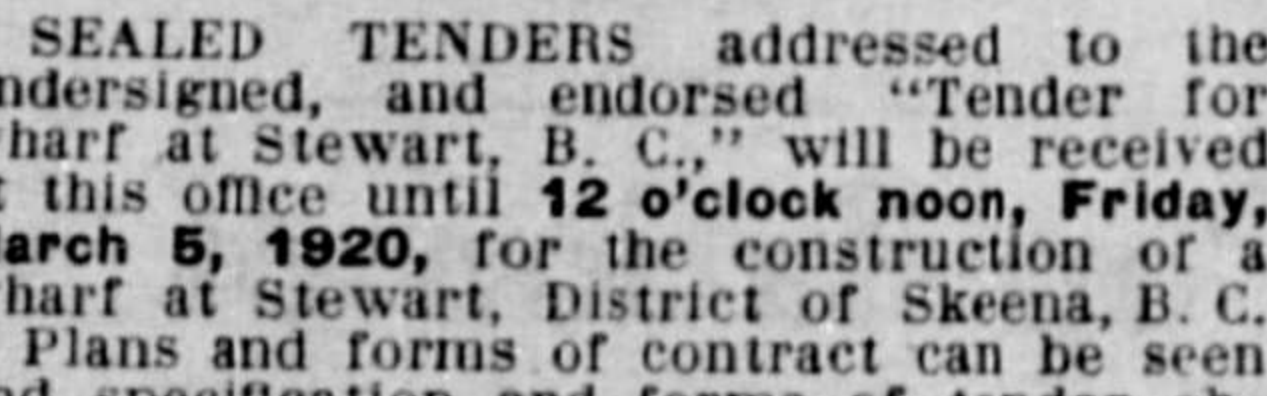

LARGE PRICES PAID FOR FURS

Americans Purchase Largely on London Market, Especially Seal.

LONDON, Feb. 17.—Prices of furs at London fur sales have been so high that scenes at the bidding have been of the wildest. Good chinchilla, which before the war cost 16 shillings a skin now fetches 40 pounds, while fox, before the war, was six or seven pounds, and is now 25 pounds. All the seal on the market was bought by a single American bidder at prices 340 per cent higher than in October last. He outbid everyone else for every skin. "The skins were almost fought for," said the manager of one large international house, "that before the war would have been sold only in Whitechapel. Expensive furs have gone up most but fur houses with high reputation would not have kept on the premises the skins they now are obliged to sell at prices higher than really good furs in 1914."

Sweep Market.
A dominant feature of this week's sales was the determination of the Americans to sweep the market at any price. Prices so far show the following rises percent above last October: Wolverine, chinchilla, stone marten, 100; marten, 75; otter and Russian sable, 50; fisher and lynx, 40; white silver and cross fox, 20 to 25; ermine, 10.

The depreciation on the dollar exchanges is seriously affecting Canadian business here. Harrison Watson, trades commissioner says the only definite comment to be made on it, is that it is holding up business all over. It is much worse than in December when he arrived and will become worse still. Canadian goods are wanted very badly here even at the Canadian demand to trade on the basis of current rate of exchange. Canadian firms are benefitting from the inequality of the American and the Canadian dollar. British buyers are realizing they can buy still cheaper from Canadian firms than United States firms. "As far as Canada is concerned, says Mr. Watson, it is not so serious as it would have been say a year ago. Many large firms have as much home made as they can undertake."

SELL MILK ON BUTTERFAT BASIS

Ontario Minister of Agriculture to Introduce Bill to Protect Farmer.

TORONTO, February 17.—Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture in the Provincial government, will introduce a bill after the assembly of the house to provide for the sale of milk at wholesale on a butterfat content basis. This will secure the farmer who sells rich milk the full value of his product and will help to eliminate the poor milk which is often offered for sale.

The new bill will provide for the appointment of inspectors to oversee the sales and make sure that the producer receives the correct price.

There is already heard some criticism that this is class legislation by the farmers for their own benefit.

RED DURHAM PASSED AWAY YESTERDAY AT TACOMA OF INFLUENZA

Funerals Were on Way From Usk to Tacoma to Bedside.

Arriving on last night's train en route to Tacoma, having been ill there by the severe illness of his son Fred from an attack of influenza, Charles Durham, of Usk, received the sad news on arrival here that the son had passed away. He continued his journey south on the Chelohsin accompanied by his wife and will arrive in time for the funeral. It was only last week that Mr. Durham received word of the death of his grandchild, the child of the deceased son. Fred Durham was well known in the river, having resided at Usk until recently. The general sympathy of the district will go out to Mr. and Mrs. Durham in their bereavement.

MANY FINE FURS TAKEN

Indians on Queen Charlottes Out After Pelts for First Time.

MASSET, Feb. 18.—The Indians here have been making good money this winter trapping marten, land otter, black bear and ermine. These are the only fur bearing animals found here and this is the first time that the Indians have realized their value. Owing to the rapid advance in the price of the pelts, something like

one hundred whites and Indians have taken to the woods or gone out in their boats in search of furs.

One of the Prince Rupert dealers recently visited Masset and bought \$3,000 worth of pelts, and this has given added interest to the hunt. While the furs are said to be not quite as good as in the interior of the mainland, owing to the mild climate, they fetch good prices. One Indian here shot thirteen black bear in one week.

The village at Skidegate has about 250 natives that are just about holding their own from a population point of view. An Indian office was opened there recently and Mr. Deasy spends part of his time at that place and part at Masset.

Asked whether the Indians at Masset were holding their own, Mr. Deasy said that they were on the increase. Last year there were sixteen births and only six deaths, the total population being 60, of whom about seventy were children attending school.

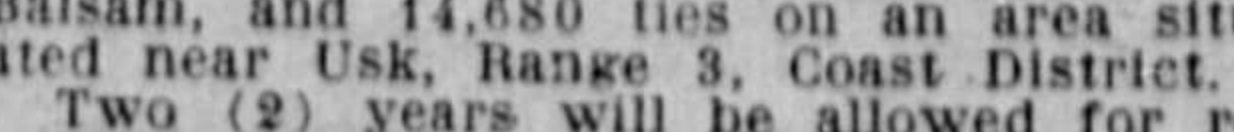

Grimsby of Pacific

The Port of a Tremendous Country of Vast Potentials.
By G. A. WOODLAND, in Imperial Oil Review

Situated as it is in a district rich beyond description in natural resources and which are on the very eve of enormous developments, Prince Rupert bids fair within a very short time to rival its older competitors to the south. Although in its infancy the port has wonderful geographical advantages and at the present time is the home of the greater part of the fishing fleet which operates in the North Pacific.

Waters Teem With Fish.

No other port of its age and size in the world, and very few others, if any at all, can compare favorably with Prince Rupert in the richness of its waters. Out of 1,616,157 cases of salmon packed in British Columbia in 1918, 1,017,491 cases, or practically two-thirds of the catch, was made in this district.

Over 25,000,000 pounds of halibut was landed during the same year, while close upon 3,000,000 pounds of ground fish such as plaice, whiting, sole, skate, brill, black cod, grey cod, ling cod and herrings were taken in the same period. The total value of the combined catches being approximately \$18,000,000. Inland rivers and lakes abound with many species of trout, white fish and other edible fish. Prince Rupert is also acting as a receiving house for the Alaska fish products and most of the fish caught in those waters go through this port to eastern markets.

Rich Mineral Deposits.

Words fail to adequately describe the mining possibilities of northern British Columbia. Rich deposits of gold, silver, copper, lead, zinc, iron and coal abound in many districts and developments are going on apace.

Anyox, located some eighty miles to the north of Prince Rupert, is the seat of the largest copper mines and smelters in Canada. They are owned by the Granby Mining, Smelting and Power Company, and immense new coking ovens were recently added to their plant at a cost of \$2,000,000. These people are large users of Imperial Oil products.

Another mine of great richness is situated on an arm from the main channel called Alice Arm and is known by the name of the "Dolly Varden." At least 750,000 tons of rich silver and lead ores are already blocked out, and this mine is now in full operation.

Further up the coast at a place called Stewart, the Premier mine is located and is also under active operation and producing silver ore ranging from \$300.00 to \$3,000.00 per ton. This mine is one of the biggest ever discovered in North America.

Forest Products.

It is estimated that we have a clear standing growth of forty billion feet, board measure, of marketable spruce, and in a very short space of time twenty-five mills have sprung up enabling the manufactured product to be shipped to Eastern Canada, the United States and Europe.

Queen Charlotte Islands is the home of the famous Sitka spruce, millions of feet of which have been shipped overseas to be used in the manufacture of aeroplanes.

The district holds a vast fortune in pulp wood, too. Millions of cords are still in standing growth. Two large pulp and paper mills have already been established, but there is still room for many more. Ample water power to enable cheap manufacture is easily obtained, and the very near future will see quite an awakening in this industry.

Farming and Ranching.

The interior of northern and central British Columbia, tapped by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, of which Prince Rupert is the Pacific terminus, presents wonderful opportunities for mixed farming and live stock raising. The type of country may be classified as plateau and valley lands. As the soil is very rich and natural vegetation very heavy live stock does exceedingly well. Horses, cattle and sheep are raised successfully.

Settlers Coming Fast.

Settlers from the burnt-out portions of the prairie and as far south as Oregon and the Dakotas are coming in very fast. It will only be the matter of very few years before the country will be well settled and a big producer. The climate of the interior varies a great deal, and although

the winters are colder, than on the coast, it may be likened to that of Ontario, except that there is a natural dryness about the air.

A Coming Port.

Residents of this new country are very jealous of its possibilities and confidently foretell the recognition that is coming to Prince Rupert.

Prince Rupert is 400 miles nearer the Orient than any other Pacific port now in existence. This fact alone will mean great savings of time and cost in favor of using this route for transportation and commerce.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, too, was well and wisely constructed. Throughout the coast mountain division a grade of less than half of one per cent is maintained. This grade will allow a speed of forty miles an hour on all trains and results in the handling of more freight at a less cost than on any other railroad in America.

Imperial Oil Limited is fully alive to the possibilities of the port. We believe that it will eventually be one of the leading centres of commerce on the Pacific coast and a most important distributing centre for all kinds of petroleum products.
