Effect of Military Orders in Dublin

Restlessness shown by Nationalists but Unionists approve measure Closing City after midnight; Shoot at Sight

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
DUBLIN, February 23.—Friday's decree, stipulating that on February 23 all persons in the Dublin Metropolitan district remain indoors between midnight and 5 o'clock, was not generally unexpected. It will cause a minimum of interference with the normal life of Dublin, which goes to bed early, but it will affect a large class of night workers. The police say they have nothing to do with the matter which is entirely in the hands of the military. The order creates a puzzle for the corporation, as nearly all city cleaning is done at night. The cleaning committee will consider this phase of the situation at a special meeting on Monday.

SOLD DOPE AND GOT SIX MONTHS

Toy On Was Found Guilty by Magistrate—Marked Money Again.

Toy On, a Chinaman, was found guilty in the police court this morning of selling drugs to Charles Houston, and was sentenced to six months' imprisonment at Okalla by Magistrate Mc-Mordie.

Sergeant Adams and Constable McGlinchy arranged with Charles Houston to attempt to buy drugs at 63 Eight Avenue West where Toy On was living with Kwong Chong. On Friday evening the trap was laid and Houston went to the shack where they live while the police concealed themselves nearby. The dope was bought and accused accepted the money which was specially marked for his benefit. The police then raided the premises, found the marked money on the accused, sundry drug appliances about and dope on Houston as well as an arm swollen up from the effects of a shot. Kwong Chong, a big fat Chinaman with glasses had escaped in the meantime.

UNITED STATES PEACE TREATY RESERVATION

Democrats Join Republicans in Voting for Right of Withdrawal.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—The vote of the reservations to the Peace Treaty of last November adopted unchanged and by an increased majority on Saturday. The irreconcilables who hold the balance of power had precluded the efforts of the Republican and Democrat leaders to secure a modification in the interest of a compromise. The reservation on which the Senate acted relates to the withdrawal of the United States from the League of Nations provided that the United States shall have the sole judge whether her obligations have been fulfilled in the sense she desires to withdraw, and a notice of withdrawal may be given by concurrent resolution of Congress. The vote was 45 to 20, ten Democrats joining the solid Republican line up supporting it.

WONG CHOSE A SPEEDY TRIAL

Lee Wong, charged with breaking a plate glass window, the property of J. Reda, appeared before Judge Young this morning and elected for speedy trial. He pleaded not guilty and his case will be dealt with on the recovery of W. E. Fisher, crown prosecutor, from an attack of influenza.

GERMAN INSURANCE TAKEN BEFORE WAR IS GOOD IN CANADA

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, Feb. 23.—Insurance policies issued by German companies before the war are still good in Canada and the Canadian Government is prepared to protect Canadians who possess paid up insurance of this kind. Most of such policies were held in Canada by Italians, Norwegians, and Swedes. Sums falling due during the war are recoverable with interest at five per cent from the date they came due.

STRIKES EXPENSIVE FOR TRADES UNIONS

LONDON, Feb. 23.—During the last quarter the General Federation of Trades Unions paid out £145,700 in connection with cotton and other strikes.

Farmers will Discuss the Desirability of Entering Into Provincial Politics

VICTORIA, February 23.—A union of all farmers of British Columbia for political action will undoubtedly be the chief topic of discussion at the gathering of farmers here during this week, but what action will be taken it is impossible to forecast.

The question has never been discussed by the directors officially, said President Copeland of the United Farmers, and I don't think it will be brought forward by them. Among the 100 delegates present already almost the sole subject of discussion is the possibility of political action in the province. Others are arriving on the boat from Vancouver today.

GERMAN CANNON ON SYLT ISLAND

Officers in Charge Were Dressed in Civilian Clothes.

COPENHAGEN, Feb. 23.—A Berlingske Tidendes Flensburg correspondent states that the International Commission has discovered 42 cannon and 10 machine guns in working order on Sylt Island of Schleswig Holsten. The officers commanding the batteries were dressed in civilian clothes and had forbidden the international police to enter the territory after 10 at night.

BOLSHEVISTS SWEEP RUSSIA IN ELECTION

Have Elected 524 Out of 574 Deputies to Soviet.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—A wireless message from Russia dealing with the Moscow Soviet elections says that of the 574 deputies whose election is definitely established 524 were Bolshevik candidates.

COMMANDER MUSGRAVE DIED AT ESQUIMALT

Was formerly Stationed off this Coast and Surveyed Approaches to Harbor.
Word has been received from Victoria of the death of Commander Musgrave of the D. S. S. Lilloet at Esquimalt. His end came as a result of heart failure. Among the survey work done by Commander Musgrave was the approach to Prince Rupert harbor, part of Hecate Straits, Victoria and Esquimalt harbors, Granby Bay and Alice Arm.

CAPTAIN P. M. MILLER OF PRINCE RUPERT ARRIVES AT ST. JOHN

St. John, N. B., Feb. 23.—The liner Melita arrived here from London bringing a number of British Columbia men, among them being Capt. P. M. Miller of Prince Rupert. Percy Miller was one of the surveyors on the Prince Rupert townsite and later was a partner in the real estate business with H. O. Crewe in Prince Rupert. B. C. Undertakers. Phone 41.

OTTAWA FORESHADOWS LIQUOR LAWS CHANGE

Suggestion that Private Bill may Make Three-Fifths Vote Necessary for Bone Dry Legislation in any Province.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, February 23.—The temperance legislation enacted on a Sunday morning at the close of the last session of Parliament that confers on any province the opportunity to give provincial wide effect by referendum to the Canada Temperance Act, may be considerably amended this session.

Under present legislation any provincial legislature can request the Federal Government to hold a referendum, and if the majority favors the adoption of the Canada Temperance Act the province becomes dry although the manufacture is not prohibited.

It is proposed to amend the act so that a three-fifths favorable vote will be required to give effect to stringent temperance legislation.

It is said that the Government will not make any opposition to the change as a matter of party policy and that members will not be restricted in a free expression by speech or vote by party affiliation. Such an amendment will receive support from members both of the government and opposition.

The Manitoba Government has announced that a referendum will be asked for. Alberta and Saskatchewan will do likewise and it is practically certain that the new Government in Ontario will make a similar request.

In the event of a three-fifths favorable vote being required, it is suggested that other provinces than Quebec will adopt a cafe and dispensary system, permitting the sale of beer and light wines.

LIBERALS ARE ORGANIZING

Reports Received at Ottawa Indicate Great Activity in Anticipation of Election.

OTTAWA, Feb. 23.—Reports to the Liberal organization headquarters indicate that organization of Liberal associations in several of the provinces is being pursued vigorously in preparation for any election which may loom up. In British Columbia the work is being pushed. A fillip has been given to western organization by the appointment of A. J. Meyers, until recently secretary to Dr. King, as Liberal organizer with head offices at Vancouver. He will direct the work throughout the province.

WILL TRADE WITH RUSSIA

Lloyd George and Premier Nitti Agree to Resume Commercial Relations.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—Premiers Lloyd George and Nitti have agreed to complete the resumption of relations with Russia, but will have no diplomatic dealings with the Soviet Government, it was reported here today shortly before the resumption of conferences of the Council of Premiers.

SOUTH AMERICAN POLICE CONFERENCE

BUENOS AYRES, Feb. 23.—A conference of the police of South American republics is in progress here. The main business is the discussion of ways and means to suppress radicals and combatting anarchy.

PROVINCE DOES NOT PROVIDE CITY PRISON

It is Duty of Civic Authorities to Provide Accommodation for Women.

This morning Mrs. E. C. Kirkpatrick received a letter from Deputy Attorney General Johnston regarding jail accommodation for women in this city. He says:

"Replying to your letter of the 5th instant in which you call attention to the lack of proper jail accommodation at Prince Rupert for female prisoners, I beg to advise you that this is entirely a matter for the municipality. I quite agree with you that it is not proper for women to be imprisoned in the same quarters as men and that separate quarters should be provided. I do not know if the delegation you speak of has met the government as yet, but as far as jail accommodation is concerned, even if the government did erect new administration buildings in Prince Rupert, there is no reason why they should provide for prisoners' accommodation, other than for prisoners who might be detained there respecting offences committed outside of the limits of the municipality."

WEDDING OF LOCAL INTEREST TOOK PLACE AT PRINCE GEORGE

Harry Avison, Who Lived Here Formerly, Marries Miss M. A. Peterson of Interior Town.

The wedding was solemnized at Prince George on February 4 of H. S. Avison, formerly of this city, and Miss M. A. Peterson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Peterson, of Prince George. Mr. Avison is the son of Henry Avison, who was government sanitary inspector here and lived on Seventh Avenue West. He served overseas with the Canadians and received severe shrapnel wounds. The young couple will be the recipients of many congratulations and well wishes for their future happiness.

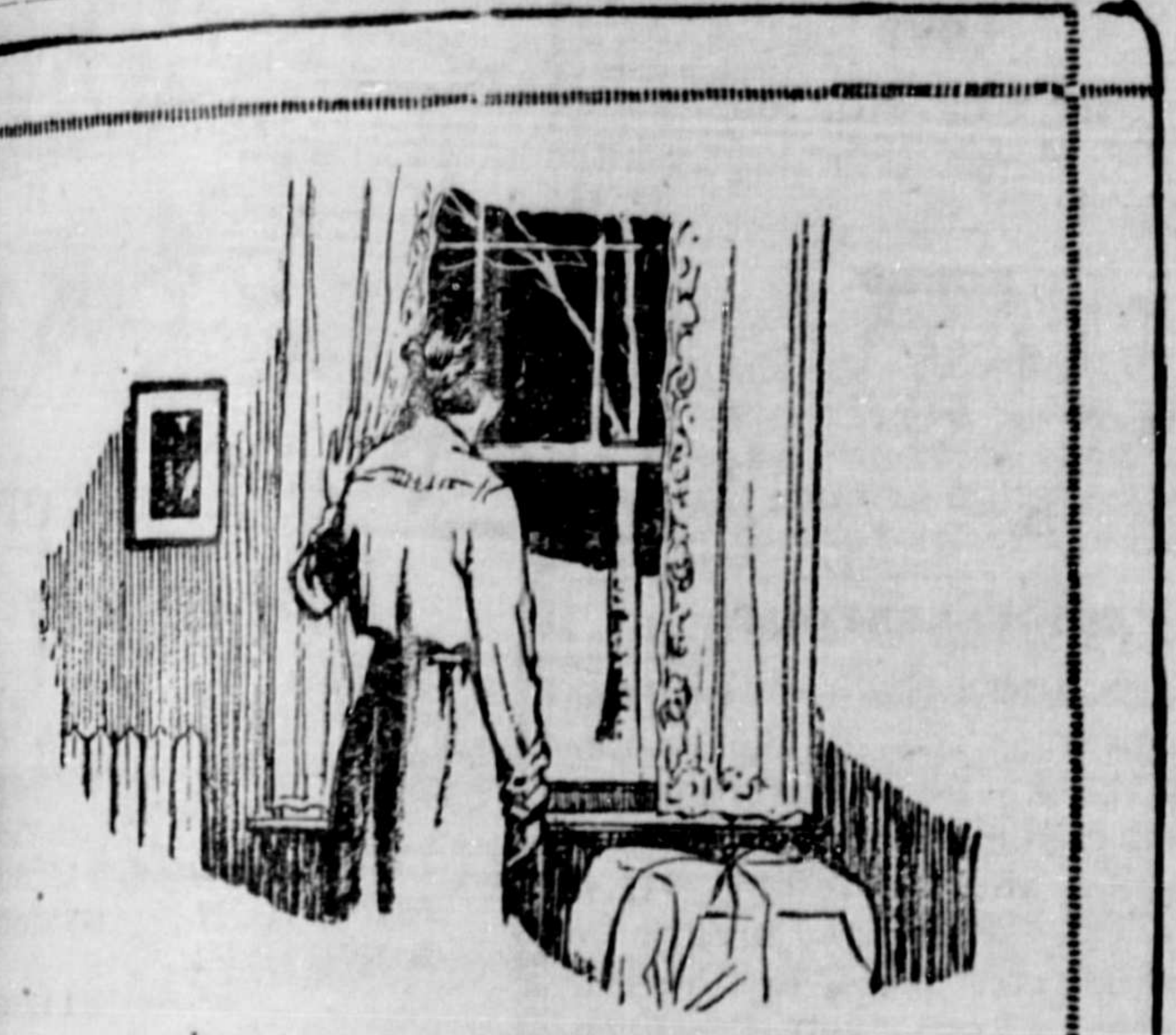

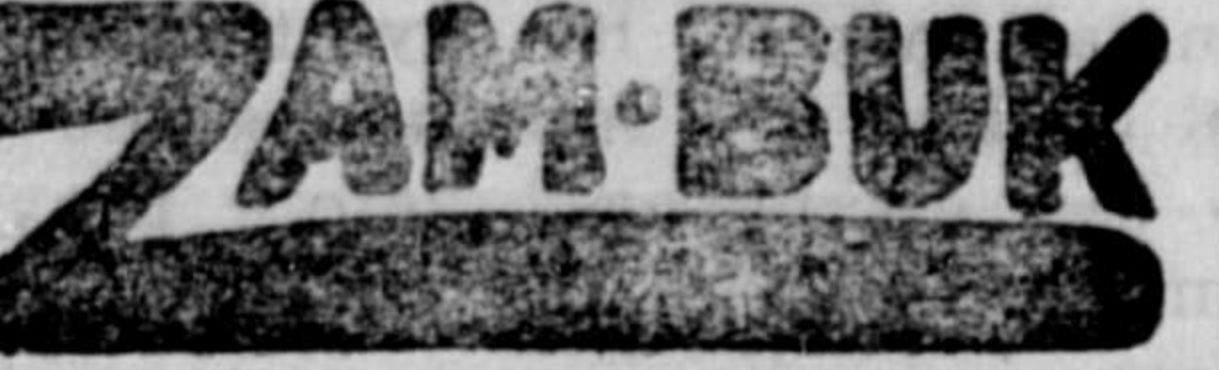

The Stewart Citizens' Association adopted a resolution that there is no necessity for the employment of Orientals in the Portland Canal district. A sign is to be posted on the wharf advising that Orientals are not required.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and improvement conditions.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditionally upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 25, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commission. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

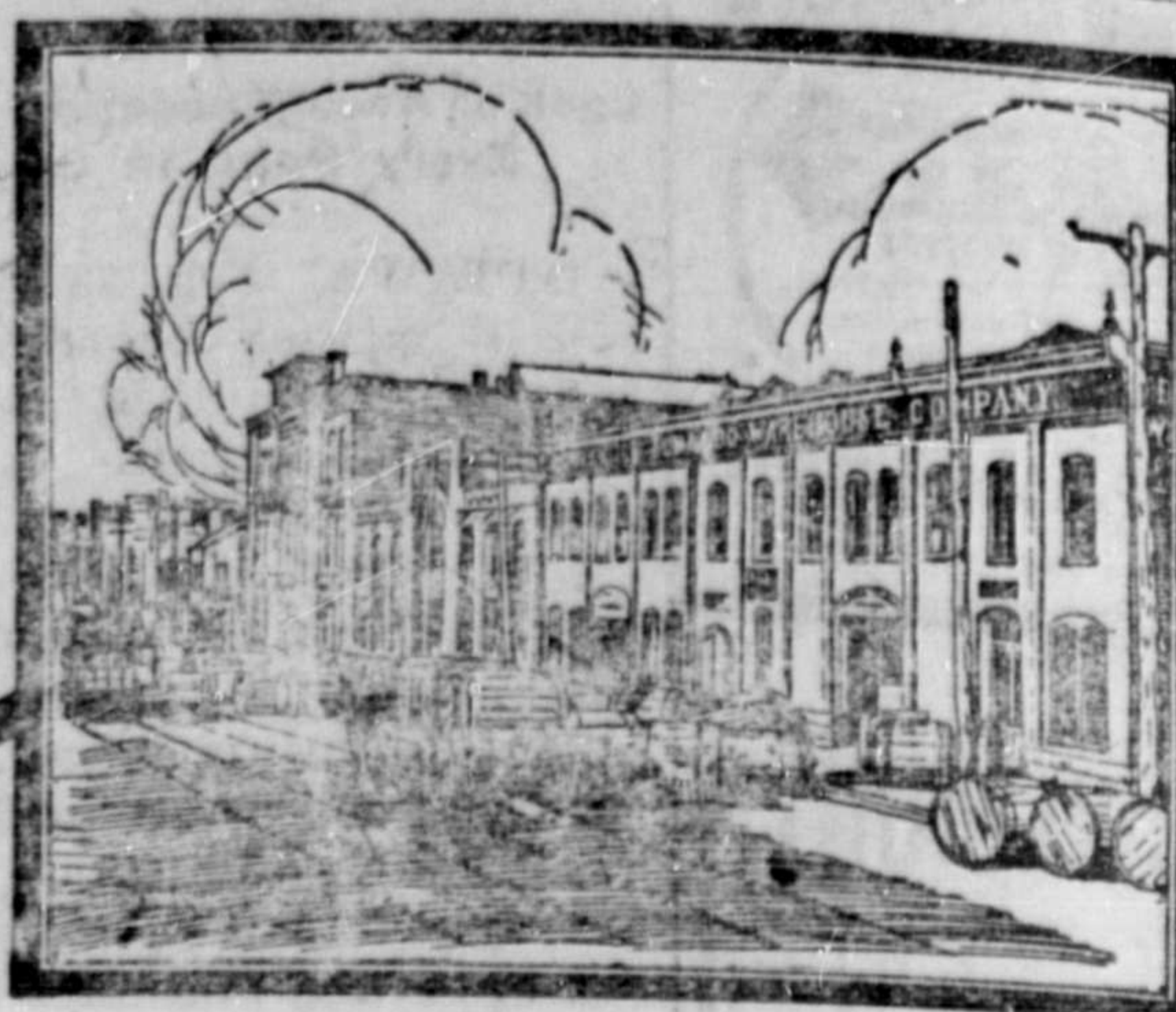
