Liquor Interests Busy at Ottawa.

The liquor interests are busy at Ottawa trying to undo the legislation which was passed at the last session of the Dominion Parliament, giving the provinces the right to pass bone dry legislation. Now they are asking that instead of a majority vote, they shall require a three-fifths vote in order to make it effective.

In order to get rid of the responsibility it is said that the Prince Rupert, B. C., as owner in under a Tax sale Deed from the Dominion Government will not make it a party question but will leave each member to vote as he sees fit.

The farmers movement in Ontario proved popular, and on the prairies it is likely to be acceptable to the majority of the voters, but in British Columbia things are different. No one seems to know what the outcome will be. There is a Home Rule bill in prospect which a few years ago would have been acceptable with alacrity but which today finds no favor in the Emerald Isle. It would be a wise prophet who could tell with any degree of certainty what the future holds.

Providing for Women Prisoners.

The decision of the City Council to provide an addition as a lockup which can, when necessary, be used to house women prisoners, is one that must meet with approval. It had become a public scandal for women to be in the same prison with men. Recently an arrangement had been made with the Salvation Army to care for women prisoners, but it was not to be expected that this could continue. There had to be provision made sooner or later and the City Council has recognized this and done its duty in regard to the matter.






