## Fireworks Develop at Grand Trunk Shareholders' Meeting

### Clergyman Scores Canadian Political Methods And is Backed by Sir Alfred Smithers; "Government Has No Morals," Says Speaker.

## Agreement to Sell the Line is Endorsed by Gathering

### Resolution of Protest, at Terms Imposed, Passed After Pact is Adopted; Twelve Vote Against Sale.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) LONDON, February 20.—The shareholders of the Grand Trunk Railway, after listening to heated criticisms today, assented to the terms of the agreement with the Dominion Government. Dozens of dissenters held a meeting afterwards and passed a resolution protesting against the terms.

"We have fought hard for nearly two years and we earnestly and unhesitatingly recommend you to accept the agreement," was the final sentence of Sir Alfred Smithers' speech to the shareholders. The meeting was crowded and at times there were strong ejaculations. The shareholders, however, were entirely cordial toward the chairman and his colleagues.

Sir Alfred Smithers declared— "I know there were influential men in Canada who thought that the policy of the Government would pursue was to let us alone and that the weaker we became the easier we could be dealt with. They knew we were carrying on under impossible conditions over which we had no control. I feel we were powerless and being held up. (Cries of "shame" and one "swindlers"). The chairman said that they thought in regard to the Grand Trunk Pacific at least they were entitled to the same consideration as the Canadian Northern.

Rev. Leonard Dawson, formerly of British Columbia, said: "The great trouble has been that this company has been an English company. Our shares were not quoted on the Canadian stock exchanges and the board is almost wholly English. Speaking frankly, in dealing with the Canadian Government, which has no morals, I have had to fight the government there myself over all matters. If we had had a real Canadian board it is understood that the condition would be such that men on the floor of the house could say to the Government like the Canadian Pacific: 'If you do that, mind what you are about because an election will come.' Then we should do better."

"I know it is not a nice way to do things in the country, but that is the way things are done there. I am sorry to say it. I have been a Canadian citizen and like their country. I believe this will lead British investors to send no more money to Canada." (Loud and prolonged cheers greeted the last sentence.)

Chairman Smithers, referring subsequently to the clergyman's speech, said: "From the bottom of my heart I realize he does know Canada from top to bottom."

The resolution was carried with less than a dozen dissenting. Subsequently the resolution protesting against the terms was adopted.

## CHINAMAN BROKE STORE WINDOW

### Was Committed for Trial in the Police Court This Morning.

Lee Wong, a youthful appearing Chinaman, appeared in the police court this morning charged with doing wilful damage in breaking a plate glass window and was committed for trial.

Constable McGlinchy told of being called at noon on the 18th to the store at the corner of 6th Avenue and Fulton Street. The damage done by the accused was reported and he found that a 7 by 6 plate glass window and been shattered with a bottle, the remains of which appeared in court.

Lee Nen and Ah Lung, both Chinese, testified to seeing accused break the window after the former had put him out of the store for being in the road. The father of the accused conducts the store. Both witnesses identified the bottle produced in court as the one that had broken the window.

W. S. Fisher, agent for Justina Reda, the owner of the building, testified as to the amount of the damage, being \$137.30.

## JAPANESE STOP MOVING TROOPS INTO SIBERIA

### All Country Between Vladivostok and Manchuria in Hands of Revolutionists.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Vladivostok, Feb. 20.—As the result of negotiations between General Krakowitz, commander of the Zemstovo army, and M. Matsuda, representing Japan, instructions have been sent to the Japanese general in command to cease sending Japanese to Vladivostok. This move is interpreted as indicating that Japan desires to avoid a conflict with the Russians.

All the country between here and the Manchurian boundary is in the hands of the revolutionists.

## PRINCE RUPERT GETS GOOD RUN

### New Metlakatla Basketball Team Showed Much Class Last Night; Great Attendance.

The crowd of 400 that attended the basket ball game between New Metlakatla and Prince Rupert in the Auditorium last night saw something in the line of indoor sport. The game was one of the very fastest ever staged here and was interesting from start to finish. The combination displayed by the Alaskans was almost perfect and the fact that the Rupert players came along with some strong checking as the visitors reared the basket was the only reason for the victory of the home team by a score of 32-16. At half time the score was 15-10 in Rupert's favor and was anybody's game.

The attendance taxed the capacity of the hall and there was a good representation of ladies. There were two referees, Lee Dell, of Rupert, and E. Hudson, from New Metlakatla. The home players were Clementson, Day, Corkle, Anderson and Hardy.

## INDIAN SURRENDERS

### Peter Wales of Hazelton Will be Tried for Murder Committed 14 Years Ago.

HAZELTON, Feb. 20.—Charged with the murder of two men nearly 14 years ago, since which time there has been a price on his head, Himadan, an Indian, known also as Peter Wales, surrendered to the police here. He will be tried in connection with the death of Alexander McIntosh near Two-Mile, B. C., and Max Lecler on the Kispiox road where the bodies were found on June 19, 1906. The evidence against him is said to be slight.

## FREIGHT RATES ARE ADVANCING

### Effective March 1 a 10% Increase on Coast Steamers Will Come Into Operation.

Effective March 1, freight rates on the coast steamship lines between Vancouver, Victoria, Seattle and this port will advance 10%, following the raise in passenger rates which became effective January 1. Like the raise in the passenger service, the increase in freight is due to the excessive costs of operation on the steamers.

## PATMORE OBJECTS TO HEAVY BAIL

### Magistrate, However, Decides that \$1,000 is Not Unreasonable on Liquor Selling Charge.

Mrs. Belle Ward, charged with selling intoxicating liquor, appeared in the police court this morning and pleaded not guilty. L. W. Patmore, defending accused, made the plea of not guilty. The placing of bail at \$1,000 caused considerable discussion between counsel.

"Such a high bail makes it impossible, almost, for a prisoner to get out," pleaded Mr. Patmore. "Almost anybody would rather pay that bail than get six months," said Mr. Williams.

"Ever since I have been on this bench, I have never asked for less on this charge," remarked Magistrate McMorndie, "and that is my ruling now."

"This is working a hardship on the Salvation Army where women prisoners are housed and I do not think Mr. Williams should ask for such a high figure," went on Mr. Patmore.

"It is not my fault that the Salvation Army is put under hardships, but the fault of the city fathers," remarked Mr. Williams. "I have ruled," from the magistrate.

"I am not satisfied," went on Mr. Patmore, "but if your worship does not wish to hear argument before ruling, all right."

"I have heard this argument dozens of times before and it is only wasting my time. I don't want to hear it, Mr. Patmore."

## WANT MANDATE FROM LABOR REGARDING LABOR SAVING ACT

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) MONTREAL, Feb. 20.—Action is being taken by the Manufacturers Association to secure the opinion of labor in Canada with regard to the passing of a daylight saving law this summer. It is believed that a referendum will give the association a mandate with which to approach the Dominion Government to ask for a Daylight Saving Act.

## MINE EQUIPMENT TAKEN TO STEWART

### W. A. Maloche Took 200 Tons for Northern Light and Spider Properties.

W. A. Maloche and his secretary, J. E. McKnight, went to Stewart on the Prince Albert, taking in 200 tons of mining supplies and equipment for use as soon as spring opens on the Northern Light and Spider claims which are to be developed. The properties are in the hands of the Algonquin Development Co.

## VICTORIA TRIES TO CHECK INFLUENZA

VICTORIA, Feb. 20.—To check the spread of influenza in Victoria and Esquimalt a ban has been placed by the Provincial Government on private and public dances. Unless conditions grow worse, theatres and public assemblies will not be interfered with.

## EMPRESS OF JAPAN HAS BAD VOYAGE

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) VICTORIA, Feb. 20.—With one lifeboat missing, part of her port rails carried away and considerable minor damage, the Empress of Japan, Capt. A. J. Holland, arrived after one of the most severe trips ever experienced during thirty-odd years on the Pacific. She took two days longer than usual to make the run.

## Whiskey Case Continued Before Magistrate and One Witness is Examined

The preliminary trial of Duff and Leachy charged with theft of liquor, was continued in the police court this morning and was adjourned until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning for further witness to be heard. George Sweet was the only witness heard today and he would not identify the liquor produced in court as belonging to him.

"I did not authorize any one to move the liquor, thirty cases of which belonged to me, from Lipsett's house," said Mr. Sweet on being called to the witness stand by W. E. Williams, "nor did I know at the time that it was being moved. I did not open the cases, but I saw them. They were tagged with manila tags tacked on the boxes. These tags bore my name and the name of the vendors, Natt Bell Liquor Co. My cases looked like Lipsett's and I took them up to the house on the arrival at the express office. It was supposed to be King's Choice Scotch Whiskey, although my order was for no definite brand as long as it was of good quality. I received no word from the vendors at to the brand being shipped to me.

**Stored Liquor.** "It came here by express in my name and I stored it in Lipsett's a key to which I had at that time, but which I returned after a half hour or so. I had made arrangements for a house of my own and had even paid a \$50 deposit for rental. The deal for the house, however, did not go through and I wired canceling the liquor; shipment but it was too late then to stop it. Harry Lipsett had told me that I could come up and live with him as I had sold my interest in my hotel and had no place to live. He said that he had a big house up on the hill and invited me. I told him about the liquor coming and asked him if I could store it at his place, too, and he assented.

**Cost \$30 a Case.** "I cannot identify the liquor shown me in the cell as there are no tags on it, although it does look like it. I did not open the cases which I put in Lipsett's house a day or so before the alleged theft. The liquor cost \$30 a case."

Mr. Patmore then examined the witness and brought forth that he did not know exactly what he had received and he could not identify the boxes.

Here a witness named Miller was called, but, not being in court or on the premises, Mr. Williams asked for adjournment and the magistrate fixed the time as 10:30 tomorrow morning.

## COMMITTEE TO OPERATE LINE

### Grand Trunk Will Work in Harmony With Canadian National Until Deal Consummated.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.) OTTAWA, Feb. 20.—Ratification of the Grand Trunk agreement by the shareholders in London will be followed by the appointment of a committee of management. The committee will be composed of five persons, two appointed by the Grand Trunk, two by the Government and the fifth by the other four.

The committee of management will endeavor to ensure the operation of the Grand Trunk system in harmony with the Canadian National Railways, the two systems being treated as nearly as possible as one.

The committee will continue to act until the Grand Trunk preferred and common stocks are vested in the Government.

## AIRPLANE SERVICE STARTED TO WARSAW

**Two Applications Lately for Power.**

An inquiry was recently received from an eastern concern asking about starting an aeroplane factory here, and especially asking if power and a site could be secured and on what terms. Last night F. R. Leyland left for the south after a visit in search of a site and power for a factory of woodproducts. Power as a determining factor in the establishment of industries is becoming more apparent every day. Electric power is what people are looking for, and they will locate where it is to be found.

**New System of Voting Justified.**

The Irish elections, according to all reports, seem to have justified the British Government in introducing Proportional Representation. The London Times says of it:—

"In the first place, the system was a mechanical success. It worked smoothly in all parts of the country. The counters and sorters made few mistakes, and in the city of Dublin especially, where there were 150 candidates for 80 seats, the town clerk and his staff did their work with admirable accuracy and expedition. The voters, too, although they included a large proportion of new women voters, seemed to have grasped the methods of voting everywhere with little difficulty.

"In the next place the Irish elections have justified the system as a fair method of giving due representation on public bodies to all sections of the community. These elections have not achieved a revolution. Some parties, notably Sinn Fein, have not done so well as they had expected, while others, notably Labor, have done rather better than their hopes. On the whole, however, the new public bodies represent the various parties in Ireland far more accurately and justly than they have been represented at any time within living memory."

**Exchange Situation Causes Demand for Products.**

The exchange situation between this country and the United States is helping to cause a demand for Canadian lumber and other commodities in the United States. The mills to the south are handicapped to the extent of the discount whatever that may happen to be. When fifty dollars a thousand is paid for lumber in the States the Canadian vendor receives something like fifty-seven dollars for it. That is good business for the mills and is the cause of the inordinate desire to ship lumber out of the country instead of supplying the prairie market.

**Toronto Editor's Opinion of Bolshevism.**

Says the Toronto Globe:—"There can be no room for compromise between sovietism and democracy. Even ignoring the savagery with which the soviet system was imposed on the Russian people, it is in principle as despotic as Czarism. 'I shall not call a constituent assembly,' said Lenin, 'for it is not the business of the masses to govern, but to obey those who know what is good for them.' Lenin has suited the action to the word by denying political rights to all who reject the Bolshevik creed. Men are forced into his armies under penalty of death and starvation, and their families held as hostages."

## ST. ANDREW'S HEAR ADDRESS BY MR. PATMORE

Speaker of the Evening Spoke on Industrial Democracy to an Appreciative Meeting.

The St. Andrew's Society gave another of its regular winter entertainments last evening when the speaker of the night was L. W. Patmore. Mr. Patmore took as his subject "Industrial Democracy" and it was appreciated as one of the most valuable and common sense lectures delivered to the society this season. He spoke of the present conditions of social unrest and advanced a plan for their settlement. Workers had been taken from the fields of peaceful industries during the war and now the time had come to bring them back into those fields after the war, activities. Some inducement must be offered them and until such time as that inducement was forthcoming there would be a continuation of the unrest. They must be shown that the present shortage of essentials of life and their consequent high price was due to the lack of production and that increased production would mean the bettering of the workers' own conditions. On the conclusion of his lecture Mr. Patmore was warmly applauded.

Among the musical numbers on the program were songs by W. M. Brown, J. T. Fraser, R. Dowther, W. H. W. Murray and R. Robertson. A recitation by Wm. Robb was well received. The St. Andrew's orchestra consisting of Dr. Bayne, J. Steven and R. Arthur, Jr., gave excellent selections. S. D. Macdonald presided over the gathering and W. Vaughan Davies was piano accompanist. Delightful refreshments supplied by the ladies were served during the interval following the lecture.

## REVISION COURT FINISHES CASES

Market Place Lots Get General Reduction—Adjourn Until Next Thursday.

At yesterday's sitting of the Court of Revision, which concluded at noon, the last work of the court was completed as far as revision is concerned. The clerk will now make up the minutes and the last session will be at 10:30 Thursday morning next when the assessor will present the revised assessment roll which will be passed by the court if found correct and signed by a majority of the members.

Yesterday lot 24, block 16, Section 1, appealed by H. G. Helgeron Co. for Gordon, McInnes and McLean was reduced in valuation from \$3,840 to \$3,780. This reduction was the cause for a general lowering of assessment in Market Place and lots 25 to 35 inclusive were reduced from \$3,840 to \$3,690. Lot 36 was reduced from \$3,840 to \$3,780.

Lot 1, block 10, Section 5, Tatlow and Fifth, belonging to M. M. Stephens, was reduced from \$2,730 to \$2,000. The lot across the street from this, lot 1, block 9, was also reduced from \$2,900 to \$2,000.

All the government interests in Blocks B, D, F, H and K were reduced to the same value as the 1919 assessment.

**MANUFACTURER SEEKS A SITE**

F. R. Leyland of New Westminster Was Here With View to Establishing New Industry.

**IMPORTANCE OF CHEAP POWER IS DISCUSSED**

Company Supplies it at Three-Quarters of a cent a Kilowatt Hour in Fraser River City.

"A suitable site with power is what I am looking for, in order to establish a factory for the establishment of laminated wood materials," said F. R. Leyland, factory manager of Laminated Materials Co. of New Westminster who returned home last night after making some investigations here.

The company which Mr. Leyland represents already has a factory at New Westminster where they manufacture water-proof ply wood panels and boxes. For this they use chiefly cottonwood. As there is a good supply of cottonwood in this district, up all the rivers, the company decided to investigate the possibilities of locating here. They sent Mr. Leyland to go over the ground and later he will return to look over timber limits and make a further investigation.

**Five-acre Site.**  
"What we want is a five-acre site on the railway and water with a place suitable for booming logs," said Mr. Leyland. "Besides that we want to get about 1,200 horse power of electric energy sufficient to operate the factory. We have already ordered the machinery and we shall establish a plant somewhere, but just where has not yet been decided. The

**Importance of Power.**  
"I should like to emphasize this especially," concluded Mr. Leyland after half an hour of interesting discussion. "It is impossible to get your load before you have your supply of power. The power must come first and whoever puts in the power must be prepared to carry the concern a short time until the load is secured. Power is what builds cities. It is the one thing above all others that manufacturers look for when they are seeking a location. Take it from me, that if Prince Rupert has the power to sell at a competitive rate she will find no difficulty in securing the industries. You must have the goods, however, before you can sell them."

It is understood that Mr. Leyland's inquiry will come before date with a view to urging the Board of Trade at an early desirability of having sites and power available for concerns that may be in search thereof.

**ASSESSMENT REDUCTIONS**

Editor, Daily News:— I wish to correct the inference the editorial in the Evening Empire of February 17 conveys re the assessment on the waterfront property. The editorial in question says a wholesale reduction in the assessment has been made and that the people are disgusted.

The people may or may not be disgusted, but a wholesale reduction has not taken place. The assessment as a whole reduces the assessment on the inside property of the city considerably. No part of the waterfront property is reduced below that of last year, yet a decided increase has taken place in the properties occupied by the cold storage and saw mill, so instead of a decrease an increase has taken place and is accordingly assessed. While it is true that the assessment as brought down by the assessor increased the assessment on the property in question a very material amount, under the peculiar condition of the property in question re exemptions in Government hands and exemptions by agreement with the G. T. P. etc., and also the matter of valuation, as to whether values are dependent on conditions or entirely independent of them, the majority of the court hesitated to confirm an increased valuation on the waterfront for the present year at least. The only purpose an increased valuation would serve would be to increase the rental basis of the land with no additional revenue for the city, due, as stated above, to exemptions, etc.

**Advice to Editors.**

While the assessed value of the land and improvements have a material bearing on the city's credit, let it also be remembered that the city's population is a very significant asset in making bond sales. Also remember that population depends upon industries and industries largely depend upon advantageous conditions. So remember, Mr. Editor, it was points of that nature that had its influence on the decision of the court and not that of a political machine. If editors would couple freedom with responsibility in their editorial writings they might materially assist in the solution of civic problems.
