Winston Churchill Speaks on Necessity of a Strong Army

Dangers from Turkey, the Far East, Egypt and the Bolsheviks Make Strong Garrison Necessary; Example to "Pious America."

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, February 24.—Hon. Winston Churchill in the House of Commons yesterday said that Great Britain's army was slightly bigger than before the war, but she was ready to make arrangements, which in peace were identical with those which the country lived before the war. The speaker said, to pretend that Great Britain's army was proportionate to the risk she ran or to the part she played and aspired to play in European diplomacy was to give the chance of a recurrence of the German danger to the British Empire. On the other hand, he explained, the responsibilities at the outset must be placed on the country which was in a state of extreme disquiet. Considering our burdens throughout the middle east, Constantinople, Egypt, Persia, and Mesopotamia," Mr. Churchill said, "it can be expected until real peace is made with Turkey. We have lost money steadily through the whole of last year and we are disposed of our armies we shall not now take steps which will drive the Turkish people to despair or undertake any new obligations because our resources are not adequate to the needs. We do not know when peace with Turkey will be made," he said to the minister, "or what degree of acquisition we shall get from the Turkish people. We do not know what aggression the Russian Bolsheviks will take in this sphere. We do not know how far Viscount Milner's commission may be able to settle the contention in Egypt. We do not know when our responsibilities in Constantinople will terminate or when the time of maintaining an international force there will be taken by an international body." Churchill emphasized his confidence in what the country would do when the general election came, to a Government which was fighting conscription, had set an example to the whole world in its army vote for 275,000,000 on account of which the debate was agreed to by 215 to 52.

COUNCIL STILL LASHES WITH SCHOOL BOARD

to Pass All Estimates and Complete List of Extraordinary Requirements.

It was decided at last night's meeting to pass all the estimates as presented by the school board with the exception of \$14,000 for furnishings and equipment. In their report the finance committee has expressed its disapproval of the recommendation, although that it be raised as a by-law. It was decided not to accept this recommendation, Mr. Ald. Perry making an amendment to that effect. In dealing with his amendment, Mr. Perry also asked that a committee of all extraordinary expenses be submitted by the school board to the city council. The council in regard to the re-opening of the school building on consultation with the architect, was received last night, however, excavation is progressing on the new site at Hays Circle. A slighting way in which the school board had treated the city council was again touched on at last night's council meeting.

BOMB FAILED TO EXPLODE

Attempt to Blow up Constabulary Barracks at Ballynahinch, Ireland.

DUBLIN, Feb. 24.—An attempt was made last night to blow up the constabulary barracks in the market town of Ballynahinch, County Down. A bomb placed for the purpose failed to explode. The town had been previously isolated by the cutting of telegraph wires and the blocking with trees of roads leading into it.

DANES TAKE CONTROL OF SCHLESWIG

COLOGNE, Feb. 24.—A number of Danish officials including the postal employees crossed the frontier preparatory to taking up the work of administering Northern Schleswig, which recently voted to be included within the Kingdom of Denmark.

BROUSSEAU KNOCKS OUT YOUNG AHEARN

Fight Arranged by Victor With Mike O'Dowd at Montreal.

MONTREAL, Feb. 24.—Eugene Brousseau, the crack Canadian middleweight, knocked out Young Ahearn, the middleweight champion of Europe, in the first round of a scheduled ten-round bout. After the fight Paddy Mullens, manager for Mike O'Dowd, the world's champion middleweight, signed Brousseau to fight O'Dowd here on May 24 for the championship.

SEPTIC TANK CASE IN POLICE COURT

Health Officer Insists That Action be Taken Against Builder.

Peter Glomach was found guilty in the Police Court this morning of having a septic tank built on his property without a permit and was fined ten dollars. The witnesses were Health Inspector Marlin, Building Inspector Mathieson and Contractor Andrew Kunka. The Health Inspector insisted that the same charge be preferred against Kunka despite the recommendation of Magistrate McMorris that it be dismissed. Adjudgment was made in order that the magistrate may ascertain if the builder can be held responsible for such a structure on the premises of the owner.

LABOR'S PROTEST

Max L. Hays Wires President Asking Him to Veto Bill Returning Railways to Owners.

CLEVELAND, Feb. 24.—Max L. Hays, national chairman of the labor party of the United States, sent a telegram to President Wilson, voicing a protest against the proposed bill for returning the railways to private ownership. He denounced the measure as legislation for the benefit of the special interests and demands that the president veto it.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—By a vote of nearly three to one the Senate passed and sent to the President a modified Railroad Reorganization Bill, under which the carriers of the country will attempt to adjust themselves to conditions arising with the end of Government control.

Burglars Rifled Queen's Coffin at Charlottenburg And Stole King's Crowns

BERLIN, February 24.—Burglars rifled the mausoleum of Charlottenburg Castle on Sunday night and removed the jewels from the coffin of the late Queen Louisa, who died in 1810, but apparently were afraid to open the other coffins. Besides rifling the coffin they removed the gold and silver and gilded crowns lying on the coffins of the late Emperor William I, Empress Augusta, Prince Albrecht and others. In this place repose the bodies not only of Queen Louisa but also of her husband Frederick William III, who died in 1840, together with their second son, Emperor William I, who died in 1888 and Empress Augusta who died in 1890.

R. A. COPELAND MADE PRESIDENT UNITED FARMERS

Expressed Himself as Pleased With Honor—Better Than Premiership.

RESOLUTION OPPOSES DAYLIGHT SAVING

VICTORIA, February 24.—R. A. Copeland, of Lumby, was unanimously re-elected president of the United Farmers of British Columbia at the annual convention here. The vice-president is W. Paterson of Koksilah. L. M. Humphreys, of Malakwa, and J. L. Priddyham, of Victoria, were nominated, but they withdrew. In expressing his thanks, Mr. Copeland said that he would rather be elected president of the United Farmers than be made premier of the province. "The movement in British Columbia," he added, "is now well over the hills and it is impossible for it to fail. It is bound to grow and the members can do much in promoting the growth."

The whole afternoon session was taken up with the consideration of resolutions from local units. One opposing daylight saving was passed after much local discussion. Another resolution condemned the policy of the Soldiers' Settlement Board in discouraging purchase by soldiers, under the act, of improved farms and orchards. This was voted down because the members felt that it was a matter that should be left with the soldiers' organizations.

PRESEGES FALL OF TURKISH EMPIRE

Famous Tree in Garden of Gethsemane Falls—Interesting Tradition.

JERUSALEM, Feb. 24.—During a recent snowstorm the famous tree "Ebutini" in the Garden of Gethsemane was blown down. According to tradition this tree would fall when the Turkish Empire had fallen. Twice it was bound round with iron braces to prevent it from falling.

Rev. Wm Ivens Must Keep the Peace

Bound Over in Sureties for \$2,000 by Court of King's Bench at Winnipeg for Contempt of Court.

WINNIPEG, February 24.—Rev. William Ivens, found guilty by the Full Court of King's Bench on the charge of contempt of court, has been bound over to keep the peace for three months on \$2,000 security. Chief Justice Mathers, in handing down the decision, said the accused had been bound over to keep the peace in order not to hamper the defence in the trial of strike leaders on charges of seditious conspiracy. Ivens furnished \$1,000 security. The other \$1,000 was supplied by James Wilcox, secretary of the Labor Church.

A. K. MACLEAN HAS RESIGNED FROM CABINET

Believed in Line with Statement of Montreal Gazette that Coalition Usefulness is Done.

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—Hon. A. K. MacLean (Liberal) minister without portfolio in the Unionist government, has resigned in accordance with the feeling recently expressed by the Montreal Gazette that the 'contract' of the Unionist cabinet is now up. Mr. MacLean entered the cabinet for the period of the war and a reasonable period of reconstruction. Hon. A. K. MacLean is a native and resident of Nova Scotia, having been born in North Sydney. He was called to the Nova Scotia bar in 1892 and was elected to the Nova Scotia provincial house in 1904, entering the Dominion house in 1904 as member for Lunenburg. He was elected as member in the House of Commons for Halifax in 1911, later being called to the Unionist cabinet. He has been a life long Liberal.

U. S. RAILWAY LAWYER FOR GOVERNMENT

Counsel has been Appointed in Connection With Arbitration.

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—The Government has appointed counsel for the arbitration which, under the chairmanship of Mr. Justice Cassels of the Exchequer Court, will decide upon the value of the preferred and common stock of the Grand Trunk Railway Co. They comprise W. N. Tilley, K. G., of Toronto; Pearce Butler, a prominent United States railway lawyer; Hector McInnes, K. C., of Halifax, and H. A. Lovett, K. C., of Montreal.

E. BRYNOLSON DIES AT CAPITAL CITY

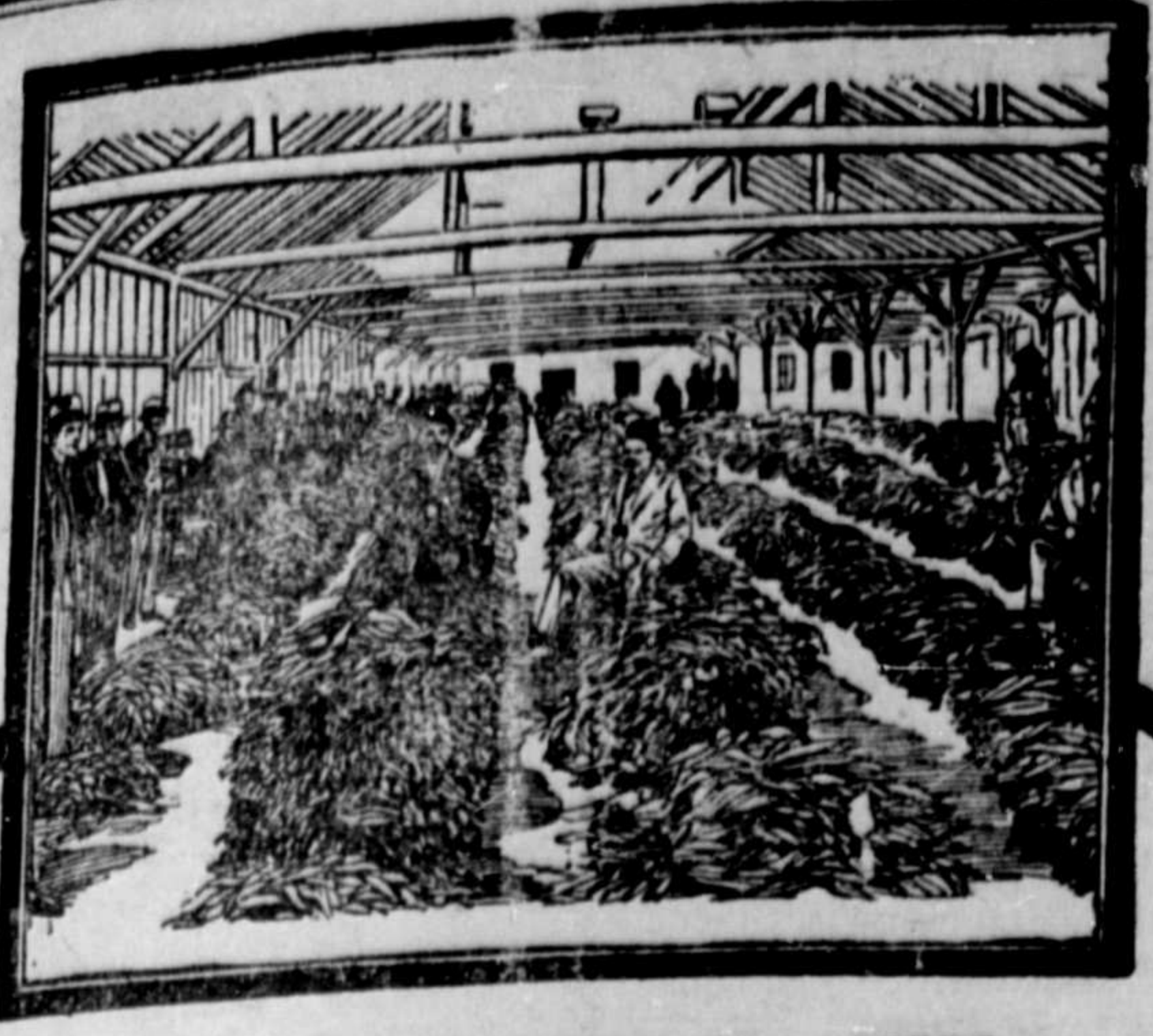
F. G. Brynolson and Ed. Brynolson Will Leave for Victoria to Attend Funeral.

PLAN FOR THIS YEAR'S FAIR IS AMBITIOUS ONE

Delegation of the Agricultural Association Requests Increased Municipal Grant.

A delegation from the Northern B. C. Agricultural and Industrial Association consisting of H. S. Wallace, George D. Tite, George Bryant and E. R. Tabrum waited on the council last night asking for an increased grant of \$1,500 and an additional grant of \$50 for this year's fair.

H. S. Wallace spoke of the ambitious plans the Association had for a much improved fair this year. Attractions were to be more of a feature than ever and the expenditure was to be greatly increased.

George D. Tite spoke of the unforeseen expenditure that had been incurred during the past year and stated that the Association was in immediate need of funds.

SCARLET FEVER AND MEASLES CONFUSION AIRED LAST NIGHT

Reports from the sanitary inspector, Dr. Cade, and Warden Bailey in regard to the conflicting reports as to scarlet fever and measles at the Pacific Rooms has brought forth the fact that, although police records say so, there was no scarlet fever there.

General Clean Up. In his report, the sanitary inspector said that he and the building inspector had prepared a list of improvements that Walter Shaw would have to make to his premises or else it would be closed up.

Warden Bailey said in his report that he had understood over the phone that it was scarlet fever; instead of measles which Dr. Cade had reported. It came out that Dr. Cade had never seen the child that died until after the death and the child he had seen had been one in a different apartment.

A Mistake. "After the council meeting last Monday night I went into the police station and saw scarlet fever plainly in Bailey's handwriting on the book," said Alderman-Rochester.

"Next day I went in and asked Warden Bailey about it and he indignantly said that there was no such thing as scarlet fever written in the police records. I called for the book and showed him. 'Oh, a man is bound to make a mistake once in a while,' said Bailey.

COUNCIL ADOPTS PLAN CITY HALL ADDITION

The report of the Board of Works, at last night's Council meeting, recommending an addition to the city hall to be used as women's jail quarters and an office for the chief of police and the magistrate was adopted.

Operations have commenced on camp building at the Wolf mine, Alice Arm, preparatory to the installation of a water power compressor there.

FRACAS OVER PROHIBITION IN MICHIGAN

Commissioner Declares Iron County is in State of Revolt.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
CHICAGO, Feb. 23.—Declaring "Iron County, Michigan, is in open revolt" against the federal authority, Major A. L. Dalrymple, prohibition director for the central states, telephoned Washington asking that warrants be obtained from Attorney General Palmer for the arrest of the state attorney of Iron County, two deputy sheriffs, two police officers and three wealthy Italian residents of Iron River.

Assistant Prohibition Director Yalord at Washington, promises to communicate with Palmer at once.

Leo J. Grove, supervising prohibition agent for northern Michigan, was held up by Iron County officials while seizing contraband liquor and eleven barrels of confiscated wine was taken from him. The attack on Grove, who was accompanied by three Michigan state constables, was led by State Attorney P. A. McDough of Iron County, he said.

SMITHERS

George Oulton of Bulkley Flats has received from R. C. W. Lett, G. T. P. tourist and colonization agent, a small sample of the new hull-less oat that has recently been developed by the Dominion cerealist. The new seed will be tried out at Mr. Oulton's ranch and also in higher ground. The experiment will be followed with great interest by all farmers.

A credit to the town of Smithers and a standing monument to the enterprise of her citizens, the town hall, is to be opened formally on March 8 with a grand ball. The new hall is most modern in regard to construction and plan and it has the largest floor space of any similar building between Prince Rupert and Edmonton. It is a two-story building 90 by 36 feet and will be a general purpose hall. It is well equipped with dressing rooms and the floor has been specially made with a view to the use of the place as a dance hall. There is also a commodious stage with all conveniences for the staging of moving pictures and stock companies as well.

Although he is one of the oldest settlers of the Lakes district, having come into the country over the old Cariboo trail, R. D. Prosser made his first visit to this place from Francois Lake last week. Mr. Prosser is confident that the coming summer will see a stampede of settlers to the lakes country.
